



"My care story began almost 30 years ago, when my grandma was taken into care. I know they were different times, and I don't want to speak ill of somewhere that has since closed down, but the way she was treated wasn't very good. I visited her regularly and I knew I wanted to make a difference. I think that people need to have something about them to be a carer, and if you don't have that drive, you shouldn't be doing it. It's a vocation, not just a job. I wasn't happy with my grandma's experience, and I wanted to help make things better for other people's



"My first job was as a carer in a small home, and about five years later, I moved to Magnolia House and never looked back. I started here as a carer, and worked on nights for about 15 years. Day shifts are a lot busier because you're dealing with medical professionals and families, which you don't get on nights.

"I was persuaded to join the day team and take on a more senior role, which ultimately led to becoming a unit manager. I now work closely with the home manager, helping with the day-to-day running of the home and taking it forward. I really love being involved with everything that's going on. It's like my second home



#### Free weekend parking returns in the East Riding on the run up to Christmas

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council's Cabinet has approved free parking for the four weekends in November/December running up to Christmas.

The popular scheme, which the council has run for the past thirteen years, will apply to all council-run on-street and off-street car parks.

Pay and display machines in these locations will be clearly marked to let shoppers know there is no charge for the weekends of 27-28 November, 4-5 December, 11-12 December and 18-19 December, from 8am on Saturday until 8am on Monday.

Councillor Jonathan Owen, leader of East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "As has been the case in previous years, free parking in the run up to Christmas will once again be offered in the East Riding.

"This scheme provides real and tangible benefits for the local economy by providing a timely boost at what is an important time of the year for traders. It also helps our residents and visitors to the area who are preparing for the festive season."

Whilst parking charges are suspended, motorists are advised that normal parking rules still apply, such as those around disabled parking bays, maximum stays and controlled parking zones (CPZ).





## Commuted Sums benefit three clubs in Cottingham

lubs based in Cottingham have been awarded £77,981.22 funding from East Riding of Yorkshire Council as part of Commuted Sums from local housing developments.

Three different groups have received funding:

Cottingham Lawn Tennis Club have been awarded £56,690 towards phase 2 of their future plans to resurface their tennis courts. The project involves the resurfacing of two Tarmac Courts 1 & 2 and two Artificial Grass Courts. In addition to the Commuted Sums funding, Cottingham LTC will be funding £6,298 of the £62,988 project from their own funds.

Doug Jennings, Chairman of Cottingham Lawn Tennis Club, said: "We are very grateful for East Riding of Yorkshire Council's latest grant funding. We are especially pleased to be able to start the work before winter, which will enable the club to keep the programme and play continuing over the winter months as the courts, in their current state, are getting dangerously slippery when wet."

Cottingham Tigers ARLFC have been awarded £16,582.74 towards their pitches project. The club have recently moved their main playing pitch to avoid utilising the cricket outfield, introduced a specific junior pitch, installed crowd barriers on the main pitch and installed netting behind the posts. The club will also improve existing floodlighting by replacing fittings, install a pitch barrier and install two new dugouts with roller shutters. Cottingham Tigers have been successful in being awarded £16,483.20 from the Rugby World Cup 2021 Grant Fund and have contributed £2,500 of their own funds towards the project.

Paul Atkinson, Treasurer at Cottingham Tigers, said: "It's great that the local authority have been able to support us in delivering these enhanced playing and training facilities. We're very lucky to have hundreds of great young people as part of our club and this funding will help improve them as both people and rugby players. We also hope it will help us whilst we continue to try and grow the club at all ages."

West Ella & Willerby AFC, who are based at Hilltop, Cottingham, have been awarded £4,708.48 towards realigning a pitch to enable the club to accommodate more teams. The growth in the number of teams operated by the Club requires an increase in the number of pitches. The project involves pitch marking, installation of new goal sockets, net support sockets and lids, moving the existing goal posts, moving dugouts to new locations and the provision of 40m of fencing.

