# Digital Picture storage and uploading online

ast month we looked at how to save your digital photos onto your computer; from a memory card or direct from your camera. Once you have them saved, normally in the *My Pictures* folder, there are lots of things you can do. You may want to send a copy of some or all to friends or family. If there are lots of photos involved, your best choice will be to burn them onto a CD so it can be read on another PC or even a home DVD player attached to a TV.

Burning photos onto a CD is easy in Windows XP and even easier in Vista. Just go to the folder that contains the chosen photos and right click on it and on the menu that appears click Send to, and then CD/DVD writer. A couple of clicks later you are ready to create the CD, and you can even type a name in the box provided (if you don't name it, the date will appear instead). In *Vista* you just locate the folder and then click the button at the top of the screen that says 'burn'.

!Tip! I am often asked what sort of CDs to buy. For general use CD-R disks are fine and will work in most types of player.

Remember that being well organised is the key to making all these tasks as straightforward as possible. In the *My Pictures* folder, if you have folders that need renaming, just right click on any one and then click Rename, and then type the new name for it and press enter. If you have odd photos scattered around, create a place to put them by clicking on New and then Folder and then type a name as above. Then all you have to do is drag the errant photos and drop them on top of the new folder, and they will be neatly filed away. (You can rename photos in exactly the same way as folders).

Sending by email is of course a very quick and easy way to let others see your photographic handiwork. The normal way is to type your email, then click on the paper clip at the top, and browse to where the photo/s you want and then click attach or insert. But an even easier way is to go to the photo/s first and then on the left hand 'tasks menu' click 'Email this file'. (or you can right click on it, and click Send to and Mail recipient. Either way, *Windows* will helpfully offer to 'make all your pictures smaller'. This is worth doing in order to speed up the process, and is essential if you have a dial up connection to the Internet, as opposed to Broadband. (the same applies for the recipient). Once you have done this, Windows will attach the chosen pictures to a new email and leave you to type it as normal.

!Tip! Photo files can be quite large. To check the size of a photo, or any other file, right click on it and click Properties.

Sharing photos on the Internet is also very popular now. There are many sites that allow you to do this, like MSN and many of the 'social networking' sites. This is called 'uploading' and the pictures are stored online for viewing. One note of caution here, do bear in mind that unless the site offers to password protect your collection, it will be open for all to see, so bear that in mind and consider whether your subjects will be happy with that.

Windows Vista has had numerous updates since its launch last year, and now in order to address further issues, Microsoft has released Service Pack 1. Although there have already been reports of compatibility problems with some programs. Many will remember when the same happened with Windows XP some years back, to be superseded later by the essential Service Pack 2. This is yet another reason highlighting the importance of Broadband to a modern computer. Windows like many other applications is constantly evolving and without the means to be able to download sometimes sizeable updates online, your computer could become a security risk.

!Tip! To see if you have XP Service Pack 2, hold down the Windows key and press the Pause/Break key. It will show underneath the XP version.

Online security is of course a major consideration for everyone now. To ensure you stay safe, ensure you have all the *Windows* latest updates as described above, and of course up to date anti-virus software. If you don't have it already, download *Internet Explorer version 7*. This is a free download from *Microsoft* for users of genuine *Windows XP* (*Vista* has it built in). *Version 8* has just been launched as a beta or test preview for Developers, so look out for the official launch of that sometime soon. Users of *Firefox*, an alternative web browser, will be interested to know that Version 3 will be forthcoming soon; a test version is available now.

!Tip! Broadband: there should be some good news coming soon in the form of some new packages from Karoo. Those considering signing up are being advised to wait until the new offers are launched around April 6th.



# Police Report from PC Morley

PC Steve Morley was unable to give uptodate crime statistics but he updated Councillors on the previous month. He was pleased to report that LPT are getting a fifth PCSO.

He also said there had only been two incidents in the last month; one when a funeral wake had descended into a street brawl, and a weekend when youths had come into the village and damaged cars. An arrest had been made since and there had been no more reports of any more damage.

