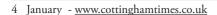

### Help to Buy: the difference between Developer, Government

and the Bank - Helen Cherry, Solicitor at Graham & Rosen (www.graham-rosen.co.uk) explains the key aspects of "Help to Buy" schemes



Buying your first home can be a daunting prospect, with the ever-growing process it can sometimes seem out of your reach to save enough for a 10% deposit, which most Bank's require for a residential mortgage.

"Help to Buy" appears to be a phrase used more and more in trying to entice first time buyers onto the property ladder, but what does this really mean and is it misleading

There are two very different types of "Help to Buy." The first is the Government backed scheme whereby a group of high street lenders have agreed to give buyers a 95% mortgage if they can pay a 5% deposit, the Government then guarantees 15% of the property's value. This guarantee sits behind the scenes and allows banks to purchase a guarantee from the Government for a higher amount than the buyer can afford. There are currently 13 lenders who have signed up to this including Barclays, Halifax and HSBC, each lender has their own criteria which includes that the property must be your primary residence (not buy to let) and the property is under the lenders top value (£600,000 in some cases).

The second "Help to Buy" scheme is very different, this is offered on new build properties only and requires the buyer to pay a 5% deposit, obtain a high street mortgage for 75% value of the property and agree to a second mortgage from the developer for 20% of the value of the property. This means that you will have two registered mortgages against the property and will be paying two separate monthly mortgage repayments. A condition of this second mortgage may mean that you do not pay any interest for the first five years; however the interest rates increase yearly thereafter and your monthly repayments could escalate so that you find it increasingly difficult to keep up with repayments which could lead to your property being repossessed.

Each scheme has its pros and cons and may well be the only way to enable you to buy your dream home but think very carefully before proceeding and separate the facts from the fiction of "Help to Buy."

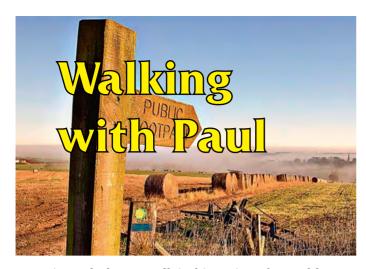

Here is Paul's latest walk in his series of monthly rambles.

### This month his destination is Walkington to Skidby

The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.

### WALKINGTON TO SKIDBY.

Maps:- EXPLORER 293

Start at GR. SE997371 Bus stop near Dog and Duck pub. Walkington.
Distance 3.3 Miles.

From the bus stop adjacent to the Dog & Duck public house, cross the road and walk up Kirk Lane to the junction and turn left to walk along the path at the back of the church. After about 200 metres take the path on the right and walk in a southerly direction along a wide path with horse paddocks on your right.

Pass through a Kissing Gate and enter a wider track then pass through the next gates(or cross the stile if gates closed) and enter a field and walk diagonally to the right across this field.

This field rises slightly and in the top right corner locate a kissing gate and pass through this gate onto a farm track. Turn right and follow the track as it skirts round Halfpenny Cottages. On reaching the surfaced road, turn left and follow the road to Risby Park Farm. As the road swings sharp right continue straight ahead along a farm track. Pass through the next gate to emerge on the Bentley to Little Weighton road and turn left.

After about 450 metres locate a path on the right and take this as it heads in a south easterly direction with the hedge on the right. On reaching the field corner, turn left keeping the hedge on the right for about 150 metres then pass through the hedge and walk in a Southerly direction and follow this path as it swings first left then right under power cables and emerge on the Skidby to Little Weighton road. Follow this road to a suitable bus stop in Skidby.

### How I did it.

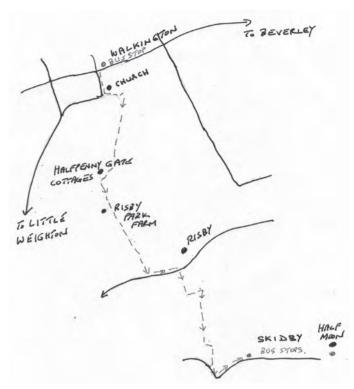
Bus No. 61 from Hull Interchange at 9.08am to Walkington arriving at 10.03am.

Walk to Skidby arriving at 11.35am (just missing the 11.24am bus)

Boarded Bus No. 180 at Skidby to Cottingham at 12.24pm arriving at Cottingham at 12.32pm and changed to Bus No. 105 at 12.40pm for Hull Interchange.

Note that several buses run from Cottingham to Hull at approximately 10 minute intervals.

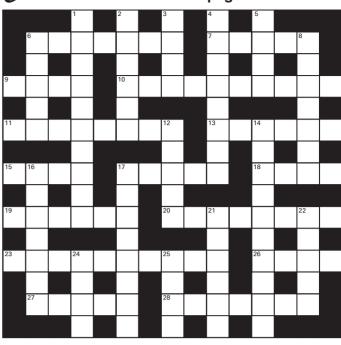

### **Chicken and Sweet Potato Casserole** with Polenta

This quick to prepare family casserole is bound to become a favourite. The sweet potatoes add a sweet, rich flavour and vivid colour to the tender pieces of British chicken. The polenta and herb dumplings are light and absorb the flavour of the casserole.