Richard Brown, Treasurer at West Ella & Willerby AFC, said: "Maintaining good, safe facilities hopefully encourages more people to maintain a healthy lifestyle. The East Riding of Yorkshire Council Commuted Sums Fund is an excellent initiative and has been that extra arm required to fulfil this project. This has benefited West Ella and Willerby Football club and the community as a whole."

# Road and path improvements worth £200,000 to be carried out in Cottingham

oad and path improvements worth £200,000 are underway in Cottingham during November and December.

The investment is being made by East Riding of Yorkshire Council and work began in South Street, Cottingham, on Monday (8 November).

The work is expected to take seven weeks to complete, weather permitting, and will be carried out by council contractors PBS Construction (NE) Ltd.

Path improvements will begin first on weekdays (Monday to Friday) between 9.30am and 3.30pm from 8 November to 14 December, under temporary traffic lights.

Road patching works will then be carried out on weekday evenings (Monday to Friday) between 6pm and 11pm, from 6 December to 17 December.

While the road scheme is happening, a temporary road closure will be in place, with a diversion route via Thwaite Street, New Village Road, Northgate, West End and Baynard Avenue.

Local traffic will have limited access through the sites during the evening works to ensure the safety of road users and the workforce.

Access will be maintained for residents, business owners and the emergency service, however drivers will need to keep vehicles off the road to allow for the improvements.

The council and its contractors will be consulting with the affected local businesses and residents.

Adam Holmes, head of infrastructure and facilities at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "Although delays are likely during the works, the improvements are necessary I would like to thanks residents and motorists in advance for their patience."

#### Chicken casserole with dumplings

• Total time: Ready in 45 minutes. Serves: 4

#### **Ingredients**

1 tbsp oil

800g pack essential Waitrose British Chicken Thighs, scored 500g tub essential Waitrose Gravy

195g can essential Waitrose Sweetcorn, drained

- 3. Add the spring greens and beans to the casserole and cook, covered, for 10 minutes. Remove the lid and add the dumplings to the casserole, pressing down slightly. Cook for 10 minutes until golden.

#### Sticky ginger loaf

This fantastic gluten-free cake is sweet and squidgy in the middle with a cool ginger icing on top. The stem ginger syrup is made with white sugar, but you could replace it with maple syrup or honey to make this recipe refined sugar free, too.

• Preparation time: 25 minutes, plus soaking

· Cooking time: 1 hour

• Total time: 1 hour 25 minutes, plus soaking. Serves: 10

#### **Ingredients**

175g unsalted butter, melted, plus extra for greasing 100g dried pitted dates

3 balls stem ginger, roughly chopped, plus extra to decorate 100ml maple syrup

3 large eggs

200g ground almonds

50g rice flour 1 tsp baking powder 1 tsp ground ginger ½tsp salt

#### For the icing:

50g dried pitted dates, roughly chopped 3 tbsp stem ginger syrup large pinch ground ginger 125g Philadelphia soft cheese

#### Method

1 Preheat the oven to 170°c, gas mark 3; grease and line a 900g loaf tin. Cover the dates with boiling water; leave for 10 minutes. Drain and whizz in a food processor with the butter, ginger and maple syrup until smooth. Add the eggs, then whizz to combine. Add the dry ingredients and whizz until just combined.

2 Tip into the prepared tin, level out the top and bake for one hour, until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. (cover with foil for the last 10 minutes if it browns too fast.) leave to cool completely in the tin.

3 For the icing, soak the dates in 75ml boiling water for 10 minutes, then tip into a blender (ideally a high-speed blender or nutribullet, or use the small bowl of a food processor). add the ginger syrup, ground ginger and a pinch of salt, then blend until smooth; cool completely. using electric beaters, whip the soft cheese briefly, then whip in the date mix. ice the loaf and top with extra stem ginger.

#### New wines on the market

I've been shopping around this month to bring you some of the latest wine news from our major supermarkets. And first up is Waitrose, which has just introduced five new wines to its successful "Loved & Found" range.

The new additions, which are available in shops and online at Waitrose Cellar, are curated by the company's buying team and represent lesser-known grape varieties from South Africa, Italy and Portugal.

