### **Property News from** Martin English of Homelink

#### A winter checklist for landlords

t is well and truly winter. The days are getting shorter, the cold is setting in, and the Christmas decorations are going up. Every year we see many weather related property incidents at this time of year, and there is a lot that can be done to safeguard against this.

As a landlord, winter poses some unique problems. Your property is at its most vulnerable during the coldest months, and you need to take steps to protect it. As well as helping you fulfil your obligation to provide reasonable accommodation to your tenants, these simple steps will help to ensure that you avoid major problems further down the line.

Frozen pipes can cause major damage to your property. Pipes are more likely to burst when they are frozen, and this can cause flooding and water damage. This is an expensive prospect

You can minimise the potential for damage of this kind by making sure that all outside pipes are properly clad. You can clad pipes yourself, and the material to do so is cheap and readily available from DIY shops.

If you notice cracks or fissures in pipes, make sure they are dealt with as a matter of urgency. These will only get worse, particularly in cold weather.

#### Service the boiler

You have a range of legal responsibilities when it comes to the boiler in your property, including a requirement to secure an up-to-date Gas Safe certificate. In addition, though, you must make sure that this piece of equipment is fully functional - and this never more important than during the winter months.

You should consider having the boiler serviced before the winter. As well as keeping your tenants warm, a properly working boiler will help to ensure that your pipes do not freeze.

#### Instruct your tenants

Properly informed tenants are your most useful tool in the battle against winter. By making sure that your tenants have the information they need you can significantly reduce the potential for damage.

Consider preparing an information pack that outlines things like how the boiler works, and the location of the stopcock. You should also suggest that they leave the heating on at a low setting if they intend to leave the property empty for a few days, for example over Christmas. This will help to ensure that the pipes do not freeze.

#### Consider void periods

An empty property can begin to degrade remarkably quickly over the winter. If you are currently suffering from a void period, make sure that you visit the property regularly to do some simple maintenance.

Windows should be opened to air the property, and the heating system should be turned on regularly. Some systems feature automation that will perform this task for you. You should also make sure that the pipes have not frozen, and that the taps work correctly.

#### Clear the gutters

Blocked gutters can cause water to accumulate, and ice to form. This in turn can increase the chances of overflows or frozen pipes. You should therefore make sure that the gutters around your property are clear of leaves and other detritus, particularly if you anticipate heavy rain or very cold conditions.

Winter property maintenance might seem like a hassle, but it is very much part of the landlord's job. By taking a few simple steps before the cold weather sets in, you can help to minimise the potential for bigger problems later on.

### What do you buy the computer person who has everything? and some security hints and tips

fly! In a very fast moving business like IT, a lot happens in a year. We've had a raft on new processors that make computers and tablets go faster, quieter and cooler. Leaps in memory (RAM) technology, and 64 bit software that can make the most of it. Amounts of 8 or 16 Gigabytes would have been unimaginable just a few years ago, but now they are easily affordable.

You will probably be reading this around the time of 'Cyber Monday'. So called for it is predicted to be the busiest online shopping day by one of the giants of the industry - Amazon (notice how it is pronounced now in a U.S. twang now: 'Ama-zon'). Last year Amazon's UK site saw more than 3.5 million items ordered on the site, at a rate of around 41 items per second. To meet customer demand they are hiring more than 15,000 people across the UK for the seasonal push. So what will be the big sellers this Christmas? Probably at the top of the list will be tablets; *iPad, Samsung Tab, Kindle Fire and even Tesco Hudl.* Believe it or not it is three years since Apple revolutionised this space by releasing the first *iPad*, now on its fifth re-generation and called the *iPad Air.* Another big seller, will doubtless be Windows 8.1 laptops, with more models available with touch screens.

So what do you buy the computer person who has everything? One idea, and although it may not be the most exciting, it may be something they thank you for later, is a backup device. The more people use computers, the more stuff they tend to store and accumulate: family history, thousands of photographs, music tracks, videos to name but a few. Well imagine the doom and gloom if all that disappeared though a disastrous hard drive failure.

Back up devices can be anything from the humble memory stick, now available in a range of huge storage sizes, or even better an external hard drive. These come in sizes to equal or exceed the storage capacity of any computer, and they just plug in and work. Some even come with

their own built-in backup software to do it all for you.

Other gift ideas are: a new wireless router, Office 2013 software, Eset security software, or a computer service!

Stop press: there is a new particularly nasty piece of malware appearing now that encrypts all your data and demands money for a decryption key. At this time there is no known way of working around this, so make sure you keep all your important data (including pictures/music) backed up, and disconnect your back up device immediately if you think you have been hit. We recommend Malwarebytes as an effective additional layer of security.

Now some more security hints and tips. On my travels visiting customers and working on their computers I come across lots of unwanted software that has planted itself somehow, and can cause problems or generally just gets in the way. So here are a few things to look out for. When doing updates on any genuine software like Adobe and Java for instance (and these are important to do), watch out for any tick boxes offering extra toolbars etc., and deselect them. More importantly, do not click on anything that says 'check your PC for errors' or 'is your PC slowing down', 'someone is watching you' etc. These are usually scams designed to worry you into downloading and buying and invasive software. As a general rule, don't buy registry tweakers, system optimizers, or other so called' PC tools', most of them point up more problems than they can fix. If you want your computer optimized or speeded up with no catches – you know who to call!