- Preparation time: 10 minutes Cooking time: 45 minutes
- Serves: 4

### **Ingredients**

- Freshly ground pepper
- 1tbsp vegetable oil
- 1 medium onion, peeled and finely chopped
- 1 pack Waitrose 8 Fresh Chicken Thighs, skin removed
- $\bullet$  500g sweet potatoes, peeled and slice into one centimetre thick rounds
  - Salt
  - 100g polenta
  - 50g vegetable suet
  - Small bunch of fresh parsley or basil, chopped

### Spicy cottage pie with sweet potato mash

- Preparation time: 20 minutes Cooking time: 60 minutes
- Serves: 4

### **Ingredients**

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 1 medium carrot, diced
- 2 medium leeks, thinly sliced
- 450g Waitrose Aberdeen Angus Beef Lean Mince (10% fat)
- 1 tbsp smoked paprika
- 1 tsp ground cumin
- 2 tbsp tomato ketchup
- 4–5 tbsp chopped, flat-leaf parsley
- 500ml beef stock
- 750g floury potatoes, peeled and cubed
- 350g sweet potatoes, peeled and sliced
- 30g butter

### Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200°C, gas mark 6. Heat the oil in a non-stick frying pan and cook the onion, carrot and leek for 3–4 minutes until softened. Add the mince, break up with a fork, and fry for a few minutes until lightly browned. Stir in the paprika, cumin, ketchup and parsley. Add the stock and seasoning and bring to the boil. Simmer, half covered, for 25–30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Transfer to a 2-litre shallow ovenproof dish.
- 2. While the mince is cooking, put all of both types of potatoes in a pan with cold water to just cover. Bring to the boil and simmer for 10–15 minutes until tender. Drain thoroughly, then return them to the pan and mash with the butter and seasoning until smooth.
- 3. Spoon over the top of the mince mixture. Rough up the surface with a fork. Bake for 25–30 minutes until golden. Great served with peas or broccoli.

### Thai fishcakes

These make a wonderful starter or a light lunch with salad. Try using any white fish or white crabmeat instead of the prawns, and add half a chopped chilli to give an extra kick

Preparation time: 10 minutes
Cooking time: 12 minutes
Total time: 22 minutes
Serves: 4 as a starter

### **Ingredients**

2 Cooks' Ingredients Kaffir Lime Leaves 50g trimmed fine green beans, finely sliced 250g cod fillet

150g pack raw king prawns

1 tbsp Cooks' Ingredients Thai Red Curry Paste

1 medium egg

1 tsp Cooks' Ingredients Nam Pla Fish Sauce

25g plain flour

1 tbsp oil

1 tbsp chopped coriander

3-4 tbsp Blue Dragon Sweet Chilli Dipping Sauce

### Method

- 1. Soak the kaffir lime leaves in a little boiling water for 2 minutes, drain and finely chop. Cook the beans in boiling water for 1 minute until just tender.
- 2. Place the cod, prawns, curry paste, egg, fish sauce, flour and kaffir lime leaves in a food processor and blitz to give a coarse paste, then season. Stir in the beans.
- 3. With wet hands, mould into 12 fishcakes. Heat the oil in a large frying pan and fry in 2 batches for 2-3 minutes on each side until golden and cooked throughout. Serve sprinkled with coriander and the dipping sauce on the side.

### Carrot cake

Fragrant orange zest, warming spices and molasses flavours from the brown sugar make this cake the perfect teatime treat. And as with all vegetable cakes, we always feel less guilty when going back for another piece.

### **Ingredients**

300ml sunflower oil, plus extra for greasing 100g walnut halves 350g dark brown soft sugar 5 eggs

350g self-raising flour
2 tsp ground cinnamon
1/2 tsp ground cloves
1/2 nutmeg, grated
1 tsp ground ginger
1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
1/2 tsp salt
250g carrots, peeled and roughly grated
1/2 orange, zest

### For the cream cheese icing:

150g unsalted butter, softened 225g icing sugar 600g full-fat Philadelphia soft cheese 1/2 orange, zest and 1 tbsp juice

### Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C, gas mark 4. Grease and line a deep 20cm x 30cm baking tray with parchment paper; make sure that the paper comes 2-3cm above the sides of the tin. Toast the walnuts in the oven for 10 minutes; turn halfway. Cool, chop roughly and set aside.
- 2. Whisk together the oil, brown sugar and eggs until smooth. In a separate bowl, mix the flour, spices, bicarbonate of soda and salt, then beat into the wet mixture. Stir in the grated carrot, orange zest and chopped walnuts until well mixed.
- 3. Pour into the tin and bake for 30-35 minutes until golden and a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean (cover the cake with foil if it starts to brown too quickly). Once cooked, leave in the tin for 5 minutes, then invert onto a wire rack and cool completely.
- 4. For the icing, use electric beaters to beat the butter and icing sugar together until light and fluffy. Add the soft cheese, mix for a few seconds, then beat in the orange zest and juice. Use a palette knife to spread over the cooled cake and serve.

