

Skidby Village Hall Celebrates its 80th

Anniversary

n the early 1920's attendance at village entertainments increased and it became difficult to accommodate everyone in the small village schoolroom. Plans to build a 'Parish Hall' for the residents of Skidby began on 15th January 1924, when a provisional committee was set up to explore ways of raising money. Within a month Mr Benjamin Thompson (Mill owner) had purchased a field behind the existing Reading Room, opposite St. Michael's Church. At a public meeting on 1st February 1924, he announced that we would give this land to the newly formed General Management Committee, which consisted of 36 village residents.

Over the next few years a vigorous fund-raising campaign was planned. This included Whist Drives, Jumble Sales, Dances, Concerts, Fancy Dress Balls and Childrenis Carnivals. Perhaps the grandest function was a Garden Fete held in the grounds of Browsholme on 21st June 1924, by kind permission of the owner Captain Harry Samman.

The building contract was awarded to A.E.Stephenson of Dunswell for the sum of £1,181. The work involved extensive renovation of the former Reading Room and the construction of the new hall, kitchen, cloakroom, dairy, copper house and ladies lavatory. Building work was completed by June 1928.

Dr Thomas Catherick Jackson LLD, performed the grand opening ceremony on Thursday 25th October 1928, assisted by Sir Harry Samman Bart, Revíd. William. Armstrong. Gates (Vicar), Revid. W.L.Hann (Wesleyan Minister) and Mr. Benjamin Thompson (Chairman). Skidby School children under the supervision of their Headteacher Miss Tate provided entertainment. This was followed by a Public Tea at 5pm (Adults 1 shilling and children six pence). In the evening there was a Whist Drive and dance led by G.Ashton and his Jazz Band.

The present Management Committee organised an 80th Anniversary Coffee Morning to celebrate the contribution made by the Village Hall to the life and community of Skidby.

Finance Committee Report

Cllr Abel reported on finance matters since 16th October 2008, all councillors had received a copy of the budget recommended by the Finance Committee and voted unanimously to approve the budget for the financial year to 31st March 2010 at £193148 with a precept request of £112150.

An S137 grant application had been received from the West End Cottingham Christmas Lights Organisation which, if not dealt with at the Parish Council meeting could not be heard by the Finance Committee until January 2009. It was therefore decided that Council would make a decision on the application at this meeting. After a discussion and show of hands it was unanimously resolved that the Council, in accordance with the powers under section 137 of the Local Government Act 1972, should incur the following expenditure, which in the opinion of the Council, is in the interests of the area and/or its inhabitants and will benefit them in a manner commensurate with the expenditure. The Council made an award of £1500 which was the same amount previously agreed and granted to the Hallgate Christmas Lights Organisation.

The Parish Council would like to pass on its thanks and appreciation for the efforts of all volunteers who give up their own time to make Cottingham so spectacular at Christmas time. It is their hard work and commitment that means we can all enjoy the magical beauty that is Cottingham Lights at Christmas. Thank you all.

Increased vandalism at Allotment sites

Cllr Hardwick reported on all allotment matters since 16th October 2008

Sadly yet another lock has been vandalised at the site; the Clerk was asked to report this to the Police. Cllr Cooper will approach the Neighbourhood Action Team at its next meeting with a view to providing funds to replace the lock. Cllr Casson stated there was a dissolving agent available which acts on superglue, he would investigate a source for supply and cost and pass this information to the Clerk.

Cllr Hardwick, Cllr Cooper and allotments representatives had previously met to discuss the installation of a CCTV camera at the entrance to the allotments which would connect to the system at KGV. This proposal is being progressed at the present time and Cllr Cooper has asked for a costing from the CCTV contractor.

Capital Projects

Tree Planting – Cllr Hardwick and the Clerk had identified site for 18 trees and a schedule had been sent to Michael Brown (ERYC Tree Officer) for approval. The Chairman thanked Cllr Hardwick and the Clerk.

Cllr Hardwick asked councillors to look out for ponies tethered to the side of the road on Harland Way. The ponies have eaten the bark from one of the trees planted last year which has killed the tree. Councillors should report any ponies tethered in this area to the Local Policing Team. Cllr Leatham asked if the ERYC will be planting a tree to replace the tree that fell down last year in West Green.