Another pop-up you will often see on your screen is when you click on an icon or link and a message says 'do you want this program to make changes to your computer?' This is a component of Windows called *User Account Control*, and is designed to stop software installing itself, all you have to do is click OK if you trust the program concerned.

Sometimes on Internet Explorer you will see a window pop up saying 'speed up browser by enabling/disabling add-ons...' Click to open and disable any item that you don't want. One you might see is 'do you want to enable Adobe document handler' and you can click ok to this.

Eset security products 3 years for the price of two! To finish off the year nicely, our friends at Eset are offering an extra year free on all new 2 year licences purchased by December 31st. Now some people might say 'why should I pay for an anti virus program when I can get it for free?' Well the answer is that old adage 'you get what you pay for'. Free is fine until it goes wrong or doesn't protect you, then you have no comeback to the provider because they don't offer support. Eset is supported both by RDM and Eset's UK office located in near Bournemouth. Ask anyone who uses Eset; they always renew every two years.

#### \*\*Version 7 is now available for download\*\*

Have you upgraded to Windows 8.1 yet? From the Windows 8 start screen, just click on Store, and it should offer you the free update. One of the added features of this is the ability to shut down without using the charms menu (side bar). When you press the Windows key and letter X, a shutdown option is now included.

**Epson is offering an extended 3 year warranty** on its printers now for £22, see <a href="www.epson.co.uk/warranty">www.epson.co.uk/warranty</a> You may have noticed also that the printers are coming up with more incompatibility messages when using non-Epson ink, this seems to have been through recent software updates.

If you set up a Microsoft account in order to download Office 2013, it is most important to keep the details safe in case you ever need to repair or re-install Office.



# In the Kitchen

hristmas or Plum Puddings have a firm tradition at Christmas in the UK, despite taking hours to cook and, ideally, having to be cooked at least a month before Christmas so the flavours mature. On Christmas Day, the pudding is re-steamed for between 2 to 4 hours, depending on its size and is served hot for dessert.

#### **Christmas Pudding and Plum Pudding History**

Christmas Pudding or rather Plum Pudding dates back to the middle ages but was originally a Christmas porridge called Frumenty which contained wheat or corn which was boiled in milk. Over the years other ingredients were added such as dried plums or prunes, eggs, and meat and it became known as Plum Pudding. Then during 11th Century, when spices including cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg were introduced to Europe from the Middle East, these were also added to the puddings, probably originally as a sign of wealth.

Although the recipe evolved further over hundreds of years, with ingredients being added and taken away, it was only established as an essential Christmas food in the 1800s when Queen Victoria's husband, Prince Albert's love of it made it fashionable throughout the country.

#### **Christmas Pudding Traditions**

There are many traditions associated with Christmas or Plum pudding, including:

It should be made with 13 ingredients to represent Jesus and His Disciples

Coins are added to the pudding mix and then every member of the family should take a turn to stir the pudding with a wooden spoon, making a wish as they stir then whoever gets a coin in their portion on Christmas Day will have their wish come true

A sprig of holly is often used to decorate the top of the pudding to represent the crown of thorns worn by Jesus on the cross

#### **Traditional Christmas Pudding**

Ingredients

175g/6oz Sultanas

175g/6oz Seedless Raisins

50g/2oz Ready to Eat Dried Prunes, chopped

50g/2oz Glacé Cherries, halved

75g/3oz Dried Figs, chopped

50g/2oz Candied Peel, chopped

90ml/3fl.oz. Brandy

1 Apple, grated

The grated zest and juice of 1 Orange

3 Eggs, lightly beaten 125g/5oz Shredded Suet 175g/6oz Soft Dark Brown Sugar 1 tbsp Black treacle 125g/5oz Fresh Breadcrumbs 125g/5oz Self Raising Flour 1/2 teasp Mixed spice

#### **Instructions**

- 1. Place the sultanas, raisins, prunes, cherries, figs and candied peel and in a large mixing bowl, mix well and leave to soak for 6-8 hours, turning once or twice. Don't be tempted to add any more brandy as the whole lot will be going into the pudding.
- 2. After the soaking period, add the remaining ingredients to the soaked fruit mixture and mix very well.
- 3. Well grease a 1.5L/21/2 pt heatproof pudding basin with butter, then turn the pudding mixture into the bowl.
- 4. Cover with a large piece of greaseproof paper and a double layer of foil, both with a centre pleat to allow for expansion and secure with string.
- 5. Place the pudding in a saucepan with sufficient boiling water to come just below the rim of the basin and steam for about 31/2 hours until firm to the touch, topping up the pan with extra boiling water as necessary.

Allow the pudding to cool a little before turning out.

Once cooked, they can be stored for 1-2 months in an airtight tin. When you're ready to serve the pudding simply re-steam for about 3 hours.



