Councillors were pleased that this project has proved to be so popular and hope that it has encouraged dog owners to clean up after their pets. Because of the success the Council voted to continue providing the bags, free of charge, for the next twelve months.

Once again the bags will be available from both the Parish Council office and The KGV Sports Pavilion – come early in the month as they do go quickly!

Trees on the railway line

You will not have failed to notice, if you live or walk near the railway line, that Railtrack have cleared out a large number of trees on the trackside. Councillors were disappointed to learn that Railtrack have a statutory right to carry out this work without informing the Council; particularly as the rail track runs through the Conservation Area and residents who live within that area cannot carry out any type of tree work without planning permission from the East Riding of Yorkshire Council. Councillors have written to Railtrack expressing their disappointment and asking that in future Railtrack have the courtesy of informing the Parish Council of planned tree works. Council will also be asking if Railtrack are planning to provide any trees for replanting in the village to replace those that have been lost!

Memorial Gardens & Roll of Honour Plaques

Following the first meeting of the Memorial Gardens working party the Council was pleased to see how much work had already been carried out by ERYC Grounds Maintenance team. Just by clearing out the deadwood and overgrown bushes it has made a noticeable difference to the gardens. Once a detailed map has been produced of the trees in the garden, including what conditions they are in, decisions can be made on removing/thinning/tying up the trees. Any tree work required could not now be done until the August-November window and it was hoped to tie this work in with resurfacing the pavement.

Quotations are being sought for a new Roll of Honour plaque to commemorate those who have given their lives in the service of their country since 1945. The plaque will be similar to the WWII plaques but along with the name of the serviceman will also mark his rank, regiment and the date of his death.



Telephone Scams and some money-saving websites

he telephone scam I have mentioned previously has reared its ugly head again.

In short, if you receive a telephone call from any organization, generally it's a call centre in India, or may even say they are working for Microsoft, telling you that your computer has been reporting problems, or may have viruses, tell them you are not interested. Do not let them talk you into going online and downloading anything, this would give them permanent access to your computer. Needless to say, do not enter into any financial transactions for service or cover either. These calls are completely bogus and fraudulent, and the Police are aware of the scam.

Many people have asked about 'Microsoft error reporting', a small window that often pops up on a computer, after a program crash or some other issue. It gives you the option of Send or Don't send a report. This is quite safe to do, and is intended to gather information about all such problems so that they can be rectified in the future, normally through Windows Update. The information transmitted is entirely anonymous and does not identify you to Microsoft, so there is no way someone could contact you to follow it up as mentioned above.

Mobile phone users may be giving away their personal data. A recent study of a selection of used handsets found that around half of them still contained photos, pin numbers and contact details of the

Computer recycling is also big business, and again be very careful what you are sending to recycling. Inside every computer or lapton is a hard drive that contains all the data ever stored by the user/s. If it is going to an approved recycling facility, check they will 'security wipe' the hard drive, or to be quite sure, remove the hard drive and keep it in a safe place.

Top ten uses of a computer: Internet / email / banking / office work / shopping / tax returns & payments / family history / photography / music / movies.

Where do you want to go today? This was a slogan printed on early disc covers of Internet Explorer, back in the days when you had to install it yourself as an optional extra! How true those words are today, now you can go to anywhere in the world online within a few clicks.

It could be said that the computer is 'a thief of time'. Particularly if your computer is really slow - nothing that a bit of extra memory won't cure! But seriously though, it is so easy to get involved in things and then get sidetracked. But if you start off with a plan or a list of tasks, you can achieve a lot.

Tips for productive use: If you are planning on printing or scanning, turn it on as soon as you sit down and make sure the paper is loaded correctly. Have a supply of ink at hand - it always runs out at a critical moment. If you are doing photographs, don't start looking at old pictures – you'll be there for hours! Checking your email - get rid of any obvious junk messages first. Set up folders in your inbox to store important emails that you may want to deal with later. Keep important contacts in your email address list to save looking round for them, or mis-typing. On the internet, build up a list of favourite websites and keep them in Favorites or Bookmarks in your browser.

Also, if you have been a broadband customer for a long period it would be a good idea to see what tariffs are currently on offer and compare them to what you are paying. This is particularly worthwhile if you still have a Speedtouch modem (a black or silver box with just two lights on it).

The winning teams will now take part in the Regional finals and if they're successful there will go to the national finals alter in the year.







Ingredient of the Month Chocolate

The common cacao tree is classified as Theobroma cacao and belongs to the family Sterculiaceae. They are very delicate and need much protection in their first four years of growth. With careful cultivation, the trees of most strains will begin bearing fruit in the fifth year. The fruit containing the seeds are about the size of a small pineapple when harvested.