The Parish Council has agreed to provide two cycles for the neighbourhood police team. A quote of £198.89 per bicycle has been verbally agreed with Cottingham Cycles, ie just under £400 in total.

## **Planning Committee Report**

Councillor Hardwick reported that two items were outstanding and needed to be dealt with.

The display of Illuminated signs at 42-44 King Street Cottingham for Boots the Chemist. The Council unanimously agreed that they had no objections to this application.

The movement of three plants outside Somerfield Ltd was agreed by the councillors.

# **Grant Applications**

A grant application form had been received from East Riding Rangers to purchase a line marking machine and an award of £250 had been given.

Cottingham Springboard Festival have been awarded £200 for publicity and hire of equipment.

A grant application had been received from Cottingham High School to help with air fares for an exchange visit, this was refused but they have been given another contact for another organisation in order to assist them.

# All Allotments Contracted Out

Councillor Hardwick reported to the council that all the vacant plots were now contracted out. He also stated that the rat problem still existed and had reminded the association members not to put down poison, because it gets into the food chain and can kill cats, dogs and wildlife etc.

## Yorkshire in Bloom

The judges for the Yorkshire in Bloom will be in Cottingham on Wednesday 9 April for the spring judging. The Chairman reported that the meeting of the first Steering Group meeting which had been held on 19 March had been well attended and was moving along rapidly.

# West End Christmas Lights

The Cottingham Christmas Lights West End Organisation had an agreement with the electricity board, that the lights electricity supply was not metered, and that they paid an agreed figure at the end of the lights switch-on period.

The electricity supplier had changed to another supplier and the West End Organisation received an unexpected bill for over £3000, which they do not have the funds to pay. They have asked for assistance from the Parish Council, possibly with legal advice. Councillors suggested that the group should publicise their problem through the Press and also offered to put the problem to David Davis MP.

# Response from the Cottingham Parish Council to the flooding in June 2007

ottingham Parish Council elected a Committee of three to action plan the response to the flooding. The Committee's objectives were:

a) to determine why the flooding occurred

b) to make recommendations to prevent any further flooding

The Committee, through investigation with landowners, parishioners, East Riding of Yorkshire Council, the Environment Agency and Yorkshire Water, established that the village is drained in a west to east direction and a north to south direction. Mill Beck and Creyke Beck are the major two becks that carry the water to Snuff Mill Lane and then to Clough Road/River Hull/Barmston Drain. These two becks converge in an area known as Cottingham Bogs to the rear of Hallgate School and then combine to flow into Snuff Mill Lane. The west to east drainage plan follows Eppleworth Road to West End Road, around West End Road and via culverts to Crescent Street, the rear of Needler Hall, underneath King Street, the rear of the school playing fields and then converges at the bogs area.

Mill Beck is a major drain facility in a north to south direction. Mill Beck drains land between Beverley and Cottingham including Poplar Farm, Wanless Farm, Pillwood Farm, Burn Park Farm, Halsham Salad Nurseries, Glenavon Nurseries and Park Lane Nurseries. All these properties are drained via tributaries into Mill Beck. Creyke Beck Sub Station also appears to drain into Mill Beck.

Creyke Beck appears to drain all the land to the east of the railway to Dunswell Road, Lawns Farm, the North Moor school development, Holly Oaks Farm. The overflow from Swifts' lagoons at no 1 gate drains into Creyke Beck. Creyke Beck is culverted under the railway to an open beck behind the old P&D carpet factory, Danish Bacon factory, open drain to the rear of Victoria's Way and then is culverted again underneath Hallgate to Beck Bank.

The evidence to date shows that the 2007 flood was a 1 in a 100 year occurrence and not attributed to global warming, but what must be appreciated is that the global warming argument states that rainfall is going to increase alongside hotter and dryer summers and adverse weather conditions will be prominent in all seasons.

