

growing number of people are continuing to enjoy the fun of "Fitmums & Friends" based in Cottingham and are getting fit in the process. Fitmums & Friends is a uniquely supportive running group which particularly encourages beginners & "mums" to running but equally welcomes anyone with an interest; you don't have to be fit, or a mum and both male and female are welcome! The emphasis of the group is about helping people to feel good about themselves and their achievements, no matter what their ability in a friendly environment.

The group has become so popular that in January a new day time session will also be available. Fitmum's has joined forces with Blue Kangaroo in order to help mum's with pre school children to exercise. Fitmums run leader Mike Barlow and assistant Fitmums Co-ordinator Mel Fletcher will be leading this session which is open to everyone. If child care is needed Mum's can pre-book their children into the "Fitkids" session on a Monday morning at a cost of £4 per child for a 1 hour session. Fitkids at Blue Kangaroo offers supervised free play, structured games and a snack – co-ordinated by a dedicated qualified member of staff. Call 01482 844200 to book a place at Fitkids.

Sam Barlow from Cottingham started Fitmums & Friends in January last year and has been amazed by the growing popularity of the group. Some nights there are as many as 20 Fitmums & Friends pounding the streets of Cottingham, enjoying a choice of a range of distances depending on ability. Such is the growth of Fitmums that it has been necessary to find an official base – this has been provided by Cottingham Methodist Church. 

Over 50 residents had attended the Planning Meeting held on Tuesday 5 January to voice their objections to an application by East Riding of Yorkshire Council to build 15 affordable houses on a site on Eppleworth Road.

The Parish Council Planning Committee unanimously recommended refusal of the application. However, the final decision rests with the ERYC Western Area Planning Committee; their next meeting, during which they will discuss this application, will be held on 9 February at County Hall.



The Haltemprice Lions are to hold a "New to You Sale" on the 22nd to 27th February, in Kings Parade, next door to Pascos restaurant.





In the Kitchen

A Little history

In Medieval times, an 'X' was used to sign documents by people who couldn't write. Upon the mark being made, the person would then kiss the X as a sign of sincerity.

Little Pots of Chocolate

Ingredients: 450g/1lb Plain Chocolate Grated zest of 1 orange Juice of 3 oranges 50g/2oz Butter

2 tbsp Grand Marnier or Cognac

4 Egg Yolks

2 Egg Whites

Extra Grand Marnier or Cognac to serve

1 Orange to serve

Instructions

- 1. Break the chocolate into the top of a double boiler. Add the orange zest and juice to the chocolate, together with butter. Heat the mixture over simmering water, stirring occasionally, until the chocolate has melted. Remove from heat and stir in 2 tbsp Grand Marnier or Cognac.
- 2. Combine the egg yolks in a large mixing bowl and beat together thoroughly. Strain the chocolate mixture on to the egg yolks, beating constantly with a hand-held electric whisk, if possible. Allow the mixture to cool.
- 3. In a clean bowl and using a clean whisk, beat the egg whites until stiff but not dry. Using a spatula, gently but thoroughly fold the whisked whites into the chocolate mixture.
- 4. Pour the mixture into 4 individual 150ml/5 fl.oz. Glass or china dishes, cover and chill in the refrigerator for about 2 hours until set
- 5. To serve cut 2 thin slices from the centre of the whole orange and cut each slice into quarters. Arrange 2 quarters, with the points facing, on top of each dish. Pour 1 teasp of Grand Marnier or cognac over the top of each dish and gently rotate each dish so that the entire surface is coated. Serve immediately.

Two Hearts as One Main Course

(Individual Beef Wellingtons)
Serves 2 Hot Beef Main Course

Ingredients:

