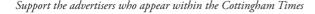

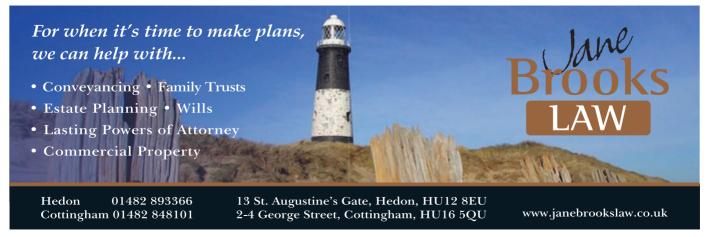

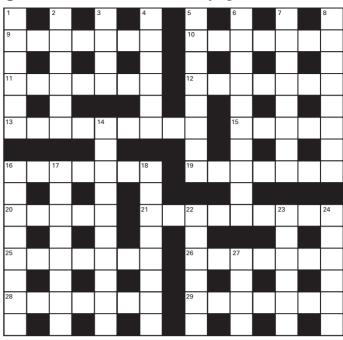

In the Kitchen



Lamb & tomato curry

½ sp ground allspice

- 4 x **9**g packs essential Waitrose British Lamb Diced Shoulder
 - 3 bsp vegetable oil
 - 2 onions, chopped
 - 3c loves garlic, crushed
 - 1 tbsp plain flour
 - 60m l lamb stock
 - 2 tbsp sun-dried tomato paste
 - 60g C harlotte potatoes, cut into large chunks
- 40g pack Waitrose Classic Vine Tomatoes, skinned and cut into wedges

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 10° C, gas mark 4. Combine the chilli, ginger, curry powder and allspice in a large bowl. Add the lamb and turn in the spices until coated. Cover and leave to marinate in the fridge for about 1 hour.

 - 3C over with a lid and bake in the oven for 1 hour.
- 4. Add the tomato paste, potatoes and tomatoes to the casserole, and return to the oven for a further θ minutes or until the potatoes and meat are very tender. Season if necessary and serve.

Total time: 3m inutes. Serves: 4

Ingredients

Pork & peppers with cornbread dumplings

Preparation time: 20 minutesCooking time: 1 hour 20 minutes

• Total time: 1 hour 40 minutes. Serves: 4 - 6

Ingredients

1 pack essential Waitrose 4 British Pork Shoulder Steaks 75g butter

1 large fennel bulb, sliced

125g self-raising flour, plus 2 tbsp

300ml chicken or pork stock

1 tsp dried chilli flakes

3 orange peppers, de-seeded and diced

100ml double cream

175g pack baby corn, halved

½ x 28g pack fresh coriander, chopped

125g polenta

1 medium Waitrose British Blacktail Free Range Egg, beaten 100ml milk

Method

- 1. Pat the pork dry on kitchen paper, then cut into chunks. Melt 25g of the butter in a frying pan and briefly fry the pork on all sides. Lift out onto a plate. Add the fennel to the pan and fry gently for 5 minutes. Add the 2 tbsp flour and cook, stirring for 1 minute.
- 2. Add the stock and chilli flakes to the pan, and stir to scrape up the pan juices, bring to the boil. Return the pork to the pan. Cover with a lid and cook over a low heat for 30 minutes. Add the peppers and cook for a further 15 minutes until the pork is tender. Stir in the cream, baby corn and coriander, and transfer to a shallow, freezer-proof baking dish.
- 3. Heat the oven to 180°C, gas mark 4. Combine the flour and polenta in a mixing bowl. Melt the remaining butter and cool slightly. Stir in the beaten egg and milk. Add to the dry ingredients, stirring with a round-bladed knife to mix. Arrange 12 spoonfuls of the mixture around the edge of the baking dish allowing a small gap between each one.
- 4. Bake, uncovered for 25 minutes until the dumplings have risen and are just firm. Leave to cool in the dish.

ZestyL ime Cheesecake with a Crunchy Biscuit Base

This light and fluffy reduced-fat cheesecake, set with jelly, is so refreshing you'll want to treat yourself time and time again.

