Property News from Martin English of Homelink

A winter checklist for landlords

Tt is well and truly winter. The days are getting shorter, the cold is setting in, and the Christmas decorations are going up. Every year we see many weather related property incidents at this time of year, and there is a lot that can be done to safeguard against this.

As a landlord, winter poses some unique problems. Your property is at its most vulnerable during the coldest months, and you need to take steps to protect it. As well as helping you fulfil your obligation to provide reasonable accommodation to your tenants, these simple steps will help to ensure that you avoid major problems further down the line.

Check the pipes

Frozen pipes can cause major damage to your property. Pipes are more likely to burst when they are frozen, and this can cause flooding and water damage. This is an expensive prospect.

You can minimise the potential for damage of this kind by making sure that all outside pipes are properly clad. You can clad pipes yourself, and the material to do so is cheap and readily available from DIY shops.

If you notice cracks or fissures in pipes, make sure they are dealt with as a matter of urgency. These will only get worse, particularly in cold weather.

Service the boiler

You have a range of legal responsibilities when it comes to the boiler in your property, including a requirement to secure an up-to-date Gas Safe certificate. In addition, though, you must make sure that this piece of equipment is fully functional - and this never more important than during the winter months.

You should consider having the boiler serviced before the winter. As well as keeping your tenants warm, a properly working boiler will help to ensure that your pipes do not freeze.

Instruct your tenants

Properly informed tenants are your most useful tool in the battle against winter. By making sure that your tenants have the information they need you can significantly reduce the potential for damage.

Consider preparing an information pack that outlines things like how the boiler works, and the location of the stopcock. You should also suggest that they leave the heating on at a low setting if they intend to leave the property empty for a few days, for example over Christmas. This will help to ensure that the pipes do not freeze.

Consider void periods

An empty property can begin to degrade remarkably quickly over the winter. If you are currently suffering from a void period, make sure that you visit the property regularly to do some simple maintenance.

Windows should be opened to air the property, and the heating system should be turned on regularly. Some systems feature automation that will perform this task for you. You should also make sure that the pipes have not frozen, and that the taps work correctly.

Clear the gutters

Blocked gutters can cause water to accumulate, and ice to form. This in turn can increase the chances of overflows or frozen pipes. You should therefore make sure that the gutters around your property are clear of leaves and other detritus, particularly if you anticipate heavy rain or very cold conditions.

Winter property maintenance might seem like a hassle, but it is very much part of the landlord's job. By taking a few simple steps before the cold weather sets in, you can help to minimise the potential for bigger problems later on.

What technological treats await us in 2015?

ell here we are, we've nearly it made through another year, and I wonder what technological treats await us in 2015! Well how about this for starters:

Windows 10 preview. Somehow Windows 9 that everyone was talking about a few months ago, has evolved into 10. The reasoning behind this shift varies between a few complicated theories to do with coding dating back to Windows 95 & 98, to a perhaps more outlandish theory that number 9 is considered unlucky in Japan – a big market for Microsoft! However, whatever the reasoning, the Technical Preview of the new operating system (due out mid 2015) has been released and I have just installed a copy on a laptop to try it out. First impressions are surprisingly good, and guess what – the start menu is back, no doubt due to popular demand! This new menu is a cross between the traditional pop up menu found in earlier versions of Windows, with some of the new-style tiles bolted onto the side. See an image of it here * I will be using Windows 10 Preview over the coming weeks and will report back in my next article – next year already!

Mobile phone contracts are set to achieve a record total of 7.1bn worldwide in 2014, 2.7bn of these being smartphones.

Cyber Monday is scheduled to be the very day this publication is due out - December 1^{st} . This is reputed to be busiest day for shopping online shopping and follows on from Black Friday when (in the USA) stores are said to 'go into the black' thanks to huge pre-Christmas spending. Amazon and other multi-national stores have used this theme to have their own big sales.

Intel profits up as PCs sales rise 8% beating analyst estimates. This is an interesting fact when the big sellers are actually smartphones, tablets and laptops. My own experience in selling PCs is that a lot of people still like using a traditional PC, they find there's something familiar and comforting about sitting down at a desk and using a normal keyboard and mouse and big screen.

TripAdvisor is an extremely popular site: www.tripadvisor.co.uk that you may have used to help plan your next holiday, i.e. knowing where or where not to stay. If you're not familiar with this website, the

idea is that anyone can post a review, good or bad, on anywhere they have stayed. An interesting story broke as I was writing this, and may have developed further by the time you read it. A couple stayed in a small hotel in Blackpool and decided afterwards to post a bad review; the hotel management saw it and charged the couple's credit card a 'fine' of £100! When they complained to the hotel they were told they should have read the booking conditions that clearly stated that would be the result of any bad online review! The case continues.

iPads and iPhones are the device of choice for many people, and following an earlier software update some users experienced problems with internet connectivity. This seemed to have occurred after the first IOS update 8.0.1. If this happened to you and your device is still on this version, try updating to 8.0.2 or more likely now 8.1, and hopefully this will rectify the situation. If your device refuses to update because you do not have enough spare space, plug your device into a computer with iTunes installed and do the update that way. Secondly, if you get a message that it can't back up to iCloud because you have exceeded your storage limit, you can increase from 5GB to 20GB for just 79p per month.

Cloud storage – what's all that about then? A question I am often asked. The best way to describe it is 'someone else's computer'. For instance the iCloud storage I mentioned above is an amount of secure storage space on Apple's own computers (known as servers), and thanks to the wonders of the internet, these could be located anywhere in the world.

Microsoft Office users, and Google account holders also get a generous 15GB of storage for their documents and photos etc. The advantage of this kind of storage is that it can be made accessible to someone else if you choose, i.e. if you want to share some photos or a document with someone else, you upload them to the cloud, then send an invite to the person to securely view them. Easier than trying to email photos nowadays when file sizes are so massive owing to the high quality of photos produced by today's devices.

File size - how to find it. This is important, certainly if you want to attach more than one item to an email as all providers have a limit, and I believe Karoo is under 10MB. All you have to do is go into the folder where the item is stored, let's say My Pictures, then right click on the item and click Properties, this will then display the size in MB or KB (1,000 KB = 1 MB).

