

Creative pupils at Skidby **CE Primary School unveil**

commemorative mosaic

reative pupils at Skidby CE Primary School have unveiled a commemorative mosaic featuring every child and celebrating the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

The joint project was led by retired teacher Erica Burt following a brief from headteacher Steve Honey who asked for a work which highlighted the church aspect of the school and featured elements from the surrounding area.

The finished mosaic includes self-portraits by all 66 pupils arranged in a cross shape, Skidby Windmill, St Michael's Church and the Humber Bridge, all surrounded by fields. It measures 2m tall by 1.8m wide and has been put up on the wall outside the school reception.

Mr Honey said: "Erica has done an excellent job with the mosaic, which looks wonderful and captures the essence of our school

"The children love the fact that all their self-portraits are featured through this mosaic they will be part of the school for many years to

Erica, who lives in Stamford, Lincolnshire, said: "It is always good to have artworks around the school to brighten the place up and let everyone know what the school stands for.

"I would like to thank the school for allowing me to be part of a wonderful shared creative experience."

The work came about after Erica, whose daughter, Hannah Booth, is chair of the school's parents and friends association, created multimedia montages depicting a series of six nursery rhymes with the

The mosaic was created using tiles donated by Topps Tiles, some of which were broken up for the mosaic, with the pupils drawing their portraits on others, which were then baked to fix the ink. The drawing of the bridge was done the same way.

Much of the work was carried out in the school hall so children could watch as the work came together.

The number of children in the school was just enough to create a cross and leave one tile spare to mention the year and the diamond iubilee.

Property News from Martin English of Homelink



Rental period confusion

ne of the most confusing aspects of letting out a property is calculating the final rent payment. What on the face of it seems a pretty straight forward matter is complicated by the fact that we are still adhering largely to a Roman system of measuring time e.g. the Roman calendar. This quaint system means that we have a series of months of varying lengths from 28 day to 31 days and then just to confuse things even more we even have one month that doesn't know whether it is 28 or 29 days

Given that most tenancies are monthly it is theoretically possible to start a tenancy on the 31st, the last day of the month for 5 months of the year. This can instigate a whole load of confusion given that should the tenant move out at the end of the 6 month tenancy, there is a good chance that the month in which the tenancy comes to an end will have less than the 31 days.

So what should you do in this situation?

Final rent payment - law & practice

Whilst the above scenario is not likely to be that common, this confusion is useful in that it helps to highlight the law. Legally most Assured Shorthold Tenancies relate to a calendar month. Therefore in the scenario set out above, legally the tenancy comes to an end on the last day of the month

At times this may leave your tenant feeling aggrieved that they have to pay an extra days rent. This situation is exacerbated if the tenancy comes to an end in February where they could loose out by two further days. Legally as already highlighted, the tenant has not lost out as the tenancy rent is per calendar month, you can argue that it is just unfortunate, however some landlords feel uncomfortable with this apparent inequity. Not wishing to be viewed as money grabbing property owning capitalists they sometimes adopt a different system to generate residual rent amounts. This namely involves calculating the final period in terms of days.

In adopting this system there is the added advantage of being consistent regardless of the tenancy dates. For instance, in the scenario outlined above where the tenancy commenced on the 31st but then ended on the 28th February. The final rent payment is calculated by measuring the length of the last rental period, which starts on the 31st and finishes on the 28th; a period of 28 days. It is then just a case of calculating the total rent payment for the year and then dividing this by 365 to give you a daily rental amount and then multiplying it by the final rental period i.e. 28 days to give the final rent due.

Interestingly, this method of calculation for the final month rental payment, is the method that should be used for returning any apportionment of rent to a tenant regardless of when it is for. It is common for Landlords and tenants to apportion a payment as a fraction of that particular month, however technically to be correct, in order to calculate the value of a single day, the yearly rent should be calculated and divided by 365 to establish a daily rental figure if this is ever required.

Now the more pedantic amongst you will point out what about the time of the day, should I include the day that the tenant moves in and moves out?

Time the tenancy starts

I have already made the point that legally a six month tenancy is a six month tenancy. This means that if the tenant moves in at 11am on the 11th of January, their tenancy finishes at 11am on the 11th of June. If the tenants are not out by then you can charge them an extra days rent. However, most landlords with an ounce of humanity would not charge their tenants a whole days rent if they were a couple of hours late, particularly when the property was going to be empty anyway. But to be clear, legally you could.