The problems associated with Eppleworth Road/West End Road were massive volumes of water moving in a west to east direction from Raywell, the hamlet of Eppleworth, surface water from the A164 and excessive flood overspill from the new hospital site which couldn't be accommodated in the culverts and dykes system at each side of Eppleworth Road. The water became backed up at West End Road due to the size of culverts and the orientation of the culverts; it then followed a natural course and the contours of the land through to Crescent Street, flooding Crescent Street and George Street and then on via Needler Hall to the bogs area near to Hallgate school. At the same time massive quantities of flash flood water was engulfing Mill Beck which again converges in the bogs area. The overspill of water took numerous directions ñ across the railway and into Northgate, New Village Road crossing which caused the overspill of Creyke Beck. The culverts couldn't cope and the overspill continued to flood properties in North Moor Lane.

The Parish Council brought together at various meetings the major players to discuss the issues, gain advice and consolidate a positive action plan. From this it appears a lagoon system will be the most economic and immediate, effective measure to prevent further flooding. The locations of the lagoons are critical and become a very sensitive requirement with regard to compulsory

purchase of land and the necessary controlled discharging of overspill in lagoons.

To date it appears lagoons are necessary in Eppleworth Road. Following investigations for Creyke Beck and Mill Beck it really does make sense to find locations for lagoons to relieve the pressure on Mill Beck and consequently the bogs area to reduce the possibility of flooding to Victoria's Way.

It is my personal view that there are civic societies that will want to protect historical sites but definitely Dene Wood could be enlarged in surface area but not in its depth due to the effects of springs and water course disturbance. It could be sympathetically landscaped to retain the amenity but increase the volume of water that the lagoon could hold.

Also the moat area to the rear of West End Road/Northgate could be utilised to relieve the flooding probability of George Street/Crescent Street.

It appears the Millbeck Wildlife field area is certainly an outstanding probability for lagoon location to relieve the pressure on Mill Beck through to the bogs area.

The culverted system from West Green through to Hallgate school, taking a route through Crescent Street, underneath George Street, through to Needler Hall and then underneath King Street is an old Victorian culvert and estimates to date show investigative camera work runs at £1,000 per day and 14 days are required for a positive result.

Coming back to Eppleworth Road it is futile to clean out the dyke on the north side of Eppleworth Road between the cemetery and West End Road without total removal of the spoil and we are currently looking at the requirements for landfill of that spoil and all the costs involved together with its implications to riparian ownership. The Parish Council will be contacting all the residents on Eppleworth Road with a riparian responsibility to discuss our findings and the costings to provide adequate water flow in a west to east direction.

The lake to the rear of properties on Dunswell Road which was constructed by Mr H B Wright (deceased) involves a court case based in 1969 where the responsibility for cleaning Creyke Beck was given to the, as then, Rivers Authority. This was quite an unusual outcome where riparian responsibility is contested. It appears that because the judgement was found in a Magistrates Court it could be somewhat fragile to assume riparian responsibility now, and in the future, would rest on the same evidence as 1969.

A substantial amount of work has been done to establish who now has responsibility for the old Cottingham Internal Drainage Boards' terms of reference. Giving my personal opinion again ñ I believe that the Cottingham Drainage Board should be reestablished as it would give the Cottingham parishioners an immediate response to a drainage problem.

Again, personally, I believe pressure must be brought to bear on the major players to gain government financial support to implement lagoon provision otherwise, as has been evidenced over the past five years, it is apparent flooding will occur predominantly in the Eppleworth Road/West End Road/George Street/Crescent Street/Victoria's Way locations. The cost of replacing the Victorian culverts would be astronomical; lagoons will, I am sure, be the most effective and economic option.

# Hull FC star Lee Jackson to sign copies of his book "Just Jacko" at Barkers, Hallgate on Thursday 17th April

ee Jackson signed for Hull FC at the age of sixteen and went on to play rugby league in three decades.

He won a Grand Final with the Newcastle Knights in Australia, the Challenge Cup with Leeds Rhinos and the Premiership Trophy with his beloved Hull FC.

