First World War Commemoration

s most people now know, the Government has announced plans to commemorate the Centenary of the First World War in 2014 and wishes to encourage local communities to do the same.

The outbreak of the War was 1 August 1914 although the first day of conflict was the 4 August.

The full order of events commemorating the First World War will span from the centenary of the outbreak of war in 2014 until that of Armistice Day in 2018. Some of the commemoration dates include:

Outbreak of war, August 1, 2014 First day of conflict, August 4, 2014 Gallipoli Campaign, April 25, 2015 Battle of the Somme, July 1 2016 Battle of Jutland, May 31, 2016 Passchendale, June 17, 2017 Armistice Day, November 11, 2018

The Parish Council is considering local plans to mark the occasion which might include:

- Look at and support the events to be put on by other voluntary groups in the village which commemorate the war.
- Involve the High School and the Primary Schools as part of their curricula.
- Examine the history of the East Yorkshire Regiment, in which most of the men from Cottingham served, during the war.
- Ascertain why the majority of casualties of men from Cottingham occurred during 1917.
- Establish what was the role of the East Yorkshire Regiment between 1914 and 1916?
- Commemorate not only those who lost their lives but also those who returned but were either injured or suffered because of the conflict
- Try to find out what criteria were used for including names on the memorials already in the village and whether anyone was missed.
- Liaise with Cottingham Memorial Club, the British Legion and the Local History Society.
- Negotiate the return of the Memorial Gardens in Hallgate (originally provided by the former Cottingham Urban District Council) from the East Riding of Yorkshire Council back to the Parish Council.
- Use the Cottingham Times to advertise the projects and to gather information from surviving relatives

The Parish Council is aware that other groups in the village are undertaking similar projects. So if you have any information which might be used in our project, or if you would like to be part of our team, we would be very pleased to welcome anyone who is interested to come and join us. Please contact Judith, the Clerk to the Parish Council, as soon as possible.

Parish Council Grant

The Parish Council made a grant of £500 to St Mary's Church who are staging a major Flower Festival (in conjunction with the East Riding Flower Club). The Festival will have a floral virtues theme: faith, hope and love in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the start of the Great War. Proceeds from the Flower Festival will support projects to improve and upgrade the general facilities within the church building.

Landlords and the Immigration Bill

The background

There is much debate at the moment about the Immigration Bill 2013. Last month it had its' second reading in the House of Parliament and will now move to the Committee Stage. This Bill, if enacted, is expected to come into force early next year and will mean extra checks for landlords and letting agents.

So what does the detail of the Bill say?

Section 16 of the Bill states that a person is disqualified as a result of their immigration status from occupying premises under a residential tenancy agreement if they are:

- Not a relevant national and they require leave to enter or remain in the UK but does not have it.
- Their leave to enter or remain in the UK is subject to a condition preventing them from occupying the premises

Under Section 17 a landlord must not authorise an adult to occupy premises under a residential tenancy agreement if the adult is disqualified as a result of their immigration status.

What could happen if landlords do not check the immigration status of their tenants?

If the landlord contravenes section 17 they may be given a penalty up to £3,000 per adult illegal immigrant. This is applicable to tenancies commencing after the Bill has been enacted.

Basically, in plain English this means that landlords and letting agents will have to carry out immigration checks on any new tenants from the date the bill is enacted and are not allowed to rent property to people who are not allowed to reside in the UK. Landlords will have a defence if they have carried out the necessary checks.

By any new tenants it not only means any new lettings, it means those existing tenants who you issue a new Agreement to and any tenants who hold over on a periodic tenancy.

What needs to be checked?

But what are those checks, how do you go about doing it and what happens if the tenant isn't happy with that. The Government state that the checks would be similar to those that employers do now – requesting a copy of a passport, driving licence, national insurance number.

However, the European Union recognises 404 legitimate means of personal identification - would landlords recognise documents other than a passport, driving licence or National Insurance number, I am sure the majority of landlords would never have seen many of these documents.

How are landlords going to be able to carry out all the checks and be confident that they have got it right. Undoubtedly there will be several companies who will set up checking services, similar to those offered by tenant referencing services, and an even greater reliance placed upon a landlords agent to protect their interests

What next?

In many ways, we will have to wait until more information has been agreed. Whilst this article raises more questions than it may answer it hopefully makes landlords aware of some of the issues they may face. My advice at this early stage is just to be aware of the potential changes and make sure if you use an agent that they are well equipped to protect your interests when the legislation does come into force.

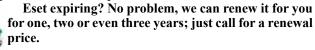

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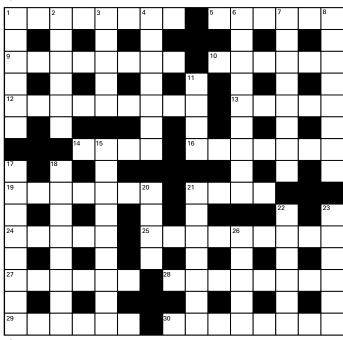

South Cave W.I. raises the roof!

n 2010 South Cave Women's Institute realised that the roof to their Hall required urgent attention.

The Hall was initially a WWI Army Hut which was brought from Rolston Camp by the original Members of South Cave W.I. and placed on land donated by the owners of Cave Castle in 1930. Since that date the Members have lovingly extended and improved the Hut by having it bricked in 1983, and since then have had central heating and double glazing installed.

The Hall is now a well used local amenity, appreciated by the diverse Groups who use it every day, as well as the W.I.

Since 2010, W.I. Members have carried out various fund raising activities to raise the money needed. These include Quizzes, Strawberry Teas, teas for community coach trips, catering for South Cave Show and other functions.

South Cave W.I. has received kind donations from Cave Players and individual members of the village community. Also some of our Speakers have generously forgone their fees and donated them to the roof fund.