Ingredient of the Month - Cumin

umin has been in use since ancient times. Originally cultivated in Iran and Mediterranean region. The ancient Greeks kept cumin at the dining table in its own container (much as pepper is frequently kept today), and this practice continues in Morocco. Cumin was also used heavily in ancient Roman cuisine. During the Middle Ages, Cumin seeds are used as a spice for their distinctive flavour and aroma. It is globally popular and an essential flavouring in many cuisines: Bangladeshi, Nepalese, Indian, Pakistani, North African, Middle Eastern, Sri Lankan, Cuban, northern Mexican cuisines, central Asian Uzbek cuisine, western Chinese cuisines of Sichuan & Xinjiang and Indonesia. Cumin can be found in some Dutch cheeses, such as Leyden cheese, and in some traditional breads from France. It is commonly used in traditional Brazilian cuisine. Cumin can be an ingredient in chili powder (often Texan or Mexican-style), and is found in curry powder, and bahaarat.

Barbeque Food

Hot Lamb Beef Kebabs

Ingredients

Marinade

100g/4oz Onion, finely chopped

2 tbsp freshly chopped Parsley

120ml/4fl.oz. Olive Oil

1 teasp Salt

Black Pepper

1 Garlic Clove, crushed

1 teasp Ground Coriander

1/2 teasp Cumin Seeds

Other ingredients

450g/1lb Lean Beef or Lamb, cut into 2.5cm/1 inch cubes 225g/8oz Solid Beef Suet, cut into 12mm/ 1/2 inch cubes

Instructions

- 1. Place the marinade ingredients in a small dish, mix well then add the meat and suet mix to coat. Cover and allow to marinate for 2-6 hours.
- 2. Thread the beef and suet alternately onto skewers.
- 3. Cook over hot coals for 15-20 minutes, turning from time to time and basting occasionally with the marinade. Alternatively, cook under a hot grill as above. Serve hot.

Hot Honeyed Chicken

Ingredients

120ml/4fl.oz. Honey

1 tbsp Hot Red Pepper Sauce

4 Chicken Breasts

Instructions

- 1. In a small bowl, combine the honey and hot pepper sauce and mix well.
- 2. Make 3 or 4 diagonal cuts in the chicken breasts, about 1cm/1/2 inch deep then spread the sauce over each chicken breast, making sure the sauce penetrates the cuts.
- 3. Grill over hot coals for 15 minutes, basting occasionally, or until the chicken is cooked through. Serve hot and use any remaining sauce as a dip.

Cheese Burgers (8 small burgers)

Ingredients

1 small Onion, finely chopped or grated

450g/11b Minced Beef

1 tbsp Tomato Paste

Salt and Black Pepper

A little Oil

8 thin slices of Hard Cheese

Instructions

- Place all the ingredients in a large mixing bowl and mix until well blended, squidging the mixture together with your hands
- 2. Shape the mixture into 8 small burgers, brush with a little oil then place oiled side down on the grill and cook over medium hot coals and cook each side thoroughly.
- Just before your burgers are ready, place a slice of cheese on top of each and finishing cooking. The cheese will slightly melt.

Lamb Chops with Mustard Butter

Ingredients:

8 Lamb Chops

For the Marinade

2 tbsp Olive Oil

2 tbsp Lemon Juice

2 Garlic Cloves, crushed

Salt and Black Pepper

For the Mustard Butter

100g/4oz Softened Butter

1/2 teasp Lemon Juice

1 Garlic Clove, crushed

1 tbsp Dijon Mustard

Instructions

- 1. In a small bowl, mix together the marinade ingredients. Place the chops in a shallow dish and pour the marinade over them. Turn to coat well then set aside for 2 hours.
- 2. Meanwhile, in another small bowl, mix together the mustard butter ingredients until well blended. Set aside but do not refrigerate as it must be served at room temperature.
- 3. After the marinating time, grill the chops over hot coals on each side until cooked thoroughly.
- 4. To serve transfer to plates, place a knob of the mustard butter on each chop and serve the remainder of the butter on the side.

