Welcome to our section of the Newsletter that keeps our residents updated with some of the projects that Cottingham Parish Council is involved with.

New Parish Clerk

The Parish Council is pleased to report that Mr. Matthew Kay has been appointed as the new Clerk and Responsible Finance Officer to the Parish Council. Matthew will take up his duties on Monday 3rd April and you can contact him at the Parish Council Office, 9 The Cottages, Market Green, Cottingham Tel: 01482 847623.

• Cottingham Day – Update

It was agreed at the Cottingham Day Committee meeting held on 31 January 2017 that Cottingham Day would NOT take place this year, basically the Committee felt that the event could not compete with the City of Culture activities in Hull City centre. Plus, the temporary library which is in situ in the Market Green would still be present in July. Along with the negative feedback received from traders and residents the Committee felt it was time for a change. Therefore, the Committee agreed to hold a Christmas Festival on Sunday 3 December 2017 between 11am – 5pm, the event will be hosted in the Market Green and Civic Hall and the Christmas themed stalls will include crafts, food and gifts, along with some form of children's activities.

If you are interested in having a stall at the Christmas Festival or wish to volunteer in any way, please contact the Parish Council office telephone 01482 847623.

• Grants to Local Organisations

Cottingham Parish Council may award grants to any community groups or charitable organisations that are beneficial to the village. If you belong to an organisation and wish to apply for grant funding from the Parish Council, then in the first instance, please contact the Parish Council Office for more information and an application form. Please note that there are criteria elements to this form that need to be taken into consideration. All application forms received are decided upon at the next scheduled Finance & Asset Management Committee Meeting. In March the Council awarded grants to a) Cottingham Cricket Club for funding towards the costs of providing equipment to enable Ladies to play matches and b) Cottingham Springboard Live Music Festival towards the costs of publicity and marketing of the festival.

• Memorial Gardens

Work continues to take place on improving the Memorial Gardens. The next step is to paint the main gates and for the installation of new lighting.

Cottingham Parish Council does not allow any scattering of ashes, placing of memorial features or furniture to be erected in the gardens. Whilst we appreciate that this may cause disappointment to some families, it was felt that it is important that these gardens are returned back to their original purpose, a place for remembrance for the service personnel.

• Cottingham Civic Hall and Council Offices

The Cottingham Village Trust has now been formed and registered as a charity with the aim to save the Civic Hall/Council Office. The East Riding of Yorkshire Council had intended to market the property in February 2017 but have agreed to delay this process for 3 months to enable a viable financial business plan to be submitted from the Trust. The ERYC has suggested some broad principles that need to be taken into account if an asset transfer is considered. The Trust has replied to this requesting further clarification and

given details of why some of those principles are unacceptable. Although there are still many concerns, the asset transfer originally proposed and then withdrawn is now again being considered and a Public Notice is to be issued by ERYC to establish if any other similar organisations have an interest.

Following the objections raised by the Cottingham Village Trust and the community regarding the proposed sale of the Civic Hall/Council Offices the following changes have occurred;

- Following its withdrawal a possible asset transfer to a community group is once again under consideration.
- The Civic Hall will remain operational until the end of 2017.
- Marketing of the property, which was scheduled for February 2017 has been put back 3 months to consider the proposals from the Cottingham Village Trust.
- A Public Notice is to be issued by ERYC inviting interested parties to put forward their proposals for the continued use of the property as a community facility.

In the meantime the Parish Council agreed to make a Grant to the Trustees to enable them to commission a survey of the buildings and to assist in the preparation of a Business Plan which has to form part of its formal bid to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council.

Wilburn Court

The Parish Council will shortly be erecting a new seat at Wilburn Court. Residents will have noticed that the seat has been missing for some time. Unfortunately the East Riding of Yorkshire Council had to remove the seat because it had been badly damaged and could not be repaired. ERYC had also indicated that it would not be replacing the seat owing to budget restraints.

Dog Waste Bags

The Parish Council are continuing to provide dog waste bags and the charge for 2017 will remain at 50p for 50 bags, with all proceeds going to Cottingham Wild Spaces Group. The response to this initiative has been so well received that we have had to limit sales to 2 packets per person.

