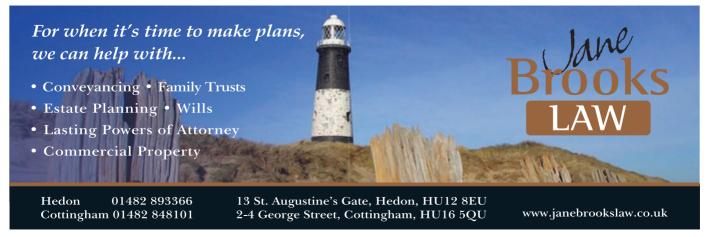

# Christmas Shopping? ... Know Your Rights

Rachael Kitchman, Solicitor at Graham & Rosen looks at your legal rights if there are problems with your Christmas presents

It's that time of year again when we are busy buying presents for our friends and family. We all want to buy that perfect present for someone special but things don't always go to plan.

The good news is that the new Consumer Rights Act 2015 strengthens your consumer rights and makes the law clearer and easier to understand. Unfortunately, some retails don't always play by the rules so it's important you know your rights should you need to return a gift.

**High Expectations** – the goods you receive should be of a satisfactory quality, so not faulty or damaged. They should also be fit for purpose and be as described and so match any description of the product of any models or samples you were shown before purchase.

Can I have a refund? – If the goods are not compliant, then yes, you can have a refund but you must act quickly; you only have 30 days to return an item and the refund should include any delivery charges. Some retailers offer a longer period over Christmas but don't assume this to be the case, ask before you hand over your credit card.

**Out of time?** – If 30 days have passed and the item is faulty or damaged, you must give the retailer the opportunity to repair or replace the item. If you are still unhappy you can ask for a refund or a price reduction if you wish to keep the goods.

Unwanted gift – can I have a refund/exchange? No, a retailer is not legally obliged to do so unless the goods are faulty. However, many retailers will offer a refund or allow you to exchange goods for a limited period of time. The key

is to ask at the till before purchase. If you buy online, however, you do have the right to cancel up to 14 days after receipt but may have to incur the cost of returning the item.

Can the recipient return the present? – The person who bought the gift needs to return it as the contract is between the purchaser and retailer. However, more and more retailers now have policies in place enabling the recipient to obtain a replacement or exchange by using a 'gift receipt'.

The retailer says the manufacturer is at fault – The fault may have been caused by the manufacturer but your contract is with the retailer and they are under a duty to make things right. However, if you have lost your receipt and the item comes with a warranty you might want to contact the manufacturer direct.

Love it or hate it there are presents to be bought; but by knowing your rights you can buy with confidence this Christmas.

Many people are understandably nervous of trusting their money to online banking, but if you have an up to date version of Windows and a good level of security installed (as mentioned above) then you should be safe. All banks offer an anti-fraud guarantee too. If you have a smart phone, have you tried PAYM? This is a quick and secure method of paying money to friends and family. 



150g waxy potatoes, such as Charlottes

5g thyme

1g cloves

1 bay leaf

5g black peppercorns

# Port and cheese a perfect match

ort and cheese enjoy delicious synergy and are renowned to be one of the best classic wine and food matches.

I, for one, like nothing better than bringing out a full cheese board at the end of a dinner party with friends - a varied selection of soft French cheeses, a couple of hard cheeses, including a mature English Cheddar and, of course, at least one blue; although knowing me there'll probably be two of those as well!

I try to find a really good Port to offer alongside the cheese; so, looking ahead to the festive season, I chatted with leading Port house, Taylor's, and top specialist cheese supplier, Paxton & Whitfield, and asked them to put their palates together and come up with some exciting matches for the ultimate festive cheeseboard.

First, a young, fruity Taylor's First Estate was matched with a goat's cheese called Sinodun Hill made by Norton and Yarrow Cheese, based in Oxfordshire.

First Estate is a richly concentrated Port crammed with blackcurrant, plum and liquorice flavours. A citric tang and nuttiness in the cheese combined magnificently with the luscious, firm tannic structure of Taylor's First Estate finishing with a creamy, restrained finish.