- Preparation time: 20 minutes, plus 2 hours chilling
- Total time: 2 hours 20 minutes. Serves: 8

Ingredients

50g unsalted butter, cut into chunks

150g pack Waitrose Reduced Fat Chocolate Chip Cookies, crushed

135g pack Hartley's Lime Jelly, cut into small pieces ½ x 410g can Carnation Light Evaporated Milk, chilled 200g pack Waitrose Half Fat Extra Light Soft Cheese 3 limes

Method

- 1. Line the base of a 20cm x 5cm round loose-bottomed sandwich tin with baking parchment.
- 2. Melt the butter in a saucepan and stir in the crushed biscuits. Press the mixture into the base of the prepared sandwich tin and chill.
- 3. In a bowl, dissolve the jelly in 100ml boiling water. Stir with a spoon then set aside to cool.
- 4. Meanwhile, whisk the evaporated milk in a large bowl using an electric or balloon whisk, until light and fluffy, and doubled in volume. Then whisk in the cream cheese until smooth and well combined.
- 5. Take the finely grated zest and juice of 2 of the limes. Finely slice the remaining lime and set aside. Add all the juice and half of the zest to the cream cheese mix then whisk in the jelly. (Keep the rest of the zest chilled.) Pour over the biscuit base and chill for 2 hours or until set. Decorate with the reserved lime zest and slices of lime.

Cook's tips

Make a lemon cheesecake by replacing the grated zest and juice of the limes with the zest and juice of 1 lemon, and using lemon jelly instead of lime jelly.

Wines from the heart of Yorkshire

hy not make a New Year's resolution to seek out and try some Yorkshire wine? What might have seemed an unlikely possibility a few years ago has now become fact; there are some thriving vineyards right here in Yorkshire.

Laurel Vines, for instance, has 5000 vi nes in its vineyard in the tiny hamlet of Aike, a few miles north of Beverley. Family owned and run since 2009, it currently produces 6000 bot tles a year (four whites and a rose) and was recently shortlisted in the "Best Yorkshire Wine" category of the 2016 Deliciously Yorkshire food and drink awards, ultimately losing out to another "local" - Ryedale Vineyard (more of them later) at Westow, some 20 miles north-west of Driffield.

Ian and Ann Sargent, of Laurel Vines, toasted their first production just three short years ago and have just enjoyed their best-ever harvest. Initially relying on Germanic grape varieties, they are now branching out with some Pinot Noir grapes planted that will produce Laurel Vines' first red wine.

"Wine making is not for the faint hearted or nervous," say Ian and Ann. "The decision to produce our own wines was easily made but then the magnitude of that decision became reality and the process started; weeks turned into months and then into two years and lots of hard work ensued."

With Ian and Ann's daughter Rebekah acting as the vineyard's sales manager, Laurel Vines can be sampled at a number of local restaurants, including the Pipe and Glass at South Dalton, Whites and the Westwood in Beverley and 18 i n Hull. It's also been supplied to the K-Com Stadium in Hull while the company has had a presence at this year's Cottingham and Beverley food festivals and was at last month's Christmas Festival of Food and Drink in Beverley Minster.

Ryedale Vineyard claims to be Britain's most northerly commercial vineyard and is set on south facing slopes at the foot of the picturesque Yorkshire Wolds.

Run by Stuart and Elizabeth Smith, the first vines were planted in 2006, with the first bottles of wine produced in 2009. A family-run business with four generations involved in the work in both the vineyard and in the winery, it had always been Stuart's ambition to produce his own wine, having supplied top quality grafted vines to the industry for over 20 years.

Ryedale currently produces three white, two rose, one red and four sparkling wines. Over the years their quality has been recognised with a number of awards, including the United Kingdom Vineyards Association's silver medal for its rose wine, Shepherd's Delight, and, in November, the Deliciously Yorkshire award for its Dalesman White Sparkling.

The judges said: "With peachy notes and punchy bubbles, this wine smells fresh and enticing! Clean and refreshing it's certainly very drinkable and a real treat!"