### A selection of wines for the New Year

can't believe we're at the start of a New Year already, but hopefully you all enjoyed a great Christmas, along with some superb food and wine.

Toasting the beginning of 2016 will, of course, have been another good opportunity to open a bottle of fizz, so I make no apologies for returning to the subject of Champagne again, which has been dominating the trade headlines for the past couple of weeks.

The big news, and something that would have been unimaginable just a few short years ago, was that famous Champagne house. Taittinger, subject of one of last month's best buys. announced it was to establish vineyards in the UK to produce "premium" sparkling wines.

Taittinger has purchased a former 69 hectare orchard close to Canterbury and will plant Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier - a combination of all or some of these grapes are traditionally used to make Champagne.

According to Pierre-Emanuel Taittinger, president of the Champagne house, the plots have an "ideal terroir" for produce sparkling wine, although he was careful to say the English fizz should not be directly compared to Champagne - something which established English producers like Nyetimber will, I'm sure, dispute

'Our aim is to make something of real excellence in the UK's increasingly temperate climate, and not to compare it with Champagne or any other sparkling wine," he said.

It is estimated that planting will begin in May 2017, although it could start as quickly as May of next year. However, the first wines will likely not be seen on the market until the mid to late 2020s.

Meanwhile, I was interested to also see that the rising quality of English wine is being continually praised. A blind tasting in October saw two wines from English producers Nyetimber and Hambledon coming top in a contest featuring sparklers from Veuve Clicquot, Pol Roger and Taittinger.

English vineyards are forecast to double in capacity and production over the next seven years, according to trade group English Wine Producers; not surprising when you consider Waitrose report that sales of English sparkling wine enjoyed it's biggest year yet in the run up to Christmas. Year on year sales of west Sussex-based sparkler Nyetimber were up by a staggering 393 per cent, according to the supermarket.

\* On a separate topic, it's been revealed that sales of Fairtrade wine have hit an all-time high, with global sales reaching almost 30 million bottles a year, according to a new report issued by the Co-op.

The report, entitled "Behind the Label", looks at the winning formula of Fairtrade wine. The UK Fairtrade wine market is currently in growth - up by nine per cent, with 78 per cent of Brits saying they would buy a bottle of fairly-traded wine.

The Co-op has been leading the way with fairly-traded wine since launching the UK's first own-label bottle in 2000 - before the Fairtrade mark was established. Since then, the competition has expanded with all major retailers now stocking Fairtrade wine.

Michael Gidney, chief executive of the Fairtrade Foundation, said: "The Co-operative's long-standing commitment to Fairtrade wine has changed the lives of wine producers in South Africa and South America, by ensuring they earn a fair price and are supported to build a better, brighter future for their families and their communities.

"What's more, the Co-op has gone further, investing extra funds in its wine-growing communities to help build health clinics, provide access to clean water, enable children to go to school, and much more."

\* Another recent report shows that the country with the highest average price in the UK for a bottle of wine is New Zealand. Its wines sell for an average of £7.37, above the overall UK average which is now £5.46.

New Zealand is the leading country in the UK in more "premium" categories, in particular the £7-£8 bracket where it has grown 23 per cent year on year and in all price categories over £7. New Zealand is now second to France in both volume and value.

Overall, while the UK wine market declined two per cent last year, New Zealand saw a 10 per cent increase. Sauvignon Blanc remains the most popular New Zealand wine with UK consumers and New Zealand is growing its share of total Sauvignon Blanc sales with a 39 per cent market share.

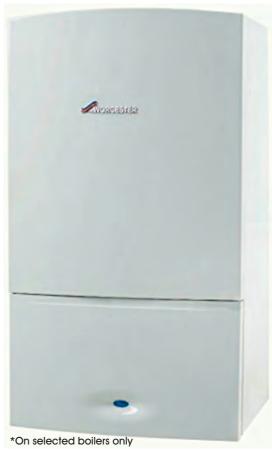

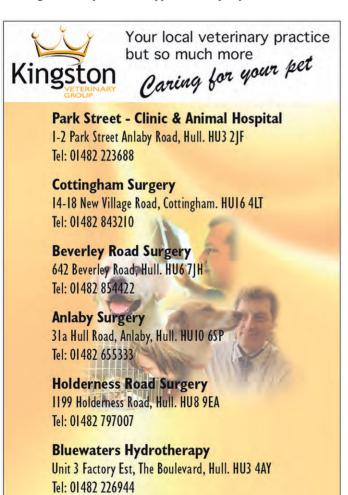


Reunited by just a chip!!