The Deputy Clerk had met with David Linfoot and referred to a document (previously circulated Cottingham leaflet and map) giving details of the costs associated with renewing this very useful and popular publication. After discussion it was unanimously agreed that the leaflet and map be reprinted in accordance with the document presented by the deputy Clerk i.e. maps for the notice boards and 30000 leaflets.

Office Closure Christmas Period

The Parish Council Office will be closed on Christmas day and Boxing Day.

Any Other Business

Mr Atkinson (conservation officer for the ERYC) will be attending the January Parish Council meeting to discuss the re-appraisal of the Cottingham Conservation Area.


Cottingham Cricket Club -Annual General Meeting held at the Hilltop Club





Sail on the Wind with the Windmill Walking Club



Countdown to Christmas

lthough Christmas Day falls on a Thursday this year, you will have plenty of time during Christmas week to get everything you need -but don't forget to pay special attention to sell-by dates.

Same old Story?

Fancy a change this year? There are so many wonderful alternatives. How about a traditional roast goose or venison? And what if you're catering for vegetarians? For help in choosing what to have for Christmas Dinner try asking our local butchers Pullans and Tim May they will be more than willing to give advice about how to cook your Christmas Fayre.

Mince Pies

Mince Pies have become a firm tradition at Christmas for many of us, and with vegetarian varieties of mincemeat now available, they can be enjoyed by everyone, as can the numerous other recipes using this old ingredient.

History

Traditionally mince pies contained meat. In the 11th Century, Crusaders returning from the Holy Land brought with them various spices including cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg. These were added to minced meat and other ingredients to symbolise the three gifts given to Jesus by the three kings (the magi). To further celebrate the birth of Christ, the pies were originally made in large oblong shapes which represented his cradle.

Over the years, the pies grew smaller, the shape of the pie was gradually changed from oblong to round possibly to disguise their significance due to the edicts of Oliver Cromwell (Lord Protector of England from 1649 until 1658). Being a puritan, he disapproved of the Christmas celebrations of the time seeing them as a pagan holiday which encouraged drunkenness and gluttony. He actually banned Christmas celebrations and the cooking of Christmas foods including mince pies. Thankfully for us, King Charles II restored Christmas celebrations to their former glory when he ascended the throne in 1660.

Over the years the meat content became smaller and smaller until the pies were eventually made with a filling of dried fruit, nuts, spices and suet.

About Suet

Suet is the dense fat which surrounds beef kidneys. Unprocessed suet is now difficult to obtain, as many butchers no longer get the kidneys in tact but shredded suet is easily purchased in packets and this is the type of suet most recipes call for. It's now even possible to purchase vegetarian suet. Suet is a traditional ingredient used for both sweet and savoury steamed puddings and is used in the making of mincemeat. It is also sometimes used to feed birds!

This is a recipe for basic mince pies but you can make them even more festive by cutting the top pastry crusts into shapes such as Christmas trees, reindeers and snowmen. Don't worry about the filling drying out....it won't.

Ingredients:

225g/8oz Shortcrust Pastry

225g/8oz Mincemeat

3 tbsp Brandy

6 tbsp Milk

2 tbsp Caster Sugar

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200C, 400F, Gas mark 6 and very lightly grease 2-3 bun
- 2. On a floured surface, roll out 3/4 of the pastry to approximately 6mm/1/4 inch thickness then cut 12 rounds out with a 6cm/2 1/2 inch cutter.
- 3. Use these rounds to line the bun travs.
- 4 In a bowl mix together the mincemeat and brandy until well blended
- 5. Divide the mincemeat between the pastry shells, pressing down lightly.
- 6. Roll out the remaining pastry and using a 5cm/2inch pastry cutter, cut out 12 circles for the tops of the pies.
- 7. Place the milk in a shallow bowl and dip the smaller pastry circles in the milk and cover each of the filled pies with a top. Use a fork to press the edges of each pie firmly together to seal then sprinkle with a little caster sugar.
- 8. Bake in the oven for 20 minutes until golden.

