Welcome to our section of the Newsletter that keeps our residents updated with some of the projects that the Parish Councillors are presently involved with:

#### • Memorial Gardens

We are currently negotiating with the East Riding of Yorkshire Council to take ownership of the Memorial Gardens in Cottingham from 1 April 2016. The land for the Memorial Gardens was donated to the people of Cottingham via the Cottingham Urban District Council in 1919. On the demise of the CUDC, this ownership passed to the Haltemprice District Council, then to Beverley Borough Council and finally to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council. It will therefore be appropriate that these gardens will, once again, be owned and looked after by the people of Cottingham, via Cottingham Parish Council.

#### • Neighbourhood Plan

We are very proud that our Parish Council is one of the first Parish Councils to introduce a Neighbourhood Plan. This follows an extensive consultation process with all our residents. The plan has been submitted to the Inspector and we are waiting approval. This will give the Parish Council more influence on any building works and planning applications within the village and hopefully gives an indication of what the residents of Cottingham would like the village to look like. Further information will follow when we have been notified of the decision.

#### • Pedestrianisation of Hallgate/King Street

A working party, including two of our Councillors, are working with other parties to look at the demand and feasibility of pedestrianising part or all of Hallgate and King Street, with further consultations to take place.

#### • High Street Funding

We have been successful in securing £5000 funding for improving our High Street and we are liaising with traders to improve their shop frontages with matched funding up to 50% contribution. This will have a positive impact for all our residents and visitors to the village.

#### • Salt Bags distribution

Salt bags have been delivered to the traders of Cottingham in preparation for the bad weather. This scheme is paid for by the Parish Council and we have extended it this year to include the churches in the village. Hopefully this will ensure that, should snow and ice arrive (hopefully not), then our village will remain open and as safe as possible.

#### • Cottingham Day – 2 July 2016

Preparations are underway for our annual Cottingham Day which will be held on Saturday 2 July 2016. This event is very popular with residents and visitors but takes a considerable amount of time and effort to organise. If you would like to be part of this fun community event, then please contact the Parish Council Office to register your support. All offers of help will be gratefully received.

#### Drainage Working Group

Since the flooding in 2007/2008, a working group of Parish Councillors have worked hard to highlight the issues of flooding in the village and seek improvements to the drainage and the Becks that surround the village. Regular meetings have taken place with Yorkshire Water, the Environment Agency and East Riding of Yorkshire Council to discuss these issues in detail and ensuring that there are clear plans in place to improve the drainage system around the village.

One of the causes of the flooding is the installation of combined water systems that were installed in 1960's to 1980s. These systems

allowed developers to direct surface water into the foul sewer, a process that is no longer allowed. The other main cause is the cleaning and monitoring of the Becks that surround the village.

Positive steps have already been taken with the installation of the Eppleworth Road Attenuation Scheme and applications have been made and we are awaiting confirmation of funding for the Cottingham Orchard Park Flood Attenuation Scheme. Both of these schemes will hopefully have an impact on the village.

The continuation of this group will ensure that all parties work together and that the issues of Cottingham and flooding remains high on the Agenda, with further improvements being sought. If you wish to find out more information regarding our work on Cottingham's flood prevention work, please visit our website or call into the Parish Council Offices for a hard copy of the full article.

#### Working with the Community

Our Parish Councillors will continue to work hard on behalf of the residents of Cottingham and it is important to note that Councillors are not paid for the duties that they carry out on behalf of the Parish Council, but are residents of the Parish who are dedicated and committed to supporting and improving our village. If, therefore, you have any concerns or issues that would you like to discuss further, please call into the Parish Council Office or contact one of our Councillors. The contact details are displayed on our website (<a href="www.cottinghamparishcouncil.org.uk">www.cottinghamparishcouncil.org.uk</a>) or in the noticeboards around the village Alternatively, you can ring on 01482 847623 or call into our Office which is open on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 11.00am to 3.00pm and located on the Market Green, in the white cottages.

You are welcome to attend any of our Parish Council meetings, which occur every third Thursday in the month, except August and December, at 7.30pm in the Parish Council Offices. The Agenda for meetings, along with any other Parish Council meetings, are posted in Cottingham Library, Customer Services and the Parish Council Offices. A copy is also put on our website for your information. (www.cottinghamparishcouncil.org.uk).

#### How are vacancies filled on the Parish Council?

A Councillor's Term of Office is four years and they are elected by the electorate of Cottingham. If a Councillor vacancy becomes available within this four year Term of Office, then there are two methods of recruitment. The first method is for expressions of interest to be obtained from any resident of Cottingham and submitted to the Parish Council Office. The candidates are then interviewed and the most suitable candidate appointed. This process of election means that the Parish Council does not incur any expenditure, except minimum advertising costs.

The second option is followed where ten of the electorates write to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council and a request made that an election takes place. When this is requested the Parish Council plays no part in the election process of the new Councillor. This explains why, during the recent election that took place in the Croxby Ward, the Parish Council could not offer any information regarding the candidates that were standing, nor assist with the election process.

The Parish Council obviously incurs a cost when this process is followed as the East Riding of Yorkshire Council charge the Parish Council for their administration. In the future, if a vacancy arises and you are interested in becoming a Councillor, please call into the Parish Council Offices where we can talk you through the process you need to follow.

#### **GET WHAT YOU'RE OWED**

After the recent festivities, it is fair to say that most of us are trying to tighten our belts in more ways than one! New Year is a good time to focus on starting afresh and getting things in order; this can be especially so with our finances. Many businesses or individuals find themselves owed debts and it can be worse at this time of year. However, this should not put you off trying to do something about it.

#### Help is at Hand

Our Debt Department can take over the worry for you. By sending a letter to the debtor this can in itself be enough to trigger payment. If this does not have the desired effect, then court action would need to be considered.

#### What if the debtor has disappeared?

Quite often people are put off chasing a debt because the debtor may have left their address and they are not sure where they are now.

Our Debt Department works in conjunction with the High

Court Enforcement Team and they can offer a detailed trace for a small fee.

Once a positive trace has been found, we can then continue down the normal channels of collecting the debt on your behalf.

#### Can a payment plan be arranged?

Yes, this can be done before issuing court proceedings. We can discuss the matter with both the creditor and debtor and try and reach an agreement for the debtor to pay a set monthly amount or maybe two or three instalments, depending on the size of the debt. If the debtor subsequently defaults, then again we can look at taking further steps for recovery.