2 x 175g/6oz Fillet Mignon (Beef fillet) Black Pepper 1 tbsp Vegetable Oil

25 c/1 oz Puttor

25g/1oz Butter

1 tbsp Onions, finely chopped

75g/3oz Mushrooms, thinly sliced

50g/2oz Smooth Liver Pate

225g/8oz Puff Pastry

Beaten Egg to glaze

For the sauce

150ml/5fl.oz. Red Wine

150ml/5fl.oz. Beef Stock

A large knob of Butter

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200C, 400F, Gas mark 6.
- 2. Melt the butter and oil in a frying pan until very hot, add the beef and seal and brown well on all sides. Remove from the pan and set aside.
- 3. Reheat the oil and butter in the frying pan, add the mushrooms and onion and sauté gently until soft. Set aside to cool a little.
- 4. Once cool, in a small bowl mix together the mushroom mixture and pate until well blended.
- 5. Divide the pasty into four then on a floured surface, roll the pastry pieces out large enough so that when you place a fillet on top there's a border of about 2.5cm/1-inch.
- 6. Divide the pate mixture between the two pieces of pastry then spread evenly over the centres leaving a 2.5cm/1-inch border of pastry on all sides then lay the meat on top. Brush the edges with a little beaten egg, lay the remaining two pieces of pastry over each fillet, pressing down firmly to seal well. Cut off any excess pastry to within 12mm/1/2 inch of the meat and brush the top of the parcels all over with beaten egg to glaze.
- 7. Roll out the pastry trimmings thinly and cut into small heart shapes. Use to decorate the top of each pie, then brush with beaten egg. Can be covered lightly with foil and refrigerated for up to 45 minutes if required.
- 8. Place on a baking sheet and bake in the oven for 15-20 minutes.
- 9. Meanwhile, place the wine and stock in a saucepan, bring to the boil and continue to boil until reduced and syrupy.
- 10. Add the butter to the sauce, stirring with a wooden spoon.
- 11. To serve transfer the beef Wellingtons onto individual serving plates and pour a little of the sauce around each one. Serve hot.

Ingredients:

350g/12oz Pork Fillet

1 tbsp Dry Sherry

1 tbsp Soy Sauce

1 Red Capsicum (Sweet pepper)

1 Green Capsicum (Sweet pepper)

1 Carrot

2 Spring Onion

1 Egg, beaten

2 tbsp Cornflour

Vegetable oil for deep frying

75g/3oz Pineapple Chunks

For the Sauce

180ml/6fl.oz. Chicken Stock

1 tbsp Soy Sauce

Salt

5 teasp Cider Vinegar

1 tbsp Sugar

1 tbsp Tomato Paste

1 teasp Cornflour mixed with a little water

Instructions

1. Cut the pork into thin strips about 2.5cm/1 inch wide by 5cm/2inches long. Place in a large bowl together with 1 tbsp each of Soy sauce and sherry. Mix well and set aside

2. Meanwhile, cut the green and red peppers into 2.5cm/1 inch squares. Peel and cut the carrots and spring onions into 1-inch

3. Bring a pan of water to the boil add the carrots and blanche for 4 minutes. Drain and set aside.

4. Make the sauce by combining the chicken stock, soy sauce, salt,

vinegar, sugar, tomato paste and cornflour mixture in a large saucepan. Bring slowly to the boil stirring until thickened, then add the vegetables (but not the pineapple). Stir until well blended. Keep the sauce warm whilst you cook the pork as follows

5. Mix the egg and cornflour together in a bowl until it forms a bat-

6. Remove the pork from the marinade with a slotted spoon, place the strips into the batter and mix to coat each piece well.

7. Heat the oil until very hot and almost smoking. Remove the pork pieces from the batter with a slotted spoon and immediately deepfry until browned. Drain on kitchen paper.

Vegetarian Spring Rolls Ingredients

For the filling

1 teasp Peanut Oil

1 Garlic Clove, crushed 1 teasp Freshly grated Ginger

2 Spring Onions, chopped

50g/2oz Oyster Mushrooms, chopped 50g/2oz Fried Bean Curd (Tofu), chopped

50g/2oz Grated Carrot 1/2 small stick Celery, very thinly sliced

1 teasp Cornflour

1 tbsp Soy Sauce Other Ingredients

12 x 125mm/5 inch square Spring Roll Wrappers

1 Egg, beaten

Oil for deep frying

Instructions

1. Heat the oil in a frying pan or wok, add the garlic, ginger, celery and spring onions and stir fry until softened.

2. Add the mushrooms, bean curd and carrots and stir fry for 1

3. Remove from the heat and stir in the cornflour and soy sauce. Blend well and allow to cool.

4. Place a tablespoon of the filling across the end of a wrapper, leaving a border of 1cm/1/2 inch on each side. Start rolling up the wrapper and when you get to 3/4 of the way, fold over the edges to enclose the filling.

5. Brush the remaining wrapper with a little beaten egg then continue to roll up the parcel. Repeat this process with all the wrappers. Refrigerate until ready to cook.