In 2013, South Cave Show Committee kindly donated £250, as did the Parish Council, which meant that the W.I. could apply for funding from Waste Recycling Environmental Ltd.

WREN is a not for profit business that awards grants to community, environmental and heritage projects across the UK from funds donated by FCC Environment as part of a voluntary environmental tax credit scheme called the Landfill Community Fund. Since 1998, WREN has granted over £150111 to more than 6,000 projects which benefit people living within 10 miles of a FCC Environment landfill site.

South Cave W.I. Members were profoundly thankful to find that they were less than 10 miles from the Galleymore, near Holme on Spalding Moor site. A grant of £5000 was duly applied for with South Cave W.I. matching an equal amount.

South Cave W.I. got the "go ahead" from WREN in September 2013 and work was commenced by Storey Felt Roofing Ltd on 1st October.

The weather did not help with wind and rain, and the large trees in the grounds dropped a lot of leaves and needles onto the refurbishment work. This meant the workmen had to clear the debris every day, with several wheelbarrow loads being loaded into

Despite the problems, the roof is now finished and the Hall is watertight for another generation of W.I. Members and the people of South Cave and WREN have released the £5000 applied for. South Cave W.I. is extremely grateful for their help in this project.

It is planned to have a small ceremony in early Spring 2014 in order to unveil a plaque showing WREN's involvement with the roof project. At that time all our donors and the people of South Cave will be invited and it is hoped that the three eldest Members of South Cave W.I., who are also past Presidents, will be able to attend this ceremony.

Mushroom & Ginger Stir Fry

Ingredients

15ml/1tbsp groundnut oil

1 red pepper, deseeded and sliced

2 carrots, peeled and cut into fine sticks

100g/4oz broccoli florets

250g white closed cup mushrooms, sliced

4 spring onions, trimmed and sliced

2 cloves of garlic, crushed

1tbsp finely chopped fresh ginger

300ml/1/2pt Vegetable or chicken stock

30ml/2tbsp rice wine vinegar

30ml/2tbsp rice wine

15ml/1tbsp light soy sauce

15ml/1tbsp tomato purée

10ml/2tsp cornflour, blended to a paste with a little

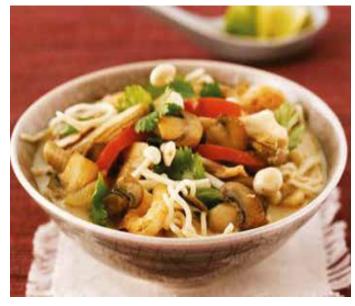
100g/4oz oyster mushrooms, torn in half thread egg noodles to serve

Method

- 1. Heat the oil in a large frying pan or wok. When hot add the pepper, carrots and broccoli and stir fry for 2 mins. Add the closed cup mushrooms, spring onions, garlic and ginger and continue to stir fry for 3-4 mins over a high heat until all the vegetables have taken on some golden colour.
- 2. Mix the stock, vinegar, wine, soy sauce, tomato puree and cornflour together. Add the oyster mushrooms to the wok, stir well, then pour over the liquid and bring to the boil. As soon as the sauce has boiled and thickened, remove from the heat and serve hot with 45-60ml/3-4tbsp thread egg noodles.

Beefy Spring Stir-Fry

Ingredients:

450g/1lb sirloin steak, cut into strips 15ml/1tbsp sunflower oil Salt and freshly milled black pepper 1 small red onion, peeled and finely sliced 175g/6oz broccoli florets 100g/4oz mangetout 100g/4oz button mushrooms, halved 1 bok choi or pak choi, halved 75ml/5tbsp good, hot beef stock 30ml/2tbsp horseradish sauce 15-30ml/1-2tbsp light soy sauce 15-30ml/1-2tbsp sherry vinegar

Method:

- 1. Heat the oil in a large non-stick wok until really hot. Season the beef then add to the wok and cook for 1 minute until browned, but only just cooked. Remove from the wok with a slotted spoon and place on a plate.
- 2. Add the onion to the wok and cook for 1 minute, stirring frequently. Add the broccoli, mangetout, mushrooms and bok or pak choi. Stir-fry for 3-4 minutes then add the stock and horseradish. Stir to combine.
- 3. Return the beef to the wok with any meat juices from the plate and add the soy sauce and sherry vinegar.
 - 4. Serve the stir-fry with plain boiled rice.



Sweet 'n Sour Meatballs

Ingredients

325g/12oz Minced Beef

1 small Onion, grated

1 Egg

1 tbsp Soy sauce

2 tbsp Vegetable Oil

2 tbsp Brown Sugar

2 tbsp Red Wine Vinegar

100g/4oz Pineapple Chunks

1 small Green Capsicum (Sweet Pepper)

1 Tomato, cut into wedges

1 tbsp Cornflour

120ml/4fl.oz. Water

Salt and Pepper

Instructions

- 1. In a large mixing bowl, mix together the beef, onion, egg, soy sauce, salt and pepper until well combined.
- 2. Using your hands, form mixture into small meatballs about 2.5cm/1 inch in diameter. Set aside.
- 3. De-seed the capsicums and slice.
- 4. . Heat the oil in large frying pan or wok until very hot and beginning to smoke then carefully add the meatballs and fry for 10-12 minutes until well browned on all sides turning frequently. Remove them to a serving platter and pour meat juices over meatballs. Keep warm.
- 5. Wipe the pan clean of any residue with kitchen paper then add the brown sugar and vinegar. Cook over a high heat until the sugar has dissolved then add the tomato wedges, green pepper, and pineapple chunks. Stir fry for 3 minutes.
- 6. Stir the cornflour and water solution to remix, then add to the pan mixing thoroughly. Cook for 2-3 minutes until the sauce is clear and thickened.
- 7. To serve pour the sauce over meatballs and serve immediately.