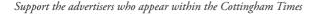

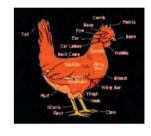
In 1931 a jaw bone was found in Honduras. It was believed to be the jaw of a Mayan. The Mayas were a very sophisticated ancient society originating in about 2500 B.C. They reached their cultural heights in from about 300 A.D. to about 900 A.D. The find was believed to be from about 600A.D. The



jaw has three pieces of shell that had been shaped into a wedge design and been implanted into the lower jaw to replace some missing incisor teeth. Two of the shell implants had evidence of bone growing around them. I doubt that the long term success rates where that great though. Many different types of materials have been used to implant into the jaws to try and replace missing teeth including shell, ivory, bone and teeth from dead and living animals and humans. There was no modern anaesthesia/analgesia back then so a whole lot of hypnotherapy would have been needed. Mind you I don't know what 'herbs' would have been available back then.

### A Rooster With A Tooth In Its Comb!

In the 18th century John Hunt, one of the greatest surgeons of his time, performed an experiment. He transplanted a 'living' human tooth whose root had not yet fully developed (i.e. a child's tooth) into the comb of a live cockerel. The blood vessels from the cockerel grew into the tooth and



it became firmly rooted into the comb. **Now get this bit!** Hunter then advocated that when a tooth was to be transplanted into the socket of a missing tooth that there should be several young donors present. If the first tooth extracted from a child donor did not fit the socket the socket then one from the next donor would be tried and so on until a good fit was achieved. The practice died out after repeated reports of failure and the transmission of disease had been recognised, especially syphilis.

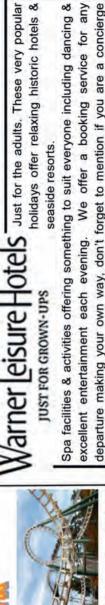

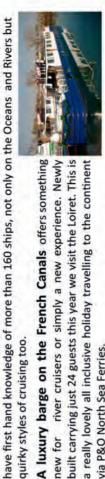

In January, your garden could need protecting from frosts, gale-force winds and heavy rain. Check stakes, ties, fleeces and other supports for damage and consider moving plants to sunnier positions to maximize light. Don't forget to keep feeding the birds; food is scarce for them over winter.

Newly arrived bare root roses and fruit trees can be "heeled in" by covering the roots in compost in a container in a cool, frost-free place until the ground defrosts.

It is fine to prune fruit trees in frosty weather. If it's when you have most time, prune hardy foliage plants now, too.

Remove any snow-damaged branches from shrubs and small trees, cutting cleanly back to a healthy branch or the trunk. Partly broken branches you can try to wrap or bolt together, but they are highly unlikely to rejoin and may attract fungal problems.

There's no need to clear ice from ponds. Oxygen will still be available for wildlife and plants. Fish may benefit from extra oxygen, so keep the pump running to prevent freezing.

Control small flies (fungus gnats) in houseplant compost by applying Westland Plant Rescue Bug Killer Ornamental Plants as a compost drench.



### Get kids into the garden

Gardening isn't just for grown-ups, just for summer or just for those with gardens. There are hundreds of ways children can have fun both in and outdoors, all year round. From miniature gardens to planting bulbs, from weeding and digging alongside adults to having a little spot all of their own – gardening can occupy them for hours and even help you out.

A good way to get children interested in gardening is to stimulate their senses with brightly coloured flowers, aromatic foliage, scented blooms, tactile leaves and fast-cropping edible plants. It may be necessary for you to explain things initially, making suggestions and putting forward ideas, but in the end the child should feel it's his or her project. And don't worry if you're a beginner yourself – gardening with children is the perfect excuse to go back to the drawing board together!

### **Helping Out**

Smaller children love to get really messy, but you can turn it to your advantage by getting them to help you with digging, weeding and watering.

Very small children may be scared of the creatures that live in the garden, so it's worth spending some time explaining what they do. Soon they'll be merrily collecting them in jars. You can explain:

- A weed is really an 'ugly' plant in the wrong place. Because they compete for food in the soil, it's best to pull them up. Take care to show children which are weeds, or precious plants could come a cropper!
- Some weeds, like dandelions, have deeper roots than others and are a bit difficult to dig up. Start with those that are easily lifted.
- Digging and forking the soil lets in the air which is important for the plants' roots and for all the animals living in the soil.
- To prepare the soil for a flowerbed, you have to turn over down to a depth of about 30cm and break up all the large lumps, adding organic matter, such as well rotted manure or compost.

Once a child is happy digging and weeding, they're all set to prepare a small garden of their own.



### **Spring Seeds**

- Seeds that can be planted straight into the ground and produce fast growing, brightly-coloured flowers are best, as a few weeks can seem years to a child. Look for candytuft, nasturtiums, stocks and sweet peas and packets that say 'easy' or 'good for children'. Big tree seeds, like acorns, conkers and sycamore wings are ideal for young children.
- Use a stick to dig a trench 2cm deep and place large seeds in at least 1cm apart. Small seeds should be sprinkled evenly pinch by pinch.
- Cover with soil and pat gently. Then water thoroughly with a sprinkler watering can, taking care not to disturb the seeds.

### 10 Jobs for this month

• Label the area so you remember what you have planted and where!

### **Containers**

If you have a patio or roof terrace, have fun with containers – they will get children used to planning, preparing and tending, and can be moved indoors when it's too cold outside!

