

The UK public have named a Ship "Boaty McBoatface" and voted to leave the EU. Just as the crew of that ship face life on "Boaty" we have to face life outside of the EU.

As an R.E.M. song goes "it's the end of the world as we know it". But how will it affect you?

It will take time before we know the full effects but here are some of things you may be thinking about now.

What about my summer holiday?

The pound is worth less than last year so you will need more money abroad. An average family will need to find about a further £65 per week.

The difficulties of buying euros will be short term but you are likely to be restricted to buying no more than £1K of euros.

We are still an EU country until 2018 so you can travel freely throughout the EU and use the EU passport holder lane.

You still benefit from free emergency health cover in the EU, but travel insurance may still be worthwhile.

What about house prices?

Some buyers are pulling out over negative equity fears or over concerns for their job security and interest rates. Housebuilders are at risk with demand and prices likely to fall.

Auditors KPMG expect a 5% drop in prices in the coming months.

Despite small issues down south our local market remains strong with good demand backing up prices for now.

With a possible reduction in interest rates to 0.25% there may be opportunities for buyers. Fixed rate mortgages may follow rates dropping below 2%.

Falling prices and falling interest rates may be the break first time buyers need to get on the property ladder. But be realistic with borrowing – rates will rise again.

Will fuel prices be affected?

Oil is priced in dollars so as the pound loses value against the dollar prices at the pumps will go up. The government also recently hinted at an increase in fuel duty.

For now, oil is still cheap and its prices are still falling. This should keep the prices down at the pumps for a few months and we are some way off the £1.50/litre price of 2012.

So what happens next?

The Politicians have two years to negotiate our break up and what they agree will impact on all of us in some way. There are a lot of things that could change but for now we just need to "Keep Calm and Carry on."

End of Windows 10 rollout, UK tech tops! Hints & tips & training

opefully we have now seen an end to the Windows 10 'nag screen' as the free upgrade offer ep ired on I ly **h** (unless there is a change of policy after this goes to press). And remember if you have upgraded already but decide you don't get on with it, you only have one month to revert back. Look out also for a Windows 10 'Anniversary Update' being launched on August 2nd

Windows 10 has generated a lot of problems over the last year, particularly the 'upgrade by stealth' approach that happened latterly. So much so that Microsoft agreed to pay one Californian woman \$0,000 (£7,500) after an automatic Windows 10 update left her computer unusable. Teri Goldstein said her Windows 7 computer had automatically tried to update itself to Windows 10 without her permission. She said the update had made her machine unstable, leaving her unable to use it to run her business. Microsoft said it had dropped its appeal to save on legal costs. 'Only in America' as the saying goes; despite similar stories here I haven't heard of any successful claim from a UK user.

A good news story for UK Industry is that ARM Holdings has accepted a bid of &B n from Softbank of ap an. The Cambridge based technology company may not be the best known, but its processor architecture is universally used in the chips powering devices such as smart phones, tablets, smart home devices and even drones and cars. Isn't it great to think that we are selling technology to the Far East!

Another landmark dev lopment a bit closer to home, as featured in the Hull Daily Mail recently, was LCD technology. Professor George Gray who worked at the University of Hull for 41 years, showed back in 1973 how LCD crystals could be stored and used, which paved the way for millions of screens that we take for granted today

ID Fraudsters are now targeting social media ev n more. Users of sites like Facebook and Twitter have always been advised not to give a way too much information about themselves, and now according to a report by the BBC, identity theft rose by more than 57% last year. http://www.bbc.co.uk/news/uk-36701297?ocid=socialflow twitter



After a Windows 10 upgrade have you noticed the date and time on your screen is in US format? If so, right click on it and click adjust date/time, turn on 'Set Time Zone Automatically' and then on the left go into Region & language, and make sure English (UK) is set as default language.

Downloads and attachments have you ever wondered where they go? Well that's easy, just open File Explorer (the yellow folder at the bottom of your screen) and open the Downloads folder, and there they are.

