

# **Property News from** Martin English of Homelink



Green Deal is Coming

egislation should be in place by the end of the year to allow landlords to benefit from the Green Deal.

#### How will it impact on landlords?

The Green Deal is the initiative to improve the energy efficiency in the UK's housing stock. As regards landlords it is all about incentivising us into investing in the energy efficiency of their properties.

Landlords have largely been put off undertaking works to improve the energy efficiency of their investment properties as the return on such investments is often not sufficiently tangible to translate into higher rents. Essentially it is the landlord who pays and the tenant who benefits by way of lower gas and electricity bills.

#### **Split Incentive**

The Green Deal seeks to address what has become known as the 'split incentive' by allowing landlords to make energy efficiency improvements without having to pay for them upfront. The cost of these works will be financed by a financial institution. This finance will be a loan secured against the landlords property with existence of the loan being documented at the Land Registry. The new revised EPC will also record the presence of Green Deal finance of a particular property.

#### Green Deal Loan

The repayment of the "Green Deal loan" will be made from the savings generated on the energy bills of the person paying the bills. For the majority of investment properties this will be the tenant. However, during voids the responsibility will revert back to the landlord. (as is the case for now for utility

#### **Golden Rule Principle**

To protect tenants (and all householders) there will be a "Golden Rule Principle" which aims to keep the energy bills at the property no higher than they would have been had the property been without a Green Deal - this is important both to protect consumers from higher energy bills, and to protect investors from a higher risk of default on the bill.

#### Legal obligation of the landlord

As the tenant will be responsible for effectively paying the Green Deal finance, the landlord will have a legal obligation to advise the tenant that Green Deal finance is in place. The Golden rule described above will protect tenants from paying higher energy bills if they rent a property with Green Deal finance as opposed to one without. In theory this should not mean that Green Deal properties will not be any less desirable to tenants. Landlords who have commissioned the new style EPC which identifies the presence of Green Deal finance will comply with this disclosure requirement by providing prospective tenants with a copy of the EPC

#### On a Personal Note

I'm all in favour of making properties more energy efficient and share a desire to improve my properties and the lives of my tenants like the majority of landlords. One factor that most legislators conveniently ignore in all their proposals is TIME! They never factor in the management time that it takes to co-ordinate further building work or upgrades. Most landlords have very limited time to manage additional retro fitting of improvement works. If you have an agent, this is where depending upon the service levels you have from your agent they can come into their own for you and help manage and facilitate the ungrades.

The Green Deal is an area that should be taken seriously, likely to be introduced some time later this year, be aware there is talk that from 2016 that Landlords may not be able to unreasonably refuse requests from their tenants to improve the energy efficiency of their properties. What's more, from 2018, landlords may not be able to let a property which has an EPC band of F or G.





#### **Haddock Baked in Cream**

Ingredients

4 Haddock fillets

1 Onion, skinned and very finely chopped Salt and pepper

1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce 120ml/4 fl.oz Single Cream The juice of 1/2 a Lemon



#### Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 170C, 325F, Gas mark 3.

#### **Instructions**

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, Gas mark 4 and lightly grease an ovenproof dish.
- 2. Wash the fish fillets under cold running water and dry on kitchen paper.
- 3. Melt half the butter in a frying pan, add the bacon and onions and sauté for
- 4. Drain the onions and bacon and spread evenly in the bottom of the ovenproof dish. Sprinkle the herbs over the onion mixture and place the fish fillets on top.
- 5. Melt the remaining butter in a saucepan, add the flour and cook for 1-2 minutes.
- 6. Remove the pan from the heat and gradually add the milk, a little at a time.
- 7. Remove from the heat and add the cheese, salt and plenty of pepper. Mix well until the cheese has melted then pour over the fish.
- 8. Sprinkle the breadcrumbs over the fish and sauce and bake for 15 minutes.
- 9. Place the sliced tomatoes in a border around the edges of the baked fish, return to the oven and bake for a further 15-20 minutes until browned and crispy. Serve immediately.

#### **Hot Cross Buns**

Hot cross buns are traditionally eaten at Easter

Ingredients

150ml/5fl.oz. Warm Water 1 teasp Caster Sugar 1 tbsp Dried Yeast 450g/1lb Plain Flourt A Pinch of Salt

1 teasp Mixed Spice 50g/2oz Caster Sugar

75g/3oz Currants





50g/2oz Cut Mixed Peel 60ml/2fl.oz. Warm Milk 1 egg, beaten 50g/2oz Butter, melted 2 level tbsp Granulated Sugar



#### **Instructions**

- 1. Place the warm water in a bowl, stir in 1 teasp of caster Sugar then sprinkle over the yeast and set aside until frothy.
- 2. Place the flour, salt, mixed spice, caster sugar, currants and mixed peel in a large mixing bowl, mix thoroughly then make a well in the centre and pour in the frothy yeast mixture, warm milk, beaten egg and melted butter into the centre. Mix to a dough.
- 3. Turn the dough onto a lightly floured surface and knead until soft and elastic then place back into the bowl, cover with clingfilm and leave in a warm place to rise for around 1 hour, until doubled in size.
- 4. Once risen, turn onto a lightly floured work surface and knead for about 5 minutes.
- 5. Divide the mixture into 12 rounds, place on a floured baking tray, spaced well apart and make a deep cross in the top of each bun with a sharp knife. Cover loosely with oiled clingfilm and leave to rise for about 30 minutes.
- 6. Meanwhile, pre-heat the oven to 200C, 400F, Gas Mark 6. Once risen, bake for 25-35 minutes until golden brown. Turn out onto a wire rack.

