Precept

You will soon be getting your Council Tax bills through for the 2020/2021 financial year. Cottingham Parish Council is funded through an addition to the Council Tax called the precept. The exact amount you pay depends on your property banding but for a Band D property the charge will be £24.10, this is an increase of £3.41 on the previous year. To put this into context, the national average charge from Town/Parish Councils in 2019/2020 was £67.69 and is estimated to be around £71 for 2020/2021. Cottingham Parish Councils always strives to get best value for taxpayers and our charge has actually been dropping for the past few years but, unfortunately, due to increased operations, overheads, and the need to overhaul the Cottingham CCTV system we have needed to increase it this year. In the 2014/2015 financial year the charge was £22.12. The £24.10 charge for 2020/2021 is the equivalent of the 2014/2015 figure adjusted for inflation meaning that, in real terms, the amount paid per household to Cottingham Parish Council has not increased for six years.

Grants

Hedgehogs

In Cottingham we are lucky to have a healthy hedgehog population however they are very vulnerable. The Parish Council urges residents to help them wherever possible by doing nine simple things. 1) Don't use chemicals or slug pellets in your garden 2) Drive slowly and take care at night 3) Feed the hedgehogs (though not bread and milk) 4) Link your garden to the hedgehog highway (ask your neighbours before making holes in fences) 5) Look out for underweight youngsters (call a hedgehog rescue if you see one) 6) Build a hedgehog home (guides can be found online) 7) Create a hedgehog larder by encouraging insects into your garden 8) Become a citizen scientist (learn about hedgehogs and record any sightings) 9) Spread the word about these wonderful creatures.

GETTING PAID WHATYOU ARE OWE

Cathy Giblin, Debt Collection Specialist at Graham & Rosen Solicitors, looks at the legal options open to you when someone owes you money.

If you run a business, you will be aware of the need to be paid fully and promptly for your work. Many businesses are owed money, and this can have serious consequences on their cash flow. If a service or goods have been provided, then you can rightly expect to be paid for it. Individuals who are owed money can also go through stress due to the financial hardships it can cause them.

As with all debt problems, it is better for the creditor and debtor to have a good channel of communication to try and resolve the problem amicably. However, debtors often need to be approached in a formal way before they will respond, and that is where Graham & Rosen can step in to help. Since 2017, the Debt Collection Protocol has been in force. This Protocol applies to any business, including sole traders and public bodies, claiming debt from an individual (including a sole trader). Any business that is owed money from an individual is required to send a formal Letter of Claim. The debtor must provide certain information within 30 days of receiving the letter. If they return this information within 30 days, they have a further 30 days to discuss the debt (for example they may wish to discuss a payment plan) before Court proceedings are issued. If the debtor does not respond at all within the 30 days, then the

creditor would have the right to issue Court proceedings without further notice. Please note that the Debt Collection Protocol does not apply in respect of business-to-business debts; a normal non-protocol "7 day letter" can be sent chasing payment.







Traditional steak & mushroom pie

Total time: Ready in 2 hours. Serves: 4

Ingredients

- 1 tbsp sunflower oil
- 500g essential Waitrose British Diced Braising Steak
- 1 onion, chopped
- 2 carrots, thickly sliced
- 2 tbsp plain flour
- 2 sprigs thyme
- 150ml red wine
- 500ml beef stock
- 250g Waitrose Chestnut Mushrooms, halved

Method

- 1. Heat the oil in a large saucepan and cook the steak over a high heat until nicely browned. Lift out with a slotted spoon and set aside. Add the onion and carrots to the pan and cook for a few minutes until beginning to brown, then stir in the flour and cook for a minute or two.
- 2. Return the meat and any resting juices to the pan. Add the thyme, wine and stock, bring to a simmer then cover and cook gently for an hour until the meat is tender. Add the mushrooms and cook for a further 5 minutes.
- 3. Preheat the oven to 200°C, gas mark 6. Spoon the filling into a roughly 30x22cm pie dish. Brush the rim of the dish with water then lay the pastry sheet on top. Trim away any overhanging pastry and press down firmly to seal. Using a small, sharp knife, lightly score the pastry surface in a cross-hatch pattern then brush with milk and bake for 25–30 minutes until risen and golden.

