Welcome to our section of the Cottingham Times that keeps our residents updated with some of the projects that Cottingham Parish Council is involved with.

Word from the Clerk – Doing more with less.
 As I come to the end of my second year as Clerk, I want to talk to you about the thing that makes the world go round: Money!

I am sure you will have all seen your Council Tax bills by now and noticed increases in the various areas. I hope you will also have noticed that there is no increase to the amount you pay to Cottingham Parish Council (actually there might be a tiny increase due to rounding). We have always prided ourselves on providing excellent value for money to the taxpayer and we currently charge, per household, less than a third of the national average charge of Town/Parish Councils (our charge has fallen over recent years).

This does not mean, however, that we are doing less. In fact, we are doing more! Our office is now open five days per week providing help & advice to the public and acting as a conduit to East Riding Council. We now run two large events per year (Cottingham Day and the Christmas Festival), have recently installed two defibrillators in the village, and will be undertaking a large upgrade to the CCTV system in the coming months. In the 2018/2019 financial year we have also provided over £27,500 to local groups and events, this being made up of; £8450 to the Cottingham Village Trust for the running costs of the Market Green public conveniences plus a general donation of £720 with money raised from the sale of dog waste bags, £10,000 for the annual Christmas Lights, £450 to St Mary's Church towards their WW1 centenary events, £774 to Cottingham Bowling Club for a new flagpole and flag as part of their centenary celebration, £1000 for Cottingham Tigers under 10s for new kit and equipment, £582 for Cottingham Rangers under 7s for clothing and equipment. £480 for Hull Folk Dance Club (based in Cottingham) towards costs of a centenary event at the Civic Hall, £1767 towards the costs of the Springboard Festival, £246 for Cottingham Cricket Club for new equipment, £3000 for the Friends of Hallgate Primary School towards the cost of new library, and £50 to the Derby & Joan club for song book printing.

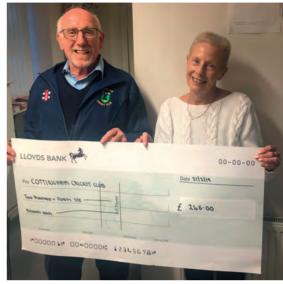

## Sustainable Urban Drainage Systems on new build estates

Sustainable Urban Drainage Systems (or SUDS) are systems put in place on new housing developments that ensure rainwater, that would normally be trapped in permeable open land prior to development, does not enter the traditional drainage systems too quickly and cause overflow and flooding.

Given the amount of new development in Cottingham over recent years, the Parish Council recommends that anyone living in a new build estate find out if such a system operates around their property and who is responsible for its maintenance.

The Cottingham Parish Council Full Parish & Finance meeting takes place on the third Thursday of the month (apart from in August and December) and start at **7pm**. The next meeting will be **Thursday 18**<sup>th</sup> **April 2019**.

Meetings of our Planning Committee cannot be fixed, so will be advertised as they arise, as they are dependent on the planning applications that come in from East Riding of Yorkshire Council. We are now aiming to have the meetings on the first Tuesday of the month but this is subject to change.

## A milestone for the Internet and warning signs for Windows 7

The World Wide Web is 30 years old. Well that's what it used to be called, and the exact date was last month, but we couldn't let it go by without a mention! Sir Tim Berners-Lee was the man who originally came up with the idea to help share information between his colleagues at the CERN physics laboratory in Switzerland. His boss at the time of reading his proposal called it 'vague but exciting'. One of the greatest understatements of all time perhaps? It is estimated now that around half the world's population uses the Internet, and of course that will keep growing as more countries come online.

How the world has changed because of the Internet. At the heart of it all, in simple terms, must be just ease of obtaining information. Anyone anywhere can look up anything with a few clicks! It has revolutionized the world of politics and commerce, education, books and music, news, banking & shopping. Information overload, mis-information - what some call 'fake news!' and social media, all have had an extraordinary effect on peoples' lives. *Sir Tim* said last month that global action was required to prevent what he called the web's "downward plunge to a dysfunctional future". That all sounds rather dramatic, as for most of us the Internet is such a brilliant resource we would struggle without.

convince Windows 7 users to upgrade to Windows 10. However, as computers running Windows 7 will probably be at least 5 to 7 years old by then, upgrading is not a realistic option in my opinion. Windows 10 works much better on a new computer, so the best way forward is to invest in a new one. Windows 7 will not stop working after that date, but there will be no more security updates issued, so like its predecessors Vista and XP, it will therefore not really be safe to use online.