How chocolate is made

The processing of the cacao seeds (cocoa beans) is not a simple task. Firstly the fruit is fermented which takes 3 to 9 days, during which the heat dries the seeds and turns them brown. The beans are then dried in the sun and cleaned in special machines before they are roasted. This loosens the outer shell which separates the shell from its center or "nib" which is further processed into Chocolate Liquor, by grinding it to a smooth, liquid state. Further processing takes place for the various types of 'eating' chocolate as follows:-

Dark Chocolate is chocolate liquor with additional sweeteners and cocoa butter.

Milk Chocolate is chocolate liquor with additional cocoa butter, milk, sweeteners and flavorings.

White Chocolate has no formal definition. White chocolate contains sugar, cocoa butter, milk solids and flavorings such as vanilla but does not contain non-fat cocoa solids, so is mostly used as a coating.

Couverture is a term describing professional-quality coating chocolate that is extremely glossy. It usually contains a minimum of 32% cocoa butter, which enables it to form a much thinner shell than ordinary confectionary coating.

Ganache is a thick, extremely rich chocolate spread. It is made by pouring hot cream over chopped up chocolate and whipping the mixture until the chocolate melts and the mixture becomes thick and stiff.

Cocoa contains as much as 20% protein, 40% carbohydrate, and 40% fat. It is also mildly stimulating because of the presence of Theobromine, an alkaloid closely related to caffeine.

A Brief History of Chocolate

1502 - Christopher Columbus introduces chocolate to Spain from his fourth voyage to the New World in 1502 but not as the product we know today. It was only consumed as a drink. The word "chocolate" was derived from the Aztec word xocolatl which means bitter water.

1615 - Anne of Austria (wife of Louis XIII) declares chocolate as the drink of the French Court , although this was only after much skepticism, as initially it was considered a "barbarous product and noxious drug".

1640 - chocolate finds its way to England, among other European countries. 1657- the drink becomes a best seller in England and excessive duties are imposed on chocolate. It takes almost 200 years before the duty is dropped.

1828 - Dutch chocolate maker Conrad J. Van Houten created the hydraulic cocoa press. The press enabled chocolate makers to crush the "nibs," or centers, of roasted cacao beans into a paste (Chocolate Liquor). After crushing, some of the cocoa butter was extracted.

1848 - English chocolate maker Joseph Storrs Fry created the first eating chocolate by further refining the cocoa, adding sugar, and mixing the cocoa butter back in.

1875 - Swiss Daniel Peter added condensed milk to chocolate and marketed the first solid milk chocolate bar.

Chocolate in cooking

When using chocolate for culinary purposes, use as high a quality as you can afford - i.e. containing higher proportions of cocoa solids, preferably 40% for milk chocolate and 70% for dark chocolate. This information can usually be found in the ingredients section on the label.

Be very careful when melting chocolate as too high a heat can make it spit. Therefore always melt in a heatproof bowl over very hot water in a small

saucepan. It can also be successfully melted in the microwave using a medium setting.

Chocolate Dream

225g/8oz Mascarpone Cheese 270ml/9fl.oz. Double Cream 4 tbsp Icing Sugar Zest and juice of 1 Lemon 175g/6oz Plain Chocolate

Instructions

- 1. Break the chocolate into pieces then place in a bowl over a saucepan of very hot water. Stir to melt.
- 2. Mix the mascarpone cheese and cream together, then divide the mixture between two bowls.
- 3. Add the sieved icing sugar, lemon rind and juice to one bowl and mix thoroughly.
 - 4. Stir in the melted chocolate to the other bowl.
- 5. In four individual tall glasses, place alternate layers of the chocolate cream first, then the lemon cream, finishing with the lemon cream.
 - 6. Decorate with grated chocolate and chill before serving.

Mississippi Mud Pie

Ingredients
For the Filling
400g/14oz Plain Chocolate
225g/8oz Butter
2 tbsp Instant Coffee
30ml/1fl.oz. Boiling Water
300ml/10fl.oz. Double Cream
300g/11oz Brown Sugar
6 Eggs

For the Crumb Base

50g/2oz Butter 150g/-5oz Digestive Biscuits, crushed 25g/1oz Sugar

Instructions

- Preheat the oven to 190C, 375F, gas Mark 5 and lightly grease a 20cm/8-inch springform tin.
- Melt the butter in a medium saucepan then add the crushed digestive biscuits, and the sugar, mixing well and adding a little more melted butter if necessary to bind the mixture.
- 3. Spoon into the prepared tin, spreading it evenly and pressing it firmly down. Set aside.
- Place the chocolate, butter, instant coffee and water into a large saucepan and heat gently, stirring well, until the butter and chocolate have melted.
- 5. Remove from the heat and beat in the cream, sugar and eggs. Mix well then pour the mixture on to the biscuit crust.
- Bake for 11/4 hours or until the filling is set. Allow to cool before removing the tin.