6. Preheat the oil to 180C, 350F. Fry the spring rolls, a few at a time, until golden and cooked through. Drain on Kitchen paper and keep warm whilst you fry the rest of the rolls. Serve immediately with a dipping sauce.



Internet Explorer (the latest version is 8) has always been included on every Windows computer for many years, and most people just click on the 'big blue e' automatically. For this reason, the fact of the matter is that if hackers and other unsavoury characters find a security flaw, they know they can potentially target up to 90% of the world's online users. That is why there are so many Windows security updates appearing on your computer. Using a different web browser lessens the security risk, as long as you keep it up to date; and of course have other security software on your computer. There has been a real epidemic of 'malware' appearing on computers recently. This malicious software takes the form of a 'personal security centre' warning you of dangerous infections on your machine. All it takes is one click and it will install itself and make things very difficult for you, some of these things are very difficult to remove. If you see one of these appear on your screen, do not click anything, just shut down your computer by holding in the power button for about 8 seconds. And under no circumstances enter your credit card details to try and solve the apparent infection. When you restart your computer, run an anti-spyware type scanner and/or your anti virus program. The main problem is that this malware often comes from infected web pages, and as it is not a virus, it won't be stopped by your anti virus pro-

Windows 7 is now the operating system of choice for all new computers so there are lots of users out there now. One useful tip for anyone getting to grips with the new system, although it is very easy to use, is to look at the top of the start menu and you will see a couple of links to tutorials about what's new, and finding your way around. Microsoft have released a helpful little guide to the trade, probably aimed primarily at business users but there are some good tips in there. Does Your Dandruff Walk?

must be getting to a funny age when I get excited by dandruff, but that is what happened to me yesterday, when I saw an 8 week old Labrador puppy. The puppy had come in because he was scratching and when I looked in his coat he was very scurfy and as I scratched his back his back legs started going in a scratch reflex.

The usual cause of this is a mite called Cheyletiella or walking dandruff mite, so called, because it is almost invisible to the naked eye, but does pick up pieces of dandruff with its large jaws and walk around with it.

So I combed a lot of the dandruff out onto the black table top and sat there observing the dandruff, (I did explain to the client what I was doing) and eventually true to form, the dandruff started to move so I quickly caught it on a piece of sellotape and rushed upstairs to look through the microscope, to see the mite with its characteristic large jaws at the front still moving.

For some strange reason the client did not hold my fascination at what we had found on her beautiful puppy and did not want to see the mite magnified x 100 (see top right.)

Cheyletiella are interesting mites which we often see on young puppies especially short coated breeds such as pugs and boxers, they make the dog extremely itchy as well. Cheyletiella is also a zoonosis in that the mites will also bite us if the dog is cuddled against bare flesh. The

mites live only on the dog but eggs can survive for a short time on the bedding. Treatment is very simple using a topical insecticide fipronil in a spray and probably need 2 treatments 4 weeks apart. Cheyletiella is also a very common mite seen in rabbits.

Fleas are probably the most common parasite seen on young animals, but there are more uncommon parasites occasionally seen. Lice are rare in puppies but I do occasionally see them especially when the pups are bedded down on straw. There are two kinds of lice, biting lice and sucking lice.

One of the most common skin parasites we see is called demodex, this mite burrows under the skin causing alopecia in young pups once again more the short coated breeds pugs, boxers and Staffordshire bull terriers. Pups catch the mite from their mothers while suckling and most dogs' immune systems eradicate the mite; however some of these short coated breeds fail to recognise the mite as being foreign and allow it to breed causing the baldness. Treatment involves usually a prescription spot on product however sometimes the demodiciosis is so severe that weekly baths of a very powerful insecticidal wash is required which we will carry out at the surgery.

So after twenty years as a veterinary surgeon I still get a thrill from an itchy puppy, especially if I can find some mite crawling around and put it under the microscope.

There are a few ways of doing this at different costs, differing results and different predictabilities.

Now Listen To A Cautious Word Of Warning!

Tooth whitening needs to be prescribed by dental professional to significantly reduce the chance of complications and unwanted side effects. Be wary of self prescription and internet home kits. Some of these kits have high concentrations of gel that can cause gum irritations or chemical burns especially when the trays have a poor fit. Some gels have a chlorine releasing component and some can cause enamel erosion. Not everyone is suitable for tooth whitening so my advice is not to waste your money on people who know nothing about dentistry or oral health. Rant over, deep breaths. Only kidding, but be careful.

