

Still following tales from my anniversary cruise Malta is a country rich in history invaded numerous times over the years is home to a very friendly race.

The natural harbour of the Capital Valetta is huge and edged with fortifications, grand buildings perched high on top of the huge walls, whilst pink and white bougainvillea spill down the walls adding a touch of colour. Old warehouses at Quay level have been converted in to shops and restaurants – ideal for a gentle stroll on the flat alongside our ships berth.

The hotel Phoenicia in Valetta is lovely and allows you to wander in and out of the city plus avoids staying in one of the more touristy areas along the coast. Of course this may not be your ideal if you are looking for a typical Mediterranean busy resort you are better heading for nearby Sliema or St Julian's.

Beaches are not in abundance on the Island, if this is the type of holiday you are comfortable with, head for the Radisson SAS out on Golden sands this gives you the opportunity to have a quiet holiday too!

The Island is easy to get around; buses run to most places and are very cheap – by the way Malta now uses the Euro! Car hire is an option but if you are just on a weeks holiday you could have 2 full days of sightseeing on the open top bus for just 15 Euros a day. You can hop on and off at the places of interest as much as you like. There are two routes one taking in the north & the other heads south of the island.

One of my memorable places is the city of Mosta once the capital and located inland. You may well wonder why inland? This way the people where safer from invading pirates. Mosta has a lovely church Santa Marija Assunta with the 4th largest unsupported dome in the world. During the 2nd world war a bomb came straight through the dome where everyone was sheltering and did not go off. If you visit today you will see a replica bomb on display inside. You will note that on many churches in Malta there are two clocks one tells the correct time whilst one does not, this is so that the devil does not know the correct time!

The historic walled Citadel of Medina otherwise known as the Silent City is perched high on a ridge and the city of Rabat which grew on its outer walls are well worth a stop. In fact you would have no problem spending a couple of hours here enjoying the gardens, the palace now housing the Natural history museum, catacombs, Cathedral and exhibitions on history back to 60 AD.

Everywhere you look in Malta there are remains of conflicts from the past, old military hangers have been turned into craft outlets near Medina and there is also a small aircraft museum. Whilst barracks on the coast near Sliema are now been used as schools etc.

If shopping is your enjoyment you will find a lot of familiar stores eg Boots, Monsoon, M&S along with a good selection of tourist shops for you to browse or spend your money.

All in all a week here could make an interesting holiday and you can fly directly from Humberside this November or you may just want a day visit on a cruise like myself for further details tel 212525.



Report from the Local Police

PCSOs Michael Dale and Lyndsay Sewell attended the meeting to inform Councillors of any recent situations in Cottingham. No statistics were available as the LPT are looking into new methods of presenting the relevant information.

Sense and Dove House charity shops were having problems with someone going through their waste bins and outbuildings. The police had mounted a camera in the area and were working with the staff to help improve their own security to alleviate this problem.

PCSO Dale reported that lead thefts were of some concern lately in Cottingham; he stressed that this was a nationwide problem as a result of the high price of precious metals.

There had also been some criminal damage to the children's play area in KGV but the culprit had been identified. Overall anti-social behaviour does not seem to be a problem at present and alcohol related offences are down.

What to do when HM Revenue & Customs make enquiries into your Tax Return or Tax Credit

richael Dunn of Accounting Solution (Hull) Ltd provides some helpful guidance on what to do if your tax return is selected for enquiry by HM Revenue & Customs.

Introduction

What if one day you receive a brown envelope in the post and inside is a letter from HM Revenue & Customs telling you that they are making some enquiries into your tax return or tax credit claim?

How will you feel? Worried, confused, irritated or perhaps, even angry? But what should you do?

What do the Revenue mean by their letter? Do they think that you have actually done something wrong? If they don't, why are they asking questions?

If you are someone who has deliberately set out to defraud the Revenue then this page is not for you: you will need a good lawyer. But for others we hope that it takes some of the mystery and worry out of the enquiry process.

The opening letter

In the opening letter, the Revenue should only be seeking documents and information on which they can judge the accuracy of your return or claim - nothing more.

When you get the letter check in their leaflet whether the Revenue is within the time limit for making an enquiry in the first place.

Is what they are asking for reasonable? If you think it isn't, ask why it has been requested.

Are you able to supply the documents and information within the time limits given? Again, if you think that you have not been given enough time, contact the Revenue to ask for a longer period telling them why it is needed.