#### **Apricot and Pecan Simnel Cake**

#### Makes 1 x 20cm/8-inch cake

Ingredients 175g/6oz butter, softened 175g/6oz light soft brown sugar 3 large eggs, beaten 225g/8oz self-raising flour, sieved 1 teaspoon baking powder 100g/4oz sultanas 225g/8oz no-soak apricots, chopped zest and juice of 1 orange 100g/4oz pecan nuts, chopped To decorate

3 tablespoons apricot jam, sieved 50g/2 oz plain chocolate, melted

675g11/2 lb marzipan

1. Preheat the oven to Gas Mark 3/170 degrees C / 320 degrees F. Grease a 20cm (8 inch) round, deep cake tin and line with

- 2. Place the butter, sugar, eggs, flour and baking powder in a large bowl. Whisk until smooth and glossy. Fold in the remaining ingredients and spoon into the tin. Bake for 1-11/2 hours until risen and firm.
- 3. Use a sharp knife to split the cake in half through the middle. Roll out two thirds of the marzipan on an icing sugar-dusted surface and cut out two 20cm (8 inch) rounds. Brush both cut surfaces of the cake with jam and sandwich together with one of the marzipan rounds.
- 4. Brush the top of the cake with jam and arrange the second marzipan round on top, crimp the edges. Roll the remaining marzipan into eleven balls and arrange on top of the cake, attaching with more jam.
- 5. Spoon the chocolate into a greaseproof paper piping bag and drizzle over the top of the cake.

#### **Easter Bunny Biscuits**

Makes approx. 12 biscuits

Ingredients

100g/4oz butter

75g/3oz caster sugar + extra for sprinkling

1 large egg

225g/8oz plain flour

1/2 teasp mixed ground spice

1/2 teasp ground cinnamon

50g/2oz currants plus 12 currants for eyes

2 tablespoons milk

To decorate, pretty ribbon

#### Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to Gas Mark 6/200 degrees C/400 degrees F. Grease two baking sheets.
- 2. Cream the butter and sugar together with an electric whisk.
- 3. Add the egg and whisk again.
- 4. Add the flour, spices and currants and mix well. Lightly knead, then roll out to a 5mm (1/4 inch) thickness. Use a bunny or other shaped cutter to press out about 12 biscuits, re-rolling the dough as necessary.
- 5. Arrange the biscuits on a baking tray and brush with milk. Make eyes with the extra currants and sprinkle over the remaining sugar.
- 6. Bake for 12-15 minutes or until golden. Cool on the baking sheet for a few minutes before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely. Tie ribbons around the necks of the bunnies.



h, what it is to have a helping hand don't you think? Someone you can turn to when things get a little bit tough...to tell your troubles to or help out with the shopping and household chores. Sometimes these 'hands' appear from the most unusual circumstances and that is how I met Joan, a lovely lady in her sixties, who had only been in a wheelchair for a year. With no-one at home, she was finding it difficult to adjust to an 'able bodied' way of living. Her bungalow had been customised accordingly for Joan's needs but she still needed that extra pair of 'hands'. At the beginning of the year, Sarah, another friend of mine, introduced me to Joan whilst she was visiting the place I had been staying at.

At first I saw the wheelchair. I suppose it's something we 'able bodied' are always drawn to see but then I saw Joan. On the outside she came across confident and also looked a little in denial that she actually needed that out stretched 'hand'. As I looked beyond all this and into her eyes, there told a different story.... a picture of sadness and a cry for her long lost independence to be regained. It was on this day our bond formed. Here was someone who needed my help, my abilities which were slightly limited ....but even so. Over the following weeks Joan visited the place where I was staying until it was time for me to return home.

On returning to Hull, I immediately visited my new found friend. With great pride, Joan showed me around her little palace, pointing out all the useful aids that had been fitted to make it more comfortable and





accessible. The cupboards had been lowered, doors widened and a special ramp had been built up to the front door for her wheelchair. "I know we are worlds apart and so different which may lead to slight frustration and I also have a lot to learn, but do you think you can help me? ". Looking into the deep brown eyes I first saw all those weeks ago, I didn't have to acknowledge.... Joan knew from my reaction, we had found a true friendship.

My first challenge came in the morning. I had to help Joan get out of bed, something we all take for granted, but for someone who lives most of their life in a wheelchair it can prove quite difficult. I brought her the training aid I had been shown and with a careful tug, Joan was sitting on the edge of her bed. Her clothes laid neatly on the chair so I took each item to her marvelling at how she had been able to cope in the past but also hoping I am giving her that extra bit of help and confidence.

Today was also our first day to tackle shopping and it was here that Joan explained that we will see a different side to the 'Human Race'. "It's bad enough being small like you but for someone on their own in a wheelchair, people (some but not all), seem to put me into insignificance" she explained. But on this day, whether it was my presence, things slightly changed along with the help I could give her. Doors were opened by people who were more than willing for this 'unlikely pair' entering the shop.