So Will It Work For You?

Tooth whitening works superbly well for so many people and in most situations I see the answer is yes to the above question. It is particularly effective for natural yellowing of teeth and teeth that have darkened through the rigours of daily life including tea and coffee. Whitening will only work on natural tooth and not on crowns, veneers or fillings. It is also very good for mild tetracycline staining (tetracycline is an antibiotic) and mild mottling/staining from fluorosis (excess fluoride intake during tooth development). Some more intense staining and mottling may not be amenable to straight forward tooth whitening alone. Obviously your teeth need to be in good nick. Trying to do tooth whitening on bad, decayed teeth is a non-starter and may well cause pain and discomfort so is really not a good idea at all. If you have some discoloured fillings and want your natural teeth whiter it might make the filling stand out more. A simple solution is tooth whitening and replacement of the filling or even just to resurface the filling if it is otherwise sound. Simple, yet extremely effective, both visually and in your pocket.

Do You Fancy Some Tooth Blackening?

Has Branfield gone mad? Just keep with me a moment. There is an old custom in Japan for the blackening of teeth by married women and courtesans as an enhancement of their beauty. The custom, rooted in antiquity, had gradually become proof of the married status of women. Before a new bride entered her husband's home she would visit seven relatives to receive dye and then underwent "the first blackening". The dye was primarily derived from ferric tannate and was applied by a brush made from a crushed twig. The dye would be reapplied as it wore. It was seen that blackened teeth showed evidence that a wife had sworn eternal fidelity to her spouse. My wife was having nothing of it. Mind you it's not really a good look is it?

Horses For Courses

The right technique for YOU depends on your own personal circumstances e.g. how dark, mottled or stained your teeth are or what colour your teeth are etc. The other considerations are how white you want them, how quick you want them whitened, how long you want it to last, how much you are prepared to do yourself and how much you want to pay. The thing is straight forward tooth whitening is a non-invasive technique that can make a big difference without more expensive veneers etc but it needs to be done correctly and appropriately. There is obviously more to this subject so I will revisit it again.




ther short distance turn left and follow the path towards White House Farm crossing four stiles to reach Eppleworth road just to the East of the farm.

On emerging onto the road, turn right and walk along the road until reaching the drive up to Hessle Golf Club. In the Garden



his month there are signs of the approaching spring, with bulbs appearing and birds and wildlife waking up as light levels and temperatures increase. There's plenty to do indoors this month, all in preparation for the season ahead. Outdoors, the garden is coming to life again, and its time to prune shrubs, such as Wisteria.

Sowing and planting

Dahlia tubers stored over winter (or bought this year) can be started into growth. Place them in a light, warm place to sprout before planting. They will need additional misting with a spray-bottle of water, to stop them drying out.

Lily bulbs can be planted in pots, for flowers this summer. After growing on indoors or in a cool greenhouse, they can be moved onto the patio when in flower, so that you can enjoy the blooms.

Bulbs coming up in the rock garden or in containers may benefit from overhead protection from the rain and snow. A sheet of glass or Perspex placed on piles of bricks will do the job.

Hardy annuals can be sown in pots or modules to provide colour.


Summer-flowering Dutch iris bulbs can be forced and used as cut flowers.

Place gladioli corms in seed trays or boxes and place in a light, warm (around 10°C/50°F) spot to encourage them to sprout before planting. This will ensure an earlier display.

Sweet peas can be sown under cloches, in a cold frame, or in a cool room in the house. Any sweet peas that were

Root cuttings can be taken of Papaver (perennial poppies), Verbascum (mullein), Acanthus (bear's britches) and Phlox.

Check on tender plants overwintering outdoors to ensure protective coverings are still in place

Cutting back, pruning and dividing

Cut back ornamental grasses and other perennials left for winter interest.

Continue to deadhead winter pansies and other winter bedding. Pansies will carry on into the spring and even to early summer, if attended to frequently.

Cut off old leaves of hellebores that produce flowers from ground level (including Helleborus x hybridus and H. niger) to expose the flowers and remove possible foliar diseases such as hellebore leaf spot.

At the end of the month prune back the stems of potgrown overwintered fuchsias and place in a well-lit, warm place to encourage new growth.