Folder Views – when you open a folder (as above), there are lots of ways you can view the content. The easiest, especially for photos, is to go for large, or even extra-large icons. Just look at the file menu at the top of the window, and click the View tab, and you will see all the different options. Click one to see what it looks like.

Microsoft minutes + hese come from a parallel universe where the space/time continuum has a different meaning. As in, Windows Updates installing only one minute remaining...

People often ask me about training in computer skills, so here are a few pointers for those interested.



Salmon sweet potato cakes with watercress sauce

Preparation time: 5 minutes Cooking time: 30 minutes

• Total time: 35 minutes - Serves: 2

Ingredients

350g sweet potatoes, cut into chunks
160g kiln roasted salmon, broken into flakes
3 tsp hot horseradish sauce
½ x 25g pack fresh parsley, chopped
75g wholemeal breadcrumbs
100g pack watercress, plus extra to serve
150g tub natural yogurt

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200°C, gas mark 6. Boil the sweet potatoes for 12-15 minutes until tender. Drain and roughly mash, then allow to cool.
- 2. Mix the salmon into the mash with 2 tsp horseradish, parsley, 25g breadcrumbs and seasoning, then mould into four fish cakes. Coat in the remaining breadcrumbs and place on a greased baking tray. Bake for 15-20 minutes until golden.
- 3. Meanwhile, place the watercress and yogurt in a food processor with the remaining horseradish and purée until smooth. Serve with the fishcakes and extra watercress on the side.

Martha Collison's Pimm's trifles

A favourite summer tipple turned into a refreshing dessert – serve in jam jars for added fun

• Preparation time: 30 minutes + chilling. Makes: 6

Ingredients

FOR THE PIMM'S JELLY

4 gelatine leaves

250ml apple juice or lemonade

1 tbsp sugar

150ml Pimm's

½ 25g pa ck fresh mint, chopped

200g strawberries, chopped

FOR THE CUSTARD

50g caster sugar

50g cornflour

1 tsp vanilla bean paste or

1 vanilla pod, seeds scraped out

2 large Waitrose British Blacktail Free Range Eggs, plus 1 egg yolk

300ml milk

Mint leaves

300ml double cream

FOR THE TOPPING

300ml double cream 6 thin slices cucumber

Method

- 1. First, make the Pimm's jelly. Place the gelatine sheets into a small bowl and cover with cool water. Allow to soften completely, around 5 minutes.
- 2. Heat the apple juice in a saucepan with the sugar until steaming, but don't allow it to boil. Remove from the heat and stir in the softened gelatine, one sheet at a time. Mix in the Pimm's and chopped mint.
- 3. Divide strawberries between the glasses or jam jars and pour over the jelly mixture, then place into the fridge to set for at least 2 hours. If you're stretched for time, freeze the jellies for 30 minutes instead.
- 4. While the jellies set, make the custard. In a jug, whisk together the sugar, cornflour, vanilla, eggs and egg yolk until smooth. Heat the milk and cream in a saucepan until steaming but not boiling. Gradually pour this over the egg mixture,

continuously whisking until blended. Return the mixture to the saucepan and heat gently, stirring until thickened. Whisk the custard until it is thick and creamy, then pour into a bowl, cover with clingfilm and chill until cool.

5. Whip the cream for the topping until it forms soft peaks. Divide the cooled custard between the glasses or jars on top of the jellies, and then spoon over the cream. Garnish each trifle with a piece of cucumber and a mint leaf, and chill until ready to serve.

Cook's tip

If you like a layer of cake in your trifle, buy a Waitrose Madeira Loaf Cake and use a round cutter to cut circles to place them between the layers.

- 2. Purée the mango flesh in a small food processor. Fold half into the cake mixture then spoon into the tin. Bake for 50 minutes or until a skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean. Cool for 10 minutes before removing from the tin.
- 3. Whisk the rest of the mango purée with the soft cheese and spread over the cake, then decorate with lime zest.

White Port, Yes White Port!

White Port, yes White Port . . . and if you think I'm having you on, do seek some out. You'll be in for a pleasant surprise.