Windows 8 and Office 2013 released on October 26th

icrosoft has revealed that they will release Office 2013 at the same time as Windows 8, probably on October 26th. This new version will feature touch screen capability; have Skype integrated into it for immediate contact of contacts in Word documents etc. It will be cloud based, meaning it can be installed on demand using a subscription service, and all documents will be backed up online. There will also be the traditional installation. Pricing is yet to be announced.

Windows 8 for £14.99...just a reminder. If you if you buy a qualifying Windows 7 PC or Laptop, you will be able to register for a £14.99 upgrade version to Windows 8 as soon as it becomes available. www.windowsupgradeoffer.com.

By the time you read this *Google* will have its own tablet (computer) on retail sale. The *Nexus* is a 7" tablet priced from just £159 and runs the Android operating system, like many smart phones. It can be used for Internet, email, playing games and as an e-book reader. It is expected that *Amazon* will release its own *Kindle Fire* tablet in the UK soon too, which has been on sale in the USA for some months.

If you're confused about all these different types of technology, here's a rough guide! A Tablet is a hand held (computer) device, the first of which was developed by Apple and called the iPad. It has a touch screen, sized normally between 7" & 10" and performs most computer functions as described above. A Laptop, as most will know, is a screen and keyboard combined, a Netbook is a smaller screen version, & an Ultra Book is a high performance Laptop. The humble PC (the original beige box) has been with us for many years, and of course is the forerunner of all this gadgetry, a tower unit that needs a screen keyboard and mouse plugged into it. Whereas an 'all-in-one PC', is a big screen with all the computer gubbins shoe-horned into the back of it, and is usually touch screen too!

Tip: The *Windows* key on your keyboard can be used for all sorts of things. Like bringing up the Start menu; or if you want to view the contents of a drive or USB stick or memory card on your computer and nothing comes up when you plug it in. Just hold it down then press letter E to open an explorer window.

Texting has overtaken talking (on the phone) as the preferred means of communication according to an OFT survey. Based on 2011 figures, the increase is not surprisingly being led by the 16-24 year age group.

Skype is a great way of keeping in contact with family and friends over the Internet for free. (www.skype.com) But recently a new scam has emerged. A few users have reported hearing a voice saying that their computer is not protected and that additional security is required. If this happens, ignore it and do not follow any links to a website. In Skype click on Help, and Support and search for 'scam' to get advice on how to report this and prevent it from happening.

Tip: If you want to print something, and you can't see a Print icon; on your keyboard press 'Ctrl' and 'P' to bring up a print dialogue box.

Holiday photos are great for sharing but they'll probably be much too big to email. So how do you get them online for your friends and family to see? If you're on Facebook you probably know how to upload them; but do remember to check your privacy settings if you don't want the whole world looking at your photos. If you have a Hotmail account (or Live ID) you can upload them to a thing called SkyDrive, which is an online storage space that you can use for free. You can create a new album and once the pictures are uploaded you can invite people by email to share them. See: https://skydrive.live.com/

Tip: If you just want a quick way of emailing a photo or document, just find it and then right click on it and click Send To / Email Recipient, and Windows will resize it for you (if required) and attach it to an email ready to send. Note, you have to use an email program on your computer like Outlook/Express/LiveMail for this to work.

Compensation scam. Yes another devious scam is doing the rounds, this time in the form of a telephone call on behalf of a 'Government Dept. or Agency' advising people that they have been awarded compensation, but they need to pay a 10% deposit in order for the cheque to be released. They are advised to go and purchase Ukash vouchers (actually a legitimate means of paying bills etc), but unsurprisingly their money then disappears.

Google's Street View has been getting some new treatment recently including mapping Antarctica, complete with a 3D view of Scott's hut. Plus businesses can now have their premises photographed so that customers can do a virtual walk-in and tour before they decide to visit.

Slugs, Foxes and Vodka!

Rushed in by her panic stricken owners who were unsure of how much she had drank, the team got to work straight away, knowing that time was not on their side. On contacting the Poisons Unit in London, imagine our amazement when one of the main antidotes is VODKA! This was not to be given intravenously (straight into the vein) but a specific measured amount was to be mixed in with her food numerous times during the day. (Please be aware it can only be given under strict medical supervision). This was going to be one very happy dog! Over the next few days whilst in intensive care, samples of her blood were taken and tested to see if the antifreeze had started to progress into her internal oragns. Happily, after 3 days at KINGSTON, dog and owner were reunited. With the patients taste in fluids having changed, the Vodka will hopefully be out of reach.



