Kenewing a Tenancy

ne of the most frequently asked question from our landlords is what to do at the end of a tenancy?

A six month tenancy is coming to an end. You are happy with your tenant and they want to continue with the tenancy. What should you do

Well the simple answer is that you don't actually have to do anything. This is because once a fixed term tenancy comes to an end, it will automatically become what is known in the legal jargon as a: Statutory periodic tenancy

Statutory periodic tenancy

A statutory periodic tenancy runs on from one rent period to another on exactly the same terms as the proceeding fixed term tenancy.

Editing a tenancy

Another way of dealing with the extension of a tenancy is to alter the terms of the fixed terms tenancy to extend it. For instance you could extend the terms of a six month tenancy to 12 months. You will need to get the tenant to sign the alteration to acknowledge that they are happy with the amendment.

Creating a new fixed term tenancy

If you decide instead to end the existing tenancy and set up a new fixed term tenancy then you will have to end the existing tenancy and set up a new one. Landlords often do this so they and the tenant have the security of knowing that they have a minimum of a six month

Quite simply most landlords opt to let the tenancy become a periodic tenancy. This has a number of advantages. Firstly, for landlords that have served the section 213 notice and protected the deposit under the tenancy deposit scheme. They will not need to go through the rigmarole of having to contact the protecting organisation and getting them to change the deposit protection details.

In addition if a landlord has served a section 21 notice under the previous tenancy then it will no longer be valid under any new tenancy.

Their is no right or wrong answer to this question, it all comes down to a matter of personal preference, some Landlords prefer the added security of a further fixed term contract, however it is worth bearing in mind that continuing under a periodic tenancy not only gives the tenant flexibility, it also gives you as a landlord flexibility, should your circumstances change and you have to dispose of your asset quickly for any reason.

You could sign a tenant up on a 12 month plus agreement, thinking that you have security for this period, which to a large extent is true, however if the tenants circumstances change, for example with a new job, family or other reasons, it may be quite an emotive issue to hold the tenant to a longer fixed term and as a landlord you have an obligation to try and mitigate your losses in any event.

A special programme of events has been arranged including a demonstration by Andrew Grisewood entitled 'Lets Celebrate in Style' which includes a 'finger buffet'.

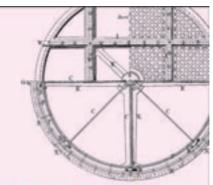
Other events are visits to famous gardens and a flower festival at St. Peters Church, Anlaby in the summer.

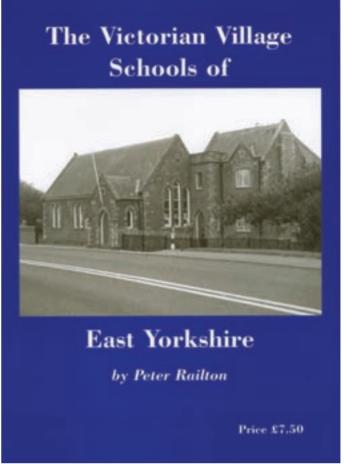
MUSIC LOVERS make a note!

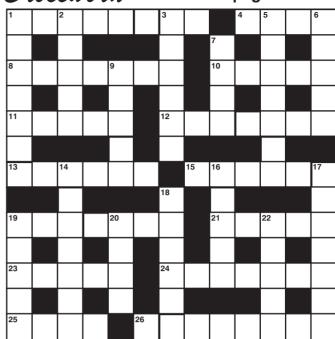

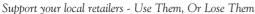
"Far Horizons - famous Hull ships and adventurers"

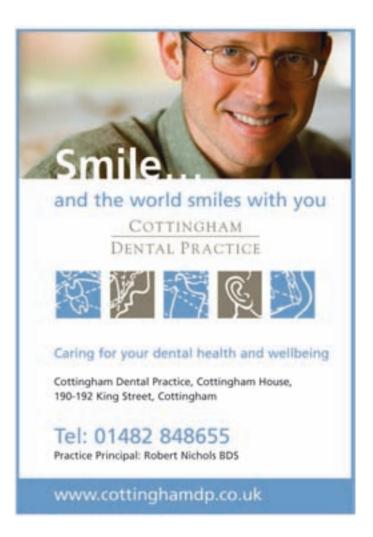
r Robb Robinson gave a fascinating talk on famous Hull personalities to the November meeting of the East Yorkshire Association of the National Trust, in Cottingham Civic Hall. He showed how much more could and should be made of the stories of the lives and achievements of the many pioneering men that have come from Hull and East Yorkshire, ranging from William de la Pole in early Middle Ages to Sir John Ellerman in the 20th century, the shipping magnate who was one of the richest men of his generation in England.

