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indows 7 has been around for over a month now, with no major problems and feedback is all positive. This is probably as a result of an exhaustive testing procedure before launch, with millions of users testing it and reporting back, and that seems to have paid off. So what's good about this latest version on Windows? Well graphically it does look superb, especially on a new flat screen, and as mentioned previously they have improved the memory management a great deal, meaning it is quicker to start and shut down, and more importantly is much more responsive in use. Some of the nice features that appeared in Vista, like the Aero Desktop and thumbnails of open windows on the taskbar have been tweaked, and a good addition is called Snap, where you can lock two windows side by side and compare, and even type in one without the other disappearing.

Despite what was announced previously, Internet Explorer is included, as in all previous versions, but the main thing missing is an email application - no Outlook Express or Windows Mail. This means downloading an alternative like Live Mail or Incredimail. However if you only use an online email service like Hotmail, Yahoo or GoogleMail, you won't need anything

So should you go for it? Well yes, if you are buying a new computer then you will probably get it anyway. If you presently have Vista, Windows 7 looks almost identical, but is more polished and does have some useful additions and performs so much better. Upgrading is a good idea if your computer is only a year or two old; any older and you are probably better waiting until you are in the market for a new one. Just give us a call for further advice.

There have been reports saying Microsoft based a lot of the new enhancements on the Mac operating system. For those not familiar, Mac OSX is the operating system that makes Apple Mac computers work. In fact they launched their latest version a few months ago. Those who use a Mac tend to be quiteand would never use anything else. It is different to Windows in many respects, but is still a point and click system, based on icons etc. Macs it has to be said are very aesthetically pleasing, encased in their trademark shiny white or aluminium casings, which you do pay a premium for. Do you go for a Windows Pc or an Apple Mac? Well the jury is still out on that one. In terms of numbers, Mac has only about a 10% share of the computer market worldwide, but an extremely faithful following. If you've never used a PC before then it would be easy to pick up a Mac, but if you've always used Windows you would find it a bit of a learning curve to change.

Google Chrome is my favourite web browser at the moment, if you haven't tried it yet, get it free from the Google website. It is very easy to use and is very customisable. Taking it one step further, the search giant intends to launch a whole operating system based on Chrome next year. This will be in direct competition to Windows and Mac, and will at first be loaded onto netbooks designed mainly for internet use. The thinking behind it, as I've mentioned in this column before, is that in the near future all you will need is just means of getting online, and the Chrome OS will fulfil that.

Do you do any online shopping? There's a good chance you have, as a recent survey suggests that a staggering 90% of computer users will shop online for this Christmas. If you haven't, now is the time to try, with everyone looking for a bargain, there are certainly lots of money saving items available online. Many of the big names offer bigger discounts than instore, and often will let online shoppers get a head start a day before cut prices appear on the high street. You can normally use your loyalty card to collect points and even money-off coupons if they have an online promotion code. Often vou'll get free delivery too for a minimum spend. And of course it beats fighting your way through the crowds in town. For tips on using your credit card online see: www.shopsafeonline.org.uk

Security is the key to doing anything online of course, so make sure you have up to date anti virus/anti spyware protection, and that your firewall is turned on (in Control Panel, Windows Firewall). The other key element is to ensure you have all the latest Windows security updates, these are not optional. You should have updates turned on to automatic (again shown in Control Panel). If you are not sure go to the top of your Programs menu and click on Windows Update. This will go online and check if you need anything else. Other updates appearing from other companies recently that you should accept are: Java, Adobe Reader, and Flash Player, these are quite safe to do.

If you thought the dreaded computer virus was a relatively new and unwelcome phenomena, news broke this week that the first virus was written 26 years ago! A Dr Fred Cohen announced on the BBC World Service that he was studying computers in California back in the 1980's when he discovered that malicious code could reproduce itself across a computer's programs after being introduced via a 'trojan horse'. He never released the code for fear it would be copied and used, but he published his findings, and the rest is history - unfortunately!