Lamb with parsnips

This succulent lamb dish is first slow roasted on a bed of onions to bring out all the flavour of the lamb. It's then finished hotpot-style with plenty of vegetables and all the delicious roasting juices

10 juniper berries, crushed

4 cloves garlic, crushed

- 2. Transfer the lamb to a board. Drain the onions and transfer to a bowl with a slotted spoon. Tilt the roasting tin and skim off most of the fat leaving just a little fat and all the cooking juices in the tin.
- 3. Pull the lamb from the bone, cutting it into chunky pieces. Discard any areas of excess fat. Arrange half the parsnips and potatoes in a pie dish or casserole and layer the lamb on top. Spread the onions on top of the lamb and arrange the remaining parsnips and potatoes on top. Stir the vinegar and 100ml water into the roasting tin and bring slowly to the boil on the hob, scraping up any residue in the tin.
- 4. Pour the juices into the dish. Cover with greased foil and bake for about 1½ hours until the vegetables are golden and tender. Serve with seasonal vegetables.

Speedy beef stroganoff

New Year, time to try new wines

o, here we are, well and truly into 2020 and with all the festive and New Year celebrations but a fast dimming memory, perhaps it's time to try some new wines. In fact that does seem like a very good new year's resolution!

One suggestion would be an interesting, but lesser-known, white wine grape that drinks exceptionally well. It's called Albarino and grows in north-west Spain and also in Portugal, where it is known as Alvarinho.

In Portugal it has long been a contributor to Vinho Verde - the classic, slightly spritz wine, but was little known in Spain until about 20 years ago when the setting up of the Rias Baixas denomination of origin in Galicia in Spain led to it suddenly becoming a fashionable drink in the bars and restaurant of Madrid.

Part of the problem was the fact that the grapes were difficult to grow in any quantity because it was difficult to get the rapes to ripen in the cool climate in that region of Spain. But the upside of that climate problem is that the grapes produce a white wine with delicious acidity, which makes it excellent with fish and seafood.

Albarino has a dramatic aromatic intensity, so expect aromas of lemons, limes, grapefruit and honeysuckle, and occasionally orange zest, and a mouth-watering tingly taste, coupled with subtle salty and bitter notes.

It's usually best to drink within a year or two of the vintage to ensure the wine retains its trademark acidity and bold, fruity aromas and is very much a wine to drink with seafood. But white meats wouldn't be a problem and, depending on personal taste, it's definitely worth trying with Vietnamese, Thai and Caribbean food.

Because of the difficulties in growing the grape, Albarino wines can be expensive, but I've picked out one bargain offer worth trying - see this month's "best buys" section.

* Talking of price, two budget £4.99 wines have proved a hit with shoppers - with Lidl selling the equivalent to 16,000 glasses of them an hour during the festive period. The supermarket's Rioja Joven DOC and the Argentinian Malbec wines proved a firm favourite among Christmas shoppers.

The two popular red wines are both part of Lidl's core range, meaning shoppers can pick up a bottle all year round and the news comes as new data revealed wine was the fastest-growing sector for Lidl last Christmas, with 21 per cent growth over the last year.

The Rioja Joven is a refreshing wine, with bright black plum aromas making it juicy and appetising. It's also highly versatile, meaning you can enjoy it with anything from pizza to steak. The Argentinian Malbec is ripe and plummy with a dry and savoury finish, and delicious with steak and grilled meats.

Lidl's master of wine Richard Bampfield said: "It's wonderful to see that Rioja and Argentinian Malbec continue to be so popular, with both demonstrating that you don't need to spend over the odds for high quality wine.

"The Malbec is a particular favourite of mine – it's delicious paired with roast beef on a Sunday."

* Has the bubble burst for sparkling wine sales? That certainly seems to be the case if latest sales figures are to be believed, because fizz in all its forms is now facing a decline according to the Wine and Spirits Trade Association's latest Market Report.