Among the many historic ships built in Hull were the Bounty and the Discovery, but how many of us know the subsequent role played by Llewellyn Longstaff of Hull, who recruited Captain Scott and Ernest Shackleton for the early National Antartic Expedition of 1901 -04, and built the relief ship Morning which rescued them from the frozen ice of Murdo Sound. Similarly, it was Hull sailors who led the way in the search for the North-West passage, starting with Luke Fox in 1631 (commissioned by Charles I) and continuing to the recordbreaking exploits of the Hecla in the early 19th century. Other notable Hull adventurers in North America included Henry Brayfield (1795-1885) who surveyed the Great Lakes, and had two towns named after him, and James Evans, who created the Cree Syllabic Language, whilst working for the Hudson Bay Company, and whose final resting place was as a shrine for the Cree nation.

There were also many local links with the New World 'downunder', from the building of the Alexander, which formed part of the First Fleet that transported convicts to Botany Bay in the 1770s, and the Tranby that carried settlers to Western Australia, where the Hardy family built their own 'Tranby House' farm. Sir John Hall, from Brooke Street in Hull, emigrated to New Zealand, where he became one of their earliest Prime Ministers, and on return to England as an MP led the campaign for votes for women, historically achieved in New Zealand as early as 1894. There were countless other stories retailed by Dr Robinson that really whetted the audience's appetite for his book on the 'Far Horizons' that is due to be published by Blaydes House in 2010 and will hopefully serve to redress our ignorance and undeserved neglect of so many famous sons and daughters of Hull.

Did you know . .

Although food historians agree that some form of pizza has been eaten for centuries in the Mediteranean, the modern day version is believed to have been invented by an Italian baker called Raffaele Esposito, owner of a restaurant in Naples called Pizzeria di Pietro. In 1889 he is purported to have baked a dish which he called "pizza" for the visit of Italian King Umberto I and Queen Margherita.

Pizzas can be as simple or fancy as you like, although after all the rich food you may have consumed over the holiday period, you may be ready for something a little less elaborate.

10 Minute Homemade Pizza Crust (base)

Ingredients
200g/7oz Self Raising Flour
1/4 teasp Salt
1 tbsp Olive Oil
Approx 90ml/3fl.oz. Warm Water

Instructions

- 1. Place the flour, salt, olive oil and water in a large mixing bowl. Mix well with a knife until a dough starts to form then pull together with your fingers, adding a very little more water if necessary to form a firm dough.
- 2. Knead the dough in the bowl for a couple of minutes then turn onto a floured surface and continue to knead for a further 3-4 minutes until you have a firm elastic dough.
- 3. Roll the dough out using a lightly floured rolling pin to a thickness of about 6mm/1/4-inch and place on a large baking tray. If you prefer, you can divide the dough into two pieces and roll each out as above. Top with a tomato sauce and your favourite toppings.

Ingredients:

2 tbsp Olive Oil

1 Onion, sliced

200g/7oz Tomato Pizza Sauce

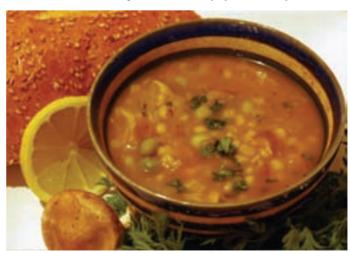

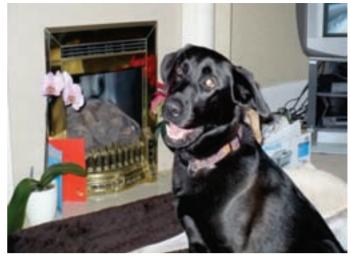


Becky's Christmas Gift
s I write this just before Christmas, with Noddy Holder and Slade's Merry Christmas blaring out from the radio, everyone is getting excited about receiving and giving presents and this year that includes my two year old Labrador Becky, who gave one of the best gifts this week to a very poorly dog, a pint of her blood!