Here is Paul's latest walk in his series of monthly rambles.

This month his destination is Bracey Bridge.

The map is for a guide only, please use an Ordnance Survey
Map or similar if possible when walking.

Map:- EXPLORER 295

Start at GR. 077620 Bracey Bridge Lay-by. Distance 7.0 Miles.

eave the picnic area in a northerly direction and cross the A614 with care. After crossing the road continue walking in the same direction with the plantation on the left. After about 0.25 miles, continue in the same direction leaving the plantation about 100 metres to the right. Cross four field boundaries and then bear slightly to the left and converge on the hedge on the right. When this hedge turns hard left, continue ahead slightly to the left of power cable posts. Cross a further

five field boundaries and, at the sixth, cross a stile, drop down a small bank, turn right and cross a further stile. Continue walking with the beck (Old Gypsel) on the left and a hedge on the right. Pass the sewage works and continue walking with the hedge on the left. At the end of the field continue ahead passing the poultry huts on the right.

On reaching the road, turn right and then follow the road to the left. When the road turns hard right, continue ahead on the Green Lane.

Follow this Green Lane as it turns hard right and becomes a surfaced lane. After about 0.5 miles from the corner, turn left and pass through a gate. Walk diagonally across the field, pass through a hedge and walk diagonally through the next field to pass through the hedge. On passing through this hedge, bear left and then pass through a second hedge.

Continue in the same direction aiming for the left corner of the playing field. Continue to the road and turn right into Burton Agnes. On reaching the main road, turn right and walk to the western outskirts of the village. Locate a way marker on the left and walk diagonally across the field to a stile, cross the stile and turn right to cross a second stile and plank footbridge. Cross the next field diagonally aiming for Harpham Church. Cross the next stile and turn right. After about 200 metres bear left and head towards a single tree, cross a stile to the left of this tree and continue across the field to a stile.

Cross the stile and walk down a short path with the old chapel on the right. Cross a stile and emerge on the road. Turn left and then at the cross roads turn right. Pass the St. Quintin Arms Inn on the right and Station Road on the left. After passing a farm on the left, turn left onto a farm road and pass the buildings on the left. Eventually cross a bridge over Lowthorpe Beck. Immediately before a small plantation turn right and pass through a gate, cross a field to pass over a stile eventually passing Bracey Bridge Mill on the right. Cross a stile and continue down the farm road to the lay-by.

been unbelievable. But remember it's not all negative for your garden; you may have noticed your lawn is looking green and luscious due to the mass rainfall. With the soil being so moist this means that there is plenty of time to keep planting and adding colour to your garden. For example usually at this time of year the soil would be too dry to plant shrubs but with all this rain the soil conditions are perfect. Add colour to your garden with delicious geraniums or beautiful dahlias, all flowering until the first frosts. <u>Top Tip-</u> Remember not all plants need the same soil, please ask our staff if you are ensure for example Azaleas require ericaceous.

How to plant a summer container by Elaine-Horticultural supervisor

Although you can still plant Summer bedding such as geraniums, dahlias and cosmos in planted containers, I prefer to move onto specimen plants. These can either be flowering or foliage, your decision should be based on the surroundings that your container will be placed. Great flowering specimens for containers include hydrangeas, patio roses and hardy fuschias. Ideal foliage plants for containers include Topairy including box, ilex, conifer, cordyline, acers, phormiums and photinia red robin. For plants that are a bit different from the norm why not try tree ferns, bamboos and grasses to add an edge to your container.

When choosing your container make sure it is the appropriate size for the plant, choose a colour to compliment and make sure you get the right compost to suit the plant. Our staff can happily advise you on any of these. It is not necessary but you can add pot feet to your container to lift the pot off the floor for good air circulation.

When you have your pot and chosen plant or maybe plants add pebbles or crocks in the bottom to help drainage. Place enough compost in so that the base of the plant is level with the top of the pot. Sprinkle a small amount of bonemeal to encourage root growth. Fill in around the plant with compost and firm down.

