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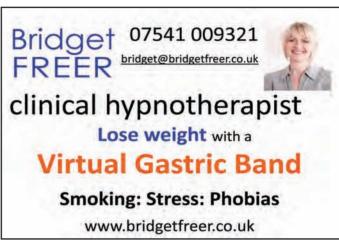

# Proposed Development - Castle Road

Some of you attended the Parish Council Planning Meeting that was held in the Civic Hall on Thursday 14 March to discuss the proposed 600 dwelling development on Castle Road, opposite Castle Hill Hospital. For those of you who didn't – the Parish Council unanimously recommended refusal of the development on the following grounds:

- Against Beverley Borough Plan Policy E3, E4 and L10
- Against Draft ERYC Local Plan COT1r rejected on the grounds that the site forms a significant part of the key open gap between Cottingham and Willerby. Development of the site would result in the coalescence of two settlements and the loss of the key open area which conflicts with the place statement and Policy A1 of the Strategy Document
- · Against village identify
- · Increase in traffic generation and safety
- · Loss of public amenity
- Noise and disturbance from the scheme
- Surface water flooding/drainage/sewerage flood risk
- · Loss of open aspect and rural character of area
- · Loss of wildlife
- Concern at the future ownership and maintenance of any attenuation system

As I'm sure you are all aware the Parish Council can only make recommendations on planning applications; the decision to approve or refuse planning permission is made by East Riding of Yorkshire Council

If you feel that this development should be refused by East Riding Council then you can make your objections to Mrs Susan Hunt, Planning Officer, East Riding of Yorkshire Council, County Hall, Beverley HU17 9BA. All letters, whether they are against or in support of an application, are seen by the ERYC Planning Committee Members and your views are taken into consideration when they make their decisions.

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# E-mail hacking - Get extra safety with Malwarebytes and the coming demise of Windows XP

ahoo email services have been quite seriously compromised over the past few weeks, leading to many users having their accounts 'hacked' and used to send out spam. Yahoo released the following statement recently which we would recommend all Yahoo email users follow: 'Yahoo! takes security and our users' data seriously. We recently learned of a vulnerability from an external security firm and confirm that we have fixed the vulnerability. We encourage concerned users to change their passwords to a strong password that combines letters, numbers, and symbols; and to enable the second login challenge in their account settings.'

Hotmail users also faced some disruption recently when one of Microsoft's data centres encountered technical problems. This happened during the process of moving users from Hotmail to the Outlook.com service.

For any disgruntled users of the aforementioned services, a good alternative would be Gmail from Google. This is free to sign up to and works on any PC, Mac or mobile device.

Look out for emails apparently coming from people you know that just contain a link to a website. This is how this malicious activity spreads itself around by using people's address books, so don't click on the link.

Malwarebytes going on, y

With all this email hacking activity going on, you can never be too careful. In addition to your own antivirus

protection, it is worth mentioning again the protection offered by Malwarebytes, namely the ability to block out websites that have been hijacked or may contain malicious content. The cost of this

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software is now £24, but that is a one-off licence cost, not recurring. Contact us for details.

A transparent computer that allows users to reach inside and touch digital content has been unveiled at the TED conference in Los Angeles. The (excellent) BBC News website reported that TED fellow Jinha Lee has been working on the SpaceTop 3D desktop in collaboration with Microsoft. Imagine being able to touch and flip through a document or set of pictures inside your computer!

Other far-reaching developments have been unveiled that will influence how we interact with technology. One feature of the new Samsung Galaxy S4 smartphone lets you scroll down pages just by moving your eyes over the screen. It will also pause video playback if you move your eyes off the screen, the restart again when you look back. Neat!

Office 2013 & Office 365 as mentioned last month, are the latest versions of Word, Excel, PowerPoint etc. Neither version comes with a disc anymore, only as a download, and supplies of previous versions have now dried up. However the new 365 offers very good value with starting price of £79.99 for use on up to 5x Windows or Mac computers. See <a href="https://www.microsoft.com/office">www.microsoft.com/office</a>

Windows Blue....rumours abound of a (another) possible version of Windows being developed. Could it be a 'Windows 9' or just an update to the current Windows 8? (only released in November 2012), Watch this space....

Just a reminder that Windows XP reaches 'end of life' in April next year. Launched back in 2000 the revolutionary operating system has had a record run, and Microsoft has decided this is the end of the line. So if your computer runs on XP you need to start thinking about a new one before then.

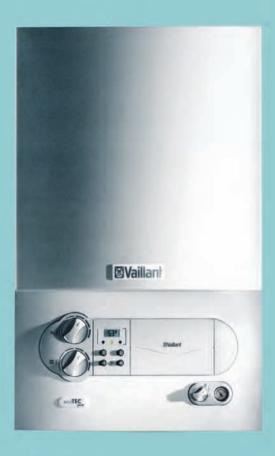


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Here are a few hints and tips to help you along:

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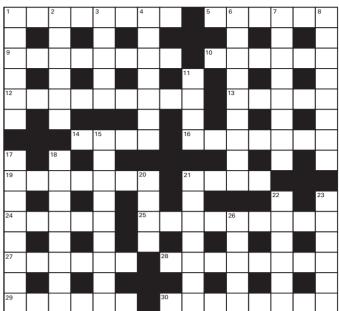

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# Crème fraîche

rème fraî che is a manufactured cream product with between 18 percent and 36 percent fat. It has a smooth thick texture, similar to cream cheese but it has a slightly tangy flavour more akin to Sour Cream.