Internet Explorer will also be officially retired at the same time as Windows 7. I have mentioned previously that Internet Explorer was becoming more troublesome and less secure, and to use another browser like *Chrome or Edge or Firefox*.

Or go to the 'hidden items' tray in the corner of your screen, click the up arrow to the left of the clock to display the box then double click on the Eset icon to open it, then click on Tools. If you have the very latest version of the program (v12.1.31.0) you should also see a new revamped screen that says in large letters 'welcome to the Eset secured browser'. This also now irons out **the previous glitch** showing a message in the address bar (from Google) that said the page may not be secure.

The Windows key on your keyboard – do you ever use it? It does have quite a few functions, when pressed it will bring up your Start Menu, or

when **held down** can be used in combination with other keys. Along with the letter R it will bring up a *Run* command which can be used to run programs. Use along with letter *E* and a Windows Explorer will open (what we used to call My Computer). When combined with the Tab key it will show all your open windows next to each other. You can click on any one to change over or use your arrow keys to navigate. If you get stuck, just press the ESC key (top left on most keyboards). To toggle between open windows even quicker, you can use (hold down) the *Alt* and press the *Tab* key.

If you haven't already upgraded to ESET Internet Security, now is the time to do it. 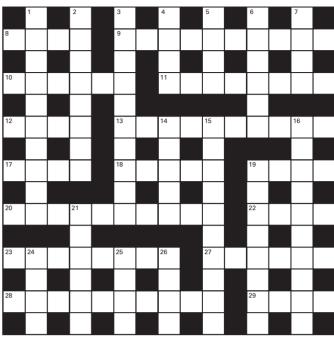

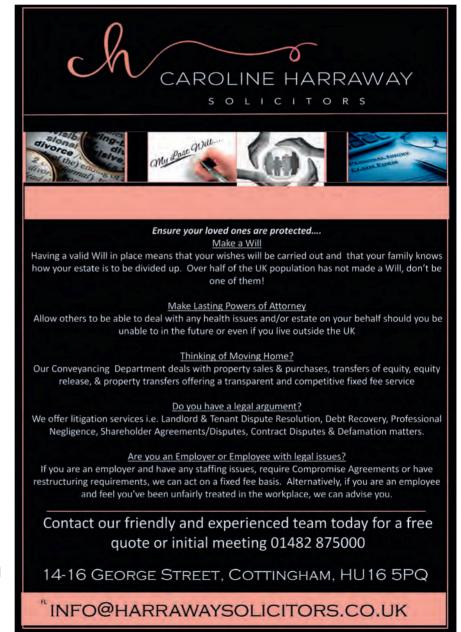

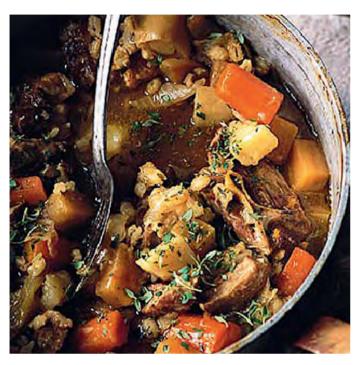

#### **Irish Stew**

This stew couldn't be simpler to make – all the ingredients simmer away to produce a dish that is really big on flavour and amazingly tender.

Preparation time: 10 minutesCooking time: 180 minutes

• Total time: 3 hours 10 minutes. Serves: 6

#### **Ingredients**

- 1 kg British stewing lamb, from the meat service counter
- 2 onions, cut into large chunks
- 2 leeks, washed, cut into large chunks
- 400g carrots, chopped into large chunks
- 1 small swede, about 600g, chopped into large chunks
- 600g potatoes, peeled and chopped
- 125 g pearl barley
- 1.75 litres hot lamb stock
- ½ x 15g pack fresh thyme

#### Method

In a large, heavy-based pan, arrange all the ingredients (except the stock and thyme) in layers and season generously. Pour in the hot lamb stock and bring to the boil. Skim off and discard any scum that comes to the surface.