Beefwith Cashews

Ingredients:

450g/11b Rump steak

4 tbsp Vegetable Oil

8 Spring Onions, cut into 2.5cm/1 inch pieces

2 Garlic Cloves, crushed

2.5cm/1 inch Fresh Ginger, finely chopped

100g/4oz Unsalted Cashew Nuts

120ml/4fl.oz. Water

4 teasp Cornflour

4 teasp Soy Sauce

1 teasp Sesame Oil

2 teasp Oyster Sauce

1 teasp Chilli Sauce

1. Trim the meat and cut into very thin slices about 5cm/2 inches long. In a mixing bowl, blend together the water, cornflour, soy sauce, sesame oil, oyster sauce and chilli sauce. Set aside.



- 2. Heat 2 tablespoons of the vegetable oil in a large frying pan or wok until very hot then add half the beef and stir-fry for 3-4 minutes. Remove from the pan and set aside. Add the remaining beef and stir-fry for 3-4 minutes. Remove from the pan and set aside with the first batch of beef.
- 3. Add the remaining vegetable oil to the frying pan and heat until very hot. Add the onions, garlic, ginger and cashews and stir-fry 1 minute.
- 4. Add the beef to the pan and stir fry, over a high heat, for 2 minutes then pour in the soy sauce mixture and continue to cook over a high heat, stirring all the time, until the sauce thickens. Serve immediately.

Chicken with Bean Sprouts

Ingredients

1 teasp Dry Sherry

1 teasp Salt

2 teasp Cornflour

1 Egg White

3 Boneless Chicken Breasts, skinned

6 tbsp Vegetable Oil

220g/7oz Fresh Bean Sprouts

1/2 teasp Sugar

Shredded Spring Onion to garnish

Instructions

- 1. In a large bowl, mix together the sherry, cornflour, egg white and half the salt.
- 2. Cut the chicken breasts into very thin slices then add to the bowl containing the sherry mixture and mix well.
- 3. Heat 4 tablespoons of the oil in a large frying pan or wok until very hot, add the chicken and stir fry for 2-3 minutes until cooked through. Transfer to a warmed plate with a slotted spoon.
- 4. Add the remaining oil to the pan and heat until very hot. Add the bean sprouts for a further minute. Return the chicken to the pan together with the sugar and stir fry for 2-3 minutes. Serve immediately garnished with the spring onions.

Council supports taxi trade by planning fee cuts

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council is planning to reduce the licence fees paid by taxi owners and drivers as part of its ✓ support for the taxi trade.

The council is one of few across the UK that is suggesting no increase in the fees, which are already among the lowest in the country.

From 23 January - 28 February, the taxi and private hire trade can give their views on the council's plan to reduce the fees they pay to be on the road. It will be the third year running that the council has maintained or reduced them.

Councillor Jackie Cracknell, the council's portfolio holder for community involvement and performance, said: "Taxi and private hire owners provide an essential transport service to the public, particularly in rural areas, and we are doing everything we can to support the trade.

"By working to keep our own costs low, we are passing our efficiencies on to the taxi trade which, we hope, will in turn help East Riding's residents."

The proposed reduced fees affect 257 private hire vehicles, 157 taxis and up to 600 drivers.

The council is recommending the licence for a new hackney carriage or private hire vehicle is reduced to £130 a year from the current £138. The renewal fee is currently £117 a year for each vehicle, but the council is recommending that it should drop to £110. Drivers' annual badges are currently £55. Additional reductions will be offered to owners and drivers who apply and pay electronically.

Local authorities are required by law to maintain a separate Taxi Licensing Account to finance the council's work in this area and it has no impact on levels of council tax. The income raised by licensing fees cannot be used to subsidise other council services.

Have you ever thought of a Cocker Spaniel? Once again, I have learnt there is the 'Working' Cocker which is potentially bred for country pursuits and has gradually become popular and suitable in canine sporting activities such as agility/fly ball due to their stamina, speed and bidability. Then there is the 'Show' Cocker; very adaptable to most environments and easy to transport with you, so resulting in becoming the most popular type of Cocker Spaniel as a typical family pet.

We did our research on the internet and travelled to the Midlands to collect our 'Charlie' and what a perfect name it is! We had never had a Terrier in the family before and I know Natalie won't mind me saying but boy, do we know we have a terrier now. The first couple of years went by without incident with Charlie gaining a rosette for his 'Good Citizen' Bronze award.

Hello again, I hope you are well.

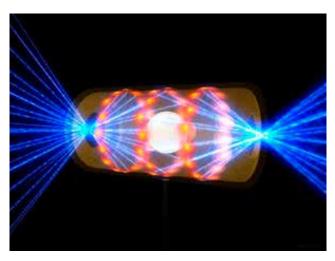

Exam Time

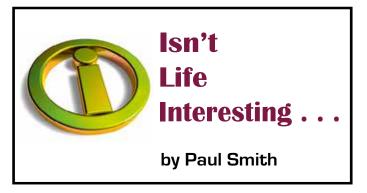
I took a couple of small exams in London and was really chuffed to come top of the class with top marks. Just waiting for the certificates to come from the University of Aachen.

What happens after the brown, blue and green bins are collected?

All waste from the brown bins is taken to a village near Pocklington, heated to kill bacteria and then composted. It's left outside for about 11 weeks, and then given to farmers to spread on their fields or handed out at compost giveaways once a year.

Waste from the blue bins goes all the way to a little town called Shotton in North Wales. There it is sorted by machines. Hand sorters are only used to remove items which shouldn't be there. Everything first goes through a series of spinning steel stars, with each one removing smaller and smaller sizes of paper. Then everything goes into a glassbreaker which smashes up bottles and jars and takes out all the glass. This leaves metal and plastic. Magnets then remove the steel and aluminium cans before an array of optical sorters separate the plastics into five polymer grades. Finally all the separated materials are sent for reprocessing.