I was able to help take items off the shelves and put them in the basket, which is something Joan had only been able to do with the help of the shop assistant. Payment was also made easier as I 'handed' the bank card to the lady on the till. "You've got a good help there" she exclaimed to Joan. The beam on her face said it all. The next challenge was the cash point. Once again, popping Joan's card into the machine made it so much easier (why the banks don't accommodate wheelchairs I don't know). The only thing I couldn't help with was the pin (for security reasons of course) much to the amusement of the couple standing in the queue.

# Our Mystery Diners visit the Black Horse, Little Weighton



have never visited The Black Horse Pub in Little Weighton, so when I was asked to write a review, I was not sure what to expect. I then read an article in the Hull Daily Mail about the new owner, Micaela, and how she had spent a lot of money on refurbishing a pub that has been very unsuccessful over the last few years, so I was intrigued to give it a try.

One of the areas the new owner was keen to grow, as with a lot of pubs, was the food side, so my wife and I decided to visit and try it for ourselves (and Cottingham Times readers)

The pub is situated on the main road through the village, near the pond and has a good size carpark at the rear. Between the carpark and the front door is a decked area which I assume will be used in the summer for outside drinking and eating.

Because I have never been inside before, I can't really comment on any internal improvements, but the bar is clean and bright with a huge fireplace and log burner dominating one end. There is a wooden floor, stripped wood tables, nice chairs and comfy sofas, making for a very comfortable and welcoming area, to eat and drink in.

Just a word here about the staff. Sarah was our server/barmaid and was very pleasant and extremely smart in white shirt/black tie and black apron.

We had decided to visit in the early evening and when we arrived the pub was fairly quiet with a few people having a drink and another couple eating.

At the bar we ordered a couple of drinks and picked up the menu to peruse at our table. As well as the menu there is also a 'Specials' menu on a blackboard next to the bar. The bar stocks the usual range of spirits, mixers, wines and beers that you would expect as well as a couple of very tasty real ales.

Once you have chosen your food, you order at the bar and Sarah suggested we opened a 'tab' and pay when we had finished.

My wife and I both chose starters from the 'Specials' board, I had paté and toast with a lovely apricot chutney (£3.95) and my wife had Thai Fish Cakes with a sweet chilli sauce (£4.95), both served with salad and beautifully presented as well as being very tasty. A small criticism was the chilli dipping sauce was quite hot!!! The starters on the main menu were limited, mainly a cheese or meat platter at £5.95, but we were very pleased with our choices and both cleared our plates.

For our main course, I had ordered the 8oz Sirloin steak with garlic mushrooms, peas and chunky chips (£11.95) which was on the 'Specials' board, but we were informed by Sarah that they had run out and would I like a 10oz Rump steak instead, to which I said yes. My wife picked 'Beef and Ale' pie from the normal menu with chunky chips (£8.95)

As we waited, fresh cutlery and napkins were brought to the table and I wondered if my normal knife would cope with a medium cooked rump steak.

Both meals arrived together, piping hot and plentiful and my knife easily coped with the tender, juicy and very tasty steak, along with a pile of chunky chips. I once again managed to clear my plate. My wife's Steak and Ale pie was equally tasty, with no gristly bits hidden in the thick gravy, she too cleared her plate.

As the plates were being cleared away, we were asked if we would like a desert but we really could not manage one. There was

a choice of three on the Specials board. There was plenty of choice on the main menu, such as fish, burgers, lasagna, gammon and more, ranging in price from £7.25 to £8.50 along with sandwiches and salads. On the night we visited, the new menus had just arrived, so it will have probably changed a little bit, but if the quality is as good as the dishes we sampled, then you will not have a problem.

By the time we had finished our drinks, the pub had started to get a bit busier, especially for a Tuesday night.

We paid our bill at the bar and I thought the cost for two courses, with drinks for two people, for just over £40 was good value for money, and we did have the most expensive dishes on the menu.

We will both definitely return and I hope many others give it a try. The village pub with good beer and quality food is getting harder to find and Michaela, Sarah and all the staff deserve the Black Horse to succeed for years to come.

Give it a try if you do not fancy cooking one night, you will not be disappointed.




sores in her mouth. She had been to her doctor but he felt that she should see a dentist. The areas became ulcers and very painful. By the time I saw her some had healed up but there was one big one left. It had a thick, whitish-yellow covering that was coming away to cause an ulcer. I scratched my head a bit for a think. Then I did it again! After a minute or two I asked if she had psoriasis on the skin. The answer was yes. It did look like a so-called desquamative disorder. Desquamative, now that's a big word for

#### What Does It Mean?

Your skin reproduces all the time and it continuously sheds. The bits that shed are called squames. Therefore, it de-squames and this gives rise to the term desquamatous disorder when something does it more than it should.

Psoriasis is a condition where a person's skin replacement process speeds up, taking just a few days to replace skin cells that usually take 21-28 days. This abundance of skin cells builds up to form raised 'plaques' on the skin, which can also be flaky, scaly, red and itchy. Psoriasis can occur on any area of the body, including the scalp, hands, feet and genitals, although different types tend to occur on different areas.

or 50 years he was revered by men and boys alike as he imparted his musical skills to the choir of St. Mary's Church in Cottingham .Now at last Walter Wright, organist and choirmaster, has been remembered with a memorial plaque, recently installed on the console of the magnificent Foster & Andrew organ which he loved so much and with which he brought so much

Donations for the plaque came from ex -choristers and parishioners alike with the surplus benefiting the choir music fund. Walter would have been indeed moved by the final line inscribed on the plaque 'remembered with affection by his choristers and friends' Some nostalgic memories were evoked by the event and most came from choir boys of the 1930 's, one such from Dennis Ringham who had a particular cause to remember Walter, as he played for his wedding


Maps: EXPLORER 294 and 295

Start at GR. 012455 Scorborough Lay-by. Distance 5.5 Miles.

eave the lay-by at the south-west corner passing through a kissing gate into a field. Cross diagonally across this field and pass through a second kissing gate to cross a farm road. Cross a second field in the same direction and cross a concrete farm road to walk diagonally across a third field but now heading west.