Public Service Announcement: Spoofs, scams etc. – a timely reminder, as the bad guys will be out to make money this time of year! If anyone rings you saying your computer has a problem: **Don't do it, don't let them into your computer** and **NEVER** give them a credit card. Legitimate computer support companies **NEVER** phone around touting for business. Keep your passwords complex and safe (try not to use the same one!). For other tips on staying safe and secure visit: www.getsafeonline.org

Windows 8 or 8.1 - if you want to disable that pesky charms menu that pops out whenever you point to the top right of your screen, or the recent apps from the top left, do the following. 

In the Kitchen



inter cabbages are a good source of nutrients. They have great flavour and crunch and as British farmers and consumers, we should be proud of them.

Winter minestrone

serves 4, prep 10 mins, cook 30 mins

2 tbsp olive oil

1 onion, peeled & finely diced

1 garlic clove, peeled & finely chopped

1 leek, finely shredded

2 celery sticks, finely diced

2 carrots, peeled & diced

1 tin chopped tomatoes

600ml good veg or chicken stock

½ a green (any type) cabbage, leaves shredded

1 bay leaf

½ tin cooked white beans, rinsed & drained

100g small pasta shapes eg. orzo, or spaghetti broken into small pieces

handful of chopped fresh parsley

handful grated parmesan

Heat the oil in a large pan. Add the onion, garlic, leek, celery and carrot. Fry for 10 mins on a low heat, stirring now and then. Add the tomatoes, stock and bay leaf. Season and simmer for 10 mins. Add the beans, cabbage and pasta. Cook for 10 mins or so, until the pasta is just cooked and the cabbage wilted. Check the seasoning. Stir in the parsley to serve and sprinkle the parmesan on top.

Savoy cabbage thoran with sticky jasmine rice

serves 2 as a main, 4 as a side, prep 10 mins, cook 30 mins

Thoran is an Indian dish, originating in Kerala. Traditionally, the recipe uses fresh coconut, but that can be hard to find. You can use other greens apart from cabbage, eg. kale. Serve with sticky jasmine rice, or simple boiled basmati, for a light, healthy supper.

2 tbsp coconut oil

1 onion, peeled & finely sliced (or use a shredded leek)

2 tsp black mustard seeds

1 tbsp dried curry leaves

3cm fresh ginger, peeled & finely grated

1-2 red chillies, depending on your preference for heat, or use some dried chilli flakes

½ tsp freshly ground cumin seeds

½ tsp turmeric

½ a very large or 1 small savoy cabbage, shredded, tough core & ribs removed

50g creamed coconut from a block, chopped or grated

handful dried coconut chips/shreds, toasted in a dry frying pan until golden

handful coriander leaves (optional)

Heat the coconut oil, add the onion and fry on a low heat for 10 mins until softened, stirring now and then to stop it catching. Turn the heat up a little. Add the mustard seeds and curry leaves and fry for approx 1 min, until you hear the seeds start to pop. Add the ginger, chilli, cumin and turmeric and stir for 30 secs. Then add the cabbage, creamed coconut and 2 tbsp water. Season and stir for 1 min or so to mix the ingredients together, then cover and cook on a lowish heat for approx 5 mins, stirring occasionally, until the cabbage has softened. Add a splash more water if the cabbage starts to catch on the bottom of the pan. Check the seasoning. Scatter over the coconut chips and fresh coriander, if using.

for sticky jasmine rice for 2:

200g jasmine rice

salt

Put the rice in a saucepan with twice the volume of water and a good pinch of salt. Bring up to the boil, cover and cook for 10 mins. Turn off the heat. Leave it covered to let the rice steam while you make the cabbage thoran. Once the cabbage is cooked, fluff up the rice with a fork; all the liquid should be absorbed and the rice sticky and tender.

Braised savoy with pancetta

serves 4, prep 10 mins, cook 40 mins

knob of butter, approx 25g

1 piece of pancetta (250g), cut into 2cm dice

1 onion, peeled & finely diced

2 carrots, peeled & finely diced

2 celery sticks, finely diced

1 bay leaf

6 sage leaves, finely shredded

1 medium savoy cabbage, outer leaves removed, quartered

1 pack (500ml) ready-made chicken stock

Melt the butter in a heavy-based casserole style pan, one with a lid. Add the pancetta and fry, stirring now and then, until browned. Turn the heat to low, add the onion, carrots and celery and cook, stirring occasionally, for 15 mins (this helps render the fat in the pancetta down). Add the bay leaf, sage and cabbage wedges. Pour in the stock and season with salt and pepper. Bring up to a simmer, cover and cook for approx 20 mins, until the cabbage is tender. Check the seasoning before serving.





Quick scandi-style red cabbage

serves 4, prep 5 mins, cook 50 mins

Many red cabbage recipes take a good couple of hours to cook. This Scandinavian inspired recipe has lots of warm spicy flavour but takes less than half the time so, as well as serving alongside cold meats, it's good for a mid-week supper. Try it with pork chops and creamy mashed potatoes.

1 tbsp rapeseed or sunflower oil

1 red onion, peeled & very thinly sliced

 $\frac{1}{2}$ a large red cabbage, tough core & ribs removed, leaves finely shredded

3 juniper berries, bashed with the flat of your knife

½ tsp allspice

½ tsp caraway seeds

1 bay leaf

1 tbsp red wine vinegar

100ml red wine

2 tbsp cranberry sauce

1 good sized eating apple, cored & thinly sliced

Heat the oil in a large wide frying pan, wok or casserole, one with a lid (or you can cover the cabbage with a layer of foil instead). Add the onion and cabbage and fry for 10 mins on a low to medium heat, stirring now and then. Add the juniper, allspice, caraway, bay leaf, vinegar, wine and cranberry sauce. Season, cover and cook on a low heat for 20 mins. Add the apple and cook for a further 20 mins, stirring now and then to stop it catching. Check the seasoning before serving.

Aloo gobi

serves 4, prep 10 mins, cook 35 mins

Some aloo gobi recipes call for cooking the potatoes and cauliflower together, but I find parboiling (partly cooking in a pan of salted boiling water) the potatoes speeds up this dish; they can take ages otherwise, and the cauli just ends up overcooked and mushy. Serve with warm naan bread, mango chutney and yogurt or raita.