Once boiling, reduce the heat to a gentle simmer and cook for 3 hours, stirring occasionally – making sure that the mixture doesn't catch on the base of the pan – until the vegetables are cooked and the chunks of lamb very tender. Serve sprinkled with chopped fresh thyme, and hunks of crusty white bread.

#### Herb & spice roast leg of lamb

Preparation time: 15 minutes, plus marinating and resting

Cooking time: 3½ hours

Total time: 3 hours 45 minutes, plus marinating and resting

Serves: 6, with leftovers

#### **Ingredients**

6 cloves garlic, roughly chopped

1 tbsp cumin seeds, lightly crushed

1 tbsp fennel seeds, lightly crushed

50g fresh flat-leaf parsley, thick stalks removed

10g fresh lemon thyme, thick stalks removed

10g fresh mint

100ml olive oil

3 tbsp white wine vinegar

4 tbsp light brown muscovado sugar

2kg whole leg of lamb, part-boned

450ml lamb or chicken stock

#### Method

1. Put the garlic, cumin and fennel seeds, parsley, thyme, mint, olive oil, vinegar and sugar in a food processor and blitz until the herbs are finely chopped. Make plenty of deep cuts into the lamb with a sharp knife and place in a non-metallic dish. Spread some of the marinade into the cavity of the lamb and spread the remainder all over the surface of the meat. Cover loosely and chill for at least 6 hours, preferably 24 hours. Remove from the fridge 30 minutes before cooking.

2. Preheat the oven to 220°C, gas mark 7. Transfer the lamb, with any of the herb marinade poured over, to a roasting tin and pour in the stock. Cover loosely with foil and roast for 30 minutes. Reduce the oven temperature to 180°C, gas mark 4, uncover the lamb (reserving the foil) and cook for a further 3 hours until the meat is very tender (see tip, below). Re-cover the lamb with the foil if it starts to over-brown during cooking.

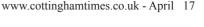

#### World Malbec Day on April 17th

ow then, it's World Malbec Day on April 17, apparently. Who knew? Well not me, for one, but then I have to say every day can be a Malbec day for me! It's regarded as one of "Big Six" red wine grapes, although it's perhaps way down the pecking order within that exalted bunch. Originating from the Bordeaux region of France, it was the grape responsible for the "black wine of Cahors" until a severe frost in the 1950s devastated

Cahors is now more usually made from a blend of grapes and that has become one of the chief uses for Malbec in France - as a grape used in the blending process to provide colour and tannin.

The story in South America is quite different, however. In Chile, but more particularly Argentina, it has found fame and glory. More Malbec grapes are grown in Argentina than anywhere and it has become one of that country's most celebrated exports.

Argentina produces some excellent single-varietal wines. It's Malbec is typically a medium to full-bodied red wine with relatively high tannin and alcohol levels - it's common to see Malbecs above 14 per cent abv.

The wines are generally a dark, inky red colour, while on the palate it possesses ripe flavours of plums, dark cherry and blackberry which together give it a decidedly "jammy" character.

It's definitely a red meat wine; not as heavy as a Cabernet but robust enough to match with the heartiest dishes. Consider giving Malbec a go with any of your favourite beef, game, lamb, chilli, stews, mushrooms, sausage, and barbecue sauces.

And yes, like in France, it will also be an important constituent of a red wine blend, often used to give that richness of colour, but look hard enough and you might even find rose, sparkling and dessert versions.

Try a Malbec and hopefully you'll agree with me that it's an easy to drink red wine, with or without food. Some people love to call Malbec a working man's Merlot, as the wine has many of the same characteristics that make Merlot easy to drink, with an added spice and acidity. I've included some examples in this month's "best buys".

\* Supermarket Aldi is set to increase its online range with more higher-priced wines on the back of strong growth.