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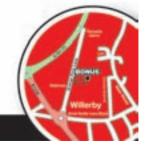




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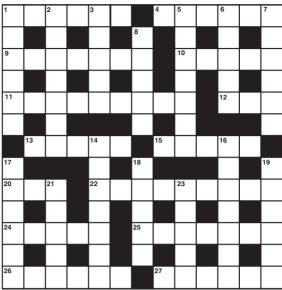

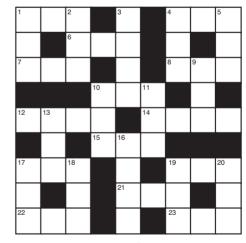

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In the Kitchen



How to prepare a turkey

If you have bought a frozen bird do make sure it is well defrosted first. Check by putting your hand inside the body cavity to see if there are any ice crystals left. Smaller turkeys (up to 7 kg) take about 24 hours to defrost in a cool place (around 18 °C), larger birds up to 48 hours.

If possible, remove it from the plastic packaging and re-wrap in aluminium foil as the plastic tends to make the bird "sweat".

Make sure you remove the giblets (if present) from the cavity and neck areas and wash the bird inside and out under cold running water. Don't stuff the body cavity. Instead lift the neck flap and press your stuffing up against the wishbone, replacing the flap of skin and securing with metal skewers, wooden toothpicks or sewing up with a needle and thread. Any remaining stuffing can be placed in a well greased shallow baking tin or made into balls then covered with foil and cooked separately.

For extra flavour place half an onion and/or half an orange in the body cavity (both with the skins still in tact) and pour some medium/sweet sherry all over the bird before placing in the oven. The resulting juices are a good addition to the gravy.

For a tasty and attractive finish, sprinkle the turkey with ground paprika and crushed thyme or dried mixed herbs before cooking and don't forget to season all over the bird with salt and pepper.

Before placing in the oven, smear the breasts with plenty of softened butter and protect with foil. Better still, cover the breasts and legs with LOTS of streaky bacon secured with wooden toothpicks then cover loosely with foil until the last 45 minutes of the cooking time.

Turkey Quantities and Roasting Times

Allow 20-25 minutes per lb (50-55 minutes per kg) plus and extra 20 minutes at 180C, 350F, Gas Mark 4 and remember to include the stuffing weight when calculating the timing. Some say to start it off breast side down which isn't a bad idea as the

cooking juices flow downwards into the breast helping to keep it moist. If you are going to use this method, don't smear the breasts with butter at the start as it will just melt and run into the roasting tin. Use the streaky bacon method below instead and still cover loosely with foil. It should be noted that very good results are still achieved just roasting the bird on its back for the entire cooking time.

Approximate cooking times (make adjustments to suit your own oven in particular for fan assisted ovens):-Servings are approximate and sufficient to have leftovers

- 2.7kg/6 lb (serves 4+)
- 2 hours 50 minutes (plus 20 minutes resting)
- 4.5kg/ 10 lb (serves 6+)
- 4 hours 30minutes (plus 20 minutes resting)
- 5.4kg/ 12 lb (serves 8+)
- 5 hours 20 minutes (plus 20 minutes resting)
- 6.8kg/15 lb (serves 10+)
- 6 hours 35 minutes (plus 20 minutes resting)
- 8.1kg/ 18 lb (serves 12+
- 7 hours 50 minutes (plus 20 minutes resting)
- 9.4kg/21 lb(serves 14+)
- 9 hours (plus 20 minutes resting)

If using the above method, half way through the cooking time, turn the bird onto its back, baste well with the cooking juices, then re-cover loosely with foil before returning it to the oven. If you feel so inclined, you can baste the bird every 1-2 hours, however if you use the foil method, basting 3-4 times during cooking is sufficient.

About 45 minutes before the end of the cooking time, remove the foil (and bacon if you prefer), baste with the cooking juices and continue to roast. This will allow plenty of time for the bird to brown.

Check the meat is cooked by parting the skin between the leg and breast. If it is still a little pink then allow an extra 20 minutes on top of your calculated time. When pierced with a skewer at the thickest part of the thigh the juices should run clear not pink.

Before Serving your Christmas Turkey

Transfer the bird to a large serving platter, making sure you drain any juices which will have collected inside the cavity. You can add these juices to the gravy for extra flavour.

Leave the cooked turkey to stand in a warm place for about 20 minutes before carving. This may seem a long time but trust us - just cover it loosely with a foil 'tent' to retain its heat. You'll be surprised how hot it will remain and this resting time makes carving a doddle. This extra time can be used to finish cooking all the accompaniments.

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An Age Concern Information and Advice Service for Cottingham

As people get older they may have worries and concerns about a variety of issues such as their health, housing situation, money, benefits or their ability to access services. Getting help, advice and information about your problems or concerns isn't always easy, especially if you would like to talk to someone face to face rather than over the telephone.