#### 10 things about Windows 10 - time to upgrade?

7 indows 10 – Yes its 6 months since launch already. I know that many of my readers have been holding off upgrading following my previous advice, but things have improved recently so it's probably safe to go for it now - with a few provisos. If you are happy with Windows 7 or 8.1 and don't like change, then it's up to you, but there's not much to dislike, and you have until July to finally decide. If your printer is a good few years old, then consider you may have to buy a new one. Eset users should check their program version number, and upgrade to the latest version 9 before you start. Go to www.eset.co.uk and click Downloads and Home Versions and download and run the Live installer for your version (either Nod32 or Smart Security). For other security programs, check with the provider. Should you have a version of Microsoft Office earlier than 2007 (or the free 2010 Starter Edition) then be ready to buy the new version. Although it is very rare for data to be lost or seriously affected, consider doing a back-up. Having considered all that here we

#### 10 things about Windows 10.

- 1) Upgrading The upgrade is free until July this year (and the offer more persistent!), but the process has been streamlined recently. You click on the blue icon in the corner of the screen and agree to download (the initial download could take up to a few hours so don't hold your breath!). Once ready then click to install, and follow the instructions. Your computer will restart several times during the process.
- 2) **Password** Once the computer has restarted and welcomes you to Windows 10 you are invited to enter a password. If you **didn't** have one before you can click Skip this. If you do create one, make sure you memorise it or write it down safely because you won't get in without it!



- On the Personalization page you can switch off options that would send data to Microsoft. If you have already missed this, you can find it in Settings on the Start Menu.

  4) Start Menu Speaking of that, welcome back! (if you were on Windows 8 previously). The Tiles that are attached to the side
- 4) **Start Menu** Speaking of that, welcome back! (if you were on Windows 8 previously). The Tiles that are attached to the side of the menu can be moved or removed. Just click and drag to re-arrange, or right click and 'remove from start menu' for many others. Don't worry if you remove by mistake as they are only shortcuts, you will probably find them all on the All Apps list (used to be All Programs)

3) Security & Privacy settings - In the next step you will be

presented with a few pages of options. When it gets to Privacy,

don't just go Next, look to the bottom left and click Customize.

- 5) **Email** This is where a lot of people have had a problem. If you used a Microsoft account (your email address is Hotmail or Live or Outlook.com) then your email will be shown on the blue Mail tab at the top of the Start Menu Tiles when you are signed in. If you have Karoo email and previously used the program Windows Live Mail, you should find that on the Start Menu, All Apps.
- 6) **Removed Applications** If you see this folder on your new Desktop, have a look at the list and see if there are any programs you need that have been removed due to incompatibility. One prime example is the **free** Office 2010 **Starter Edition**, which I have previously mentioned does not work. The normal paid-for 2010 version is fine.
- 7) **Printers** Right click on the Start Button and click Control Panel and Devices & Printers and see of your printer is shown in there, right click to check it is ticked as default printer, then try printing. There will be other 'virtual printers' in there like Fax etc., which can be removed if you wish, just by right click and remove device.
- 8) *Edge vs Internet Explorer* You will see a familiar blue e icon that now launches Microsoft's new internet browser called Edge. This is not to everyone's taste, so if you prefer Internet Explorer 11, or Chrome or Firefox, then go to Settings and Default Apps and choose your favourite one.
- 9) *Cortana* and search *Cortana* is the new voice search and help assistant. Located next to the Start Button 'Ask me anything', you need to answer a few details about yourself before using *Cortana*. You can then click on the microphone icon and ask a question and she will answer or launch programs, or even tell you a joke when requested, like: 'I told the doctor I broke my arm in two places, he told me not go into those places'
- 10) **Revert** Finally, if you decide you don't like Windows 10, or you have lost your programs or printers etc., you can revert within one month, by going to Settings and Update & Recovery.

If you go for the upgrade I hope it all goes smoothly, but if not, or you don't feel happy doing this yourself, then you know who to call – numbers shown below!



# In the Kitchen



## Soy and Honey Duck Breasts with Spiced Red Cabbage

Preparation time: 15 minutes
Cooking time: 90 minutes
Total time: 1 hour 45 minutes

• Serves: 4

#### **Ingredients**

1 tbsp sunflower oil

1 small onion, finely sliced

1 tsp ground coriander

½ tsp ground cinnamon

1 small red cabbage, finely shredded

25g Waitrose Wholesome Dried Apple

4 tbsp cider vinegar

2 tbsp soy sauce

2 tbsp Waitrose Acacia Honey

½ tsp Chinese five spice powder

4 Waitrose British Free Range Duck Breast Fillets

#### Method

1. Heat the oil in a large heavy pan, add the onion and cook for three minutes until softened. Stir in the coriander and cinnamon and cook for another minute. Add the shredded cabbage and stir to coat in the spices, then stir in the apple, vinegar and 4 tbsp cold water. Season and bring to the boil then cover and simmer very gently for  $1-1\frac{1}{2}$  hours, stirring occasionally, until really tender and the liquid has evaporated.

2. While the cabbage is cooking, preheat the oven to 190°C, gas mark 5. Mix the soy sauce, honey and five spice powder and brush over the duck breasts, reserving ½ of the sauce. Place on a wire rack in a roasting tin and cook for 40–45 minutes until the skin is crisp and golden and the meat is thoroughly cooked through. Leave to rest for 5 minutes. Stir the remaining sauce into the cabbage and return to the heat for a couple of minutes. Serve the duck on plates on top of the red cabbage.

### Sweet and Sour Pork with Noodles and Sesame Seeds

Celebrate Chinese New Year with this quick stir-fry dish, which cooks in just 10 minutes. Serves: 2

#### **Ingredients**

1 bunch salad onions, washed and trimmed

3 tsp oil

300g pack Waitrose British Pork Stir Fry

2.5cm piece fresh root ginger, peeled and cut into thin strips (optional)

150g pack trimmed mangetout peas, halved lengthways

350g jar Waitrose Perfectly Balanced Sweet and Sour Sauce

2 tsp sesame seeds

300g pack Waitrose Egg Noodles Fresh To Wok

#### Method

1. First prepare the salad onions. Cut each one into 4 lengthways, then into long thin strips. Heat 2 teaspoons of the oil in a large wok or nonstick frying pan until very hot, then add the pork and ginger (if using) and cook over a high heat for 3-4 minutes until lightly browned, stirring often. Add half the prepared salad onions with half the mangetout and stir-fry for 2-3 minutes.