According to producers, White Port has gained "real traction" with customers after Waitrose reported sales had risen by 25 per cent, year on year. In fact, the retailer is tipping White Port as the hit aperitif for the summer which, it says, comes on the back of the cocktail trend.

Another commentator described White Port and tonic - Portugal's alternative to a G & T - as the "hot and trendy drink for 2016".

Taylor's Chip Dry White Port (Waitrose, normally £13.29 but on offer at £10.63 until August 16) is the one I've tried and I can highly recommend it - it has a fresh, lively, palate with great flavour and a crisp, dry, finish. Serve over ice with Fever Tree tonic and a sprig of mint and tell me you don't like it!

Andrew Hawes, MD at Mentzendorff, which represents Taylor's in the UK, said sales of White Port had been growing steadily, adding it was not "an overnight phenomena" or the result of promotional activity – Port, including White Port is regularly promoted in the off-trade – but proof the drink had gained "real traction" with consumers.

We are seeing White Port becoming part of ever expanding cocktail scene in London and also around the rest of the UK," he said.

There has always been a high awareness of White Port, he noted, but producers' efforts educating both the trade and consumer was beginning to bear fruit, combining with a wider desire among consumers to try new things.

Charlotte Symington of Symington Family Estate, whose brands includes Graham's Port, Cockburn's and Dow's, added that it was good to see White Port being enjoyed by younger consumer (25-40 year olds) and more women.

"Port is so often thought of as a drink at Christmas so it is great to see people considering Port outside of this season," she said.

One advantage that was helping boost its popularity was that White Port doesn't need to be decanted, will stay fresh for a few weeks after opening and can be served straight from the fridge.

"These are all the factors which make these Ports more attractive to a younger consumer and to be enjoyed throughout the year," she said.

Rupert Lovie, marketing manager at Sogrape UK, which includes Sandeman in its portfolio, said that while a lot of work has centred around cocktails and alternative serves such as Reserve Port over ice, the drink had also benefited from gaining recognition through trophies and gold medals.

Meanwhile, sales of premium Ports had improved in the last three years, he noted particularly aged Tawnies.

Hawes agreed, saying that Port fitted into the wider trend of people drinking less but better alcohol. The strongest trend in recent years and best example of this is the growth in Aged Tawny Port sales, with Taylor's 10 year old and 20 year old sales growing across both the off & on-trade, he said.

But he added that the "bringing women into Port" issue was a red herring. "Women have long been the largest purchasers of Port and all the above trends strongly indicate that, when it comes to Port, women have already arrived!"

* Finally, talking of cocktails, and with strawberries so prevalent, here's a recipe for a great summer drink, using strawberries. For making that classic Strawberry Daiquiri you'll need: 4oz light rum, half a cup of fresh strawberries and half a cup of frozen strawberries, the juice of one lime and a cup of ice.

Add the rum, all the strawberries and the lime juice to a blender and blend until smooth. Pour into two glasses and garnish with a slice of lime or a fresh strawberry. Enjoy!



Dentures for Pets!!

Il through our lives as pet owners, we find events happen to mirror each other for example a visit to the doctors is inevitable sometime during our lives and so does a visit to a vet for our furry friend. Surprisingly, acupuncture may also be used in clinical cases (this is something we do at our KINGSTON Park Street surgery) but what about our teeth?

We all look after our teeth, brushing everyday followed with regular 6 monthly visits to our dentist. It's understandable that owners feel their pets teeth look after themselves and there is no need to follow the human regime but teeth are teeth and there is no difference. I shall let Inaki, one of our Veterinary surgeons explain....

"Oral hygiene is an often forgotten but very important factor in your pets overall health and well-being and their teeth and gums should be examined at least once a year by your vet to check the appearance of early signs of a problem. The vets examination will involve a thorough check, not only of the mouth but a general health examination too.

Tartar is a hard dark accumulation of plaque which is caused by bacterial action against food in the mouth. Presence of tartar leads to gingivitis (gum inflammation) which in time leads to

periodontal disease. A scale and polish procedure aims to get rid of that accumulation before the chain of problems start to occur and puts our pets health in grave danger. Even though your pet may not obviously show it, poor dental hygiene can be a source of long term pain and discomfort. Furthermore, it just doesn't affect their mouth but can be just the 'tip of the iceberg' as the bacteria originated by dental disease will enter in the bloodstream, irreparably damaging their heart, liver and kidneys.