To try and help the older people of the Cottingham area, Age Concern East Riding of Yorkshire has now set up an Information and Advice surgery in Cottingham that will take place weekly on Friday mornings.

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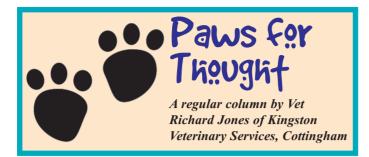












Letters for Christmas

Working breeds bred from show lines may be more suitable as pets. I have a Border Collie (lovely when tired), bred from showing stock. He is pretty energetic, however needing less exercise and entertainment than a farm collie with generations of dogs for whom a 20 mile run is a mere walk in the park.

Our receptionist Maggie has a "working" Labrador, who is nicely, tired when doing the job she was bred for, when not working her destructiveness is liable to resurface.

It just remains for me to wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year from all at Kingston Veterinary group.

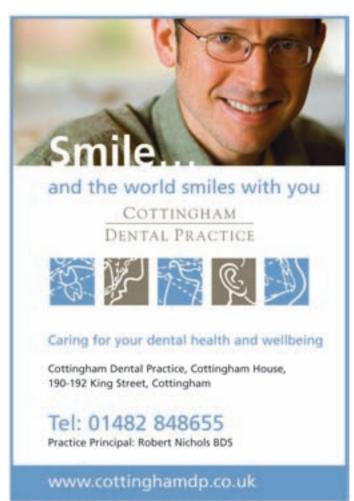

Life Changing Dentistry -Filling The Gaps - Part 1

ello again. I hope you are all well. I know I have mentioned it before but where does the time go? Summer over, kids back to school, Christmas, DONE. I think we've all been over exposed to Gordon Ramsay.

Now That You Are All Relaxed

Over the last few months I have written about some strategies and techniques to help overcome dental anxiety. I have also mentioned a few things in the past about how dentistry can really make a difference and be a life changing experience. The examples given included the improvement of overall health and well being including early detection and subsequent early treatment of mouth cancer. Also the detection, treatment and prevention of gum disease that has been linked with cardiovascular disease, low birth weight babies and even sterility. Not to mention the relief from chronic toothache.

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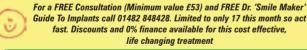


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Filling In The Gaps And Then Something Different

A major way of improving your quality of life if you have missing teeth is to fill in the gaps. This can give an enormous boost to your self esteem. There are several ways of replacing missing teeth. Some are more successful than others. Some are more "lookers" than "chewers". With some you can look great and chew great. Options available are dental implants, bridges and dentures.

Now For The Different Bit

You may well be fed up with me rambling on about how absolutely, excellently, superb modern day, 21st century dentistry is and' bigging us up' and patting us on the back. I thought that I would change tack and have a look at some dentistry from the past. Tooth replacement goes way back and some of it is really ingenious.

In 1931 a jaw bone was found in Honduras. It was believed to be the jaw of a Mayan. The Mayas were a very sophisticated ancient society originating in about 2500 B.C. They reached their cultural heights in from about 300 A.D. to about 900 A.D. The find was believed to be from about 600A.D. The jaw has three pieces of shell that had been shaped into a wedge design and been implanted into the lower jaw to replace some missing incisor teeth. Two of the shell implants had evidence of bone growing around them. I doubt that the long term success rates where that great though. Many different types of materials have been used to implant into the jaws to try and replace missing teeth including shell, ivory, bone and teeth from dead and living animals and humans. There was no modern anaesthesia/analgesia back then so a whole lot of hypnotherapy would have been needed. Mind you I don't know what 'herbs' would have been available back then.

A Rooster With A Tooth In It's Comb!

In the 18th century John Hunt, one of the greatest surgeons of his time, performed an experiment. He transplanted a 'living' human tooth whose root had not yet fully developed (i.e. a child's tooth) into the comb of a live cockerel. The blood vessels from the cockerel grew into the tooth and it became firmly rooted into the comb. Now get this bit! Hunter then advocated that when a tooth was to be transplanted into the socket of a missing tooth that there should be several young donors present. If the first tooth extracted from a child donor did not fit the socket, then one from the next donor would be tried and so on until a good fit was achieved. The practice died out after repeated reports of failure and the transmission of disease had been recognised, especially syphilis.