Over the past few years their Vineyards Tours have proved to be very popular - and the wine can be bought from the vineyard; although it's always best to check on availability first. Stockists include the Balloon Tree farmshop at Gate Helmsley, Fodder at the Great Yorkshire Showground in Harrogate and the Castle Howard farm shop. It's also available to order vie the revenue website.

Looking forward to unveiling their first wines in 2017 is the Little Wold Vineyard in South Cave. The vineyard, situated on the Wolds Way, was planted in spring 2012 with further additions in 2013 and 2015

A bumper harvest was enjoyed in 2016 and those grapes are currently being turned into white and, hopefully, rose wines that will go on sale in the spring or early summer. Little Wold, based at Market Place Farm in South Cave (who are also well known as producers of Christmas turkeys), do regular vineyard tours and wine tastings throughout the summer and these will take place again in 2017. For further information visit their website, marketplacefarm.co.uk

Other Yorkshire vineyards include the Yorkshire Heart Vineyard and Brewery at Nun Monkton, between York and Harrogate, which plans to open a new visitor centre and cafe this year (yorkshireheart.com) and Holmfirth Vineyard in Last of the Summer Wine Country, which has been producing its own wine for the past seven years and operates tours for visitors (although its cafe is closed until spring following a fire). More information from holmfirthvineyard.com

One of the longest established Yorkshire vineyards is Leventhorpe, near Leeds, founded in 198 which produces at least five white wines, a red and a sparkling wine. All the wines produced at Leventhorpe are made from grapes grown within the five acre vineyard in its purpose-built winery. They are then matured in the bottle for at least two years before release.

So, quite a bit of choice to go at if you would like to choose a White Rose wine in 2017, but as the Leventhorpe Vineyard website says, wine growing in Yorkshire goes back further than you might think. "The Romans certainly cultivated the vine this far North. The Cistercian monks at Kirkstall Abbey in Leeds had vineyards, although the ex ct location is unknown. The Benedictines at St Mary's Abbey, York, had a well documented vineyard of around 10 acres at Askham Richard on the outskirts of the city and had been making wine successfully up to the six eenth century," a spokesman said.

trip was obviously to help people out of dental pain, but also to build relationships and understand, so that we can put a process together to then be able to send out teams of volunteers on a monthly basis, as we cannot keep going out ourselves. There are now 20,000 refugees in Thessaloniki spread over 15 camps. **6**% are families escaping for their lives. There also quite a lot of unaccompanied minors, whose parents didn't make it.

TheyM ust Be Nithered

Now there's a word I hadn't used until I came to the East Riding. It was really cold in Greece. We were all wrapped up in layers but a lot of refugees had flip-flops and didn't even have any socks!! Oh my word. We left our fleeces, sweatshirts, hats and gloves. Temperatures got sub zero.



Dentist Open

This picture was at the poshest place we worked. Inside was a central sterilisation unit and some dental chairs. It was at base camp. Each day we worked somewhere different on a rotation around the camps. This was real field, outreach dentistry.

We saw people of all ages in pain. They were so appreciative. The thing is, these people are just like you and I who had normal lives with families and jobs, and thrust into living in these camps with no real sign of getting out. In spite of this and the cold, they still stayed

in good humour and we had some banter and smiles. Dental Mavericks love music so we have music on. We have the occasional dance. What I love is when you get a connection, regardless of language. Getting that understanding that you will do your best to help as gently and respectfully as you can. That's the buzz.



Hey The Macarena

One camp was run/organised by a Lady Professor, who was also a refugee. She loved what we were doing and would not let us leave until

we had a dance. There was a real community vibe going on, which was lovely. Kids that had just had teeth out were dancing and smiling. It was also great for keeping warm. This is humans at their best. Inspiring stuff



Fed Up Of The Spare Bed?

I bet that sounded a bit random! It just popped into my head. I use

lasers at work all the time. In February I'm off to Florida to train on using my lasers to do non-surgical shrinking of soft palates to help stop snoring and even help with problems like sleep apnoea. Can't wait.