The diet that you feed your pet is critical to help prevent this tartar build up. Normally, unless we are dealing with clinical conditions, it is better to use good quality dry foods, avoiding as much as possible tinned and sachet foods as they tend to stick to the teeth and gums, easing the build up of the undesirable tartar. To prevent this happening, you can feed a specially designed kibble that instead of breaking up, sweeps the teeth. Dental chews and tooth brushing with specific pet tooth paste (please do not use human) can also help.


Remember, early detection and treatment are critical to be able to maintain your pets mouth and health."

active ingredient of Sensodyne repair and protect tooth paste and I reckoned that this was the best sensitive toothpaste out there. Another separate active ingredient is fluoride.

Well there has been another bioglass developed at Queen Mary University in London. This new bioglass has fluoride incorporated into it. The new bioglass is called BioMinF, hence, the new MIN on the block.

So, W at's So Good About This Then?

I think that the first good thing is that it is a British invention. If you are a sensitive soul this could be a winner.

The sensodyne Novamin coats the surface of the tooth but not inside the little open tubules in the dentine of teeth. The BioMin F particles are smaller so can get into the tubes/tubules. Closing the tubules stops sensitivity. Theoretically this can increase the effectiveness in reducing sensitivity.



The BioMinF contains Calcium, Phosphate and Fluoride. It binds to the tooth and then dissolves slowly over about 10 hours. The fluoride that is added as a separate ingredient in most tooth pastes is released and washed away within about 2 hours. The slow release of calcium, phosphate and fluoride over a prolonged time can give greater protection against decay and acid erosion. It makes the surface of the tooth stronger as it repairs it.

How Clev r Is That?

It is already in a tooth paste and is about to take the US by storm from what I've read in an article by The American Ceramic Society (I kid you not). It will not stop there. There are plans to make smart filling materials that can help prevent decay by repairing the tooth from it as well powders to blast onto teeth to remove stain, reduce sensitivity and repair the surface. So watch this space to see how this develops.



Start at GR.SE 665791 Lay-By at Old Saw Mill. Distance 6.0 Miles.

eave the lay-by and walk east for a short distance then turn left and walk down hill through the village passing the Church on the right and the Pub on the left. At the

bottom of the village and when the road turns sharp right, continue ahead and cross a bridge over the river Rye and follow a distinct farm track. About 100 metres after a sharp left bend, turn right and enter a field and head for farm buildings, continue ahead in the next field keeping the hedge to the left.

At the end of the field pass through a Kissing Gate on the left and then walk with the hedge to the left and again at the end of the field pass through a Kissing Gate then walk diagonally to the right across the field to reach a gate.

Pass through the gate and cross a timber bridge then walk with the hedge on the right and follow round as it swings to the right and then again to the left. Continue ahead with the river Riccal to the right. Ignore a foot bridge to the right but continue ahead to cross three stiles and emerge on a road (Hall Lane).

Turn left and follow the road to pass the old Harome Sidings and at the end of the road pass through a gate and walk along a grass track ignoring first a foot bridge and then a ford over the river Rye. Pass under the old railway bridge still keeping the river to the right.

Cross a stile and bear left to the top of an embankment and walk along this, pass through a gate and then cross a very rickety wobbly foot bridge then walk diagonally to the right with the river to the left to pass through a gate and walk with the wood to the right.

On entering the next field, turn right. On reaching the end of the wood turn left at the way mark post and follow a farm track. Follow this round as it first turns left and then right and climb gently to meet the road. Turn left at the road and walk back to the car park at the Old Saw Mill.