Serve cold with whipped cream.

Eggs signify new life. The giving of chocolate Easter Eggs in the UK has become a widespread tradition although in truth the tradition has its roots much further back in history and was originally a pagan ritual celebrating the advent of spring.

By the 18th century, the first chocolate Easter eggs appeared in France and Germany and soon spread to the rest of Europe and elsewhere. Certainly in the UK, the giving of chocolate eggs isn't restricted to children and many an adult is disappointed if they don't get at least one!

Passion Fruit is another food closely associated with Easter, the reason being that the plant was given it's name by Christian missionaries who used the flower to symbolise the "Passion of Christ" i.e. his suffering at the crucifixion, to the indigenous natives in South America.

Simnel cake

Easter is preceded by Lent which is a period of 40 days which signifies Christ's time in the wilderness. It is traditionally a period of fasting which ends at Easter with a feast consisting of the rich foods which couldn't be eaten. The making of Simnel cake was a tradition in the 17th century, when servant girls would take one home to their mothers as a gift. It is decorated with 11 marzipan balls signifying the 12 apostles minus Judas, who betrayed Christ.

Hot cross buns

Once again, the eating of hot cross buns stemmed from the Saxon pagan practice of eating as buns marked with a cross in honour of the goddess Eostre. It is believed that the bun signified the moon and the cross the moon's quarters. In Christianity, the cross symbolises Christ's death on the cross - the crucifixion.

Savoury Baked Fish - Serves Four

450g/1lb Fish fillets, e.g. Cod, Whiting, Pollack, Hake, Coley 100g/4oz Streaky Bacon, chopped

2 Onions, sliced

50g/2oz Butter

1 level teasp Mixed herbs

1 tbsp Fresh Parsley, chopped

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, Gas mark 4 and lightly grease an ovenproof dish.

- 3. Melt half the butter in a frying pan, add the bacon and onions and sauté for
- 4. Drain the onions and bacon and spread evenly in the bottom of the ovenproof dish. Sprinkle the herbs over the onion mixture and place the fish fillets on top.
- 5. Melt the remaining butter in a saucepan, add the flour and cook for 1-2 minutes.
- 6. Remove the pan from the heat and gradually add the milk, a little at
- 7. Remove from the heat and add the cheese, salt and plenty of pepper. Mix well until the cheese has melted then pour over the fish.
- 8. Sprinkle the breadcrumbs over the fish and sauce and bake for 15
- 9. Place the sliced tomatoes in a border around the edges of the baked fish, return to the oven and bake for a further 15-20 minutes until browned and crispy. Serve immediately.


If Only . . .



This has led to more crowding of teeth and impacted wisdom teeth. Sometimes we fail to grow certain teeth (hypodontia) and the most common tooth to be missing is the wisdom tooth. There is one school of thought that maybe these people are more evolutionally advanced to overcome the problem of not having enough room for the teeth.

Having had my 'wissies' out I think that they are just jammy. I had mine out while I was a dental student. I went for the assessment with the consultant and asked for local rather than a general anaesthetic and he looked at me as if I had two heads then smiled and said OK . It was fine. I had one side done then went back for the other side done after a couple of months. I wanted to know what it was like to be on the other end of the procedure so that I could understand and empathise. In the afternoon after having the first lot done I had a naevus taken off my leg at student health. The doctor asked me if I knew where pathology was in Leeds General Infirmary, I did, so he gave me the removed naevus in a specimen pot to take down there. There was no sympathy there then

Do They Have A Turbo Jet Pack?

There used to be a time when a lot more wisdom teeth were taken out prophylactically. That is to try and prevent teeth from crowding. This practice has died out now as I do not think that there is evidence of this. In fact front teeth can become crowded after wisdom are taken out or if no wisdom teeth are present. When you think about the wisdom teeth would need a jet pack to push all those teeth forwards to make them crowded.

Do Impacted Wisdom Teeth Need To Be Removed?

The short answer is no. Again, in years gone by a lot more wisdom teeth were taken out just because they were impacted. These days in keeping with NICE guidelines less are taken out unless there are signs and symptoms of infection or disease. I you are lucky an impacted wisdom tooth will stay under the gum and not communicate with the mouth. This way it is unlikely to get infected. They still need to be monitored to make sure that they don't end up getting a cyst around them or cause damage to adjacent teeth. If it does start to come through the gum all you can do is keep it as clean as possible and hope for the best.