- 1. Prune shrubs after flowering and feed
- 2. Mow lawn weekly
- 3. Feed lawn to ensure it stays green and healthy
- 4. Protect ripening fruit from the birds with netting
- 5. Sow bedding plant seeds for Autumn and Winter
- 6. Houseplants need more water
- 7. Hoe or use a weed killer on those pesky weeds
- 8. Dead head flowers from your summer bedding to encourage more flowers
- 9. In hotter weather pests and bugs thrive be prepared with a pesticide
- 10. Keep on top of algae, moss & lichen on your patios and drives

I encourage people to use pot toppings not only for decoration but they also help with weed control, deter slugs and help to retain moisture. I would recommend checking the container every day to ensure it doesn't dry out. Remember that even if it has rained it doesn't always get into the pot where it's needed.



However some pests love the rain and you may have noticed more slugs and snails than usual eating your plants, to keep them at bay invest in a good product such as Eraza slug and snail killer which is 5 x more effective than other products plus it is shower proof. Plant of the month

• August's plant of the month is the beautiful Rudbeckia. This beautiful species are commonly called coneflowers or black-eyed-susans. Many people love them for their showy yellow or gold flower



heads. From midsummer to early autumn, stems bear daisy-like flowerheads 10-12cm (4-5in) across, with bright yellow ray-florets and high, conical centres of green disc-florets, becoming yellowish brown with age. This plant is best grown in moderately fertile, well-drained soil that does not dry out, in full sun or partial shade. The lovely shades of yellow and orange compliment wonderfully with blues and purples such as Veronica 'inspire blue' and Sedum 'Autumn joy'. A bonus for these plants is they make great cut flowers.





ello and welcome again fellow anglers to this month's fishing news. How is the weather where you are? I am asking because today is Sunday 15th as I write this, and it is sunny! It feels like the first day of summer, Hurray!

Anyway, at long last it seems that the fish have spawned and are now bang on the feed. The Match results are fantastic from all over our region and the pleasure anglers are having a great time.

In this article I am going to tell you about cheaper alternative baits for you to use as I did when I was a kid. I know I maybe shooting myself in the foot as we own a tackle shop, but I would sooner you all go fishing than do nothing, and in this economic climate all I hear is that it is too expensive to go fishing. Firstly bread: it can be used as crumb, slop, flake, punch and paste.

It is as cheap as chips, plus I have often noticed in the supermarkets at the end of the day on the whoopsie shelves it selling for 10p a loaf! Have a look at alternative meats such as a tin of Hot Dogs from as little as 50p per tin, great value. Garlic sausage is great bait and that costs from a £1 in most

shops. If you need any help or advice on how to use any of these baits effectively just pop in shop and I will be happy help to you. As well as the alternative baits don't forget there are quite a few free fishing venues around our local area as well, with no day ticket to pay for. Such as the brilliant River hull, Barmby Drain, Holderness Drain, Yorkshire Water plus free ponds at Broomfleet. You will not need a day ticket but you do need to have a Fishing Licence! So go give it a go, there are lots of fish to be caught and fun to be had throughout the summer holidays.

I was approached by the owners of Halsham Fisheries for a little help the other week. They enquired if something could be done to help remove some fish out of the first lake and place them in the second lake. The Environment Agency advised this course of action as they considered lake one to be overstocked. Anyway the Catchmoore Crew and some others came to the rescue.

We reckoned it would be a great idea to have a charity match on lake one and transfer all the fish that were caught on the day. This was done very successfully. Everyone involved had a good day and we raised £100 for Castle Hill Hospital, Cancer Ward. So may I take this opportunity once again to say Thank You to everyone.

The owner of Halsham Fisheries was very impressed and asked if we could possibly make it an annual event for charity. I obviously said of course we can, so nearer the time, about a month prior to the next charity match, I will give you all the details and anyone wishing to do their bit and join in the match can do so.

Sea scene: once again I cannot believe it, yep that's right there are still Cod getting caught on our coast. Only last week I heard of three different areas, Dimlington, East Newton and Cowden. Don't get me wrong there are not a lot of them, but other species such as Doggies, Smoothound and Thornback Rags are making up the catch rate on most tides. The best baits at the moment are Lugworm, tipped off with peeler crab.

The Humber near Chalky point is still producing flatty's and small Schoolie Bass. They are being caught on fairly large night tides. On the subject of fresh Lugworm, if you keep ordering my digger will keep providing them week after week, we do try to carry spares but please book to avoid disappointment. Plus don't forget there is a large selection of frozen baits available too.