Divide and/or plant bulbs-in-the-green such as snow-drops (Galanthus) and winter aconites (Eranthis hyemalis).

Divide clumps of herbaceous perennials that you want to propagate, those that have become too large for their allotted space, and those that are flowering poorly or have lost their shape.

General maintenance

Prepare beds for new roses when conditions allow. Avoid wet days and frozen ground.

Send soil samples for pH and nutrient testing (if necessary). This can help you choose the correct plants for the site in question, and allow you to rectify any nutrient deficiencies with a spring feed.

Improve the drainage of heavy soils by working in lots of organic matter and coarse gravel (if necessary).

Clear up weedy beds before mulching. Lighter soils can be mulched now, but heavier soils are best left until March, when the soil is warmer.

Mulching with a deep layer of organic matter helps to condition the soil, suppress weed growth, insulate plant roots from temperature fluctuations, and conserve soil moisture during the summer.

Check whether containers need watering. Pots that are sheltered by eaves or balconies can miss out on any rainfall. Check the compost at a hand's depth to see if it feels dry. Aim to keep pots moist, not wet.

Pots and tubs benefit from topping up with fresh John Innes compost. Old compost can be removed and replaced if there is not much room.

Towards the end of the month, you can top dress beds and borders with a balanced fertiliser such as Growmore or blood, fish and bone, to feed perennials as they start back into growth.

Planning ahead

Order catalogues for spring planting of summer-flowering bulbs, bedding plants and herbaceous perennials.

Stock up on stakes and ties for the coming season, if you have not done so already.

Plan your summer bedding and container planting schemes in good time for ordering the necessary bulbs, annuals and seed, and for propagating the relevant material







You don't have to be a genius to guess the topic

now, snow and yet more snow!!!!! All very beautiful....nature had clothed our trees, fields, hedgerows and land with a blanket of pristine, white, fairytale softness. ENOUGH OF EXTOLLING THE VIRTUE SIDE!!!

The reality was extremely different, as each and every one of you will know of course!!! Water supplies froze up, pipes burst, the going underfoot was treacherous and we will not even go into discussing the roads and the appalling lack of foresight by any council across the land...not just ours. Maybe I am being unfair to assume that our money (the rates we pay) is not very often channelled in appropriate directions but that is most certainly how I feel. We ought to have a forum on this topic......someone do it please.!!!!

We, as the higher intelligence, have the opportunity to wear boots with thick rubber soles which have plenty of grip to help us walk and keep us safe. Horses, however, do not fare well walking on ice or snow. It is of no benefit if they are wearing metal shoes. Snow balls up inside the shoe, to the point of making stiletto like towers....quite scary, as falling over is a very real threat. They slide on ice and it is in the lap of the gods if you both make it to where ever in one piece.

Our hospitals have been heaving at the seams with 100's of fall related injuries...we are fortunate in that the human body can be

mended. Horses, however, are shot when they break bones. It is virtually impossible to mend a break in a horse. The cost of such treatment is so enormous that it is simply not feasible. Only with incredibly valuable horses is treatment ever tried....Racing stallions worth countless millions for example. The success rate, however, is not high. Usually the supporting leg cannot cope with the long weeks of weight bearing and the foot structure inside collapses.

I managed to keep all my horses and owners happy at my yard by turning all my horses out every day. By doing so my horses stayed sane through the long period where riding and exercise was out of the question. I am lucky that I have that opportunity open to me. I have been speaking to many local horse owners who simply had no choice but to keep their animals confined in their stables.....and then had to cope with all the problems related to such containment.....Stress, colic attacks, high jinks in a confined space and the inevitable manic galloping about come the day their owners could safely get them to their fields.....In that circumstance all one can do is pray that the horses don't injure themselves as they hurtle and cavort around their paddocks, making the most of their new found freedom!

Not an easy time, all in all. With the thaw came the blessed relief of free running water supplies! No more carrying water to the stables! Heaven personified for those owners who had to do just that! A horse can drink anywhere from 7 to 11 gallons a day. That is a lot of water to carry to a yard full of horses from wherever the only working tap happens to be! Farmers across the country have equally struggled to get water to their cattle and sheep. There is much effort involved in caring for any livestock at times of extreme weather.

I finally have the use of my school/ ménage back now, which means that my working life can resume normality.....God willing! We can start to school and train the horses again. My income has suffered a significant blow as every job I had arranged round the country was understandably cancelled.