Waste from the green bins is sent directly to landfill near Holme on Spalding Moore. Nothing is sorted or recovered before being sent there.

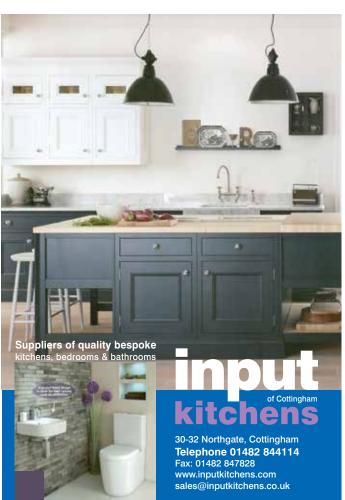
This month his destination is Fordon

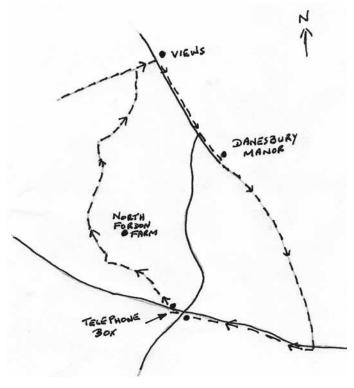
The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.

Map: EXPLORER 301

Park on grass triangle near cross roads GR.TA050752. Distance 5.0 Miles.

Leave the cross roads and walk in a westerly direction along Fordon Lane and on reaching the telephone box, turn right and walk through the farm. Keep right of the last building and after passing through a gate follow a sunken





path to a second gate, pass through the gate and walk along the dale bottom.

Pass through a metal gate and continue ahead with a fence on the left. Pass through a second metal gate and continue walking along the dale bottom then pass through a wooden gate and keep the fence on the left.

On reaching a metal herding pen, turn right and cross a farm track, cross a stile and continue ahead with a hedge on the left following the dale bottom as it swings to the left. On reaching a cross road of paths marked by a sign post, turn right and climb the hill, pass through a gate and continue climbing but less severe and at the top of the hill pass through a kissing gate and emerge on a metalled road. (Superb views from this point)

On emerging on the road, turn right and follow the road to pass Danebury Manor. After passing the Manor, the road becomes a farm track and shortly a green lane. Continue along this Green Lane to reach the road, turn right and walk back to the cross roads at Fordon.



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ow that the temperature is rising and we are having slightly milder weather we can start to think about getting out into the garden again.

Make sure to keep your garden tidy so that you are ready for the arrival of the Spring weather. One job that is fun and rewarding with superior taste rewards is growing your own potatoes. Whether you have a garden, allotment or small patio or balcony there are many options for growing seed potatoes.

What to grow

- There are dozens of different potato varieties, usually described as early, second early and main crop potatoes.
 These names indicate when they crop and also give you an idea of the space you'll need, how closely and when they can be planted
- You should concentrate on the earlier types if you're short
 of space, and it's also worth remembering that earlies are
 less likely to encounter pest problems as they're lifted so
 much earlier in the year.
- Second earlies take 16 to 17 weeks to mature after planting, so you should be able to harvest them from very late June through to the start of August.
- Main crops are ready 18 to 20 weeks after planting, so they can be lifted usually from July through to October. Main crops take up the most space in the garden, but they tend to be the best varieties to grow if you want some for storage.

What to do How to chit

- Chitting simply means encouraging the seed potatoes to sprout before planting.
- Start chitting from late January in warmer parts of the country or in February in cooler areas, about six weeks before you intend to plant out the potatoes.
- Each seed potato has a more rounded, blunt end that has a number of 'eyes'.
- Stand the tubers with the blunt end uppermost in trays or old egg boxes, with plenty of natural light.
- The potatoes are ready to be planted out when the shoots are 1.5-2.5cm (0.5-1in) long.

How to plant

- Plant your chitted potatoes when the soil has started to warm up, usually from mid-March or early April. Start by digging a trench 7.5-13cm (3-5in) deep, although the exact depth should vary according to the variety of potato you're planting.
- Add a light sprinkling of fertiliser to your trench before you begin planting.



- Plant early potatoes about 30cm (12in) apart with 40-50cm (16-20in) between the rows, and second earlies and main crops about 38cm (15in) apart with 75cm (30in) between the rows.
- Handle your chitted tubers with care, gently setting them into the trench with the shoots pointing upwards, being careful not to break the shoots. Cover the potatoes lightly with soil
- As soon as the shoots appear, earth up each plant by covering it with a ridge of soil so that the shoots are just buried.
- You need to do this at regular intervals and by the end of the season each plant will have a small mound around it about 15cm (6in) high.

Harvesting

- Your home-grown potatoes should be ready for lifting from June until September, depending on the varieties and the growing conditions. Earlies can be lifted and eaten as soon as they're ready.
- This will be when above-ground growth is still green, and usually as soon as the flowers open.
- Second and main crop varieties can be kept in the ground much longer, until September, even though aboveground growth may well be looking past its best.
- Two weeks before you lift the crop, cut the growth off at ground level. This should give the skins of the potatoes sufficient time to toughen up, making them far less prone to damage from lifting and easier to store.