Sad death of well-known Cottingham personality Mrs. Anne Ford

nne Ford, who will have been well known to many in Cottingham, has died after a short illness in Painswick, Gloucestershire at the age of 79.

A long-time resident in Cottingham, Anne was the only child of Albert and Dorothy (Dot) Barker. Anne had an idyllic childhood being part of a village community whose friends included Mary Brocklesby and Vera Buttery. Anne attended the village school and when older would cycle to St Marys Convent on Inglemire Lane in Hull. As children Mum often told us stories of having to avoid the craters on the roads that had appeared overnight from the wartime bombing raids.

Anne met her husband Ron in the 1950s when as a young police officer he was posted to Cottingham. They were married in 1956 and took over a grocery store in South Cave expanding the business by offering a delivery service to their customers. When Anne's parents retired from Barker's shop in Cottingham in 1958, Ron and Anne were the natural successors to takeover the reins of the business and develop it into a flourishing and high quality enterprise.

Always active in local life, her community commitment led Anne to become an elected member of Beverley Borough Council where she served for many years as a keen and conscientious Councillor, Although elected on a political platform as a member of the Conservative party she was always at pains to represent the interests of everyone in her ward, regardless of their persuasion. In due course she became an Honorary Alderman of Beverley and was Lady Mayoress for a year.

After retirement Ron and Anne moved to Painswick in the Cotswolds where they enjoyed exploring the area, gardening and taking in the beautiful scenery with their dog. Both of them settled into their new surroundings and welcomed friends who would visit from Yorkshire.

Ron died in 2004 but Anne continued to lead an active life joining a wide range of pursuits and clubs in Painswick. Anne was always up for a challenge and although not good at it would take part in skittling events at WI functions just for the fun of it. Anne continued her love of travel and liked nothing better than to visit new places and meet new people.

Anne leaves behind a daughter Liz and son Richard and five grandchildren. She will be missed by them all.



WO of East Yorkshire's top young chefs will now go head to head at this year's Beverley Food Festival to be named as the county's Apprentice Chef Of The Year after triumphing in the semi-final stage of the 2012 Copper Saucepan Competition.

Michael Flower, of the Hallmark Hotel, North Ferriby, and Luke Underwood, of The Star, Sancton, were among 10 chefs cooking a three-course meal for judges in the competition organised by the Hull & East Yorkshire Hospitality Association.

"It was a hugely impressive effort by all those taking part; there were some outstanding dishes and the standard overall was better than ever," said association chairman Paul Vinsen after the cook-off at Hull College.

Luke and Michael, who has only been working as a chef for six months, will now compete before an audience of 300 in the food theatre at this year's Beverley Food Festival, which takes place on October 7.





They will have half an hour to produce a main course and dessert. The winner will receive the Copper Saucepan trophy, a cheque for £200 and the chance to spend a day in the kitchens of the award-winning Winteringham Fields restaurant, owned by Colin McGurran, a recent winner in the Great British Chef contest on TV.

The runner-up will receive £100 and also get the chance to cook at Winteringham Fields.

Luke's winning dishes at the Hull College cook-off were: Loin of rabbit with Yorkshire chorizo, baby honey-soused vegetables, leaves and horseradish; followed by turbot with a cauliflower and vanilla veloute, broad beans and smoked bacon; and a sweet of dark chocolate parfait and fresh raspberries.

Michael produced a starter of sautéed wild pigeon breast with quail eggs cooked two ways, garden beets and pancetta; followed by slow-roasted belly pork with scallops, pea puree, black pudding and boulangere potatoes; and an Olympic chocolate trio as the sweet, comprising a bitter chocolate brownie, white chocolate cup and a hazelnut creme brûlée.

Others competing were: Gavin Lane, of the Light Dragoon, Etton; Jane Branton, Holiday Inn, Hull Marina; Damien Ross, The Hallmark, North Ferriby; Dan Bennett, Yorkshire Garden Centre; Jessica Marshall, Asda; Josh Gedney, Pipe & Glass, South Dalton; Matthew Lee, Pipe & Glass; and Richard Halsall, Cave Castle.