2 tbsp coconut oil

1 very large or 2 small onions

2 garlic cloves, peeled & crushed

3cm fresh ginger, peeled & finely grated

2 tsp black mustard seeds

½ tsp turmeric

1-2 fresh chillies, deseeded (leave the seeds in for more heat) & finely chopped, or use chilli flakes

1 tbsp curry leaves (you can buy these dried)

600g potatoes, peeled & cut into rough 2-3cm chunks, parboiled for 6-8 mins, depending on size, until almost tender

1 medium cauliflower, chopped into bite sized florets, plus any inner light green leaves

2 large tomatoes, diced

1 lemon

salt

handful fresh coriander leaves (optional)

Heat the coconut oil in a large heavy-based pan, one with a lid (or use a piece of foil). Add the onion and fry on a low heat for 10 mins, stirring now and then to stop it catching. If it does start to catch and burn, add a splash of water and turn the heat lower. Add the garlic, ginger, mustard seeds, turmeric, chilli and curry leaves. Turn the heat up slightly and fry until the mustard seeds start to pop. Add the potatoes, cauliflower, tomatoes and the juice from ½ the lemon. Season with a little salt, cover and cook on a low to medium heat, stirring now and then, for 10-12 mins, until the cauli and potatoes are tender. It shouldn't be too wet a mixture, but add a splash of water if it starts to catch on the bottom of the pan. Check the seasoning and add a little more lemon juice to taste. Sprinkle over the the coriander leaves to serve, if using.

Baxter's Journey

am often asked the question "how do I think of what to write in the articles?". Usually, it is what is occurring during the time of year such as Easter and the potential hazard of chocolate poisoning or November 5th and the fear of fireworks but also everyday things that happen either within my family or friends lives brings ideas to mind.

You will know by now, from past articles, my 'dread' of learning new technology, which brings me to shame when I see my 3 year old and now my 18 month old grandsons whizzing around an iPad. So you can imagine my reluctance, at the time, when my daughters persuaded me to change my faithful old mobile phone to a more up to date iPhone. Learning has been slow but I am getting there with a little extra tuition from an unlikely source...my mum. Not unusual you may think but at 87 she can scroll around her own iPhone just as quick as my grandsons on their iPads and even prints photos sent to her mobile, via her printer. So, technology does have many advantages as my eldest daughter found out.

You may have read about the exploits of Baxter, Kath and her partner Matt's cross Belgian Shepherd but this time it isn't accidental. They have been noticing just recently, that Baxter had been stumbling on the 'odd' occasion but more so recently. On a visit to our Park Street surgery they saw one of our excellent orthopaedic vets Rob Williams, who explained he was showing signs of a possible neurological

problem. He was immediately referred to see a specialist at the Animal Health Trust Hospital in Newmarket, which is where we went last Monday. On arrival, we were made to feel most welcome by not only the warm greeting by the receptionists but also the lovely nurses, who both showed their compassion for animals. This is also one of the things that makes working at KINGSTON worthwhile.

After a brief consultation, we left Baxter there to have his bloods taken and then a general anaesthetic for an MRI scan. It felt like the longest 5 hours of our lives but eventually we got the call Baxter was ready to go home. On his discharge appointment with the consultant, we were shown his findings. The scan showed 2 small ligaments pressing slightly on Baxters' spinal cord. At the moment he is only showing slight discomfort but if left, it may possibly progress. The treatment is either lifetime medication which eventually may not be enough or an operation to remove the pressure but as you can imagine, at great cost not only monetary but the operation does come with risks. We were told not to decide there and then but to go home and think about which route to take. Breathing space is what Kath needed...she had the whole day to go through with Matt who sadly couldn't come with us due to work commitments. After a well deserved nights rest, things became clearer....the only way is to go ahead with the operation and hopefully make the rest of Baxter's years, pain free. Also the trusted iPhone came to the fore once again when the consultant sent the scan photos to Kath's mobile via e mail to show Matt. So today, Kath rang the hospital to book the operation and once again Baxter will be making the long journey down to Newmarket ready for his operation on Monday 1st December. It wasn't an easy decision for them...not only because of the highs risks but also it is a highly delicate costly operation. Latest technology is expensive!!

This is where Pet Insurance is a saving grace! Thankfully, Baxter is insured so this helped greatly in the decision to help him lead a 'normal' life. How to help hedgehogs this Autumn

10 hedgehog-friendly gardening tips for the months ahead

he People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) and British Hedgehog Preservation Society (BHPS) have together produced a free guide of 10 tips to make your gardens hedgehog-friendly this autumn and help this small British mammal in decline. Their top tip: check and make your gardens accessible!

Gardens and urban green spaces provide a vital habitat for hedgehogs to live in, but their numbers have fallen by more than a third over the last 10 years. By making your garden more hedgehog-friendly this autumn you will be helping animals prepare for hibernation, a critical time for any hedgehog. The ten tips offer advice and easy practical tasks for all the family to get involved in, whether green-fingered or not, for example:

Link your gardens - Hedgehogs roam between 1-2km each night in search of food, shelter and potential mates. They can also change nesting sites more than once during their hibernation period. It's therefore critical that they can access a wide range of gardens and placing a 13cm x 13cm hole in your garden walls

or fences will let hedgehogs through, but be too small for most pets. Once you've made a hole in your fence you can add it to the national map on the Hedgehog Street website.

Food and water - Hedgehogs really benefit from extra food, using it as a supplement to their natural diet. Meaty cat or dog food, hedgehog food, meal worms and chopped, unsalted peanuts are all suitable. Hedgehogs are lactose intolerant and should only be given water to drink.

Henry Johnson, Hedgehog Officer at PTES says: "In autumn months hedgehogs will be foraging for food to store up their fat reserves and seeking out suitable shelter in preparation for hibernation. This coincides with a generally busy time in the gardening calendar so it would be great if people can spare a thought for hedgehogs while they are pruning and mulching. Making log piles and storing leaf litter in a quiet corner of the garden creates natural nesting and feeding sites for them – and it's so easy to do."



Here is Paul's latest walk in his series of monthly rambles. This month his destination is North Cave

The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.


Map:- EXPLORER 293

Start at GR. SE897327 Car park opposite Church. Distance 5.0 Miles.

eave the car park heading south to enter the playing fields. On entering the playing fields turn left to reach a hedge and then turn right and walk with the hedge on the left. On reaching a fence, pass through and continue walking

in the same direction. On reaching the tarmac road (North Cave to Everthorpe) turn left and follow this to the village of Everthorpe. Immediately after the first of the houses, take the road on the right and then at the next junction turn left. After about 180 metres, locate a hidden footpath sign on the right and pass through a kissing gate and then cross a short paddock to a further gate which pass through and walk with the fence on the left. On reaching a large tree, keep the hedge on the left. At the end of this field, cross a wooden footbridge and continue ahead with the hedge on the left.