While sparkling wine, particularly Prosecco, has enjoyed a boom over the last ten years, overall sales went down for the first time by three per cent in the last 12 months. The price of wine has gone up by up to seven per cent in the past year, and the WSTA said this could be partly to blame for the drop.

The wine industry has blamed the Government for refusing to cut duty on wine for 35 years, making it more costly and causing drinkers to choose other beverages. Miles Beale, Chief Executive of the Wine and Spirit Trade Association, said: Wine drinkers haven't enjoyed a cut in duty for 35 years, since Nigel Lawson was Chancellor and only then because he was forced into it by the Courts. Wine was singled out for a duty rise at the last Budget which, on top of the weakening of the pound, has contributed to a further hike in wine prices.

"This is why the WSTA is calling for a cut to wine excise duty at the Budget to help revitalise the industry, encourage investment and bring a boost to the economy."

But notwithstanding all of that, retailers will be enjoying a boom in fizz sales this month because of Valentine's and I've picked out a nice pink Champagne as a "best buy" as it's currently enjoying a price cut at the Co-op for a limited period.

* Finally, there was good news recently for Majestic, who have an outlet in Beverley, after a takeover by private equity firm Fortress Investment Group, who immediately announced plans to keep open its 190 stores and possibly open new ones. Under its previous leadership, Majestic had been set to close up to 140 of the 190 stores.


The Passage of Time

aggie has kindly lent me her column again to do a little reflecting. I cannot believe it is already February and January has just gone. As you may already know, January is the month named after Janus, the two-faced Roman god, with one face looking forwards to the future and the other looking back into the past. It's also a very good time for me to be snuggling up indoors, where it's nice and warm and dry, with a cup of hot coffee by my side and an open laptop.

I'm finding I feel a little bit sorry for veterinary students now. When I first qualified, the only form of equipment we had to learn to use to look inside our patients was a basic x-ray machine. If we were very lucky, we might also have a precious endoscope to peer into stomachs and down into lungs. Nowadays the poor vet students have to get to grips with a whole battery of modern diagnostic equipment in a very short space of time. In addition to x-ray facilities, we at KINGSTON now also have a range of machinery that provides incredibly detailed pictures of nearly every part of the body. Much like in human medicine, we can now use MRI to look at brains, ultrasound to look at abdomens and a CT scanner to take images of whole bodies from nose to tail.

The veterinary student of today also has more information about more conditions to learn about, more laboratory tests to consider, more diagnoses to ponder over and many more treatments and surgical techniques to choose between. On the plus side, it means that vets now have far more resources at their disposal to care for the nation's pets to an increasingly high standard. They are far less likely to suffer the frustration of being

unable to help an animal because of limits on reaching a diagnosis or lack of information about possible treatments. Looking forward, that hopefully means the veterinary profession will continue to be a rewarding career and keep attracting the brightest and the best young people to keep the torch of enthusiasm burning.

Those of us who are bit longer in the tooth have had the relative luxury of years to slowly build upon the basic knowledge we gained at university. It's obviously essential that all vets keep up to date with new information given the incredibly fast pace of change in our profession, and most vets at this time of year will be planning which courses and other learning activities they will be taking part in to keep themselves as current as possible over the coming months.

I was very gratified to read that a recent Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons survey revealed a whopping 94% of the general public completely or generally trusted veterinary surgeons. That is really good to know, as none of us would be doing this job if we didn't love it and all of our patients. Yes, even the ones who don't necessarily love us back!

One thing you can't stop, though, is the passage of time. All of this progress means that there is far more for us to discuss with owners and many more choices to be made about treatment for their pets. To address this issue, at KINGSTON we are now making our consultations longer. When I first started work as a veterinarian five minutes for a veterinary consultation was normal. More recently it has been ten minutes and starting this year we will now be offering fifteen minute consultations as standard. This means more time for you to express your concerns, more time for us to examine your pet carefully and considerately and more time to discuss treatment options. Welcome progress indeed.