### Origin and History of Crème Frî che

Originating in the Brittany and Normandy regions of France it is widely available and used throughout Europe. In France, the unique characteristics of crème fraî che made by different artisan producers is greatly appreciated in much the same way as connoisseurs appreciate and enjoy different types of yoghurt.

It is traditionally made with unpasturised cream which naturally contains the bacteria required to thicken it, but whilst specialists still use unpasturised cream, pasturised cream is becoming more widely used.

## Crème Fraî che in Cooking

Many cooks favour crème fraî che over cream and sour cream because it can be boiled, reduced and thickened without the risk of curdling. It can also be whipped like double cream and has a longer shelf-life than both cream and sour cream. Crème fraî che can be used as a substitute for sour cream in most recipes and for cream in many.

It makes a great topping for fresh fruits, puddings and other desserts. It is also an excellent ingredient in savory dishes such as soups and casseroles, and adds richness and body to sauces.

# Storing Crème Fraî che

Crème fraî che should be treated like any other fresh dairy product and once opened, it should be used within two to seven days.

# Homemade Crème Fraî che Recipe

Crème fraî che is very easy to make at home. Below is a recipe and whilst it takes a while to make, it's certainly worth giving it a try.

Preparation time: 8-14 hours

Ingredients

240ml/8fl.oz. Double/Whipping Cream

2 tbsp Buttermilk

### **Instructions**

Place all the ingredients in a glass bowl, mix well, cover, and leave to stand at room temperature (about 70 degrees F.) for 8 to 24 hours, or until thickened. Stir well, cover with clingfilm, refridgerate and use within 10 days.

# Courgette and Herb Pâté

Ingredients:

600g/1/2lb Courgettes (zucchini)

Salt and Black Pepper

50g/2oz Butter

3 Eggs

210ml/7 fl.oz. Double Cream

1 heaped teasp Freshly chopped Parsley

1 heaped teasp Freshly chopped Mint

1 heaped teasp Freshly chopped Tarragon

1 heaped teasp freshly chopped Chervil

Pinch of Cayenne Oil for greasing

# Instructions

- 1. Coarsely grate the courgettes into a colander, sprinkle with salt and leave for 1/2 hour to drain any excess water.
- 2. Rinse the grated courgettes under cold running water, drain well then dry on kitchen paper.
- 3. Melt the butter in a pan, add the courgettes and gently sauté for 10 minutes, stirring, until they are soft. Cool.
- 4. Preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, Gas mark 4. Line a 1.5L/3pt loaf tin with greaseproof paper then grease the paper with oil.
- 5. In a bowl, mix together the eggs and cream then add the courgette and butter mixture, salt, pepper, herbs and cayenne. Mix well.
- 6. Pour the mixture into the prepared loaf tin, cover with foil, stand in a roasting tin containing 2-3 inches of water and bake for 11/2 hours or until firm. Cool.
- 7. To serve turn the pâté onto a serving platter, spread the crème fraî che over the top and sprinkle with fresh herbs.

# Pests - Whose responsibility?

Pests are never a planned addition to a property, so when they set up home alongside your tenant, responsibility can be far from clear.

An infestation of any kind, be it ants, bedbugs, fleas or pigeons, makes a property unpleasant to live in, not only due to the inconvenience of these pesky trespassers, but also as a result of the unsanitary conditions they create. They should therefore be eradicated as soon as possible, which may require repeat treatments or a lengthy course of action. Further, if professionals need to be called in, say where fleas insist on making themselves at home in the property, who should have to bear the costs?

Readers may be surprised to discover that the general rule is that the landlord is not responsible for any pests that take up residence in the property, whether the infestation takes place during or prior to the tenancy. There are a few important exceptions to this rule which I will come onto, however the Landlord is responsible for the fabric of the building and its essential services and appliances, but not for any living things that decide to move in with the tenants.

If a tenant discovers a pest infestation immediately upon taking possession of the property, it is theoretically possible for the Landlord to claim a defence under the principle of 'caveat emptor' (let the buyer beware) and to refuse to accept any responsibility. The principle of caveat emptor is well-established dating back to 18th century, unfortunately the old principles of caveat emptor run contrary to the modern consumerist approach where any commercial supplier is expected to supply goods and services that are essentially 'fit for purpose'. Whilst the two principles exist there will remain some grey areas in the law.

Where a Landlord takes responsibility for issues with pests, is where it can be shown that the landlord is in some direct way responsible for the

infestation, for example through damaged drains or holes in the walls or floors of the property. Under the Landlord and Tenant Act 1985 a landlord is required to keep in repair 'the structure and exterior of the dwelling'. If the pests entered the property through disrepair, this would then become the responsibility of the Landlord through default of the property being in disrepair.