According to Aldi demand online has grown since launching an e-commerce platform three years ago. "We're now more and more confident we can stretch the range online because of that maturity we've got and because we also have more data," said Aldi buyer Mike James.

The discount supermarket has also launched an English still wine for the first time, as the trend for crisp, crunchy, acidic wines gathers momentum, fuelled by last year's long hot summer.

It has added an exclusive signature white Bacchus-Pinot Blanc blend from Lyme Bay Winery into its Exquisite Collection, which became available for the first time from the middle of last month. The 48 per cent Bacchus, 26 per cent Pinot Blanc, nine per cent Solaris and 17 per cent other varietal blend comes of the back of a new partnership with the innovative Axminster-based winery, and made in collaboration with Lyme Bay's head winemaker Liam Idzikowski

Aldi buyer Mike James has said that last summer's scorching summer made it the year "to make a go of it" with English still wine, adding that it tapped into the growing demand for crisp, crunchy white wines and rosés, which had gained momentum over the summer.

"It was almost a manifestation that the trend was there already, customers were already moving on to that style of wine, so the great summer was all about that impetus. To crack on with that, we've thrown caution to the wind but even if it's a grey day (like today) for the rest of the summer, customer's palate are now tuned that style of wine," he said.

"Customers are having fewer preconceptions and less barriers to purchase, and thinking 'I'll give this a go, and if I like it, I'll buy it again'. Those seafood wines are really what people are after, so there are a lot on those types of styles.'

James said the team had therefore "bigged up" the range with that style, adding a number of Galician whites including an Albanta Albarino 2018 (rrp: £7.99) and some "exciting" whites from Portugal, including Animus Vinho Verde 2018 (rrp: £4.79) and a single variety Avesso from producer The Wine Foundry (rrp: £6.49) Picpoul de Pinet and Exquisite Collection Muscadet

"Hopefully what Aldi does well is bring the right wines to markets but not necessarily your goto Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc or Chardonnay, something a bit different," he explained.

The supermarket has also extended its range of rose – which James said was "massive last year", particularly those in the popular Cote de Provence style, and a number of Portuguese reds.