At each stage of the enquiry you will be asked informally for any information which the Revenue are seeking - under normal circumstances they are obliged to do this before using any for-

If you are asked questions or asked to give explanations (or the Revenue have expressed a specific concern), at this stage, you should give them full detail. There may be a simple answer which could enable the enquiry to be closed.

They would have to reject these explanations, with reasons, before they can justify asking about something they had not asked about previously.

If you feel uncomfortable with replying in a straightforward way, then seek professional help from us! Remember that you have the right to apply for the enquiry to be closed at any time.

Supplying documentation and information

If you do not supply the information and/or documentation within the time limit, the Revenue may issue a formal notice for their production. This formal notice will provide a fresh time limit and also warn that you may be charged a penalty if you do not supply what has been requested and within the time allowed.

However, what the Revenue asks for must be relevant for checking that return and you must actually have or be able to obtain any documents requested (they must be in your power or possession). If you feel that the above is not the case or consider that you have not been given sufficient time to supply the information and/or documentation, you should contact the enquiry officer as soon as possible.

Business Premises

If you have business premises, you can suggest that any records are reviewed there, or sometimes the enquiry officer may suggest this. However, if you prefer, you can ask that records are examined at the Revenue office or at the premises of a professional adviser, if you have one.

If you are unable to reach agreement with the enquiry officer in a tax enquiry, you can appeal against the notice to the Appeal Commissioners.





Ingredient of the Month

Peaches

August is Peach Month, and is the perfect time to celebrate and enjoy the benefits and taste of these full-of-goodness fruit whilst they are at the peak of perfection.



Peaches (Prunus persica) are native to China where they have been cultivated for centuries. Not only have they been mentioned in Chinese writings dating back to the 10th Century BC, they have also been the subject of many Chinese folk tales, including having been consumed by the Immortals for their mystic powers of giving long life. The Persians are believed to have introduced the peach to Europe from China and Spanish explorers took them to the Americas in the 16th century.

Nutritionally, not only does a medium sized peach provide one of your recommended 5-a-day, but medical studies have shown that their content of the antioxidants Lutein and Zeaxanthin helps guard against blindness caused by Age-related Macular Degeneration (AMD) which is now the biggest cause of irreversible blindness or partial loss of sight in the western world, affecting millions of people over the age of 50.

Chicken with Peaches

Serves 4
Ingredients
50g/2oz Butter
4 Boneless Chicken Breasts, skinned
1 Large Onion, thinly sliced
100g/4oz Greens or Spinach, washed and finely shredded
240ml/8fl.oz. Fresh Chicken Stock
Salt and Black Pepper
2 peaches, peeled, stoned and cut into 12 wedges

Instructions

- 1. Heat half the butter in a frying pan until hot then add the chicken and cook for 5 minutes on each side until browned. Remove with a slotted spoon and set aside.
- 2. Reheat the butter then add the onion and sauté for about 5 minutes until softened.
- Stir in the chicken stock, bring to simmering point then return the chicken to the pan, reduce the heat to medium, cover and cook for 10-15 minutes.
- 4. Add the greens, season with salt and pepper, mix well then cover and cook for a further 5 minutes.
- 5. Meanwhile, heat the remaining butter into a frying pan and once melted add the peach slices to the pan. Sauté for a few minutes, turning once until they are heated through and just softened.

To serve - transfer the chicken to a serving platter, arrange the peaches around the meat and pour the sauce over the top. Serve immediately.

Little Pots of Chocolate

Serve 4
Ingredients:
450g/1lb Plain Chocolate
Grated zest of 1 orange
Juice of 3 oranges
50g/2oz Butter
2 tbsp Grand Marnier or Cognac
4 Egg Yolks
2 Egg Whites
Extra Grand Marnier or Cognac to serve