In contrast however, where defects in the property have arisen due to bad design or existing openings, rather than as a result of disrepair or dilapidation, the landlord will not be responsible for the problem. Nor will the Landlord be responsible due to a tenants mistreatment of the premises or indeed if the tenant fails to take measures to eradicate an infestation which subsequently causes disrepair to the building fabric. An example of bad design maybe gaps in floorboards, a mouse can easily enter through such, however this is not necessarily an example of disrepair and is more likely to be due to design and age of the property.

Where the area can become even more complex is if your tenancy makes specific reference to obligations in respect of pests, this can effectively override the above default position.

Whilst in most cases the tenant is likely to be responsible when an infestation occurs, as a responsible landlord, it would be foolish to not assist your tenant where reasonably possible to prevent any reoccurrence of the problem, such as assisting in sealing up areas of entry to potential pests. It may well be the tenants responsibility to rid the infestation from the property, however if this prompts a tenant into leaving the property sooner than they had otherwise planned, this can actually have a financially detrimental effect to the landlord if you are having to meet the costs of finding a new tenant as well as any potential void period, could far outweigh the cost of small repairs.

# Spring Savers





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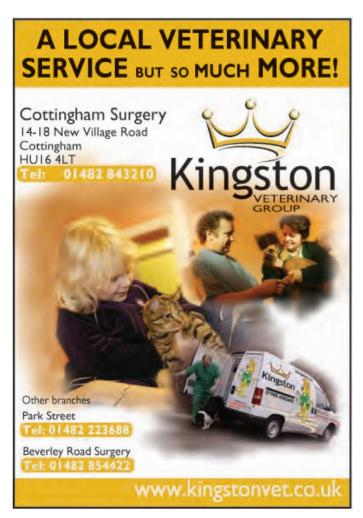
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t is that time of year again when all the little 'darlings' who have been hibernating away inside over the winter period, emerge ready for their summer holiday of sun, food and more food. Now you may rightly be thinking of your lovely children or grandchildren but I hasten to add it's nothing as delightful. The 'little critters' I am referring to are, SLUGS, SNAILS, FLEAS AND THE BLOOD SUCKING TICK!!!

As most gardeners are aware, the slug and the snail are very harmful to plants but how many pet owners know they can be just as potent to our pets. The warmer but wetter weather is perfect for them in which they can harbour the parasite LUNG WORM. Lets start with the SNAIL, a very tempting 'snack' to many a puppy and also the inquisitive older dog. I know my dog Teal, when she was a puppy, brought many a snail into the house after she dug up half my garden at the time. Needless to say most of the plants and shrubs also ended up on my lounge carpet. What more fun can there be to a 6 month old Labrador, than to dig, explore and then proceed to eat their findings? What harm can it do? You may be surprised. The snail can be infected by a type of worm called LUNG WORM which is associated with foxes and when digested by our canine friend, travels along major blood vessels supplying the lungs, where it can cause a whole host of problems. Left untreated it will have major consequences. The SLUG doesn't get off lightly too as this also carries the deadly worm. So if your pet shows signs such as coughing, tiring easily, nose bleeds, vomiting/diarrhoea or any other change in behaviour, please contact your vet immediately.





Every pet owner knows about FLEAS and what a nuisance they cause but you may also be surprised of the health risk they can carry? These tiny external parasites live off the blood of mammals and their bites can lead to major health issues. The flea is a tiny wingless insect with a hard flat body designed to easily navigate through pet hair, legs designed for jumping great distances and mouth parts designed to suck blood. An adult female flea can lay on the host, up to 40 eggs a day which will then dry and fall off into the environment such as carpets, curtains and furnishings. A fully developed flea, which may live up to 4 - 6 weeks, will begin to lay eggs within 24 hours of her first blood meal. She defecates blood from her host that will fall off along with the eggs, re starting the life cycle all over again. The health risk? Flea allergic dermatitis is an allergic reaction to flea bites which can cause severe itching and major skin infections. Also, Tapeworm (there goes the WORM again, raising its ugly head) which can be contracted by animals or humans after accidentally ingesting an infected flea. Another one is aneamia which can prove fatal if the host animal has enough flea infestation to lose a lot of blood. You maybe surprised to learn that three out of the four stages of the flea cycle are spent in the carpets, curtains and furnishings, jump onto the host for a feed then jump off again. This explains the odd occasion when we get a new client pop into the surgery, who has moved house and has no pets, to buy a household product to treat a flea infestation left by the previous occupiers. The fleas had found another meal source other than a furry friend.

TICKS! Wonderful little things that are attracted to warmth and motion. It climbs onto its host (mainly around ears and inside of the legs) and attach its mouth into the skin beginning the blood meal. Once the tick is locked on, it will not detach until the meal is complete which can take a few days. The appearance of a tick is like a small cream lump (often mistaken for something more medical) which gradually grows and changes colour with the amount of blood it intakes. As for diseases? Most ticks do not even carry them, however the threat of disease is always present so must be taken seriously. Signs include lethargy, fever, weakness and joint swelling which may take days or weeks to appear so the early removal of a tick is crucial but to be removed under medical care.

