Power options on laptops. If like me, you find it frustrating when a laptop goes to sleep every time you turn your back for a minute! Then you'll be pleased to know you can adjust this. Go into Control Panel and open Power Options and you will probably find the setting selected called 'Balanced' or similar. Click to change power settings, there are two settings, battery and mains power, then using the drop-down list change the number of minutes before the screen or hard drive goes off. On the mains setting I personally go for a long screen time, and change the hard drive off setting to Never. Click to save.

Browser or search engine - what's the difference? These two things do get confused. But put simply a browser is just a piece of software that is designed to give your computer access to the internet. Examples would be *Internet Explorer(see below)*, Edge, Chrome and Firefox, Safari & Opera. When you open your chosen browser and you type in either an address or a search query, that's when the search engine leaps into action. Google is probably the best known (and has of course become a verb); then there is Bing from Microsoft and Yahoo has its own also. Your browser will have one of these set up and will use that all the time, although you can choose to change it at any time). There is a whole science behind searching the internet, but suffice it to say search engines use complex algorithms to pick key words you have typed and return results based on similar popular searches. The future I am sure will be based on artificial intelligence and machine learning which will actually understand what you are asking so as to be more precise. Mind you when you think how massive the internet is and how quick the results come back now, it's pretty impressive now!

Talking of Internet Explorer, its been around as long as the internet and is starting to show its age. Lots of customers have been experiencing problems with crashes and 'script errors' etc. The only solution is to switch to another up to date browser like those mentioned above.

Telephone scam – yes, I must mention this again as I have many times before. There has been another spate of unsolicited calls to computer users in this area purporting to be from Microsoft (which they are not) offering to fix problems with your computer (which they won't) and then fraudulently taking money for their (non-existent) services. If you get such calls, and they can be very persistent, tell them you are not interested, or that you have a local computer specialist, or that you don't have a computer!

LASTING POWERS OF ATTORNEY

A Lasting Power of Attorney ('LPA') is a document which you sign now to give people the authority to act on your behalf if you lose mental capacity in the future. There are two types of LPA, the first deals with decisions about your Property and Financial affairs and the other with decisions about your Health and Welfare.

It is advisable that every adult prepares both types of LPA so that if you do lose the ability to make decisions at any time in the future, there is someone appointed, who you trust, to step in and make decisions on your behalf, as your Attorney. The types of decisions your attorney might need to make on your behalf are how to invest your money, where you live and whether or not you should receive life sustaining treatment.

If you lose the mental capacity to make decisions about yourself and you have not prepared an LPA, the people closest to you will find themselves in a very difficult position. Your bills will still need to be paid or decisions made about where you live and because you have not already signed a LPA, there is no-one authorised to make these decisions.

In a situation where you have lost mental capacity and haven't signed an LPA, your bank accounts will be effectively frozen as your bank cannot authorise the payment of monies from your account after you have lost mental capacity. This may mean that your care fees cannot be paid or your property sold, if required.

If you do lose mental capacity in the future without preparing an LPA, the only alternative for those closest to you is to make an application to the Court of Protection for a Deputy to be appointed on your behalf. This is a very long and costly process and the Court will decide who to appoint as your Deputy. It could be any member of your family or friends and it might not be a person who you would trust to look after your money or act in your best interests.

It is therefore highly recommended that people put LPAs in place whilst they still have the mental capacity to make decisions.

By preparing LPAs now you will be doing as much as you can to ensure that if you did lose mental capacity in the future all of your affairs are in order. This will mean that the people closest to you do not have to become involved in a lengthy Court application simply to ensure that your bills can be paid and decisions can be made on your behalf.