This is easier said than done at times if you have a flap of gum over it. This flap of gum is called an operculum. You might need a special little brush to try and get under it and definitely floss. Sometimes if a partially erupted (partway through) wisdom tooth is giving problems it may be a good idea just to gently remove the operculum so that it can be kept clean more easily. This seems to work well and has saved a few wisdom teeth from requiring later extraction.



In the Garden

hit and plant out second early potatoes in the first half of the month and maincrop potatoes in the second half. Potatoes can be planted in deep drills or in individual planting holes, with 5cm of soil mounded over the top. Alternatively, plant them through slits in black polythene mulch.

Sow beetroot, carrots, Swiss chard, summer cauliflower, kohl rabi, lettuce, leeks, radish, turnip, spring and pickling onions, peas and perpetual spinach in well-prepared soil.

Plant shallots, garlic and onion sets.

Plant Jerusalem artichoke tubers

Plant asparagus crowns. A deep, friable, well-drained soil with plenty of organic matter incorporated is ideal.

Broad beans grown in pots can now be transplanted into the garden. In the second half of the month (wait until early May in cold areas) you can sow marrows, courgettes, pumpkins and squash in a heated glasshouse at a germination temperature of 16°C (61°F).

In very mild areas you may be able to sow dwarf French beans and sweet corn outside under cloches or fleece, but in cooler areas it is best to wait until May.

Sow a seedbed of brassicas to provide transplants of sprouting broccoli, cauliflowers and cabbages that will be ready for planting out to their final position in June or July, and for harvesting in autumn/winter. It is rather late for sowing Brussels sprouts, but you can still buy young plants from the garden centre.

Sweet peppers, tomatoes, cucumbers, aubergines, celery, salads and globe artichokes can all be sown in a frost-free greenhouse. Artichokes and celery can be transplanted outside later in the spring. Tomatoes germinate best at 22°C (72°F), and can either remain in the greenhouse or go outside from early summer onwards. Peppers, cucumbers and aubergines do best kept under cover throughout their life.

Pot up tomato seedlings when they develop true leaves above the more rounded seed leaves. After growing on in small pots, they can be planted into larger pots or growing-bags.

Plant out onions sown from seed earlier in the spring. Don't use ground used for onions in the last three years.

Pea plants should be supported with sticks, twigs, green support mesh, or wire netting from the garden centre.

Thin out rows of seedlings as soon as they are large enough to be handled.

Fleece and polythene can be used to protect early outdoor sowings. Many vegetables can bolt if sown outside too early without protection (beetroot being an example). A greenhouse or conservatory is useful in all but the very mildest areas with the lightest soils, to start seeds off,

hardening off and transplanting the young plants into the vegetable garden later in the spring.

You could prepare your runner bean supports and trenches for sowing (in May) or planting out (in June). This will save you time later.

Spring should now be in evidence, with daffodils in flower and blossom adorning trees. Expect the inevitable 'April showers' but the frequent sunny days and rising temperatures too make it perfect gardening weather. It's an exciting month, with indoor-sown seeds well into growth, and it's also time to start sowing outdoors. Just watch out for frosts.

Sowing and planting

Hardy annuals can be sown in pots or modules to provide colour in the garden. Annual grasses that can be fun to try too: Briza maxima, Lagurus ovatus and Hordeum jubatum are suitable examples. In mild areas with light soil, you can sow directly outside. Marking out irregularly shaped seedbeds and broadcasting 'drifts' of different seed gives a more natural look.

Modular trays are useful for sowing half-hardy summer bedding plants such as marigolds (Tagetes), Lobelia, and Petunia. Label each seed tray. You will need to plant them under cover, or in a heated propagator, at the appropriate temperature, only putting them outside when the weather is reliably warm day and night.

If you started sowing early, in March or even February, you may have modules of young hardy annuals now ready for planting out.

Sweet peas can be sown outside this month. Plant out autumn-sown sweet peas that have been raised in pots, and prepare your wigwam supports for them to climb, using a light twine to tie the plants in.

When space becomes available in the greenhouse, pot up cuttings of tender perennials taken last summer and at the beginning of this year. Bulk up plant numbers by taking more cuttings from the largest of the new plants.

Plant summer-flowering bulbs, if not done already. Prepare the soil first, to ensure that drainage is sufficient to prevent the bulbs rotting. Anemone coronaria tubers, for instance, need particularly well-drained

You can still plant herbaceous perennials such as Geranium, Astrantia and Oriental poppies. Check that the plants you buy have strong, green shoots and plant them into well-prepared soil.

Plan a continuous crop of cut flowers for this summer. Perennials such as delphiniums and annuals can be grown to produce a useful and beautiful display.