Serve hot or cold as a dessert with cream, custard or Brandy Butter.

White Chocolate Truffles

Ingredients - Makes 24

225g/8oz Good Quality White Chocolate

50g/2oz Butter

50g/2oz Icing Sugar

1 teasp Almond Extract

1 Egg Yolk

75g/3oz Chopped Almonds, lightly toasted

Icing Sugar



- 1. Break the chocolate into small pieces and place in a heat proof bowl together with the butter. Place the bowl over a saucepan of very hot water and stir
- 2. Remove from heat. Add the sugar, egg yolk and almond extract and beat with an electric mixer until smooth
- 3. Transfer to a shallow dish, cover and leave to cool until the mixture has set enough to roll into balls.
- 4. Dust your hands lightly with icing sugar then shape mixture into 2.5cm/1 inch balls. Roll each ball in the chopped almonds and place on a flat tray which has been dusted with icing sugar. Cover loosely with clingfilm and refrigerate at least 8 hours. Serve at room temperature.

Illustrated talk held on the History of the Hull and Barnsley Railway at the **Cottingham Civic Society**

n 20th November Brian Crowther's illustrated talk on the history, route and construction of the Hull and Barnsley Railway was well-attended, particularly by a substantial number of guest railway enthusiasts who found much to refresh their recollection of what was the last substantial railway to be built in this country.

Dubbed the "railway that should never have been built" by its great rival the North Eastern Railway, it was opened in 1885 and ran the 53 miles from Cudworth to the Oueen Alexandra Dock in Hull, being later extended to King George Dock in the 20th century when the rivalry between the two companies had abated somewhat.

The railway's initial purpose was to provide a cost-effective coal transport link to Hull docks as an alternative to the NER's network of an earlier date which served Hartlepool. Passenger transport was not neglected however. The Hull and Barnsley had a "main line" character which is evidenced by photographs of the well-staffed and well-built station facilities at Howden and Little Weighton for example.

As a "duplicate railway" it proved expensive to build, having to avoid the rival network by means of several tunnels, large embankments and many bridges. In addition, the engines and rolling stock were all bought in.

However, as Brian was keen to point out, once purchased everything was well cared for and maintained with diligence at the Springhead Coachworks which featured in many of the photographs on view.

While the H&B was late in the day in terms of 19th century railway development it could lay claim to being first in a number of ways. It was the first to maintain a detailed pictorial record of the line's construction. Other "firsts" were the use of steam navvies and pneumatic drills in its building, electric lighting, and joint management/workers consultative committees.

As one would perhaps have expected the engines were the stars of the show, both on the rails and, occasionally, de-railed! We all appreciated Brian's intimate knowledge of the line's history and the stories he could tell.

Merry Christmas **But Don't Forget Your Pets**

s the excitement of Christmas descends we must not forget our pets and I don't mean buying presents, but remember to them Christmas can be a stressful and confusing time as all routine goes out of the window!

If like me, you enjoy your food around Christmas, and then are very careful what your pets may be eating. I remember as a child my mother would always feed the turkey giblets to Tammy, our cocker spaniel. Without fail as soon as you would be sitting down for Christmas dinner Tammy would start to vomit and explode out the other end as the rich giblets disagreed with her. The strange thing is the selective amnesia of my parents who would do exactly the same thing the next year! So, be very careful with rich foods which your pets will not be used to.

Some foods however do more than just upset your pets stomach and can be very toxic even fatal! Chocolate, especially dark chocolate, contains theophyllines, which affect the heart causing an irregular heart beat and can be fatal to dogs. Every year at Christmas time we end up treating dogs with chocolate toxicity, so please keep all chocolate well out of reach of your pets and remember some of those wrapped up presents under the tree may contain chocolate and the dog will soon sniff out which one.



Not as commonly known is that grapes, currants and raisins even in small amounts can cause renal (kidney) failure in dogs and cats. It can take as few as four grapes to cause fatal kidney failure! Interestingly no one knows the precise toxin responsible.

My wife is very keen on decorating the house with plants at Christmas, but is she aware of how dangerous these can be to our pets. Poinsettias, mistletoe, holly berries, yew, spider plants and lily pollen are all very toxic animals, so keep them out of reach. I hope the wife reads this!