Next up was Taylor's Late Bottled Vintage (see best buys), with a fabulously creamy Brillat Savarin. The soft texture of the cheese, with its light penicillin white coat, worked brilliantly with the succulent, red berry fruit in the Port and its delicate chocolate notes.

Sweet, luscious flavours in this Late Bottled Vintage cut through the chalky sourness of the cheese rind making it one of the best combinations in the line-up.

Two amber coloured Tawny Ports were chosen with the next cheese pairings. Taylor's 10-year-old Tawny was matched with a nutty Cave-Aged Cheddar, matured in Somerset. The fruity, nutty notes in the cheese brought out the luscious fruit and Christmas spice in the

Meanwhile, a Gruyère Reserve from Switzerland found its perfect partner with a Taylor's 20-year-old Tawny. The salty fruity notes of the cheese with its lactic aftertaste proved to be an exotic partner to the complex, spicy, nutty flavoured Tawny and complemented its opulent fruit palate.

A Single Quinta 2002 Vintage (also see best buys) from Taylor's flagship vineyard, Vargellas, worked well with the fudgey, salty sweet flavours of Mimolette, a cheese made in Northern France. With a hint of violets and warm plum and cherry jam flavours, this Port and cheese combination was an exciting palate pairing.

One match that has stood the passage of time is, of course, Vintage Port and Stilton. Here a creamy yellow Stilton produced by Cropwell Bishop Creamery in Nottinghamshire (one of my personal favourites) was matched with a 2000 Vintage Port.

The soft buttery texture, mellow character and piquancy of the cheese teased the ripe powerful flavours in the Port and worked beautifully with its rich fruity core. Port and cheese enjoy delicious synergy and are renowned to be one of the best classic wine and food matches.

Talking of Port I was interested to learn recently that Sandeman is rolling out new clear bottles for its tawny Port range in the first step to get people drinking it outside its traditional post-dinner and Christmas slots.

The company has moved to clear bottles for the aged tawnies in order to show the evolution of the liquid as it ages, with the 20-year old and older Ports also using Vinilok closures to ensure a cleaner, more premium look. The labels draw on historic imagery and typography from the Port house's archives and includes its well-known Sandeman "Don" on the bottle

The new look, which is targeting the premium off-trade, specialist independents and the on-trade, will be rolled out across the entire portfolio in 2017, although its ruby Ports will continue to be bottled in dark glass.

The company says said education is key to boosting consumer awareness of Port's versatility, and said it was keen to tap into the buzz around successful drinks such as gin and craft beers through new serves such as using port as an chilled aperitif, over ice or in a cocktail.

They also provide a solid foundation to take advantage of future job opportunities and progress along the employment ladder.

"The council is a keen advocate of apprenticeships as a route into employment and will be recruiting to a further four positions before the end of the year. We would strongly encourage other organisations to consider creating apprenticeship positions to help develop a skilled workforce that in turn will benefit the local economy."

Harry Smailes, apprentice construction assistant, said: "I would definitely encourage more young people to take up apprenticeships. Seeing and assisting with design work and onsite construction work has helped me tie together the knowledge I have gained from college, rather than just relying on learning resources."

Kate Thomson, apprentice support services assistant, said: "I would certainly recommend doing an apprenticeship in something you are interested in and want to learn more about. It gives you the confidence, skills and qualifications you need to better yourself and get a career in doing something you enjoy.

"I would class myself as a mature student and it just shows you can be any age to decide to have a change in your career and go for something new."


Map:- EXPLORER 6

Start at GR.S E**846** 1 Rad side near church. Distance 45 M iles.

alk in a westerly direction out of the village passing the church on your left. At the end of the village bear right onto a distinct chalk road and climb gradually to Cow Wold Barn. Immediately before the barn, bear left and

cross a grassy patch to a stile. Cross this stile and follow the Wolds Way signs.