Locate a finger post and enter a fourth field crossing this field diagonally. Locate a stile at the end of this field, cross the stile and continue ahead with the hedge on your right. Almost at the corner of this field, ignore a path leading off to the right but at the corner of the field turn left and continue with the hedge on your right. After a short distance, meet a fast flowing stream on the right and cross this by a





footbridge at the corner of the field. After crossing the footbridge immediately turn left and walk with the hedge on your left.

After a while turn left and cross a footbridge over a ditch and continue with the hedge on your left. At the end of this field pass a small plantation to meet a farm road. Turn right and after about 200 metres turn left off the road and walk through a field with the hedge on your left. At the end of this field, pass through a gap in the hedge and continue on a distinct grassy track with the hedge on your right. This eventually leads into green lane. Where a fast flowing stream crosses the track, cross the stream by a footbridge and continue along the lane. This lane leads into a surfaced road which is followed towards Lockington. Turn right on reaching the junction and then right again into Church Lane.

Pass through the church car park and the churchyard to leave by a footbridge. Ten metres after cross the bridge turn right and cross a stile into a field. Walk across this field with a meandering stream on the right. Pass through a hedge by a footbridge and cross a marshy area heading towards Snowclose Plantation. Enter this plantation by a squeeze stile constructed in a metal gate and follow the distinct path through the plantation.

Cross a footbridge and stile to leave the plantation and head diagonally across the field. Locate a footbridge and cross into the next field and continue with the hedge on your right. After about 200 metres turn left and walk across the field to a finger post, turn right at this finger post to meet a farm road. Cross the road and walk diagonally across the field heading for Scorborough Church. Cross over the next farm road and retrace the beginning of the walk back to the lay-by.

# In the Garden



pring should now be in evidence, with daffodils in flower and blossom adorning trees. Expect the inevitable 'April showers' but the frequent sunny days and rising temperatures too make it perfect gardening weather. It's an exciting month, with indoor-sown seeds well into growth, and it's also time to start sowing outdoors. Just watch out for frosts.

#### Sowing and planting

Hardy annuals can be sown in pots or modules to provide colour in the garden. Annual grasses that can be fun to try too: Briza maxima, Lagurus ovatus and Hordeum jubatum are suitable examples. In mild areas with light soil, you can sow directly outside. Marking out irregularly shaped seedbeds and broadcasting 'drifts' of different seed gives a more natural look.

Modular trays are useful for sowing half-hardy summer bedding plants such as marigolds (Tagetes), Lobelia, and Petunia. Label each seed tray. You will need to plant them under cover, or in a heated propagator, at the appropriate temperature, only putting them outside when the weather is reliably warm day and night.

If you started sowing early, in March or even February, you may have modules of young hardy annuals now ready for planting out.

Sweet peas can be sown outside this month. Plant out autumn-sown sweet peas that have been raised in pots, and prepare your wigwam supports for them to climb, using a light twine to tie the plants in.

When space becomes available in the greenhouse, pot up cuttings of tender perennials taken last summer and at the beginning of this year. Bulk up plant numbers by taking more cuttings from the largest of the new plants.

Plant summer-flowering bulbs, if not done already. Prepare the soil first, to ensure that drainage is sufficient to prevent the bulbs rotting. Anemone coronaria tubers, for instance, need particularly well-drained soils.

You can still plant herbaceous perennials such as Geranium, Astrantia and Oriental poppies. Check that the plants you buy have strong, green shoots and plant them into well-prepared soil.



#### Top 10 jobs

- 1. Keep weeds under control
- 2. Protect fruit blossom from late frosts
- 3. Tie in climbing and rambling roses
- 4. Sow hardy annuals and herb seeds
- 5. Start to feed citrus plants
- 6. Increase the water given to houseplants
- 7. Feed hungry shrubs and roses
- 8. Sow new lawns or repair bare patches
- 9. Prune fig trees
- 10. Divide bamboos and waterlilies

Plan a continuous crop of cut flowers for this summer. Perennials such as delphiniums and annuals can be grown to produce a useful and beautiful display.

Towards the end of the month, in mild areas, you may be able to plant up your hanging baskets for the summer.

#### Cutting back, pruning and dividing

Perennials that are showing new shoots from the crown can be propagated via basal stem cuttings. Shoots 8-10cm (3-4in) high are cut from the parent plant with a sharp knife. Sometimes a piece of root can be taken with the cutting (which speeds establishment), but stems can be cut without root, and then dipped in hormone rooting powder before striking into growing medium, as for softwood cuttings.

Divide clumps of herbaceous perennials that you want to propagate, those that have become too large for their allotted space, and those that are flowering poorly or have lost their shape. Bamboos and clumps of bulbs or rhizomes can be divided in the same way. Just make sure that the transplanted divisions have roots, shoots, and are given adequate water to settle into their new positions.