10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Prepare vegetable seed beds, and sow some vegetables under cover
- 2. Chit potato tubers
- 3. Protect blossom on apricots, nectarines and peaches
- 4. Net fruit and vegetable crops to keep the birds off
- 5. Prune winter-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering
- 6. Divide bulbs such as snowdrops, and plant those that need planting 'in the green'
- 7. Prune Wisteria
- 8. Prune hardy evergreen hedges and renovate overgrown deciduous hedges
- 9. Prune conservatory climbers
- 10. Cut back deciduous grasses left uncut over the winter



Growing tips

- Potatoes like plenty of sun, so avoid planting them in frost-prone sites, as these conditions can damage the developing foliage. If you're starting up a vegetable plot on very weedy ground or old grassland, potatoes may help swamp out weeds with their fast-growing, extensive foliage.
- If you're short of space, try growing potatoes in an adequately drained container that's at least 30cm (1ft) deep and wide. Half fill the pot with multi-purpose compost or good quality, fertile garden soil, nestle two seed potatoes into the top of the compost and then top up with more compost or soil to within 2.5cm (1in) of the rim of the container.
- It's particularly important that there's adequate water once the tubers have reached the size of marbles. Unless there's regular, ample rainfall, the size and quality of the crop will be reduced if you don't water your potatoes.
- Seed potatoes are now in stock at Coletta & Tyson garden centre from £1.99.



Plant of the month Camellia

Camellias are one of the most popular winter- and springflowering shrubs, providing a vivid splash of colour when little else is in bloom. Although they need acid soil, they are easy to grow in containers of ericaceous (acidic) potting compost.

Site and soil conditions

Camellias are woodland plants that grow best in shelter and light shade, although with careful watering they can be grown in sunny positions. They prefer free-draining conditions, with plenty of organic matter, such as leaf mould, incorporated into the soil. Being ericaceous plants, camellias require an acid soil. If your soil isn't acid then consider growing your camellia in a container.

Watering

Tap water, especially in hard water districts, often contains too much calcium for camellias, reducing the acidity around the roots over time. Rain water is ideal for watering camellias. If rain water runs out, tap water is satisfactory for a month or two in summer.

Feeding

Feed camellias with acidic fertilisers, such as Chempak Ericaceous, Miracle-gro Ericaceous, sulphate of ammonia or sulphate of potash. Controlled release fertiliser pellets are available from Miracid and Phostrogen to mix into the potting compost of container-grown plants, avoiding the need for further feeding until the following season.

You can use organic fertilisers, including fish, blood and bone and seaweed products.

o I may not be great at writing witty verse in cards, but that won't stop me trying as Valentine's Day is just around the corner, so this month I'll be writing with love in my heart and alcohol in my bloodstream! I've got something for everyone this month – Champagne, Rose, Red and Lager so let's get on with it.

Laurent-Perrier Cuvee Rose Brut NV (75c1, £57.99) is exquisite. It is made purely from Pinot Noir grapes which give it wonderful redcurrant and raspberry flavours along with touches of buttery brioche. This would go great with strawberry based desserts or try it as an aperitif.

For me, Cabernet Sauvignon makes the best Rose's. It's depth of fruit flavour transfers across so well, and the **Zalze Cabernet/ Shiraz Rose** (75cl, £7.99) is a great example of that. It's medium dry so it's not too sickly sweet and it has masses of cherry and plum character. Great if you're having garlic and chilli prawns as a starter as the touch of sweetness helps deal with the chilli. A good toothpaste will help with the garlic breath.

If you're better half or potential better half doesn't like sweetness in their wines then **Coquille d'Oc Rose** (75cl, £7.49) is the one to go for. It is exclusive to Waitrose and isn't that easy to come by as it's a limited edition. Vibrant strawberry colour fills the glass and aromas of raspberry, pear and fresh citrus fill the air.

That's enough of the soft and gentle wines, time for one with a bit more punch. Waitrose St Hallett Barossa Shiraz (75cl, £10.99) carries much weight and depth of flavour. It's easy drinking but crammed full of fruit, namely blackcurrant and plum. But it doesn't stop there. You can also pick up strong dark chocolate which gives it a touch of bitterness and some coffee notes too. A great bottle of wine, which keeps on getting better and better.

Finally I've chosen a beer. But not any old beer no, this one is made by Ferran Adria, a three Michelin starred chef from the famous elBulli restaurant in Catalonia. **Estrella Damm Inedit** (75cl, £5.29) isn't your typical beer. It has so much depth of flavour and is very aromatic. It is creamy and silky smooth to taste and on the palate you can pick up orange peel and coriander as well as a yeasty character. A truly great bottle of beer and one saved for a special occasion.

These conditions can often be prevented, even for people who have a family history of them.

The checks will be carried out by trained fitness professionals in a private consultation room. They are aimed at anyone who hasn't had a NHS health check in the past five years and take around 20 to 30 minutes.

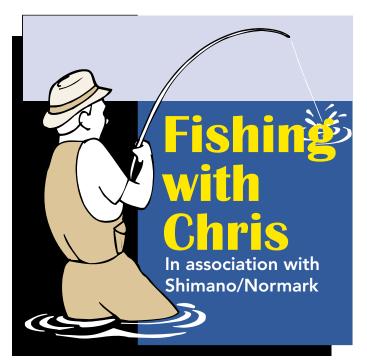
They include a simple test to check cholesterol levels, a blood pressure check, and a calculation of body mass index (BMI).

The winner was fishing near the rope on a bomb with a floating piece of artificial corn tipped with a real piece of corn, plus to make it more of an intense corn flavour he soaked his corn in dynamite corn flavouring. He used an 8lb main line to a 6lb hook

length with a size 14 PR36 hair rig hook. That is good winter Carping.

Talking of open matches , Robbo is currently running a weekly Saturday match at Risby Park. It costs £15 all in and the draw is at 8.15am at the café. To book on a match call Neil, (Robbo), on 07834275278. He tends to alternate the matches between Folly and Tench Pond. Good weights are always on the cards here, give it a go you never know you just might win a good pay out. Good luck.