At the end of this field enter a narrow plantation and turn right then after a few metres turn left and cross a wooden footbridge and then follow a distinct path towards houses. Cross a wooden footbridge before entering an enclosed path, cross a stile and walk down a surfaced path to emerge on an estate road. Turn left and then immediately bright to enter a snicket, cross a further road and then emerge on the main road passing through South Cave. On reaching this road, turn left and walk towards Cave Castle.

On reaching the entrance to Cave Castle, turn left and follow this road as it winds its way towards Castle Farm Court housing estate. Immediately on approaching the estate, bear left and pass through a wooden gate then turn right and walk with a hedge on the right then veer to the right and pass through a kissing gate and cross over a chalk lane and follow a distinct grass track which becomes gravel. At the end of this gravel track turn right and follow a line of trees across the golf course eventually with a ditch on the right.

At the end of this line of trees cross an open area to a second clump of trees then turn left and aim for a way marker (difficult to locate) and then cross a footbridge and then walk with the line of trees on the left. At the end of the trees veer right and then immediately turn left and cross a footbridge and cross a stile then walk straight ahead across a slightly raised part of the field heading towards a hedge.

On reaching the hedge, continue in the same direction keeping the hedge on the right. At the end of the field, pass through a kissing gate and turn right on the grassy track. Immediately before reaching the road, turn left and pass through a kissing gate and walk parallel to the road. On reaching the first gate on the right pass through a kissing gate to emerge on the road. Turn left and follow this road back towards North Cave to eventually meet the track back towards the playing fields and the car park.

he Christmas tree has become an iconic tradition at Christmas time with people choosing from freshly cut, pot grown and artificial trees. Popularised in the UK by Queen Victoria and Prince Albert, the Christmas tree was bedecked with candles, sweets, fruits, nuts, homemade decorations and small gifts.

Selecting and decorating the Christmas tree is one of the key



festive traditions, and nothing compares to the wonderful fresh pine scent, appearance and texture of a real Christmas tree.

The traditional Christmas tree is the Norway spruce which we have available 5ft-10ft, but as an alternative we also have the beautiful Nordmann and Frasier Fir available in 5ft-8ft. Just remember to give your tree plenty of water and follow our simple steps to ensure that your beautiful natural tree takes pride of place in your home this Christmas.

Before you buy your Christmas tree, make sure you know how much room you've got to house it. Measure the ceiling height and width of the space and take a tape measure with you.

- Look for a green tree with no sign of brown needles. Check that the trunk is sturdy and straight and the tree has a good, even shape with well-spaced branches and no obvious gaps. Needles should stay fast if you gently run your fingers down one of the lower branches.
- Once home, place your tree in a cool, dry place out of the wind in a bucket of water until you're ready to decorate.
- Before you bring it into the home, saw 2.5cm (1in) off the end of the trunk.
- Place the tree in as cool a position as possible ideally well away from radiators and open fires.
- Christmas trees keep best in plain water rather than soil or sand, which block the pores in the bark, so use a specially designed Christmas tree stand.
- Keep topped up with water. Don't forget to add a little sugar.

Festive Plants

Flowering and colourful plants are always a joy to give and receive at Christmas. Their bright, cheerful appearance,

especially those with red flowers, bracts and stems, lifts the spirits and epitomises the season. Follow these simple guidelines to help your festive plants perform superbly right through the Christmas season and well into the New Year.

CYCLAMEN

Cyclamen are one of the most charming winter-flowering plants with exotic looking, swept-back flowers in intense shades of red, purple, pink and white with heart shaped, silver-veined foliage. They are easy and rewarding houseplants, provided you meet their requirements – a cool spot (12-15°C) that's brightly lit, but out of direct sunlight. Overwatering is one of the chief causes of their demise. When the compost surface feels dry immerse the pot in a bowl of rain water for 20 minutes then pour the excess away.

CHRISTMAS ROSE

Said to have sprung from the tears of a young girl who had nothing to offer the Christ child, the Christmas rose (Helleborus niger) blooms in the darkest months of the year, making them a valuable asset to any garden. Native to Europe, the Christmas rose grows 38cm (15in) high and bears single white flowers about 8cm (3in) in diameter from December to March. Grow in a sheltered position, in soil with plenty of added organic matter

AMARYLLIS

Hippeastrum or amaryllis is an indoor plant producing large, colourful showy flowers on tall stems in winter. Give plants plenty of light so the stems don't become too leggy. Support stems with a short stake to keep them upright under the weight of the flowers.

After the blooms have faded keep the bulbs in a warm place and resume watering the next autumn.

POINSETTIAS

Their name comes from Joel Robert Poinsettia, who introduced them to the USA from Mexico, about 1828. And even though poinsettias now come in different colours, the red and green classic is the most popular. Poinsettias are easy to care for. To enjoy them as long as possible put them in a bright warm spot, around 20°C without draughts. Do not overwater by leaving water in the saucer – water only when the potting mixture is almost dry.

FORCED HYACINTHS

Bowls of forced hyacinths that have been grown in the dark to encourage them into early flower add a delightful scent to the home. To prolong flowering, place in a sunny spot away from draughts and radiators. Stand the pots on shallow trays of moist gravel. Cut off the flowers when they die and give the bulbs some liquid feed until the leaves begin to fade. Gradually dry off the bulbs and plant them out in the garden to enjoy in years to come

I have written about him a few times over the past months and years.... his name to us was Lou or Louie. May I personally say he was one of the best and definitely one of a kind. You will never again meet a fishing character like he was. He had so many funny sayings. Allow me to share some of them

with you and some funny experiences too.

Whilst In the shop he would pick up on what additives people where choosing to mix into their ground baits, he would then wind us all up as he had some "secret condiments" to mix in. That's not all. He used to call brazem powder "custard" because he kept forgetting its correct name.

This is the guy that we nicknamed "Plummet", yes you guessed it; it was Louie who fell in Rainbow Lake remember. He had many nicknames; from Me Plummet was the politest believe me. Ha Ha!

Whenever you where fishing and you heard the crunch crunch of footsteps along the bank as you where fishing the margins I might add you could always 100% guarantee it would be Louie with a sandwich in his mouth spying on what everybody else was doing. You could be pegged on peg one and you could still hear Louie either laughing or cursing on peg 23. He cursed many a time as he was very prone to getting his hook and line caught in a tree trying to cast out, he would announce "I'm shaking the bush, shaking the bush".