• Office Opening Hours – Temporary

Parish Council opening hours are Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from 11.00am to 3.00pm. However, this is just a temporary change in hours and we will notify you when we will be reverting back to our original days of Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursdays.

• Dates for your Diaries

You will be aware that Cottingham Parish Council meets the third Thursday of every month, excluding August and December and they all commence at 7.30pm. The dates for meetings in 2017 have been approved as:-

20 April 2017, 18 May 2017, 15 June 2017, 20 July 2017, 21 September 2017, 19 October 2017 and November 16 2017

The changing face of IT and the PC is still here.

here is no doubt the technology landscape is changing. Having been in business for over 15 years now (and dabbling with computers for a few years before that), I've seen a lot of changes take place. Gone are the days of the old PC beige box in the corner with fan noise like a jet engine, huge monitors that took two people to lift onto the desk and squawking dial-up modems that took over your telephone line! Think back to the last century B.G. (before Google) when a quick computer session turned into hours as you'd tried find something online or just send an email. And if you wanted to buy something, wow that was an experience! Then in 1998 came the dawn of Google (and a new version of Windows) and things suddenly got a whole lot easier to find, even though web pages still took an age to load. Then came ISDN which more than doubled the speed of internet connections, and eventually the fabled broadband arrived and we all jumped on the information superhighway! Fast forward to today and we have fibre-optic broadband with speeds you could not have dreamed of a few years back, and of course Wi-Fi virtually everywhere, and nearly everything has to connect to the internet. (Apologies to any readers who are still waiting for these services to arrive!).

So with all this going on, what services do we offer to you, the home computer user?

We supply PCs to any specification. Yes, the PC is still alive and well, now in a sleek and shiny, very quiet black box! We have one or two specifications that will suit most home users, but all can be modified or upgraded for any use. Chances are that if you've always used a PC you will want to keep using one (even though the family might say go for a laptop!) Reasons? Firstly, a PC tends to be more robust, easier and cheaper to repair and it sits in a dedicated space in the house. 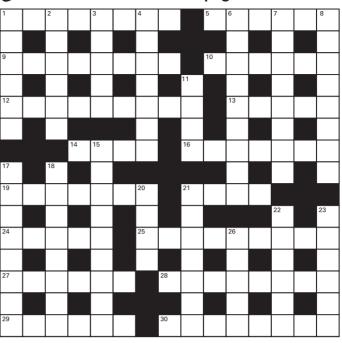

In the Kitchen



One-pot roast chicken with garlicky potatoes & greens

• Preparation time: 15 minutes + resting

• Cooking time: 1 hour 20 minutes

• Total time: 1 hour 35 + resting. Serves: 4 - 6

Ingredients

1 medium chicken (about 1.5kg), string removed 500g Charlotte potatoes, halved or quartered if large 400g pack echalion shallots, halved lengthways, root

trimmed but attached

1 garlic bulb, halved horizontally

100g unsalted butter, softened

500ml tub fresh chicken stock

250g pack essential Waitrose Kale, tough stalks removed

2 tbsp cider or white wine vinegar, to taste

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 220°C, gas mark 7. Remove the chicken from the fridge 20 minutes before cooking. Place the potatoes, shallots and garlic into a medium roasting tin. Season the chicken and rub it all over with butter before placing on top of the vegetables. Roast for 45 minutes.

- 3. Put the roasting tin on the hob, add the chicken stock, bring to a rapid boil over a high heat, stirring occasionally,

until the liquid reduces by at least half and the potatoes and shallots are very tender. Discard the garlic.

4. Add the kale, cover and steam for 2-3 minutes more, until just softened. Stir in the vinegar and seasoning, to taste. Carve the chicken, adding any resting juices to the vegetables. Serve at once.

Ingredients

300g frozen butternut squash

1 red onion, cut into chunks

1 aubergine, diced

40g mixed nuts, roughly chopped

200g can butter beans, drained and rinsed

- 3. Preheat the oven to 200°C, gas mark 6. Stir in the crème fraîche then spoon the mix into a heatproof pie dish, discarding the rosemary stalks.
- 4. Open out the pastry sheet and lay it over the filling, tucking in the edges. Brush the top of the pie with milk and sit the dish on a baking sheet. Bake for 25-30 minutes until the pastry is golden and cooked through. Delicious served with mash and steamed greens.