Flaky mushroom & thyme pie

- Vegetarian
- Preparation time: 40 minutes + chilling
- Cooking time: 1 hour 15 minutes
- Total time: 1 hour 55 minutes + chilling. Serves: 6

Ingredients FOR THE PASTRY

175g butter 225g plain flour essential Waitrose Egg, beaten, to glaze

FOR THE FILLING

1 large celeriac, about 800g

700ml vegetable stock, boiling

3 tbsp double cream

1 tsp Dijon mustard

1 tbsp olive oil

15g butter

1 medium onion, chopped

- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 x 200g packs Waitrose 1 Mixed Exotic Mushrooms
- 2 tbsp each chopped fresh thyme and parsley

Method

- 1. For the pastry, put the butter in the freezer for 30 minutes. Sift the flour into a bowl with a pinch of salt. Grate the butter into the flour and mix together. Add 85-100ml chilled water and mix to a soft dough, wrap in clingfilm and chill for 30 minutes.
- 2. Meanwhile, preheat the oven to 200°C, gas mark 6. Place a baking tray in the oven. Peel the celeriac and cut into thick matchsticks. Cook in the stock for 15-20 minutes until tender. Drain, toss with the cream, mustard and seasoning. Leave to cool.
- 3. Heat the oil and butter in a frying pan. Cook the onion and garlic until soft. Add the mushrooms. Cook over a high heat for 5 minutes until lightly browned. Stir in the herbs and season. Leave to cool.
- 4. Roll out 2/3 of the pastry to line a 20cm springform cake tin, to about 7cm deep. Spoon the mushrooms over and spread level. Arrange the celeriac over the top. Roll out the remaining pastry to cover the pie, pinching to seal the edges. Brush the pastry with beaten egg, cut a steam hole in the centre and place on the hot baking sheet in the oven. Bake for 40-45 minutes until the pastry is crisp and golden. Serve hot with salad.

Spiced rhubarb cake with cinnamon cream

The warmly spiced sponge balances the sharpness of the rhubarb brilliantly. Whipped cinnamon cream makes an ideal accompaniment.

- Preparation time: 20 minutes, plus cooling
- Cooking time: 1 hour 15 minutes
- Total time: 1 hour 35 minutes, plus cooling. Serves: 10

Ingredients

150g salted butter, melted and cooled, plus extra for greasing

400g rhubarb, trimmed and cut into 0.5cm slices

225g caster sugar, plus an extra 2 heaped tbsp

3 tsp ground cinnamon

3 large eggs

2 tsp vanilla bean paste

2 tsp ground ginger

225g self-raising flour

75g flaked almonds

CINNAMON CREAM

300ml double cream

3-4 tbsp icing sugar, to taste

1 heaped tsp ground cinnamon

1 tsp vanilla bean paste

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 160° C, gas mark 3. Grease a 23cm springform cake tin and line the base with baking parchment. Mix the rhubarb with the extra 2 heaped tbs peaster sugar and 1 tsp cinnamon; set aside.
- 2. In a large bowl, beat the remaining 225g sugar and 2 tsp ground cinnamon with the melted butter, eggs, vanilla and ginger. Mix in the flour, followed by the rhubarb, until everything is combined.
- 3. Pour the cake mixture into the tin and smooth the surface, making sure the batter is evenly distributed before scattering over the flaked almonds. Bake for about 1 hour 15 minutes, until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean; cover with foil after 1 hour if it starts to brown too much. Leave to cool in the tin.
- 4. When you are ready to serve, whisk the cream with the icing sugar, cinnamon and vanilla to soft, light, pillowy peaks. Serve each slice of cake with a generous dollop of the cinnamon cream on the side.

Worklink's 10th anniversary celebrations

pioneering scheme which has helped hundreds of people with learning disabilities from across the East Riding enter the world of work has celebrated its 10th anniversary.

Worklink has made a real difference to the lives of hundreds of people by providing accredited training in horticulture, woodwork, and hospitality and catering, before helping many enter employment or further education.

Worklink, which is run by the East Riding of Yorkshire Council, has been based at its purpose built learning resource centre in Cottingham for the past 10 years. The scheme also has outreach centres at Sewerby Hall and Gardens and at the Sobriety Project, in Goole.

Since opening its doors in 2007, over 360 students from across the East Riding have joined the scheme, of which just under half have moved into employment, including work placements or what is classed as 'sheltered employment' with Worklink itself.

Councillor Richard Harrap, council portfolio holder for adult and carer services, said: "Worklink is a ground-breaking scheme which has helped numerous people secure employment by taking a fresh approach to learning disabilities.