While I'm writing this my daughter, Alice, pipes up "Don't forget about keeping the Christmas tree baubles well out of the way as they can be very sharp if they shatter and watch out for the needles falling off the tree and getting stuck in the dog's paws."

Every year at work we have a competition as to the most unusual object we have to remove from an animal's bowels as dog are very good at chewing up the Christmas presents, so make sure the kids tidy

Christmas is also a time for families to get together and this can often end up being a very noisy and excitable time. Not all our pets appreciate this, so make sure they can go somewhere quiet to chill out.

Fireworks are also now very popular at Christmas and New Year, so don't be caught out if your pet is frightened by them. Ask your veterinary surgeon for advice.

So I hope you all have a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year, but don't forget your pets.

The Chancellor's Budget announcement explained

Changes to VAT

The standard rate of VAT will be reduced by 2.5% from 17.5% to 15% on 1 December 2008. This new rate will apply until 31 December 2009, when it will revert to 17.5%. Only standard-rated sales are affected. There are no changes to sales that are zero-rated or reduced-rated for VAT. Similarly, there are no changes to the VAT exemptions.

Business Payment Support Service

The Chancellor announced that from 24 November 2008, HMRC have introduced a new, dedicated Business Support Service designed to meet the needs of businesses affected by the current economic conditions. This will provide specific help where customers are worried about being able to pay tax, National Insurance or other payments owed to HM Revenue & Customs.

Personal Tax, Child Benefit, Tax Credit and National Insurance changes

The child benefit increases brought forward to 5th January 2009 instead of April.

The personal tax allowance increases to £6475, and the basic rate tax limit to £37,400 from April 2009.

Basic Personal allowance for individuals with income over £100,000 to be reduced from April 2010.

A new tax rate of 45% on income over £150,000 from April 2011 Class1 and Class 4 NICs to be increased by 0.5% from April 2011.

Excise Duty Changes

The duty on alcoholic drinks will be increased by 8% with effect from Monday 1 December 2008.

The duty on tobacco products will be increased by 4% with effect from 6pm on Monday 24 November 2008

The fuel duty rates for 2008 introduced in the Finance Act 2008 will be reinstated with effect from 1 December 2008

Business Tax Changes

The planned increase in the Small Company Rate from 21% to 22% from 1 April 2009 has been deferred until 1 April 2010.

The loss carry back rules are to be extended, for CT accounts ending between 24/11/08 & 23/11/09 and IT accounts ending in 2008/09, by allowing the loss carry back to three years. The amount to be carried back under the new provision is capped at £50,000.


A package of reforms to the taxation of corporate foreign profits, including the introduction of an exemption for foreign dividends will be in Finance Bill 2009.






Here is Paul's tenth walk in his monthly column. This month his destination is Cottingham Parks.

Start at GR. 051327 Cottingham Railway Station.

Distance 5.0 Miles.



eave the station car park and turn left to walk alongside the track in a northerly direction to reach Northgate. Turn left and then cross the road at a safe point and locate Mill Beck Lane (not to be confused with Mill House Woods Lane) Turn right into Mill Beck Lane to the junction with Lawson Avenue. At this point locate a path alongside the beck and follow this to emerge at playing fields. Walk across this field with the hedge on your right and head for a group of trees, cross a footbridge into a second field and continue in a northerly direction. Eventually this path doubles back to the right to reach a footbridge. Cross this footbridge and immediately turn left to reach a road leading to the power station. Turn right on reaching this road and walk towards the power station. On nearing the perimeter fence, turn left and follow the surfaced road round the power station.

Take the farm road on the left and pass between fields of stored caravans and follow this road as it twists its way to Poplar Farm. On reaching the farm turn left and locate a path on the left and continue on this path heading south with the hedge on your right.

Follow this path to Burn Park Farm. On reaching the farm walk along the farm road heading towards Cottingham passing Burn Park Cottages and several Market Gardens.

This road eventually meets Northgate where turning left leads back to the Railway Station car park.