So what about the future I hear you ask? With the pace of change I've seen so far I'm beginning to think that maybe Dr McCoy's little gadget that performed diagnosis and fixed every injury and disease in Star Trek isn't so impossible to imagine anymore. Beam me up, Scottie!

Tooth Wear, Everywhere

ello again, I hope you are well. I had a trip down memory lane last weekend. It is just over 27 years since I qualified as a dentist from Leeds University Dental School. I met up with a few old mates in Leeds. It's changed quite a bit in the city and the university. However, there are still some old haunts going strong I'm pleased to say.

Where is This Tooth Wear?

It's all over the place and very common. We see it in adults and children. Really the proper term is tooth surface loss and is caused by different things.

Attrition is tooth again tooth wear from grinding teeth together. We see quite a bit of this.

Erosion is caused, generally from acids. The acids can from the diet including fizzy drinks, citrus fruits and juice. It can also come from the stomach with reflux or full on vomiting. You can see it on the side teeth, the front of teeth, on the palate side of teeth and on the biting surfaces.

Abrasion is the wearing of teeth from an external source e.g. tooth brush abrasion from over brushing.

Abfraction is an interesting one. This is when teeth are clenched and jiggled side to side creating stress at the gum level





February Gardening Tasks

ow that the temperature is rising and we are having slightly milder weather we can start to think about getting out into the garden again.

Make sure to keep your garden tidy so that you are ready for the arrival of the Spring weather. One job that is fun and rewarding with superior taste rewards is growing your own potatoes. Whether you have a garden, allotment or small patio or balcony there are many options for growing seed potatoes.

What to grow

- There are dozens of different potato varieties, usually described as early, second early and main crop potatoes. These names indicate when they crop and also give you an idea of the space you'll need, how closely and when they can be planted.
- You should concentrate on the earlier types if you're short of space, and it's also worth remembering that earlies are less likely to encounter pest problems as they're lifted so much earlier in the year.
- Second earlies take 16 to 17 weeks to mature after planting, so you should be able to harvest them from very late June through to the start of August.
- Main crops are ready 18 to 20 weeks after planting, so they can be lifted usually from July through to October. Main crops take up the most space in the garden, but they tend to be the best varieties to grow if you want some for storage.

What to do How to chit

- Chitting simply means encouraging the seed potatoes to sprout before planting.
- Start chitting from late January in warmer parts of the country or in February in cooler areas, about six weeks before you intend to plant out the potatoes.
- Each seed potato has a more rounded, blunt end that has a number of 'eyes'.
- Stand the tubers with the blunt end uppermost in trays or old egg boxes, with plenty of natural light.
- The potatoes are ready to be planted out when the shoots are 1.5-2.5cm (0.5-1in) long.

How to plant

- Plant your chitted potatoes when the soil has started to warm up, usually from mid-March or early April. Start by digging a trench 7.5-13cm (3-5in) deep, although the exact depth should vary according to the variety of potato you're planting.

- Add a light sprinkling of fertiliser to your trench before you begin planting.
- Plant early potatoes about 30cm (12in) apart with 40-50cm (16-20in) between the rows, and second earlies and main crops about 38cm (15in) apart with 75cm (30in) between the rows.
- Handle your chitted tubers with care, gently setting them into the trench with the shoots pointing upwards, being careful not to break the shoots. Cover the potatoes lightly with soil.
- As soon as the shoots appear, earth up each plant by covering it with a ridge of soil so that the shoots are just buried.
- You need to do this at regular intervals and by the end of the season each plant will have a small mound around it about 15cm (6in) high.

Harvesting

- Your home-grown potatoes should be ready for lifting from June until September, depending on the varieties and the growing conditions. Earlies can be lifted and eaten as soon as they're ready.
- This will be when above-ground growth is still green, and usually as soon as the flowers open.
- Second and main crop varieties can be kept in the ground much longer, until September, even though above-ground growth may well be looking past its best.
- Two weeks before you lift the crop, cut the growth off at ground level. This should give the skins of the potatoes sufficient time to toughen up, making them far less prone to damage from lifting and easier to store.