#### **Christmas Chocolate Log Recipe**

Ingredients:

#### For the Sponge

3 eggs

75g/3oz Light Brown Sugar

75g/3oz Plain Flour

2 teasp Ground Cinnamon

1 tbsp Warm Water

#### For the Butter Cream

225g/8oz Butter

450g/11b Icing Sugar

2 tbsp Cocoa Powder

2 tbsp Milk

Icing Sugar for dusting

#### Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 190C, 375F, Gas mark 5 and grease and line a 17cmx27cm/7x11 inch Swiss-roll tin with greaseproof paper.
- 2. In a large mixing bowl, whisk together the eggs and brown sugar until light and creamy.
- 3. Sift in the flour and cinnamon and gently fold into the mixture.
- 4. Turn into the greased tin and shake gently to even it out. Bake for 15 to 20 minutes until golden brown, risen and firm to the touch.
- 5. Whilst still hot, turn the sponge onto a piece of greaseproof paper and place another piece of greaseproof paper on the top.
- 6. Roll the sponge up tightly, starting at the short end and leave, rolled up, until completely cold.
- 7. Meanwhile, make the filling by creaming the butter sifted icing sugar and cocoa powder together in a large mixing bowl until smooth and soft.
- 8. To assemble once the cake is cold, gently unroll and remove the paper. Spread a thin layer of the butter cream over the inside of the cake then re-roll. Transfer to a serving platter.
- 9. Spread the remaining butter cream over the top and sides and use a fork to make a "log" effect, dragging it lengthways over the topping.
- 10. Dust with a little icing sugar (snow) and decorate with holly, Robins etc.

#### Glazed Ham with Pineapple

Ingredients
2.2kg/5lb Joint of Gammon
10 Whole Cloves

1 x 400g/14oz tin Pineapple Rings in heavy syrup

50g/2oz Dark Brown Sugar

8 Whole Maraschino Cherries

#### **Instructions**

- 1. Stick the cloves into the ham and place in a large saucepan. Cover with cold water, bring to the boil then reduce the heat, partially cover and cook for 2 hours. Make sure the water is only just bubbling as too fast cooking make the meat tough.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 170C, 325F, Gas Mark 3 and drain the juice from the pineapple rings into a medium bowl and stir in the brown sugar. Set aside.
- 3. Remove the ham from the saucepan, cut off the rind, score the fat into large diamond shapes, place the ham in a deep roasting tin then coat all over with half the sugar mixture.
- 4. Arrange the pineapple rings over the outside of the ham, place a maraschino cherry in the centre of each pineapple ring, and secure with a toothpick.
- 5. Brush the remaining sugar mixture over the top of the ham and pineapple then roast for 40-50 minutes, basting frequently. A nice alternative at Christmas.

#### **Nut and Carrot Roast**

Ingredients

250g/9oz Carrots, coarsely grated

100g/4oz Cashew Nuts

100g/4oz Walnuts

100g/4oz Granary Bread

50g/2oz Butter

1 Onion, finely chopped

90ml/3 fl.oz. Hot Vegetable Stock

2 teasp Yeast Extract (such as Marmite)

1 teasp Honey

1 teasp Dried Mixed Herbs

2 teasp Lemon Juice

Salt and Pepper

#### Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, Gas mark 4 and grease an 850 ml/11/2 pint shallow ovenproof dish.
- 2. Grind the cashews, walnuts and bread together with a food processor until fine. Place in a bowl.
- 3. Melt the butter in a pan, add the onions and fry gently for a few minutes until soft and golden. Add the carrots and cook, stirring, for a further 5 minutes. Remove with a slotted spoon and add to the nuts mixture in the bowl.
- 4. Mix the hot stock, yeast extract and honey in a bowl and stir until dissolved. Add to the nut mixture together with the herbs and lemon juice. Mix well and season to taste.
- 5. Turn the mixture into the prepared dish and bake for 45 minutes. Serve hot or cold straight from the dish.

Next year we hope to visit more villages like Merchekella as there is a real need to what we do. If you would like to donate to help then give




eave your vehicle and walk to the village hall and turn right into Church Rise. On reaching a gate, pass through the gate into a field, cross this field to a second gate which you pass through, and then follow a well defined track eventually turning right and then left to follow the field boundaries to reach Risby road.

Cross the road and walk down the side of Fishpond Wood but keeping outside the wood. Follow this round and cross a ditch then walk along a well defined track climbing gently to

meet the Bentley to Walkington road. Turn left on reaching the road and then left again through large gates and follow the track eventually keeping the hedge and woods on the left.

After crossing a stile at Silver Fir plantation, follow the track on the left and keep the hedge on your left to reach the road a short distance to the south of Risby Park Farm. Turn left and follow this track/road to reach a gate and emerge onto the Little Weighton/Bentley road.

Turn left on reaching the road and after about 500 metres locate a stile/opening on the right, pass through the hedge and follow the path with the hedge on your right. At the top of the field, turn left and then after about 200 metres cross a stile on the right and follow the path to reach the Skidby/Little Weighton road on a bend. On reaching the road turn left and then immediately left again and walk on a path with fields to the left and houses to the right. Continue on this path to Church Rise, turn right and then turn left at the Village Hall and walk back to your vehicle.

#### **Christmas Time**

For centuries, Christmas has been celebrated by bringing nature into the home. Plants offer natural beauty and wonderful fragrances. As well as the real Christmas trees and exotically coloured houseplants on sale at our garden centre, you can decorate your home with bowls of pine cones or colourful leaves, twisted stems or teasels in a vase, garlands of ivy, holly and mistletoe, and natural tree decorations such as cinnamon sticks tied with ribbon and studded oranges. So for a greener Christmas, why not add a little natural country charm to your decorations – and get the kids to help!

Selecting and decorating the Christmas tree is one of the key festive traditions, and nothing compares to the wonderful fresh pine scent, appearance and texture of a real Christmas tree.

The traditional Christmas tree is the Norway spruce which we have available 4ft-12ft, but as an alternative we also have the beautiful Nordmann and Frasier Fir available in 4ft-8ft. Just remember to give your tree plenty of water and follow our simple steps to ensure that your beautiful natural tree takes pride of place in your home this Christmas. Plus when you buy any tree over £20 you will get a £5 voucher to spend in January.