New Home in the Sun

It is now the middle of July and, having moved into our new home in Spain 3 months ago, we still have about 30 boxes to unpack!! We have, however, made a lot of progress around the house and garden since we have been here, but nothing in Spain is a '5 minute job'. Local shops open 10-2 then 5-8 so if you run out of anything you can be a bit stuck. Also nobody opens on a Sunday, which took a bit of getting used to. Certainly the Spanish word 'manana' is well suited to the pace of life around here.

In the house, the old kitchen has been ripped out and replaced with a modern white kitchen from Ikea and black granite work tops from a local supplier it looks great but after 5 weeks we are still waiting for the tiles to arrive to finish the job. Maybe manana (tomorrow). All of the internal painting was done for our arrival so we decided to paint all the windows and external doors inside and out, just to smarten them up. We chose to go a darker shade and two coats were needed but they look much better now. The two rooms that need the most work now are the bathrooms, both are usable but need new suites and re tiling to give them a more modern feel.

We have managed to complete the first 2 guest bedrooms, one double and one twin, which are situated in the main house just off the dining room. They share one of the bathrooms which has yet to be updated, and have already had our first visitors. My daughter, Nicola and her partner Andy brought our 2 year old grandson Jack out at the end of May for a week. We had a really nice time, the weather was great, Andy helped with a few jobs around the house and It was great to see little Jack, although he did come out in chicken pox the day after he got here!! A week after they returned home our friends, Dawn and Steve came out for 8 days, a period that involved plenty of eating and drinking as well as watching England in the Euros. I think they all enjoyed themselves as they are all coming out

again in September. Next guests are Adels parents, Keith and Sheila, who will have been and gone by the time by the time you are reading this.

Work on the main guest accommodation, which will be a 70sq.m two bed casitas which is separate from our house and totally self contained, will hopefully start in October, subject to planning permission. We hope to complete that early in 2013 ready for renting out on a self catering basis to anyone who fancies a holiday in rural Spain. It will sleep 4/5 and will be very rustic with great views across the olives to the Sierra Nevada mountains. More on that nearer completion.

All the other bedrooms now have fitted wardrobes which meant we could all finally unpack our cases and sort our clothes, all our English winter clothes however went into the loft!! The house has a satellite dish on the outside so after a couple of weeks I thought I would try my sky box and TV and hey presto it worked. It meant my wife and daughter in law could watch the soaps but more importantly we could watch the football.

The grandchildren have settled in really well and both started at a Spanish school in the next village and seemed to integrate really well, considering they could not speak any of the language at all. They have both made friends, been invited to birthday parties and been generally accepted. The school hours are 9am till 2pm, so they are both home and in the pool for 2.30pm and then do about an hour's homework.

To help with their Spanish we asked at the school if anyone would do private tuition at our house. The headmasters daughter said she would do it and now she comes over for two hours a week and teaches them both together and they love it. They broke up on the 22nd June for 11 weeks summer holiday but at least the weather should mean they will be outside and not stuck indoors because of the rain.

Having gone as far as we can inside the house (until the tiles arrive) we decided to do some work in the garden area so my son Tom painted the bar and the whole area around the pool. It now looks clean and fresh and is getting well used. It's been kitted out with sun beds, chairs, settees, tables, pool and football tables, our old Jacuzzi, gazebos for shade and a couple of fridges which are well stocked with liquid refreshments. When the temperature in the shade reaches 40 degrees (106) then cold drinks are a must. We also have a music system and TV up there as well as the barbecue, so it's a great area to relax in.

The swimming pool water is warming up nicely, When we got here in April it was 16 degrees in the water but it has now reached 28 so it's lovely to cool off in and it should get even warmer.

One of the main reasons for moving to Spain was the weather (as well as the food, wine, people and way of life!!!) and it hasn't disappointed. When we first arrived the temperature was about 25 degrees and in the first couple of weeks we had five days of rain fall, which was much needed. Since then, we haven't seen a drop (think you have had it all in the UK) and the temperature is now constantly in the high 30's. It has touched the low 40's a few times during June but it is forecast to get hotter for July and August.