Growing tips

- Potatoes like plenty of sun, so avoid planting them in frostprone sites, as these conditions can damage the developing foliage. If you're starting up a vegetable plot on very weedy ground or old grassland, potatoes may help swamp out weeds with their fast-growing, extensive foliage.
- If you're short of space, try growing potatoes in an adequately drained container that's at least 30cm (1ft) deep and wide. Half fill the pot with multi-purpose compost or good quality, fertile garden soil, nestle two seed potatoes into the top of the compost and then top up with more compost or soil to within 2.5cm (1in) of the rim of the container.
- It's particularly important that there's adequate water once the tubers have reached the size of marbles. Unless there's regular, ample rainfall, the size and quality of the crop will be reduced if you don't water your potatoes.

Plant of the moment

Camellia

When everything is still bare, the evergreen shrub Camellia japonica (also known as Japanese camellia) is already flowering abundantly. Neither cold nor snow will stop this winter bloomer. Highly valued for their stunning floral displays and fresh, glossy, evergreen foliage, few hardy shrubs signal the end of winter better than camellias.

With dozens of varieties available you'll be spoilt for choice – you can pick from camellias in shades of pink, red, white and cream.

Camellia flowers vary in size and shape, and their forms can be divided into six descriptive groups depending on the number of petals and their pattern or arrangement within the flower. These forms are described as Single, Semi-double, Anemone-form, Peony-form, Rose-form double or Formal double, so take your pick from the ones that most appeal.

Like azaleas and rhododendrons, camellias are ericaceous plants, and this means they need to grow in an acid or limefree soil to ensure they stay healthy. A simple soil test kit available from garden centres can be used to check your soils acidity/alkalinity (often called its pH), and composts and fertilisers can be added to help make soil more acid.



Winter bloomers offer scent and colour

Winter bloomers are ideal plants for bringing the spring indoors when everything outside is still grim bare. Colourful primula (Primula obconia), cheerful ragwort (Senecio) and white jasmine (Jasminium) provide scent and colour in the home in many shapes and sizes. They're easy to look after, and have been specially grown to be able to go outdoors as well when the temperature rises above 10°C.

Origin

Wild primulas often occur in the mountains on the northern hemisphere. There are some 15 varieties in the European Alps. Ragwort has travelled across from Australia and New Zealand, and occurs widely on the Canary Islands. Jasmine is a (sub-)tropical climber from the temperate regions of Asia

which can also do well indoors if it's given enough moisture and warmth.

What to look for when buying Winter bloomers

- All winter bloomers are keen drinkers, so check the soil is sufficiently damp when buying. Drooping leaves are a sign that the plant has been kept too dry.
- Check the number of buds and the ripeness of the buds on all winter bloomers. Ideally they should already be showing some colour.
- · Primula and ragwort should have attractive, smooth leaves, whilst jasmine should have dense tendrils with lots of buds.
- Look out for leaf-miner flies and aphids, and in the case of primula and ragwort also check for Botrytis, a fungus which can affect foliage and flowers when they're too damp.

Local Beekeeper Neil Gower Continues his quarterly review of the Beekeeping world

Beekeeping DIY

ive had a productive winter so far in terms of repairing my ageing wooden beehive collection. I've been able to utilise my new found garage space and have made good use of some spare timber to repair some of the larger brood boxes and the smaller supers.

Using plans from the internet I've also managed to build some new boxes and have adapted other plans for a complete hive.

This new design is a hybrid between a full size hive which can take 11 frames and a Nucleus hive designed to take 6 frames. My new design will hold eight frames, will be smaller and lighter than a full size hive and is an ideal size for my garden. It will allow a colony to become big enough to survive the winter and provide some excess honey without becoming too large. I'll be able to use bees from this hive to support start up colonies with new queens which will provide me with more flexibility. I've sourced everything I need locally including the mesh for the flooring and the waterproof roof covering. I'm also using locally sourced timber so my new hive(s) will have a very low carbon footprint. This is something that's important to my beekeeping philosophy and I'm looking forward to completing my first hive shortly.