We had a very poorly dog brought in 5 days ago, normally a lively Springer spaniel this young dog was very lethargic and not eating. The first thing that hit us was that he was jaundiced and bloods showed he was anaemic, further investigation led us to believe he had autoimmune haemolytic anaemia, an uncommon but very serious condition where the dogs immune system starts to destroy the dogs own red blood cells. Why does this happen? There are lots of reasons such as lungworm, infectious diseases, but most commonly no identifiable reason. Treatment involves high doses of steroids to stop the animal's immune system doing more damage but it is a race against time as all the time the process of destroying the red blood cells goes on making the animal more anaemic. The normal percentage of red blood cells in dogs blood is 37-45%, this little dog when presented had a haematocrit of 20% and this soon dropped to a dangerous level of 10%, life threatening. It was at this point when Mr Robinson decided a blood transfusion was necessary, so Becky was sent for.

Blood transfusions in veterinary practice are not uncommon to help animals who have perhaps lost a lot of blood in a road accident or from surgical procedures, illnesses such as this spaniel, animals with bleeding disorders such as rat poisoning and haemophiliac dogs. In this case we needed whole blood because we needed to replace the red blood cells that had been destroyed.





What! A whole armful!

For Becky it was just exciting as she got lots of fuss from the nurses. As a donor she needs to be fit and well, up to date with her vaccinations, over 25kg in body weight(no problem for a Labrador) and never having travelled abroad as in Europe there are infectious diseases such as Babesia, Ehrlichia and Leishmaniasis that affect the blood and can remain dormant

The procedure for getting the blood is painless and quick. In dogs we use the jugular vein in the neck which is very accessible (not an armful as Tony Hancock would say, am I showing my age?). Local anaesthetic is put in the skin and the vein cannulised and within 10 minutes we have 460ml of Labrador blood in a special anticoagulant bag ready for the recipient.

What about blood groups you say? Well dogs do have blood groups and Becky has been blood typed to see which blood group she has. However, in emergency situations such as this dogs can receive a blood transfusion from any blood group with minimal risk, however if further blood is needed then both donor and recipient will need typing for compatibility. As it happens both Becky and the dog have the same blood group.

Our pint of Labrador blood is then given very slowly to the dog through a vein in the forearm, while this is happening over about 2 hours, the dog is constantly monitored by one of our veterinary nurses, looking for any anaphylactic (allergic) reaction, with pulse and respiration monitored constantly.

As we write the dog has stabilised, Becky's blood doubled the dog's haematocit from 10 to 20% and this has stayed stable for 3 days and despite being so poorly he is very bright, he has a long way to go yet, but so far so

As a practice we have several donor dogs who we can call on, as should this dog need more blood we will need to have the same blood group and Becky cannot give blood again for 3 months. If we cannot use any of our own donor dogs, there is now a national blood bank for dogs based at Loughborough. This can supply either full blood or just red blood cells for dogs that have haemorrhaged plasma and clotting products. By splitting the blood up it can be stored better frozen and last longer and each blood donation can help more than one dog.

Bloods transfusions in cats are not as common a procedure as in dogs. This is for several reasons, cats can have several serious viral diseases and unless the cats are tested prior to giving blood and stay indoors permanently, their disease status can change. Cats also have far greater risks when receiving blood transfusions and always needs compatible donor and recip-

Imaginative, Creative and Ingenious

Last time I delved back in time a bit to see how the problem of missing teeth was tackled way back when. We mainly looked at replacing missing teeth with implantations of different sorts. Some were very imaginative, creative and ingenious and sometimes a bit mad

A Bridge Too Far?

Dental bridges are not new, not by a long way. There have been bridges discovered dating back to the fourth or fifth century B.C. One such bridge was found in Sidon, chief city of ancient Phoenicia. The Phoenicians were a people contemporary with the ancient Egyptians and Hebrews and lived in what is now modern day Lebanon. The bridge had four natural human incisor teeth with two carved ivory teeth between them. These 'teeth' were bound together with gold wire.