Now how do we prevent or remove these little critters? As in every case, prevention is always better than cure so we shall start with worming. This comes in various forms, granules or tablet and also in the case of cats who hate digesting anything other than food, (as mine have often proved after chasing them around the room causing havoc) drops on the back of the neck are available. We recommend these are administered every 3 months.

For fleas, once again it is simple by popping a vial of liquid flea treatment on the back of your pets neck once a month. Here at KINGSTON we stock a flea product that is also a tick preventative so you don't even to have to apply it on your pet twice. All these products are only available through veterinary practices. Please also do not forget to treat your house and surroundings.

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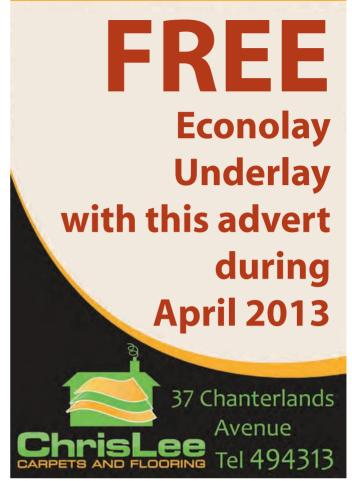


# Cottingham Wildlife Watch Group closes its doors to nature

# We Are All Getting Older

It's true that we are all getting older. As we do our bodies change. Some try to defy the aging process but you can't cheat time





Our mouths change as well to a degree, e.g. getting long in the tooth. Most of our bodies and our mouths do well really. Lets face it we are not really designed to get past 40.

# Oh No We're In A Recession

GUM recession that it. Do you see what I did there? Terrible, I know.

When the gum recedes it uncovers the root of the tooth. There is no hard enamel on the root. The surface layer is cementum but this is lost to uncover dentine. Dentine is not as hard as enamel and it has little tubes in it that lead down the pulp (what is often referred to as the nerve). This can lead to a couple of things. One is the potential for sensitive teeth. This is especially the case if you have a high acid diet or acid reflux (stomach acid that comes back up).

The other thing is root decay (or root caries as we call it). As I said, there is no hard enamel to protect the root so the tooth decay process can really crack on at a fast pace if the conditions are right. I say right but this is right for the bacteria causing he decay, for us I should say the conditions are wrong I suppose.

# When In Drought

A particular problem for the teeth as we get older is taking certain medicines. All medicine can have side effects and if you read the leaflets that come with them there can be loads of possible side effects. A common one is dry mouth (xerostomia).



Saliva is great stuff. It helps protect the teeth from decay and lubricates the mouth to stop chaffing. Some medicines are worse than others for dry mouth.

# **Double Whammy**

If you couple recession and root dentine and a dry mouth there is potential for root decay to get a hold quickly. Next month I will see if I can come up with some top tips on how to help control or prevent this problem.

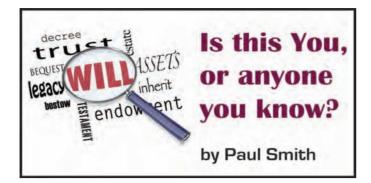

Maps:- EXPLORER 294

Start at GR. SE8274016 Old Railway Station. Distance 6.0 Miles.

Pollow the old railway track in an easterly direction and emerge on the A614 road, turn left and then after about 50 metres turn left again onto a farm track/path keeping the hedge on the left. On reaching a junction on the track, turn right and then immediately left, at all times keeping the hedge on the left. Continue ahead with Brouncey Farm ahead.



On approaching the wooded area near the farm, turn right keeping a dyke to the left then after a short distance turn left and cross the bridge over the dyke. After crossing the bridge, turn left, keeping the farm buildings to the right. Skirt round the farm and on reaching the northern side of the farm turn left onto a farm track. After about 80 metres turn right. After about 400 metres turn left for 100 metres then turn right.

Continue on this track until a point where the track turns sharp right. At this point turn left and pass through a gap in the hedge keeping a wooded area to the right. After a short distance turn right and pass through the wooded area to emerge on an enclosed path and finally into an open field. Continue ahead with the hedge on the left.

Emerge on the Everingham road and turn left. Follow this road for about 1.4 kilometres then locate a bridleway on the left and follow this to Park Farm. On reaching the surfaced farm road, turn right and follow this to meet the main road. Turn left on reaching this road and follow this back to the parking area.

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pring should now be in evidence, with daffodils in flower and blossom adorning trees. Expect the inevitable 'April showers' but the frequent sunny days and rising temperatures too make it perfect gardening weather. It's an exciting month, with indoor-sown seeds well into growth, and it's also time to start sowing outdoors. Just watch out for frosts.

### Where to start with bedding

For instant seasonal colour, flowering bedding plants are the answer! They are useful for filling in gaps between plants and shrubs that aren't fully grown, for using in containers or for planting up a whole bed for immediate effect. They can also be planted in hanging baskets, window boxes and troughs. Although they are short lived (lasting one season only) they grow fast and provide excellent value for money.