In the Garden



Christmas house Plants

ost flowering houseplants will last longer if kept cool, such as a constant 10-15C (50-60F), but always avoid chills at night (most common if plants are displayed on windowsills) and excessive warmth from central heating. Water plants by standing the pot in a few centimetres of water, remove and allow to drain before replacing the pot in its flowering position.

Cyclamen

With care, cyclamen will bloom for several months and will flower again in future years. Buy a plant with plenty of buds showing under the foliage and avoid any plants with drooping or yellow leaves. Choose a brightly lit situation away from direct sunlight and heat sources. Occasional drying out of the compost is less harmful than overwatering.





Poinsettia

Position plants in bright conditions, water thoroughly once the surface of the compost begins to dry out. Avoid chills and draughts as poinsettias need warmth and are probably the best choice in homes with central heating.

Azalea

Azalea - This half-hardy species will grow to between 20 and 45cm (8-18in) high. They usually flower in spring but are forced into early flower for the Christmas trade and need similar growing conditions to outdoor azaleas - cool, moist and shady. If the compost dries out the plant will almost certainly die. Water by plunging the pot into a deep container of tepid water (preferably rainwater) until bubbles cease to appear, drain and place in the potholder or on a pebble tray to maintain humidity. A sunny windowsill during winter is ideal.



Christmas trees hate the warm, dry atmosphere of our homes so only bring indoors for a maximum of 12-15 days. Position in a cool room or at least away from direct heat. Using anti-transpirant sprays such as Spray 'n' Save will also prolong the display.

history of the Christmas wreath

The hanging of evergreen wreaths at the entrance to our homes is a long-established way of welcoming visitors at Christmas.

Steeped in ancient symbolism, evergreens were believed to possess powers of eternal life. Branches were exchanged as gifts and givers believed they were bestowing health and wellbeing upon the recipient.

To make them more decorative, these evergreen branches were formed into rings or wreaths.

The best berries to use are those of the tree forms of cotoneaster, such as C. 'Cornubia', or hollies. They last far longer than pyracantha, sorbus or skimmia. A glue gun may be helpful.

Try to use natural materials – they look far better than synthetic ones. Add your own bits and pieces to make it unique.



A Cup of Cocoa on **Christmas Eve**

left Cottingham Hallgate Boy's School in the October half-term week of 1946 - this was fondly known as 'spud picking' week Lebecause a lot of boys went on to local farms and helped with

An uncle got me a job with an engineering firm in Hull's old town and I became an apprentice at the Vulcan Ship Repairing and Engineering Co. in Blanket Row.

Bottom rung of the ladder

Most young apprentices started at the bottom of the ladder - I seemed to stay there a long time - and were merely 'gophers' go for this or go for that; fibre washers from Binghams in Queen Street, or valves from Danbys in Dock Street, or nuts and bolts from F. R. Scott in Castle Street over Mytongate Bridge and so on, but very often I sallied forth with the hand cart with its centre pole and ironrimmed wheels, loaded with tools and various bits of engine to jobs on the docks where the time served fitters would be overhauling or repairing a ships engines, or with a load of brass and copper piping for a laundry down Southcoates Lane or Wellsted Street, or a large propeller lowered by block and tackle on to the cart.

The weight had to be distributed evenly above the two wheels or either I could not lift the pole off the ground, or I was shot up into the air grasping it, like an ejected jet fighter pilot!. Being a skinny lad did not help matters.

Siberian Blast Hits Hull

It was Christmas Eve, Tuesday December 24th 1946. The atrocious winter had not started yet but there had been two very cold spells that month. On 16th a headline in the Hull Daily Mail read, "Siberian blast hits Hull" with three degrees of frost and an electricity cut at 10.15am "After all, it is December and such temperatures are not exceptional. Colder conditions are on the way." Very prophetic. On the 18th "Britain awoke to a land of white fields and roads caused by widespread frost." Christmas Eve dawned very frosty and very foggy - fog in these days of smokey domestic and industrial chimneys was something to be remembered; it lasted for days, cold, wet, clinging and choking.