On reaching a pit, cross a stile and walk with the fence on your left to the field corner, turn right at this corner and descend gradually to the lower corner of the field and cross the stile. After crossing the stile descend more steeply and after about 200 metres locate a stile in the hedge on your left, cross this stile and descend to the dale bottom.

On reaching the dale bottom locate and cross a stile and then climb gradually with the fence on your right. On nearing the top of the dale, locate a metal gate and pass through. (There is also a stile at this point). Continue walking in a northerly direction with the large sparse hawthorn hedge on your right. After a short distance, enter a small plantation on your right and pass through this plantation emerging onto a farm track.

Turn right on meeting this track and follow the Wolds Way Signs. After about 0.7 miles locate a Centenary Way sign on your right and turn right passing through a small belt of trees. Follow this path/track as it passes the derelict Wold House. On passing this derelict building, the track swings left and then right. Further along the path again swings to the left and at this point turn right and follow a path with the hedge on your right to locate a gate in the corner of the field.

Pass through this gate into Court Dale and immediately turn left and walk along the top of the dale. At the end of the dale descend to a farm track and pass through two steel gates to emerge onto a tarmac road. Turn right and follow this road back to Thixendale.

An alternative route from the bottom of the dale is to remain in the field and walk parallel to the tarmac road on a clear ridge. This emerges in the village adjacent to the Public House.

# **Christmas Time**

Plants offer natural beauty and wonderful fragrances. Selecting and decorating the Christmas tree is one of the key festive traditions, and nothing compares to the wonderful fresh pine scent, appearance and texture of a real Christmas tree.

The traditional Christmas tree is the Norway Spruce which we have available 5ft-10ft, but as an alternative we also have the beautiful Nordmann available in 5ft-8 t and Frasier Fir available in 6ft-8 t. Just remember to give your tree plenty of water and follow our simple steps to ensure that your beautiful natural tree takes pride of place in your home this Christmas.

Before you buy your Christmas tree, make sure you know how much room you've got to house it. Measure the ceiling height and width of the space and take a tape measure with you.

- Look for a green tree with no sign of brown needles. Check that the trunk is sturdy and straight and the tree has a good, even shape with well-spaced branches and no obvious gaps. Needles should stay fast if you gently run your fingers down one of the lower branches.
- Once home, place your tree in a cool, dry place out of the wind in a bucket of water until you're ready to decorate.
- Before you bring it into the home, saw 2.5cm (1in) off the end of the trunk
- Place the tree in as cool a position as possible ideally well away from radiators and open fires.

or sand, which block the pores in the bark, so use a specially designed Christmas tree stand.

• Top up with water with a little sugar added – you may find your tree needs as much as 2 litres (3 pints) a day.

#### Festiv Plants

Flowering and colourful plants are always a joy to give and receive at Christmas. Their bright, cheerful appearance, especially those with red flowers, bracts and stems, lifts the spirits and epitomises the season.

Follow these simple guidelines to help your festive plants perform superbly right through the Christmas season and well into the new year.

# **CYCLAMEN**

Cyclamen are one of the most charming winter-flowering plants with exotic-looking swept-back flowers in intense shades of red, purple, pink and white with heartshaped, silver-veined foliage.

They are easy and rewarding houseplants, provided you meet their requirements – a cool spot (12-15°C) that's brightly-lit, but out of direct sunlight. Overwatering is one of the chief causes of their demise. When the compost surface feels dry immerse the pot in a bowl of rain water for 20 minutes then pour the excess away.

## **CHRISTMAS ROSE**

Said to have sprung from the tears of a young girl who had nothing to offer the Christ child, the Christmas rose (Helleborus niger) blooms in the darkest months of the year, making them a valuable asset to any garden. Native to Europe, the Christmas rose grows 38cm (15in) high and bears single white flowers about 8cm (3in) in diameter from December to March. Grow in a sheltered position, in soil with plenty of added organic matter

# AMARYLLIS

Hippeastrum or amaryllis is an indoor plant producing large, colourful showy flowers on tall stems in winter. Give plants plenty of light so the stems don't become too leggy. Support stems with a short stake to keep them upright under the weight of the flowers.