Bedding plants are ideal for sunny or lightly shaded but relatively sheltered areas. The municipal style of growing them in straight lines





is best avoided in a garden - so plant them in large drifts or clumps to create impressive splashes of colour.

Many bedding plants can be grown easily from seed or as young plants from our garden centre. Bedding plants are available for spring, summer or early autumn colour, which will transform an otherwise dull border in a very short period of time.

## **Preparation and Planting**

- Don't plant when it's too hot and water the new plants thoroughly while still in their pots.
- Make sure the planting area is free from weeds. Fork over or hoe the area thoroughly, ensuring you don't disturb any nearby plants.
- Dig a hole bigger than the roots of the plant and water the hole. Tap the plant out of its pot or tray, disturbing the roots as little as possible. Gently push into the hole and firm the surrounding soil. Repeat with the other plants.
- Place tall plants to the rear and compact edging plants at the front. Don't overcrowd the plants.
- Some bedding plants come in pots made from peat which should be planted as well because the roots grow through them.
- After planting, sprinkle a general fertiliser such as Growmore lightly around plants and water well.
- Bedding plants grown in flowerpots, containers, hanging baskets and well-mounted pots, should be filled with potting compost mixed with water-retentive gels and slow-release fertiliser pellets.

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# Top Ten Tips

- 1. Keep a check on weeds
- 2. Protect Spring shoots from slugs
- 3. Plant summer-flowering bulbs
- 4. So hardy annuals and herbs
- 5. Top dress containers with fresh compost
- 6. Mow the lawn on dry days (if needed)
- 7. Feed roses and shrubs
- 8. Remove moss from paths and patios
- Open the greenhouse or conservatory doors and vents on warm days
- 10. Increase the water to your houseplants

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### Plant of the month Rhododendron

Rhododendrons are grown for their spectacular flowers, usually borne in spring. Some also have young leaves and stems covered in a striking dense woolly covering (indumentum) and some - the deciduous rhododendrons or azaleas - have good autumn colour.

Choose a site with dappled shade in sheltered conditions. Avoid deep shade beneath other trees. Most rhododendrons will tolerate a more open site if sheltered from cold, dry winds. Dwarf alpine species will tolerate full sun provided the soil does not dry out. Avoid frost pockets and sites exposed to early morning sun.

- Rhododendrons need moist but well-drained, acid soil between pH 5.0 and 6.0 that is rich in organic matter.
  - If you have alkaline soil, grow rhododendrons as container plants.
  - Dwarf alpine rhododendrons are effective in a rock garden.
  - Larger rhododendrons are excellent for woodland gardens.
  - · Compact hybrids are ideal for containers on shaded patios.

eil Oakes of Jane Brooks Law says that careful thought needs to be given by couples intending to purchase property jointly as to the best method of joint ownership, as very different legal consequences flow from this decision.

# Co-owners hold property in one of two ways: Joint tenants

Each joint tenant owns the whole of the property —they do not each have a quantified share in the property and will not be able to leave a share of the property by will. If joint tenants sell the property it will be presumed that they owned the property equally, regardless of respective contributions to the purchase price. On the death of one co-owner, their interest in the property would automatically pass to the remaining co-owner without any further action. The surviving co-owner would then own all of the property and on their death it would form part of their estate. This is known as the "right of survivorship".

Married couples or those in a civil partnership commonly use this method of co-ownership because the right of survivorship makes it straightforward to inherit each other's shares in the property.

# Tenants in common

If property is held as tenants in common, each co-owner will own a specified share in the property. The share be fixed from the outset or may vary according to the financial contributions made by each person during their ownership of the property.

Tenants in common can pass their share of the property to another person, either during their lifetime or by will, or under rules of intestacy.

Holding the property as tenants in common may be appropriate if co-owners have children from previous relationships and would prefer them to inherit their interest on their death rather than their co-owner.

Ownership as tenants in common should be documented in a declaration of trust which is a document that formally records that they

hold the property as tenants in common and sets out respective shares in the property. On the sale of the property the declaration of trust will be referred to, to work out entitlements to the sale proceeds from the property.

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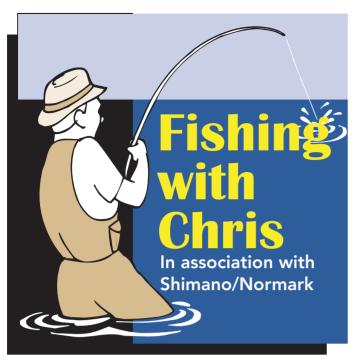


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# Here is the latest article from Chris who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

Fishing news. Today's date is the 19th March. I hope by the time you read this article you will have remembered your 2013 ROD LICENCE. Plus don't forget the rivers are now closed until June 16th, don't get caught out stay legal.

This year's rod licences are going to be the same price as 2012. They are as follows:

Full: £27.00 Concession: £18.00 Junior: £5.00 8 Day: £10.00 1 Day: £3.75

Not bad for a full years fishing, eh!