"Just Jacko" (priced at £8.99) tells the story of a kid from the Bransholme Estate in Hull who made it big in the sporting world. It tells of his highs and lows in the game and his adventures as a player on tour in such places as Papua New Guinea and New Zealand.



# Rugby for Grannies -Advice for the uninitiated

## What to wear

Wrap up and wear your walking boots. Rugby is played on open, wind swept fields, in winter. Games are not stopped because of rain, snow or sleet. Your grandson is playing on a muddy field in a short sleeved shirt and rugby shorts (two pairs?). His legs are turning red and looking sore. You are standing on the touch line all wrapped up, you must NOT leave to sit in the car.

### What to shout

You will learn much of the language by standing near the fathers, but beware of using it until you are sure of what it means. Cries of '..king ref' are not accolades on the skill of the referee and, although the ball is vital to the game '..king ball' does not reflect this. You'd do well to avoid all reference to royalty until you are sure of yourself.

'Legs!' is not a comment on a pair of well turned ankles.

## **Tackling**

Be warned! During play your grandson may get the ball. When this happens he will be attacked by several rough boys from the other team. They will throw him to the ground if they can. You must NOT go to his aid or even shout at them to get off. At some point during play this gentle boy of yours will attack one of the other team members. Do not be shocked, it is your role to call "Well done .......!" Do not use your pet name or call him 'darling'. Use the name his father calls him, or better still, what his coach and team mates call him. This will probably start with the initial of his Christian name and finish with a 'z' or 'zza'.

During pauses you will see your nicely brought up boy turn and spit on the floor. This does not mean he has forgotten his hanky and giving him a tissue will not be appreciated. This is a bonding thing. It says to the others, "I'm a big rough, tough man and I'm one of you." Sometimes he will take a drink from a bottle and then spit it out. He is making a more overt gesture of the same and not expressing his disgust at the taste.

#### Scoring

At some point a player (let's hope it's your boy) will get the ball and run as fast as he can for the 'line'. This is where the goal posts are situated. When he gets there he will fling himself, arms outstretched, onto the mud. If he manages to get that ball over the line he has scored a 'try'. No matter how hard he ran, or how he pulled himself through gangs of the other team, in fact no matter how hard he 'tried,' if he does not get the ball over the line it does not count as a 'try'.

If a try is scored the team get four points and another player will take the ball and set it upright on the ground. He is going to try to kick it through the posts. All the other players, on both sides, will turn their backs and completely ignore him. They will get into little huddles for a chat with their coaches. The 'kicker' will go through his own, very personal, ritual first. (Johnny Wilkinson puts his hands together in a little gesture of prayer and sticks out his bottom before he kicks) If the kicker scores they get another two points!

At the end of the game all the players will line up to shake hands with the other team. When you have told your grandson how good he was and how somebody else got 'Man of the Match' because he needed the encouragement, you can go home.

# Ingredient of the Month

# **Sweet Potato**

The sweet potato (genus Ipomoea) belongs to the Convolvulaceae family which includes ornamental flowering plants such as Morning Glory. The most popular edible species Ipomoea batatas I. batatas is a crop plant which produces large, tapered, starchy, sweet-tasting tuberous roots. They have a relatively smooth, usually reddish skin and its flesh can be white, yellow, orange or purple depending on the variety. I feel that clarification is required regarding its name.

For some reason (mainly) in the USA, sweet potato is also called Yam ... it is NOT A YAM. It's entirely unrelated both botanically and in taste.

## **Origin and History**

Archaeological evidence shows that sweet potatoes are native to South America are have been cultivated there for over 5000 years. In fact, fossilised sweet potatoes found in the Andes region have been dated between 8,000 and 10,000 years old.

The Incas and Maya civilisations are known to have grown several varieties: some varieties were grown for food and other varieties were grown to extract colouring materials for artists. It is also known to have been cultivated in Polynesia as early as 1200 A.D. and was already a principle food source of the Maoris in New Zealand by the time Captain Cook arrived there in 1769.