The Etruscans also were very adept in the art of dental prosthesis. Here again there have been dental findings dating back to 500 B.C. Soft gold bands where fitted around natural teeth. The false teeth were fastened to the bands with rivets. The false teeth (pontics to use the dental jargon) were made up of human teeth with the roots cut off or more often oxen teeth. In some cases a groove would be made down the middle of a wide ox's tooth to make it look like two teeth. Absolutely ingenious. These guys must have had some time on their hands, not like the 100 miles an hour of 21st century living, eh?

Elephant, Hippopotamus Or Walrus, The Choice Is Yours

Over the years dentures have been made out of different materials including ivory, gold, stainless steel, cobalt-chromium, vulcanised rubber and acrylic. The teeth on the denture made from ivory, natural teeth, porcelain and acrylic. The ivory that was meticulously carved came from different sources. Namely elephant, hippopotamus or walrus. Each type of ivory had its own characteristics in terms of grain and texture. There is evidence of ivory being used for dentures as far back as Roman times.

Would You Like Springs With That Sir?

One famous denture wearer was the American President George Washington. He was plagued by toothache and abscesses for many years and only had one tooth left by the time of his inauguration. He had several dentures made by the best people of the time and had them made from the whole range of materials available. His last set was made by John Greenwood. The upper palate was swaged from a sheet of gold and had ivory teeth riveted to it. The lower denture was carved from a single block of ivory. The two dentures were fastened together by a steel spring! I bet that took some getting used to. I also bet that you can't get them on the NHS. How much do you think that would cost now?

So there you go, another little jaunt back in time to dental practice of bygone eras.

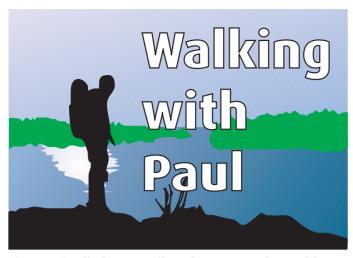

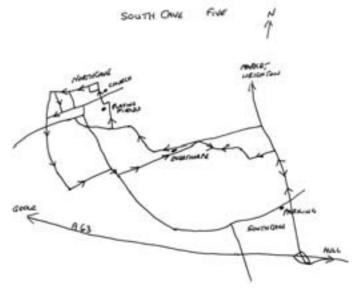
right and walk with a hedge on the left. At the next corner of the field, turn left and cross over a plank bridge and stile. Then walk across the field heading for a short length of hedge row and keep this on the right. At the end of this short hedge row, continue straight across the next field on a well defined path.

Pass through a kissing gate and turn right with the hedge on your left. After a short distance turn left and pass through a kissing gate and walk with a fence on the left and a hedge on the right. After a short distance pass through a kissing gate on the right and emerge onto the Everthorpe road and turn left. At the fork, bear left and then take the first surfaced lane on the right to once again bring you onto the main Everthorpe/North Cave road.

Just before entering North Cave, turn right and head across a field towards the football grounds and then leave the ground by way of a childrens play area and car park to emerge on the road in North Cave. Cross the road and pass the church and cemetery on the right.

Immediately before the bridge, turn left and pass through a kissing gate and walk down the path with the stream on the right. Cross over a foot bridge where the stream passes under a building and walk up a loose stone drive to emerge on a road. Turn left on reaching this road and after about 400 metres locate a way marked footpath on the left and take this path. When the path forks, take the right fork and then pass through a kissing gate to emerge on Blossoms Lane. Cross this lane and pass through a kissing gate and walk with the stream on the left. Pass through another kissing gate eventually to emerge on a road. Turn left and follow this road again with the stream on the left.

On reaching the main road, cross the road and continue walking in the same direction down a wide lane known as Low Mill Lane. Pass under the old railway bridge. This lane eventually becomes a tarmac lane and shortly after follow the road as it sweeps sharp left passing the Everthorpe Prison over to the right. On reaching the road from North Cave to South Cave, turn right and then after about 50 metres, turn left and follow this road into Everthorpe. Shortly after leaving the village locate the footpath earlier used and retrace the route back to South Cave.