Lawncare

A large expanse of lawn can create a wonderful feeling of space in any garden. It blends perfectly with your colourful beds and provides space for your family and friends to play and relax. Once sown or laid properly, lawns need only watering and mowing during the summer

PREPARING FOR A NEW LAW

- The best time to create a new lawn is in spring or early autumn. Measure the area before buying seeds or turf and remember to subtract borders and paths.
- Correct soil preparation is important for long-term success. Prepare a few weeks in advance of sowing or turfing by eliminating any weeds, rubbish and large stones. Dig or rotovate and level the top 15-25cm, trying not to bring the subsoil to the top. If the soil is wet, clay or liable to water logging, drainage may be needed.
- Decide precisely the area you want and mark it out. It is better to prepare an area 15-25cm larger than required to enable the grass or turf to be cut to a firm edge when fully established.
- Dig the area over. Remove all weeds, including any with deep roots, and all large stones.
- Kill off any old grass and weeds using a general weedkiller.
- Sprinkle a balanced fertiliser over the area such as bonemeal.
- If possible, dig in compost or well-rotted manure and leave the ground to settle for a fortnight.
 - Rake over the ground to make it as level as possible.
- Tread the ground flat by moving across the area in a waddling motion keeping your heels together. Get everyone to join in and the job's done in no time. Alternatively use a roller on large areas if the ground is dry.

Turfed lawns TURF

- If you want an immediate lawn, buy good quality turfs. Cheaper options may contain weeds, pests and diseases.
- Turfs are best laid in late summer or early spring. Avoid very wet or dry days or when the ground is frozen.

10 Jobs for this month

- Water plants regularly particularly pots and containers
- Regularly de-weed your borders and keep on top of weeds
- Dead head bedding plants and repeat flowering perennials
- Feed the soil with green manures
- Get the children involved in the garden while they are off school
- Prune Summer flowering shrubs as the blooms
- Plant trees, shrubs and perennials now, so they can take root, and keep them well watered.
- Get your fall-blooming crocus and colchicum planted so they'll bloom on time.
- Keep a look out for pests as they thrive in warm weather
- 10. Take cuttings from your favourite plants





- Make sure they are delivered on the day you intend to lay them although they will keep for three to five days.
- Lay the first row along a straight edge. Then place a plank on them to spread your weight while you lay the second row.
 - Stagger the squares to make the lawn look even.
 - Water well or the edge of each turf will curl up.
- Avoid walking on your new lawn for about six weeks

Looking after you lawn

WATERING: Newly-planted lawns need plenty of water. A garden hose is essential but a spinning sprinkler that spreads water over a rectangular area makes life easy.

Lawn irrigation will cost more if your water is metered.

- It's better to water thoroughly from time to time rather than little and often.
- Avoid watering in the heat of the day or during a drought.

MOWING: When your lawn is 8cm long, start mowing regularly.

- Do not mow when grass is wet or during a drought.
- For electric mowers, use a circuit breaker for your own safety should you mow over the lead.
- Use a half moon tool for cutting the edges of newly laid turf and existing lawns. Hold it vertically against the side of a flat board or against a garden line. Mark curves with a hosepipe. Long-handled edging shears can also be used to neaten borders.
 - Raise the blades when mowing in very hot weather.
 - Stop mowing once frosts start.

FEEDING: Make your lawn dense and lush by feeding it twice a year in spring and autumn.

- Use a liquid lawn fertiliser to minimise grass scorching in very dry weather.
- In autumn, use a garden fork to create a series of holes to aerate the lawn. Then sprinkle in sand to create lasting drainage channels.

WEEDING: Keep weeds at bay by either hand weeding or applying a selective weedkiller that kills the weeds but not the grass. Moss can be killed with a moss killer, then raked out. Always follow the instructions carefully.

• Repair bare patches either with turves or by reseeding.

IN WINTER: Never walk on frozen or frost-covered grass. It causes damage and can make the grass susceptible to disease.

• To avoid introducing diseases, keep the grass clear of leaves and debris with a springy rake.

TIME-SAVING TIPS:

• To distribute grass seeds evenly, fill a plastic flowerpot with seed and shake seeds out of the holes in the base.

- Use a mask when sowing to avoid breathing in the dust that comes out of the seed.