The Loved & Found range launched in June 2019. Wine buyer Rebecca Hull told me: "We know our customers love to explore the unknown when it comes to wine and we're thrilled to be able to offer these new and exciting varieties from a range of winemakers.

"We've looked for diversity of flavour, something truly different but eminently approachable and delicious. It was also important to us that the wines are all under £10 and offer great value to customers. These are the wines that we believe have the potential to be the popular varieties of the future."

Four of the original line-up are being replaced with five brand new varieties: Waitrose Loved & Found Bukettraube, South Africa (£8.99), Loved & Found Castelao, Portugal (£6.99), Loved & Found Fernao Pires, South Africa (£6.99), Loved & Found Roero Arneis, Italy (£7.99) and Loved & Found Perricone, Italy (£7.99).

The following five original wines are staying in the range: Waitrose Loved and Found Ebling, Germany (£6.99), Loved and Found Petit Manseng, Jurancon, France (£9.99), Loved and Found Marselan, Rhône, France (£6.99), Loved and Found Pais, Chile (£7.99) and Loved and Found Pecorino, Italy (£8.99).

Looking at the new wines in a little more detail, Bukettraube is the oldest man-made crossing of grape varieties on the planet - Sylvaner crossed with Trollinger. There are 42 hectares in total in the world and Cederberg in South Africa has 11 hectares. It came to South Africa via Alsace. David Nieuwoudt (owner and winemaker at Cederberg) describes this wine as having a perfume akin to Gewurztraminer, but with fantastic acidity similar to Riesling.

The off-dry style is amazing with spicy food - think Thai curries - and mature cheeses.

The Castelao is one of Portugal's many indigenous varieties, and one of its most planted too, Castelao is predominantly used as part of blends, but is increasingly being seen on its own as interest grows in single varietal Portuguese reds.

It's medium-bodied, a classic example of this variety, with an expressive nose of raspberries and blackberries. On the palate there is rich fruit which is kept fresh by a well-balanced acidity.

Fernao Pires was originally brought to South Africa from Portugal and grown for brandy production. The wine is light-bodied and very refreshing, with lively acidity, distinctive floral (rose petals and blossom) aromas and abundant stone fruit on the palate.

The Roero Arneis is a dry, unoaked, light-bodied Italian white wine, with zesty acidity, and subtle flavours of orchard fruit (pear, white peach) and spring blossom.

Finally, the Perricone, from Sicily, is a medium to full bodied red-wine, subtly oaked and packed with spicy brambly fruit, and has a wild herb edge. Southern Italian and Sicilian reds are currently in strong growth for Waitrose. Perricone is a native north-west Sicilian red grape variety, grown in small quantities on the island's west coast, around the towns of Marsala and Trapani. It is most commonly used in blends with Nero d'Avola, where it brings texture and deep colour.

\* Lidl is now selling magnums of two of its most popular red wines - Baturrica Gran Reserva and Heredad Ducel Tempranillo, both from Spain - for just £9.99 each. Master of Wine Richard Bampfield, who consults for Lidl, said: "Consistently one of the favourite wines at the tastings I present is the Baturrica Gran Reserva, and if there is a better value red at under £5 in the country, I have yet to find it.

Both wines are available in the 1.5-litre bottles while stocks last.

\* Morrisons The Best Toscana 2019 has been awarded a top score at the Decanter IGT Tuscan Red Tasting, attracting an impressive 92 points from experts. Selling for £10 per bottle, it was placed ahead of 45 other pricier bottles, including Brancaia II Blu Toscana 2018 which retails for £80.

Judges were impressed with its "enticing nose of red plums, cherries in liqueur, creamy oak and tobacco leaves" and also complemented its "well-textured tannins with a meaty finish."

Mark Jarman, senior wine sourcing manager at Morrisons said: "The Best Toscana is now one of the stars in our The Best Italian range. It's fantastic to see it getting this recognition - it's a rich, flavoursome and complex wine that's absolutely perfect for enjoying as the nights draw in. It will also improve even further with age, so if you've got somewhere dark and cool to store it, tuck it away for a year or two."



#### Let's be nosey

s you know from my past articles, I do like to vary the subject alongside what is happening during each season but this one is slightly different.