1 Orange to serve

Instructions

- 1. Break the chocolate into the top of a double boiler. Add the orange zest and juice to the chocolate, together with butter. Heat the mixture over simmering water, stirring occasionally, until the chocolate has melted. Remove from heat and stir in 2 tbsp Grand Marnier or Cognac. (Chocolate can be melted in the Microwave).
- 2. Combine the egg yolks in a large mixing bowl and beat together thoroughly. Strain the chocolate mixture on to the egg yolks, beating constantly with a hand-held electric whisk, if possible. Allow the mixture to cool.
- 3. In a clean bowl and using a clean whisk, beat the egg whites until stiff but not dry. Using a spatula, gently but thoroughly fold the whisked whites into the chocolate mixture.
- 4. Pour the mixture into 4 individual 150ml/5 fl.oz. Glass or china dishes, cover and chill in the refrigerator for about 2 hours until set.
- 5. To serve cut 2 thin slices from the centre of the whole orange and cut each slice into quarters. Arrange 2 quarters, with the points facing, on top of each dish. Pour 1 teasp of Grand Marnier or cognac over the top of each dish and gently rotate each dish so that the entire surface is coated. Serve immediately.

There are three levels of Karoo Broadband currently: Lite, Mid & Pro with prices from £8.49 per month. They are all dependent on the amount of information you download or send over the Internet (measured in Gigabytes/GB). Each page you view, and email or photo you send or receive all count. To make sure you are paying the right amount for your usage, there is a useful GB calculator available to anyone already signed up to Karoo. Just go to the Karoo homepage and click on My Account, and then sign in with your username (not email) and password, and then you will see a link to it.

Karoo has been contacting customers and advertising in the local press that it is upgrading the local exchanges to the next level of Broadband service, called ADSL2+. This will be good news for most users as the upgrade is rolled out across the region, meaning faster speeds on the Internet; and the best news is that the increase is free. The only proviso is that your own equipment is capable of supporting the change. If you have a recently supplied or purchased router, you should be ok. But those with modems (normally called Speedtouch) will still connect as normal, but will not see any marked increase in speed. You can of course replace your modem with a router, but check that your computer has an Ethernet port, otherwise known as a Lan port, or network card. To check whether your hardware supports the change go to: www.karoo.co.uk/broadband/hardware_compatibility.asp

Spammers (senders of junk email) have sunk to new depths in their efforts to get people to open and read their particular brand of rubbish. Subject lines like 'World War III? Has US Army really invaded Iran?' and '20000 US Soldiers in Iran' Anti-virus company Sophos report on how a malware gang is exploiting Middle East tension in an attempt to infect the computers of innocent users. Another company recently reported a staggering statistic that in the months April – June this year, that 97.5% of business email was found to be iunk. All the usual pharmaceutical stuff and expensive brand watches are there, plus the latest ones purport to be from UPS parcel deliveries, Customs, and reports of celebrity disasters, flight delays and bomb threats.

A more light hearted survey in our main trade magazine recently asked readers: 'if you could have anyone's job, whose would it be?' Unsurprisingly Bill Gates came out top at 64% but the boss of Google only polled 5%!

One preconception about software that is worth mentioning again concerns Microsoft Office i.e. Word, Excel etc. These programs do not come included with any version of Windows. So if you are thinking about a new computer and you already have Word or Excel etc installed on your existing one, (It may have come pre-installed originally), but unless you have the original CD with the official license number, you will have to purchase it again. The only version of Office available to buy now is Office 2007; all previous versions were discontinued last year. When you see that the top version, Microsoft Office 2007 Professional costs nearly £400 you can understand why it doesn't come included! The best value one is Office 2007 Home & Student, which includes Word, Excel & PowerPoint and can be installed on up to three machines in the same household, and sells for around £99

There have been a few technical problems with the new version 8 of AVG anti-virus since it was launched earlier this year. This has been mainly with the built in Firewall in the Internet Security Suite particularly with Windows Vista. We would recommend trying the AVG Anti-virus and Spyware package (what used to be known previously as AVG Professional) as Windows has a built in Firewall anyway, and as many people use a router now, they normally have their own Firewall software anyway. You should email any problems you are experiencing to AVG so that a fix may be provided. Please note that no technical support is provided for the free version.

As a very good alternative, we are now a reseller for ESET anti-virus products, and they offer a free 30day trial at: (do make sure you completely uninstall other product before installing) www.eset.com/download/free trial download int.php

Now a few tips on making the most of Internet browsing. If you know the address of the site you want to view type it straight into the address bar, not into a search box. i.e. if you want to go to the news on the BBC you type into the address bar: www.bbc.co.uk/news. If you wanted to do a search for a site you would type it into a search box, like Google or Yahoo or Ask for instance. Try and be as specific as possible. So if you wanted to find a company that does air conditioning in this area you would type: air conditioning + Cottingham to link the two together. Also to save opening lots of windows in Internet Explorer, or Firefox, or Opera (the names of the main browsers available), open a new tab instead. You can click on File, and new Tab, and then you can display lots of pages at once on different tabs and just flick between them.