There are a few other maintenance jobs to be carried out before the start of the new season, but I'm well ahead and these can be scheduled as the weather improves.

The bees

It seems an age since I closed the hives down in September. Since then I've made the odd visit to my various sites to administer varroa treatments or to add fondant to those hives low on stores. I've also made sure the mouse guards are still in place following mistakes I made during last winter.

I just have to wait now until the first vestiges of spring arrive, the temperature rises, the queens begin laying eggs and bees start to emerge on warmer days to carry out hive cleansing tasks. The long wet winter gives me some cause for concern as damp conditions are bad for honeybees. It is often said that a cold hard winter is much better for them than a damp one. When it is cold they tend to cluster around the queen and maintain their stores more efficiently. If there are warmer periods the bees tend to venture out using energy and require more food, thus depleting their stores more quickly.

Climate change is clearly having an effect on us all. In some climatic regions this results in excessive temperatures, forest fires, melting of ice caps etc. Our temperate climate seems destined to be warmer but wetter. I read a report recently from beekeepers based in London who said that last winter their queens continued to lay eggs throughout the winter period. If that pattern continues it will mean that beekeepers will have to completely review our thinking on how we manage our bees between October and March. If queens lay eggs in the wintertime the bees will need a source of pollen to feed the grubs. We will need to add pollen substitutes much earlier and more frequently than is currently the case and food stores will need to be monitored more closely. Over the past few years I've made subtle changes to my beekeeping practices, but it could be that in years to come we don't have a closed season.

Hive products

I've always been interested in putting the products generated by the bees to good use. It's a given that any excess honey produced is well received and delicious. The excess beeswax that I recover with a solar powered extractor also makes excellent candles and for many years my wife and I have made 100% all natural soaps with honey, propolis and beeswax featured in some of our recipes. In my last article I announced my intention try my hand at mead making. Many of my beekeeping colleagues are already experienced mead makers with some being award winners.

I used about 2kg (just over 4lbs in old money) of honey which I dissolved in warm water. I transferred it into a 5 litre (1 gallon) demijohn and topped up with cool water. When the temperature of the liquid was around 22 degrees Celsius I added a sachet of Champagne yeast and added an airlock. All the equipment needed is readily available at a number of local stores featuring homebrew equipment. I kept the potion warm during fermentation and left it for a couple of weeks. I was really pleased with finished product which served me well over the festive period, and I will certainly be making it again.

Mead is said to be one of the oldest alcoholic beverages with evidence linking it back to 7000B.C.

It was prevalent in areas of Europe where grapes could not easily be grown for wine and many monasteries made mead as a by product of their beekeeping. It can range in strength from around 3% to 20% alcohol by volume and can be made with added fruit (Melomel) or herbs and spices (Metheglen)

Here's looking forward to spring.





Council opens hospital discharge suite

he council has developed a new pilot which will help free up hospital beds and give residents the chance to gain back their independence after being discharged from hospital.

The East Riding Social Care Suite will support people to regain their daily living skills and promote ongoing independence, ready for their return home.

East Riding residents accessing the service will be provided with short-term care and support and will have the opportunity to take part in a range of interactive activities with a view to taste what is available to them in the community.

Alongside this, a range of information and advice and signposting will be provided and available on how to live healthily and independently for longer.

The East Riding Social Care Suite is available and contributes towards meeting the additional demand for acute medical beds as a result of winter pressures.

John Skidmore, director for adults, health and customer services at the council, said: "We are aiming to provide engaging and interesting activities from a range of services that will enhance the emotional and physical wellbeing of users, whilst strengthening social networks in the community so that people are more confident and better connected once leaving hospital."

Teresa Cope, Chief Operating Officer at Hull University Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust, said: "Having this excellent facility at Castle Hill will mean there is somewhere to care for people who no longer require the intensive support and treatment provided by our hospital and staff. We are matching the council's funding to get the suite up and running and look forward to continued close working with the council."

Paula South, director of quality and governance/lead nurse at East Riding Clinical Commissioning Group, said: "Clinical evidence shows that people recover faster when they are in an environment where they can carry on with their activities of daily living that helps to support and increase their independence.