"Why do horses have their thick winter coats clipped off when they need it most?"

This was a good and very relevent question I was asked recently. I can understand that a bystander may perceive this practice to be unfair on the horses. Horses grow an amazingly thick, double layered, highly greased coat in winter. Its purpose is to keep it warm, obviously, but also to be extremely waterproof. The reality is that when a horse remains "in work" during the winter months, then its very nature turns against the animal. The horse overheats quickly and starts to sweat. The coat inhibits the skin to dry and holds the sweat in. This, in turn, causes the horse to stay wet for hours and leads to chills and is a very real danger to its health.

By clipping an appropriate amount off, we are therefore able to work the horse better and without leading to any sort of discomfort to the animal. The amount of hair removed is dictated by its own personal work regime. The picture below shows TuTu sporting a very nifty "Blanket "clip! His back and kidneys are left covered but all the areas that readily sweat are exposed for quick recovery. This style of clip is perfect for a horse in a light to medium exercise regime. A hunter or racehorse which will be galloping and exerting itself would have to have all its hair removed in a "Hunter" clip. All clipped horses are rugged up to the hilt to more than compensate for its "Number 1"! I honestly promise that life for a horse, in work, in winter, is most definitely improved by being clipped. Worry not, those of you out there who were unsure!

Chinese New Year The Year of the Tiger

bout a week before Lunar New Year, traditional families will be busy preparing the religious ceremony performed with tributes and offerings in honour of Heaven (Tien Shen) and Earth (Ti Tu), and of the various deities of the household together with family ancestors. One of the most well know deities is the Kitchen God who resides over the stove and is said to keep an eye on the interactions of the household, making an annual report on what the family has done in the past year to the Jade Emperor in Heaven around about a week before Chinese New Year Day. Rites and offerings are made to the Kitchen God (Zhou Khun) on this day with hopes that he will speak well of the deeds of the family.

Traditionally, the run up to the celebration of Chinese New Year is the 'Reunion Dinner'. An extravagant banquet is laid out to mark the onset of the New Year where young and old gather for a reunion dinner to symbolise family unity. Family members try to get home from different places before or on New Year's Eve to celebrate this special occasion in the family home. Married daughters will traditionally spend their reunion dinner in the husband's family home.

This is a family banquet that is full of special dishes and delicacies artistically named with auspicious symbolic meanings. The dinner will start with a prayer of tribute and offerings to the ancestors and deities at the family altar. It is a very colourful and lively affair when every light is supposed to be kept on in the house throughout the whole night.

Some of the dishes that are laid on the banquet table have superstitious attributes such as: Ginkgo nuts; these represent gold ingots and are full of auspicious luck for fertility. Black moss seaweed is a symbolic food of prosperity. This is also true in the case of a whole chicken which is a desirable addition to the feast. Dried bean curd is placed on the banquet table to symbolise happiness and luck. Lotus seed is seen as another fertility symbol and signifies having many offspring. Nian Gao is a traditional sweet steamed glutinous rice pudding, when you eat this dish you will aid growth and abundance. When you translate bamboo shoots into Chinese, the words sound similar to the Chinese for "hoping that all turns out for the best". A whole fish with its head and tail intact will represent togetherness.

Reunion Dinner


The Reunion Dinner is a very busy event. The women buzz around the kitchen with the dinner preparation whilst the men either watch TV or (guess what?) play mah-jong. Mah-jong is an extremely important part of Chinese culture and is played by men and women alike, often in halls exclusively dedicated to the game.

Mah-jong is linked with gambling with huge sums of money being won and lost by the players. An excellent memory is required to remember which tiles have been laid down and which remain. Once a certain point in a hand has been passed, you need to pay special attention as if you are the one to put down the tile that enables another player to win that hand, you not only have to pay your own losses on the hand but those of the other two losing players as well. This can mean serious amounts of money.

Children are bathed and dressed in their new pyjamas and promised the arrival of "Tsai Shen Yeh" (Chai Shen Yeh) (the Wealth God). Whilst they sleep; the parents will slip an ang pow (a red envelope with money) under their pillow signifying a visit from 'Chai Shen Yeh'. Children can also expect to receive red envelopes from uncles and aunts, with the amount that is given, being dictated by the closeness of the family relationship and also the age of the child. Older children can usually expect to receive more than younger ones. Someone who has a large family and who has taken a hammering on the mah-jong tables is in for trouble!