"Entering employment or further education really does have a positive impact on a person's life, not least someone who has to overcome the challenges of having a disability.

"It is clear to see that both students and employers have benefited from the scheme over the past 10 years and long may its success continue"

Last May the scheme celebrated reaching the '100 days a week' milestone, which meant they were responsible for over 60 adults working a collective 100 days a week in their local communities.

The anniversary was celebrated with an open day event at their learning resource centre, in Cottingham which was attended by staff and students past and present, local employers who support the scheme, and civic dignitaries.

Attending the event was 60-year-old Nick Whelbourn, of Hessle who trained in catering at the Learning Resource Centre for two years and now works part-time at Mires Beck Nursery, in North Cave.


Nick was accompanied by his father Walter, 80, and his brother Andy, 55, who has spoken of the real difference the scheme has made to their lives.

Andy said: "The whole family has noticed a vast improvement in Nick's confidence. Before he came to Worklink he wouldn't do anything, he let my dad do everything, he wouldn't socialise, he was very apprehensive about going anywhere especially into a crowded area.

"But now his confidence has grown, he will do things which he never did before, he will ring me, he will sort things out when I have given him details of who to ring, it is just noticeable on those small things but quite big things for Nick."

Malt whisky - 'The whisky' of choice

pologies for forsaking one of my loves, wine, for another, malt whisky, but I've been meaning to do this for ages, so in the spirit (!) of the New Year, here goes . . . my favourite 10 malts.

Writing about whisky, like wine, in the space of one column is almost impossible; it evokes strong opinions, but like wine, those debates can be savoured almost as much as the drink itself. I say almost . . .

In recent years the rise and rise of Japanese single malts has seemingly been unstoppable while an American-produced Bourbon whiskey (Colonel E H Taylor Four Grain) has just been named best whisky in the world in the 2018 World Whisky Bible, but to me, whisky means Scottish malts. A little bit of Scotland in a glass.

I'm drawn to peaty malts - if peat is burnt while drying the grains, the whisky will have a smoky flavour - so my first port of call is Skye and the island's only distillery, Talisker.

The 10-year-old Malt is my all time favourite and although once often seen discounted down to under \$30 in supermarkets at Christmas and New Year, it's less common these days. Instead you'll see such things as Talisker Skye and Talisker Storm but the original 10-year-old is still the best for me.

Highly distinctive, with a strong smoky, peaty flavour because both the malt and the water used are heavily peated. Robert Louis Stevenson described it as "king 'o drinks" in an 1880 poem. It was awarded "Best Islands Single Malt" at the 2017 World Whiskies Awards.

2. Smokehead: Mystery surrounds this peaty whisky from Islay, not least who makes it. The bottle describes it as "not for the faint hearted" and there's a huge hit of smoke from the first sip. Many have hazarded a guest at its parentage, but the current favourite suggestion is that it is a "young" Ardberg.

What's disappointing is it can be hard to find; my latest bottle came from a small independent whisky shop in Bakewell, Derbyshire, and before that an airport duty free in France. I used to get some from the York Whisky Shop and, occasionally, Sainsbury's, but neither seem to sell it now. It can be ordered online from various sources.

- 3. Highland Park: From Orkney, and although slightly peaty this is an altogether smoother, honeyed, whisky. Readily available and guaranteed to impart a warm glow.
- 4. Deanston: Another that's hard to find. Seems to have disappeared from the shelves of M&S and the York Whisky Shop, but available online. My favourite Highland whisky (from Perthshire), with just a faint whiff of smoke from the lightly-malted peat. Honeyed notes make it one to savour.
- 5. Laphroaig: We're back to Islay and huge amounts of smoke. Often described as the "Marmite of the whisky world" you either love it, or hate it. First-timers say it reminds them of cough medicine or, unkindly, disinfectant. But persevere, and you'll love it.
- 6. Lagavulin 16-year-old: Islay again and a special treat because this will generally sell at a higher price than many of the others I've mentioned. Very peaty and enjoys a fanatical following and works in an extraordinary way with intensely flavoured salty blue cheeses.
- 7. Benromach: Hard to find Speyside whisky, the smallest distillery in the region, that was revived in 1993. You'll probably need a specialist shop to find it. Floral and smoky on the palate, with a touch of sweetness.
- 8. Glenmorangie: Best-selling malt in Scotland and second-best in the UK after Glenfiddich. Good introduction to malts; no smoke, just lovely honeyed, caramel tastes.
- 9. Glenlivet: This succulent Speyside whisky is No 2 global best-seller. Medium bodied and smooth, with the merest hint of smoke.
- 10. Old Pultney: From Wick in the very north of Scotland. Enjoying a sales boom, with a lovely floral sweetness