Although the sweet potato is native to South America, its spread to other parts of the world including the Caribbean was rapid although exactly how they spread is still an issue which causes much debate amongst geneticists and archaeologists.

Many Europeans feel the sweet potato is a relatively new import to Europe, however it may interest you to know that Columbus introduced them to Europe from the West Indies in the 1400's and that they were cultivated in Spain as early as 1500 A.D. Furthermore, Henry VIII (he of many wives fame) is purported to have been extremely fond of them, having received some as part of Catherine of Aragon's dowry. It is also said that he'd set an ongoing competition for any gardener in England who could grow them successfully - a task no one managed.

### **Explorers and Traders**

It is believed that Spanish explorers took the sweet potato to the Philippines and East Indies, from where it easily spread to India, China, and Malaya, probably with the assistance of Portuguese traders. By 1648 they had been introduced to North America and

were possibly the most important single crop in sustaining Americans through such difficult times such as the American Revolution and Civil War. It gained similar recognition in China, where the sweet potato sustained the nation through a number of droughts which devastated native grain staples.

In the 18th century, sweet potatoes were included in many European agricultural annotations being described as a versatile crop which could be prepared in numerous ways and fed to humans and animals alike and although they seemed to have dropped from favour for quite some time, certainly in the UK at least, they can now be found on many supermarket shelves.

Though orange-fleshed varieties are the most common today, the white fleshed types were once considered the finest.

### **Lamb with Garlic and Sweet Potatoes**

Ingredients

8 Lamb Cutlets

4 tbsp Olive Oil

1kg/2lb Sweet Potatoes, cubed

2 Red Onions, cut into wedges

8 Garlic Cloves, peeled but left whole

1 tbsp Muscovado Sugar

Juice of 1 Lemon

1 Small Lemon, thinly sliced

1 tbsp Fresh Thyme Leaves

A few whole sprigs Thyme

## Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200C, 400F, Gas Mark 6.
- 2. Heat the olive oil in a large frying pan. Add the sweet potato cubes, onion wedges, garlic and sugar and fry, stirring, over a high heat for about 5 minutes until the vegetables start to soften and caramelise. Transfer to a roasting tin.
- 3. Sprinkle the lemon juice, lemon slices, thyme leaves and seasoning over the vegetables then top with the lamb chops and thyme
- 4. Roast in the oven for 25-30 minutes until the lamb is cooked and the sweet, potatoes are tender. Serve immediately.

Cottingham Memorial Club occupies Elm Tree House, fronted by 'Grandads Park' in South Street and is the former home of one of the many 19th Century Hull merchants, several of whom lived in Cottingham.

### new season



# In the Garden





# The Vegetable Garden

f you have still been forcing rhubarb plants under forcing jars, take the last crop of pale stems, feed with general fertiliser, and leave them uncovered to grow without cropping for the rest of the year.

Chit and plant out second early potatoes in the first half of the month and maincrop potatoes in the second half. Potatoes can be planted in deep drills or in individual planting holes, with 5cm of soil mounded over the top. Alternatively, plant them through slits in black polythene mulch. Start earthing up as the shoots grow, covering them entirely if frosts threaten, and finishing when the earthed up ridge is about 25cm (10in) high. Potatoes grown under black polythene do not need earthing up, as the polythene excludes enough light.

Sow beetroot, carrots, Swiss chard, summer cauliflower, kohl rabi, lettuce, leeks, radish, turnip, spring and pickling onions, peas and perpetual spinach in well-prepared soil.

Plant shallots, garlic and onion sets.

Plant Jerusalem artichoke tubers.

Broad beans grown in pots can now be transplanted into the garden. Sow a seedbed of brassicas to provide transplants of sprouting broccoli, cauliflowers and cabbages that will be ready for planting out to their final position in June or July, and for harvesting in autumn/winter. Pot up tomato seedlings when they develop true leaves above the more rounded seed leaves. After growing on in small pots, they can be planted into larger pots or growing-bags.