2. Pour over the sweet and sour sauce, stir well, then bring to the boil and simmer for 2-3 minutes, or until the pork is thoroughly cooked through.

3. Meanwhile, place the sesame seeds in a small frying pan and lightly toast over a medium heat for 30 seconds to 1 minute, stirring all the time. Remove from the pan.

4. Heat the remaining oil in the frying pan. Add the rest of the mangetout and salad onions (reserving a few strips to garnish) and stir-fry for 1-2 minutes. Add the noodles and continue to stir-fry for 2-3 minutes until piping hot. Carefully combine with the pork mixture, sprinkle with the sesame seeds and garnish with the reserved salad onion. Divide between 2 plates to serve.

#### Easy salmon fishcakes

Preparation time: 20 minutes
Cooking time: 30 minutes
Total time: 50 minutes. Serves: 4

#### **Ingredients**

500g floury potatoes such as King Edward or Maris Piper, peeled and cut into cubes

300g salmon fillet

4 salad onions, trimmed and sliced

1 tbsp creamed horseradish sauce

2 tbsp chopped fresh parsley

2 tbsp plain flour

2 medium Waitrose British Blacktail Free Range Eggs, beaten

60g Cooks' Ingredients Breadcrumbs

Sunflower or olive oil spray

#### Method

- 1. Place the potatoes in a large pan, cover with water, bring to the boil and simmer for 10-12 minutes until tender. Drain very well and mash until smooth, then tip into a large bowl.
- 2. Meanwhile, place the salmon in a small frying pan and cover with boiling water. Simmer gently for 5 minutes until cooked through. Drain and discard the water, then break into large flakes, discarding the skin.
- 3. Preheat the oven to 200°C, gas mark 6. Stir together the mash, salad onions, horseradish and parsley. Fold in the flaked fish, then season. Shape the mixture into 8 even-sized cakes the mixture will still be warm, so leave to cool a little if necessary.
- 4. Dust the cakes in flour. Place the egg and breadcrumbs in separate bowls. Dip each cake first in the egg and then in the breadcrumbs, making sure they are evenly coated. Transfer the fishcakes to a large non-stick baking sheet and spray lightly with oil. Bake for 20 minutes until crisp and golden brown. Serve with peas.

#### Rhubarb and ginger cheesecake

• Preparation time: 20 minutes

• Cooking time: 60 minutes, plus chilling

• Total time: 1 hour 20 minutes . Serves: 10

#### **Ingredients**

150g gingernut biscuits

75g unsalted butter, melted and cooled

500g curd cheese

200g cream cheese

150g caster sugar

2 eggs, lightly beaten

1 x ½ tsp vanilla extract

1 x ½ lemon, zest and juice

170g soured cream

75g granulated sugar

400g rhubarb, cut into 3cm lengths

1 piece stem ginger in syrup, finely chopped, plus 2 tbsp syrup.

#### Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 150°C, gas mark 2 and line the base of a 20cm spring-form cake tin with baking parchment. Place the ginger biscuits in a freezer bag, seal and bash with a rolling pin until crushed. Tip into a bowl and mix with the butter. Press into the base of the tin; set aside to chill.
- 2. Beat together the curd and cream cheeses, caster sugar, eggs, vanilla and lemon juice until smooth and creamy. Tip into the cake tin and bake for 1 hour until the cheesecake just wobbles in the centre.
- 3. Turn off the oven and leave the door ajar, allowing the cheesecake to cool in the oven for 30 minutes. Remove from the oven and spread the soured cream over the top. Once cooled completely, chill for at least 4 hours or, ideally, overnight.
- 4. To make the rhubarb topping, put the granulated sugar in a pan with 2 tbsp water. Place over a low heat and allow the sugar to dissolve (stirring occasionally and gently). Add the rhubarb, lemon zest, stem ginger and syrup, bring to the boil, then simmer, covered for 3 minutes. Turn off the heat, uncover and leave to cool completely. Strain through a sieve set over a pan; reserve the rhubarb. Simmer the juice until reduced by half, then pour over the rhubarb and chill until ready to serve.
- 5. Serve slices of the cheesecake with the rhubarb and syrup on the side.



Vet Nuno Neves said: "Ironically, the case involved a dog owned by one of our own vet nurses. We also know of another confirmed case in Pocklington and we are concerned that more cases may come to light."





"Before we had the confirmed cases we advised owners to worm their dogs every three months with a recommended product. This was fine for parasites such as roundworm and tape worm but with lungworm now in our area we are recommending increasing this to monthly worming. This is because the lungworm larvae takes 40 to 50 days to develop," he added.

Shannon Wiles, a vet nurse at Kingston Vets Park Street Surgery, is the owner of Lily, an English Bull Terrier that has now recovered after contracting lungworm.

Shannon said: "Lily developed a dry tickly cough and was very wheezy, particularly when she was exercising. She was given antibiotics for a week that seemed to help but within a day of stopping the medication the cough returned. She then had a chest x-ray that showed large patches on her lungs. Samples of fluid from her lungs were also taken and the results came back as lungworm."

"Thankfully Lily's lungworm was caught early. We gave her wormer on a daily basis for almost a month and this got rid of the lungworm and cleared the patches on her lungs," she added.

Lungworm is a parasite that dogs pick up by taking in the larvae or by licking or eating slugs and snails. Once hatched, the worms live in the intestine and migrate to the heart and lungs, causing breathing problems and abnormal bleeding. Left untreated, lungworm can result in death.

#### More Blasts from the Past

#### **Imaginative, Creative and Ingenious**

Last time I delved back in time a bit to see how the problem of missing teeth was tackled way back when. We mainly looked at replacing missing teeth with implantations of different sorts. Some were very imaginative, creative and ingenious and sometimes a bit mad.

#### A Bridge Too Far?

Dental bridges are not new, not by a long way. There have been bridges discovered dating back to the fourth or fifth century B.C. One such bridge was found in Sidon, chief city of ancient Phoenicia. The Phoenicians were a people





contemporary with the ancient Egyptians and Hebrews and lived in what is now modern-day Lebanon.