Prune penstemons and other slightly tender plants such as Teucrium and lavender. Make the cuts just above fresh, new shoots.

Some perennials benefit from having their flowering shoots thinned out. Although this results in fewer blooms, they are larger and of better quality. Delphiniums, lupins and phlox all benefit from this process.

#### General maintenance

Apply a general-purpose fertiliser to borders and beds. Take care not to damage emerging shoots, or to burn them with fertiliser.

Put supports in place for perennials before they get too large. Criss-crossing strings from hidden or decorative posts work well, allowing stems to grow up in the gaps between strings.

Remove faded daffodil and tulip flowers, nipping off the heads and seed pod at the same time.

Deadhead pansies, primulas and other spring bedding plants. Pansies will carry on into the spring and even to early summer, if attended to frequently.

Remove tired winter bedding and plants that did not survive the winter.

Check that self-seeded forget-me-not isn't smothering other border plants. Pull out plants if necessary.

Hoe borders to prevent annual and perennial weeds from spreading and seeding themselves.

Herbaceous perennials infested with couch grass and other perennial weeds should be lifted so the roots of the weeds can be removed.

Bulbs coming up in the rock garden or in containers may benefit from overhead protection from the rain. A sheet of glass or Perspex placed on bricks will do the job

Top dress spring-flowering alpines with grit or gravel to show off the plants and to help prevent stem rots. Any mulches may need replacing after weed removal

You could plant up an alpine trough to display some of your alpine plants as many can look their best at this time of year.

Check whether containers need watering. Even at this time of year, they can

Pots and tubs benefit from topping up with fresh compost. Old compost can be removed and replaced with new to a depth of 5cm (2in) if there is not much room for topping up.

Pot on plants showing signs of being pot-bound. You can tip out the rootballs of unhappy looking containerised specimens, to see if they are indeed pot-bound or if they are suffering from some other problem.

#### Lawns

Mow lawns when necessary - whenever the grass is growing - the aim is to maintain a constant height throughout the year.

Add the clippings to the compost heap in thin layers (too much grass all at once is likely to be very wet and poorly aerated, resulting in smelly slime rather

Use a half-moon edging iron or spade to create a 7.5cm (3in) 'gutter' around the lawn edge. This will prevent grass creeping from the lawn into borders.

Sowing new lawns or over-seeding dead patches can be carried out from mid-April to early May. If the soil is very wet or cold germination will be poor, so delay until the weather improves. Prepare the ground for sowing, by cultivating, levelling and lightly firming beforehand.

Do not walk over or mow newly sown grass until it has reached a height of 5-7.5cm (2-3in), and then only give it a light trim at the highest setting.

Apply a high nitrogen spring lawn fertiliser at the beginning of the month to encourage good, strong growth. If moss is a problem choose a combined fertiliser and mosskiller.

April is the best month to apply lawn weedkiller.

Lightly rake lawns with a spring-tine rake to remove old plant debris. This can also be done to rake out dead moss a couple of weeks after applying a chemical moss killer.

Repair bumps and hollows by peeling back the turf, removing or adding soil, and then replacing the turf.

It is still a good time to sow a wildflower meadow.

#### **Troubleshooting**

If a hosepipe bans is looking likely, consider keeping your lawn a little longer than usual, and even investing in a mulching mower.

Mulching mowers shred the grass clippings very finely and then blow them into the lower layers of the turf, where they act like mulch to help the lawn retain moisture. Because the clippings are fine, the end result is not unsightly, especially later in the season when the lawn gets very dry, and the mulch helps to keep it green rather than brown.



Here is the latest article from Chris who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

Ello and welcome again fellow anglers to this month's fishing news. Date of article is 19th March. By the time you read this article the clocks would have gone forward and Easter is just around the corner. I don't know about you but I prefer the light nights, it means I can grab a couple of hours fishing from work! Did you check all your gear last month, lines, elastics etc., if not I would do it now. Please do not forget your 2012 licence is also due now.

You will be pleased to know that there is no increase this year. This means a licence will cost you for a full licence £27, a concession licence £18, a junior licence £5, an eight day licence £10 and a one day licence £3.75. All licences are available from your post office or obtained on line at <a href="https://www.envi-roment-agency.gov.uk/rodlicence">www.envi-roment-agency.gov.uk/rodlicence</a>. We at Catchmoore wish you a good 2012 season.

I went to Risby Park fisheries the other day with my brother in law Karl and my mate Lou. We had a great day on Carp pond. Karl whom has never been fishing properly before caught over a 100 Roach for an estimated 12 - 14 lbs. Lou fished his pole on an inside line and had a similar weight fishing maggot over

ground bait. He was very unlucky though as he was broke off a couple of times with bonus fish. Antony, the fishery owner was showing me his new state of the art kitchen he has just had fitted. The new café maybe open now and apart from your normal English breakfast and butties he will be providing lunches as well. He informed me of a stocking programme that is about to take place in all of his ponds. It looks to me that a lot of time and money and effort is being spent on this fishery, we should all respect it and look after it.

I have said it before and I will say it again please take all your rubbish home. Plus to help stop any disease transfer make sure your nets are 100 per cent dry before you take them to water. Other local waters to try out that are now open are: Beresford Park pond (Beresford Avenue), Sam Hosticks (Woodmansey), Barmston Fisheries (Woodmansey), Beverley Beck Canal (Beverley).