In the Garden



In January, your garden could need protecting from frosts, gale-force winds and heavy rain. Check stakes, ties, fleeces and other supports for damage and consider moving plants to sunnier positions to maximize light. Don't forget to keep feeding the birds, food is scarce for them over winter.

Prepare soil: Although you need to stay off your plot if it is soggy wet, when it dries out, get out and start digging it over, spreading organic matter and incorporating green manure. The more you can do now, the better off you'll be in spring.

Clear away old crops: It's a good time to pick over the plot and

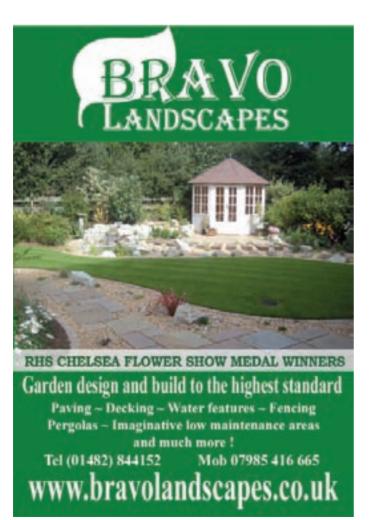

remove any old, decaying crops. Throw the debris on the compost heap, or if it is diseased, burn it or dispose in some other way.

Planning ahead

Plans for later in the year's cropping can be drawn up and seeds and other planting material ordered in good time. It is also worth getting in sufficient canes, stakes, netting, fertiliser and pesticides to save time later. Mail order suppliers and gardening clubs and societies can offer significant savings over retail outlets.

When seeds arrive make a seed organiser and store the seed in cool, dark dry conditions. Potato tubers can be laid out to sprout or 'chit' in late winter. Clean out and wash seed trays, pots and other containers ready for seed sowing in the spring.

Soil preparation

Digging over vacant ground, spreading organic manures, incorporating green manures, checking the pH and adding lime if required and generally giving your soil some attention should get it in the best condition for an early start in spring.

Sandy soils are usually best left until the spring, otherwise they can have lots of nutrients washed out of them.

Once the soil is in good condition and sufficiently moist it can be covered with a polythene sheet or cloches to keep it ready for sowing. Clear sheeting and cloches will also warm up the soil, but you have to be prepared to do a little weeding. Black polythene doesn't warm up the soil as much, but does prevent weed growth.

If the compost in compost bins is ready the bins can be emptied and the compost spread over the soil or dug in. If it's not ready the contents can be mixed again and the bins refilled.

Top 10 jobs

- 1. Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch
- 2. Ventilate the greenhouse on sunny days
- 3. Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already
- 4. Repair and re-shape lawn edges
- 5. Inspect stored tubers of Dahlia, Begonia and Canna for rots or drying out
- 6. Prune apple and pear trees
- 7. Start forcing rhubarb
- 8. Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season
- 9. Keep putting out food and water for hungry birds
- 10. Prepare a polythene shelter for outdoor peaches and nectarines, to protect them from peach leaf curl.

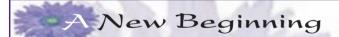

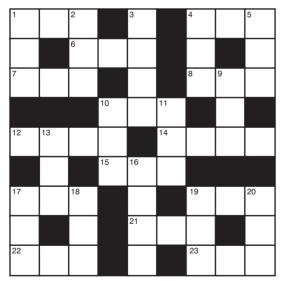

Winter Blues

The weather is always a good topic of conversation whoever you are and whatever you do. For those of us who choose to work outside it has an extra, hugely horrid impact when the weather is bad! In all the years I have been working with horses or on farms in general, I have simply never known the land to be so drenched and so damaged as it is this year. The gateways and access points are literally knee deep in mud. Trying to get the large Haylage bales out across land to horses that are wintering out, is like an army expedition each and every time! The tractors sink as soon as they enter the field and the ensuing mess is enough to break your heart!

As dismal as the conditions are now, the good lord usually allows us the opportunity to heal the land come spring and summer. What appears a vision of desolation in mud now will bounce back to life come late spring time. That thought is sometimes the only thing that makes me feel better when I am on my mobile phone beseeching someone to please pull me and my tractor out of the field as I are stuck fast (again!)