The Flower Festival at St. Mary's Church, Cottingham

ow!", "How beautiful!" "Gorgeous!" "What colours!" "What variety!, "A feast for the eyes!", "I've looked in corners I hadn't looked before", "I've learnt so much", and "I've never seen one of those in a vase before."

These are just a few comments I overheard one warm Thursday evening but where was I?

I was at St. Mary's Church, Cottingham, on July 3rd preview night for the East Riding's Flower Club's festival which ran until July 6th.

I love flowers and with a thoughtful husband and kind friends there's usually one vase full in the house and on special occasions there might be two. Sometimes they are "plonked" in a vase and left to settle, other times with a mixed bunch, I might even try to 'arrange' the flowers - you know big ones at the back and small ones in the front. I've been to a couple of flower festivals over the years, but I wasn't prepared for what we saw that night - absolute perfection.

The festival was entitled "Cottingham Characters" and included Nicholas de Luda, the first Rector of Cottingham; Winifred Holtby, a writer and pacifist; Ron Overfield, local shopkeeper; Philip Larkin, poet and librarian to the University of Hull; Brian Rix, actor and president of the Royal Mencap Society and lots more really interesting people beautifully depicted in flowers. Every nook and cranny was filled, every corner used, all the pew-ends decorated with wonderful arrangements.

There were colours and varieties aplenty: roses, gerberas, stocks, lilies, chrysanthemums, carnations and alliums in colours looking much better than any paint chart: whites and creams; pinks and reds; yellows and oranges; blues and lilacs and even black. Hosta leaves and other leaves of every imaginable shade of green served to complement all the wonderful colours. It was easy to think of Jesus's words - "Consider the lilies of the field......"

There was a welcome arch, a lectern arrangement, a fantastic font, a decorated cartwheel and window ledges full of flowers. The pulpit was festooned, the choir stalls (my favourite) depicted an embroidery and quilting exhibition in flowers, and all available tables and pedestals were utilised. The floor was put to good use too, but everyone seemed to be aware of watching their feet in fact I soon learnt that if I moved too quickly on to something that caught my eye then I could have missed another display. There seemed to be just the right amount of flowers to suit the church admirably - St Mary's has never looked more beautiful - the flowers enhanced the beauty of the church and the church was just the right place to display the flowers.






Here is Paul's sixth walk in his monthly column.

This month his destination is North Cave.

Maps:- EXPLORER 291 & 293

Start at GR. 897327 Car park opposite Church. Distance 6.5 Miles. This walk can also be started by parking on the wide grass verges at GR. 875338 on the road leading to Snake Hall.



n leaving the car park, cross the main road and walk down passing the church on the right, cross a bridge and pass through white gates leading to Hotham Hall. Follow the surfaced track and pass the hall to the right and then turn left to pass green houses on your right.

After passing the green houses, turn right and walk by Home Farm on the left. On reaching the road, cross over and enter a field through a kissing gate. (This field has recently been planted with conifers and holly) Leave the field by a stile and walk down a short narrow path to meet the main road in Hotham. On reaching the road continue ahead and, when meeting the junction near the war memorial, turn left. Carry straight on at two cross roads eventually passing Snake Hall South on the left. On reaching North Carr Farm, turn left and follow a wide track with the drain and hedge on your left.

This track eventually swings to the right to arrive at South Carr Farm. On approaching the farm, turn left down a cinder track. This track eventually becomes surfaced at a junction of paths (The sign indicates North Cave 7 miles but in fact you are 2 miles from North Cave). At this junction of paths, turn left and follow the track to Common Farm. Bear left through the farm and locate and cross a stile. Walk diagonally to the right to a gate and pass through this gate onto a wide grassy track.

Continue along this track passing Dryham (ignore the paths to the right) and continue ahead passing the North Cave Wet Lands Reserve on the left. This is the site of the old gravel quarries and is now being converted into a wild life reserve.

On reaching the main road walk ahead and when the road swings right continue ahead on a minor road. After 300 metres locate a path to the right and follow this path. At the junction of paths bear left and cross a footbridge. On reaching the road turn left and follow the road back to the car park.