Plant out onions sown from seed earlier in the spring. Don't use ground used for onions in the last three years.

Pea plants should be supported with sticks, twigs, green support mesh, or wire netting from the garden centre.

Many vegetables can bolt if sown outside too early without protection (beetroot being an example), kale and sprouting broccoli.

# The Flower garden

Divide clumps of herbaceous perennials that you want to propagate, those that have become too large for their allotted space, and those that are flowering poorly or have lost their shape.

Hardy annuals can be sown in pots or modules to provide colour in the garden. They are inexpensive and can also provide fun activity for children. Suitable examples include Limnanthes, Nemophila, Lobularia and Consolida. There are annual grasses that can be fun to try too: Briza maxima, Lagurus ovatus and Hordeum jubatum are suitable examples. In mild areas with light soil, you can sow directly outside. Marking out irregularly shaped seedbeds and broadcasting 'drifts' of different seed gives a more natural look.

Modular trays are useful for sowing half-hardy summer bedding plants such as marigolds (Tagetes), Lobelia, and Petunia. Label each seed tray. You will need to plant them under cover, or in a heated propagator, only putting them outside when the weather is reliably warm day and night.

Sweet peas can be sown outside this month. Fleece covering can be used to raise the temperature and encourage seedling growth in cooler areas, or they can be started off in a cold frame. Some types may need chitting (nicking of the seed coat), and/or soaking, in order to germinate.




Here is Paul's second walk in his new monthly column. This month his destination is Withernsea.

Maps: Explorer 292.

Start at GR. 339279 Car park near church and lighthouse.

Distance: 5.7 miles

NOT TO SCALE



n leaving the car park, turn left and proceed down the B1362 (Hull road) for about 0.5 miles. Immediately before the last bungalow, "SUNRAE" on the right, turn right and follow a wide farm track in a northerly direction. After approximately 0.5 miles and at a sharp right bend, turn left and follow a path across the field in a line with telegraph poles. On reaching a hedge, turn right and immediately left walking with the drain on vour left.

Turn right at the head of the field and locate a footbridge on the left. Cross this footbridge and a stile, turn right and follow the field boundary, locate and cross a stile and continue in the same direction heading for farm buildings. Follow the field boundary to the left and locate a footbridge on the right.

Cross this footbridge with extreme care (very slippery) and then cross a stile into a paddock. Walk across this paddock to emerge onto a farm access road made out of large concrete blocks. After a short distance this track swings to the left and climbs slightly. At the top of the rise and near Shaw farm you cross the Greenwich Meridian.

This track becomes a farm road and eventually meets the Rimswell road. On reaching the main road, turn right and walk into Rimswell. After passing the church on your left and the village hall on your right, locate a way marker on your right and pass through a metal gate into a field. Cross this field with the hedge on your

right and cross a stile located in the left corner of the field then walking with the hedge on your left. On reaching the corner of the field, cross a footbridge and walk in the same direction eventually following the headland to the right. Ignore a footbridge on the left which leads to the main road but continue walking in a southerly

After about 0.5 miles, locate a footbridge on the left and cross and continue in the same direction. Locate another footbridge on your right which you should cross and turn right walking with a ditch/drain on your right.

At the end of this field you cross a footbridge and turn left to follow the outward path back to the car park.

# The History of Hallgate Schools - continued

by Peter Railton (Local Historian)

n 1912, Friday 24th May was Empire Day. Much importance was given to this very special day each year. In both boys' and girls' departments assemblies were devoted to it and hymns and patriotic songs were sung, classrooms were decorated with flags and posters and pupils marched around the flagpoles in each yard and saluted the Union Jack. This was still the era of Imperial Britain and pupils were taught the meaning of responsibilities of Empire. How may schools celebrate it or indeed know about it today? Perhaps it is not politically correct anymore!

During June the usual arrangements were made for the various Sunday School Feasts held in the village and schools closed early in the afternoons and a days holiday was given on 3rd July for Cottingham Clubs Feast - as usual the attendance on the following day was "not satisfactory".