The horses themselves do surprisingly well as a rule. Providing they are supplied with supplementary fodder in the

form of adlib Hay, Haylage and, or, hard feed if needed as well, then they have no reason not to thrive. They however, just like us, hate the wind and the rain. They shelter themselves against a tall hedge, backsides to the weather and their heads down! In that position they will patiently wait for the rain to pass, though the sight of them always brings the words THOROUGHLY DEDJECTED to mind!!

For my part, I always have my horses wearing thick waterproof rugs.....sometimes 2 as is the case right now. These keep my animals warm and dry (as well as making me feel less guilty that they are not in nice warm, dry stables!)

There are some health issues associated with wintering horses out. Vigilance on the part of the carer is essential to keep the risks to a minimum. If a horse sustains a cut in a wet and muddy environment, then the chances are that it will get infected. Daily attention with first aid will hopefully be enough to allow a good heal to take place.....all dependant on the severity of the cut of cause. Sometimes the animal has to be given a coarse of antibiotics and, or brought back inside for the time it takes to heal.

Other ailments associated with these horrid conditions are "Mud Fever" and "Thrush". The first affects the skin on the leg which breaks down as a result of being constantly covered in thick wet mud. The skin becomes open to a fungal infection which becomes very painful, the leg swells and the skin becomes encrusted with deep scabs. These scabs become the umbrella for the bugs to live under and hence have to be removed. The affected horse needs to come in for a few weeks to be nursed.

The second ailment "Trush" affects the underside of the foot. This is basically a foot rot as with sheep and cattle. A mixture of both these ailments was the torture which our soldiers suffered as "Trench Foot" during the First World War. Totally impossible to treat effectively in such conditions but hopefully one can keep under a measure of control (or again bring the horse in to a dry environment with daily treatment.)

Different breeds of horses cope better than others. Obviously the hardy Native type horse is better armed to thrive than say a Thoroughbred. However, if the carer provides adequate forage and is diligent in their observations then it merely needs a hand from a "Higher Power" to help improve the lot of the wintering out horse!

On that note I will leave you with a picture of my little herd doing what they do best.....eating! I hope that you all had a lovely Christmas and I wish every one a happy, successful and DRY New Year!!!!

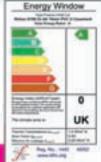

Talk given to the East Yorkshire National Trust Association on "Treasurer's House - York"

r. Tomlinson has been a volunteer guide at Treasurer's House for 16 years. He began with the history of the house. It was the House of the Treasurer of York Minster until the dissolution of the monasteries in 1547, and is close to the North East end of York Minster. Initially it consisted of three sides of which only one is left. It is based on Roman foundations and can claim the oldest ghosts in the Country.

In 1953 an apprentice plumber working in the cellar saw a troop of Roman legionaries, the leader on horseback coming through the wall at the level (unknown to him) of the original Roman road. From his description of what he saw, experts thought they were Auxiliary troops of about 390AD.

By 1897 the house was split into three properties, one was bought by Mr Frank Green, who quickly acquired the other two and with his architect Temple Moore began restoring the house and decided to return it to its seventeenth century shape.

Mr Green's Grandfather was a Wakefield engineer who invented the "Green's Economiser" which took the waste gases from boilers to pre-heat the incoming water, giving a saving of 20% in fuel cost. This made the family fortune.

The house as seen today is very much the creation of Frank Green, who left it to the Trust in 1930, and was the first house given to the Trust complete with contents. It has been kept very much as it was when he left it. We were given a tour on slide from room to room by Mr Tomlinson, showing points of interest as we went. From the studs, Frank Green put in the floors to mark where the furniture should be placed, to the Grand Hall he created from four other rooms. He treated the rest of the house in much the same way, a framework for his idea of a historic house. Each room would emphasise a different period, Tudor, Restoration, Queen Anne, Georgian, etc. and illustrate the history of the house, on which he did much research.

The house was used as a show piece for his continually growing collection of fine furniture, paintings, textiles, and porcelain. Family portraits, including three of himself, together with a copy of Van Dyck's portrait of Charles I in the Louvre, and one of Prince Charles Louis (Prince Rupert's brother) were some of the paintings shown.