At midnight, at the turn of the old and New Year, people let off firecrackers which serve to scare away the evil spirits and old qi of the past year and to greet the arrival of the New Year.

New Years Day itself, starts you with you, in your finest and newest clothes, with the exchange of good wishes amongst the family. Married couples present the young ones, children and unmarried adults alike with a Hung-Bao. In Chinese culture, instead of giving a wrapped up present as we do at Christmas in the UK, it is a customary to give this red envelope containing money. The amount of money contained in the envelope has to be in even numbers. Even numbers are auspicious unless it is a single Chinese i-ching coin on its own. It is amazing how much a person can accumulate in a single day.



The day continues with visits to relatives. The visiting rota has its unspoken hierarchy arrangement. The oldest get to sit at home and wait for the younger relatives to visit them to exchange good wishes to each other. This is a very exciting time for the children because nearly every 'Kung Xee Fa Chai' (it means Congratulations and May you be Prosperous) they recite, they get an ang pow (red envelope containing money) for it.

The second day of Chinese New Year is named 'Kai Nien' meaning "Year Beginning" which starts with a very early morning breakfast. Special dishes with symbolic names will be served. The special dish of this day is long noodles which are served with everyone competing to toss the noodles as high as possible with their chopsticks. The tossing of noodles is a symbolic activity done to promote longevity. This means that, unless you are unable to do so, you stand up and raise your arms full stretch in the air holding the noodles aloft. In order to get extra lift off, some people use super long chopsticks and stand on chairs so you should probably make sure the ceiling fan is turned off.

Unlike in the west, Chinese New Year is not a time for drinking a lot of alcohol. In fact, alcohol is generally not drunk as people save space for themselves to drink enormous amounts of Chinese tea. Some people will have a Chinese wine with their meal but, particularly as the emphasis is so much on the family nature of the celebrations, nobody goes over the top.

Two days of over eating and general fun and games are induldged in quite a lot as the Chinese do not hold back on these occasions. The Chinese relationship with food is close all the year, but at no time more than at New Year. Many dishes have particular significance, especially at this time. Even everyday dishes like fish and turnips have special meanings and none more so than fish balls and meat balls both of which suggest reunion, which is a most important element at this time. However, after two days of festivities and fun, even the Chinese can have enough and recognise that energy levels need to be restored. The third day is therefore a day of calm. Traditionally, it is not a day for risks or adventure. The young ones will venture out to see friends but it is a quiet day. In China no offices or businesses will be open on this day.

Normal procedures return with businesses as usual on the fourth day. Many businesses will choose a specific day to start business with the assistance of their Feng Shui Practitioner and initiate the new trading year with a spectacular display of Lion Dance and fire crackers. It is a very noisy and exciting event.

Greetings and an air of festivity remain for another eleven days through to the full moon of the first lunar month when another celebration follows but this time it is to mark the closing of the Spring Festival. Day 15 is also called the 'Spring Lantern Festival' (Yuan Xiao Jie). This wonderfully romantic celebration takes place under a full moon on the fifteenth day of the first lunar month of the year.

On this day, the old and young carry a colourful lantern and gather in a neighbouring public place. They gather to admire and appreciate the first full moon of the year (very similar to the Mid Autumn Festival). In China, there are still villages that hold a big Tang Yuan (rice dumplings) cooking and eating session. The dumplings are round and symbolise family unity and completeness. The mid-month Lantern Festival traditionally brings the seasonal passage of the New Year to a conclusion.

Social Events



Beware Claims Management Firms offering to Clear Your Debts

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council's trading standards service is warning local people to beware of firms offering to clear their debts. Low interest rates, wage cuts and freezes, and high house prices have meant that many people are struggling to meet their financial obligations. The current economic climate has seen a rise in the number of claims management companies (CMCs) targeting cash-strapped families with promises to use legal loopholes to help people escape their debts. However, these firms may expect payment of several hundred pounds, up front, from those who are already unable to meet their financial commitments and who are unaware of the free advice available from the organisations listed below

Changes to the Consumer Credit Act 1974 mean that borrowers only need to prove that the relationship between them and their lender is unfair rather than showing that certain criteria have not been met, such as an agreement being incorrectly worded or that the interest rate is extortionate. If it can be shown that the relationship is unfair, the borrower could make a legal claim against the lender that the agreement is not enforceable.