#### Who am I?

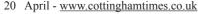

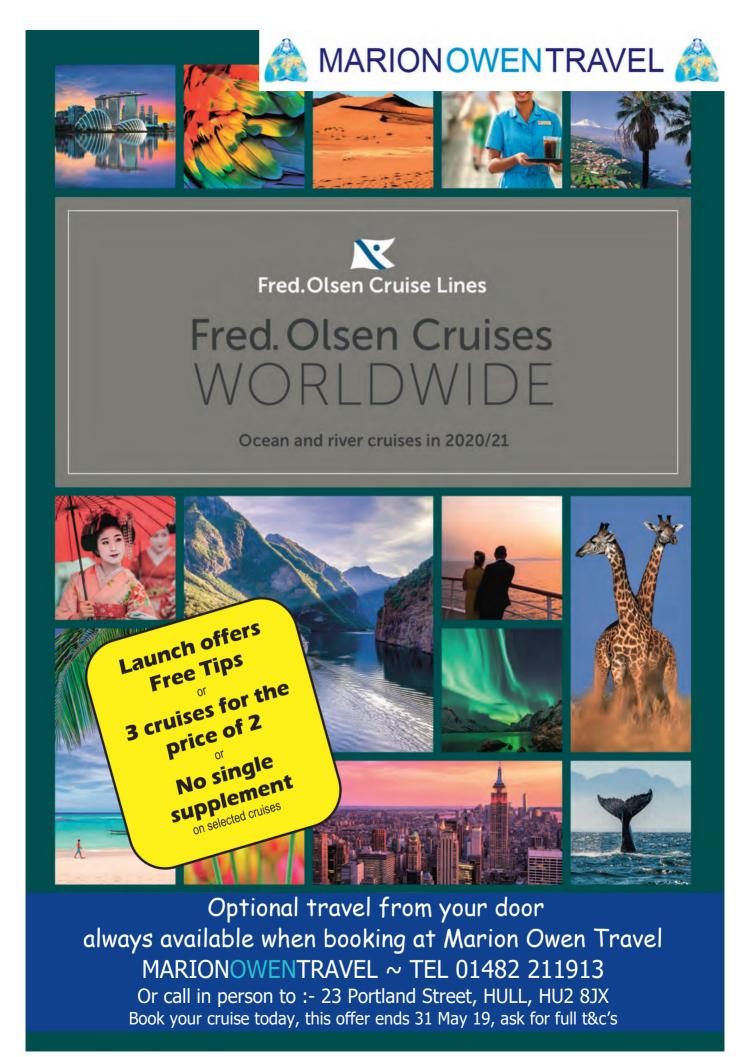

# **National Stop Snoring Week**

daytime functioning, mental health problems, cognitive issues and negative social behaviour can be symptoms of being subjected to loud noise over an extended period of time. Sleep deprivation can also have a negative impact on body systems such as hormonal release, glucose regulation and cardiovascular function. Some bed partners who sleep with a snorer try to ignore the noise. Although they may manage to sleep through the night, the quality of sleep is much reduced and they will not feel as refreshed in the morning as they should. #### Create a Vegetable Patch

#### How best to grow potatoes in a planter

- 1. Quarter fill the potato planter with a good quality multi purpose compost.
- 2. Set 2 or 3 seed potatoes (do not use more than this as you will only end up with very small potatoes), chits or eyes up, into the compost and cover with another 15 to 20cm layer of compost.
- 3. Water well, two to three times a week, to ensure the compost never dries out. Once shoots break through, roughly every seven to 10 days, cover over with more compost, until the bag is full. Potatoes like a lot of water. You don't want the compost soaking wet but it should be moist all through. Once the bag is filled, feed weekly with a liquid tomato fertiliser instead of watering that day.
- 4. Once the plants flower, this is the indicator that the tubers are forming and may be ready. Scrape some compost out and if the tubers look OK, empty the bag and harvest your crop. Not all varieties flower so check bags according to the type of potato grown.

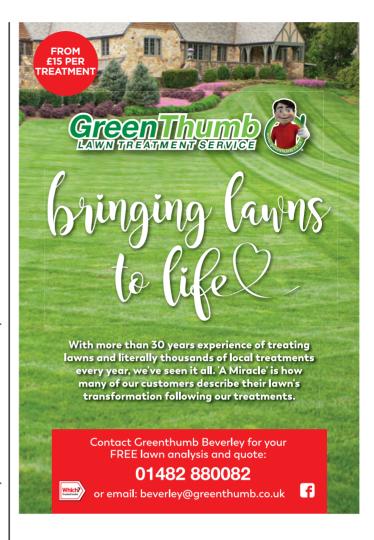

# Shower Screen cleaning a problem?

#### **Farndale**

The beautiful valley of Farndale lies at the heart of the North York Moors. Each spring, its glorious daffodils put on one of nature's most spectacular shows - a dazzling display of colour that carpets the meadows and river banks along a seven-mile stretch of the River Dove. It's often said that medieval monks from nearby Rievaulx Abbey planted the first daffodil bulbs here. But the petite wild daffodil (Narcissus pseudonarcissus) is one of our native plants and is protected within the Farndale Local Nature Reserve, established in 1955 to safeguard the valley's famous flowers.

#### Working with nature

Wild daffodils love riverbanks, grassland and woodland – especially woodland with partial shade at the edges and no encroaching vegetation. Luckily, that describes Farndale to a T, with the River Dove snaking through the meadows of a lightly wooded agricultural dale. The daffodils spread either by their seed falling on the ground or by their bulbs being carried downriver. Weather also has a part to play, as extremes of any kind – from drought to overly wet autumns or cold springs - affect bulb growth and flowering.

There's also one more factor that makes Farndale fab for daffs, and that's the work of local landowners and the National Park Authority, who look after the local habitat together. Maintaining the footpaths keeps visitors on the straight and narrow, avoiding damage to the leaves or roots while growing; while cutting back scrub and branches lets in the light that the daffodils need to thrive.