Before you buy your Christmas tree, make sure you know how much room you've got to house it. Measure the ceiling height and width of the space and take a tape measure with you.

- Look for a green tree with no sign of brown needles. Check that the trunk is sturdy and straight and the tree has a good, even shape with well-spaced branches and no obvious gaps. Needles should stay fast if you gently run your fingers down one of the lower branches.
- Once home, place your tree in a cool, dry place out of the wind in a bucket of water until you're ready to decorate.
- Before you bring it into the home, saw 2.5cm (1in) off the end of the trunk.
- Place the tree in as cool a position as possible ideally well away from radiators and open fires.
- Christmas trees keep best in plain water rather than soil or sand, which block the pores in the bark, so use a specially designed Christmas tree stand.
- Top up with water with a little sugar added you may find your tree needs as much as 2 litres (3 pints) a day.

#### **Festive Plants**

Flowering and colourful plants are always a joy to give and receive at Christmas. Their bright, cheerful appearance, especially those with red flowers, bracts and stems, lifts the spirits and epitomises the season.

Follow these simple guidelines to help your festive plants perform superbly right through the Christmas season and well into the new year.

#### CYCLAMEN

Cyclamen are one of the most charming winter-flowering plants with exotic-looking swept-back flowers in intense shades of red, purple, pink and white with heart-shaped, silver-veined foliage.

They are easy and rewarding houseplants, provided you meet their requirements – a cool spot (12-15°C) that's brightly-lit, but out of direct sunlight. Overwatering is one of the chief causes of their demise. When the compost surface feels dry immerse the pot in a bowl of rain water for 20 minutes then pour the excess away.

#### **CHRISTMAS ROSE**

Said to have sprung from the tears of a young girl who had nothing to offer the Christ child, the Christmas rose (Helleborus niger) blooms in the darkest months of the year, making them a valuable asset to any garden. Native to Europe, the Christmas rose grows 38cm (15in) high and bears single white flowers about 8cm (3in) in diameter from December to March. Grow in a sheltered position, in soil with plenty of added organic matter

#### **AMARYLLIS**

Hippeastrum or amaryllis is an indoor plant producing large, colourful showy flowers on tall stems in winter. Give plants plenty of light so the stems don't become too leggy. Support stems with a short stake to keep them upright under the weight of the flowers. After the blooms have faded keep the bulbs in a warm place and resume watering the next autumn.

#### **POINSETTIAS**

Their name comes from Joel Robert Poinsett, who introduced them to the USA from Mexico, about 1828. And even though poinsettias now come in different colours, the red and green classic is the most popular. Poinsettias are easy to care for. To enjoy them as long as possible put them in a bright, warm spot, around 20°C without draughts. Do not overwater by leaving water in the saucer – water only when the potting mixture is almost dry.

#### FORCED HYACINTHS

Bowls of forced hyacinths that have been grown in the dark to encourage them into early flower add a delightful scent to the home. To prolong flowering, place in a sunny spot away from draughts and radiators. Stand the pots on shallow trays of moist gravel. Cut off the flowers when they die and give the bulbs some liquid feed until the leaves begin to fade. Gradually dry off the bulbs and plant them out in the garden to enjoy in years to come.

#### Make your own Wreath

Wreaths are a lovely way to enhance the festive atmosphere in your home, welcoming Christmas visitors at your front door. They are quite simple to make and most of the materials are freely available.

• You will need a wire frame made from two circles of wire looped together or a length of wire mesh (rolled into a sausage shape and bent to form a circle) or a readymade wire ring from your local florist; florist wire; some greenery (ivy, laurel leaves, leylandii,

Lawson's cypress and holly work well); and berries, cones and seedheads.

- $\bullet$  First attach a length of florist wire securely at the top of the frame to hang your wreath.
- Cut small bunches of foliage to 25cm (10in) lengths and wrap a piece of wire around the lower end of the bunch. Attach the foliage to the ring with another piece of wire. Keep repeating the procedure a little further down the frame, ensuring the bunches overlap, leaving no obvious gaps.

#### 10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Check greenhouse heaters
- 2. Protect any tender plants with horticultural fleece
- 3. Prune acers, birches & vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding
- 4. Reduce water for houseplants
- 5. Increase feed and provide plenty of fresh water for the birds
- 6. Continue to deadhead pansies and violas to encourage flowering through the mild weather
- 7. Plant Winter flowering shrubs to add colour to your garden
- 8. Harvest leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage, sprouts and remaining crops
- 9. Check that your Winter protection structures are set up and in place
- 10. Clean up and cover you garden furniture to protect over the Winter



- At first you may find the foliage slides around a little, but the more you add, the more stable it will become. Keep your work flat on a tabletop to prevent movement.
- For a really full wreath, fill both the inner and outer parts of your frame with foliage. The more you add, the better it will look.
- Attach your decorations by twisting wire around the base of the cones, berries and seedheads. Twist the ends firmly together and push the wire into the wreath frame. Secure by twisting the ends again at the back of the wreath.
- Finally, attach the finished wreath to a nail on your front door for all to see and admire.
- You can create beautiful natural garlands in a similar way. Use florists wire to attach overlapping bunches of evergreens and decorations to a length of rope.

ecember arrives, the Christmas tree goes up, the wreath hangs on the door, Santa is busy prepping all the gifts, you endure some Carol singers but of course most importantly you have to decide what to drink this Christmas! That's where I come in. This month I've selected some extra special wines to suit all your festive needs

So you've got the family coming for Christmas dinner and you want to start things off with a bang. Look no further than a bottle or six of fizz. Prosecco is a great way to start a party and to celebrate special occasions with friends and family. **Waitrose Prosecco (75cl, £8.99)** is full of apple and a soft nutty taste that'll get any celebration underway. Or if you wanted to treat yourselves, why not try an English sparkling wine? **Nyetimber Classic Cuvee (75cl, £29.99)** is full of rich buttery brioche flavour and hints of citrus which go to make this one of the finest English sparkling wines out there!