Towards the end of the month, in mild areas, you may be able to plant up your hanging baskets for the summer.

Lawns

Mow lawns when necessary - whenever the grass is growing - the aim is to maintain a constant height throughout the year.

Add the clippings to the compost heap in thin layers (too much grass all at once is likely to be very wet and poorly aerated, resulting in smelly slime rather than compost).

Use a half-moon edging iron or spade to create a 7.5cm (3in) 'gutter' around the lawn edge. This will prevent grass creeping from the lawn into borders.

Sowing new lawns or over-seeding dead patches can be carried out from mid-April to early May. If the soil is very wet or cold germination will be poor, so delay until the weather improves. Prepare the ground for sowing, by cultivating, levelling and lightly firming beforehand.

Do not walk over or mow newly sown grass until it has reached a height of 5-7.5cm (2-3in), and then only give it a light trim at the highest setting.

Apply a high nitrogen spring lawn fertiliser at the beginning of the month to encourage good, strong growth. If moss is a problem choose a combined fertiliser and mosskiller.

April is the best month to apply lawn weedkiller.

Lightly rake lawns with a spring-tine rake to remove old plant debris. This can also be done to rake out dead moss a couple of weeks after applying a chemical moss killer.

Repair bumps and hollows by peeling back the turf, removing or adding soil, and then replacing the turf.







Children's Club is all smiles after receiving £2,000 Co-operative Grant

donation of £2,000 from The Co-operative Group's Community Fund will help an East Riding children's organisation provide horse riding classes for disabled and autistic youngsters and their families.

Special Smiles, which is a not-for-profit group based in Cottingham, was set up in July 2010 to arrange regular activities and social events for disabled and autistic children and their families.

The group, which is the only one of its kind in the area and has applied for charity status, has 32 volunteers and provides activities for more than 84 children aged two years up to 18-years-old in the East Riding and Hull area. Special Smiles plan to spend the £2,000 on regular horse riding lessons for the disabled youngsters, and their siblings, in the spring.

Kevin Jennings, chairman of Special Smiles, said: "This grant from The Co-operative will make a big difference to us and will help us provide regular horse riding lessons, which will give the disabled children the opportunity to experience something different that is not normally accessible to them.

"This money will go a long way to help us make these youngsters' lives, which can quite often be very difficult, full of fun and give them something to look forward to. It will also help new friendships to be formed for the disabled children, their siblings and

Tenant Abandonment

What is Abandonment?

Abandonment is the voluntary surrender of a legal right, for example, an interest in land or property - a tenancy.

By virtue of S5(2) Housing Act 1988 a tenancy can only be bought to an end by the landlord obtaining a court possession order, or by a surrender or similar act by the tenant

If the tenant appears to have abandoned the landlord's residential investment property, this can put the landlord in a difficult position. This is because if the tenancy has not been surrendered or bought to an end, the tenant may return and accuse the landlord of unlawful eviction.

The issue of tenant abandonment is further complicated by the fact that tenants sometimes leave their accommodation unoccupied for long periods. In this situation it may either breach the terms of the landlords insurance or increase the premium due to the added risk to the insurer of covering an empty buy-to-let residential investment property.

A landlord's options

The difficulty for a landlord is the legal ambiguity surrounding the concept of a tenants abandonment. For instance a tenant may disappear and stop paying rent. It is often difficult or impossible particularly with an apartment to judge from an external inspection whether a tenant has left a property. If a tenant has left some of their possessions then a Court will often interpret that as "demonstrating an intention to return" and that the tenant intends the tenancy to continue. Should a landlord make a wrong decision in assuming that the tenant has left and then attempts to re-let the property only for the tenant to return then the landlord could be sued for damages.

Surrendering the tenancy

If the landlord is not prepared to wait for a possession order then the next best alternative is to get the tenant to surrender the tenancy. This can be done by the tenant submitting in writing a notice to quit expressing their intention to give up the tenancy. It is important that the tenant also returns the keys. The return of keys is another important indication of the tenant's intent to surrender their tenancy.

The least ideal scenario for the landlord is to take possession of their residential investment property on the grounds that the tenant has abandoned the landlord's residential investment property. In order to help a landlord substantiate a claim for abandonment important factors would be:

- · Has the tenant stopped paying rent?
- Has the tenant left the keys to the property?
- Has the landlord attempted or been able to contact the tenant or a relative?
- Do neighbours have any knowledge of the tenant's circumstances?
- · Can the landlord see through the windows of the residential investment property and are they able to see if the tenant's possessions are still in the accommodation?