I will write plenty about these and many more waters as the season progresses. Please keep me informed if you have a good day somewhere local so I can share this information with everybody else. Most important don't forget that there is a closed season on all inland moving water, i.e. rivers and drains etc. so no fishing on these waters until June 16th.

Sea scene: first of all I am sorry I cannot give you all the information about the European championships from Bridlington as the organisers still have not told me any information. Although, I understand that a Cod weighing just over 10 lbs. won the biggest fish I am also led to believe in spite of bad weather conditions that a fantastic turnout was had with people coming from as far afield as Holland, Germany and Poland. The event was well organised and plenty of fish was weighed in and many prizes were dished out. Well done to everybody concerned.

I am not getting many reports from the Humber at this moment in time, but a lot of fish are still being landed on our coast. There is a lot of Bass up to 2lb being reported from Albrough and near marks. Waxholme and Dimlington, has seen some early Skate to 14 lbs. being caught, plus some doggies are being reported. I also understand that there is a great many large Crabs about at this moment in time.

Cod are still being caught all over the coast but Spurn seems to be producing more at present with the small tides, it has been better at night when there is less weed about. Fresh worms are still available, but please order because the shops out there do not know how many to order without your help.

P.S. there may be a couple of club memberships available, pop in shop if you are interested, your own transport is essential.

#### Household site permits

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council is reminding those who need permits to duse the 10 household waste recycling sites, that they are due for renewal. ■

The permits enable residents to use their commercial type vehicles to take personal household waste to the sites. Commercial waste is not accepted at any

The annual permits can be renewed immediately and a maximum of six are allocated for the next 12 months. Unused permits for the current year cannot be carried over after 1 April.

Applications for renewal can be made online by visiting www.eastriding.gov.uk. Forms can also be downloaded from the council's website. Hard copies of the forms can be obtained from any of the household waste recycling sites or customer service centres in the East Riding.

Those applying for new permits for the same vehicle and address do not need to submit a V5 notice with their completed form. Residents who received permits in January and February will automatically be sent new permits.

#### The digital age makes the world a smaller place

he digital age we live in makes the world a much smaller place. When we phone our bank we have become used to a call centre in the Subcontinent answering. Business hours follow the sun, meaning that as one country closes for the day another opens up. If you go and see the film 'The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel', there is a very funny clip where the character played by Dame Judi Dench has a frustrating phone encounter with the call centre of a broadband provider, which leads to a very interesting and enlightening chain of events!

The best thing is that we can use this technology to our advantage in a big way. Many of us have family up and down the country, not to mention all over the world even. And perhaps we don't see them as often as we would like. You can pick up the phone and talk, but that's not quite the same. But if you have a computer and broadband, you can communicate for free whether your friends and family are in London or Australia, and if you add a webcam, you can see them too! You could see that new grandchild for the first time, or view some of the house you have never seen. On Mother's Day, my wife was able to see and chat to her Mum who was away in Spain at the time.

Skype is the technology that makes this happen. Founded as a private company in 2003, it enjoyed such runaway success that it was later acquired by the mighty Microsoft Corporation, and yet it is still free. Up to 30 million people use the service at peak times. All you need to do is go to <a href="www.skype.com">www.skype.com</a> and sign up for a free user account that gives you a Skype name (just like an email address). Download the small bit of software and just add your contacts names and you can start to talk. No specialist equipment is required, if you have a new laptop it will probably have a webcam built in, but any PC can just have one added to it for a nominal cost. And if you don't want to do it all yourself—you know who to call, the number is shown below!

iPad 3 launched recently to the usual acclaim. People queued outside Apple stores all night to be one of the first to get their hands on the new device. There were stories of people being paid up to £300 to queue up or to give up their place, and when you think the iPad sells for £399 you know that many of these are being snapped up to export or sell at a big mark up! Downloading of movies, TV programs and music has become an enormous industry, both legitimate and illegally. You can buy or rent, or in the case of the iPlayer you can download content for free, but only within seven days of the program showing. Now the BBC plans to monetise it huge entertainment archive by offering programs for sale at any time. The plan called 'Project Barcelona' is due to be put before the BBC Trust later this year.

Action Fraud website has recently launched a new campaign called the 'The Devil's in your details'. This highlights the growing threat of identity fraud and one of the videos shows a hacker stealing a lady's financial details. Although this may be an extreme example, the site contains extremely useful information and offers help and advice to anyone who thinks they may have been a victim of any sort of fraud. <a href="https://www.actionfraud.police.uk">www.actionfraud.police.uk</a>.

On that note it is important to point out that the 'computer telephone scam' has surfaced yet again. You will see it mentioned on the site above, and I know that they have been targeting this area recently. If you receive a phone call from anyone (usually a call centre in India), saying they are working for Microsoft or that they have detected there is a problem with your computer, do not speak to them. No reputable computer support company would make 'cold calls', and Microsoft certainly do not call anyone! These fraudsters are just after credit card or bank details. Please pass this advice on to anyone you know who owns a computer.

Microsoft were so concerned about this scam that they carried out their own survey of 7000 computer users in the UK, Ireland and USA and discovered that 15% had been contacted by one of these dubious operators and that about a quarter of that number had suffered financial loss.