You're all sat down ready to eat, and now you need a perfect wine for the big meal. I've chosen two wines that really are a treat, but its Christmas so why on earth not, right!? Pinot Noir is a fantastic match for a plump goose. **Dom Heresztyn VV Gevrey Chambertin** (75cl, £28.99) takes its grapes from 65 year-old wines, which help give the wine great depth. Its gentle raspberry, blackberry and blackcurrant flavours suit the majesty of a goose to a tee. If you're like me though and you like a Turkey for Christmas dinner then you must try **Gerard Thomas St Aubin Premier Cru** (75cl, £19.99). Red is traditional with everyones favourite Xmas bird but that doesn't mean you shouldn't try something a little different. You've had to undo a belt buckle or two, somehow you managed to rip your hat that you got from your cracker and decided to take one from that moody relative who won't wear one, you cracked a cheesy joke that makes everyone groan and you've just found a use for an over-sized plastic paperclip. Now it's time for dessert (which we always seem to have room for). Christmas pudding needs something that's going to match its rich, sweet flavours. Warre's Otima 10 Year-Old Tawny (50cl, £13.49) will do just that. This Port has got sweet raisin, touches of spice, fresh acidity and flavour that will stay with you. If you wanted something a touch richer and sweeter then look no further than Campbell's Rutherglen Muscat (37.5cl, £11.99) which oozes honey and golden raisin, juicy plum and shows signs of oak.

So that's it. You're thoroughly stuffed. You couldn't eat another thing (apart from maybe some chocolate or a mince pie) and now you just want a nice glass of something to help send you to sleep in the armchair – snoring is optional. **The King's Ginger (50cl, £21.50)** will do just that. It uses a recipe that was created for King George VII. Its great served chilled with a squeeze of lemon or better still, add it some whisky or mulled wine.


All council car parks will be free from 8am on Saturday until 8am on Monday.

Here is the latest article from Chris Catchmoore who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

ello and welcome once again fellow anglers to this month's fishing news, I hope you are all well. It is the 14th November. The weather; it was bl---y cold when I wrote this but never mind. I just made myself laugh really as I am always telling everyone there is no such thing as cold weather but there is such a thing as the correct clothing. I am feeling it a little now (could be old age coming!!) but when I go fishing I am all toasty because I am wearing the correct clothing. If you are planning to fish through winter like I do wrap up and be comfy. The comfier and happier you are the better you will fish.

Anyway now that you are all wrapped up have you all taken heed of last month's tip of scaling down your terminal tackle, no well if you don't you will be blanking quite often.

Now is the time to start targeting silver fish again, as you are probably aware the Carp are getting caught less and less now. Fish such as Roach, Skimmers and Chub tend to feed throughout the colder months, so pick your venue accordingly.

Another tip for winter fishing is to put your pole away and go back to rod 'n' line only. Apart from the fact you are more likely to catch more fish as you are not creating a great big shadow on the water, you will find you are more comfortable. The pole can become very cold to hold where as a rod butt made from cork or foam is warmer on the mitt. You can still shot a waggler float to be just as sensitive as a pole float should you wish to do so. If you prefer to use a feeder rod but it is a little too windy use a butt indicator and sink your rod tip below the surface a couple of inches. When you are using a butt indicator remember to point your rod in the direction of the bait. Strike at the slightest



movement of your tip, but don't be violent, strike gently.

Here is one for you to check out once again, I know you have been there before on my advice but it is different yet again. Where am I talking about? Our beloved Sam Hosticks at Woodmansey. Do you remember a couple of months ago I mentioned a match I organised on Moat, well it was thick with weed but I still caught 90 odd lbs. Well since then Sam, Val and crew have been very busy, they have removed 95% of the weed, this is such a good thing as the weed was causing a lot of problems for anglers. They have replaced the bridge. The bridge is now a solid causeway which is good as the fish can no longer reside underneath it.

Nearly all of the far side willow trees have been cut down, a great relief to some pole anglers as some poles where being smashed when a bonus fish was hooked and took off at great speed past the willow trees!

Sam and Val have had a major restocking program too last week. Most of the fish were put into Moat and Island pond and some went into Kingfisher. Not just small stockies either, but fish weighing up to 14lbs. My friend Jacko was there at the time and watched as tub after tub of fish where being poured in. My hat goes off to Sam and Val for trying their hardest to give you all a local fishery to be proud off.

Sea scene: wow! Have you heard or checked out the forums? There are good Skate and large Cod everywhere. I have had reports from Scarborough right to Skegness and they are all saying the same thing. It is about time! Fisherman who are not in matches and those that cannot really cast are all either catching or standing next to somebody who is catching. The baits are flying from my fridges so please order early to avoid disappointment.