Here is one for you nearly all the recent matches have been won on either the waggler or the bomb. The feeder or the pole are not producing as many fish. I personally think the pole might not be producing as much because of the water clarity in most venues. The pole must be putting a large overhead moving shadow on the water. As for the feeder not working as much as the bomb I can only put this down to people putting too much feed down too quickly, were as a lot of people that I have spoken to whom have fished the bomb successfully have been fishing with baits like a single piece of hair rigged corn or 8mm bright boilie. Don't get me wrong these tactics don't work all the time. But if you stick it out when the fishing is extremely hard you tend to pick up better quality of fish with this method. Give it a try you may be surprised.

Sea scene: well where do I start, if I tell you there are fish coming out all over the coast on nearly every tide, you are probably going to think I am kidding, well I'm not!

Firstly if you have access to the internet go log onto the Holderness Forum or any of the East coast match scene sites and they will confirm what I am telling you. There has been fish caught over the last two weeks to 20lb with many weighing 6 – 10lb. There has even been Thornback Rays being caught all over the coast. At the moment the key spots seem to be Mappleton, Aldbrough - Runnels, Dimlington, Cowden, East Newton and Lagoons near Spurn.

As I have just mentioned Spurn I am sorry to report that the road is still closed and I don't know if this is just a rumour or what but the word is it might not be getting repaired. That is going to be a real shame.

As far as baits go I cannot say any particular bait is doing better than another because the reports I am receiving in here on a daily basis is that different baits are being used at different venues.

Before I forget, the Brid wall challenge between Eric the Viking and Captain Pugwash is after a long Christmas break 6-5 to Captain Pugwash. Eric the Viking is clawing his way back, slowly.

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Chinese New Year The Year of the Horse begins on February 4th

bout a week before Lunar New Year, traditional families will be busy preparing the religious ceremony performed with tributes and offerings in honour of Heaven (Tien Shen) and Earth (Ti Tu), and of the various deities of the household together with family ancestors. One of the most well know deities is the Kitchen God who resides over the stove and is said to keep an eye on the interactions of the household, making an annual report on what the family has done in the past year to the Jade Emperor in Heaven around about a week before Chinese New Year Day. Rites and offerings are made to the Kitchen God (Zhou Khun) on this day with hopes that he will speak well of the deeds of the family.

Traditionally, the run up to the celebration of Chinese New Year is the 'Reunion Dinner'. An extravagant banquet is laid out to mark the onset of the New Year where young and old gather for a reunion dinner to symbolise family unity. Family members try to get home from different places before or on New Year's Eve to celebrate this special occasion in the family home. Married daughters will traditionally spend their reunion dinner in the husband's family home.

This is a family banquet that is full of special dishes and delicacies artistically named with auspicious symbolic meanings. The dinner will start with a prayer of tribute and offerings to the ancestors and deities at the family altar. It is a very colourful and lively affair when every light is supposed to be kept on in the house throughout the whole night.

Some of the dishes that are laid on the banquet table have superstitious attributes such as: Ginkgo nuts; these represent gold ingots and are full of auspicious luck for fertility. Black moss seaweed is a symbolic food of prosperity. This is also true in the case of a whole chicken which is a desirable addition to the feast. Dried bean curd is placed on the banquet table to symbolise happiness and luck. Lotus seed is seen as another fertility symbol and signifies having many offspring. Nian Gao is a traditional sweet steamed glutinous rice pudding, when you eat this dish you will aid growth and abundance.

When you translate bamboo shoots into Chinese, the words sound similar to the Chinese for "hoping that all turns out for the best". A whole fish with its head and tail intact will represent togetherness.

Reunion Dinner

The Reunion Dinner is a very busy event. The women buzz around the kitchen with the dinner preparation whilst the men either watch TV or (guess what?) play mah-jong. Mah-jong is an extremely important part of Chinese culture and is played by men and women alike, often in halls exclusively dedicated

Mah-jong is linked with gambling with huge sums of money being won and lost by the players. An excellent memory is required to remember which tiles have been laid down and which remain. Once a certain point in a hand has been passed, you need to pay special attention as if you are the one to put down the tile that enables another player to win that hand, you not only have to pay your own losses on the hand but those of the other two losing players as well. This can mean serious amounts of money.

Children are bathed and dressed in their new pyjamas and promised the arrival of "Tsai Shen Yeh" (Chai Shen Yeh) (the Wealth God). Whilst they sleep; the parents will slip an ang pow (a red envelope with money) under their pillow signifying a visit from 'Chai Shen Yeh'. Children can also expect to receive red envelopes from uncles and aunts, with the amount that is given, being dictated by the closeness of the family relationship and also the age of the child. Older children can usually expect to receive more than younger ones. Someone who has a large family and who has taken a hammering on the mah-jong tables is in for trouble!

At midnight, at the turn of the old and New Year, people let off fire-crackers which serve to scare away the evil spirits and old qi of the past year and to greet the arrival of the New Year.

New Years Day itself, starts with you, in your finest and newest clothes, with the exchange of good wishes amongst the family. Married couples present the young ones, children and unmarried adults alike with a Hung-Bao. In Chinese culture, instead of giving a wrapped up present as we do at Christmas in the UK, it is customary to give this red envelope containing money. The amount of money contained in the envelope has to be in even numbers. Even numbers are auspicious unless it is a single Chinese i-ching coin on its own. It is amazing how much a person can accumulate in a single day.

The day continues with visits to relatives. The visiting rota has its unspoken hierarchy arrangement. The oldest get to sit at home and wait for the younger relatives to visit them to exchange good wishes to each other. This is a very exciting time for the children because nearly every 'Kung Xee Fa Chai' (it means Congratulations and May you be Prosperous) they recite, they get an ang pow (red envelope containing money) for it.