Don't let the bad guys ruin your day. Do something proactive, change your computer and/or email password, especially if you use an online service like Hotmail, Yahoo or Gmail. Change your pin and bank password regularly (I know, it's difficult to remember!), but it will make you more secure. Ensure your computer security is up to date, and scan for malware, a free scanner is available from <a href="https://www.malwarebytes.com">www.malwarebytes.com</a> or we can supply the paid-for live version for just £20. Stay safe online.

Q: My ESET anti virus is expiring soon, what can I do?

A: Just phone us for the discounted renewal figure, and we can action it for you. You have up to 30 days from the expiry date to renew.

Q: What is Windows Live Essentials?

#### **Mutually Respectful** Relationships

oes this sound like the kind of basis that one hopes all children will grow up to recognise? By respecting each other there is a perfect base and opportunity for friendships, partnerships and any form of future relationships...whether they are of the heart or of your purse!

That same ethos applies to Human/Horse relationships....by finding the way into mutual respect. Horses need leadership.....not a best friend.

I have met two horses this first week back at work after my long injury rehabilitation (YEEEAAH!!!!...am happy to be back!)

Jess is a fine coloured mare who has moved to a new yard. The unsettling change to her regime and routine has led to her getting much attached to another mare...to the point of becoming very agitated when that other mare is not in sight. She cannot think of anything else but getting back to her and as such her work brain and attention to her owner has totally gone. Jess is a nice horse who is normally compliant but has always had a defiant/independent streak. Separation anxiety is in itself a very common problem amongst horse owner's especially in ex racehorses, which missed the chance to form relationships through their formative years because of the way racehorses are kept and trained.

Jess became very anxious, bargy and argumentative while her owner Nikki was becoming increasingly dispirited. We have spent a week doing work in the round pen using Natural horsemanship techniques to bring Jess into a real form of attention and respect for Nikki. We train the horses by using the same moves, the same techniques and the same body language

that horses use towards each other....it is all about understanding exactly what body language and mind set you are seeing as to then deciding what you intend to do about it.

During this week Nikki has learned to master a whole load of new techniques and has found the way to keep Jess's respect and attention. We brought in liberty work (free of any rope or physical restraint) where the horse can choose to stay and move everywhere the human goes and at any speed. Plenty of changes of direction and pace as well as moving across into the big school where the horse is free to clear off at will. Jess chose to stay! Nikki now even has a party trick too where she can climb on a high fence and her mare simply places herself in the correct place to be mounted...like magic! All these moves we have introduced require complete attention, submission and relaxed thought from the horse. Jess has to yield her body in many ways...forwards, backwards, left and right, sometimes the haunch, sometimes the shoulders...and always with Nikki having the ability to control the distance...This could be from directly in front and inside your own personal space to being 30 yards away or more.

They have returned home today where Nikki will need to put in place all the rules they have learned together this week. Jess will be delighted to be reunited with her best mate again only now she should be happy to leave her at any time Nikki chooses. Jess has learned to "LOCK ON" to Nikki now and show respect and harmony. Fingers crossed it will make all the difference to this budding partnership and give the both of them confidence

The photo is of Jess showing Nikki calm body language and complete respect. She has dropped her head in front of Nikki and is stood quietly "GROUND TIED" away from her at the exact distance that Nikki dictated.

The second horse is a six year old unbroken pony mare called Bliss, that has been taken on by a lady called Vicky. I used to teach Vicki when she was just a child at Willerby many moons ago...now she is all grown up, married and mum to a gorgeous little boy! Yeah, yeah, I feel old! ?

Vicky has decided to go back into horses after many years away from them and Bliss is her challenge. Bliss still holds many natural defence mechanisms found in the wild. She strikes out in front, rears right up in order to get away, is fairly nervous of some forms of touch and is quick to worry. Vicky called me in to help her get her going in the early part of starting any young horse... called lunging. This is where you ask your horse to walk and trot round you on command obediently and happily. It tests you ability to control distance, speed, build trust and puts the young horse into 'work mode" mentally.

Bliss had point blank refused to even start to cooperate! Well why should she in reality? She has been free to roam at will for her entire life after all.... but hey school catches up with all youngsters!!! Life is developed through lessons and learning for us all...horses are no different.

After a few hissy fits, tantrums and wayward behavioural moves Bliss soon caught onto what was being asked of her...she even started to enjoy the experience despite herself! I will pop in and out of Bliss's life from here on in just to support and teach Vicky how to maintain and move forward with training this pretty but impetuous youngster. I will keep you all posted as to their progress.






#### Local author and historian Peter Railton's latest book "The Victorian Village Schools of East Yorkshire"







# Moving Abroad? A monthly column by Nick Russell

ive years ago, Nick Russell (ex Spectrum Video) and his wife Rita decided that, by the time they were 55, they would like to live and work in a sunnier part of Europe. The plan was to try and buy somewhere big enough to live in and earn an income from letting rooms on a Bed & Breakfast basis, or self catering accommodation. Their search started in France but after a couple of years searching for the right property, it became apparent that to get a suitable property, both in terms of size and location, was going to beyond their budget.

So a couple of years ago the search moved to Southern Spain - Andalucia to be exact. It is an area they know quite well as they have had a share in a house on the Costa del Sol for the last 30 years which has been used regularly for family holidays. This is the second part of their story of the ups and downs of trying to buy a dream property in the sun. The third part will follow in next months issue. This is the second part of our story as we searched for our dream home in the sun. We hope you found the first part interesting enough to entice you to read part two. After looking at properties in France for the last couple of years with no success, we had decided to change our search area. So early in 2009 we started to look at properties in Southern Spain and the area of internal Andalucica. As I said last month our wish list was quite large, six or seven bedrooms, three bathrooms, plenty of living space, a pool and a decent garden, all in a rural setting and suitable for a Bed and Breakfast or Self Catering. Of course it all had to be within our limited budget.