# Making Tax Digital for VAT - Ten Myths Debunked

#### by Nick Robinson of Yorkshire Accountancy

Making Tax Digital (MTD) is a HMRC initiative designed to make sure the UK tax system is effective, efficient and easier for taxpayers. MTD begins on the 1st April 2019 with MTD for VAT. From that date VAT registered businesses will have to keep digital records and submit VAT returns using compatible software.

With so much information available about MTD for VAT it can become confusing very quickly. To help you prepare for the biggest shake up in VAT and accounting in decades, the team at Yorkshire Accountancy have put together a list of common misconceptions and debunked them. Compliance doesn't have to be complicated as long as your records are up to date, stored appropriately and transferred to HMRC via an approved method, you're there!

# Older bookkeeping software needs to be upgraded in favour of cloud accounting bookkeeping software.

No. Any software can be used, it must however, store individual transactions digitally. It must also have the capability to transfer the VAT return data in digital form to MTD enable bridging software.

# I must purchase a new software package in the place of using Bridging Software after the 12 month soft landing period.

No. Bridging software can be used indefinitely, not just for the soft landing period.

#### Spreadsheets must not be used for digital record keeping

Yes you can use spreadsheets for digital record keeping. As was the case for bridging software, spreadsheets can be used beyond the soft landing period specified by HMRC.

#### A 'digital link' does not include a CSV file transfer

A CSV file is recognised as a digital link between where the records are stored and the MTD submission software.

#### Copying and Pasting Data is sufficient to create a digital link

Under the regulations this is not considered to be a digital link and is, therefore, not compliant.

#### I can go back to the old VAT 100 submissions if I don't like MTD for VAT $\,$

No. MTD for VAT is here to stay and compliance for VAT registered businesses is mandatory.

#### Data cannot be adjusted once exported from the bookkeeping software

Adjustments are necessary as part of the more complex VAT arrangements. HMRC recognise this and state that all adjustments must be documented within the spreadsheet.

#### I must submit all of the transactions that make up the VAT return

HMRC only wants the nine boxes of numerical data that make up the VAT

#### I can just type in the nine boxes of data

No. All VAT records must be kept digitally. These records will be used to populate the nine boxes of information required by HMRC automatically.

#### My accounting software, must interact directly with HMRC for MTD

Some accounting software can interact directly with HMRC, however, this isn't necessary. Bridging software can be used in the place of a direct link.

#### 1. Behaviour Assessment and Behaviour modification.

This is a huge subject in all ways. Problem behavior modification is all about understanding why your horse is feeling the way he does and why he is behaving the way he is. **Only then can moves be put in place to start to make the changes needed.** 

All behaviours have a function to the horse and all behaviours are controlled by released hormones inside those exposed emotions. They are always triggered by the environment (facing somewhere scary, leaving somewhere scary, something coming into its immediate environment (the introduction of a worrying stimuli- certain equipment like the saddle or girth, a vet, a farrier, a worming tube, clippers, a bus or a tractor. These are just some examples which may trigger a bad reaction and produce unwanted behavior. All of which will be remembered from bad past associations and frightening experiences).

I often see that so many people inherit problems at the point of sale which then impacts on their future relationship.

Understanding that behaviours are only repeated if something is reinforcing them. Finding out what the horse gains from preforming that "particular set of behaviours" is the key to being able to start to solve it. They are usually (but not always) avoidance or escape driven and can range from freezing to pure flight. Sadly, sometimes rage comes to the fore and fear aggression may follow. Both are violent in nature and is a terrible way for any horse to feel, never mind to then act on those feelings. Resource guarding can be a very real and dangerous issue too.

By training your horse on the emotional level, we will work hard to change how he feels about life- so that his fear, defense, frustration or rage are replaced with calm and relaxed emotions

and all using positive reinforcement training.

Past associations, pain, fear of remembered pain, accidents, fear of punishment, acts of ignorance or a history of harsh or unfair training, confusion, frustration, anger at life and what life means or has meant to him in the past- all these things have a price to pay as far as your horse is concerned.... and then it is also you who pays the price because you are inside that equation. This is the "BIG" subject and is the most common reason for owners to seek out professional help.