In the Garden





Fruit and vegetable garden

Continue to pick summer fruit. Freeze surplus and make jams and jel-

Start picking apples and blackberries for use in pies and desserts.

Support heavily laden branches on plums to prevent breakage.

Lift and pot up rooted strawberry runners.

Prepare new strawberry beds for next year if not yet done.

Cut out fruited canes of summer raspberries and tie in new canes to fruit next year. Select strong, healthy canes and cut out weak, forked or misplaced ones (such as those growing out into the paths).

Tie in new growth on blackberries and hybrid berries.

Complete summer pruning of restricted fruit trees such as cordon and espalier apples and pears.

Prune out dead and fruited wood after cropping of fan-trained plums and cherries, and tie in replacement shoots

Continue to sow spring cabbage, turnips, Oriental vegetables and overwintering onions, in the south of England.

Finish harvesting second early potatoes, especially if it turns wet, as slugs will become active.

Harvest sweetcorn as it ripens. Push a fingernail into the kernel when the tassels at the end of the cob start to shrivel and brown. If the liquid is milky it indicates they are ready.

Lift onions, shallots and garlic when ready. Plants should be harvested when the necks start to turn brown and papery, and bend over naturally. Avoid actively bending the necks, as this can result in disease. Once harvested, let the tops dry until they rustle like brown paper, and then remove

Regularly pick fast-maturing vegetables such as French beans, runner beans, courgettes, cucumbers and tomatoes, to prevent stringiness or toughness, and to encourage further cropping. Excess pickings can be frozen.

Continue earthing up celery, putting a layer of paper between the stems

Marrows should be raised off the ground slightly, to prevent them rotting from contact with the soil. Some older leaves can be removed, if necessary, to maximise sun upon the fruit.

Take care when thinning out any late-sown carrot seedlings to prevent the scent released attracting carrot fly females. To protect them from carrot fly use fleece or environmesh coverings.

Irregular watering can lead to problems with blossom end rot in toma-

toes, splitting of root vegetables and flower abortion in peas and beans. Help prevent this by watering well during dry spells. We do not advise using grey household water on edible crops, but stored rainwater from a water butt is ideal.

Flower garden

Don't neglect hanging baskets - deadheading, watering and feeding will help them last through until autumn.

Deadhead plants such as Dahlia, rose and Penstemon and bedding to prolong the display colour well into early autumn.

Cutting back the foliage and stems of herbaceous plants that have already died back (e.g. Dicentra) is starting to be a priority.

Hardy geraniums can be cut back a little to remove tired leaves and encourage a new flush of growth.

Prune climbing and rambling roses that do not repeat flower or produce attractive hips, once the flowers have finished.

Pinks and carnations can be propagated by layering.

Propagate irises by dividing the rhizomes if not done last month.

Propagate perennials by dividing once they have finished flowering, but only in areas with some rain and duller weather, to avoid drying out problems.

Take cuttings of tender perennials such as Pelargonium and Osteospermum, as soon as possible. A greenhouse, cool conservatory or a light windowsill are ideal to bring them on until they are established.

Rock garden plants, such as Helianthemum, Aubrieta and Dianthus can be propagated from cuttings at this time of year.

Collect and store seed of hardy annuals and perennials for sowing later in the autumn. Good plants to try include Calendula, Nigella, Cerinthe, Papaver, Aquilegia and hardy Geranium. Allow some plants to self-seed to give an element of surprise to the garden.

Towards the end of August sow hardy annuals directly into borders. They will overwinter and flower next summer.

Buy or order spring-flowering bulbs.



The History of Hallgate Schools - continued

ottingham Hallgate Schools Infant and Junior departments closed their doors in July for the last time; the infant department has been enlarged and joined to a brand new school building with state-of-the-art equipment and the whole will open in September as Hallgate Primary School.

This fine new building replaces the original Cottingham School Board School erected in 1892 and opened in 1893, and the later County Council building opened in 1913, both of which have been showing signs of ageing and were deemed no longer fit for the purpose of providing the education demanded in today's high-tech world.

Yet - when the Board School with it's girls', boys' and infants' departments opened it was just as impressive to the scholars and parents then, as the new Primary School is to us now. References were made by the Heads of the new departments as to the 'newness of the buildings' and the strange surroundings caused much distraction and the lessons suffered thereby - as was the case in 1913 when Mr. Moorby fought his way among tins of paint, lengths of wood, noisy workmen, official visitors and eventually achieved semblance of order in what was to be the new boys only school.