Exclusivity agreement on Skidby Mill extended until 31st March

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council has announced today (12 December 2016) that it has ext ended the ext lusivity agreement with the Millhouse Restaurant regarding proposals for the future operation of Skidby Mill until 3 March, 2017

Skidby Mill and Heritage Centre is currently operated by the council as a visitor attraction and is the home of the Museum of East Riding Rural Life. The facility includes the area's only working windmill and is open all year round, as well as offering conference and catering facilities.

The council is epl oring options for the future of the listed facility, with a view to making the most of its heritage value and making the best use of the site.

Earlier this year, the council announced that it had concluded the process of seeking expr essions of interest from suitable parties for Skidby Mill and Heritage Centre. One expr ession of interest was received from the Millhouse Restaurant at Skidby.

The council entered into an ex lusivity agreement with the Millhouse Restaurant for a period of six months to enable them to put forward a more detailed proposal for the future of the facility for the council to consider. This agreement exi red on 2 December 2016 The Millhouse Restaurant have made progress in putting a proposal together but require more time, hence the ext ension until 3 March 2017. If a viable proposal is put forward by the restaurant, a decision about the future of the mill can then be made by the council's Cabinet.

The council understands that Skidby Mill is a much loved and iconic building and has not made any decisions about future arrangements for the facility. It is very much business as usual for the mill, museum and adjoining independently run café. Staff and commercial tenants at the site have been notified and updated about the ex ension of the agreement.

A good way to get children interested in gardening is to stimulate their senses with brightly coloured flowers, aromatic foliage, scented blooms, tactile leaves and fast-cropping edible plants. It may be necessary for you to explain things initially, making suggestions and putting forward ideas, but in the end the child should feel it's his or her project. And don't worry if you're a beginner yourself – gardening with children is the perfect ex use to go back to the drawing board together!

When the weather allows, carry on clearing paths of moss and leaves.

Helping Out

Smaller children love to get really messy, but you can turn it to your advantage by getting them to help you with digging, weeding and watering.

Very small children may be scared of the creatures that live in the garden, so it's worth spending some time epl aining what they do. Soon they'll be merrily collecting them in jars. You can epl ain:

- A weed is really an 'ugly' plant in the wrong place. Because they compete for food in the soil, it's best to pull them up. Take care to show children which are weeds, or precious plants could come a cropper!
- Some weeds, like dandelions, have deeper roots than others and are a bit difficult to dig up. Start with those that are easily lifted.
- Digging and forking the soil lets in the air which is important for the plants' roots and for all the animals living in the soil.
- To prepare the soil for a flowerbed, you have to turn over down to a depth of about θ c m and break up all the large lumps, adding organic matter, such as well rotted manure or compost.

10 Jobs for this month

- Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch
- 2. Ventilate the greenhouse on sunny days
- 3 Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already
- 4. Repair and re-shape lawn edges
- 5 Inspect stored tubers of Dahlia, Begonia and Canna for rots or drying out
- 6 Prune apple and pear trees

FUN TIPS:

- Put a small box around the fruit of a tomato when it's little, the tomato will grow into a square much more fun to eat
- If you tape a fridge magnet letter to a young apple, then the fruit will grow around the letter. When you remove it you have your own personalised fruit!
- Grow a 'head' of long, wild green grass by cutting off the foot of an old thin sock or thickish tights, tying a knot at the cut end and filling that end with compost and grass seed so you end up with a good-sized head. Knot the other end like a balloon and make a nose by pulling out a lump in the middle and fixing an elastic band around it. Cut out felt features, stick on with fabric glue and leave to dry, then sit it on a cup of water and watch your new friend grow grassy hair.

STIMULATE THE SENSES:

- Introduce your children to 'noisy' plants such as the rattling seedheads of Nigella (love in the mist) and poppies, and rustling grasses and bamboos.
- Let them experience the distinctive scents of Helichrysum italicum (curry plant), cherry pie heliotrope, chocolate cosmos and Melissa officinalis (lemon balm).
- Fun to touch plants include furry Stachys byzantine (lamb's ears), sticky Petunia or prickly Eryngium.

Once a child is happy digging and weeding, they're all set to prepare a small garden of their own.