After the blooms have faded keep the bulbs in a warm place and resume watering the next autumn.

# 10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Check greenhouse heaters
- 2. Protect any tender plants with horticultural fleece
- 3. Prune acers, birches & vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding
- 4. Reduce water for houseplants

- 7. Plant Winter flowering shrubs to add colour to your garden

- 10. Clean up and cover you garden furniture to protect over the Winter





## **POINSETTIAS**

Their name comes from Joel Robert Poinsettia, who introduced them to the USA from Mexico, about 188 And even though poinsettias now come in different colours, the red and green classic is the most popular. Poinsettias are easy to care for. To enjoy them as long as possible put them in a bright, warm spot, around 20°C without draughts. Do not overwater by leaving water in the saucer – water only when the potting mixture is almost dry.

#### FORCED HYACINTHS

Bowls of forced hyacinths that have been grown in the dark to encourage them into early flower add a delightful scent to the home. To prolong flowering, place in a sunny spot away from draughts and radiators. Stand the pots on shallow trays of moist gravel. Cut off the flowers when they die and give the bulbs some liquid feed until the leaves begin to fade. Gradually dry off the bulbs and plant them out in the garden to enjoy in years to come.

# Make yu rw n Wreath

Wreaths are a lovely way to enhance the festive atmosphere in your home, welcoming Christmas visitors at your front door. They are quite simple to make and we stock everything you need to make your own this year.

- You will need a wire frame made from two circles of wire looped together or a length of wire mesh (rolled into a sausage shape and bent to form a circle) or a ready-made wire ring from your local florist; florist wire; some greenery (ivy, laurel leaves, leylandii, Lawson's cypress and holly work well); and berries, cones and seedheads.
- First attach a length of florist wire securely at the top of the frame to hang your wreath.
- Cut small bunches of foliage to 25cm (10in) lengths and wrap a piece of wire around the lower end of the bunch. Attach the foliage to the ring with another piece of wire. Keep repeating the procedure a little further down the frame, ensuring the bunches overlap, leaving no obvious gaps.
- At first you may find the foliage slides around a little, but the more you add, the more stable it will become. Keep your work flat on a tabletop to prevent movement.
- For a really full wreath, fill both the inner and outer parts of your frame with foliage. The more you add, the better it will look.
- Attach your decorations by twisting wire around the base of the cones, berries and seedheads. Twist the ends firmly together and push the wire into the wreath frame. Secure by twisting the ends again at the back of the wreath.
- Finally, attach the finished wreath to a nail on your front door for all to see and admire.
- You can create beautiful natural garlands in a similar way. Use florists wire to attach overlapping bunches of evergreens and decorations to a length of rope.

Alternatively if you haven't got the time to make your own we have taken the hard work out for you and have a beautiful range of wreaths real and artificial dressed to enhance your home and doors this Christmas.



# My First Car - A Christmas Story

here it was, a big gleaming streamlined looking car - it was in grey, I have always liked a grey or silver cars ever since, it had whitewall tyres surrounding red metal disc wheels, no roof, no floor and only one door - yes, you have guessed it, it was a pedal car for Christmas.

I would be just four years old and my mum took me downstairs where my dad was waiting smiling at the living room door which he opened to reveal my main Christmas present (there were others in my pillowcase, story books, paints, game etc.) I remember standing there and staring at it; there was a running board down each side with two little petrol cans on the drivers side, one was in yellow with 'Shell Mex' printed on it. I can't remember the other much, only that it was a red one.

I walked around it calmly several times. "Are you going to get in"? mum asked, so I carefully turned the door handle and stepped inside onto the carpet, of course which I thought a bit of a let down at the time as proper cars have floors, but never mind. My dad showed me how to put my feet on the two pedals and push alternately. I got the idea after a few tentative attempts and decided to 'rev up' so with a mighty push with one foot with the other following suit, I reversed into the settee with force!