# The Frogman cometh...

Visitors to the Artmarket Gallery might be slightly startled to encounter a giant tree frog climbing up the side of the building. The colourful creature is an invitation to come on inside and enjoy the work of one of the gallery's latest artist – internationally renowned 'Frogman', Tim Cotterill, the best-selling bronze artist in the world.



Tim's work — exquisitely sculpted bronzes depicting animals and birds, the most popular of which are his brilliantly jewel-coloured frogs — inspire passion from collectors around the world.

At an introductory event when Tim first joined the Artmarket stable earlier this year, one client invested £10,000 on a large bronze frog — for her garden!

Artmarket Gallery director Robert Power says: "Tim and his work are in huge demand worldwide, so it's taken nearly three years of negotiations to welcome him to our family of artists — but it's been worth every minute. His glorious, tactile bronzes are a stunning addition to the gallery."

The artist himself has a personality as vibrant and flamboyant as any of his creations, and an energy that belies his 68 years — Google his appearance on



Emmy Award-winning show Jay Leno's Garage, where he showed off another of his passions, the extraordinarily futuristic Rocket II Trike which he designed and hand-built, and you'll see what we mean!

He started his career in the UK with six years of training as an electrical engineering, before deciding it wasn't for him. "But nothing in life is ever wasted," he says now. "I'm still using some of the skills I learned then."

It's hard to imagine how when you look at his sculptures. They're as far removed from the brass tacks of engineering — and from construction, landscaping and stonemasonry, his subsequent, and typically varied, careers — as it's possible to be.

But the resourceful artist, who's never had any formal art training, has woven his many skills together to create a unique technique that results in pieces which, while heavy in the hand, are visually ethereal.

He uses the classic 'lost wax' technique to model his bronzes — a silicon mould is filled with wax to create a maquette which is then coated in a ceramic material to produce a second, heavy-duty, mould capable of holding the molten bronze.

But that first silicon mould is made from his original 'master' which is built from metal and – believe it or not – car body filler

"I learned how to acetylene gas weld at the age of 20," he says. "Believe me, I can make a gas torch talk!

"I start out by making a metal armature,

welding rods together and using ball bearings to make the frog's little toes.

"Then I add car body filler. We call it Bondo over here in the States; in the UK, it's known as P38. It's very strong — I can work on it with steel files, taking it off, putting it on, until I get the result I want.

"I then add two or three coats of primer, and rub that down until I have a perfect finish — the silicon mould will pick up even the tiniest imperfection, so it has to be absolutely right.

"Most bronzes are big, chunky lumps of metal: maybe a torso, or a head. Mine are airy — I even sculpt orchids in bronze — because of the materials I use.

"They're genuine hot-cast bronze, not cold-cast, which is essentially resin with bronze powder. So you're buying a piece of real quality, something that can be handed down through generations.

"And they're very addictive. My frogs have big eyes, and feminine curves – they're actually rather sexy, if you can say that about a frog!"

Tim lives and works happily alone in his compound – a 'funky barn cabin' is how he describes it – in LA's artistic enclave, bohemian Venice Beach.

# **Barratt Homes honours Hull's history with Poppy Fields site launch**

# Tour de Yorkshire wheels its way through our area on Thursday 2nd May

kidby and Little Weighton will feature again this year in The Tour de Yorkshire, welcoming the first stage of the fifth edition of The Men's race on Thursday 2nd May "The Heritage Stage"

The international cycle race considered one of the most dramatic and best supported events has now been upgraded to attain the highest category possible for a multi-day race outside of the UCI World Tour.

The East Riding of Yorkshire Council, who hosted the first race from Bridlington in 2015 and subsequently each year in either the seaside town or Beverley continues to sponsor the spectacular and prestigious event, last year boosting the Yorkshire economy by £98m and attracting 2.6 million spectators in the Towns and villages lining the County's Roads. Live TV covers the race and is watched in almost 200 countries, showcasing Yorkshire as a visitor and economic destination. The Council has recently reached a new agreement with Welcome to Yorkshire ensuring a start or finish up until 2022.