Spring Seeds

- Seeds that can be planted straight into the ground and produce fast growing, brightly-coloured flowers are best, as a few weeks can seem years to a child. Look for candytuft, nasturtiums, stocks and sweet peas and packets that say 'easy' or 'good for children'. Big tree seeds, like acorns, conkers and sycamore wings are ideal for young children.
- Use a stick to dig a trench 2cm deep and place large seeds in at least 1cm apart. Small seeds should be sprinkled evenly pinch by pinch.
- Cover with soil and pat gently. Then water thoroughly with a sprinkler watering can, taking care not to disturb the seeds.
- Label the area so you remember what you have planted and where!

Containers

If you have a patio or roof terrace, have fun with containers – they will get children used to planning, preparing and tending, and can be moved indoors when it's too cold outside!

Winter Bulbs

• Put a few pebbles in the bottom of a pretty pot 20–25cm in diameter and half fill with bulb fibre. Plant three hyacinth bulbs, putting bulb fibre around them but leaving the top of the bulbs just showing. Water well. Cover with newspaper to block out the light and keep in a cool frost-free shed or unheated room. Water every 2–3 weeks. After six weeks put it on a window sill and watch the flowers grow!

Happy New Year and let's plan for a safe and secure 2017

On the positive side, things can only get better as last month will be remembered by many as the month of losing the internet! First of all Kcom had a major problem caused by a cyberattack on one its most widely used Zyxel routers (more on that to follow). Then along came a Windows networking issue that caused many Windows 10 computers to lose their Wi-Fi connection.

Hopefully by now everyone will be happily back online. But in case you missed the announcements by Kcom across the media, and even if you didn't lose your internet service there is an important fix required if you one of these Zyxel routers. It has a black top and white surround, turn it over to see the model number on the base. This is the message from Kcom issued in mid-December: We are rolling out an automated upgrade for Zyxel AMG 1302-T10B routers which is designed to remove any service issues and remove the vulnerability that the cyber-attack exploited last week. In order to find the solution, we have been liaising with other broadband providers affected by the cyber-attack. It is very important for all users of this router (whether you are experiencing any issues or not) to follow the simple steps below to upgrade router settings.

- Unplug your router from the electrical socket and leave it off at least 30 seconds
- Switch the power back on and leave your router for at least 15 minutes while the settings update automatically. The lights on the router will flash intermittently during this time. It is very important that you do not try to access the internet during this phase. This will allow your router to process the upgrade and come back online.
- We expect this to clear any issues you have accessing the internet and it will also remove the vulnerability for all customers using this device.

Windows Vista – official retirement date is 11 April 2017. I've mentioned before that Vista is reaching 'end of life' in Microsoft terminology, and this is now the official date for end of support. This follows on from the same scenario for Windows XP back in April 2014. There is no upgrade path from Vista to any other version of Windows, so the only plan of action will be to buy a new computer.



Now is a good time to buy a new computer as Intel has upgraded its processor line-up to the 6th generation. So look out for the number 6 in the description, for instance Intel i3-6100 or i5-6200 and so on, to make sure you are getting the latest processor. This is after all the most important part of any computer, followed closely by the amount of operating memory (called Ram) which should be between 4 and 8 GB – the more the better. Hard drives, where all your data is stored on the computer, are massive nowadays at 1TB (1,000GB). Some computers use SSD (solid state drives) which are smaller in capacity but much faster to boot, and are sometimes teamed up with a traditional storage drive.

Things to consider when buying a new computer. The first and most important is that all your data can be transferred. This includes documents, family history, photos, music & videos, emails and contacts and even internet favourites. Programs however cannot be transferred, they have to be re-installed from the original source i.e. a CD or download and you will probably need the licence number or activation key that came with it. Sometimes however that licence will only permit use on one computer, so you may have to purchase the latest version, which is often better anyway in terms of compatibility. Microsoft Office is a prime example of this, so if you need Word or Excel or PowerPoint plan to buy the latest version or pay an annual subscription for Office 365 which offers all six programs in the suite for up to five computers (incl Mac).

For advice on a new home computer, security and Office versions please give us a call.