"Oh be careful" pleaded mum, but dad laughed and said "This time push with your other foot first". I could not remember which foot I had used the first time, but took a chance and shot forward into the easy chair which stood between the living room and kitchen doors. Mum quickly began to doubt my driving skills, but dad said that I would soon get the hang of it, and after a bit more coaching from him I usually avoided serious collisions with the furniture.

"Come and have your breakfast now," mum said, so I very reluctantly unfastened the car door and stepped out, but I kept glancing over at it from my chair to make sure it had not gone away and after gulping my cornflakes and toast despite her pleas to "slow down or you will choke". I quickly got back in and grasped the steering wheel. "Push slowly forward Peter", my dad said as he cleared more space in the middle of the living room, "Turn your steering wheel this way." I did as he asked and found to my delight that I was able to go to the left or to the right. I think that was when I must have got to grips with three point turns for the first time and succeeded in traversing the living room without wrecking it.

"It will be nice when the better weather comes and you can take your car outside Peter", mum said rather hopefully. This wish was granted a day or two later when it was a bit warmer and there was no frost or snow yet and dad lifted the car outside and on to the lawn back way. "There, now you have all the grass to yourself, off you go!" I opened the door, got in, made the obligatory 'broom, broom' and pressed the pedals expecting a flying start, but I hardly moved! This was disappointing, indeed as I had intended to drive to the edge where the flower bed was. "You will have to press harder Peter, the grass is not like the carpet in the living room, it's harder in the garden to get moving." To make matters worse I went into reverse more than I moved forward, in my anxiety to show what I could do. "Here, I'll give you a push and when you feel the pedals moving keep pressing them," dad advised. This did work, but it was hard going and I remember my legs ached after a while and I gave up the unequal struggle!

"Let's go front way and you can drive it on the path to the gate, it will be a bit easier." So the car was pushed out of the garden, over the pebbled driveway and on to the concrete path. This was a lot better and off I went, pedalling furiously to the front gate and bumping into it. "Now, pedal back to the front door if you can." Dad eventually managed to set me off backwards and I found this was harder because the path sloped up to the front door, but I got there in triumph.

The next challenge was the pebbled driveway between our house and next door; the slight drop off the path was easy and then more disappointment because the pebbles were almost as hard to drive over as the lawn was. They seemed to get in the way of my wheels - a mighty push and pedals freed them but I got bogged down when I got too close to the path edge, very frustrating to a four year old, but dad came to the rescue and let me go outside and on to the pavement outside our row of houses. Mum was alarmed,

"Oh, Jack, don't let him get too close to the road." She need not have worried really, because a car or a lorry, or even a horse and cart passing by was a rarity in the 1930's down New Village Road. There were two cars down our row and they were both garaged elsewhere. I remember running to the front room window and peering out in wonder when a car of a lorry went by. This us much better I thought, as I travelled easily along the footpath, up and down past the house several times as my admiring parents looked on. A few more weeks passed then mum said "Would you

like to drive your car to Mr. Pyms, do you think you could manage it?, I will help you if you get stuck." Now, this was a challenge and I accepted it willingly. Mr. Pym's shop was small but well stocked with groceries and was around the corner, across Jesmond Road, past a row of houses and had a good 'forecourt' on which to park near the door of the shop.

Getting across Jesmond Road was a problem, no dropped kerbs then, just a drop onto an unmade road, over the rough ground and up the other side. I remember my mum had to lower car and driver down one kerb and pull up on the other side and my pedals and feet getting a few sharp bumps in the process, but Mr. Pyms was reached successfully and the car parked carefully under the shop window. A visit to Pym's usually resulted in a few sweets for me along with the items of food stowed away in mum's shopping bag, dolly mixtures were tipped into a small conical shaped paper bag and gratefully received. I suppose that I felt that I had earned them due to the first extended drive!

Mr. & Mrs. Pym came outside and admired my motor, then off we went back home.

My legs must have been tired because mum gave me an occasional push with dad's walking stick that she had brought along. The obstacle of Jesmond Road was overcome again, this must have been tricky with a full shopping bag in one hand and a stick in the other because I was persuaded to get out and help to get the car across. Home was reached and I enjoyed my dolly mixtures sat in the car in the back garden.