Despite this change in the law, what is considered to be unfair has only been partly tested by the courts and there are many cases pending. Until recently, lenders have preferred to settle out of court rather than be part of a case that sets a legal precedent for any future claims. However, a recent ruling in favour of lenders, by Judge David Waksman in the Manchester High Court, can be seen as a partial victory against indebted credit card customers. Promises by CMCs that they can use this loophole to help people escape their debts may,

therefore, be misleading as a borrower could win or lose a claim and an unsuccessful claim would leave an individual in even more debt.

The Ministry of Justice has highlighted some of the misleading statements made by CMCs, such as claims that 80 per cent of credit agreements were unenforceable or that a CMC could get credit card debt written off iwithin six weeksî.

Some of the firms that charge up front for this type of service offer to refund the charge if the claim is unsuccessful. However, in some cases refunds are only offered in relation to disputes over specific types of agreements, such as mortgages or secured loans, and are not offered to clients with other types of debt. For example, if the small print of the agreement with the CMC excluded refunds for unsuccessful claims regarding credit cards, a client who claimed unsuccessfully in relation to a credit card agreement could be several hundred pounds worse off.

Colin Briggs, trading standards services manager, said: iI would always recommend anyone who is struggling to pay their debts to seek advice from one of the organisations that can help them, free of charge. Why pay when you can get help or advice from organisations such as your local citizens advice bureau, the consumer credit counselling service or the national debtline?i.

Cllr Jane Evison, portfolio holder for cultural services, housing and public protection, commented: iI would urge anyone who is worried about debt to seek independent advice from one of the free charities or organisations that provide this type of service.î



I ospital staff around the country have been rushed off their feet following a significant rise in the number of people suffering broken bones in the snow and ice. Many of the cases are broken bones in the hands, legs, feet, wrist or ankle as a result of slips and falls on the ice,"

Find a hospital emergency department on the first big snowfall of the year, and there may be a running tally of a few common injuries and illnesses. A large amount of snow usually means a large amount of shoveling. Clearing a pavement or driveway is an aggressive exercise and requires plenty of aerobic capacity to lift and toss shovels full of snow.

When snow storms start to blanket the ground, The hospital is a place nobody wants to visit (except for the newborn nursery), and while injuries and illnesses do pay the bills, most doctors would prefer preventive maintenance instead of emergency body repair work.

As hospitals report an increase in the number of accidents due to the ice and snow, pedestrians have been advised to 'roll1 when they fall over Those out walking on icy pavements are being told they could cushion the blow by rolling with a fall. If you do fall, try and curl up and roll with the fall and stay relaxed. Also suggested having two pairs of shoes - one for walking in the snow, the other for driving or walking around the office.

Waterproof shoes, which also have a grip sole and ankle support, are best for outside but leather soled shoes should be avoided. Wellington boots can be practical but do not give enough support and can be hard to remove. Clothing should be warm but allow free movement And remove items from pockets that could cause injury in a fall

No one has been immune to it.'

Doctors describe fractures in the following ways:

- * A complete fracture is when the bone has broken into two pieces.
- * A greenstick fracture is when the bone cracks on one side only, not all the way through.
- * A single fracture is when the bone is broken in one place.
- * A comminuted (kah-muh-noot-ed) fracture is when the bone is broken into more than two pieces or crushed.
- * An open fracture is when the bone is sticking through the skin.

What Happens When You Break a Bone?

It hurts to break a bone Its different for everyone, but the pain is often like the deep ache you get from a super bad stomachache or headache. Some people may experience sharper pain especially with an open fracture. And if the fracture is small, you may not feel much pain at all. Breaking a bone is a big shock to your whole body. Its normal for you to receive strong messages from parts of your body that aren't anywhere close to the fracture. You may feel dizzy, woozy, or chilly from the shock, other people don't feel any pain right away because of the shock of the injury.

How Do Broken Bones Heal?

Your bones are natural healers. At the location of the fracture, your bones will produce lots of new cells and tiny blood vessels that rebuild the bone. These cells cover both ends of the broken part of the bone and close up the break until its as good as new.

What Happens When the Cast Comes Off?

Once the cast is off, the injured area will probably look and feel pretty weird. The body part that was in a cast might look strange at first. The skin might be pale, dry, or flaky, and the body part itself might look smaller because you might have lost some muscle while it was healing.

Don't worry. This is all temporary.