### Winter Bulbs

• Put a few pebbles in the bottom of a pretty pot 20–25cm in diameter and half fill with bulb fibre. Plant three hyacinth bulbs, putting bulb fibre around them but leaving the top of the bulbs just showing. Water well. Cover with newspaper to block out the light and keep in a cool frost-free shed or unheated room. Water every 2–3 weeks. After six weeks put it on a window sill and watch the flowers grow!

### **FUN TIPS:**

- Put a small box around the fruit of a tomato when it's little, the tomato will grow into a square much more fun to eat.
- If you tape a fridge magnet letter to a young apple, then the fruit will grow around the letter. When you remove it you have your own personalised fruit!
- Grow a 'head' of long, wild green grass by cutting off the foot of an old thin sock or thickish tights, and filling the toe with compost and grass seed so you end up with a good-sized head. Knot the end like a balloon and make a nose by pulling out a lump in the middle and fixing an elastic band around it. Cut out felt features, stick on with fabric glue and leave to dry, then sit on a cup of water.

### Clearing away the old with a 'technological' clean sweep

appy New Year! You may now have the latest state of the art TV, music system, kitchen, or a car that thinks for itself! But what about your computer? If it's more than a few years old why not consider a clean sweep, a technological 'out with the old and in with the new?' Then let's start with some useful terminology explanations.

A PC or personal computer is a 'tower unit' (not a modemthat's what we used to use to dial-up to the internet). Plugged into a flat screen (monitor) & keyboard/mouse. A PC is still preferred by many people who like to work at a desk and want a proper keyboard and mouse. They are powerful, easy to upgrade and repair, and we specialise in these.

**All-in-one** - this is basically a screen with the computer built into the back of it. Originally developed by Apple, the Mac computer is still the pinnacle of this design, but there are Windows all-in-ones now by the likes of Acer, HP etc. Like a big laptop on a stand really, so hardware repairs can be expensive.

A Laptop is also known as a Notebook or at the top end an 'Ultrabook'. Great for portability and work on Wi-Fi so no cables to hold you back (apart from the power lead when needed).

**Netbooks** have all but disappeared from sale now, as they were small screen laptops (about 9") and have really been replaced by tablets.

**Tablets** can have a screen size of 7" or 10" or 12.9" in the case of the new iPad Pro. A brilliant additional item to have around. Again they work on Wi-Fi both here & abroad. They don't do everything a computer can do, but you wouldn't be without it!

When you are buying a new computer, the processor is the most important item inside, because it does all the hard work. My preference is an Intel processor and preferably the i3 or i5 or i7 - but not below that level as they tend to be a bit slow. This part can't be upgraded.

**Memory or Ram** – this is what helps your computer run faster, it doesn't actually store anything. It is expressed in

Gigabytes (GB or gig) as in 4, 6 or 8GB. The rule here is the more the better, although you can normally add more later if needed

Hard Drive – this is purely storage, where all your programs, files & folders are kept. Again expressed in Gigabytes, or even Terabytes (1,000 GB). More expensive computers often have SSD (solid state) drives, which are smaller in capacity but much faster than mechanical drives. Hard drive size isn't so important, unless you are storing videos etc. My first PC had a 1GB hard drive, now the starting point is 500GB. How things have moved on, the memory sticks in my pocket are 8GB each!

**DVD/CD** – also known as optical drives. These are normally found in PCs, but are gradually being phased out in Laptops to save space and power. Downloads and memory sticks are taking over.

**Memory sticks** – also known as pen or thumb drives. These are basically solid state storage where you can save data i.e. files, folders, pictures etc. and can be plugged into any device that has USB ports. Good for backups & transferring data.

External Drives – also known as expansion drives. These are basically a hard drive in a case. They give you more storage, and are the best medium for doing continual backups. Contact us for advice on the increasingly important subject of back up and data transfer.

USB – universal serial bus. This now comes in two types, the standard USB2 and the newer USB3 (normally coloured blue inside) which is approx. 12x times faster. It's only faster in terms of data transfer, it doesn't matter to printers. USB is used to plug in virtually everything, keyboard, mouse, printer, memory stick, external hard drive etc.



Windows 10 – Next month will mark 6 months since launch so I will be doing a feature on the whys and wherefores of upgrading.



I mentioned that ESET has launched version 9 of its Nod32 and Smart Security products. Both offer an enhanced level of

security to your computer and are compatible too with Windows 10. The Smart Security version has a clever new secure browser that takes over when you type in a bank address and keeps your online banking even more secure. ### Hallgate Schools - continued

By Peter Railton (Author and Local Historian). The year is 1955

This article was held over from November 2015 (Editor)

here are entries in the boys' school log book for this significant year, but they are short in detail, e.g. a collection for the Lord Mayor of Hull's Fund for Trawler Disasters (several were lost that year) realised £20. On 1st of April presentations were made to Mr. G. Clarke, Mr. G. Howe, who were to go to the new Harland Way School, and M. &. B. Raynolds and Mr. Banks who were to leave the school that term. On the 20th of April the school re-opened as a Junior Boys' Department, Mr. Hyde was in charge as Mr. Panke was absent through illness. The Zion classroom was kept on pro-tem and one of the pre-fabs was loaned to the infants' department and rearrangement of classes took place with the hall free at last after having been used periodically for teaching purposes.