Plain Exteriors and Gloomy Interiors

Readers who follow my articles in the 'Cottingham Times' will remember these events as we trawl through the history of Hallgate school - the transition from the single big room plus one classroom of the National and Wesleyan schools with their plain exteriors and gloomy interiors, to the multi-roomed stylish new building, now much lighter, where the big room was to become the 'hall' for assembly indoor P.T. and extra teaching space if needed; of course the tall windows were still high up from ground level in order to keep the attention focused in the room and not on distractions outside! Now there were cloakrooms, efficient (hopefully) boilers and radiators, and flush toilets, outside of course which caused endless amusement to the pupils and annoyance to the Heads; there were double desks with seats instead of the long type of seating several children, playgrounds for boys, girls and infants.

We have seen how the impact of the new buildings facilitated fresh approaches to teaching - there was now room to work as different standards were accommodated in separate rooms instead of all being crowded together in one big room. Discipline was still tight and exam continued to be conducted - but now there was scope for outdoor games and, gradually, inter-school competitions.

The Time of Empire

Queen Victoria was still on the throne when the original building opened and continued to reign for another eight years. This was the time of Empire, when large areas were coloured red on the new big maps which were hung on the walls of most classrooms and geography lessons were built around the products and topography of the Empire.

New lessons were given on natural science and the land because of the predominance of boys from the farms and smallholdings in the area, while the girls still had the traditional needlework implicit in the 19th century to fit them for the future wives and mothers!

The school has lived through historic times. It has witnessed the Boar War and joined in the celebrations of the Relief of Mafeking and the end of the war in 1902, the same year that saw the coronation of Edward VII.

Victims of War

The euphoria that accompanied the start of the First World War in August 1914 quickly turned to anxiety and sadness as the lists of killed and injured service men were published and local families lost loved ones, many of them old scholars at Hallgate as the plaques on the entrance to the Memorial Gardens in Cottingham village centre testify. For the first time ordinary people were involved directly when Zeppelins raided Hull and some bombs fell in Cottingham causing panic.

Throughout those years the school continued to do its job, not only as a place of learning but as an essential part of the community - practically everyone had links with the school and so in a way there was a strong

common purpose in difficult times then, and which many families encountered in the 1920's and 30's.

Never Felt Threatened

The outbreak of the Second World War in September 1939 saw the school ready - taped windows, sandbags at the doors, air raid practices held as scholars crowded into the stuffy cloakrooms, and then the real thing as the siren on top of the Council Offices on Market Green wailed its warning - and through it all the teachers maintained an air of composure and when the 'all clear' sounded we carried on with our 'sums' or English and strangely, never felt threatened by bombs - it was too exciting; the real threat was if you misbehaved which could lead to a visit to the redoubtable Mr Brookes in the boys school!

The Dawning of a New Age

I have been in Hallgate Juniors several times recently - continuing the history of the school with the pupils, the putting on a display of photographs for visitors on Cottingham Day and again on the school open day. Cottingham Day was spoilt by the continuous rain which affected numbers going to the school, although a few hardy souls with wet hair and bags of chips braved the elements in the village centre; but a lot of exscholars turned up on Wednesday 9th July to see the displays plus plans of the old buildings drawn up by the architects at the time, and were able to go round the school while the pupils were at their lessons and then have a look round the new school.

There are eleven classrooms all with new furniture which varies in colour from room to room, plus plans for a nursery; it is envisaged that there will be some 300 children on role.

The question now is what happens to the redundant buildings that have witnessed so much history - so many children - so many teachers over the years. The H.O.S.P.A. group (Hallgate Old School Preservation Association) want some at least of the buildings to be kept and put to community use, eg. scouts and guides and similar activities, plus possible business interests or Council initiatives and there is strong support for this in the village. It would be sad to see the place boarded up and a target for vandals, which could happen if a decision on its future is left too long.

Hallgate schools are comparatively recent when compared to St. Mary's Church, but together these buildings represent Cottingham providing a gateway to the village, iconic, and offering stability in an ever changing world.

The old school falls silent now - its children gone - year six to the High School and the rest to the new Primary School. History moves on - but records and memories remain, and so we will continue the story of Cottingham Hallgate Schools.