Anyway now for some fishing news; First of all it is now that time of year for you all to go and check out our local waters again and what a change you will see on some of them, changes for the better may I add.

Let me tell you what has been going on at Sam Hosticks, Plaxton Bridge. Sam and Val and the crew have been very busy during the winter months removing loads of trees that was affecting not only the fishing but causing a leaf problem in the ponds. Now those trees have been removed the water quality should improve no end. Along with a couple of good friends Sam has also had a very good stocking program

going on. Up to now an estimated 8000 Roach and Carp have been introduced to his waters in all three lakes. These range from 2oz to 9lb in weight, and he assures me there is more to come. As we speak a peg improvement scheme is going on. There is another change you may be interested in, if you want a match on any of the lakes you can now book as little as 10 pegs if you wish, and Sam or Val will give you half a lake of your choice. Finally just outside on the layby there is a good butty van that provides good sausage 'n' bacon butty's.

Just up the road towards Beverly there is Barmston Fishery run by Nigel. If you have not been here for a number of years check it out. Nigel has improved this site no end. You can recognise from the off that if the fish are anything like the pond that they will be in pristine condition and I personally know that there are Carp in here to 30lb. Now for Risby at Walkingon, this place is run by Anthony and crew. This is local water that is constantly changing.

Once again the forestry commission has been down here improving things with the woodland. Another stocking program has been going on here too. Plus the new café is brilliant. On that point even if you are not fishing this site it has very good food, indoor and outdoor seating area and very clean toilet facilities. So if you are hiking or bird watching this is a very good pit stop.

I say this every year and I will say it again, please respect our local fisheries. The owners are constantly trying to give you a good day out. It is a lot of hard work improving something which looks so little. Please help them not only by fishing these waters, but do things such as taking your rubbish home, and if some rotten devil has left some litter please pick it up and take it home. Less litter means fewer rats which in turn means less disease. If we all do this and respect all the fishery rules we can all expect brilliant fishing for years to come.

Here is a bit of good news for our local anglers that was published recently. Apparently in between Northmoor Lane and Dane Park Road a new pond is getting dug, and to encourage more youngsters into our beloved sport it is going to be free to fish. I will do a follow up story on this news when I have more definite information next month.

**Sea scene:** despite a record number of anglers on the European Championships last month not much was caught due to the unfortunate horrendous weather conditions. But may I take this opportunity to take my hat off to a very well organised match. The people involved were so professional despite the weather conditions everything ran as smooth as clock work.

Since then the fishing has improved greatly now that the weather has calmed down, and I have had reports of Cod to 61/2 lb being caught all over from Witherensea right down to Old Hall. The crabs are not too bad still and there are loads of whiting and Flatty's getting to the baits still. So don't put your sea gear away just yet. On that point whilst you keep ordering live lugworm my digger will keep providing you with the freshest bait possible, and of course there is always plenty of frozen baits available.

Well a new season is here again so new and used stock is arriving almost daily now, check it out.

From me Chris and the rest of the Catchmoore Crew we all hope that you all have plenty of "TIGHT LINES" during 2013, till next time take care and see you on the bank soon.

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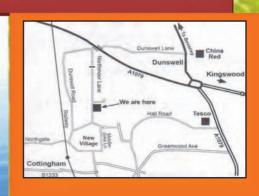
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# Young Persons' Musical Competition Called Off -For Now

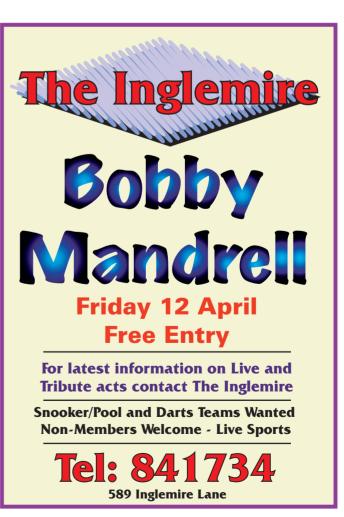

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# It's been a long winter

That a lovely promise happens when the tops of the early bulbs start to push through the soil. Somehow, when the tips of green erupt in their little clumps it gives one hope of better things to come. The days get longer and the children come home from school in daylight. We notice it doing the yard up at night. When you leave the horses at 5-ish each evening and it is daylight, it simply starts to cheer ones soul up......apart from the excessive rain!

We seem to have had a long winter this year somehow . . . though I am sure we probably all say that every year! It has certainly been extremely wet. My winter turn out field became a no go area for my tractor for weeks. Thankfully I borrow a 4 wheel drive digger so that I can still take out the haylage bales for the horses to eat as there has been no grass at all.

However, it is all on the change now bit by bit. By the time you read this spring will have become more established though I am still looking at a sprinkling of snow on the ground as I sit here to write.

We have quietly ticked over all winter with ex-racehorses in for re training, all problematical individuals in their own right. "Lou" came to me just before Christmas to be put down if we could not find the way forward with her. This is often the case with ex-racehorses who are so out of control and who carry so many anguished hang ups. We get several a year all on death row because it has all got so bad that the owners are at their whit's end and know that they cannot or should not sell their horse on.