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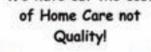


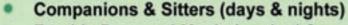


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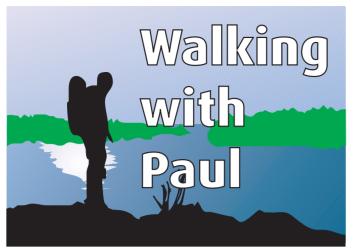
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Here is Paul's latest walk in his series of monthly rambles. This month his destination is North Cliffe

Map: EXPLORER 293 and 291

GR 874370 :: Distance 4.0 Miles.

Start at the east side of the road at North Cliffe on a wide grass verge in front of cottages known as War Agricultural Cottages.

Leave the car park area and walk up the track in an easterly direction keeping No. 1 War Agricultural Cottage on the right. This is an enclosed tarmac track at the start which rises steeply up Cliffe Hill. At the end of the enclosed section, enter a field and continue in the same direction with the hedge on the left. When the hedge ends,

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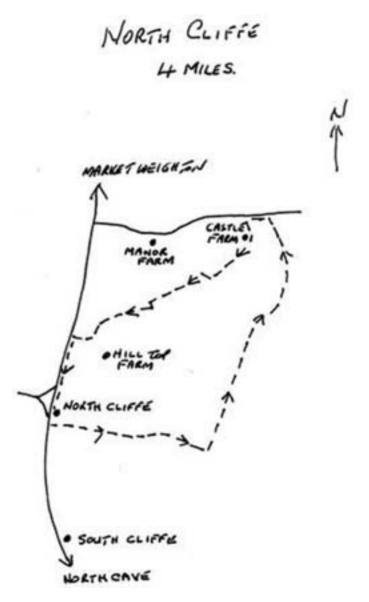
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turn right and follow a field track as it sweeps to the left and continue to enter a wooded area.

At the first major junction, turn left and continue on this track for about one mile until it emerges into a field. Walk with the hedge on the right and cross a stile and pass through two metal gates to enter a boggy area. Cross this area with care and pass through a kissing gate to emerge on a road. Turn left and after a short distance, turn left onto the access road for Castle Farm. Pass through the farm first turning right, then left then right again and pass through a wooden gate to enter a field and follow the track with the hedge on the right.

Walk with the hedge on the right and on reaching a gap in the hedge some 20 metres from a wooded area, pass through the gap and then walk with the hedge on the left to cross over a wooden foot bridge, then turn left and follow the field boundary with the hedge on the left.

When there is a gap in the hedge, pass through and then walk in the same direction but with the hedge on your right. Bear left at the corner of the field and on approaching a wooded area, locate a stile on your right, cross the stile and descend steeply down the bank to cross a stile and emerge on the road. Turn left and follow the road back to North Cliffe.



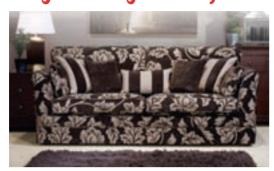
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In the Garden



Houseplants

Reduce watering and feeding of houseplants as the days shorten. Ensure that there is adequate ventilation in the greenhouse or conservatory, perhaps opening vents for an hour or two on milder days to encourage air circulation.

Remember that cacti need very little water, and no feeding, over the winter. Keep them barely moist until the spring, when they will be coming up to flowering and will therefore appreciate extra water and feed.

Clivia benefit similarly from a dormant period over winter, with less watering, feeding, and lower light levels.

Check that light levels are sufficient for houseplants. They will need light to carry on over the winter, and can easily be forgotten in a back or spare room that receives little natural light, or with the curtains left drawn. They are best moved to sunny windowsill until March next year.

Pot up Hippeastrum (amaryllis), and bring them back into active growth with regular watering and feeding. They should give you beautiful flowers for the new year.

If your Christmas cactus (Schlumbergera truncata and S. x buckleyi) failed to set flower buds, it may be that the temperature is too high (above 18°C/65°F), or that the plant is

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Top 10 jobs

- 1 Check your winter protection structures are still securely in place
- 2. Check that greenhouse heaters are working OK
- 3. Prevent ponds and stand pipes from freezing
- 4. Prune open-grown apples and pears (but not those trained against walls)
- 5. Prune acers, birches and vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding
- 6 Harvest leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage, sprouts and remaining root crops
- 7. Deciduous trees and shrubs can still be planted and transplanted
- 8. Take hardwood cuttings
- 9. Keep mice away from stored produce
- 10. Reduce watering of houseplants

receiving light from an artificial light source after dark. Try moving the cactus into cooler conditions or away from night lighting.