On our KINGSTON VETS Facebook page, we recently wrote about how important it is to let your dog use its nose. Go for a walk, letting them sniff is allowing them to use their natural behaviour which is an activity that is needed for their general wellbeing. It is calming to their senses and provides stimulation. I know this can be very difficult at times when we are in a rush to get somewhere and we are aware our dog/s need a walk, the last thing you want is them to constantly stop to sniff but I found an activity both Tali and I will enjoy.

As I mentioned last month, I booked our first session of Mantrailing and it was amazing. I had been looking for something for us to do together apart from all the walks we go on and this was so different. The instructor, Fiona, met us at the location booked, this time being Hessle Foreshore but it can be anywhere within the Yorkshire region. After an introduction to the rest of the team, instruction on how to fit the special harness, how to hold the longline plus teaching Tali to sniff the article

belonging to the Misper (missing person), we were off. There is quite a knack on how to let your dog use its nose without putting strain on the line along with lots of encouragement and praise on the trail. It was fascinating watching Tali work this way, nose to the ground, eagerly following the trail to find the misper waiting at the end with her favourite treat of sausage. We did 3 trails in the 3 hours we were there with Tali improving each time. I did have a feeling she had it in her with her father being an ex-prison dog and 2 elder brothers involved in search and rescue but that is not a guarantee. She could have been the 'black sheep' of the litter which she did show during her escapades in her puppy stage. Surprisingly, the dogs present that day were quite a mixture of breed and not just the usual working dogs. Some also had various issues such as anxiety and reactive to other dogs which looking and observing them, totally surprised me. They had been attending these sessions for a while and their confidence, under careful guidance, had grown. Discussing this with Fiona, she advised mantrailing makes the dog think for themselves and puts it into their court to trust the handler which encourages them to grow in confidence.

As you can read between the lines, I am totally hooked and have booked our next session which is a progression morning at Hornsea Freeport. This shall definitely test Tali's nose and restraint with all the tempting food outlets they have. If you are interested in trying this wonderful 'sport', surprisingly you don't have to be young and super fit just have a passion for team work and connecting with your dog, then please give me a call at KINGSTON VETS and I shall point you in the right direction.

What a little superstar this pup is turning out to be. After guidance from the breeder, my daughter Jenni and husband Adam, continued with the whistle training for Max and his progression I saw at the weekend. the truth. There are fake ads with expert and celebrity endorsements and fake scientific claims to get you buy stuff you don't need or conspiracy theorists wanting you on their side out of fear. There is even just fake stuff for the sake of it.

#### Some stuff looks convincing

Example: Rare condition makes teeth grow in hands

Calcium hyperproficiency is a rare complication of vitamin D deficiency, where excess calcium from bone resorption forms complex structures resembling teeth. Neoformed teeth grow on different bones, such as this patient's hand, causing fractures and joint dysfunction.

#### The Truth

This looks very convincing and when I first saw I thought wow, that's interesting. I've never seen that before. Then realised why I hadn't seen it before. It's fake and does not make sense. Why would teeth just form because of calcium being there. This is photoshop at work. You have to question and ask the question. WHY? I've always said when I've been mentoring colleagues. "If you don't

know WHY you are doing something, stop, because you probably shouldn't be doing it."

Now you can get teeth growing in parts of the body where they should not be. There is a benign tumour called a teratoma. At university, now 29 years ago since I was there, we were shown pictures of teeth in ovaries and testicles. I'll not put any pictures as might be ready for your tea. It makes me a bit queasy thinking about it. The



geeky bit is that this makes more sense. Human teeth start from ectoderm down growths during the embryological phase and from mesenchyme. So you need the right cells from the start. Things have obviously gone a bit array with teratomas when the wrong genes have been activated to form teeth.

#### Vitamin D

However, vitamin D deficiency is quite a common thing. I did some training with a French surgeon a few years ago and he said that 65% of all hospital workers in France were vitamin D deficient. Not many windows in some hospitals and night shifts so sleeping during the day. We need sunlight on our skin to make vitamin D. It's important for good bone and a good immune system. Several studies now have shown that vitamin D supplementation had reduced COVID symptoms in people by improving the immune system. We recommend it for dental implant therapy. The darker winter months is when you benefit from vitamin D supplements the most.