Boys going on to grammar or similar schools were - A. Watson, S. Blackwell, J. Harbert, R. Stern, T. Shaw, D. Tasker, D. Waldie, J. Cowell, R. Bancroft, plus six more transferred after a few days at Harland Way to Beverley Grammar School as late developers, R. Fox, N. Ashton, G. Partis, R. Whitfield, K. Starr and J. Place.

On the 23rd of June the school sports were held on the Ellerman's ground down Woods Lane, and on the 21st of July Mr. and Mrs. Panke attended the official opening of the new County Secondary School, Harland Way at 2.30pm. When school opened in September there were 313 on the roll - boys

and girls were still to be in separate departments until, the late 1960's

In the girls' department three new teachers joined the staff on the 5th of January - Miss. M. Segelman, Mrs. M. Mitchell and Mr. Hallet. Medical exams began on the 7th, starting with the 10 to 14 year olds, and the weather turned nasty in the middle of the month with frost and snow.

On the 3rd of February, Mr. Greenwood paid another visit to the school, this time to talk to the senior girls, many of whom would be going to the new secondary school in due course. Three of them, Sheila Smallwood, Margaret Andrew and Deanna Shaw left school early on the 6th of February to go to a weekend course on orchestral work held at Longcroft School in Beverley. Snow and frost persisted throughout most of the month resulting in absences with colds and flu and some of the staff were also affected.

### End of term concert

An end of term concert was held on the 5th of April; it was a special event and had particular significance for all pupils and staff because all the seniors left the department; Hallgate's days as a school with junior and senior departments was over; girls who were not going to a grammar or similar school at about 11 years of age were to go 'up the hill' to the new secondary school on the morning of the 20th of April when it opened its doors for the first time, Miss. Segelman, Mrs. Mitchell, Mrs. Clarke and Mr. Hallet left to go with them.

The domestic science room, overlooking Hallgate, was to "be given over to the infants' department plus two H.O.R.S.A. huts which had housed two senior classes were also given over to the infants department. Mrs. Fletcher records -

"School reopened this morning 20th of April. It is now a Junior School with approx. 230 children on roll organised into seven classes,"

This statement in the log book opened a new chapter in the life of the school; a further profound change was not to come until the late summer of 1969 when Mrs. Fletcher retired and the "boys' and girls' departments became a mixed sex school under their own Headship of Mr. P. Hassam, but the infants continued separately under their own Headmistress, who was Miss. M. Locking at that time.

The arrangement of classes after Easter was as follows - Junior 6 in room 5 with Mrs. Evens; Junior 5 in room 7 with Mrs. Auty; Junior 4 in room 4 with Mrs. Nellis; Remove in room 1 with Miss. Porter; Junior 3 in room 3 with Mrs. Cox; Junior 2 in room 2 with Miss. Anderson; Junior 1 in room 6 with Miss. Selby.

### Mr. Lacey emigrates to Uganda to teach in Kampala

Mr. Lacy left to go and teach in Kampala, Uganda, and the headmistress paid tribute to his untiring efforts in the school garden which he and the gardening group tended to the delight of Mrs. Fletcher! The hall was free at last and plans were made to convert this area into a library and quiet reading area until it was needed again as a classroom, (it was still a library and reading area, when the old school closed and everyone transferred to the new Hallgate Primary School in 2008).

Mrs. Fletcher was away ill over part of the transition period but records that 'it was a trying time but everything went well' and paid tribute to the staff and to Mrs. Evans who had worked hard to see that the new arrangements were completed as smoothly as possible.

A parent-teacher meeting was held on the evening of the 9th of May at the new secondary school where Mr. Greenwood and his staff showed everyone around the building, the 10th and 20th of the month were holidays as the hall was needed for voting purposes for the Urban District Council and the General Election respectively - pupils always welcomed elections at the school as bonus days off.

The reorganisation of the school, although alleviating the severe pressure of numbers i.e., 379 girls on roll on the 13th of September 1954 to 230 after reorganisation in late April 1955, numbers began to increase rapidly and further class arrangements were going to have to be made for the autumn term. Mr. Clarke, Chief Education Officer and his assistant Mr. Williams, discussed accommodation problems with Mrs. Fletcher in June. Also that month, Mr. Hart the Music Organiser brought five violins for the girls' use in music lessons.

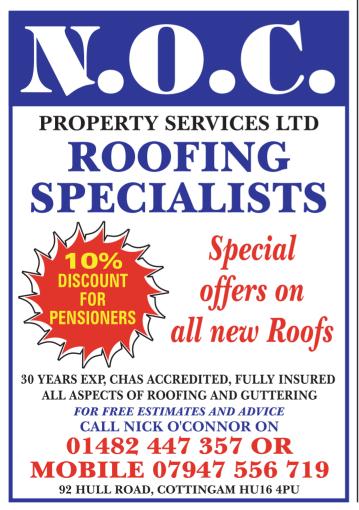

The schools sports for both departments took place on the 20th at the Ellerman's Grounds, rain stopped the jumping events at the end of the afternoon and these had to be finished off on the playground next day and the 'yellows' won the school cup.