The weeks passed, warm weather arrived and the sun canopy was erected in the garden on a fine sunny Sunday. Grandma was a widow and lived in Hull with her daughter and her husband and grand-daughter Margaret, who was my age and Grandma sometimes brought Margaret to our house for the day on a Sunday. I remember one particularly fine warm Sunday they were with us in the garden, the grown-ups under the sun canopy and my cousin and I playing. Now, I had left my car behind the 'tent' as we called it, when mum said, "Show Margaret your car Peter and let her have a ride in it." Even at the tender age of four, I did not like the idea, but reluctantly pedalled the vehicle round, I sat there while Margaret walked round it and waited at the door while I sat grimly holding on to the steering wheel. "Peter, get out and let Margaret get in" I was ordered.

Slowly, the steering wheel was relinquished, the door opened and I got out. Without a word Margaret got in, clearly she had no idea what to do, which pleased me immensely. "Here, I will help you dear." Dad offered and gently pushed the car and told her about pressing the pedals and turning the steering wheel, which was easier now the grass was cut short. However, I was gratified to realise that she could not move the car at all and soon tired of the attempt and went back to playing with her dolls under the tent. Good, I thought, now that potential obstacle has been removed, I will demonstrate how it should be done and collided with the side of the tent nearly collapsing it, ran over Grandma's toes and ended up in the flower bed, resulting in cries of dismay and being lifted bodily out of my pride and joy and forbidden to get in again that day. How humiliating and in front of my cousin too!

Eventually I outgrew my car, my knees were almost as high as the steering wheel top, Dad bought me a 'Mickey Mouse' tricycle (front wheel drive with pedals on the big wheel] and gave the car to a friend at work for his small boy. Later. I got a 'real' chain driven tricycle from Watson's cycle shop in Hallgate, (it is an insurance office now) and wooden blocks were attached to the pedals at first because I could not reach them at their lowest point.

I have had a variety of cars in my adult life but, I still remember, and have a great affection for my first car.

# **Instinctive Horse Training**

People ask me all the time about my work, so I thought I would explain just how in-depth my work goes.

Everyone knows I train horses, but it is way more than that one statement. For 31 years, I have been based in this lovely village playing with horses. However, you may be interested to know just how far this goes.

My reputation precedes me now within the horse industry because everyone knows that I pick up the pieces mainly. Most horses which come my way are damaged emotionally due to bad past experiences, whether it be accident, injury, harsh training, abuse or by being in an inappropriate environment. They display dangerous and extreme behaviours which need changing into happy and calm behaviours.

I retrain **race ho ses** with all the complex conditioned behaviours which that entails.

I start **yu ng ho ses** in a positive way where I concentrate on having them happy out on roads and in traffic. I don't do what most trainers do which is perform all their training inside an arena. Our first proper ride is always out through the village. I rarely ride them in the arena.

I will train any ho se, regardless of its problems, breed, size etc. It's what I do. I will help any w ner.

Human training is a huge part of my job. Understanding how fragile they feel and being empathetic always. Unless I can help the owner, I cannot help that horse with its future.

I do **behav u r cn sultancy** over the phone to assess what is happening and why. This is very thorough and I knitpick re information so that the advice I give is as perfect as possible.

I g where the prb lem is. I travel the UK extensively to assess situations and environmental impacts/triggers and find a way forward for both horse and owner. Behav u ral assessments, env ru mental assessments and function al assessments are always so interesting and essential that

the owner understands what is happening and why. I will implement changes where possible and train the owners in new skills/ knowledge needed. I further support them by phone afterward Not every horse suits every owner and not every environment is a good one. The yard experience for horses and owners is not always a good one so finding a yard where a horse and its owner can be relaxed together is often harder than you think and can have a massively negative impact. **Fear 6 lad ing into wag s and trailers** is always a classic reason for away work.