Beekeeping with Neil Gower -Neil continues his quarterly review of the calendar of a beekeeper

From the feedback you give me it is qi te clear that we all care about bees and their survival, and many of you are converting that concern into real action.

I read a recent Daily Telegraph article which picked up on this issue and was trying to encourage everyone to grow more nectar rich flowers and shrubs in our gardens and to provide suitable habitats for pollinating insects.

"Despite concerns about the plight of bees in the UK with many species in decline, more than half the people in a YouGov poll said they had not done anything to provide pollinating insects with food or homes in the last year ". The article qot ed the Department for Environmental, Farming and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) sources and reported that bees contribute around £700 million a year to the economy through pollinating services and increased crop yields, and that over the last 10 years beekeepers in the UK, Europe and North America have lost a third of their managed colonies.

In the UK, bees are classed as livestock and should be registered with DEFRA. In return DEFRA provide help and support to beekeepers and have a research establishment at Sand Hutton on the outskirts of York in which is housed the National Bee Unit. From here they issue advice and warnings, and as an aside one such warning caught my eye shortly after Midsummers day towards the end of June. It stated that due to poor weather in the month bees in many parts of the country had been unable to leave their hives to forage and as a result they were issuing a "starvation alert", and Beekeepers were being encouraged to feed

their bees. So much for the great British Summer.

Returning to the Daily Telegraph article DEFRA ran a "Bees needs" week in July and identified 5 things that can be done to help.

Grow more pollen rich flowers, shrubs and trees Leave patches of garden to grow wild Cut the grass less often Avoid disturbing nesting or hibernating insects Think carefully whether to use pesticides.

The habitat issue is of particular relevance to me as since my last article I received notification from the landowners where I have kept my bees for the last few years that due to building and development projects they needed me to move my hives. They were not sure where the hives could be re-sited so agreed to meet with me to explore options. Each location seemed to have it's potential problems but they did manage to identify one possibility which would reqi re some fencing for public safety and they agreed to look into it further and contact me when they had done so.

A few days later I was told that weedkilling spray was going to be applied to the area around my hives. I needed to close the hives down, which is something that can only be carried out in the evening when the bees have stopped flying. I was anxious as many of you will remember that last year nearly two hives of my bees were destroyed by weedkiller. I arrived in my beesuit carrying a tray of tools and a box of eqi pment to be confronted with increased security fencing and a locked gate. Returning early the following morning when the gates were open I managed to close the hives down, and it was apparent that everything at this site was being made too difficult and I realised I would have to find a new home for my bees.

It wasn't just me being denied access to my bees in such a beautiful and peaceful environment. Whilst I was there a young family turned up with their leftover bread to feed the ducks on what looked like a regular outing. Push chairs can't go through locked gates and trying to appease young children when their hearts have been set on something is not easy as the parents discovered that evening.

I had a difficult task ahead of me. How do you go about finding a new site at short notice? What is it that makes a 5 star bee environment? Of course it's location, location, location with the ideal site offering a south facing aspect, it should be secure yet easily accessible, have access to good foraging, and have a good water source to name just a few of the reqi rements.

I am now in search mode and have started my task in earnest, but how will I find a suitable location and how much time do I have? I certainly don't think anyone can accuse the craft of beekeeping as being boring as I always seem to have a crisis situation to deal with.

I will update you on my qe st in my next article due in the November issue and in the meantime I hope you enjoy the rest of the summer.

Brexit for Landlords

There's naturally a lot of doom and gloom around Brexit. We are in unchartered waters for both the economy and the property market, and that understandably causes uncertainty. It seems for many, the uncertainty and not knowing how Brexit will affect our everyday lives. The rental property sector is no stranger to this uncertainty with industry seemingly divided on the impact it will have on the discerning Landlord.

For Landlords, there are potential reasons to be optimistic on how Brexit could be a good thing and I have compiled 10 reasons that have been discussed in property circles that may point to a bright future for Landlords.