250g golden caster sugar

- 3. Once the cakes are completely cool, pour the double cream into a mixing bowl and whip until soft peaks form. Spread the cream over the bottom of one of the sponges, spread the other sponge with jam, and sandwich them together. Finish with a dusting of icing sugar just before serving.

Cook's tip: Instead of whipped cream, a vanilla-scented buttercream is a lovely alternative and is great if you want your cake to keep until the next day. Simply cream together 150g Butter with 150g icing sugar and a teaspoon of vanilla extract.

WITH ROY WOODCOCK

Rioja one of our favourite red wines

Ask any wine lover for their favourite red wines and you can bet that Rioja will be high on their list. The Rioja region in Northern Spain covers some 57,000 hectares of vineyards across three areas: La Rioja, the Basque country and Navarra. Between them they produce around 250 million litres of Rioja wine every year, and wine lovers enjoy every drop.

Wine has been produced in this area since Roman times, with set practices dating back to the early 1100s. In 1787, the Royal Economic Society of Rioja Winegrowers was established with the sole purpose of encouraging the cultivation of vines, wine production and its commercial development.

The long history of the production and development of Rioja wines has resulted in a wine of outstanding quality. Rioja wines have matured into one of the world's most favoured reds and can confidently stand shoulder to shoulder with many of the world's finest wines.

In recent years there has been a debate over what constitutes a traditional Rioja. Many question what grape varieties should be used and others question the production techniques, including the use of winemaking methods, which have changed the focus of the wine, making it altogether more fruit driven.

However, under the Denominación de Origen Calificada Rioja, there are four red grapes permitted to be grown in the Rioja region: tempranillo, garnacha, mazuelo and graciano. Some wine growers are experimenting with cabernet sauvignon, which is at the root of contention for people who question the makings of a true Rioja. Tempranillo, however, is easily the most widely planted, accounting for around 50 per cent of Rioja's vineyards.

Although Rioja is a famous red, 15 per cent of the Rioja wines are actually whites or rosés. The Denominación de Origen Calificada Rioja also allow for the white grapes viura, malvasía and white garnacha to be grown in the region.

Rioja wines exhibit an aromatic complexity. They are fresh, with a medium body, a balanced structure and have an excellent bouquet.

Classic red wines have a rich colour with a fresh, penetrating aroma. They are light in the mouth with medium alcohol content. Rosé wines, mainly from garnacha, are bright pink in colour with a strong fragrance and are even lighter and fresher in the mouth with medium alcohol content. Rioja whites, mainly from viura, exhibit fine, delicate aromas and are light in the mouth with fairly low alcohol content.

Rioja wines are aged in 225-litre oak casks followed by a further period of bottle ageing. There are over 270 producers of aged Rioja racking up some 900,000 casks between them. The different Rioja wine categories are based on minimum ageing periods, which can vary between one and three years in casks. Then follows a period of bottle ageing, varying from six months to six years in the bottle depending on whether the wine is to be a Crianza, Reserva or Gran Reserva.

Like all wines, you get what you pay for with a bottle of Rioja. For reds, Gran Reserva is the most expensive, but it packs plenty of extra taste to the pound.

* For a little relief from all the other Trump-related stories we're bombarded with, I was interested to read that a quartet of Slovenian wine producers near Sevnica, where First Lady Melania Trump grew up, have released a wine in her honour.

Named simply First Lady, the wine is made from Blaufränkisch grown in eastern Slovenia, which is known locally as Modra Franking.

An initial run of 300 bottles sold out in three days priced at €27.90 a bottle but further supplies have since gone on sale.

Melania was born in Novo Mesto, which at the time was part of Yugoslavia, and grew up in Sevnica. She began modelling at the age of five and signed with an agency in Milan aged 18.

She met Donald Trump at a New York Fashion Week party in 1998. The pair were married in 2005 at an Anglican service in Palm Beach, Florida. Their son, Baron William Trump, was born in 2006.