The garden is having a make over this winter which will include tulip planting by visitors and volunteers, their planting will be recorded and they will be notified when their bulbs are coming into flower in the Spring. A quince tree, which was to have been pulled out a few years ago, suddenly began producing fruit abundantly, so it has been given a reprieve, and the fruit put to good use.

The speaker was thanked for an interesting and entertaining talk.

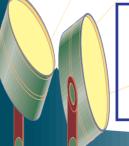
Social Events

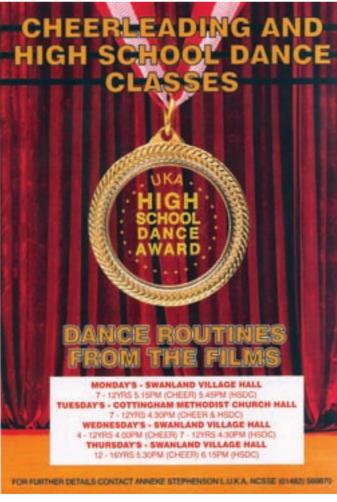

Hallgate Schools - continued

January 1920 to December 1920

chools reopened on the 5th January 1920 - a new decade and, as we have seen, affected the civilisation population through air raids and various shortages and sadly resulted in the loss and maiming of many ex-scholars of the boys' school. A letter was received at the end of 1919 from the government, thanking the head teachers and staff and particularly the pupils, for their 'magnificent contribution' to the war effort through the appeals of the Ministry of Propellents! Evidently that section of the war department had appealed for as many 'conkers' - horse chestnuts - as children could find, bag them up over the few weeks of the season and the local authority would come to the school and collect them.

It appears that the humble conker contains acetone which is a constituent of cordite used in the manufacture of artillery shells. The playing of conkers was strictly forbidden by the headteachers and despite the initial disappointment of the boys, a 'great number of sacks' went to munitions factories in 1917 and 18. A late but welcome recognition of local efforts which was emulated in many other schools.

Measles Epidemic

The infant department remained closed when school began in January due to an epidemic of measles which hit both of the other departments; 191 boys were present out of 238 on roll and there were similar comparisons in the girls' school. Miss Whitehead stepped into the breech again, taking classes in both girls' and boys' schools as teachers went down with the flu' this remarkable lady who taught at Hallgate for several decades was a tower of strength, well remembered and well liked by an older generation of ex-Hallgate scholars today.

Early spring of 1920 saw gales of wind. In the infant department-

"There is such a strong west wind blowing that the danger of doors banging is with us again. This noon one of the side doors clashed to and four panes of the glass were shattered." "Work rather distracting today. Only one door available for assembly and dismissal. Mrs Stephenson still ill and unable to get to school, several new scholars who are homesick and require mothering, bank bigger than ever, and a general bustle!"

In the boys' school football was stopped in the school yard on account of damage to the crops in the garden. Mr. Lacy was appointed to the school and took St. III in place of Mrs Heaton. On the 16th February a meeting was held in the Head's room between Mr Moorby and messes Bickersteth, Whitehead and Sergent, all County Council Inspectors, to discuss the provision for advanced education for boys and girls from 12 to 16 years.

The Need for Secondary Education

This was very significant and foreshadowed the coming into being of a report identifying the need for a secondary type of education in the then elementary schools. This was the first step on the long road to the secondary modern schools and will be referred to as appropriate later.

Mr Moorby was ill again in March when three tons of farm manure was delivered for the gardens and allotments, plus eight stone of seed potatoes, a gift from E Hatfield an old scholar.

A girls' class 1920

Members of the dance class held in the school were in trouble again - one of them took the school hand bell from the corridor and some members of the group threw fish and chip papers around in the school yard!

Beverley Girls' High School notified Mrs Holmes of a forthcoming scholarship exam at the school and eight girls were entered for it but only three attended - Jennie Wright, Dorothy Crown and Murial Padgett. Conditional Exemption Certificate s were granted to Annie Stabler and Elsie Johnson in March.