I know I always stock plenty of back up frozen baits, but you can't beat live Lug or Rag worm, and it is the same price as last year.

Just a reminder that gift vouchers are available in store, so if you don't know what to buy your loved one you do not have to make a mistake when choosing a gift for them, buy them a gift voucher and let them choose their own gifts.



#### Aunty Gladys, Hitler and Christmas Eve

unty Gladys was not a real Aunt - she was a childhood friend of my mother's, but I was brought up to address her as 'Aunty Gladys'. She lived most of her life in Park Road, round the corner from Park Grove between Princes Avenue and Beverly Road in Hull. The old Hornsea railway line used to pass quite close to the front gardens along there, just before Stepney Station; a bungalow development occupies the site now.

Mother lived in May Street and attended Lambert Street School and so did Gladys and they became friends in the infant department and remained so for life. Gladys was the eldest of several brothers and sisters and was always looked on as a second mother by her siblings and as a help and support by her mother.

#### Left school at 14

Mother and her left school when they were fourteen, just prior to the 1914-18 war, mother into the office of Sisson's paint works and Gladys onto the haberdashery and knitting wool counter at Willis' on the corner of Carr Lane and Waterhouse Lane in Hull. I remember going into Willis' with my mother before the Second World War and seeing Aunty Gladys at the back of the counter - another assistant worked at that counter too - Miss Woolhouse - I could see the rather odd connection then - Miss Woolhouse sells wool to the customers!

In those days Thursday was half-day closing in town and Gladys made the most of her brief liberty by going to the park or to a matinee at a cinema, and later, coming to Cottingham when we moved here to New Village Road in the early 1930's, when Gladys gratefully accepted the regular invitation to come to our house after work on Thursdays and stay to tea, this arrangement continued for years.

I always looked forward to Thursday afternoons because Aunty Gladys came equipped with a bag of sweets for me - she came by bus and I always looked out of our front room window for her to appear when she got off the bus on Thwaite Street - no buses down New Village Road in those days.

'She's here' I would call to my mother. Gladys was a fairly tall, very slim person, always smartly dressed, dark hair in a 'bun' at the back, carrying her knitting in a small case - she was a prolific knitter, churning out jumpers and cardigans for her nephews and nieces and anyone who wanted a hand knitted garment: she was such a rapid knitter that the work literally took shape as I watched her fingers fly across the clicking needles and the ball of wool growing smaller and smaller, chatting with mother as she worked. She only stopped when it was time for tea and then continued until it was time for her to go home and resume the rather monotonous, routine. All her siblings were married and living away - one brother was a clergyman who never failed to remind Gladys that it was her duty to remain single and stay at home with her mother - evidently, she had no right to a life of her own!

#### Life changed in 1939 with the outbreak of war

However, things were about to change with the outbreak of war in 1939 - Gladys continued her Thursday afternoon visits but was always worried about her mother on her own in case the air-raid sirens sounded early, which they sometimes did; she would hastily pack her knitting and rush off to catch a bus - they ran every quarter of an hour then - we had no telephone and neither had Gladys at home, so naturally the level of tension was high even if no raid transpired, just an alert, then the 'all clear' would sound usually as she was on the bus on her way home. Visits were often cut short like that.



In the summer of 1942 Glady's mother decided to accept the invitation from one of her married daughters to go and live with her while the worst of the bombing continued - she was somewhere in the Lake District I believe. This gave Gladys more flexible time and my mother suggested that she could stay overnight when she wanted to - she would still get to work easily by nine o'clock. I liked this arrangement as there was someone else also to wind up the Hornby train engine or fix the lines when they came apart or play snakes and ladders', but above all else the knitting was priority with her as she and my mother chatted.

Now, Aunty Gladys was a well organised person, very methodical, and continued her 'blitz routine' as she called it, when she stayed the night, we all went to bed fairly early to get some sleep before the 'buzzers' sounded later on. The living room, kitchen and the two main bedrooms were covered by plywood shutters each night by my father or mother and care had to be taken not to switch on the lights in any other part of the house and attract the attention of the ever watchful air-raid wardens. Consequently, I had to get undressed in the darkness of the small bedroom taking care to fold my clothes neatly on chair in the right order to put on in a hurry if the sirens sounded.'

Gladys had the advantage of the electric light in her bedroom and was able to carry out her careful routine. The hair grips and slides, necklace, glasses, bracelets, watch, ear rings, two or three finger rings of assorted shapes and sizes were all neatly placed at vantage points on the dressing table and the light covering, of lipstick was removed with whatever she used to remove it with, then preparations made to change into nightwear at which point my mother, who usually went upstairs as well, said goodnight and left her to it.

I think the Luftwaffa knew Aunty Gladys came to our house on Thursday's, because the sirens often sounded and we all had to reach for our clothes, get downstairs and under the table or under the staircase; but Gladys would not be hurried - on went the hairgrips, slides, necklace, glasses, bracelets, watch, earrings, finger rings, lipstick applied, all clothes on neat and tidy as she would carefully descend the stairs accompanied by the bangs and thuds and flashes overhead and take up her precious knitting sat on a chair in the living room while we looked on in wonder from our hiding place under the table.

"Gladys - come under the table - I'll go and sit under the stairs," my father would say. "Certainly not Jack, I wouldn't be able to get on with my kitting under there - I won't be put off by some Germans" was her reply. Sometimes the alert lasted for a short time, sometimes for several hours, sometimes two or more alerts in a night, but Glady's routine was always the same - occasionally she would be halfway down the stairs when the all-clear sounded and the whole process was repeated with comments like "they have no consideration", or "what a nuisance".