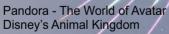

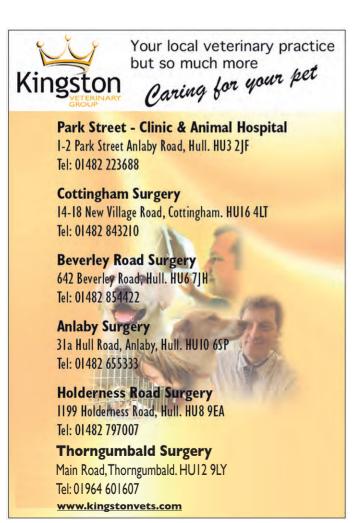

When we think about the plants, we often go by the season and obviously colour, of what we are going to plant in the garden but how many of us think about the hazard these beautiful blooms bring. Now, you will be quite right in thinking of hazards to yourself but in this case I am talking about our little canine friends. Spring brings daffodils in abundance, they literally spring up everywhere and how tempting they maybe to an inquisitive nose. The temptation not only to sniff but take a bite. TOXIC! These beautiful flowers, who so many admire, are poisonous to dogs. The consuming of not only these but many bulbs, plants and house plants MUST be followed immediately by a visit to your vet. If you are unsure of the name of the plant and don't have a label, please ensure you take part of the plant with you so your vet can identify it. Our feline friends do not get away lightly because plants, for all they are not as toxic to cats





as to dogs, they may cause vomiting and once again, Veterinary advice must be sought.

The Spring also brings Easter...a time of not only reflecting on the meaning of this time but also, as in the case of many shop windows since the new year, CHOCOLATE. This is much to the delight of my grand-children who cannot wait for the luxury of Easter eggs. For the regular readers of *The Cottingham Times* and also a feature Teal my Labrador made in the *Hull Daily Mail*, you will be following her exploits. I say following because the 'dangers' are always there especially to an inquisitive black nose

Now chocolate to us is wonderful and so sweet which just happens to be the same to our pets and yes, once again, it is harmful. The cocoa solids in chocolate contain Theobromine which is poisonous to dogs. All chocolate whether it is white, milk or dark can contain Theobromine. If your dog has eaten some chocolate please seek medical advice and KEEP the wrapper ... unless, it is like Teal and consumes that too! Yes, she did have a trip to our Park Street surgery followed by a stay in the hospital as it was enough to possibly cause her harm.

Along with chocolate at this time of year is another delight to most humans...hot cross buns. You would be correct in thinking that with them not containing chocolate and be bread based, they will cause no harm but it is the raisins, currants and sultanas that are the problem. Even when this fruit is cooked your dog is still at risk of kidney failure. It is not only these that should be avoided, and this may surprise you, but ready meals, gluten free, home baking and sweets can all contain Xylitol which is poisonous. Check whether the packet contains E967, Xylitol or a sweetener and contact your vet.

Finally.... this is something that comes as 2nd nature to Teal, I am ashamed to saySCAVENGING!! Now everyone knows how greedy dogs can be, especially Labradors, and bin bags lying around is a great temptation. As in Teals case it is the bird table. The ever increasing lumps of bread that fall, is Teals dream but after researching for this article, if the bread has turned mouldy it can contain toxins. These quickly attack a dogs nervous system and a small amount of these mycotoxins can cause tremors and seizure.

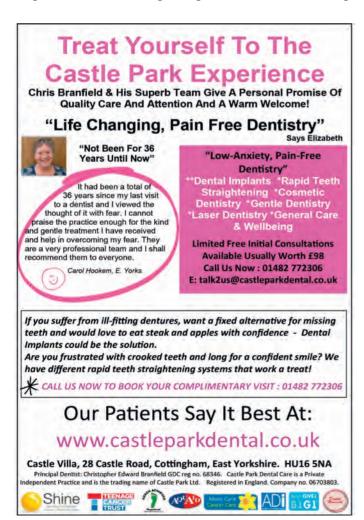

A while ago I was asked to give an hour-long presentation at a small conference for dental practices. Now, my slot was on the morning of day two. over "feeling". Well, this did some doing for me, as I'm not a computer tetchy at all. It was all trial and error but got there in the end. It was a choice between The Righteous Brothers and Elvis Presley. I opted for Elvis as I was brought up on "The King" and my dad wouldn't forgive me if I

Oh Get To The Point!