The bridge had four natural human incisor teeth with two carved ivory teeth between them. These 'teeth' were bound together with gold wire. The Etruscans also were very adept in the art of dental prosthesis.

Here again there have been dental findings dating back to 500 B.C. Soft

Over the years dentures have been made out of different materials including ivory, gold, stainless steel, cobalt-chromium, vulcanised rubber and acrylic. The teeth on the denture made from ivory, natural teeth, porcelain and acrylic. The ivory that was meticulously carved came from different sources. Namely elephant, hippopotamus or walrus. Each type of ivory had its own characteristics in terms of grain and texture. There is evidence of ivory being used for dentures as far back as Roman times.

#### Would You Like Springs With That Sir?

One famous denture wearer was the American President George Washington. He was plagued by toothache and abscesses for many years and only had one tooth left by the time of his inauguration. (He doesn't look a happy chap). He had several dentures made by the best people of the time and had them made from the whole range of materials available. His last set

materials available. His last set was made by John Greenwood. The upper palate was swaged from a sheet of gold and had ivory teeth riveted to it. The lower denture was carved from a single block of ivory. The two dentures were fastened together by a steel spring! I bet that took some getting used to. I also bet





that you can't get them on the NHS. How much do you think that would cost now?

So there you go, another little jaunt back in time to dental practice of bygone eras.

## This month his destination is Burstwick

The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.


Map: EXPLORER 292

Park near the Hare & Hounds public house .(Entrance to Woolam Hill) GR TA229278. Distance 5.5 miles.

Cross the main road to walk up Pinfold Lane. At the end of the lane continue straight ahead between a wooden

fence on the left and a hedge on the right. Pass through two kissing gates into open fields and walk with the hedge on the right which eventually disappears to leave a dyke on the right.

Cross a wooden foot bridge and walk straight ahead across the next narrow field and then cross a wide foot bridge with metal hand rails. Immediately after crossing the bridge turn left and walk with a drain on the left. Continue straight ahead across three fields keeping the drain and, at times, a hedge on the left.

Eventually leave the field onto the old railway track and turn left. Follow this railway track across two roads (Station Road and Hariff Lane) which both lead back into Burstwick on the left. After crossing the second road, continue ahead for about 0.5 miles and then turn left to pass a large pond on the left. After passing the pond continue ahead and eventually walk with a wood on the left and a wire fence on the right.

At the end of this path emerge onto a surfaced track and turn left. Follow this track as it sweeps right passing another pond on the left. Pass through a barrier near Sangwins Yard and immediately turn right onto a muddy track which shortly becomes a grass track.

On reaching a junction of tracks, turn left and walk with a deep drain on the right. (East Carr Drain) At the end of this surfaced track emerge onto a road and turn left. At the "T" junction turn right and walk back to Woolam Hill.

ow that the temperature is rising and we are having slightly milder weather we can start to think about getting out into the garden again.

Make sure to keep your garden tidy so that you are ready for the arrival of the Spring weather. One job that is fun and rewarding with superior taste rewards is growing your own potatoes. Whether you have a garden, allotment or small patio or balcony there are many options for growing seed potatoes.

#### What to grow

There are dozens of different potato varieties, usually described as early, second early and main crop potatoes. These names indicate when they crop and also give you an idea of the space you'll need, how closely and when they can be planted.

You should concentrate on the earlier types if you're short of space, and it's also worth remembering that earlies are less likely to encounter pest problems as they're lifted so much earlier in the year.

Second earlies take 16 to 17 weeks to mature after planting, so you should be able to harvest them from very late June through to the start of August.

Main crops are ready 18 to 20 weeks after planting, so they can be lifted usually from July through to October. Main crops take up the most space in the garden, but they tend to be the best varieties to grow if you want some for storage.

#### What to do How to chit

Chitting simply means encouraging the seed potatoes to sprout before planting.

Start chitting from late January in warmer parts of the country or in February in cooler areas, about six weeks before you intend to plant out the potatoes.

Each seed potato has a more rounded, blunt end that has a number of 'eyes'.

Stand the tubers with the blunt end uppermost in trays or old egg boxes, with plenty of natural light.

The potatoes are ready to be planted out when the shoots are 1.5-2.5cm (0.5-1in) long.

#### How to plant

Plant your chitted potatoes when the soil has started to warm up, usually from mid-March or early April. Start by digging a trench 7.5-13cm (3-5in) deep, although the exact depth should vary according to the variety of potato you're planting.

Add a light sprinkling of fertiliser to your trench before you begin planting.

Plant early potatoes about 30cm (12in) apart with 40-50cm (16-20in) between the rows, and second earlies and main crops about 38cm (15in) apart with 75cm (30in) between the rows.

Handle your chitted tubers with care, gently setting them into

the trench with the shoots pointing upwards, being careful not to break the shoots. Cover the potatoes lightly with soil.

As soon as the shoots appear, earth up each plant by covering it with a ridge of soil so that the shoots are just buried.

You need to do this at regular intervals and by the end of the season each plant will have a small mound around it about 15cm (6in) high.

#### Harvesting

Your home-grown potatoes should be ready for lifting from June until September, depending on the varieties and the growing conditions. Earlies can be lifted and eaten as soon as they're ready.

This will be when above-ground growth is still green, and usually as soon as the flowers open.



#### 10 Jobs for this month

- Prepare vegetable seed beds, and sow some vegetables under cover
- 2. Chit potato tubers
- 3. Protect blossom on apricots, nectarines and peaches
- 4. Net fruit and vegetable crops to keep the birds off
- 5. Prune winter-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering
- 6. Divide bulbs such as snowdrops, and plant those that need planting 'in the green'
- 7. Prune Wisteria
- 8. Prune hardy evergreen hedges and renovate overgrown deciduous hedges
- 9. Prune conservatory climbers
- 0. Cut back deciduous grasses left uncut over the winter



Second and main crop varieties can be kept in the ground much longer, until September, even though above-ground growth may well be looking past its best.

Two weeks before you lift the crop, cut the growth off at ground level. This should give the skins of the potatoes sufficient time to toughen up, making them far less prone to damage from lifting and easier to store.