If you use the Trainline.com to book rail tickets, I have found they now accept Apple Pay. If you already have Apple Pay set up on your iPhone you'll know the benefits of just waving your phone over the card machine in stores, and now you can book your tickets using the trainline app then just pay by using your fingerprint — easy!

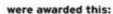

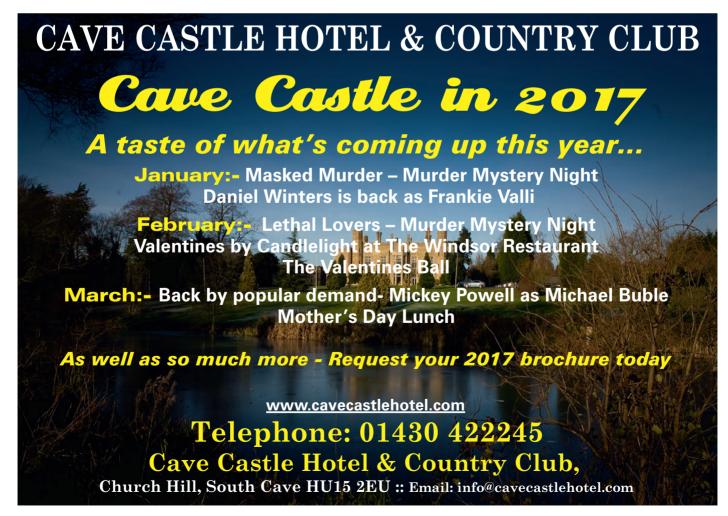

Take several pictures of the same thing so that you can make sure you select the best picture when you upload them to your screen. Try taking pictures of the same room from different angles and study what is actually in the picture that you are taking, doors are notorious for getting in the way, take the time to prop these open or take up a slightly different position to shoot from. Nobody wants to see bins either, so move them out of sight for your picture.

Don't be afraid to take close ups it's not always about a picture of the room, if you have some shiny new exe nsive taps in your bathroom, try taking a close up picture of this, you might have some really nice looking handles on an expensive looking door, a fancy fireplace or even an ornament in the room for ex mple. By showing these you are visually telling people that your property oozes quality, it's got a nice feel to it and that they need to come and see

By having a selection of good quality pictures this allows you to rotate the front picture on your adverts to keep the advert fresh. Regularly rotating the front picture will ensure that your property advert doesn't stagnate and is kept firmly in the minds eye of those searching for their nek property.

Work has started on the new Multi-Service Centre for Cottingham

Tork has begun on a refurbishment scheme for the Cottingham Library building, as part of the council's £.4 million programme of creating a number of new Multi -Service Centres across the East Riding.

The work at Cottingham will see the customer service centre and registration service move into the refurbished library building, offering customers a one-stop-shop facility, in a modern and attractive environment. It is anticipated that work will be completed within ten months.

During the building works, the customer service centre and registration service will continue to operate as normal from their ek sting locations. The library service will, however, be relocated to temporary accommodation in front of the Civic Hall in Cottingham for the duration of the work.

The library has re-opened in its new temporary location in front of the Civic Hall.

During the building project, the library will provide a wide selection of stock, and three public access computers with internet, printing and scanning facilities.

The council is committed to investing £.4 million in the creation of six more multi-service centres by 2019. These will be in Hedon, Beverley, Cottingham, Hornsea, Goole and Howden.

Councillor Richard Burton, portfolio holder for civic wellbeing and culture, said: "The new multi-service centre in Cottingham will provide greater flexibility, allowing residents to carry out a wide variety of transactions at their own convenience while, at the same time, being able to use a self-service provision and access information via public access terminals.

"This is the latest multi-service centre to be developed in key towns across the East Riding and is part of the council's drive to lower running costs whilst seeking to improve access to services "

An East Riding of Yorkshire Council spokesperson added: "We apologise for any inconvenience caused by these temporary changes in Cottingham, but would like to reassure our customers that the end result will provide the local community with a modern and cost efficient facility, bringing a number of services together net year."