I run cu rses here at Skidby as well as in yards all over the UK. We talk through the science of behaviour in reasonable depth and explore the differences which are made through learning to use positive reinforcement techniques with horses. Breaking the mu ld is the hardest thing ev r and teaching owners that using proven science and ethical, force free alternatives which allow horses the choice in participation is an amazingly powerful training way forward.

I talk!... bet you are not surprised at that! I love being invited to speak at events UK wide. I speak at charity events as well as Corporate events, AGM's, Riding Club meetings, and do "An evening with Melanie Watson!" which is both amusing as well as informative. I

I teach anyone, anywhere! I invite people to come to my yard to learn about **Clicker training ho ses** and see it in practical application.

I act as Ep ert Witness in court cases where a behaviour expert is needed to explain horse behaviour. This is never untaken lightly. My reports must cross very "T" and dot every "I" because my statements must withstand cross examination. I work for miss-sale cases mostly but have supported personal injury cases and RTA cases. I have even supported cases where trainers have ruined horses by their training techniquesphys ical as well as emotional damage to the horses in their care.

I enjw article writing as you well know. I write for a couple of Horse Magazines and online sites and blog away happily.

I support various Animal Charities both here in the UK as well as abroad. I support the Hull Branch 6 the RSPCA. They are an amazing team of staff and volunteers. I have helped with the development of the innovative Education Room, where local school children are actively taught about pet care and responsibilities, capturing their young minds into showing care to animals. Hopefully this will prevent future cruelty and neglect by investing in their young minds. I demonstrate there with my beautiful Toby pony (children and staff alike adore his basketball skills!) and teach animal training there whenever I am asked. I have taken on home visits for horse adoption and help fund raise. Hull has the wo st cruelty rate 6 any city in the UK .di d you know that?

I have recently used Facebook to help a small Working Donkey and horse charity in the Holy land, with fantastic results. People have donated so much unwanted equipment and first aid products. It's been amazing and I thank each one of them. The horse community was touched by the plight of these animals and the abject poverty of their owners and their generosity was fantastic. What a massive difference will be made to the lives of the receiving animals.

So, there you go. Just a little insight into some of my work with some its facets..ne ver a dull moment for sure.

#### How to fight colds and flu

It is that time of year again (groan!). Welcome to the cold and flu season. Your first inclination may be to head to the closest chemist and stock up on tissues and cold medication. If you dread the thought of a runny or stuffed up nose, sneezing, sinus congestion, a headache, the chills and a dry scratchy throat, be proactive.

#### TwoE njwac up 6 black tea:

To improve your body's ability to fight viruses, drink more black tea. Those who consume five cups (approximately three mugs) of black tea on a daily basis, produce 10 times more "virus-fighting interferon" than those individuals who drink coffee.

#### Three - Add sm e cb u r toyu r diet:

Fruits and vegetables come in every colour of the rainbow- well practically! Load up on as many colours as you can. Bell peppers, broccoli, kiwi fruit, oranges, strawberries and tomatoes are all excellent sources of vitamin C and flavonoids. These essential substances support the body in sending out protective immune cells. You need these foods so eat up as often as possible!

Oatmeal and shredded wheat are two whole-grain cereals that are rich in the nutrients beta glucan, selenium and zinc. These three nutrients are particularly beneficial in the winter months because they enhance the work of the immune system.

#### Fiv -F ig t illness with spiced up chicken so p:

Even with the best efforts, it is still possible to catch something during the cold and flu season. If you do come down with something, turn to the old standby, chicken soup. Chicken soup has the potential to shorten the duration of your illness by as much as 50 percent.

There have been many theories proposed as to why this may be the case. One of the theories has to do with an amino acid called cysteine. When chicken is cooked, it releases this amino acid, which is chemically similar to a drug for bronchitis called acetylcysteine.

To enhance chicken soup's power to fight the flu and a cold, add some garlic and hot red pepper to your soup. Garlic is excellent at fighting viruses while hot red pepper contains capsaicin, which is a very strong decongestant. Chicken soup with a little dill weed added to it can also do your infection a world of good.