Colonel E H Taylor Four Grain Bourbon, by the way, emirates from the Buffalo Trace Distillery in Frankfort, Kentucky. Made from a distinct bourbon recipe using corn, rye, wheat, and malted barley, this limited edition bourbon was released for sale in April of this year and retails at just under £100 a bottle. Tunbridge Wells-based Master of Malt (www.masterofmalt.com) had some just before Christmas at £95.90.

And while talking whisky, connoisseurs might like to head for the Glenesk Hotel situated in the beautiful "Britain in Bloom" award-winning village of Edzell at the foot of the Angus Glens. Why? Well it has broken the world record for the largest number of whiskies for sale behind its bar - some 1,031 different varieties in total. The Edzell-based hotel serves whisky from every working distillery in Scotland. Its most expensive dram is the Lagavulin 25-year-old costing \$248 a measure.

Other notable whiskies on offer include Tomintoul 33-year-old and Port Ellen 33-year-old, as well as some rare bottlings from the Glencadam distillery, now the only working distillery in Angus. Established in 1825, the distillery closed in 2000 only to be reopened in 2003 following its sale to Angus Dundee Distillers.

Owner of The Glenesk, Dylan Wren, purchased the hotel some five years ago having already accumulated around 200 bottles of whisky. Since then, the collection has spiralled and has surpassed the previous holder of the title, Millionaire's Casino in Ayrshire's 800 bottle offering.

Visitors to the hotel can browse the two large whisky tomes at the bar, containing a full list of all the whiskies together with tasting notes for each bottle.



i, How was your Christmas? I hope it was all it was expected to be and more. It is strange talking about what we did over this festive period when I am writing this two weeks before the event. Therefore, I am afraid I cannot comment on how my family celebrated but seeing how excited my five grandchildren are becoming it will be hectic but fun.

Looking back on my past articles, I reflect on memories made through the year especially of the loved ones we are missing. It can be a dreadfully sad time thinking of who is no longer by our side to venture through a new year. Sadly it is not only relatives/friends we greatly miss but it can also be our four-legged companions. Like humans, they leave such a vast void in our lives when they have passed away making us wonder how we can exist without them . . . but in our own special way we do.

Some of us say never again, they cannot bear to go through the pain of losing someone so dear which is so understandable, but others may take a look at what enjoyment, love and companionship their pet had brought to their lives and look, not for an identical replacement but another little personality to love. I personally feel it is wrong to express your ideas on someone else, everyone is different and grieves in different ways. I, for one, take the second route and love having a pet around no matter how small. So with this in mind, I thought of writing this article with an insight into the Thompson household.

Animals have always played a big part in my life, from our first dog Scamp (a little rag-a-muffin stray who strolled into our lives, myself at the age of 5 and my brother aged 7), through into my teens when I developed a passion for horses and spent all my school holidays and weekends at the local stables in Cottingham, and on into married life when my husband and I bought a gorgeous little crossbreed called Brandy from a pet shop in the town (sadly, back in the

80's pet shop windows where a showcase for many litters). She stayed with me until I sadly lost her through cancer at the age of 10 years and through this time I had given birth to my three daughters who formed a bond so great they missed her terribly when she went. So you can imagine, it didn't take me long to be persuaded to get another dog but this time we approached a local rescue centre. There we saw Tammy, a gorgeous eight-week old cross Bearded Collie who my daughters fell in love with instantly.