Have you ever had a local anaesthetic? Sometimes you can feel like you about to fall over your face. Local anaesthetic is great. It allows us to have a load of stuff done in the medical field in a comfortable way. The only real drawback is that you can feel numb for quite a while sometimes. If you've had your teeth done you have to wait a bit to have a cuppa.

Nearly There



Now there is the QuickSleeper. This is a novel way to deliver a dental anaesthetic and numb up to six teeth in one go without the same numbing of the cheeks, lips and tongue. How good is that? Now, it does not replace conventional anaesthetic altogether, as it cannot be used in all situations and each case needs to be assessed properly, but I am using it more and more. It is a bit different. There is an element of vibration involved but it is all very gentle and feedback is very good. It is ideal for doing a few tooth restorations in different areas of the mouth in one go, especially if you struggling for time and want to get a lot done in one visit. Perfect for people that live away. Or those who cannot wait for a cuppa!

Most Gentle On The Planet

I was not quite accurate in what I said above. The quick sleeper can be used to numb up in a similar way to the conventional approach i.e. leave you feeling numb. However, as it is a computer controlled technology it is so gentle. This means pain free! I researched this quite a bit and have been on courses as I'm a dental anorak! However, it's the quest for always looking for better. We have three of these things in the practice so we can ALL use them all the time and have one standard of care throughout. The feedback is incredible.

On The Clinic

My son, Edward, is still enjoying his course at university and now started treating patients on clinics. It's a really intense fast moving course. Non of this four hours "contact" a week. He's all buzzed up. He comes back to see Hull City play with me. Come on City, see if you can stay up lads.

How best to grow potatoes in a planter

- 1. 1. Quarter fill the potato planter with a good quality multi purpose compost.
- 2. Set 2 or 3 seed potatoes (do not use more than this as you will only end up with very small potatoes), chits or eyes up, into the compost and cover with another 15 to 20cm layer of compost.

- 3. Water well, two to three times a week, to ensure the compost never dries out. Once shoots break through, roughly every seven to 10 days, cover over with more compost, until the bag is full. Potatoes like a lot of water. You don't want the compost soaking wet but it should be moist all through. Once the bag is filled, feed weekly with a liquid tomato fertiliser instead of watering that day.
- 4. Once the plants flower, this is the indicator that the tubers are forming and may be ready. Scrape some compost out and if the tubers look OK, empty the bag and harvest your crop. Not all varieties flower so check bags according to the type of potato grown.

Muker & Upper Swaledale from Keld

The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.

pper Swaledale is, in my opinion, one of the most interesting areas within the boundaries of the Yorkshire Dales National Park. This route is no exception and offers a mixture of high level and valley walking with visits to picturesque villages. As a bonus the area is rich in industrial heritage and you are able to see at first hand some of the remaining ruins.

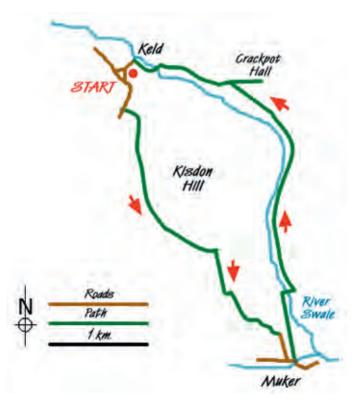

The walk starts in the small village of Keld (Grid ref.

NY892011) where there is car parking, public toilets and limited opportunities for refreshments. Leave the village and take the left hand fork to reach the main road. Turn left towards Muker and after approximately 400 metres turn left down a signed bridleway. This route leads across the southwestern side of Kisdon Hill before dropping steeply into the attractive village of Muker (shop, pub, refreshments etc.).

The onward route is located to the north of the church down a minor road flanked by cottages. The footpath strikes north (Grid ref. SD 910980) across hay meadows for approximately a kilometre to reach a path junction (Grid ref. SD 909986). Turn right here and cross the Swale using the substantial footbridge. On reaching the east bank of the river turn left and follow the broad track northwards alongside the Swale.