#### **Motoring - with Roy Woodcock**



# For a company that built its reputation on delivering small, affordable, family cars, the Suzuki Across breaks the mould. Roy Woodcock reports...

Ithough it was officially launched in the Uk exactly a year ago, Suzuki's flagship model, the Across, is still a very rare sight. Price will have something to do with it the car is only available in one very high specification model at £45,599 - but the company admitted there would be only very limited production in the first full year.

Let's see if that improves, for we're talking about a car that rubs shoulders (price-wise) with something like the Land Rover Discovery or the very top end Range Rover Evoque. And this from a manufacturer that's built its reputation on delivering small, affordable, family cars.

The Across is a joint venture with Toyota and it's an SUV that shares its roots with the PHEV version of the RAV4. Such is the way of the motoring world right now as economies of world scaled are factored in and there's already a second Suzuki model as a result of this tie-up (more of that later).

In order to compete the Across is given plenty of weapons: It is stylish and offers a comprehensive array of standard kit. There's an electronic 4x4 system, which ensures efficient and elective performance, confidence-inspiring handling and control even in slippery conditions, plus heated front and rear seats, heated steering wheel, dual zone automatic air conditioning, auto function opening tailgate and nine-inch multimedia touchscreen as standard, together with all the electric and electronic aids you would expect from a vehicle in this price range.

Fuel efficiency ticks all the right boxes, too. This is a plug-in hybrid with a 2.5-litre engine supported by not one, but two, electric motors, and the "official" (WLTP) fuel consumption figure is given as 282mpg.

Couple this with an official carbon dioxide emissions rating of just 22g/km and a benefit in kind taxation rate of six per cent, and this Suzuki is undoubtedly going to make a lot of sense for, say, company car drivers whose businesses allow them the initial outlay.

In the real world, however, getting anywhere near that official fuel consumption figure will only ever be achieved if the car is driven for most of the time using the battery. Electriconly running can get somewhere near 46 miles, so what that means is you'll need to charge the battery every night to get the best from this PHEV.

Based on limited experiences with the car on a mix of long and short journeys and without constant recharging, the fuel return is closer to 43mpg.

To cope with the hybrid powertrain the gearbox is a

continuously variable transmission and that works in a splendid fashion under all conditions.

Performance figures are 0 to 62mph acceleration in six seconds and a top speed of 112mph and on the road the Across is brisk off the mark although unusually in this day and age there is a degree of understeer if cornered briskly. Nevertheless, it is a competent performer on and off the road with three drive modes to go at to get the best out of the powertrain.

If you're looking at this car in terms of it being a useful tow vehicle, it has a maximum towing limit of 1.5 tonnes braked or 750 kilos unbraked.

The Across looks muscular with an in-your-face design featuring big alloy wheels and meaty wheel arch mouldings as well as a rock-star feel thanks to tinted windows, neat LED headlights with daytime running lights, twin tailpipes and a rear upper spoiler.

The interior is modern, plush and well put together with soft-touch materials used in all the right places. With a nine-inch touchscreen in the centre of the dash and a fully equipped instrument panel the cabin looks the part but the lack of a fitted sat nav system means only smartphone directions are available either via Apple CarPlay or Android Auto.

That's a shortcoming in a car costing this much but a trait of modern times with phones becoming vital parts of so much of everyday living. However, it leaves the map button on the display panel redundant and a feature only available on its Toyota sister-ship.

There is plenty of room for four adults and their luggage with the boot boasting a capacity of 490 litres rising to 1,168 litres with the 60:40 split-folding rear seats dropped flat.

A third adult can be fitted on the rear bench but the slightly raised transmission tunnel restricts leg room a tad and you lose the use of the central drop-down armrest featuring two cup holders.

There is also an armrest between driver and front-seat passenger concealing a deep storage box with plenty of cup holders and cubby holes ensuring a family's nik-naks are neatly squared away.