### **Haltemprice Junior Sports Day**

During July over £79 was collected for the 'guide dogs for the blind fund. Attendance averaged 93% and the end of year subject tests were held as usual and the Haltemprice Junior Sports took place at Carr Lane School in Willerby. Fine Weather prevailed for that and for the 36 dancers who took part in the Junior Dance Folk Festival at Hessle on the evening of the 14th of July. Mrs Johnson and Miss Selby took Junior 4 to Flamborough Head next day and joined Flamborough Juniors in a project in connection with the local environment.

### **Open Day**

Open day was on the 26th of July, afternoon and evening sessions were held and large numbers of parents went to see the work of the school. All junior 5 and 6 classes left the school on the 30th of the month when term ended; they were to go on to the new secondary school or to a grammar school in September. Miss. Anderson left the school to get married and Mrs. Cox resigned because of her expected confinement. Presentations and. gifts were made to them from the pupils and staff.

Some 253 girls were on the roll when the autumn term started on the 12th of September. Miss. E. Eggleton joined the staff and Mrs. Lythe took up duty as supply until a permanent teacher was appointed; numbers had increased again by another 23 girls and every sign was that numbers would increase further. The classes were organised thus- Junior 7, 4th year, 38 girls with Mrs. Evans; Junior 6 was a mixed 4th and. 3rd year class of 36 girls with Mrs. Auty; Junior 5, 3rd year, 37 girls with Mrs. Eggleton; Junior 4 2nd year, 34 girls with Mrs. Nellist; Junior 3, another 2nd year class of 31 girls with Miss. Porter; Junior 2, 1st year, 40 girls with Mrs. Lythe; Junior 1, another 1st year class with Miss. Selby. It was to be some years yet before the pressures on Hallgate Schools were alleviated, with the building of Croxby School for 180 pupils in 1963, Bacon Garth for 223 pupils in 1969 and Westfield for 437 pupils in 1970, to cater for the huge increase in the house building programmes in those catchment areas and the subsequent demand for school places.

The Secondary School opened with 297 on the roll but numbers increased rapidly as the leavers from those schools plus feeder schools in Skidby, Little Weighton and Dunswell attended, plus later on, pupils from some Hull schools. So ended the history of Hallgate as a right through school i.e. 5 to 14 and 15 years - its story began in 1893 and continued until July 2008 when a new Hallgate Primary School opened its doors to incorporate the infant school built earlier.

### The Closing of the Book

These accounts began life as a book, but have appeared in a diary form instead, courtesy of 'Cottingham Times'. The infant school log books were not available to me for a long time, hence the concentration on the junior and senior departments, they end here as the book would have done - in 1955 the timing seems appropriate as Cottingham High School celebrates its 60th year of providing a high standard of education to G.C.S.E, and A- levels and university entrance. Finally, the old buildings will continue in the purpose for which they were built - the education of children at Cottingham Hallgate Schools.

ewis Tutty from Cottingham and his partner Olivia King from Sheffield recently claimed a place in the finals of the British Nationals Ballroom and Latin Championships held at the Winter Gardens in Blackpool. 19 determined couples took to the floor and fought hard for a place in the top six Ballroom finalists.

Lewis and Olivia took fifth place despite Lewis sustaining a painful injury in the first round. They later went on to reach the semi-finals in the Latin section being placed ninth overall. These results were great achievements for these young dancers who have trained with determination to reach the standard required to take place in this prestigious competition. The following weekend they also won The Kings Trophy in Ballroom and came second in The Kings Trophy in Latin.

The couple only met and started dancing together in August

2014 shortly after which they appeared on Look North with Robin Windsor. After watching them dance Robin said they were "up and coming british talent" and they have proved this during a roller coaster of a year in 2015 by winning a great many first places in competitions all over the country.

Sadly, though the couple have now made the decision to split up. Lewis will go "upwards and onwards" and be trained by his coach, Vicki Smith, the Principal of Rhythm & Dreams Dancing Centre, as a Junior dancer. He will take time away from the competition floor to learn new techniques and routines whilst looking for a new Junior partner. Olivia has decided not to take the step into Juniors just yet and will look for a new partner and continue to compete in the Juvenile Section.

This has been a very happy and successful partnership and these dancers have made their teachers, families and friends proud by their constant improvement and success and I am sure they will both have many more happy years of dancing ahead of them.

### **Ellie Mai Fund achieves Charity Status**

llie Mai was born on February 5, 2006 to parents John and Lisa.

She was a beautiful little girl who loved everything in life. She loved helping people and always put money in charity boxes and gave it to buskers.

Ellie loved going to London to the theatres and Hamleys, playing with her best friends at school, swimming, baking, face-painting and dancing. She was very rarely ill.

In January 2012 Ellie became wobbly. Her left hand became difficult to use and her temperament changed. We went to the doctors and presumed it was an inner-ear infection.