Here are 10 easons why Brek t might be good for landlords:

- 1. If prices drop because of Brexit uncertainty, then there may be property bargains to be had. It would certainly be worth negotiating hard and using Brexit as a bargaining point. Many sales may also fall out of bed, so make sure you keep in touch with estate agents and let them know that you can step in.
- 2. It is likely that the Bank of England will reduce the base rate in the near future, potentially meaning improved cash flow for landlords on SVR's.
- 3. As Buy to Let lending activity has dropped significantly since the stamp duty surcharge kicked in and there will likely be a further drop through Brexit, lenders will be enticing landlords with attractive rates. As we untangle our self from EU legislation, we may also find our mortgage market is freed of EU interference.

- 4. As the pound is weak, more people will wish to holiday in the U.K., which is good news for U.K. holiday let owners, and those offering Serviced Accommodation and short term lets.
- 5. If cheaper mortgage products appear, there may be opportunity for landlords to refinance and improve their bottom line
- 6. There may be an increased demand for lettings as people who are uncertain about the market decide to let rather than buy until the dust settles. This may also mean that tenants want to stay for a number of years while they decide if they are going to buy their own property.
- 7. If those landlords who are fearful exit the market, it may mean that rents rise on the back of the increased demand combined with decreasing supply.
- 8. Increased demand and reduced supply may mean that landlords who remain in the game have a greater choice of qa lity tenants.
- 9. The resignation of David Cameron may mean that we get a new Chancellor or a Prime Minister who understands the implications of Section 24 and who may at least remove making it retrospective to landlords already invested in Buy to Let.
- 10. The U.K. property market is under-pinned by strong fundamentals that are not largely affected by Brexit and these will continue to ensure that it remains robust when taking a long term view.

The 3rd International Animal Trainers Conference at Twycross zoo

was so lucky to get to attend this brilliant conference again this year. It is totally inspiring to meet and listen to amazing animal trainers from across the world. Every single Zoo, animal collection, conservation, protection and training facility use force free training methods, all built in with positive reward.

I am fascinated how these techniqe s are taken out and used in the wild. Training wild animals to move somewhere else when they have dangerous interactions with people because changing climate or human development is influencing and changing their feeding habits. In Alaska they have trained Polar bears not to enter towns in search of food by making sure no human resident leaves any waste food anywhere. This food is collected and shipped out to various places way out of town where the hungry bears can find what they need. The receding Sea Ice is impacting very badly on these animals and as such they are hungry because they can no longer hunt seals and as such are becoming dangerous to human settlements. There is no longer reinforcement in their searching through towns. Human behaviour is shaped in the training process.

Trainers are called out to extreme locations where such problems are happening in order to save the wild animals. One project in the Amazon Rain forest has been to train troops of rare wild monkeys to scream when they see humans approaching. By setting trigger traps where a life sized Human cut out springs up alongside a recording of their alarm call, trainers have taught the monkeys to jointly scream and hit the tree canopy at sight of a human. This saves these endangered monkeys from the poachers (Chinese medicine pays highly for some body part)

and the screaming alerts the Rangers of the whereabouts of the poachers. Win, win!

In 2010 a team of military and police dogs were trained in real emergency timing (in a matter of days not weeks) to sniff out 5 different types of highly endangered sea turtle eggs, about to hatch onto oil polluted beaches in the Gulf of Mexico. Amazing training considering they only had a month from start of training to finding the buried nests. Volunteers then carefully dug them out, packed them individually and flew them to a specially modified, temperature controlled hanger at NASA. Once hatched they were released elsewhere. 29,000 eggs were found is 3 days of sniffing compared with 6000 found by over 200 volunteers on foot over the 3 weeks prior. The power of the canine olfactory system is amazing. Ken Remirez is to thank for this amazing feat.

Dogs trained in Manchester are now out in the bush in Africa sniffing out carcasses of endangered animals poached from the forests for body parts for the well-paid and illegal Chinese medicine demand. Road blocks are set up and the dogs work round vehicles exactly the same way as drug/explosive seeking. The cadavers of the highly endangered species are hidden deep inside heaps of other legal bush meat cadavers. Dogs really are amazing!