It all adds up to a classy hybrid SUV that is fast, fuel efficient, spacious and easy to live with. But, and it's a very BIG but, if you have £46,000 to play with then you really are spoilt for choice.


Now then, that other Suzuki/Toyota model I mentioned . . based on the Toyota Corolla estate, the Suzuki Swace was launched around the same time as the Across and is built in Britain at the Toyota factory in Burnaston near Derby, priced from £27,499. Hopefully more on that in a later road test.

• Look for a green tree with no sign of brown needles. Check that the trunk is sturdy and straight and the tree

has a good, even shape with well-spaced branches and no obvious gaps. Needles should stay fast if you gently run your fingers down one of the lower branches.

They are easy and rewarding houseplants, provided you meet their requirements – a cool spot (12-15°C) that's brightly-lit, but out of direct sunlight. Over-watering is one of the chief causes of their demise. When the compost surface feels dry immerse the pot in a bowl of rain water for 20 minutes then pour the excess away.

- Once home, place your tree in a cool, dry place out of the wind in a bucket of water until you're ready to decorate.
- Before you bring it into the home, saw 2.5cm (1in) off the end of the trunk.
- Place the tree in as cool a position as possible ideally well away from radiators and open fires.
- Christmas trees keep best in plain water rather than soil or sand, which block the pores in the bark, so use a specially designed Christmas tree stand.
- Top up with water with a little sugar added you may find your tree needs as much as 2 litres (3 pints) a day.

Flowering and colourful plants are always a joy to give and receive at Christmas. Their bright, cheerful appearance, especially those with red flowers, bracts and stems, lifts the spirits and epitomises the season.

Follow these simple guidelines to help your festive plants perform superbly right through the Christmas season and well into the new year.

#### **CYCLAMEN**

Cyclamen are one of the most charming winterflowering plants with exotic-looking swept-back flowers in intense shades of red, purple, pink and white with heartshaped, silver-veined foliage.

#### 10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Check greenhouse heaters
- 2. Protect any tender plants with horticultural fleece
- 3. Prune acers, birches & vines before Christmas to avoid bleeding
- 4. Reduce water for houseplants
- 5. Increase feed and provide plenty of fresh water for the birds
- 6. Continue to deadhead pansies and violas to encourage flowering through the mild weather
- 7. Plant Winter flowering shrubs to add colour to your garden
- 8. Harvest leeks, parsnips, winter cabbage, sprouts and remaining crops
- 9. Check that your Winter protection structures are set up and in place
- 10. Clean up and cover you garden furniture to protect over the Winter



#### **CHRISTMAS ROSE**

Said to have sprung from the tears of a young girl who had nothing to offer the Christ child, the Christmas rose (Helleborus niger) blooms in the darkest months of the year, making them a valuable asset to any garden. Native to Europe, the Christmas rose grows 38cm (15in) high and bears single white flowers about 8cm (3in) in diameter from December to March. Grow in a sheltered position, in soil with plenty of added organic matter.

#### **AMARYLLIS**

Hippeastrum or amaryllis is an indoor plant producing large, colourful showy flowers on tall stems in winter. Give plants plenty of light so the stems don't become too leggy. Support stems with a short stake to keep them upright under the weight of the flowers. After the blooms have faded keep the bulbs in a warm place and resume watering the next autumn.

#### **POINSETTIAS**

Their name comes from Joel Robert Poinsett, who introduced them to the USA from Mexico, about 1828. And even though poinsettias now come in different colours, the red and green classic is the most popular. Poinsettias are easy to care for. To enjoy them as long as possible put them in a bright, warm spot, around 20°C without draughts. Do not overwater by leaving water in the saucer – water only when the potting mixture is almost dry.

#### FORCED HYACINTHS

Bowls of forced hyacinths that have been grown in the dark



to encourage them into early flower add a delightful scent to the home. To prolong flowering, place in a sunny spot away from draughts and radiators. Stand the pots on shallow trays of moist gravel. Cut off the flowers when they die and give the bulbs some liquid feed until the leaves begin to fade. Gradually dry off the bulbs and plant them out in the garden to enjoy in years to come.