#### **Growing tips**

Potatoes like plenty of sun, so avoid planting them in frostprone sites, as these conditions can damage the developing foliage. If you're starting up a vegetable plot on very weedy ground or old grassland, potatoes may help swamp out weeds with their fast-growing, extensive foliage.

If you're short of space, try growing potatoes in an adequately drained container that's at least 30cm (1ft) deep and wide. Half fill the pot with multi-purpose compost or good quality, fertile garden soil, nestle two seed potatoes into the top of the compost and then top up with more compost or soil to within 2.5cm (1in) of the rim of the container.

It's particularly important that there's adequate water once the tubers have reached the size of marbles. Unless there's regular, ample rainfall, the size and quality of the crop will be reduced if you don't water your potatoes.

Seed potatoes are now in stock at Coletta & Tyson garden centre from £2.49.

#### Plant of the moment Camellia

Camellias are one of the most popular winter- and springflowering shrubs, providing a vivid splash of colour when little else is in bloom. Although they need acid soil, they are easy to grow in containers of ericaceous (acidic) potting compost.

Site and soil conditions

Camellias are woodland plants that grow best in shelter and light shade, although with careful watering they can be grown in sunny positions. They prefer free-draining conditions, with plenty of organic matter, such as leaf mould, incorporated into the soil. Being ericaceous plants, camellias require an acid soil. If your soil isn't acid then consider growing your camellia in a container.

#### Watering

Tap water, especially in hard water districts, often contains too much calcium for camellias, reducing the acidity around the

roots over time. Rain water is ideal for watering camellias. If rain water runs out, tap water is satisfactory for a month or two in summer.

#### **Feeding**

Feed camellias with acidic fertilisers, such as Chempak Ericaceous, Miracle-gro Ericaceous, sulphate of ammonia or sulphate of potash. Controlled release fertiliser pellets are available from Miracid and Phostrogen to mix into the potting compost of container-grown plants, avoiding the need for further feeding until the following season.

You can use organic fertilisers, including fish, blood and bone and seaweed products.

#### Beekeeping with Neil Gower -Neil continues his quarterly review of the calendar of a beekeeper

inter....that quiet time of deep snows and warm fires. A time of waiting for another Spring.... And as we are now in February the spring really is almost upon us, according to the Met. Office and is always a time of anticipation. During the winter I've caught up on quite a few tasks, I've cleaned out my spare hives and equipment, managed to read all the beekeeping related articles I put off earlier in the year and made my plans for the forthcoming season.

Like all livestock, honeybees suffer from a number of diseases, some of which can be caused by their very social nature; they share food, transfer nectar from mouth to mouth and live in close proximity as part of a colony which encourages the spread of spores or germs. Beekeepers can minimise the risks of disease by exercising good housekeeping and everything must be kept clean, from the bee-suits that we wear to the tools that we use when inspecting our bees as well as the hives and their surroundings. Poorly maintained equipment spreads bacteria and disease and the modern day honeybee has enough to contend with without the beekeeper adding to its plight.

Most Beekeepers follow a pest and disease management strategy, and as part of mine over the past few months I've scorched and scraped all the inside surfaces of my wooden hives with a blowtorch to kill reluctant germs; my polystyrene hives have been thoroughly scrubbed with a solution of washing soda and disinfectant and all have been

stacked in a clean, dry environment ready for the time they will be needed. My tools are cleaned during and after every inspection but the container I keep them in and any ancillary equipment receives special attention at this time of the year.

Another tool available to us as part of our strategy is the application of licensed treatments and this is particularly important in our ongoing battle against the parasitic Varroa Destructor Mite. Around December or January we would normally trickle a solution of Oxalic Acid over the bees which kills any mites present on their bodies. It is administered only when the queen has stopped laying eggs and there is no brood present in the hive. At the time of writing there was brood present in all my hives so the treatment has not been administered and I'll apply other measures against Varroa later in the season which I'll refer to in a later article.

Last year I shared with you my philosophy on changing out at least half the frames in each hive annually and those I removed in the spring have been destroyed after removing the wax for recycling. I cut out the sheets of wax from the frames and put them in a device called a solar extractor. As its name suggests this homemade insulated box with a glass roof uses the power of the sun to melt the wax at high temperature which is collected and can be used to make new sheets of beeswax foundation, candles, polish and we also use it in the making of homemade soap. As well as being ecologically sound this also helps to keep down the running costs of beekeeping.

The poor summer of 2015 resulted in a low honey harvest and I decided to leave much of the honey they had made in the hives to help feed the bees during the winter months. We test the weight of the honey in the hive by using a technique called "hefting" in which you gently lift one side of the hive off its stand and experience gives you a good indication as to whether or not the bees have enough stores.

At the end of the autumn they were still well stocked but I've been keeping a closer eye than normal on my colonies this winter as the mild temperatures in December and early January meant that they were flying out of the hives and searching for forage. Normally they would be clustered in a ball around the queen and the problem is that this activity makes them hungry and they tend to consume their food stocks much quicker.

I've been supplementing their own stocks with bakers fondant which is a sugary food that they can easily digest since mid December which is earlier than normal; and I will continue with this until the spring flowers and tree blossoms come into bloom and I can see them bringing pollen and nectar into the hives.

Springtime is an interesting period in the beekeeping calendar as activity in the hives builds up and it brings with it expectations of what might be achieved in the forthcoming season, but it also brings its own challenges. Like with gardening and many other activities the weather plays it's part so we can only hope that there will be an improvement on last year. My next article is due in the May edition when each colony should be expanding, spring flowers and fruit trees should be providing pollen and nectar and the swarming season will be upon us and I will look forward to updating you.

#### Chinese New Year The Year of the Monkey begins on February 8th

bout a week before Lunar New Year, traditional families will be busy preparing the religious ceremony performed with tributes and offerings in honour of Heaven (Tien Shen) and Earth (Ti Tu), and of the various deities of the household together with family ancestors. One of the most well know deities is the Kitchen God who resides over the stove and is said to keep an eye on the interactions of the household, making an annual report on what the family has done in the past year to the Jade Emperor in Heaven around about a week before Chinese New Year Day. Rites and offerings are made to the Kitchen God (Zhou Khun) on this day with hopes that he will speak well of the deeds of the family.