Lou was typically a very sweet natured mare to handle on the ground but very dangerous to ride! She displayed all sorts of issues:- from fear of being saddled where she always launched herself around the yard when the girth was tightened up, to "blowing up" on the roads....especially coming home, where she would lose all rational thought. All that mental anguish stemmed from her racing days and an assortment of accrued significant injuries.

The first thing we do with each and every horse is to do a pain assessment on arrival. Lou naturally stood and moved in a very

strange way! She had her hind legs very tucked under herself, with her back quite raised and her frame looked tight and awkward. Her four feet were always too close underneath herself. It turned out that the poor girl had the tightest, most constricted ham strings I have ever seen...... which had shortened to such a degree that all the connecting muscles had gone into spasm in sympathy. She must have been in such significant pain because of all the related cramps which were constant....no wonder she objected to the saddle and ejected riders at will with such violence....all of which was against her openly sweet nature.

So the long task of muscle release, hamstring stretches and flexion exercises were put into place. The equine Osteopath worked extremely hard to start the process which we then carried on with. Unfortunately little Lou suffered a bad colic during this painful process which left her in the Veterinary hospital all over Christmas. The stress and pain was all too much despite our care and steady approach. She had suffered for so long and her frame had become so atrophied that the physical fix was too much for her to bear. It was so sad and my heart went out to her. She was "touch and go" for a few days but being a tough old bird she pulled through and came back to Skidby before the New Year.

A week of rest and rehab with us where we walked her out in hand and where we started to gently stretch all her legs out again meant we were then able to carry on with her training. She was totally re-trained using Natural horsemanship techniques where we get the ability to put a calm stitch of in place. All these racehorses know how to blow up and go, adrenaline to the fore, with no knowledge or ability to come back down into calm rational thought again hence they "Lose it" when turned for home.

She leaned to halt at road junctions by use of a balance rein round her neck, not the bit in her mouth. She learned to think her way back down from her heightened energy "go, go, go" response using the one rein stop we had formerly trained in, ready for such inevitable moments. She learned to stand quietly to be mounted with no one holding her and the girthing/saddling issues disappeared. We spent time training Kate, her owner, in all these techniques and Kate felt happy to take Lou back home at the end of January.

Kate just sent me a lovely video of Lou being schooled like any other normal soft and happy young horse.......She is jumping, schooling and being ridden out safely and happily. A massive difference from the little horse that walked through our door! Physically Lou is in far better shape. Her hamstrings and all the associated musculature involved had been released and softened. The cramping should not return if all the stretch and flexion exercises are maintained. Mentally Lou is certainly in a very different place. Life in general is now pain free and ridden life is now fun and an adventure for her! No bullet for this sweet little horse now and a smile replaces the tears for Kate.....perfect!

Skidby is a small village with several working farms and a narrow winding Main Street. "On street parking" is therefore not recommended.

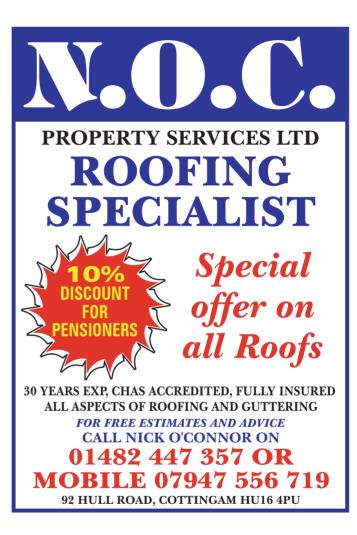

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# Moving Abroad? A monthly column by Nick Russell

#### Road works

have had the main road between our village, Tocon, and the next village, Mesia, relaid this month. Its quite a hilly road with lots of bends through the olive groves and like many roads in Spain (and UK) was in very bad condition. Because its only two lanes it was interesting to see how they kept the traffic moving while they worked.

As they closed off a section of the lane they were working on, they obviously had to feed the traffic from both directions down one side. Now in the UK you would expect to be controlled by temporary traffic lights but over here it was a bit different. Workers are positioned at the start and finish of each section being worked holding a stop/go sign, but they cant see each other.

So that they know when its safe to change the traffic flow the last car is given a stick to hand in when they reach the other end and the traffic flow can then be changed. An old fashioned system maybe but it worked and the grand kids loved it if they got the stick on the way to school. Anyway they completed laying the 4 miles of tarmac in about 7 days and now we have a lovely smooth road instead of one full of pot holes.

#### **Dancing**

Our granddaughter Katie has been going to Flamenco lessons twice a week since September and last month she was in her first show. The 28th February is Andalucia Day and her dance school were putting on a show, with all the age groups doing 3 dances. Katie was really looking forward to it and practised nearly every night at home.

One of her friends mum makes all the dresses for the show and so Katie looked really good in her hand made dress and dancing shoes with her hair up. The show was really quite good and we were all impressed with the overall quality of the dancing and how Katie didn't look out of place with her Spanish friends.