When Louie first started fishing his technique of landing fish was so very funny and farcical. He would hold up his landing net and handle in mid-air underneath a fish dangling from his rod and line!!

He would always be one of the first to shout Cuckoo as one of the club members lost a fish. It didn't matter if you were an England International angler or a complete novice, Louie's first words would be "listen son you know you're coming second because

I'm gonna kick your **** today, an this is cos' you ain't got any of my "condiments". Every now and then, god knows how, but even Louie really did get a result. Bless him.

He was 66 years old and he did a little work voluntarily for me. So I called him the oldest YTS in Britain. This always made him smile.

On our last match we were at Stannilands at Thorne on the Air and Calder Canal. It was very hard fishing but he got a Roach 10 minutes before the end to his great delight. I promised not to blank him as he didn't weigh it in. This put a massive smile on his face.

Sadly on the way back to the car he suffered a fatal heart attack

So my final words are to you all wherever you are "tight lines" and to Louie..... Night Night Louie, miss you loads son and that's not just from me but from everyone you ever knew.

"Tight lines son don't forget your condiments"!!!



Hallgate Schools - continued

by Peter Railton, Author and Local Historian

The Year is 1949

The year began with Mr. Panke away ill again and Mr. Bailey was appointed Assistant Head in July. His duties as set down in the log book were quite formidable

- 1. To deputise for the Headmaster when sickness or duties necessitate the latter's absence from school.
- 2. To keep in touch with all school activities, changes, individual problems and correspondence.
- 3. To consult with the Headmaster on school policy, planning of timetables and distribution of teaching staff.
 - 4. To act as liaison between headmaster and staff on all problems.
- 5. To have a full knowledge of the details of the working of the school bank, school milk, school dinners, requisitions etc.
- 6. To see that all school equipment is in good repair and easily accessible when required.
- 7. To superintend the projection of films during lessons which necessitates use of the projector.
- 8. To be responsible (under the Head) until such times as a woodwork instructor be appointed, for all woodwork tools and equipment including timber stored, and for the present to take the woodwork instruction in the two senior classes.
- 9. To generally supervise all singing instruction throughout the school, to take singing lessons as per timetable.

There are no more entries in the boys' school log book for that year.

Mention was made in the 1948 article of the urgent need for more school places and the using of the Congregational Church rooms - also pressed into service was the old National School, King Street Rooms, on the corner of King Street and Finkle street, used again for educational purposes. A rising birth rate nationally prompted the new Labour government to meet what was foreseen as a country-wide emergency alongside the need to replace town schools destroyed in the air raids, with the supply and erection of temporary school classrooms for L.E.A.'s and Cottingham to receive some. The grass paddock between the boys school and the old Vicarage was acquired and the construction began of several H.O.R.S.A. Huts - Hutting Operation for the Raising of the School Age. This was ongoing during the winter of 1948 to 49. The supply of S.F.O.R.S.A. furniture followed - School Furniture Operation for the Raising of the School Age.' Military jargon at work? More

Early in January there was a burglary at the school and the desks of Mrs. Tether and Mrs. Ridley were tampered with in the girls' department, but nothing had been taken.

Two students from the University College, Miss Sugarman and Miss Darrell went to the school on teaching practice.

Mrs. Fletcher was stricken with a severe bout of flu and was absent for three weeks in February and early March, leaving Miss Buttery (who's handwriting in the log book is impeccable) in charge of the school. On the 6th and 7th of April, the juniors and the seniors entertained their parents with some of their work in music and dancing; some 200 parents attended and enjoyed these displays.

Three girls went on to further education - Sheila Giles was accepted at the College of Commerce in Brunswick Avenue, and Mary Collinson and Pauline Youhill at the College of Art in Hull. After the Easter holidays 251 girls were on the role and French classes were started under the tuition of Mrs. Hall. The school was closed on the 10th of May because the hall was to be used for voting in the Urban District Council Elections.

On the 13th of May, Mr. Acaster, the Schools Gardening Organiser called and discussed plans for making a school garden and got the enthusiastic support of Mrs. Fletcher, who was a keen gardener at home anyway. It was decided that the areas around the newly erected pre-fab classrooms should receive attention and the worst of the left-over building materials and rough grass were removed and then Mrs. Fletcher and her 'girls gardening club' took over. The





soil was dug over, stones cleared, then raked and levelled, grass seed sown and roses planted; other types of flowers were added over the years and the girls were responsible for cutting the grass with shears and a push along lawn mower. Most of the pre-fabs were used by the senior girls at first, but over the years the juniors and some infant classes used them from time to time. Many Heads and teachers leave a legacy of something good in a school and this was Mrs. Fletcher's legacy which lasted until the buildings were removed and the Further Education building erected on the site.

Thirteen girls had been selected to go to secondary schools in the autumn: M. Bennison; C. Buffey; E. Corner; M. Dry; M. Kirkness; V. Laud; C. Lawton; C. Rodmell; S. Skinner; R. Tennison; S. Brown; S. Gibson and J. Clark.

On the 25th of May, Senior. 1 and Junior 5 girls were taken by Miss Selby and Mrs. Akeroyd to the Dorchester cinema to see 'Scott of the Antarctic' and a few days later two teams of netball junior girls went to Penshurst School in Hessle - one team lost and the other one drew and they were entertained to tea in the school later. The next day, a senior netball team went and took on their opposite numbers and avenged the defeat of the Hallgate juniors by winning 11-4. Four teams of girls took part in the Folk Dance Festival held at Tranby Lodge Hessle in June and on the 7th of July, competitors, staff and spectators journeyed to Bilton for the Holderness Schools Sports. Cottingham Schools came second in the Senior sections.

Doreen Kutchinson, Jean Kilvington and Doris Needham were accepted for the pre-nursing course at Thoresby High School in Hull. On the 27th of July an open day was held when parents and friends were invited to the junior art, needlework and hand work displayed in the hall, senior work in the annexe (the pre-fabs) and cookery in the. domestic science room. About 160 parents looked around this very successful event'. The term ended with the departure of Miss R. A. Wright after 23 years at the school, to take up a post at Longcroft School in Beverley. She was presented with a travelling case by the staff and pupils and was described by Mrs. Fletcher as a most valuable and dependable member of Staff.'