This time, unlike our early seaches in France we were going to do plenty of research into the areas and types of property available. We hoped this would save us a lot of wasted time and be far more productive.

We started searching the internet, looking at Estate Agents in Andalucia. After a couple of days trawling through site after site, it became apparent there are hundreds of Agents and this was going to take some time. We then stumbled on a site called 'Kyero' which covers all the major Agents across Spain and you can select the areas you want to cover. Just type in the area you are interested in, what you want in the way of a property and up pops hndreds of properties from dozens of Estate Agents in the area. Much quicker and very easy, and then you can go into the Agents own website to look at their other properties. Once you have selected a few of your choice, you can download more detailed information and start putting together a possible viewing list.

#### Plannning the search area

This was much more of a plan than France and we were not going to rush it. This time it had to be right. We had decided on a fairly large search area, from Antequera in the West to Albox in the East and everything inbetween. We wanted to use Malaga airport as the main point of entry into Spain so most of our search area was within a one hour drive of the airport and the A92 motorway runs right through the area.

Our search area was quite large, so we decided to split it into three main areas. Area one around the ancient city of Antequera, area two around the city of Granada and area three around Albox.

The plan was to visit all areas during 2009 by taking holidays throughout the year, baseing ourselves on the coast at our holiday house and driving to each area

The first area we decided to visit, was the area to the East of Granada, around Guadix, Baza and Albox. The search on Kyero threw up plenty of properties to view, so we short listed about a dozen to view from four or five Estate Agents. We requested as much information from them as they could give us, about the property and the area and then made viewing appointments. All of our choices ticked most of our expectations or at least they appeared to on the internet, so it would be interesting to see them in the flesh, so to speak. So by mid 2009, we had our list of properties to view, all we had to do was book our flights and car hire, pack our bags and go viewing.

The idea we had was to buy a home in Spain become settled and then sell the business. Unfortunately around this time, things were getting very difficult with my business, Spectrum Video, due to the start of the recession and sales were suffering. So after 30 years in the village. I had a massive decision to make, with dropping sales and rising costs I made the decision to close the business and sell the property. It meant making seven people, who had worked for me for a long time, redundant, but looking back now, with the state of the economy, it was the right decision to make. Obviously this put our property search on hold until we could close the business and sell the property. Fortunately the property sold quickly so the Spanish property search was back on, a year later than planned as we were now into mid 2010.

#### Revisiting past regions

We decided to keep to our plan and try and visit the areas we had picked out the year before.

So it was back to the internet, re-checking with the agents on the availability of our choices and to see if anything new had come to the market. There had been some changes to what was available but not much as the property market in Spain was, and still is going through a terrible time. Many properties are reduced for quick sales or open to offers, which is great if you are buying. Because we are looking to do a bed and breakfast or self catering we also checked out what there is to do in the areas we were looking at. Obviously getting as much information about the area is very important, whatever you want to do when you get there. If you have children, you need to know about schools or if you need medical treatment you need to know where the nearest hospital is and can you get the treatment you need. Also if you have guests, what is there close by that might be of interest that they could visit. Access to any property is also important, near a motorway or main road is great but once you get off them, you come across very windy and rough country roads and dirt tracks.

So we picked out about a dozen properties to look at over a period of three to four days. This meant three or four viewings a day, and let me say, in summer temperatures, that is plenty. It's just so hot sitting in a car travelling between properties. All of the houses we wanted to view appeared to fit our needs on the internet at least. In reality, once again, it was very different.

The first property was situated near the town of Orgiva apparently. The Agent had arranged to meet us near the property, which was a few miles up a mountain road, in the middle of nowwhere. We all jumped into his 4x4 and much to my wife's dismay headed down what felt like a 1 in 3 dirt track. I think my wife had decided, after about 500 yards that she was not going to like this place. In the end, neither of us did, not a great start.

The next property to disappoint was situated in a small community which sounded great. We again met another English Agent nearby and followed her 4x4 in our little hire car along the main road for a couple of minutes until, once again we turned off down we later found out was a dried up river bed, very rough and dusty. The house was alright, but the location wasn't.

#### Generous with the truth

None of the others over the next couple of days were really not what we wanted, either because of location, size or condition.

Despite asking the Agents a lot of questions about their properties, it appears the truth is not always fourthcoming.

On the last day of viewing we were with an American Estate Agent, who at my request was showing us some Cave houses around the town of Baza. I had seen and read about these on the internet and thought they might be a bit different - and they certainly were, especially if you want to live like the Flintstones. In most of them all the bedrooms seemed to be built into the rock face with no natural light and very rough walls. Not ideal if you want people to come and stay. So, having experienced them, we decided against buying one.

So having viewed about a dozen properties, none seemed to tick enough boxes and on our return to the UK, we changed our search area to the area between Antequera and Granada.


Just a couple of tips here, definitely get an English speaking Agent and also make sure they know exactly what you want and what you intend to use it for.

#### Stress . . .

It is one small word but oh what a loaded word! Too much of it is bad for your health and your overall well-being. 