Cyclamen persicum (often given as a winter pot plant) appreciates a cool room with good light. It is best watered from below (i.e. into the saucer, not the pot), as wetting the leaves can easily result in fungal infections and rotting off.

Cool conditions and regular watering will help keep potted indoor azaleas looking good for longer. Remember to water azaleas with rainwater collected in a rain butt, not with tap water.

Avoid buying poinsettias that have been accidentally chilled, particularly those sold from street stalls on cold days. Once home, place them in a warm, light place, away from drafts, to ensure they last for as long as possible.

Place hyacinths in a cool, bright place in the home. If it's too warm, the leaves will elongate and the flowers will fade quickly.



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In the Greenhouse

Put up insulating material such as bubble wrap on the inside of the greenhouse, if not already done.

Check that greenhouse heaters are functioning properly. Invest in a maximum-minimum thermometer to enable accurate monitoring of the temperature in your greenhouse.

Clear leaves and twigs from greenhouse and shed gutters. Pest and disease watch

Keep an eye out for overwintering pests such as whitefly or red spider mite and treat accordingly. Nooks and crannies, and the bark of woody houseplants and vines, can harbour mealybugs and scale insect nymphs, for example.

Regularly deadhead winter-flowering plants in the home and greenhouse, to prevent problems with grey mould (Botrytis). Cyclamen are particularly prone to this problem.

Occasionally ventilating the greenhouse or conservatory for an hour or two on mild days will help reduce fungal infections.

This is a good time to clean all your old pots and seed trays, so that they are ready for next spring's flurry of activity. Thorough cleaning will reduce pest and disease problems, and will reduce your propagation and sowing problems.

Regularly pick and sweep up fallen debris to prevent disease appearing and spreading.

Retraining Owners

ndeniably as important as training a horse, is the time, energy and care that myself and my team put into the owners. It is not just the animal that arrives traumatised or damaged but often the owner and or the rider too.

It is true that owners can occasionally and unintentionally allow their horses to develop bad habits. More often though, it is that life throws unexpected, undeserved and confidence ruining accidents and incidents at all of us at times, no matter what walk in life we take.

Partnerships between people and partnerships between animal and owner are no different.

Once trust in the other has gone then the damage is very real, hurtful, saps ones confidence and needs careful thought as far as your future together is concerned.

The owner loves that horse with all their heart, they want to keep the horse but it has to mend its ways and mutual trust with viable expectations must be created. That's where I come in . . . An equine marriage councillor no less!, although I've never quite thought of it in that light before.



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My retraining of any horse is always open to spectators. We do nothing behind closed doors. It is very important that I share as much information as is possible with the owners especially if they cannot always be present.

Distance and work commitments mainly limit the time that they can be actively involved. Hence the time that I do get to share with the owners is very important. All applicable methods are taught and testing the trust by creating scenarios which push the partnership....eg, fear of large traffic and being able to be positive where there had only been fear (on both sides).

Making sure that it is the owner in charge throughout all those times or circumstances where previously the horse had been holding its owner to ransom.

Considering I went in to horse training in my early working days with the blinkered vision of my becoming some form of Mother Teresa for horses, thinking that all the wrongs which an individual horse had endured at the hands of its owner could be blamed on cruelty or ignorance, I was so very wrong.

The people I meet care deeply. Their love for their horse has been sorely tested but they hang on in there despite both personal and, sometimes, physical injury. Apart from as a result of an unavoidable accident, I have rarely met an owner who is the original cause.

You will have read in past editions that most problems are inherited at point of sale. Sometimes an inability to cope or an incorrect but understandable reaction from the handler or rider can compound the issues already there.....but they are rarely the

As a result of which Cath is back riding again, which she had previously thought physically impossible.

Fantastic.... If I ever wonder why I do what I do then the lovely people that I meet, like Cath, simply confirm that (despite the wind and the rain)....It is a good life!