Workmen had been in the school during the summer holidays renewing the ceiling in four of the classrooms and the girls returned to find a fully redecorated building. Numbers were steadily increasing with 294 on role compared to 285 the previous year. 56 pupils went up from the infants; there were 10 classes, six junior and four senior. Three new teachers began their duties in the department - Mrs. M. Wilson, Miss M. Bell and Miss A. Gledhill. How many ex-pupils remember gathering rose-hips that autumn? Some 5451bs. were gathered and sent to Newcastle to be made into Rose Hip Syrup, a vitamin-rich liquid for babies and small children.

A milestone was reached on the 25th of October when about 60 parents went to the school and met with staff members and it was agreed to form a parent-teachers group. Mrs. Fletcher records that it was a very wet evening and she was surprised that so many people turned out. The future employment of her pupils occupied her thoughts too and representatives of the Labour Exchange in Hull visited the department that autumn. The term ended with the usual parties and carol concerts - the end of term and the end of another decade at Hallgate Schools.

Why the word "NO" is not helpful

Thave been studying hard over the last 2 years to better understand how to train any animal, as well as my horses using science based fact......not mythical fog. The overriding factor is that most training techniques concentrate on corrective methodology.

I was recently doing 2 days of Lecture/Demo's down in Ipswich at The East Anglian Equine Fair......where I took my pony to show how Positive reinforcement training works in real life. I followed a talk/demo by a Natural Horsemanship trainer who was talking about how to deal with unwanted behaviours. The horse at her side was unsettled and kept nudging forward so she kept twitching on the rope to make it move back. No sooner had it moved back then it moved forward again...so the scenario was repeated. This horse could not learn to stand at that particular moment in time because it was worried and confused in that environment (in a pen surrounded by the show goings on around it and the audience in front of it)

Eventually the pressure she used increased on the horses sensitive head and it shot back and kept going back....so she then pulled it forwards! This form of using aversive training or "pressure on" simply just had to increase until the horse worked out that when the pressure was off it should be glad to stand in order to avoid it happening again. At no time did she praise the horse for standing where she wanted it to nor did she give the horse any information about it being okay to feel unsafe and that by staying quietly with her was the safe place to be. This training kept the horse worried, the environment kept the horse worried and gave the horse no information about what she did, actually, want it to do. Corrective training does just that. It tells the animal, child, dog, horse exactly what you do not want but gives no information to the animal what is you would like and can simply increase the emotional state forcing the behaviour to happen in the first place. "No" is simply not helpful to the animal at all.

If you look at this situation from another angle of MARKING the absolute second in time where the animal is where you would like it to be and then be able to reinforce it with something the animal finds highly reinforcing (praise with a child, a good fuss with a dog, a bit of apple or carrot for a horse, a treat of some sort for any species really) then the likelihood of that behaviour being repeated is very likely! The way to mark that second in time is to use a BRIDGE! This word means a noise, distinguishable from all other noises, bespokely (Classically conditioned) attached to (paired with) something really good. A clicker is commonly used in dogs and horses, a whistle is used in Marine Mammal training, a clucking noise, the word GOOD used in a special tone

consistently said. The animal needs to know 100% that bridge is the promise of a reinforcer. Pavlov discovered this many moons ago and it is called Classical conditioning.

Once that is in place then the animal is going to try hard to earn that bridge.....not the food! The bridge is the information it needs to know that has just done something you are really happy with, something you would like the animal to repeat or marks an emotional state you are happy with. Emotions are behaviours of course and stress brings on a whole load of trouble re behaviours.....so if you concentrate on marking and reinforcing calm feelings or relaxed feelings then the animal will benefit so very much in the long term....and so will you! Reinforcing eh?!!!!

Training your dog not to pull on its leash is a classic example of the use of aversive.....it pulls so you pull it back and so on and so on. You get cross and frustrated and the dog simply learns to pull away from you more and more. Try instead marking any time spent next to you at your leg and back it up with a treat as well as praise. Attach the word "come" or "here" (or whatever you decide would be the command for the dog to return to you or stay with you) and always reinforce it with a treat. Very soon your dog will no longer pull and will learn to stay with you or come back to you happily. Do this training away from any stressful stuff. At home in the back garden for instance. By training any animal to be calm and happy next to you will then arm you for the situations when the environment around the animal gets tough on it or causes it fear.

I choose to train trailering or clipping or injection desensitizing or worming horses before I need them to experience the situation in real life.

Pairing something really good with something physical or a noise that potentially would be stressful or fearful is such a brilliant way to train and means that your pet can find training enriching in its own right, as well as keeping you all safe. In science it is called Systematic desensitizing and Counter Conditioning!

Positive reward based training is happening with our educating young children, in dog training clubs and in Zoos internationally. It is my wish to promote it in the UK Horse training Industry as it is in the USA.

At present there are no rules or guidelines to using ethical techniques with horses. There is more and more information coming through on the internet but horse people inherently believe that dominance and corrective methods have always been the way and are therefore the way of the world. Not so I say! Dare I use the word "NO" in this context!

How would you cope with a fire in your home

magine, you wake up at 01:30 coughing and your eyes stinging, then you realise there's a fire downstairs, you can hear it and smell the acrid smoke. You manage to rouse the family and get them out of the house; you're all coughing and shivering; you've remembered to take the dog. A neighbour has called the fire service and they arrive quicker than you thought they would, thank goodness.

The fire fighters soon have things under control and put the fire out. They are very kind and sympathetic, they reassure you that although there is black smoke damage throughout the house, the main damage is confined to the kitchen – it looks like the fire may have started in the dishwasher. As much as the fire fighters would wish to be able to stay and help you, they can't, they have to get ready for their next call. One thing they can do for you however is call out the British Red Cross Fire and Emergency Support service (FES).

Once requested, two FES volunteers will meet up at the Central fire station in Hull to collect the FES camper then make their way to you. They will offer you shelter from the cold, plus clean, warm clothing, food etc for you dog, and they will make you all hot drinks and snacks. They will look after you. The volunteers have lots of practical experience so they will be able to help you make some urgent decisions about such things as where you will be able to stay. If you have insurance, chances are you will be covered to stay in a hotel for a short time, giving you chance to make longer term plans while your home is being repaired. Arrangements will also need to be made to make sure your home is secure. It could be that you can go to a relative's home for the rest of the night; the FES volunteers may be able to transport you.

The volunteers are very good at helping you with practical decisions. They are equally good with the emotional support they

give. Again, experience and training gives the volunteers the skills they need to comfort you. They understand how terrified you must have been when you discovered the fire and how relieved you must be feeling that your family got out safely, plus all the other emotions in between. They are very good at what they do and they care that you and your family feel supported.