These points help to indicate abandonment. There are no legal rights attached to abandonment so what a landlord must seek to do is be able to prove to a court in the unlikely event that a tenant returns that they took every step possible to safeguard the rights of the tenant. This may be then accepted as a defence by a Jury should an unlawful eviction case be bought by the tenant.

Therefore, if a landlord can prove that their residential investment property had been left in an insecure state; or that the landlord suspects internal appliances could present a danger to the property and/or neighbours. If all these circumstances prevail then and only then could the landlord have a case for entering their residential investment property and possibly fitting a secure lock.

Where a landlord assumes abandonment and takes possession the landlord

- Leave a clear notice on the door informing the tenant that the lock has been changed by yourself or a locksmith and that if the tenant requires access they must contact the landlord at the address supplied to obtain a replacement key.
- · Remember that a landlord does not want to encourage squatters notices displayed too prominently may do just that!
- Under no circumstance must the landlord deprive the tenant/s of their rights

The advantage to a landlord of assuming a case of abandonment is that it may enable a landlord to re-let quickly (seeking a possession order can be a lengthy process). The chances are that the tenant will never be seen again and that you as the landlord have a considerable financial benefit of being able to re-let quickly and recoup some of the financial losses caused by the previous tenant. However, landlords should be in doubt that this is high risk strategy and if a landlord is in any doubt they should seek expert advice on the specific case.

s I sit looking out of my window, absent-mindedly watching my dogs play, it is a good scene. The sun is shining; the grass is growing and has finally started to turn green, instead of brown. Everything is starting to improve from the weather and the promise of spring to the land drying up and becoming workable. I can hear the tractors rumbling past my house with harrows, rollers or fertiliser spreaders at the rear. When these changes start to happen, we seize on the first opportunity to get out there on the land.

It now needs help after the ravages of winter in order to both recover and subsequently yield its promised crop....mine being grass. How I wished it grew for free! It will in its own way of course but not to the extent I need it too. There is a balance of maximising potential yet allowing nature to take its course in natural development......whilst not meddling too much or spending too much time and money in investment.

Could not the same be said of a horse? I have this balance to make each time I take on every troubled equine that comes in to the yard. I cannot give false promise yet I must give hope. I have to produce results in the shortest possible time in order to keep the cost down for the owners, yet I must let each animal develop and let down its defences at its own speed. The depth of its traumatic history is a massive part of the ensuing dictation in time.

We have two horses in for training just now who have imploded big time, with all encompassing fear behind their eye line...... Un-rideable, stressed to handle and awful to catch. Both are from different backgrounds, but both fear touch on their haunches which in turn is all about defence.

Jazz is a beautiful 15hh native bred chestnut mare, and has been owned by this family for seven months.

They have had so many traumatic incidences in that time whilst trying to ride her. She basically hits a panic button in her head which sends her into a blind run with violent bucking until she gets the rider off. This always leaves her in a terrible state

afterwards. She has eyes out on stalks, nostrils flaring and her heart races so hard that she visibly shakes. She is then hard even to approach and catch....never mind get back on. She has been with us for 2 weeks now and has come on extremely well. The rope halter work has given her a feeling of safety and an ability to relax when being asked questions. She worries still but now has the tools to start to let go of tension and relax. We have just started to back her and it is going well. Her owners come over from Doncaster regularly and are delighted with her ability to calm down after a freak!

No one can force the change of attitude; it has to be her decision at the end of the day. We do not try to stop her fear by masking what we ask for....she is fully exposed to my requests and must find it in herself to trust me and my staff. Every day we move her forward and today has been my best success yet on her back. I can now jump up and over. I get on one side and get off on the other without her feeling the need to react..... real progress.

Finn is a 16.3hh Irish sports horse. He is a fine upstanding dark grey horse who has suffered greatly in the hands of scum bag dealers. Because he has probably always been a difficult personality he has hit the downward spiral that so many do. He has been passed from pillar to post, harsher treatment each time to try to tame the beast. The unsuspecting new owners have unwittingly inherited a whole life time of abuse because they fell in love with the picture of beauty that stood in front of them.

The story inside the story is that although he has come to me from Sheffield, I have seen this horse before.... being roughly ridden by a local dealer after the last decent owners found that they too could not manage him. Drugged up at point of sale sells the animal, the reality is after a week in its new home and the drugs are out of the system! A common occurrence I am sorry to say. The dealer denies all knowledge and says that they have ruined a good horse by doing something wrong. Blah, blah, same old, same old.

Those owners did not send him back to that scum bag dealer, their conscience for the horse did not allow. They sent him to a local trainer who sold him to another scum bag dealer who has been banned by the courts and the RSPCA from ever owning another horse. Again very local....he gets round this ban by saying that his girl friend owns all the horses. Who has the power to stop all this?