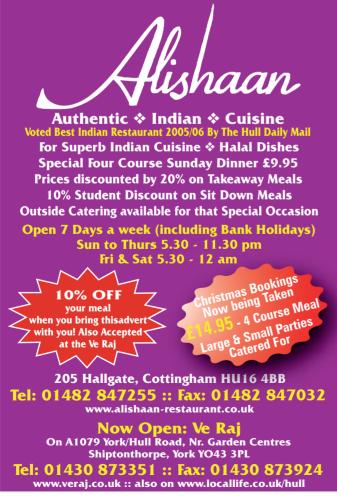

An Egg for Christmas Dinner

hen my parents were first married, they lived with Dad's mother and sister in Cornwall Gardens, Raglan Street, on Newland Avenue. This was a little two-up and two-down terraced house and Grandma and Edna had one bedroom and Mother and Dad the other. Apart from that, they all shared the rest of the accommodation and the ladies took turns in cooking, cleaning, etc.

It was 1927 and Grandma worked part-time in Brown's bookshop, which was in King Edward Street then, to supplement her meagre pension, Edna earned a poor wage as a milliner, Dad had just got his foot on the lower rung of the Civil Service ladder and Mother had had to leave her office job at Sissons Paint Works because of their policy of not employing women once they married.

Christmas approaches

Christmas was approaching and money was tight. Everyone was trying to put a 'bit' aside for presents but it was not easy. Dad and Grandma shared the household bills for rent, gas, coal and food but, like many other families at that time they 'were hard up'!

Then salvation beckoned - Bladons were advertising for part-time assistants for the Christmas period, so Mother went along and got a job on one of the gift counters and it seemed that money worries were over for the time being anyway. But as so often happens, hopes were dashed when Edna along with other girls, was made redundant when the milliners' shop went bankrupt and they were back to 'square one' again.

However, it was resolved that they were going to have a good Christmas come what may, so shopping for the essential ingredients for Christmas cake, mince pies, jam tarts, lemon curds, etc. got under way; the cake was made by Grandma as the executive officer, with the assistance 'of Edna and Mother who weighed and washed the currants, raisins, sultanas etc, sieved the flour, softened the margarine in front of the fire and so on and eventually the mixture was put into the baking tin, after everyone had a stir with a wooden spoon, while it was in the mixing bowl, and eventually it was placed in the gas oven.

A few days later, the baking gear came out again for the pastries and everything was thus made ready for Christmas tea - now, what to do about Christmas dinner? A chicken of course - it's Christmas, was the general

Christmas Chickens came with all their feathers

Now, in those days chickens, rabbits and other would-be Christmas dinners came with their feathers or furs on, as the case may be and it was usual for the buyer to prepare the unfortunate creature themselves and Grandma was no stranger to this job. So on Christmas Eve morning, Grandma and Edna went to the shops on Newland Avenue - Mother and Dad were both at work - and bought the potatoes, sprouts, onions, carrots etc., then on to a meat and poultry shop where Grandma exercised her experience, as she carefully chose a large enough chicken for the four of them - not an easy task when it still had all its feathers on. They were all going round to Grandma's sister Emily and brother in law Joe's house on Boxing day, so there was no need to get a large bird with meat over for that day.

Back home, the vegetables were put away and the serious business of plucking the chicken and drawing (i.e. removing its insides) began - a nasty. messy job as one can imagine. A large cloth was placed across the kitchen table and Grandma set to work; the poor thing was be-headed and de-feathered, then had its internal organs taken out - reminiscent of the crowd pulling attraction of hanging, drawing and quartering a political opponent, so popular in medieval times.

The hapless creature was then washed and placed in a large bowl of water to soak overnight - salt was added to the water 'to get the blood out' - a good handful of salt. Perhaps it was the tradition of Grandma's sea- faring ancestors where all meats were preserved in salt, that was passed down but she was extremely liberal with salt in everything especially meat. My dad and his sister were used to it and even added more to their dinners, but Mother hated it and rarely touched meat while they lived at Grandma's.

Christmas Day Dawns

Christmas Day dawned and everyone turned to. Grandma was up early and washed the bird and just to 'make sure, immersed it again in salted water for a while. Stuffing was home-made with sage leaves and finely chopped onions and added to the chicken which was put into the cooking try and placed in the oven. Next, the vegetables were peeled, chopped,

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soaked for a while then consigned to their pans, the potatoes prepared for roasting and a little salt sprinkled on top to make them crisp, then they too went into the oven.

Then the biggest mistake ever - Mother and Grandma were upstairs .making the beds and Grandma called down -

"Jack - Edna - will one of you put a bit of salt in the pans of sprouts and carrots - it will give them a better flavour."

Now, it transpired that unknown to each other both Dad and his sister added a 'bit of salt' to the pans.