In the boys' department, the Cottingham Cricket Club Committee placed their ground at the disposal of the older scholars to hold matches with other schools and to practice on in 'games periods'. Mr Moorby was very grateful for this privilege as it would introduce many boys to the game for the first time on a proper pitch, which was

down Millhouse Woods Lane.

In July 1912 the classes and their teachers were - St. I 41 pupils, Miss Hancock; St. II 48 pupils, Miss Baker; St. III 48 pupils, Miss Paterman; St. IV. 43 pupils, Mr Rhodes; St. V 29 pupils, Miss Youngson; St. VI 26 pupils Mr Hall; Sts VII and ex VII 39 pupils, Mr Amery; a total of 274 boys, there were a similar number of girls, and more children were staying on at school until they were 14. In August, examples of poetry taught to the pupils in the upper standards were "Extracts from Paradise Lost," by Milton; "Essay on Man", by Pope; "Battle of Nazeby," by Mcauley; "Pilgrim Fathers," by Hemus; "Henry VIII"; by Shakespeare; "Amardia", by Macauley; "Blow thow Winter Wind," and "Song of the Western Men." heavy going wasn't it? But it focused the mind wonderfully by the sheer necessity to remember and repeat those poems. There are many old ex-scholars who were taught rote in arithmetic tables, as well as poetry and songs, years ago who can still remember their work today and are good spellers and handwriters also.

The 26th August was an extremely wet day and attendance was cut to 218 boys, "simply a deluge all day." In September a Cottingham boys' side played Beverley boys' side at cricket in Beverley and won by 9 runs. Pupils from both departments were to have many successes in competitive sports in the years to come, as we will see. Basket ball was very popular in both departments and Mr Moorby described the game as a "vigorous, strengthening and intellectual form of physical exercise."

#### Graffiti, an age old problem

Graffiti is not a new problem; the Head spoke sharply to Allen Richardson, Robert Wallis and two girls from that department about taking chalk and writing on palings, doors and walls down Northgate! In addition, some boys got a telling off for having fireworks in school.

In the girls' school two new teachers were appointed, Miss Lillian Robinson taking St. III, and Miss Lait taking St. IV. Class exams took place in October which was a very cold month and the heating frequently broke down and several girls were away with bad throats. An HMI Mr Harvey made the periodic inspection of the school and all pupils had a half day's holiday for Hull Fair - a sharp reduction on previous years and a pointer to the gradual ending of closure for Sunday School Feasts and Cottingham Club Feast, so long a feature of village life.

Examinations of all classes in the girls' and boys' schools were no longer carried out for grant purposes - block grants from the government had replaced the grants earned by the standards of work and attendance, a further change for the early years of the new century

although quarterly exams were still held by HMI's to assess progress. Snow fell heavily in December and term finished with carol concerts in all departments on Monday 23rd.

#### **Bad weather and epidemics**

The new boys' school building was rapidly taking shape despite the bad weather which extended into January 1913 making it impossible for children living at a distance to get to school.

In February many girls were absent because of influenza and the whole infant department was closed due to measles and so two classes of girls used some of the spare accommodation thus easing the overcrowding a bit and some of the infant teachers helped out in the girls' department. Also that month, Ashton's shop in Hallgate donated six atlases to six boys who had achieved the best results in English and Arithmetic quarterly tests. This acted as a spur to efforts and a marked improvement took place in tests conducted by the Head and teachers in most classes! The measles epidemic in the infants had its knock on effect - both girls' and boys' department had many absen-

Mr Amery left the school at Easter and was presented with a clock; the two classes at King Street Rooms went back to Hallgate and a large Standard III went to King Street with Miss Paterson and Miss Baker. On 25th April Mr Moorby records the

"transfer of stock and material to the new school as workmen want to commence alterations in the Main Room here," and on 2nd May -

"The noise of hammering - constant and loud - is a most disturbing element in the two classrooms now used by Sts II and IV in the school."