Chinese New Year The Year of the Rooster begins on January 28th

bout a week before Lunar New Year, traditional families will be busy preparing the religious ceremony performed with tributes and offerings in honour of Heaven (Tien Shen) and Earth (Ti Tu), and of the various deities of the household together with family ancestors. One of the most well know deities is the Kitchen God who resides over the stove and is said to keep an eye on the interactions of the household, making an annual report on what the family has done in the past year to the Jade Emperor in Heaven around about a week before Chinese New Year Day. Rites and offerings are made to the Kitchen God (Zhou Khun) on this day with hopes that he will speak well of the deeds of the family.

Traditionally, the run up to the celebration of Chinese New Year is the 'Reunion Dinner'. An ex ravagant banquet is laid out to mark the onset of the New Year where young and old gather for a reunion dinner to symbolise family unity. Family members try to get home from different places before or on New Year's Eve to celebrate this special occasion in the family home. Married daughters will traditionally spend their reunion dinner in the husband's family home.

This is a family banquet that is full of special dishes and delicacies artistically named with auspicious symbolic meanings. The dinner will start with a prayer of tribute and offerings to the ancestors and deities at the family altar. It is a very colourful and lively affair when every light is supposed to be kept on in the house throughout the whole night.

Some of the dishes that are laid on the banquet table have superstitious attributes such as: Ginkgo nuts; these represent gold ingots and are full of auspicious luck for fertility. Black moss seaweed is a symbolic food of prosperity. This is also true in the case of a whole chicken which is a desirable addition to the feast. Dried bean curd is placed on the banquet table to symbolise happiness and luck. Lotus seed is seen as another fertility symbol and signifies having many offspring. Nian Gao is a traditional sweet steamed glutinous rice pudding, when you eat this dish you will aid growth and abundance.

When you translate bamboo shoots into Chinese, the words sound similar to the Chinese for "hoping that all turns out for the best". A whole fish with its head and tail intact will represent togetherness.

Reunion Dinner

The Reunion Dinner is a very busy event. The women buzz around the kitchen with the dinner preparation whilst the men either watch TV or (guess what?) play mah-jong. Mah-jong is an ek remely important part of Chinese culture and is played by men and women alike, often in halls ex lusively dedicated to the game.

Mah-jong is linked with gambling with huge sums of money being won and lost by the players. An ex ellent memory is required to remember which tiles have been laid down and which remain. Once a certain point in a hand has been passed, you need to pay special attention as if you are the one to put down the tile that enables another player to win that hand, you not only have to pay your own losses on the hand but those of the other two losing players as well. This can mean serious amounts of money.

Children are bathed and dressed in their new pyjamas and promised the arrival of "Tsai Shen Yeh" (Chai Shen Yeh) (the Wealth God). Whilst they sleep; the parents will slip an ang pow (a red envelope with money) under their pillow signifying a visit from 'Chai Shen Yeh'. Children can also expect to receive red envelopes from uncles and aunts, with the amount that is given, being dictated by the closeness of the family relationship and also the age of the child. Older children can usually expect to receive more than younger ones. Someone who has a large family and who has taken a hammering on the mah-jong tables is in for trouble!

At midnight, at the turn of the old and New Year, people let off fire-crackers which serve to scare away the evil spirits and old qi of the past year and to greet the arrival of the New Year.

New Years Day itself, starts with you, in your finest and newest clothes, with the ex hange of good wishes amongst the family. Married couples present the young ones, children and unmarried adults alike with a Hung-Bao. In Chinese culture, instead of giving a wrapped up present as we do at Christmas in the UK, it is customary to give this red envelope containing money. The amount of money contained in the envelope has to be in even numbers. Even numbers are auspicious unless it is a single Chinese i-ching coin on its own. It is amazing how much a person can accumulate in a single day.

The day continues with visits to relatives. The visiting rota has its unspoken hierarchy arrangement. The oldest get to sit at home and wait for the younger relatives to visit them to ex hange good wishes to each other. This is a very ex iting time for the children because nearly every 'Kung Xee Fa Chai' (it means Congratulations and May you be Prosperous) they recite, they get an ang pow (red envelope containing money) for it.