Zoo's themselves provide test centres for tracking eqi pment to be used in the wild in conservation projects and provide invaluable information in understanding blood health and normal hormone levels in various species so that comparisons can be made in the wild. Researchers are monitoring how wild species are coping with pollution levels in their various habitats so the information gained from Zoos internationally is critically important. All the Zoo species are trained for voluntary participation in veterinary procedures like blood draws, temperature taking, scanning and measurements made. They are always free to leave. They choose to stay because they are given, and have, ultimate control. This training is amazing and all built incrementally on clicker training and systematic desensitisation..s haping and rewarding behaviour with high reinforcement. It is brilliant to watch an Elephant, Gorilla, Sea lion, Crocodile or Hippo for instance, move into a stationing point on recall and allow veterinary procedures like injections, blood draws, dental examinations, skin scrapes, clipping and scanning to name but a few, to take place while remaining calm, motionless and wholly participating. Absolutely no force used at all with the animal receiving high food rewards at the end.... wages!

The keepers, trainers, vets and staff internationally are to be congratulated. This same training for participation is exactly the same as I use with my horses. Any animal can be and should be trained with patience, kindness, knowledge and understanding with the power of choice and high reward as the key elements.

Parents urged to apply early to buy school bus passes

Parents in the East Riding are being urged to apply for school transport passes as soon as possible – to increase their chances of securing a seat for their child.

For school pupils and sixth form students not entitled to free school transport, parents can fill in an application form to buy a travel pass from East Riding of Yorkshire Council, which will then put their child on a waiting list

Once all seats have been filled by students eligible for free transport, the remaining seats will then be allocated to those who have applied to buy a travel pass, on a priority basis.

Applications received after Sunday 31 July will be allocated on a first come, first served basis.

Parents can apply now for a travel pass by visiting the website <u>www.eastriding.gov.uk/schoolstransport</u> and completing an online form.

Travel passes will be allocated from I August and most will be posted out by the start of the autumn term in September.

Students who may be planning to go on to sixth form for the first time, but are waiting for their exam results, are being urged to apply for travel passes now to get on the waiting list, as applications can be easily cancelled if they are not eventually needed.

The council's school transport team handles thousands of applications every summer for both free and paid-for bus passes.



"So we would encourage parents to get their bus pass applications in now to avoid disappointment in September."

Natural methods for insect bites

hen temperatures are warm and everyone is spending more time outside sunscreen and sun hats are not the only things we need to protect ourselves.

Insects are a reality of the summer season that we would rather do without but must learn to cope with. What you need is some natural remedies and good old fashioned cures from the cupboards that can take the itchiness and the redness out of the skin when an insect sets his sights on you.

To combat the itchiness that can drive you crazy look no further than common everyday products that you have in your kitchen. Rub lemon juice on the bite to stop the urge to scratch right away. Lemons are also effective types of disinfectants that can kill bacteria on your skin and can also prevent your skin from becoming infected.

Apple cider vinegar can make the itching go away fairly qi ckly as can combining salt and water and then applying it to the bite. Yet another natural method that works like a charm and will get rid of the itching is mixing baking soda with water. Whip it up until it turns into a paste and then directly apply it to the area that is red and itchy. Before long the desire to scratch will be gone!

Did you know that toothpaste is an alternative remedy for the itch that accompanies insect bites? It is. In fact if you like minty toothpaste then that is great because it is more effective than the regular type of toothpaste.

Why minty toothpaste for the itch of mosqi to bites? The skin receptors you have send signals to the brain. For instance there are signals for heat, cold and itchiness. Most of the receptors that the skin has are only capable of processing one signal at a time and not a number of them all at once. The cooling element that the mint toothpaste brings to the skin is able to neutralize the itch of the bite because it is stronger and is able to override the signal for itch!

If you have some pure aloe gel (or an aloe plant) on hand to cope with sunburned skin then you can also use it to take the itchiness out of bites from pesky mosqi toes. In fact any product that contains aloe can be of help to you.

If all else fails and you are still scratching then head to the local chemist to pick up the popular staples for skin itch-calamine lotion and hydrocortisone cream. Now you can kiss the itch goodbye and go back to enjoying your summer!