Crossing Swinner Gill (Grid ref. NY 908004) you will see extensive evidence of the lead mining that one took place in this valley with the remains of a flue on the hillside together with ruins from an engine house and other auxiliary buildings. Continuing the main path climbs to reach a junction (Grid ref. NY 904008). Turn right here and walk the short distance to the ruins of Crackpot Hall. After inspecting these return to the main path and continue towards Keld.

Far below on your left is Kisdon Force which is an impressive sight when the Swale is in spate. Just after crossing East Gill (Grid ref. NY 896011) turn left and cross the Swale and continue into Keld village. If you want to take a closer look at the falls turn left immediately after crossing the bridge and follow the Pennine Way. After a short distance you will notice a narrow footpath on your left descending to the Swale from where a good view of the falls can be obtained.

It is recommended you take a map with you when following a walk route. The preferred scale is 1:25000 used by the Explorer series. Note: If two maps are listed at the same scale then either (a) both are required for full coverage of the route or (b) the route is covered on both maps.

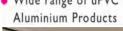

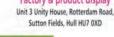

Working hand-in-hand with young people in education

ne ethos I have always operated my business on is wanting to help young people starting up in the industry. My main way is by allowing work experience opportunities within my local community as well as further afield. I have students come to experience the work and the training on my yard from local schools to Universities across the UK. Further education provides a myriad of choices in career and in the direction of animal care, training and rehabilitation especially so.

For 31 years, I have been sharing my world with our local schools and colleges. 14, 15, 16, 17 and 18 year olds come to participate in work experience programmes at my yard. Some schools offer a 2-week block while others only offer 1 week at a time. I always think 2 weeks benefits a young person more because by the 2nd week they are more comfortable with the routines, the horses themselves as well as how the yard works. By the 2nd week they are no longer all fingers and thumbs and start to feel that they are part of the team....and that is massively important. I want any young person to feel they have achieved much in their time at my yard. This confidence is then carried forward into their lives in general.

As far as Universities are concerned I offer opportunities at my yard UK wide. Over the years I have had students studying veterinary medicine, ethology, anthropology, psychology and more recently I have opened my doors to the next generation of Animal trainers. Extraordinarily there are now degree opportunities for students to study Animal Learning and Behaviour at Bishop Burton, right on my doorstep! Having made so many wonderful contacts through my attending various conferences, seminars and training workshops with Internationally Acclaimed Animal trainers and Scientists over these past years, I have formed a great relationship with senior Animal Behaviour lecturers at Bishop Burton. This has opened the door for the opportunity for their students to come and watch training at my yard. All these students are using the same science as myself so when they come they see how I apply this knowledge to my species: -horses!

These Degree and Masters students are all studying the exact same science but will apply their knowledge to their own specific species of interest. Some are planning to work with dogs in various ways-training, rescue, rehabilitation, training drug or seeking dogs, etc. Some are planning Zoo or animal conservation careers. To my delight 3 students from this year's group are planning to be horse trainers! Finally, this ethos and science of force free training is filtering through to Equines.

Every animal has its own innate behaviours, hard driven, innate reactions dependant on its species. Variables come in with its specific breed inside that species group. For example, there will be some similar innate behaviours and some breed specific behaviours if you were to compare behaviours of a German Shepard dog to a Springer Spaniel or a tiny lap dog breed. The all still have wolf in them with some common similar behaviours in say the "startle reflex". However, their breeds are so altered that they will all have behaviours specific to that breed. The German Shepard has been developed as a protection type dog. The Spaniel has been developed as a seeking dog and the lap dogs have been developed as companion house dogs.

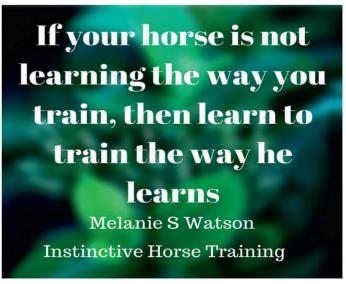
This exact same scenario is applicable to horses of cause. Compare the innate, hard driven behaviours of all horses (wild at heart) then look at how we have altered and shaped breeds per our wish list. A Thoroughbred race horse is bred to run and run fast. The Shire or Clydesdale has been bred to be calm, slow, huge and extremely strong. The Shetland pony is small, tough, resilient, strong and is a pure survivor, bred to live in very harsh conditions on very poor available food.