The second day of Chinese New Year is named 'Kai Nien' meaning "Year Beginning" which starts with a very early morning breakfast. Special dishes with symbolic names will be served. The special dish of this day is long noodles which are served with everyone competing to toss the noodles as high as possible with their chopsticks. The tossing of noodles is a symbolic activity done to promote longevity. This means that, unless you are unable to do so, you stand up and raise your arms full stretch in the air holding the noodles aloft. In order to get extra lift off, some people use super long chopsticks and stand on chairs so you should probably make sure the ceiling fan is turned off.

Unlike in the west, Chinese New Year is not a time for drinking a lot of alcohol. In fact, alcohol is generally not drunk as people save space for themselves to drink enormous amounts of Chinese tea. Some people will have a Chinese wine with their meal but, particularly as the emphasis is so much on the family nature of the celebrations, nobody goes over the top.

Two days of over eating and general fun and games are indulged in quite a lot as the Chinese do not hold back on these occasions. The Chinese relationship with food is close all the year, but at no time more than at New Year. Many dishes have particular significance, especially at this time. Even everyday dishes like fish and turnips have special meanings and none more so than fish balls and meat balls both of which suggest reunion, which is a most important element at this time. However, after two days of festivities and fun, even the Chinese can have enough and recognise that energy levels need to be restored. The third day is therefore a day of calm. Traditionally, it is not a day for risks or adventure. The young ones will venture out to see friends but it is a quiet day. In China no offices or businesses will be open on this day.

Normal procedures return with businesses as usual on the fourth day. Many businesses will choose a specific day to start business with the assistance of their Feng Shui Practitioner and initiate the new trading year with a spectacular display of Lion Dance and fire crackers. It is a very noisy and exciting event.

Greetings and an air of festivity remain for another eleven days through to the full moon of the first lunar month when another celebration follows but this time it is to mark the closing of the Spring Festival. Day 15 is also called the 'Spring Lantern Festival' (Yuan Xiao Jie). This wonderfully romantic celebration takes place under a full moon on the fifteenth day of the first lunar month of the year.

On this day, the old and young carry a colourful lantern and gather in a neighbouring public place. They gather to admire and appreciate the first full moon of the year (very similar to the Mid Autumn Festival). In China, there are still villages that hold a big Tang Yuan (rice dumplings) cooking and eating session. The dumplings are round and symbolise family unity and completeness. The mid-month Lantern Festival traditionally brings the seasonal passage of the New Year to a conclusion.

Food has played a major role in Chinese New Year celebrations for centuries, and "lucky" foods are traditionally served throughout the two week Chinese New Year celebration, known as the Spring Festival - the most important festival in China when families come together to celebrate in as grand a style as they can afford.

The Chinese belief that different foods symbolize good things in different ways manifests in various forms.

Chinese Good Luck Foods for the New Year

The quantity of food prepared signifies prosperity and wealth of the household and there is an old custom of serving a platter which is made up of five meats or five vegetables, referred to as "the five blessings of the new year" representing longevity, peace, righteousness, wealth and wisdom.

Individual foods and recipes also have specific meanings and are widely served during the Spring festival. Examples include, Chinese dumplings which have the appearance of the old Chinese silver ingots (the legend is that the more dumplings you eat, the more money you will make in the coming year); spring rolls which resemble gold bars; and noodles which represent long life.

But it's not just the appearance of the food which counts. Sometimes the name of the foods served are the significant factor.

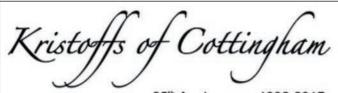
For instance the Chinese word for fish sounds like the words "wish" and "abundance" which has led to the tradition of serving a whole fish (head and tail in tact) thus ensuring good fortune from the beginning to the end of the new year; the name Nian Gao (a glutinous rice cake) sounds like "getting higher year by year" the Chinese believing the higher you are, the better off you are; the name for turnips also means "good luck"; the word for lettuce in Cantonese sounds like "rising fortune" so it is very common to serve foods in a lettuce wrap especially if it's another lucky food; and tangerines and oranges are both given and eaten as their names sound like "gold" and "wealth". Another favourite is Sweet and Sour pork as the Cantonese word for sour sounds like the word for grandchildren, so serving this dish will help ensure the continuance of the family.