Traditionally, the run up to the celebration of Chinese New Year is the 'Reunion Dinner'. An extravagant banquet is laid out to mark the onset of the New Year where young and old gather for a reunion dinner to symbolise family unity. Family members try to get home from different places before or on New Year's Eve to celebrate this special occasion in the family home. Married daughters will traditionally spend their reunion dinner in the husband's family home.

This is a family banquet that is full of special dishes and delicacies artistically named with auspicious symbolic meanings. The dinner will start with a prayer of tribute and offerings to the ancestors and deities at the family altar. It is a very colourful and lively affair when every light is supposed to be kept on in the house throughout the whole night.

Some of the dishes that are laid on the banquet table have superstitious attributes such as: Ginkgo nuts; these represent gold ingots and are full of auspicious luck for fertility. Black moss seaweed is a symbolic food of prosperity. This is also true in the case of a whole chicken which is a desirable addition to the feast. Dried bean curd is placed on the banquet table to symbolise happiness and luck. Lotus seed is seen as another fertility symbol and signifies having many offspring. Nian Gao is a traditional sweet steamed glutinous rice pudding, when you eat this dish you will aid growth and abundance.

When you translate bamboo shoots into Chinese, the words sound similar to the Chinese for "hoping that all turns out for the best". A whole fish with its head and tail intact will represent togetherness.

#### **Reunion Dinner**

The Reunion Dinner is a very busy event. The women buzz around the kitchen with the dinner preparation whilst the men either watch TV or (guess what?) play mah-jong. Mah-jong is an extremely important part of Chinese culture and is played by men and women alike, often in halls exclusively dedicated to the game.

Mah-jong is linked with gambling with huge sums of money being won and lost by the players. An excellent memory is required to remember which tiles have been laid down and which remain. Once a certain point in a hand has been passed, you need to pay special attention as if you are the one to put down the tile that enables another player to win that hand, you not only have to pay your own losses on the hand but those of the other two losing players as well. This can mean serious amounts of money.

Children are bathed and dressed in their new pyjamas and promised the arrival of "Tsai Shen Yeh" (Chai Shen Yeh) (the Wealth God). Whilst they sleep; the parents will slip an ang pow (a red envelope with money) under their pillow signifying a visit from 'Chai Shen Yeh'. Children can also expect to receive red envelopes from uncles and aunts, with the amount that is given, being dictated by the closeness of the family relationship and also the age of the child. Older children can usually expect to receive more than younger ones. Someone who has a large family and who has taken a hammering on the mah-jong tables is in for trouble!

At midnight, at the turn of the old and New Year, people let off fire-crackers which serve to scare away the evil spirits and old qi of the past year and to greet the arrival of the New Year.

New Years Day itself, starts with you, in your finest and newest clothes, with the exchange of good wishes amongst the family. Married couples present the young ones, children and unmarried adults alike with a Hung-Bao. In Chinese culture, instead of giving a wrapped up present as we do at Christmas in the UK, it is customary to give this red envelope containing money. The amount of money contained in the envelope has to be in even numbers. Even numbers are auspicious unless it is a single Chinese i-ching coin on its own. It is amazing how much a person can accumulate in a single day.

The day continues with visits to relatives. The visiting rota has its unspoken hierarchy arrangement. The oldest get to sit at home and wait for the younger relatives to visit them to exchange good wishes to each other. This is a very exciting time for the children because nearly every 'Kung Xee Fa Chai' (it means Congratulations and May you be Prosperous) they recite, they get an ang pow (red envelope containing money) for it.

The second day of Chinese New Year is named 'Kai Nien' meaning "Year Beginning" which starts with a very early morning breakfast. Special dishes with symbolic names will be served. The special dish of this day is long noodles which are served with everyone competing to toss the noodles as high as possible with their chopsticks. The tossing of noodles is a

symbolic activity done to promote longevity. This means that, unless you are unable to do so, you stand up and raise your arms full stretch in the air holding the noodles aloft. In order to get extra lift off, some people use super long chopsticks and stand on chairs so you should probably make sure the ceiling fan is turned off.

Unlike in the west, Chinese New Year is not a time for drinking a lot of alcohol. In fact, alcohol is generally not drunk as people save space for themselves to drink enormous amounts of Chinese tea. Some people will have a Chinese wine with their meal but, particularly as the emphasis is so much on the family nature of the celebrations, nobody goes over the top.

Two days of over eating and general fun and games are indulged in quite a lot as the Chinese do not hold back on these occasions. The Chinese relationship with food is close all the year, but at no time more than at New Year. Many dishes have particular significance, especially at this time. Even everyday dishes like fish and turnips have special meanings and none more so than fish balls and meat balls both of which suggest reunion, which is a most important element at this time. However, after two days of festivities and fun, even the Chinese can have enough and recognise that energy levels need to be restored. The third day is therefore a day of calm. Traditionally, it is not a day for risks or adventure. The young ones will venture out to see friends but it is a quiet day. In China no offices or businesses will be open on this day.

Normal procedures return with businesses as usual on the fourth day. Many businesses will choose a specific day to start business with the assistance of their Feng Shui Practitioner and initiate the new trading year with a spectacular display of Lion Dance and fire crackers. It is a very noisy and exciting event.

Greetings and an air of festivity remain for another eleven days through to the full moon of the first lunar month when another celebration follows but this time it is to mark the closing of the Spring Festival. Day 15 is also called the 'Spring Lantern Festival' (Yuan Xiao Jie). This wonderfully romantic celebration takes place under a full moon on the fifteenth day of the first lunar month of the year.

On this day, the old and young carry a colourful lantern and gather in a neighbouring public place. They gather to admire and appreciate the first full moon of the year (very similar to the Mid Autumn Festival). In China, there are still villages that hold a big Tang Yuan (rice dumplings) cooking and eating session. The dumplings are round and symbolise family unity and completeness. The mid-month Lantern Festival traditionally brings the seasonal passage of the New Year to a conclusion.

Food has played a major role in Chinese New Year celebrations for centuries, and "lucky" foods are traditionally served throughout the two week Chinese New Year celebration, known as the Spring Festival - the most important festival in China when families come together to celebrate in as grand a style as they can afford.

The Chinese belief that different foods symbolize good things in different ways manifests in various forms.