Thursday's race will start in Doncaster and finish in Selby with most of the cycling taking place in The East Riding. Arriving in Skidby at around the halfway stage this year via a slightly different route, the peloton after coming through Brough, North Ferriby and Swanland all for the first time will come through Eppleworth entering Skidby passing the Windmill, which will be a spectacular shot from the Helicopter camera, before coming through the village on its way to Little Weighton. From there it heads off to Walkington, Beverley and the Yorkshire Wolds and descending into Selby for the finish on the first day.

Welcome to Yorkshire Director, Stephen Parnaby, OBE., said "Its fantastic to get the race back again to our part of the County and a real privilege, the organisers were very impressed with the community spirit and effort that went into welcoming the riders last year, a huge factor in the success of the event, that is being rewarded with a return visit. I am sure this year will be even better and hope everyone has a great day and thank you in advance for your enthusiasm".

Sir Gary Verity, Chief Executive of Welcome to Yorkshire said "I'd like to thank everyone for their incredible support and getting this show on the road. I am extremely grateful, particularly for the enthusiasm shown throughout every corner of our wonderful County, "Christian Prudomme, Director of Cycling ASO and The Tour de France added "Yorkshire has everything a cycle race could wish for - the terrain, the stunning landscape, passionate crowds and towns decorated with bunting, bikes and banners".



Stage three of the race for both the women's and men's will start outside The Bridlington Spa "The Yorkshire Coast Stage" on Saturday 4th May finishing in Scarborough.

For all details, residents and organisers are advised to check final timings, but it is anticipated the race will arrive in Skidby at around 1.00 pm. No road closures will be in place, with only rolling road blocks lasting no more than one hour, however, parking restrictions will be in place along the route and access limited whilst the race passes through. Spectators are advised to arrive early to gain best advantage. Refreshments will be available, along with other venues, at Skidby Village Hall prior to and during the race. The official chosen charity for The Tour de Yorkshire this year is Help for Heroes.

# **Proposed Residential Development of Thwaite Hall, Cottingham rejected at Parish Council Planning Meeting**

planning application for the Development of Thwaite Hall, Cottingham was rejected at a Cottingham Parish Council Planning Meeting held on the 5th March.

The proposal relates to the provision of 95 new homes involving the conversion of the existing buildings into 61 new houses and flats, and erection of new buildings to provide 9 flats and 25 town houses following demolition of ancillary buildings.

Use is to be made of the existing accesses to Thwaite Street and New Village Road with an altered internal road infrastructure and car parking areas and new landscaping adjoining the buildings.

At a well attended meeting, members of the public and councillors discussed the merits and faults of the proposed development. The proposed development was rejected by a vote of three for, and six against the development.

# MV Syntan's 70th Birthday Celebration on the weekend of 13th and 14th April

n Saturday the 13th and Sunday the 14th of April, there will be a celebration of Syntan's 70th birthday, from 10.0 am to 4.00 pm each day. The event will be opened by the Mayor, and takes place on Beverley Beck along with other vessels, including sail barges.

The Beverley Barge Preservation Society has three vessels, Syntan. Sun, and Mermaid. Syntan was built in 1949 by J R Hepworth at Paull, on the Humber estuary. She was the last barge to be built for Richard Hodgson who were Tanners in Beverley, and had a fleet of sixteen barges.

As a working barge she carried hides, nuts, and chemicals for the tanning industry as well as general cargo. Now fully restored to a very high standard, Syntan is a floating museum,

community resource, and occasionally winds her way down the river Hull into the estuary.

Entertainment and amenities over the two days include

music and dancers, a bar, charity and craft stalls, refreshments aboard the society's MV Sun, boat trips down the beck on MV Mermaid, raffle etc. A number of the vessels, including Syntan, will be open to the public each day. 'Beverley beck is definitely the place to be, on the weekend of the 13th - 14th of April.'

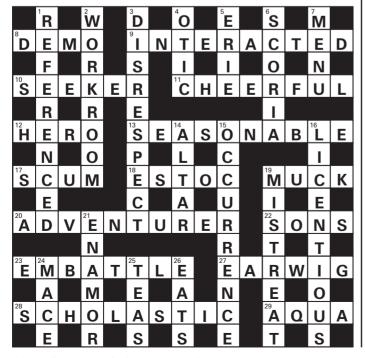