Then she was sent home from school for falling. The next day we rang for an ambulance and Ellie was admitted to Hull Royal Infirmary.

The following day, on her sixth birthday, Ellie had a CAT scan. We had to cancel her birthday party, which made her extremely upset. The scan showed a small abrasive tumour and that afternoon we went to Leeds General Infirmary where Ellie had an MRI scan the following day.

The results came that afternoon. We were greeted by numerous doctors and nurses and the news they gave us changed our lives forever. We were going to lose our little girl.

Ellie had an aggressive Diffuse Pontine Glioma – a brain tumour. This particular one was very rare and incurable. The prognosis was that Ellie had a maximum of a year to live.

The following day Ellie had an operation to insert an accessible portacath in her right side. This would be used for medication, blood transfusions and blood tests. When Ellie came round after the operation, she was very poorly and upset.

We both gave up work to spend every second we could with our precious daughter.

### Radiotherapy at Jimmy's in Leeds

Ellie then underwent six weeks of radiotherapy and chemotherapy at Jimmy's in Leeds. For the radiotherapy there was a mask attached to Ellie's head and then attached to a table.

She was also placed on steroids, which caused her to gain weight dramatically. This made her very self-conscious and upset, saying she felt ugly. Ellie said she wasn't a princess any more, and she kept hiding away.

John spent the next few months searching the internet for a cure but to no avail.

We stayed for most of the six weeks at Eckersley House, a home in Leeds for sick children, but all Ellie wanted to do was go home to her cat, Daisy.

Once the treatment was finished we had a long wait until June for another MRI scan which showed the tumour had shrunk a little.

Ellie had a five-day course of chemotherapy every month. Sometimes these were delayed by the need for blood transfusions, which became more frequent and caused her to come out in large bruises.

Ellie wanted to do the things she did before she was ill. She attended school every now and then, usually for half-days as she became tired quickly. She spent a lot of time with our family and Aislinn, her best friend forever.

Once Ellie stopped taking steroids she lost her weight and looked amazing. People were astonished at how well she looked. Her balance problems were not as noticeable and she was able to use her arm again.

Thanks to all the community support we were able to take Ellie to lots of places.

The Make-A-Wish Foundation sent us to Disneyland in Paris but with our luck, as it was, the princesses and other characters went on strike and the tea party was cancelled.

We then went to Menorca, a farm in Devon and to London several times to go to the theatre and Hamleys. On December 11 we went to Lapland thanks to the When You Wish Upon A Star charity.

In November Ellie was one of the children chosen to switch on the Christmas lights in Cottingham.

On December 2 the mum of one of the children in Ellie's class at school organised a fun day. There was a photo-shoot for all the girls in Ellie's class followed by a limo ride to a pub for a party with animals and a Punch and Judy show. Ellie had an amazing day and was still quite well in herself.

Towards November Ellie's wobbliness returned and her hands became weak again. The doctor decided to take her off chemotherapy as it was no longer helping. We knew then she would probably go downhill quite fast.

Ellie still never complained or asked questions. She just got on with being her loving, cheery self.

After our Lapland trip she started to become ill. She was being sick, complaining of headaches, struggling to walk unaided and the problems with her hand were limiting what she could do.

### Martin House Children's Hospice

She was taken to Martin House Children's Hospice where she was placed on a syringe driver which gave her a constant medicine supply.

We got to Christmas and New Year, but then we barely moved off the settee.

Ellie's medicines were having to be increased more and more often. In her last few days she was unable to eat or drink and she struggled with going to the toilet.

She was sleeping between 15 and 18 hours a day and she lost her speech. Not knowing what she was saying broke all our hearts and frustrated and hurt her. We ended up trying to write things down.

Ellie was such an amazing, brave little girl and a fighter. The nurses called her unique, and "a one-off." She kept beating all the odds. We said goodbye four times but she fought so hard and kept proving everyone wrong.

In the last week she insisted on visiting Bridlington, feeding the ducks, going to her favourite shop and even though she was so poorly on the Thursday she insisted on going to the Post Office to buy Lisa a lollipop.

The following day we had the rare thunder snow and that night Ellie became unconscious. She slipped away in Lisa's arms on Sunday 20 January 2013.

Ellie was now with the angels and out of pain, but we miss her so much.

### The last 3 years.

The Ellie Mai facebook page was set up followed by the Ellie Mai fund, which was an organisation to raise money for other charities such as Wish Upon a Star and brain tumour trust. Over the two years that the organisation ran the total amount raised was in excess of £23,000.

In the summer of 2015 the Ellie Mai fund organisation formed a committee to apply for charitable status, although a long process this was granted in September 2015.

Although it is still very early days for the charity, we have already donated to Martin House a cheque for £878.70 which has been used to fund a new bath cradle.

Charity collection boxes have been distributed through our local region, and meetings have been held with local companies to raise the awareness and funds for the charity. Plans are afoot for the year ahead which will allow us to continue and expand.

The Ellie Mai tearoom was opened in 2013 as a lasting memory to Ellie, although this is not related to the charity.