#### Chinese Good Luck Foods for the New Year

The quantity of food prepared signifies prosperity and wealth of the household and there is an old custom of serving a platter which is made up of five meats or five vegetables, referred to as "the five blessings of the new year" representing longevity, peace, righteousness, wealth and wisdom.

Individual foods and recipes also have specific meanings and are widely served during the Spring festival. Examples include, Chinese dumplings which have the appearance of the old Chinese silver ingots (the legend is that the more dumplings you eat, the more money you will make in the coming year); spring rolls which resemble gold bars; and noodles which represent long life.

But it's not just the appearance of the food which counts. Sometimes the name of the foods served are the significant factor.

For instance the Chinese word for fish sounds like the words "wish" and "abundance" which has led to the tradition of serving a whole fish (head and tail in tact) thus ensuring good fortune from the beginning to the end of the new year; the name Nian Gao (a glutinous rice cake) sounds like "getting higher year by year" the Chinese believing the higher you are, the better off you are; the name for turnips also means "good luck"; the word for lettuce in Cantonese sounds like "rising fortune" so it is very common to serve foods in a lettuce wrap especially if it's another lucky food; and tangerines and oranges are both given and eaten as their names sound like "gold" and "wealth". Another favourite is Sweet and Sour pork as the Cantonese word for sour sounds like the word for grandchildren, so serving this dish will help ensure the continuance of the family.


## Fear of attack and possible death - How to make the changes in the environment needed for success.

was recently asked a question about horse behaviour which got me thinking about our behaviour. The question was all about fear behaviours in an otherwise quiet, calm and content gelding. He lives on a yard where there are quite a few stallions. One stallion in particular was scaring her horse while riding exercise in the school. He spins, shakes, tries to bolt off in any direction away from this particular stallion. He is nervous and spooky and very unsettled. He spends his whole time keeping an eye on the stallion and where he is in proximity to himself, ready to flee at any time. She finds it impossible to gain any relaxation or even attention from him. Her question was what could she do to train her horse how to not be scared of this stallion and be calmer all round in this situation.

My first question to her was why is her horse in the same proximity to stallions in the first place, alongside asking how this particular stallion behaves with her horse or any other horse in its proximity. To my mind this description would go a long way into explaining her horse's emotions and behaviours.

Apparently her gelding is not nervous in any other circumstance. She hacks him out happily, which he enjoys and they enjoy together. His ground manners are lovely and calm and he gets lots of time out in the fields simply being a horse.

The yard itself houses several Dressage stallions which all have to be exercised of course, however, one in particular openly dislikes her horse. It displays aggression and threatening behaviour towards him despite being in the control of a rider. I may have perceived some of her story wrong but it would appear, on balance, that the stallion owner/rider shows little or no consideration to other school users. It would appear that she expects everyone to keep out of her way rather than choosing to exercise her volatile Stallion well away from others or at totally different times altogether. I cannot understand this way of thinking at all because it is encouraging and reinforcing a totally wrong set of emotions and behaviours in the stallion. This is madness to my mind and an accident waiting to happen, never mind the fact that he must feel quite tortured in his life. Where is his fun? When does he get calm, relaxed exercise or schooling time outside of his stable?

So what behaviour needs changing here and in whom? Is it realistic or even possible to try and change the fear (of death) in the gelding or simply eliminate the cause? It would not be realistic to try to train the gelding in the presence of the stallion... it is in fact very harmful to both horses.

Fear inhibits learning in us all and elicits the release of cortisol and adrenaline. These hormones are needed for survival and produces flight behaviours and an acute awareness of minute movements or changes to the immediate environment. Little things may cause huge fear/flight behaviours - a flapping pigeon becomes a pterodactyl or a moving flower becomes a triffid!

I have advised that she must never put her lovely horse in that situation again. There is a high risk of serious accident to all concerned, and her horse will lose trust in her for forcing him to face these innate fears. The pity is that her horse is not the cause of the problem but he suffers as a result all the same. It should really be the Stallion owner who should never put anyone else in a compromised position but can she not see this herself? Presumably there are other owners who feel the same way.

No one should be ostracized here. It would be lovely if there could be quiet communication between owners so that everyone could find how to use the facilities for the betterment of their horses and their relationships and in group harmony. This is not about training the horses but changing their humans behaviour.

# Issued on behalf of Safer Roads Humber: Installation of average speed cameras on A1079 to begin in February

ork will start on Monday 1 February to install state of the art average speed cameras on a stretch of the A1079 between the Shiptonthorpe roundabout and the Dunswell roundabout.

The existing cameras on the Market Weighton bypass and on Arras Hill near Market Weighton and on sections of the Beverley bypass will be replaced by the new equipment.

The new average speed cameras will be designed and installed by national contractor Vysionics at their recommended locations on behalf of Safer Roads Humber, a partnership which includes East Riding of Yorkshire Council, Humberside Police, and Humberside Fire and Rescue Service, and the installation is scheduled to take approximately eight weeks. It is not anticipated that the installation work will cause significant delays for traffic using the route.

The existing twelve cameras - dating from 2006 - are being replaced because they are life expired and still rely on wet film in the cameras which has to be developed in the traditional manner. The first of the new cameras that motorists will see will be located at the Shiptonthorpe roundabout, with other cameras located at new locations between there and the Dunswell roundabout, ensuring that the speed limit can be enforced along the whole route.

The new cameras are costing Safer Roads Humber a total of £890,000, which covers the costs of installation, and maintenance

for the next eight years.

Councillor Andy Burton, portfolio holder for planning, highways and transportation, said: "We want roads in this region to be as safe as they can possibly be; in other areas of the country, the installation of average speed cameras has helped to reduce casualties on the roads. We want motorists to keep to the speed limits on our roads, which will help keep them and other road users safe and keep accidents to a minimum. We are confident that this new equipment will help to achieve these aims

"Before the installation of the current cameras, the A1079 was classed as a medium to high risk road by Euro RAP (the independent international system for rating roads across the continent). Between 2002 and 2004, there had been 71 crashes along this section of road, resulting in 138 people being injured, of whom 36 were seriously or fatally injured. Since the cameras were installed in 2006, the number of injury crashes and the severity of injury have been greatly reduced. We want to maintain these greatly improved statistics, which is why it is essential that the current outdated cameras are replaced by modern equipment."