The biggest problem with offering work experience these days is the Health and safety nightmare! Rules and regulations are ridiculously over the top and have inevitably put so many employers off. Finding placements in any industry is getting harder as more businesses pull out of the programme. The young people suffer because their opportunities become scarcer. It is the way of the world now, risk assessment mania! Employers and business owners like me risk being sued if anything went wrong, yet we are giving freely!

I am very safety minded of cause because horses are always high risk. They are predictable in their unpredictability! However, we are always very sensible and specific risks are always discussed on a daily, even momentary way, depending on the task in hand.

Who knows where it will end up but in the end, we need to invest in young people starting out if life and encourage them as best we can. Opportunities are out there and the generosity of small businesses is imperative to give opportunity, help and support along the way. To the powers that be, please stop making it so hard for us to share.

Council joins forces with Yorkshire Air Ambulance to run textile amnesty

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council is teaming up with the Yorkshire Air Ambulance to hold a series of textile amnesties across the East Riding.



Residents are being encouraged to take any unwanted clothing, shoes and textiles - including sheets, blankets, towels and quilt covers - to amnesty events so they can be collected by the charity for recycling to help to raise money.

The events are being held to encourage residents to recycle their old clothes and materials and not to place them in their household bins, as they cannot be recycled that way.

Each year in the East Riding around 8% of all waste put in blue bins is textiles. That is 2,820 tonnes of fabrics from an overall total of 35,245 tonnes of waste collected for recycling.

Instead residents are being urged to take all old items of material to local clothing banks for recycling. There are clothing banks located at any of the 121 mini recycling sites across the East Riding at supermarkets and other sites.

Yorkshire Air Ambulance has a number of clothing banks across the East Riding.

The council's waste and recycling officers will be holding the first textile amnesty event at Driffield Market on Thursday 16 March. They will be there with their van and trailer from 9am to 3pm to offer recycling advice and to collect textiles on behalf of the charity.

Then Yorkshire Air Ambulance staff will join the waste and recycling officers at the following textile amnesty events:

Beverley Tesco store on Wednesday 5 April from 4.30pm to 7.30pm.

Willerby Retail Park, near Waitrose, on Tuesday 11 April from 4.30pm to 7.30pm.

Residents are encouraged to go along and take any unwanted clothes, shoes, bedding, towels or other material to give to the Yorkshire Air Ambulance.

Councillor Symon Fraser, the council's portfolio holder

for asset management, housing and environment, said: "East Riding residents are some of the best recyclers in the country, so it would be great if every old t-shirt or pair of shoes was taken to a nearby clothing bank rather than placed in the bin at home.

"And that's what our amnesty is about – helping the environment and helping to raise money for a worthwhile charity too."

View from the station box

In response to repeated complaints over the down time of the level crossing barriers, Network Rail invited a small group of Cottingham councillors to see operations first-hand. Parish and East Riding councillors Mike Harness, Ros Jump and Geraldine Mathieson each spent an educational hour in the signal box at Beverley Station, with four Network Rail staff to talk us through the process and answer our questions. Here is some of what we learnt.

A railway train is much larger and heavier than anything we see on the roads. Because the smooth rails are designed to move heavy loads with minimal effort, stopping in a hurry is not easy, even at low speeds. Keeping the way ahead clear is therefore vital for safety. Early railway history is littered with the dramatic