#### Cost of living

As everyone knows, the whole of the Eurozone is in financial crisis, especially Spain and it has started to reflect for us in the recent value of the pound against the Euro. I transfer money over at the beginning of each month and in three months the rate has dropped from 1.24 euros to 1.13 euros to the pound (about 10%) which means we have to be a bit more careful how we spend our money. Thankfully most essentials are still cheaper than the UK, especially food, drink and diesel.



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On the subject of drink, I have been listening to the debate in the UK about putting extra charges on alcohol to try and reduce anti social behaviour and binge drinking. Here in a Spanish supermarket I can buy strong (5%) beer for about 20p a can, a bottle of wine for about a pound and a litre of most spirits for under £10 but I have never seen anybody getting trashed and causing trouble, at least not in the towns and villages we go to around here.

I think its more to do with upbringing, education and a reduction in policemen on the streets in the UK as much as the cost of the booze. Also, over here you don't argue with a policeman who has a gun!!!

#### Weather

Since the end of February the weather has been very changeable. We have had sun, rain (lots of it )and snow over the last 3 weeks and it looks like its going to continue that way until early April. Roll on the summer and 35 degrees C temperature.

#### Sierra Nevada

While our daughter Nicola and her partner Andy were here, we had a day out at the ski slopes so Andy could go snow boarding and our grandson Jack could play in the snow. The weather was sunny but very cold. We had a walk around Pradallono and Andy hired a snow board, bought his pass and spent the afternoon on the slopes while we all sat drinking coffee in the sunshine.

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#### Get together with the Expats

When we first moved to Tocon, we didn't think any other Brits lived here. However we have now met or heard of six other families who all live Tocon or nearby in the Campo so Rita and I decided to have a get together at our house so we could all get to know each other. One of the couples we had already met had the e mail addresses of all the others so we used them to make the initial contact, with replies to me. Four of the six families said they could make it and we had a great night eating drinking and talking. I think the last ones at about 2.30am. It was nice to get to know each other and hear about all their experiences in Spain. Despite a few moans about living out here, they all said they wouldn't move back to the UK!!

#### Days out in Granada and Malaga

Our friends Dawn and Steve came out for the first week in March and they fancied a day out in Granada while they were here. Its only about 30 mins by car from our house but as we all fancied day of tapas and wine as well as a bit of sightseeing, we decided to go by train. Although there is a train station in Tocon, and the Granada train passes through it, it doesn't stop here. We had to travel to Loja, 20 mins in the other direction, to catch a train to come back through our village to go to Granada. The train was very clean, quiet and on time and cost less than a Cottingham/Hull return ticket.

The train station in Granada is about a 5 min walk to the main tourist areas and is much easier than trying to park. We found some great Tapas bars on our walk round, which is just as well because it rained most of the day. We spoke to one of the bar owners who said he had never experienced weather like this in years and that it had actually snowed in the city the week before for the first time in 50 years. Despite all the rain, Granada looks a great city and we will go back when it's a bit warmer and drver.

The last day of their stay was hot and sunny so we headed to the coast just east of Malaga to an area called El Palo which is still very Spanish and unspoilt. We had had a restaurant recommended to us so that was the main reason for the visit but we had a walk along the seafront, enjoying the sun, stopping at a couple of bars to people watch and have a couple of cold ones. At lunch time we headed to the restaurant, El Tintero, situated right on the beach. It's a big place with seating for about 400 people but as it was a bit out of season it was only about a quarter full.

Although there are menus on the tables, with about 30 starters, nearly all at 6 euros, and then a main course menu of about 10 fish dishes sold by weight, you don't order in the normal way. As you sit at your table all the waiters walk around the restaurant, each carrying different starters, shouting out what they have. If you fancy it, you put your hand and they bring it to you. If you want a main then you order that in the normal way but as we fancied nearly all the starter we never made it to a main course. We wondered why they never cleared the plates from the table until we asked for the bill. Like a sushi bar, they just tot up the number of plates, empty bottles etc, write it all on the table cloth and then work out the final price. It was an interesting experience, the food was really good (if you like fish and shell fish) and the price for 4 was very reasonable. The setting on the beach is great. As its only an hour away, we will definitely go back, its well worth a visit.

They must also have appropriate insurance in place for the work that they are carrying out. Should any problems arise, you will have reassurance that the SRA will be able to help you.

Solicitors are required to be upfront and clear about costs. There should not be any hidden surprises along the way. When contacting a firm of solicitors, we recommend that you should always ask for details of cost in advance.

We would advise you to ensure your solicitor is a specialist in Private Client law – not all solicitors prepare Wills regularly. Look out for specialist qualifications such as membership with the Society of Trust and Estate Practitioners (STEP) and members of the Chartered Institute of Taxation (CTA). When arranging an appointment, don't be afraid to ask about the experience of the individual you will be seeing and for details of their supervisor, if appropriate.

- the experience and qualifications of your advisor
- · whether they are regulated by a professional body
- · what insurance they hold
- that you receive a clear estimate of charges in advance

#### The Mind Body Connection and Your Immune System

Leave muscle tension and often results in high blood pressure, depression can lower the immune system and stress can result in ulcers and other disease.