The proof the pudding is in the eating

At last it was dinner time - the table was set, the vegetables put into the turines, the chicken placed on its dish and everyone sat down amidst the mouthwatering aromas of Christmas dinner. Dad carved the chicken and they helped themselves to the vegetables and the usual salt was sprinkled on them. As I have explained, Dad and his family were used to liberal doses of salt in their meals, but even they were defeated by the super-abundance of the stuff which became apparent in everything. Mother gave up after the first mouthful - even the chicken was inedible, and the gravy made matters worse.

"Oh Lord," a favourite expression of Grandma's, "we've put too much salt in." The understatement of the year. After a great deal of blame apportioning, dinner was abandoned. What could they have instead? No chicken, which left only its progeny- an egg; this was the only solution at that moment - there were no spare vegetables left, so four eggs were put into a pan to boil.

Needless to say, the traditional cheer and excitement of Christmas dinner was distinctly absent from that meal. But at least Christmas tea could be looked forward to? thankfully that went without a hitch - salt had not found its way into the mince pies, jam tarts and lemon curds, and the cake was spared the ignomy of being put into the dustbin along with the dinner.

Boxing Day was spent at Aunt Emily and Uncle Joe's house in Alexandra Road - the funny side was eventually seen, but that Christmas dinner of 1927 or rather lack of it, remained a family joke for many years and was firmly etched in my Mother's memory for ever - an egg for Christmas dinner!

This month our Mystery Diners visited The Millhouse Restaurant & Bar at Skidby Great Food! - Great Location!

t is a long time since I have visited The Millhouse Restaurant & Bar, and, having read in the Cottingham Times about the new, vastly experienced chef, I thought it was time to try it again.

Some of you may remember the old 'Francos' Restaurant above The Westfield Club (now Fair Maid) from 20 years ago. Well, Franco then had this purpose-built restaurant constructed to replace the old restaurant. Now run successfully by his son Marco Ciuffetelli. The restaurant offers the complete dining experience, whether a special occasion or just a meal out with family and friends.

On arrival on a wet Saturday evening the large car park was already half full even at 7.30 pm, which is a good sign of its popularity.

The restaurant building itself is a very impressive white Mediterranean style building. As you walk in through the coffee shop and then into the impressive bar area, you get the feeling you are in for a quality evening. The decor is tasteful dark wood and comfy chairs. A piano player tinkles the ivories for background music and it is very relaxed and comfortable.

Our party took a seat in the bar area with our drinks and perused the menus.

A comprehensive list of starters and main meals, including vegetarian options, made it an interesting read. Our party finally chose Organic Salmon Fish Cakes with Spring Onion, Sweet Chilli and Lime dressing (£6.50), Duck and Fig Terrine with fruit chutney and toasted Brioches (£5.95) and Grilled Black Pudding on a bed of Mustard Mash, topped with a Poached Egg (£5.25) which was absolutely delicious. For the main course we chose Honey Roast Half Duck served with Orange and Cointreau (£15.50) which came with a beautiful crispy skin, Monkfish & King Prawn Curry with spiced Chicken, Cumin Rice and Popadoms (£18.95), which my wife said was delicious, Sautéd Escallops of Dutch Veal with White Wine and topped with Sage and Parma Ham (£15.95)

The dining room area is large, light and comfortable with the tables far enough apart to be able to talk normally to each other without being overheard. On our visit the restaurant was fully booked, but still felt very relaxed and intimate.

We were shown to our table and quickly served our starters, all of which were very tasty, with nothing left on the plates.

Our wine, a Spanish Tempranillo Red at £17.50 was smooth and tasty. Just a comment on the wine list - it is very comprehensive and needs to be read thoroughly, because the choice is massive and so is the price range.

The main courses came with a selection of vegetables and a side order of chunky chips, all hot and well cooked.

Once again everything was cleared off the plates and the general opinion was one of satisfaction. The desert menu came around with a very tempting range of sweets and coffees.

We plumped for the cheese board (£7.50) and a Peanut Butter Cheese Cake with Old School Peanut Brittle and Peanut Butter Ice Cream (£5.95) The cheese cake was superb as was the icecream, but just a comment about the cheese board. The choice of cheese was lovely but the portion size, four thin slices and

four crackers, was I felt, not enough for the price paid and was the only disappointment in an otherwise flawless evening.

We also had two Liqueur Coffees (£4.95 each) and two named coffees (£1.95 each).