"This new suite will offer care focussed on re-ablement, whilst patients wait for their planned social care package to start"

Users of the suite can expect to receive input from a range of services, including help from the staff in the voluntary sector, public health, East Riding Libraries, East Riding Leisure and the museum services.

- 1. (Start) Walk towards the church and turn right down the lane opposite. Cross the busy A614 with care and take the road opposite. Turn left past cottages and at the end, where the road turns right, go through a gate to the left into a field (way-marked Minster Way). Continue forward across earthworks to a kissing gate into the next field. Turn right to arrive at a gate, where it can be muddy. Cross a decrepit stile by the gate and go left alongside the hedge towards a small wood. Walk round the edge of the wood note Ell Well, a pond, inside the wood and come to gate onto a farm road. Cross the farm road and walk on along a wide track (still on the Minster Way). Cross a stile and turn right to a road
- 2. (3.2km, 2miles) Turn left along the road (B1246) into North Dalton. The Star Inn is at the west end of the village, round the corner by the village pond. The church stands on small hill opposite. (For shorter route, you must back-track and take

a lane heading north by the telephone box. This track passes the village cricket pitch and after passing through a gate climbs gradually onto the Wolds, with good views all round. The track now drops down to reach woodland. Go through a small gate and follow a narrow path which bears left down through the trees into Deepdale at point 5.) In North Dalton Take a lane heading west past Tithe Farm. A footpath sign now indicates the way, left, along a sunken lane. At the end of this lane cross a stile and go left round two sides of a small field. With a hedge now on your left, go through a gate, and head west alongside the hedge for about 2km (1½ miles) to meet a concrete farm road.

- 3. (6km, 3¾ miles) Here you leave the Minster Way and turn right and follow this farm road due north for about 1km (¾ mile) to a road. Cross straight over and continue north on what is now a green lane between hedgerows. At the top you meet another green lane, the Hawold or Haywold bridle road, at right angles.
- 4. (7km, 4½miles) Turn right to follow this ancient route due east for about 3km (2¾ miles). Cross a farm road from Haywold Farm which is in a sheltered valley to the left. The route then gradually descends into this valley amid rolling farmland. In area shown as Deepdale on the OS map you come alongside a belt of woodland on the right. It is here the shorter route joins from North Dalton.
- 5. (9.5km, 6miles) Continue east on the ancient Hawold track along the valley floor to the corner of Low Wood. Turn right here uphill alongside the wood and on towards High Wood, Do not enter this wood the track in High Wood is private and is not a right-of-way
- 6. (12km, 7½miles) Turn left and walk along the edge of this wood to reach the B1248 road. Turn right along the road. You must now walk along the verge of the B1248 for about 0.8km (½ mile) back towards Bainton. Take care as this is a straight, fast stretch of road. Just before Bainton roundabout are the Wolds Village Tearoom and craft centre, which is worth a visit. From the tearoom, walk to the roundabout and cross the B1246 to join the footpath, which runs from the bus-stop to Bainton village, alongside the A614. Note the ruined tower of and old windmill on the right before crossing the main road to reach the lay-by. (10km/7miles).





In May 1994, I had a serious accident at work, injuring my spine. An accomplished guitarist, I also found my hands were useless

The surgeon removed two crushed discs from my neck and patched me up with a piece of my hip bone. At 39 years old this was a devastating scenario.

Prior to the accident I had started Tai Chi lessons, knowing that I now needed a positive focus, I pinned all my faith and hopes on Tai Chi.

With the permission of my doctor and wearing a neck collar, I returned to Tai Chi classes and found myself on the first steps to rehabilitation and recovery.

Nine months after the accident I returned to work, but began an instructor programme. In 1997 three years after the accident I qualified as a Tai Chi instructor.

In March 2002 I retired from the building trade and became a full-time instructor. Through my own rehabilitation experience, I pride myself on being able to teach anyone Tai Chi, regardless of age or level of fitness.

With simple step-by-step tuition, the moves are easily adapted to suit individual needs.