Before the volunteers leave you they will give you a booklet that contains useful advice as well as details of how to contact various agencies and organisations if you need to replace any documents, or inform someone about the fire.

Some incidents of fire or flood that FES attends in Humberside are more serious, some less so – the one thing they all have in common is the care, support and understanding the people affected receive from the FES volunteers. We have been in partnership with Humberside Fire & Rescue Service for more than twenty years, supporting hundreds of adults and children and often their pets. The relationship between the two agencies is excellent and mutually supportive.

Three of the FES volunteers live in Cottingham. If you think you would like to volunteer for FES, here are some facts: currently FES is offered between 18:00 and 06:00 weekdays, and full weekends and bank holidays, though we respond to most day time calls as well; we operate a rota system that allows for the volunteers to plan their time on call - there is no expectation that volunteers be available for a minimum number of hours per month, though some level of commitment is desirable; ideally volunteers will live within about a 30 minutes drive from Central fire station; full training and support is provided to ensure that volunteers feel equipped to support people in crisis; out of pocket expenses are paid; full uniform is provided. Volunteers learn the protocol for being on a fire ground and receive training on driving the camper, if they so choose. A DBS check is mandatory. All training, uniform and checks are free to our volunteers.

While FES volunteers don't provide this service for their own benefit, the reward they feel after they've been able to support someone is remarkable.

Great Uncle George and the Christmas Chicken

reat Uncle George lived in Barton upon Humber and was my Dad's uncle. He was one of a family of boat owners which stretched back into history, plying their trade to Europe and along the coasts and inland waterways in the days of sail.

Uncle George lived down Waterside Road in Barton with his wife and two sons and operated a Sloop - a sailing barge. I remember on one of our visits to Barton before the Second World War, being taken along with my father to see one of the vessels on a slipway in the Haven and men clearing barnacles from the enormous hull and applying a thick black tarring substance to protect and seal the woodwork. Barton Haven is silted up now almost to its full length and boats can only get into the mouth at high tide - mountains of mud are slowly blocking that now and it looks as if it will follow the fate of Hedon Haven - even Hessle Haven is looking threatened too, as layers of mud line its sides. A pity to see these old places of early industry choking to death.

My Dad's Mother was one of George's sisters and often went across from Hull to visit the various family members; on one visit in early December in the late 1930's, she mentioned that she was spending Christmas with us in Cottingham - she was a widow and sometimes went to her daughter's and sometimes to us. Uncle George promised that he would send us a chicken from his collection of backyard fowls and that we would receive it on Christmas Eve.

The quickest route from Barton to Cottingham in those days was via the steam train from Barton Station to New Holland Station then the train would slowly puff its way on to the long pier amid a lot of creaking and clanking until it reached the end where one of the ferry boats would be waiting; it was a duel pier, i.e. there was a narrow road section for cars which could drive straight on to the stern section of the vessel. Three ferry boats were operated by the L.N.E.R., (London and North Eastern Railway), the Lincoln Castle, Wingfield Castle and Tattershal Castle - two did a shuttle service between Hull Victoria Pier and New Holland Pier, usually passing in mid-river, while one was kept in reserve at New Holland in case of breakdowns.

These were fascinating vessels with side paddles - you could see into the engine room at the pistons working and there was a comfortable lounge and buffet and good views from the deck on fine days. Clouds of black smoke issued from the funnel and the paddles churned up the water on each side - an unforgettable experience.

The unfortunate chicken was sacrificed early on Christmas Eve morning and began its journey to our dinner table, courtesy of train - ferry - and carriers cart. Carriers did a thriving business collecting parcels and goods of all kinds around the Hull area and delivering them to where they were destined. There were stands for carriers, carts - horse drawn or motor vehicle - along South Church Side of Holy Trinity Church and at various other places in the 'old town'. Some had been notified that their services were required, while others turned up at the Pier office on chance of a delivery job.

W. W. Grantham and Son of Cottingham were carriers and had a. stand in South Church Side. Both father and son had the same Christian names and to avoid confusion the son was always known as 'Dick! Now, whether Granthams had been notified or not I do not know, but anyway they were to be the final transporters of our Christmas dinner. The chicken, complete with feathers and an addressed brown luggage label tied to its legs with string, had been put on to the ferry - but, as was often the case, bad weather and poor visibility took a hand - a freezing fog hung over the Humber, the bane of all sloops and other vessel owners, no radar in those days to make matters worse the ferry clung to the Lincolnshire bank for a good way up-river to avoid the sand banks which have always plagued the shipping on the Humber.

The captain made his turn at last but too soon, the vessel; got stuck. I can imagine the groans from the passengers because we had been stuck like that once; if you were lucky the captain could reverse away, or else you were stuck there until high tide floated the vessel off. Grandma and her sister made frequent trips to see their

relatives in Barton and sometimes got stuck on a sandbank. "I'm sure they wait until I'm crossing", she would say, as if some evil spirit of the sandbank was waiting to capture her in the middle of the Humber!

Meanwhile in Cottingham, 'the clock was ticking - tea time came and went and no Christmas dinner appeared. "I hope our George has remembered," Grandma said anxiously. "Well grandma, if it doesn't arrive we'll have to have Boring Day's rabbit instead, Mother replied. Thankfully the rabbit had been prepared at the butcher's, (Edwin Hatfield in King Street, where 'Costa Coffee' is now) and she was secretly wishing that she had done the same with a chicken - it would have been plucked and drawn and in our pantry awaiting the next morning's appointment with the gas oven.

Six o'clock, seven o'clock -then just after half past seven came a knock at the front door - was it the missing chicken? Yes - a sigh of relief as my parents with me pushing in between them, opened

the door to see a cold, foggy darkness and in the light shed by the hallway bulb, a very wet Dick Grantham holding up an equally wet and bedraggled chicken by its legs.

"E're you are missus - boat was late and I 'ad a lot of calls to make and lorry brok' down", the tales of woe went on and on and all the while the foggy drizzle ran down the feathers of the hapless chicken making it look more miserable. Dad paid the few shillings for delivery and closed the door with a "Merry Christmas" to Dick who unenthusiastically muttered the same.