Waves of strikes by transport workers and others made life difficult in an already difficult time of shortages just after the war. Rationing was still with us - not only for households but for industry too. "Peter!!" the Gaffer roared above the noisy clatter of machinery in the workshops. His office was up some iron steps attached to the outside of the building but an opening office window allowed communication with the workshop beneath. I abandoned my sweeping brush and hurried outside and up the steps - a one-time Engineer Commander in the Royal Navy, the Gaffer was not a man to be kept waiting.

"Take the cart and be sharp about it"

"Take the cart and get yourself round to Smiths for some iron and steel - he's just had a delivery, and look sharp about it."

So, away to the top of Blanket Row and turn right on to Princess Dock Side taking care not to get the hand cart wheels stuck in the sunken railway lines along there, left over Monument Bridge past Finleys Tobacconists and the wet fish shop, Ferens Art Gallery and the Punch Hotel and left into Waterhouse Lane with Willis' shop on the opposite corner. A pair of huge wooden gates gave access to that part of the Princes Dock where the engineering firms of Amos and Smith and Charles D. Holmes were always busy refurbishing trawlers tied up there bow first, where the incessant sounds of hammering and the drone of the welding machines added to the cacophony of the noise on the dock side, on the various ships loading and unloading, and on the roads outside.

The firm of "Arthur M Smith Iron and Steel Stockholder" was just inside the gates - a low building, its open doors revealed long racks in which were slotted some lengths of iron and steel bars. Young Mr Smith had recently been de-mobbed from the R.A.F., and was back working for his father. I gave him the order form from the Gaffer and he selected the lengths of flat and round iron bars and some very scarce high tensile round steel and we loaded the cart together.

Dickensian Office

"You look cold," he remarked. I certainly felt cold; my tatty gloves were sodden and one boot let water in and the freezing fog clinging to my face and clothes and seemed to penetrate to my bones! "Come on up to the office and Dad will give you an invoice to take back as well."

This office too was up some outside stairs and I stepped into a room which I can only describe as Dickensian, with heavy old desks and filing cabinets. A fire burned in the large old grate and a kettle simmered on a gas ring.

Mr. Smith senior was a tall grey haired man. The winged collar, black tie and dark suit with the watch chain across the waistcoat seemed to belong to another era. "Sit down young man and have a mug of cocoa," Mr Smith invited - nay - ordered. I protested that the Gaffer would be angry if I was too long but Mr Smith replied. "you leave Harry Hall to me, I'll telephone him later. You look all in."

Steaming mug of Cocoa

I did feel faint coming out of the cold and into the warm room. Mr Smith produced a packet of Fry's cocoa from a cupboard, a glass jar with sugar in and a bottle of milk. I watched as he mixed the contents in the mug and added the hot water, stirring it gently as he looked at me. "Here boy, get this down you," and he smiled kindly and passed me the mug of steaming cocoa.

Never, never, before nor since, has a mug of cocoa tasted so good! Feeling gradually returned to my hands and feet and the freezing fog dripped from my coat. Eventually, I stood up and thanked him and said that I must be off. "Merry Christmas," he said and gave me five shillings - two half-crowns actually, twenty five pence in today's money but a lot then, when my weekly wage was one pound seven shillings.

I trundled the hand cart back the same way, dodging lorries, horse rullies, cars, cyclists plus a light railway engine and trucks which had appeared on Princess Dock Side, the iron and steel bars protruding from the front and back of the hand cart rattling away in spite of being roped down, as I pushed along over the stone sets of the dock side and Blanket Row.

A Merry Christmas and a Ten Bob Note!

The Gaffer did not complain when I got back - Mr Smith must have 'phoned him as promised'. Instead, I got a ten shilling note and a hearty "Merry Christmas" - two Father Christmas's in one day!

I was doing some shopping in the City recently and retraced that route; no Waterhouse Lane now, the Princes Quay shopping mall has wrapped itself around that section of the dock but it is possible still to see the berth for the trawlers on the left hand side of the Mall approached from the Punch Hotel, a narrow stretch of water ends at the dock wall and the huge iron bollards remain where the trawlers were secured, though the old buildings are long gone. I remembered how it used to be and the kindly Mr Smith who provided a skinny, frozen young teenager with the best mug of cocoa ever and five shillings on the Christmas Eve in 1946.