PC Simon Carlisle, casualty reduction officer for Humberside Police, added: "Average speed cameras allow motorists to manage their speeds considerably better. They prevent what we call 'camera surfing', where motorists speed up after passing a known camera site, but equally they prevent the triggering of an old style camera by a brief lapse in concentration. Motorists will be able to maintain a more constant, steady and safe speed."

Safer Roads Humber is reminding motorists that all existing speed limits on the A1079 will remain the same as they are now, including the 60mph limit on the climb up Arras Hill. The stretch of road involved will see clear signage erected at regular intervals, to remind motorists of the average speed cameras.

# **Property News from Martin English of Homelink**

#### Landlords and the Immigration Act 2014

The recent Immigration Act 2014 will have significant repercussions for landlords and letting agents. The new provisions will require landlords (and by implication, agents) to carry out immigration checks on all tenancies starting after the introduction date. A limited rollout across five areas in the Midlands (Birmingham, Walsall, Sandwell, Dudley and Wolverhampton) began on 1 December 2014 and a full roll out in England commenced on 1st February 2016.

#### What action is required?

The new rules require landlords to check the immigration status of all new tenants. The new rules affect you if you are:

- Renting out accommodation for people to live anywhere in the UK (including taking in a lodger)
- A letting agent who provides a service for landlords by finding people to live in rented property
- A hotel or guest house, or provider of similar accommodation and you take in guests who stay for three months or more.

Responsibility for completing the checking process will primarily lie with the landlord unless this responsibility has been transferred to a

All private landlords and letting agents will be required to make simple checks on the migration status of new tenants in order to make it more difficult for illegal migrants to live in the UK. Before renting accommodation, landlords will ask prospective tenants to produce evidence (from a checklist of documents) of their permission to be in the UK. Landlords and agents should check this evidence and keep a copy for their records. The exact nature of these checks is detailed in Government guidance.

When a prospective tenant cannot provide the landlord with any

of the documents required under the checks, then the landlord must request verification of a 'right to rent' from the Home Office's Landlords Checking Service using an online form. Where a landlord does not have access to the internet, a request can be made by telephone. The Landlords Checking Service will respond to the landlord with a clear "yes" or "no" response within 2 working days.

#### **Penalties**

Where a landlord has authorised an adult to occupy a property without a legal 'right to rent', he may be subject to a penalty of up to £3,000 for any breach under the Act – so it is something that landlords will be advised to familiarise themselves with. If you are in any doubt a reputable agent should have robust processes in place to safeguard your responsibilities as a Landlord and you should seek there advice.

# Parents across the East Riding encouraged to get Sugar Smart

new campaign was launched recently encouraging parents to get 'Sugar Smart' and take control of their children's sugar intake.

The Change4Life campaign follows revelations that four-to-10 year olds consume an estimated 5,500 sugar cubes a year, weighing 22 kg - the same weight as an average five-year-old.

Currently, 22% of four to five-year-olds are overweight or obese in Yorkshire and The Humber, increasing to 33% in 10 to 11-yearolds. This means they are more likely to become obese adults who are more prone to a range of serious health problems, such as heart disease, some cancers and Type 2 diabetes.

A new Sugar Smart app has been launched to help parents to see how much sugar there is in everyday food and drink. The free app works by scanning barcodes of products and revealing the amount of total sugar they contain in cubes and grams such as:

six cubes of sugar in a 43g chocolate bar five or more cubes in a 200ml juice drink

nine cubes in a can of cola -instantly taking children up to or over their recommended maximum for the day.

Change4Life has created an eye-opening short film, which warns parents about the health harms of eating and drinking too much sugar, including becoming overweight and tooth decay. The film brings to life the excessive amount of sugar consumed by the average child per year; currently three times more than the new maximum recommended daily amount.

Dr Tim Allison, Director of Public Health at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "Healthy eating is extremely important for children and young people in the East Riding, to give them the best start in life. Levels of childhood obesity locally continue to be a cause for concern.

"Children aged five shouldn't have more than 19 grams of sugar per day – that's five cubes, but it's very easy to have more. That's why we want parents to be 'Sugar Smart'. Public Health England's easy to use app will help parents see exactly where the sugar in their children's diet is coming from, so they can make informed choices about what to cut down on."

Five million Sugar Smart packs will be given away to primary school children and their families through schools, local authorities and retailers.



# The Benefits for Your Health of Having a Pet to Love and Care

Those who have pets can attest to the many benefits they bring to their lives. Animals are often prone to silly comical behaviour that can elicit smiles and laughter from their owners.

If you are not a pet owner and you think of owning a pet as a lot of work you do not need then for the sake of your health you may want to reconsider. Is there a relationship between animal companionship and improved health and emotional well-being in human beings? While the jury is still out on how therapeutic it is to share your life and home with a pet more and more people are becoming believers.

#### One – Dogs help to prevent obesity:

A study that looked at 2,000 adults found that dog owners who walk their pets on a regular basis get more physical activity than those who do not have dogs and therefore are less likely to become overweight or obese. Those who love their dogs know that they need to be exercised so when the pet gets exercise so does the owner.

A similar study found that walking a dog leads to a greater level of mobility within a home.

## Two – Heart attack victims benefit from having pets:

Researchers looked at 420 people who had suffered a heart attack the previous year. Some of the subjects owned dogs while others did not. They found that dog owners were more likely to be doing better and feeler better, regardless of how bad their heart attack was. Non-dog owners were found to be doing worse and some did not survive the year.

### Three – Pets help to teach love, understanding and empathy:

It is not just adults who feel that their pets in part contribute to their emotional and psychological well-being. Children can be taught valuable life lessons by having pets in their lives. Animals can help children to develop empathy for others, as well as love. This can also provide a source of comfort when the child is feeling down.

Many children (and adults alike) talk to their pets when they are feeling sad, discouraged or upset.

## Four - Pets keep people socially connected to each other:

Walking a dog will not only keep you trimmer but you are likely to come across other people on your walks and strike up conversations. Animals open the door to greater communication which helps to keep their owners more socially connected than those who do not have dogs to walk. This can lead to greater longevity and a lesser degree of physical and mental decline as you age.

None of these benefits have been proven for a certainty but those who own pets do not have to be convinced. Other studies have pointed to the fact that having pets can lower stress, fight depression, reduce health care costs and lower blood pressure.