### Disruption caused by building work

Not only having to put up with the builders in both the boys' departments, there was an ongoing lack of communication between all three buildings which caused further problems. However, all boys were in the new school on 19th May although workmen were still around painting and making further alterations in the ex-boys' department and a constant stream of LEA officials, managers, builders and various other visitors added to the Head's frustrations and his health suffered accordingly.

The layout of the new school will be familiar to many local people, but briefly, the provision was for 350 boys ie. three classrooms (demolished in the 1970's) for 50, 40 and 40 at the far side of the Hall; a room for 40 opposite the Hall doors; four classrooms for 50, 40, 40 and 50 facing Hallgate. The Hall measured 50x25 ft., with cloakrooms near the doors at the end of each corridor with the Head's room above at one end and a teachers' room above at the other. Gas lighting was still used and radiators heated the building. Toilets were still across the vard.

The situation is paralleled today with the construction of the new Hallgate Primary School building which inevitably has brought some disturbance to the present infants' school which has been kept to a minimum by the Staff who have risen to the challenge just as their predecessors did in 1913.

Next time we will see what those changes meant for the girls' and infants' departments, whose Heads could now rearrange the spare accommodation.

# Save Tax When Taking Your

# State Pension by Nick Robinson

f you are like Bruce Forsyth and have deferred taking your state pension as you are happy working, you need to carefully consider the timing of when you do take up that pension. You have two choices when taking your deferred state pension:

Draw an enhanced weekly pension; or

\* Take a lump sum plus the normal weekly amount.

The enhanced weekly pension is taxable just like the normal pension. If you defer taking your pension until after 6 April 2008 you will have an increased tax free personal allowance of £9,030 (if aged under 75) to set against that income. However you need to estimate your total income for the tax year, as if it exceeds £21,800 your age allowance will be reduced.

The lump sum pension payment is taxable at the top rate of tax you pay in the year you become entitled to receive your deferred pension, not necessarily the date when you actually receive the lump sum. So the date you claim your deferred pension could be

The lump sum is not added to your total income to work out your marginal rate. If the top tax rate you pay on other income is 20% (for 2008/09), then the full lump sum will be taxed at 20%. Similarly if your personal allowance fully covers all your other income so you pay no tax, the lump sum is taxed at a nil rate.

If you are planning to stop work and take your state pension, cease your earnings in 2007/08 then take your pension lump sum in 2008/09, and possibly defer your personal pension until 2009/10. In this way you will minimise the marginal tax rate in the year the lump sum falls into.

### **Question and Answer Corner**

Q. The Taxman has asked me about my rental income, but I've never made a profit from my let properties, so do I have to complete his form?

- A. The Taxman is currently writing to people who he believes are letting properties, but that rental income is not shown on their tax returns. You do have to declare the rental income even if your interest payments and other expenses cancel it out to make a loss. You are not obliged to respond to the Taxman's letter, but if you don't things will only get worse.
- Q. Is there anything I should do before the end of the tax year to save inheritance tax?
- A. If you have not made any significant gifts of capital since 6 April 2007, you can give a total of £3,000 to individuals to use your annual inheritance tax exemption for 2007/08. If you did not make any similar gifts in 2006/07 you can give a total of £6,000 before 6 April 2008 and all those gifts will be exempt from inheritance tax. Make sure you leave enough time for your cheques to pass through the banking system before 6 April 2008, as otherwise the gifts will not be completed.
- Q. Should I invest in an ISA now or wait until the new tax year?
- A. The investment thresholds for ISAs are set for each tax year and cannot be carried over into the next tax year. The limit for 2007/08 is £3,000 for a cash ISA and the balance of up to £7000 in stocks and shares. These limits increase on 6 April 2008 to £3,600 and the balance up to £7,200 for stocks and shares. So if you don't invest before 6 April 2008 you have missed you 2007/08 ISA allowance, but you will have more scope with the higher investment limits in 2008/09.



# **Aqua Detox**