The second day of Chinese New Year is named 'Kai Nien' meaning "Year Beginning" which starts with a very early morning breakfast. Special dishes with symbolic names will be served. The special dish of this day is long noodles which are served with everyone competing to toss the noodles as high as possible with their chopsticks. The tossing of noodles is a



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symbolic activity done to promote longevity. This means that, unless you are unable to do so, you stand up and raise your arms full stretch in the air holding the noodles aloft. In order to get extra lift off, some people use super long chopsticks and stand on chairs so you should probably make sure the ceiling fan is turned off.

Unlike in the west, Chinese New Year is not a time for drinking a lot of alcohol. In fact, alcohol is generally not drunk as people save space for themselves to drink enormous amounts of Chinese tea. Some people will have a Chinese wine with their meal but, particularly as the emphasis is so much on the family nature of the celebrations, nobody goes over the top.

Two days of over eating and general fun and games are induldged in quite a lot as the Chinese do not hold back on these occasions. The Chinese relationship with food is close all the year, but at no time more than at New Year. Many dishes have particular significance, especially at this time. Even everyday dishes like fish and turnips have special meanings and none more so than fish balls and meat balls both of which suggest reunion, which is a most important element at this time. However, after two days of festivities and fun, even the Chinese can have enough and recognise that energy levels need to be restored. The third day is therefore a day of calm. Traditionally, it is not a day for risks or adventure. The young ones will venture out to see friends but it is a quiet day. In China no offices or businesses will be open on this day.

Normal procedures return with businesses as usual on the fourth day. Many businesses will choose a specific day to start business with the assistance of their Feng Shui Practitioner and initiate the new trading year with a spectacular display of Lion Dance and fire crackers. It is a very noisy and exciting event.

Greetings and an air of festivity remain for another eleven days through to the full moon of the first lunar month when another celebration follows but this time it is to mark the closing of the Spring Festival. Day 15 is also called the 'Spring Lantern Festival' (Yuan Xiao Jie). This wonderfully romantic celebration takes place under a full moon on the fifteenth day of the first lunar month of the year.

On this day, the old and young carry a colourful lantern and gather in a neighbouring public place. They gather to admire and appreciate the first full moon of the year (very similar to the Mid Autumn Festival). In China, there are still villages that hold a big Tang Yuan (rice dumplings) cooking and eating session. The dumplings are round and symbolise family unity and completeness. The mid-month Lantern Festival traditionally brings the seasonal passage of the New Year to a conclusion.

Food has played a major role in Chinese New Year celebrations for centuries, and "lucky" foods are traditionally served throughout the two week Chinese New Year celebration, known as the Spring Festival - the most important festival in China when families come together to celebrate in as grand a style as they can afford.

The Chinese belief that different foods symbolize good things in different ways manifests in various forms.

Chinese Good Luck Foods for the New Year

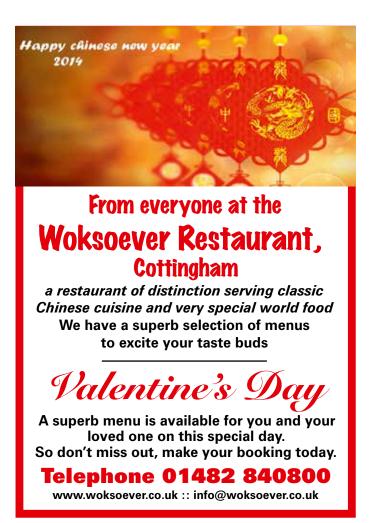
The quantity of food prepared signifies prosperity and wealth of the household and there is an old custom of serving a platter which is made up of five meats or five vegetables, referred to as "the five blessings of the new year" representing longevity, peace, righteousness, wealth and wisdom.

Individual foods and recipes also have specific meanings and are widely served during the Spring festival. Examples include, Chinese dumplings which have the appearance of the old Chinese silver ingots (the legend is that the more dumplings you eat, the more money you will make in the coming year); spring rolls which resemble gold bars; and noodles which represent long life.

But it's not just the appearance of the food which counts. Sometimes the name of the foods served are the significant factor.

For instance the Chinese word for fish sounds like the words "wish" and "abundance" which has led to the tradition of serving a whole fish (head and tail in tact) thus ensuring good fortune from the beginning to the end of the new year; the name Nian Gao (a glutinous rice cake) sounds like "getting higher year by year" the Chinese believing the higher you are, the better off you are; the name for turnips also means "good luck"; the word for lettuce in Cantonese sounds like "rising fortune" so it is very common to serve foods in a lettuce wrap especially if it's another lucky food; and tangerines and oranges are both given and eaten as their names sound like "gold" and "wealth". Another favourite is Sweet and Sour pork as the Cantonese word for sour sounds like the word for grandchildren, so serving this dish will help ensure the continuance of the family.

know it's a bit late but we hope you all had a great Xmas and New Year and that you have all managed to keep to Lyour new year resolutions. I have to admit that I haven't. After over indulging during the festive period, I was going to try and have a dry January and not touch alcohol for 4 weeks. I thought I had done well when I reached 4 days!!!! Needless to say it was harder than I thought, although I have cut down from Christmas consumption and now only have a couple of glasses of wine with my evening meal...instead of the whole bottle.

We already have some bookings for this year but the season is a long one and you are more or less guaranteed some sunshine from the beginning of May until the end of October. So if you fancy trying the real Spain instead of the coast, give us a try.