The nights of Sunday the 20th and Monday the 21st of December 1942 saw raids on East Hull with some casualties, but the following nights were quiet, giving hope of a raid free Christmas - but the alert sounded on Christmas Eve and Gladys was spending the Christmas with us. Calls upstairs of "come on Gladys" and "hurry up Gladys': where to no avail. She appeared, immaculate as usual. "If we get bombed and killed, Hitler is not going to see me in my nightwear," she proclaimed. "Gladys, I don't suppose Hitler will give a damn what you're got on", my father retorted.

Thankfully, there was no raid and we were able to enjoy a rabbit pie dinner next day, with the sprigs of holly round the picture rail and the little artificial Christmas tree on the sideboard - no paper decorations in case of fire.

Soon after, Gladys went as a cook in a Woman's Land Army hostel in Alnwick, Northumberland and enjoyed a new life surrounded by dozens of friends. She died in Hull in the 1970's, back to her solitary life once more.

#### My yard is a little community

ow that the cold weather has really arrived all the horses in my care are now stabled at night. Some of my residents have been with me for years and years and will live out their days in my protection.

Their routine is **everything** and understanding what makes each and every one of them tick is paramount to having a cohesive and peaceful yard. My staff have to get to know their foibles and quirks quickly as the care regime we give each one is individual and unique to that particular animal

The first through the yard gate is **Slim**. He is a 16.3hh, 21-year-old ex-racehorse. He is fragile in character and relies heavily on routine, and his pals (Norman and Humpy) for peace of mind. He has been in my care for around 10 years now and has to be treated gently at all times, because he is the most sensitive of all the horses. He worries about life, the universe and everything. Haunted by his past, he little brain works in overtime most of the time. He is the most polite horse I have ever met and always tries so hard to please...he pre-empts what he perceives you would like him to do, or where you would like him to be. He has no intention of growing old gracefully however...... refusing to be retired, loves his work and is a pocket rocket to ride at times! Arthritic changes in his legs mean we have to be cautious about how we approach his work these days......no trotting on hard roads for example......however, you try stopping him once he gets those old legs of his on grass! He is hilarious!

Because Slim is of a nervous disposition he is hard to keep weight on. He cannot ever be left on his own. If we want one or both of his pals in from the field then all three have to come in together! He worries his little head off out in the field until the group is reunited so its best just to simply think about his peace of mind and bring him in too. You can take him away from them but not so in reverse! His owner, Alison, is a very caring person, gentle in all ways and adores her old boy...perfect partners.

The next box is bedroom to Humpy. I have written about this complicated old horse in the past. He is a 17-hand 21-year-old exracehorse who retired from racing at 11 and has never left my care since. He came for re-homing but because of his panic attacks and health issues he simply stayed because no one else was prepared to take on such a complicated horse. Alongside the usual insecurities which ex-racehorses commonly suffer from, Humpy wind sucks! This is a bad habit developed in the early days of confinement and over feeding as a young racehorse and is an established habitual behaviour...boredom, stomach and gut ulceration and indigestion from the unnaturally high protein diet in racing is the usual cause. He gets hold of the door, gate, field fencing... any available purchase place and sucks in air. This damages the whole digestive system by filling it with air leading to serious health issues. Frequent and life threatening colic attacks are common and the symptoms of which my staff are always on the lookout for, an inability to maintain weight because his system is ruined and the fact that at this grand old age he has no upper teeth left at all! We have to provide hay out in the paddocks all year round because he would starve as he cannot graze short grass. That means all the horses get hay because you cannot give it to one and not all the others......costs me a fortune!

Humpy is a gentleman to handle most of the time but can still react to a soul deep fear from something way back in his youth.....he can suddenly and for no apparent reason fly off in a massive violent panic at being restrained. As a result of which I taught him to stay where we put him (untied), so bless him, we can abandon him on the yard and he simply waits for us to get back to him! We don't need to tie him up for the farrier, for clipping or grooming or tacking up. He is such a sweat heart! Humpy

falls into the same fragile place that Slim occupies in that he relies heavily on his buddies for security, we can take him away from them but we cannot take them away from him......so they all come in together ......again! Pam took on Humpy as her own when her wonderful 29-year-old horse Hawkeye had to be put to sleep. She has been keeping her horses with me for 21 years too..... 21 is a recurrent theme in this article!

Then there is Norman! I bred Norman myself, here in Skidby ......21 years ago out of a brilliant but complicated jumping mare called Vicki. I produced him for Eventing and show jumping as a young horse and we competed at high level competitions countrywide. Always of a nervous disposition and flighty (like his mum) he was an amazing horse cross country and was pure joy to compete on. However, we did "part company" on a few occasions at high speed because he would spook at the sudden appearance of a PERSON in what he considered the wrong place! This led to some serious personal injuries on my part (which still hurt and remind me of that time) At 8-years-old I sold him to Lord Nelson (because he had long legs and could stay on!) Norman became a "landed Gentry" horse for a few years and competed nationally and with great success. Five years later Norman came back home to me with a grumbling lameness and an end to his career as an Event horse. My friend Jackie became his owner and has learned so very much from this partnership. They gel as a team beautifully and Norman takes great care of his mum. He is such a content horse because he is home! He goes with the flow as far as his care is concerned, trying to keep Humpy and Slim feeling safe.