The chicken was now going to have to be made ready for the next day. Dad's offer to help consisted of carefully spreading several sheets of newspaper on the kitchen table, then going into the living room and tuning in the wireless to listen to Christmas Carols. "You can leave the door open if you like, to listen," he said generously, as Mother and Grandma set to work. They were old hands at this - off with the feathers first, a lot of the very small ones drifted about as I watched and I remember thinking that this seemed very cruel - could the poor thing feel its feathers being pulled out? Then when it came to cleaning it out and taking its head off, I joined Dad in the living room and tried to enjoy listening to the Carols with their messages of peace and joy to one and all - but not to chickens evidently.

Christmas Day dawned and the ladies got busy - the chicken received the obligatory sage and onion stuffing and put into a roasting tray, then into the oven. Vegetables were prepared, the table laid with a holly and ivy motif paper table cloth over the usual one, knives, forks, spoons and a Christmas cracker each and dishes made ready for the steaming Christmas pudding, while I was examining the things that good old Father Christmas had brought me.

Delicious smells drifted in from the kitchen, and soon the dinner was served and everything tasted lovely. The worries of the previous day were forgotten and everyone voiced thanks to Great Uncle George and for the eventual arrival of the excellent Christmas Chicken.

Shoppers benefit from free parking

HOPPERS visiting towns across the East Riding this Christmas will be able to park for free.

East Riding Council's cabinet yesterday approved proposals for free parking in council car parks in towns such as Beverley, Bridlington and Goole in the run-up to Christmas.

Pay-and-display machines in the council's car parks and onstreet parking locations will be clearly marked to let shoppers know there is no charge for weekend car parking, starting on Saturday, December 6.

Beverley Chamber of Trade chairman Julian Minshall said: "This is superb news for shoppers in the East Riding.

"The news will be very well received by traders who are doing everything they can to make sure people shop locally this festive period.

"The free car parking will also go along way to make sure this year's Christmas celebrations in Beverley are bigger and better than ever."

All council car parks will be free on Saturdays, December 6, 13 and 20, and Sundays, December 7, 14 and 21.

There will be no charges from 8.00 am on the Saturday to 8.00 am on the following Monday.

Normal parking rules will still apply, such as those around disabled parking bays and maximum stays.

Suspending payment for weekend car parking will cost the authority in the region of £40,000.







East Riding County Choir - A concert for St. Nicholas's Day, Saturday 6th December at the **Beverley Minster**

The 6th December is the feast day of St. Nicholas, the 4th century bishop of Myra, in what is now Turkey. Nicholas, who is the patron saint of both Russia and Green, is also (very appropriately for a Christmas concert!) the original Father Christmas – Santa Claus being a corruption of his name!

Joseph Haydn wrote the St. Nicholas Mass to be performed for the Name Day of his patron, the fabulously wealthy and intensely musical Prince Nicolaus Esterhazy of Hungary, and the choir will be singing this joyous work on the 242nd anniversary of its very first performance on 6 December 1772. It was one of the few choral works that Havdn wrote before his 50th birthday; most of his output at the time was either orchestral or instrumental, with his great choral masterpieces being written during the last 15 years of his life.

In complete contrast to the mass, the choir will be performing Benjamin Britten's St Nicolas Cantata. This was written to celebrate the centenary of Lancing College in Sussex and had its first (unofficial) performance at the very first Aldeburgh Festival in June 1948. The part of Nicolas was sung by Britten's partner, Peter Pears, an old boy of Lancing. The cantata tells the story of the life and works of the beloved bishop, some real, some legendary, centred around his care of the poor and downtrodden. One of these tales – where Nicholas resurrects three small boys who, in a time of dreadful famine, had been murdered and pickled in brine by a wicked butcher - was the basis for the tradition of giving presents to deserving children.

The soloists for the St. Nicholas concert will be the distinguished Irish tenor, Ross Scanlon (who will be singing the part of Nicolas in the Britten cantata) Judith Cunnold (soprano) Rachel Wyllie (contralto) and Benedict Williams (bass). The 'pickled boys' will be sung by four boys from Hull Collegiate School. East Riding County Choir will be conducted by its musical director, Colin Wright, and accompanied by the East Riding Sinfonia (leader Patricia Mitchell).

It is that time of year again (groan!). Welcome to the cold and flu season. Your first inclination may be to head to the closest chemist and stock up on tissues and cold medication. If you dread the thought of a runny or stuffed up nose, sneezing, sinus congestion, a headache, the chills and a dry scratchy throat, be proactive.

How can you accomplish that? Get regular physical activity (even walks will fit the fitness bill in the winter months) and improve the work of your overworked immune system by paying attention to your nutrition.

Here's how:

One – Think healthy protein:

One of the many tasks of protein is to improve the body's ability to produce antibodies that fight diseases and infections. Choose high-protein foods that are also are made up of healthy fats. Examples of these include ground turkey breast, white-meat chicken, beans, fish, nuts, tofu and non-fat dairy. Cut down on fatty red meats and dairy foods that are high in their fat content. These foods promote inflammation around the heart and should be avoided.

Two - Enjoy a cup of black tea:

To improve your body's ability to fight viruses, drink more black tea. Those who consume five cups (approximately three mugs) of black tea on a daily basis, produce 10 times more "virus-fighting interferon" than those individuals who drink coffee.

Three – Add some color to your diet:

Fruits and vegetables come in every color of the rainbow- well practically! Load up on as many colors as you can. Bell peppers, broccoli, kiwi fruit, oranges, strawberries and tomatoes are all excellent sources of vitamin C and flavonoids. These essential substances support the body in sending out protective immune cells. You need these foods so eat up as often as possible!

Four - Choose cereals that are 100 percent whole-grain:

Oatmeal and shredded wheat are two whole-grain cereals that are rich in the nutrients beta glucan, selenium and zinc. These three nutrients are particularly beneficial in the winter months because they enhance the work of the immune system.

Five – Fight illness with spiced up chicken soup:

Even with the best efforts, it is still possible to catch something during the cold and flu season. If you do come down with something, turn to the old standby, chicken soup. Chicken soup has the potential to shorten the duration of your illness by as much as 50 percent.

There have been many theories proposed as to why this may be the case. One of the theories has to do with an amino acid called cysteine. When chicken is cooked, it releases this amino acid, which is chemically similar to a drug for bronchitis called acetylcysteine.

To enhance chicken soup's power to fight the flu and a cold, add some garlic and hot red pepper to your soup. Garlic is excellent at fighting viruses while hot red pepper contains capsaicin, which is a very strong decongestant. Chicken soup with a little dill added to it can also do your infection a world of good.