Talking of the weather, it has really turned here since New Year. December was quite a nice month and we spent most days doing bits in the garden or just enjoying the afternoon sunshine on the patio with a cup of coffee. Christmas day was very wet with heavy rain for the whole day which caused a few leaks in the casita which have now been sorted. Thankfully we didn't have anyone staying in there. Between Boxing day and the start of January the weather was ok, but since then it has been a lot cooler and a lot wetter and the weather forecast is that the wet weather is going to last till the start of February. Its nothing like the rain that parts of the UK have been having and we do get the odd day of warmer weather interspersed between the wet days. All I can say is roll on the sunshine

The wet weather has been playing havoc with the olive harvest because when it rains they cant pick because the ground in the olive groves is far too wet. So far they are three weeks behind and ours will not be picked until the first week in February at the earliest. Antonio, the guy who organises





the pick, called up to tell me all this but did say that my crop was a lot bigger than last year and not to worry about a late pick. The harvest season does last until the end of March anyway so I am not worried. Despite an anticipated increase in the price per kilo, having talked to those who have had their crop picked, it hasn't materialised so depending on the quality we should be about the same price as last year

Because New Year is not celebrated in non tourist Spain like it is in the UK, Rita and I decided to go to the coast for 3 days to see if it would be a bit more lively. We took Rita's sister Pat and had a nice time in Calahonda and managed to have a couple of decent meals but despite it been a Brit area most of the bars and restaurants were closed until the end of February. On New Years day we visited Benalmadena and the weather was glorious. The place was quite busy with people enjoying the sun and even on the beach and in the sea.

It was 12th night in the village, which here in Spain is the big one and is celebrated more than Christmas day, so I took the grandchildren up to the village for the procession. Fortunately it was a dry evening and they enjoyed catching sweets as they were thrown into the crowds from the back of the float.

The next big job for us over here is painting the outside of the house. It hasn't been done for about 4 years and badly needs doing. We have bought all the equipment and are now waiting for the weather to change and warm up.

I think it will be a job for April. Then its reseeding the lawn and trying to keep that going unlike last year when it all just died off despite me watering it every day. Then its getting the pool cleaned and bar area painted and set up ready for any guests. Hopefully all the work will be done by the end of April but you never know what might happen.

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New Council Tax discount on annexes from 1st April 2014

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council is reminding residents that a new Council Tax discount is being introduced by the Government from 1 April 2014. It will be applicable to people living in a property with annexes. The annexe must either be in use by a resident of the property, or occupied by a relative of the person who pays Council Tax on the property with the annexe.

The discount will apply where the annexe has been separately banded and is classed as a separate dwelling. The Council Tax payer will know if the property has been classed as a separate dwelling, because they will have a Council Tax bill for it.

The discount will reduce the amount of Council Tax payable on the annexe by 50%.

To obtain the discount, the council requires the Council Tax payer to apply for it. Any East Riding Council Tax payer who thinks they may qualify for this discount should contact the Council Tax section as soon as possible, either by email at council.tax@ eastriding.gov.uk or by telephone on 01482 394747.

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News from the KGV Cottingham Sports Centre

That's in a name? KGV Pavilion, the Rec, the park. It's all the same; that green building with sports fields and a play area on Northgate. The land was King George V's memorial of space for sports, managed through local councils. The building is now run by Cottingham KGV Community Trust, been re-named Cottingham Sports Centre, and is 'home' to several sports clubs, most visibly East Riding Rangers football club and those runners in pink Fit-Mums & Friends.

The Trustees and staff work hard to make the Centre self-financing, and to that end there are some new items on the weekly programme, such as Tumble 'n' Twist in 3 pre-school age-ranges, and Ballroom Dancing for older customers. Thanks







to a big grant from Sport England, and smaller grants from the Parish Council and others, plus lots of volunteer time, the new football changing rooms will soon be ready to use, freeing up space at weekends for more birthday parties and other bookings.

On the roadside we're getting a new signage, to help people find the venue, and to advertise special events. The Friends of KGV organise a popular programme of activities such the Easter Egg Hunt, Summer Family Fun Day, Halloween Ghost Walk (especially scary thanks to our 'zombies' in the woods!) and Christmas Party. These fun, low-cost entertainments raise vital cash for specific projects as well as providing a good time for all. For example, following the tragic death of a football spectator, the Friends matched money from a grant to buy a defibrillator, which is now in the Sports Centre with our first-aid trained staff.

We also thank everyone who helped us to gain a £3,000 Lloyds Bank community grant to help improve security in the park, which again has been boosted by cash raised by the Friends. The next events will be the Easter Egg Hunt on Easter Sunday and Sports Relief on 23rd March.

The KGV fields are a combined public park and sports field, a situation that brings occasional clashes and misunderstandings, usually between dog-walkers and sports-players. Most people are thoughtful and considerate, but sometimes problems can arise from ignorance of each other's position. The Millbeck Wildlife Field (a.k.a. The Old Rec.) is the best place for dogs to run free as no sports are played here, but please make sure your domesticated wolf has calmed down fully before walking back. We've had reports of normally placid dogs following their hunting instincts when they see people running on the sports field, or scent-marking where they shouldn't. Dogs will be dogs, and are always welcome at KGV, but it's up to us humans to anticipate their behaviour and keep it sociable.

And finally, the Queen's Diamond Jubilee tree has been planted, again! The Sandringham oak was officially planted in 2012, along with 200 other saplings as part of the Jubilee celebrations. The special tree was so small that we feared for its safety, so it has spent the last two years growing bigger and stronger in a sheltered garden, but it is now back at KGV behind special railings with a commemorative plaque. Younger residents should have the joy of seeing it grow into a mighty oak over the coming decades.

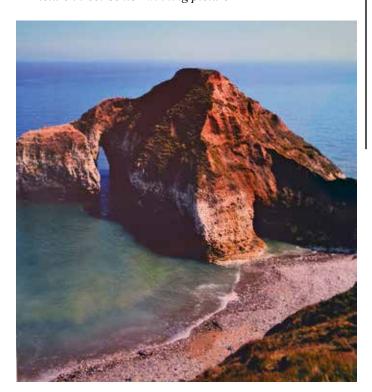