Stella is a bit of a grumpy sort of mare but it is all play acting! She tries to keep "her" staff knowing our respectful place! She came to me too many years ago for me to remember now as a city horse needing a country life......as to the manor born! Standing at 16.2 and yet again 21-years-old now, she causes no trouble providing we keep her hotel accommodation just right! She lets us know "our place" and keeps us dancing attendance as is her right! Bless her, such a wonderful old mare with high standards... our Prima donna! Jean has owned her all her life so their relationship is very special. They are the best of friends but even Jean is reminded if Stella considers that the standard of care is slipping! Funny!

Our "newbie" is Al Ghalla. At 19 (a mere spring chicken in comparison to the others) he has spent all his life out in the deserts of Dubai until this summer when his mum Gaile relocated back to the UK. God was kind at first, giving us a lovely warm summer for him to acclimatise to life in Skidby. However, for him it was Iceland at first. He has tasted fresh grass for the first time ever.....he loves the green paddocks, beats sand any day! Great care has been taken with this old horse to make sure we get his needs right. This wet cold weather is all new to him so we constantly monitor his temperature. He arrived very thin and has the worst teeth I have ever seen. Gross neglect of them in his early days has left him with only a very small grinding surface with which to chew. As horses need a high fibre diet we have to feed him the softest hay and he has four feeds a day of very good quality available energy and easily digestible fibre. We have started to address the teeth issues which will take time to try to reconcile. He has put weight on well and is fighting fit inside his head! The cold weather is making him very sparky so he rushes about a lot, playing and interacting well with his field mate Toby. This behaviour worried his mum at first because she is used to the lethargy and calmness that high external temperatures bring about. His diet is providing him with the energy he needs to come to terms with our climate and we keep him very warm with rugs. Much to his mums amusement I have bought him some horse bed socks to wear on these cold nights too!

I am so looking forward to seeing how he reacts to snow for the first time in his life but dreading him on ice. Fingers crossed he does not panic. My oldies all know to go steady on ice; Al Ghalla has much to learn.

So there you all have an insight into life on my yard re caring for several of my liveries. All these oldies need extra care because of their physical as well as mental issues. I add milk powder (readily available protein for body building) and oil (should help go into weight storage as well as coat condition) to their diets. They are very expensive to keep as a result of their age but are a total joy to have about. They are my geriatrics in body but no way would any one of them consider themselves as such in nature! They keep myself and my staff on our toes all the time......they have come to expect and demand high standards by Gove!

As a footnote here, I must add that the hierarchy starts with the yard cat Bruno. He oversees all things and his opinion matters.....let's face it, nothing happens on my yard before he is fed. He is commander-in-chief and lets no one forget it!

The message was: "send reinforcements, we're going to advance." When it eventually reached its destination, a mystified soldier was told to "send three and fourpence, we're going to a dance." A clear illustration of the creative possibilities of a muddled message.

# Local group offers cancer survivors a new lease of life

There are over 2 million people living with and beyond cancer in the United Kingdom. This figure is set to rise to 4 million by 2030. It is a great cause for celebration that more people than ever are surviving after a cancer diagnosis but we know the impact of cancer does not suddenly stop when treatment is over. People who have finished cancer treatment often tell us that they have difficulties financially, emotionally, practically and medically.

We believe far more can be done to improve the lives of cancer survivors. Support for people living with or beyond cancer should not finish after treatment but should continue into a phase of supported aftercare.

Hull and East Yorkshire Hospitals NHS Trust works jointly with Macmillan to provide support specifically to people who have experienced cancer, as Claire Walker, Clinical Support Worker with the Macmillan Survivorship Programme based at Castle Hill Hospital in Cottingham explains: "Everyone's reaction to having cancer is different, so adjusting to life after cancer treatment, or living with cancer, can provoke strong emotions and possible fears for the future.

The Macmillan Survivorship Programme aims to help cancer patients who have completed active treatment with all aspects of their recovery, health and well-being, by focusing on the individual needs of the patient. The programme offers a whole host of options for patients including a monthly support group, a well being course, one to one support with a clinical nurse specialist, telephone support, email support and a free 12 week exercise programme. Each package of care is tailored to the individual patient.

On top of the opportunity for cancer survivors to share their experiences with others, members of the group also take part in activities which have previously included trips to Lincoln Christmas Market, relaxation sessions, and professional beauty advice.

Anna Binks, Macmillan Survivorship Programme Manager, says "We are based at the Queen's Centre at Castle Hill Hospital however we

do hold clinics across Hull, East Riding, North Lincolnshire and North East Lincolnshire. We often have patients coming in, looking nervous and vulnerable, who just want to speak to someone who understands the journey they have been on. To see the relief on their faces by simply sharing their worries with their Nurse Specialist or to see them smile and make friendships from sitting down at a support group and having a cup of tea with their peers is extremely rewarding".


This will actually be the 23rd year for this extremely popular annual event!

The cake production is only a winter thing so it will probably end at the end of March when it hopefully starts to warm up again.

#### **Winter Skin**

inter is not always kind and gentle to skin. Not all seasons affect the skin in the same way. While getting sunburned is not a worry during the cold winter months there are other concerns that you must think about.

Apply almond oil, coconut oil or jojoba oil to your skin. Or look for a lotion that contains one of these softening ingredients for your winter skin. Other excellent options are lotions that contain cocoa butter, Shea butter. These oils will make your skin look great and they will make it feel even better!