While Tom was sorting the bar out, I decided to start on the garden and the fish pond. We have managed to get the fish pond filled up and all it needs now is topping up once a week from the well. The fish seemed to have doubled in numbers and I estimate we now have around 50, from about 6" long to 15". They get fed twice a day, on dog biscuits would you believe, because fish food over here is hard to find and very expensive. The banks of the pond are one half plants and one half rocks but unfortunately most of the plants had died off and many of the rocks were missing. My grandson Aiden and I decided to sort the rocks out and rebuild the bank. It took us a couple of days and about 20 wheel barrows full of rocks to complete the job but it looks much better. Next job will be to buy 40 plants and dig them in around the rest of the bank and they should put a bit of colour back around the pond.

The orchard has been planted with a dozen young fruit trees which seem to be growing nicely. They get watered every day and hopefully they will produce some nice fruit next year. We planted apple, orange, lemon, lime, avocado and mango but may well plant more next year. At the other end of the orchard, we are going to plant salad produce and vegetables but that will



probably happen next year. I have been trying to prepare the ground but it is so hard to dig I had to buy a petrol rotivator which is a great help. I have now managed to rotivate all the allotment area and between the fruit trees as well. Even with the rotivator it is hard work and it took me about 4 days to complete. Having said that, it is an area of about 6000 sq. ft. of hard, rocky soil so I don't think I did too badly. It will need doing a few more times before we start planting but should give us some nice fresh salad and veg next year - can't wait.

The other area which has so far defeated me is the lawn. No matter how much I water it, it just won't come back, although I am getting plenty of weeds coming up. It's such a big area (about 10,000 sq. ft.) that it may have to wait until the autumn when it gets a bit cooler.

Next issue: Meeting the locals, rats, snakes, kittens and more water problems.

New charity service proves to be a lifeline – In its first week!

new cleaning service launched by Age UK East Riding has proved to be a lifeline for one elderly couple just days after it was launched.

The Beverley-based charity launched the new Spic and Span service in June, to provide a trusted domestic cleaning service for older and vulnerable residents.

Just days after its launch, Julie Preston, one of the team of cleaners, arrived at the home of an elderly couple in Beverley to find the door locked and no apparent sign of life.

She alerted the couple's daughter and with the help of a neighbour, who held a key, went into the house to find the elderly woman lying helpless after a fall and her husband, who was confused, unable to move to raise the alarm.

Julie and the neighbour were able to help and reassure the couple until their daughter arrived.

Julie said: "When I got to the house the doors were locked and the curtains were closed. The neighbour had a spare key so we went in and shouted upstairs.

"The man was sitting on the bed in his pyjamas and his wife was lying on the floor in front of him. She said she was not hurt but could not get herself up.

"The neighbour and I helped her onto the chair, and I made them a cup of tea and some biscuits until their daughter arrived."

Age UK East Riding has launched its new Spic and Span cleaning service in the Beverley area but is aiming to roll it out across the East Riding in the next few months.

The charity employs its own team of cleaners to help older people with jobs such as vacuuming, changing bedding and ironing. The cleaners are all CRB.

Chris Dixon, the charity's Business Services Co-ordinator, said: "We launched Spic and Span because people told us that there was a need for a cleaning service to help older people to continue to live independently in their own homes.

"Our cleaners will also be a friendly face that the clients know they can trust and can look forward to their visits. In this instance the contact with a regular cleaner meant that Julie was able to help in a potentially distressing situation with no harm done."

Teenagers travel for less during the school holidays

ocal bus company EYMS is allowing teenagers to travel for less on its buses during the school holidays.

The current child fare (usually half the adult fare) is available up to a person's sixteenth birthday but young people who are 16, 17 or 18 years old can travel for child fare on any East Yorkshire or Scarborough & District bus during the school holidays (21 July – 2 September).

That means cheaper fares to the beach, the cinema, to meet friends or to go shopping.

Teenagers in this age group do not need to apply for a special card or ticket in advance – they just get on the bus and ask for a child ticket. They should remember to bring ID, such as a passport, citizen card or driving licence, to prove they are not older than 18 as it will often be impossible for a bus driver to distinguish between an 18 year-old and a 19 year-old.

EYMS are offering the discount after meeting with Hull Youth Council, who raised the issue of teenagers' travel costs.

EYMS chairman and chief executive Peter Shipp said: "We are keen to encourage young people to travel by bus and we know it can be relatively expensive for them especially if they are still at school or college and not earning. We have therefore decided to give this scheme a trial run during the school holiday. We will be very interested to see how many youngsters take advantage of it and if any problems arise through the need to prove that they are within the age limit"