The service throughout the whole evening was First Class as you would expect from a restaurant of this calibre and could not be faulted from start to finish.

The bill for the whole evening was just under £170, which isn't cheap, but for the four of us including wine, liqueur coffees and cheeseboard, it is to be expected for the quality of food and

There are also many other menu choices available such as the Table de Hoté Menu, a two course meal with 125ml glass of house wine £16.95, and also a three course for £22.95, and a selection of Bar Meals from the new Autumn/Winter Café Bar Menu.

The Millhouse Restaurant & Bar is a well established top class restaurant and much of its long standing success must go to Marco and all his staff, as well as the choice and quality of the food.

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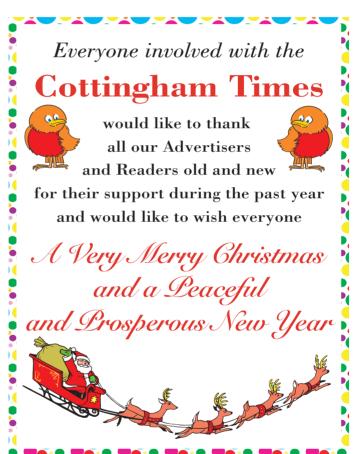


Teenage leukaemia patient urges community to save lives

Winter Blues

ne in 100 Britons becomes depressed in winter and suffers from Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD). Millions more have low spirits during the winter months.

So, if the short, dark days are getting you down, what can you do to feel like yourself again?

If you're going through a bout of winter blues, lack of daylight is probably playing a big part.

Keeping active by 30 minutes exercise three times a week is effective against depression, and anecdotal evidence that lighter exercise will have a beneficial effect too. Go for a walk or take up Yogi, or Tai Chi (Michael Maduro pg 46) or join the local gym (there are many locally to choose from). Try joining a dance class, any exercise that keeps you moving and alleviates the stress and boredom of winter.

If you have a tendency towards SAD, outdoor exercise will have a double benefit, because you'll gain some daylight.

Exercise is believed to change the level of the mood-regulating chemical serotonin in the brain. It can also help by providing a pleasant change of scene, and helping you to meet new people.

Keep your home warm. the main rooms you use during the day at a minimum of 21°C (70°F) and your bedroom at a minimum of 18°C (65°F) at night when you're asleep.

Wrap up warm. Several thin layers of clothes are better than one thick layer. Don't forget to wear hats, gloves and scarves. Remember head, hands and feet, to retain body heat. If possible, stay inside during a cold period if you have heart or respiratory problems.

Move around at least once an hour and don't sit down for long periods of time. Even light exercise will help keep you warm.

Look out for elderly friends and neighbours. Check they're safe and well throughout the winter. Make sure they're warm enough, especially at night, and have stocks of food and medicines so they don't need to go out during very cold icy weather.

On average we sleep six-and-a-half hours a night, much less than the seven to nine hours recommended But in winter, we naturally sleep more, due to the longer nights. Use the time to catch up.

Eat more fruit and vegetables. When it's cold and dark outside it can be tempting to fill up on unhealthy comfort food, but it's important to ensure that you still keep your diet healthy and include five portions of fruit and veg a day. If you find yourself craving a sugary treat, try a juicy clementine

Try new activities for the whole family. Don't use the cold winter months as an excuse to stay in and lounge. Instead, get out with the whole family to try out a new activity, maybe ice skating or taking a bracing winter walk on the beach or in the country.(See Pauls Walk pg 24) Regular exercise helps to control your weight, boost your immune system and is a good way to break the tension that can build if the family is constantly cooped up inside the house.

Have a hearty breakfast. Winter is the perfect season for porridge. Eating a warm bowl full on a cold morning isn't just a delicious way to start your day, it also helps you to boost your intake of starchy foods and fibre, which give you energy and help you to feel fuller for longer, stopping the temptation to snack mid-morning. Oats also contain lots of vital vitamins and min-

Eat a balanced diet and don't skip meals and keep your immune system perky all winter. Choose foods with high antioxidant levels like oranges, strawberries, kiwi fruit, broccoli, carrots and cabbage. Many experts believe that antioxidant vitamins, like vitamin C, vitamin A and vitamin E can help give your immune system a big boost and reduce the risk of serious illness. So go ahead and eat up! Say goodbye to colds and flu.

A simple way to get more antioxidant vitamins into your diet is to drink green tea. People in the East drink green tea regularly and many people believe it to be the secret of longevity.

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