Forerunner to Teacher's Courses

Mrs Tether returned to school after a very long absence and Mrs Raper, the supply teacher was sent elsewhere. On the 30th June the girls' department all went on a day's excursion to Bridlington which was organised by the Weslyan Sunday School. A tentative but important step forward is recorded on Friday the 1st October when the department closed again and the staff en-trained for Driffield to attend a lecture and display on physical education at the Council School there. This was a forerunner of teachers' courses and marked the transition of schooling into modern times - contacts established between teachers of different schools - exchanges of ideas - advances in teaching methods - new ideas gathering momentum after the Great War and a general moving forward, leaving many of the traditional methods behind - but not all!

In December Mrs Holmes records that,

"Standard VII is becoming quite small as girls are applying for the Conditional Exemption Certificate and are leaving school on attaining the age of fourteen years."

Crops of shallots, cabbage, lettuce, turnips, peas and potatoes were sown or planted by the older boys in April just before heavy rain made the ground too wet to cultivate. Dr Watson, for many years the schools M.O.H., died in April and Mr Moorby

attended his funeral although he was "far from well". June was a hot month and had it effects on school work, but attendance were good, 95% for the whole month.

Three Standard VI boys, J Bursell, C Wray and E Leedham were awarded prizes for paintings at the Cottingham Flower Show. Forty eight boys were admitted from the infants department in July; Miss Youngson was away ill and Miss Hardy 'a student in training' took Standard V. - the Miss Hardy also well remembered and well liked by elder ex-scholars. Four new boys were admitted at the same time - F Bourne from Raywell and three brothers named Rookes from Wood House farm. The garden crops were harvested as the season advanced and either sold or stored in sand in wooden crates temporally.

Mr Moorby taught tow new songs to the older boys - "Oh, Oh, hear the wild wind blow." and "Lone, Lone, is he deep." The songs taught were still very old fashioned and were not much better in the 1940's - the choice of songs seems to have been limited, either by availability or preference.

On 20th September the older boys had a game of cricket on the Devon Street pitch under the supervision of Mr Cooke, who left the school in October to teach in London - 'a distinct loss to the school' recorded Mr Moorby, who was left to teach 80 boys on his own as,

"It appears impossible to get teachers to accept service in spite of the new scales of salary."

His voice failed completely and Mrs Moorby went to help out and took Standard IV., and Standards V, and VI. were amalgamated for the time being. Due to staff shortages it was impossible to conduct the usual quarterly exams that autumn no doubt the boys would have been deeply grateful and the teachers in all departments glad when the schools closed on Christmas Eve after the usual Christmas songs and carols drew the year of 1920 to a close.

ear after year we make resolutions to exercise regularly, eat well, and give up smoking and other bad habits. Following such basic rules can cut heart disease risk by 80 percent, diabetes risk by 90 percent and cancer risk by 50 percent, according to Health Studies. But most of us fail to keep our promises to ourselves.

Wear a pedometer. New research suggests that routinely wearing a pedometer encourages people to walk about an extra mile each day, lose weight, and lower their blood pressure. Aim for at least 30 minutes of brisk walking and a total of 10,000 steps per day.

Eat at least two fish meals per week: The evidence is strong that the oils in darker types of fish, such as salmon, tuna, mackerel and herring, are beneficial for the heart and brain and may even lower risk of cancer.

Drink water: No matter where you are, water should always be the first thing you reach for when you're thirsty. Water truly is essential.

Sleep Eight hours a night: A number of recent studies have confirmed that you really do need at least eight hours a night. Among the many benefits: Adequate sleep makes you feel better, decreases risk for cardiovascular disease and boosts memory.

Keep sugar and caffeine to a minimum: It's hard to believe, but decreasing sugar actually increases people's energy, by minimizing the highs and lows that sweet foods triggers. Different people react differently to caffeine, but most of us are probably overstimulated already

Consider acupuncture and massage: as valid therapies for chronic problems, such as back pain or as a preventative measure

Don't focus on dieting: Focus on eating healthy. If you're hungry, you're more likely to overeat, especially in the evening. Instead, of sacrificing all day and gorging later, it's better to eat enough during the day to avoid hunger pangs and uncontrolled eating at night. Eat every four hours or so.