Finn (formally BUD) is an absolute psychological mess. I have no idea if he can be brought back from the brink. If I cannot make a significant impact into his ability to trust a human ever again then he has no future. He will how ever be treated very well, be shown great care and I, alongside his beleaguered new owners, are determined to give him every chance.

Commencement of Raywell Flood Attenuation Scheme

uch of the flooding, which saw hundreds of Cottingham residents displaced from their homes in 2007, was caused by water running off agricultural land in the Raywell Valley.

The Raywell Valley Flood Attenuation Scheme has been designed to hold back 18 million litres (4m gallons) of water in a series of terraced lagoons in the event of a flood.

These lagoons would be off Eppleworth and Westfield Road to the north of Castle Hill Hospital.

The scheme has recently received planning permission and will shortly be in a position to start construction work on site. It is hoped that the attenuation scheme will be in place and ready to help protect Cottingham in time for the fourth anniversary of the flooding in June 2011, in addition to protecting residents of Cottingham the scheme will reduce the impact of flooding to the Orchard Park estate in Hull.

Leader of East Riding of Yorkshire Council, Councillor Stephen Parnaby, OBE, said: iWhen complete, this scheme will help protect hundreds of properties, both business and residential, and will help reduce the risk of wide-spread flooding suffered in Hull and the East Riding four years ago.

"The council is very pleased to have secured the necessary funding and support for this scheme and aims, with the support of its partners, to have everything in place by the summer." Councillor Jonathan Owen, deputy leader of East Riding of Yorkshire Council and representative on the Yorkshire Regional Flood Defence Committee, said: iIn developing this scheme the council has received tremendous support from the local community, Hull and East Yorkshire Hospitals NHS trust, Hull City Council and local land owners.

"The scheme, which is funded by the council and the Yorkshire Regional Flood Defence committee, is the largest scheme of this type ever undertaken by East Riding of Yorkshire Council."

East Riding of Yorkshire Council is also working collaboratively with Hull City Council to develop large flood alleviation schemes in the Haltemprice and west Hull areas for the benefit of residents in Willerby, Cottingham and the western side of Hull.

These proposals are at an early stage, however both councils remain optimistic that the schemes will progress via the Environment Agency's National Programme.



The Mystery Diner visits the recently opened Zing Lounge on Hallgate, Cottingham



Te are now well into the new year, so for the first restaurant review of 2011, it seems fitting to write one about Cottingham's newest eatery.

Zing Lounge is situated at 119 Hallgate, Cottingham in the same building that used to be Wok Ever. Not only has the cuisine changed from Chinese to Indian, but the internal layout and decor has also had a major overhaul.

From the outside, new etched glass windows add a touch of class and give a light airy feel to the interior. The bar area, which was at the rear of the ground floor, is now just as you enter the restaurant and is ideally located if you want to have a drink while you wait for a table or if you are collecting a take away.

The inside has been redecorated in a contemporary style (no flock wallpaper!!), with dark furniture and neutral walls. The tables are close together but not on top of each other and can accommodate small or large parties quite easily. What used to be the bar area at the back is now the "V.I.P." area.... A raised area great for large parties who want to sit together.

There is also another dining room upstairs, which is also were you will find the washrooms.

All in all the decor and ambience is contemporary and comfortable, with Indian music playing in the background creating a nice atmosphere.

We booked a table for 8.00 pm on a Friday evening, and as we entered were greeted by Youseff, who many of you will know from Cottingham Tandoori take away, and shown to our table.

There were about another 20 diners in the the restaurant who all seemed to be enjoying the food and atmosphere.

We sat down and ordered a couple of drinks while we looked at the very comprehensive menu. All your favourite Indian dishes are there, such as various Tandoori dishes, from £8.95, Balti Dishes from £9.95 and classic Biryani dishes from £8.95 as well as all the curries from Korma to Vindaloo, all at £6.95. Vegetarians are also well catered for with a choice of 8 dishes all at £7.95. If you love seafood then you wont be disappointed either with a huge choice of prawn and fish dishes starting at £8.95

The specials list is also impressive, with plenty of dishes I haven't seen on an Indian menu before, such as Nowbai Khana (£8.95), Silla Silla chicken (£8.95) and Andhari Raat (£8.95)

We started with a couple of popadums and dips to share, which were nice and fresh and crispy.