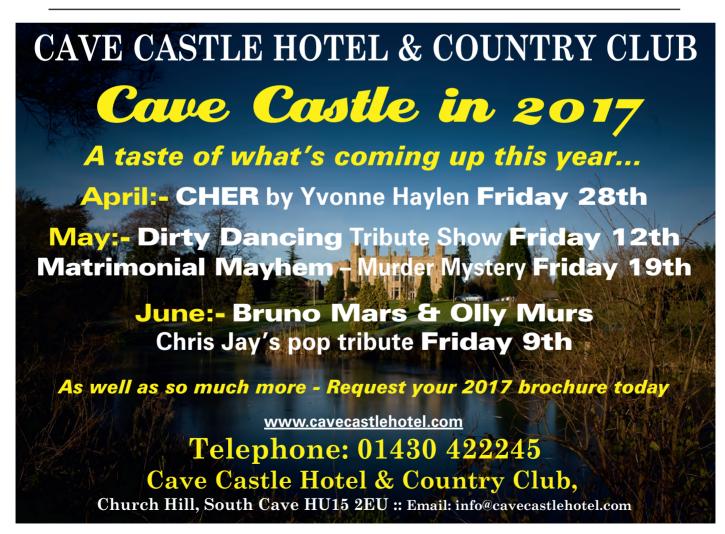
tragedies that forced evolution of the modern rule book [see Red For Danger by L.T.C. Rolt 1955] and every new accident drives demand for safer working.

Crashes between trains are avoided by use of Absolute Block, a system that divides the railway into sections, with signallers handing trains from one section to the next like a game of 'pass the parcel'. This Victorian invention is now in use all over the world, and only the signalling technology has changed, with automation to reduce scope for human error. The 120 year old telegraph bell at Beverley is still in use today to offer and receive trains between some sections.

The notorious 'leaves on the line' problem is not about wheels slipping, but interference with the way a train is detected - it simply disappears from the 'radar'. That's when the signallers go back to the slower old-fashioned methods: looking out of the window, or watching on CCTV.

Automatic Half-Barriers in more rural areas are triggered automatically by the train itself passing a set point, marking 30 seconds travel time. That's not much reaction and braking time if the driver sees some impatient idiot driving around the barriers. The full barriers at Northgate and Thwaite Street level crossings are lowered manually whilst the signaller in Beverley watches on CCTV. Please keep well back from the barrier position, because if an obstruction, such as a pedestrian is in the wrong place, it stops the barrier dropping and then the signal to the approaching train remains at red. Once slowed to await a green signal, the heavy train will not regain much speed, so road traffic must wait even longer for the train to pass.

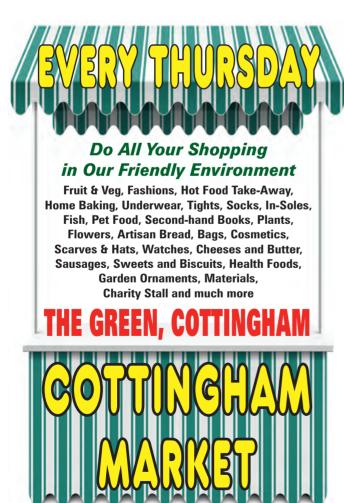
The passing of the train automatically triggers the barriers to lift. If another train is approaching from the other direction, the signaller uses their judgement to know whether it is worth lifting the barrier for a few seconds or not. Letting just a few cars through can often cause more frustration than it saves, and drivers trying to avoid a second delay can block the barriers, delaying everyone even more.

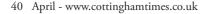
Due to the distances involved, the safety rules dictate that when the train is in the station, the crossing ahead must be closed. One factor that the signaller can never know is how long the train will be stopped in the station. This is entirely dependent on the passengers getting on and off. Large numbers of passengers, people with luggage or wheelchairs, or problems for the guard to deal with, will all keep the crossing closed a little longer.

We heard a plea from drivers regarding the footpath crossing by the old good shed. Please, please do not cross in front of a train, even when it is moving really slowly. From this position it is too easy to think that the train you see is the only one, but there may be another coming the other way, and not all of them stop at Cottingham. The train drivers can see you running in front of them and are well aware that they cannot stop if you have a mishap or mis-judge the situation. The prospect of flattening a pedestrian terrifies them, so they drive much slower here than near other stations. That means the level crossing gates are closed longer than they need to be, and Network Rail would love to have the footpath crossing removed altogether.

The lesson overall is, if we want the barriers to be down for the shortest possible time, we must all work with the railway staff to help them operate the system quickly and safely. So, road users, please respect the barriers; footpath users, please keep off the track when a train is in sight; and train passengers, please don't dawdle or otherwise delay the train when it stops in the station. Together, we can keep the road traffic flowing with as little interruption as possible.