For starters we chose to share the Sizzling Tandoori Mix for two $(\pounds7.95)$ and Onion Bhajis (£2.95). Both were delicious although I like my bhajis a little crisper. For the main course, I went for the Zing Special Tandoori Balti (£10.95) and my wife had Lamb Badam Passanda (£8.95). Both were very tasty and the sauce for the passanda was really smooth and delicious. We also shared a side order of Coconut rice (£2.95) which was nice and fluffy and just the right amount of coconut, and a Peshwari Nan (£2.95) which was big enough to share and well cooked

Throughout the meal, the staff were attentive and quick to clear empty plates and refill drinks. The food was served tidily and with a smile. Not always the norm in some Indian restaurants, so well done to the waiting staff.

The total bill for two with drinks was just under £55 which is pretty reasonable these days for this type of restaurant.

Good luck to Youseff and his team. It is always nice to see a new business open up in the village, especially in this economic climate and I hope it succeeds. It also means the other restaurants in the village now have more competition for your money and need to keep on their toes to offer good food at the right price.

Our modern network of roads has evolved over hundreds of years from tracks, Roman roads, enclosure roads and turnpikes to the system we have today. This exhibition explores when, where and how these roads were laid out and what travel was like in this region for our ancestors

Bulgarian Aid to hold Gift Fair at the Civic Hall, Cottingham on Saturday 9th April

ULGARIAN AID is a charity that works to help the needy, particularly the elderly and disabled in Bulgaria. The need is still great there with pensions at 67 Euros a month approximately £15 a WEEK!

During the past year we have sent out three, 40ft containers of Food and other Aid which has been distributed, through the Rotary Clubs in Bulgaria, to those most in need. I was there in November for the distribution of one container and was dismayed to find that many elderly widowed people, living alone, could only buy bread and milk to eat. They had very little protein in their diets. We plan to send another container of high protein Food Aid, much of which will be targeted at this group of pensioners, in late March. We need to raise money to pay for the transportation (£2500) and the handling charges we pay for the food (£75 a pallet). This means a total of at least £4000.

To this end we are holding a fund-raising Gift Fair at the Civic Hall in Cottingham on the 9th April 2011. It will run from 10am to 4pm and admission will be 40p with accompanied children free.

There will be 30 stalls, many local craftspeople who make very attractive Gift items, everything from special cakes, candles and glassware to beautiful turned wood gifts, quilted cushions and jewellery. There will, of course, be our usual Tombolas, Book and Plant stalls, attractions for the children, a super Raffle, cake and preserve stalls as well as a Chocolate Fountain. Freshly made hot and cold sandwiches with homecooked meats and other refreshments will be on sale all day.

All proceeds will go to help the needy - no one is paid in this organisation!





Eating the right foods for energy

eeling tired is a universal problem. Every day about 2.2 million people complain of being wiped out and exhausted.

While many people are convinced this is because of their busy stressfull lifestyles the reality is it's more likely connected to the way they eat or don't eat. Here we look at some of the top ways to fight fatigue and to prevent you from wanting to go back to bed as soon as you've got up.

Your mother was right – breakfast is the most important meal of the day because it fuels you up and gets you in gear for the day ahead. Even if you do not feel hungry when you get up have something nutritious to eat. Research studies have shown that those who consume breakfast function better and feel better both physically and mentally. Researchers at Cardiff University in London have also discovered that the stress hormone cortisol is lower in those who eat a small bowl of breakfast cereal or oatmeal in the mornings.

Instead of eating three large meals a day why not change things by eating three smaller meals and two snacks throughout the day. This will help to keep your blood sugar at a stable level and by so doing it will also keep your energy level where it is supposed to be. Be aware that eating big meals requires more of your energy to digest and can leave you feeling very tired. What you need to do when you eat your mini meals is to make sure that you eat a mix of protein, carbs and healthy fats (such as seafood, nuts and olives).

You need an adequate amount of fibre to not get run down.

Fibre works with carbohydrates to release them into the bloodstream at a slow rate, that is better for the body's metabolism. What this serves to do is to keep your energy at a high level. Most people consume only 10 to 15 grams of fibre per day despite the fact that the daily recommended dosage is 25 to 30 grams. To add more fibre to your diet eat an apple with the skin on, try eating whole-wheat spaghetti or black beans and cheese wrapped in a multigrain tortilla.

There is no substitute for drinking water. Hydration is the name of the game in keeping tiredness at bay.

You may wonder why this is the case. Approximately 83 percent of our blood is made up of water. The water found in the blood helps to digest food, control body temperature and transport waste out of the body. The majority of other bodily fluids are also composed of water. Mild dehydration thickens the blood and then forces the heart to work harder to deliver blood to the organs and the cells in the body. Unfortunately this causes tiredness because the heart is pumping faster and more intensely.

You do not just have to drink water to increase your intake of it. There are foods that contain ample amounts of water that you should be eating as well. These include broccoli, carrots, grapefruits, oranges, watermelons and yogurt.