She was the 'perfect' puppy, if you can have one described as that . . . never chewed a thing, seemed to be house trained within two weeks and just followed the girls around like their shadows. So what was holding me back? Why wasn't I feeling the special bond, I knew human and animal can have? Don't get me wrong, I loved her but felt there was something. It wasn't until Tammy was six months old, I awoke one morning to find bloody diarrhoea on the kitchen floor.

Panic struck in and the thought of losing another member of our little family was unbearable. Thankfully, after an early morning visit to my vet followed by 48 hours of monitoring, Tammy was on the road to recovery and it was from this moment on I had finally found my special something with her. Whether I had put up an invisible barrier to stop my feelings getting hurt again after Brandy, I don't know but from that day I felt different. Once again our little family unit felt complete. It was so amazing to watch such a unique friendship develop between Tammy and my daughters. As I mentioned earlier, animals have always played a large part in my life so as well as dogs, we also had four cats, three rabbits 11 guinea pigs and a hamster. Something I will always treasure, as I watch my daughters (now in their 30's) with dogs of their own, is the 'bond'. The legacy lives on.

As the years grew, so did Tammy, not only in size but in our hearts. Wherever I went, she was by my side from going to and from school to shopping, from visiting family and friends to eventually becoming a P.A.T (Pets As Therapy) dog. With a bit of time on my hands, I registered Tammy and after passing a short test with flying colours, we got our first 'job' visiting a local residential home. It was wonderful to see how just two to three hours of our time a week, could bring so much pleasure. It was also sad to hear of how some of the residents had to give up their pets to go into the home, so the sight of a big four legged bundle of fun bouncing into the room brought a smile to many faces.

It was the seeing one of the elderly ladies raise her hand and smile for the first time when she first met Tammy something she had never done since she had started living there . . . that made me feel our visits were worthwhile. I am also proud to say Tammy won the regional finals of Companion Dog Of The Year only to be pipped to 2nd place in the National finals by a Golden Retriever in Scotland. Sadly, I had to give up our visits when I started working full time for a local vets and yes, Tammy was by my side once again. She accompanied me everyday and was quite happy lying in her basket by my feet, only to get up to greet the 'odd' nervous client to show them that the vet is not as fearsome as he/she may look. She also came on my visits to schools when I gave talks on Pet Care (sadly with Health and Safety etc., we are no longer able to take pets into schools but here at KINGSTON our nurses still do school visits when asked).

One of my proudest moments was when she gave her first blood donation (something we also do at KINGSTON and are constantly looking for donors) and delighted to say the receiver led a full recovery. The list is endless. She had so many loving qualities, so much love to give ... my four legged 'soul mate'. Then the fateful day arrived. I had to make the decision we all dread. So letting her go with dignity, at the age of 16 years, Tammy died peacefully in my arms, at home and surrounded by all who loved her . . . my daughters and mum.

The old saying "Time is a great healer" is right. We never forget those who we have loved. The memories never go away, but with time the 'raw' period begins to blend into the back ground and the happy times become more memorable. Like people, each pet is different. We don't love them anymore than the previous one, just maybe in a different way.

Water Damage - Who Pays? - Part 2

nder s.11(2) of the Landlord & Tenant Act 1985 the landlord is not responsible for works or repairs for things which the tenant has a duty to use in a tenant-like manner such as carpets or decoration. However, the exact responsibilities may be set out in any explicit terms contained within the Assured Shorthold Tenancy Agreement and what constitutes the Landlords fixtures, fittings and contents.

Who pays for water damage?

The next step for the landlord is to establish who pays for the repairs in both flats.

For a start any insurance on the (upstairs flat) will only cover damage to the landlords flat unless there is block insurance scheme in place. This is likely to be the case where a freeholder and a management company exist who arrange the building insurance for the entire residential block and then recharge each leaseholder for their share of the insurance costs.

Contents insurance is the responsibility of the individual flat owner or leaseholder. Therefore, providing the landlord has contents cover they will be able to claim against the damage caused to the carpet in their top floor flat. The landlord is likely to have liability cover included in their buy-to-let insurance policy, but this is only if it can be proved that they were legally negligent. This means that under the scenario under discussion, the only way the landlord of the upstairs flat would have been legally negligent is if the downstairs flat owner "officially" warned the top floor landlord that they had a leak (or something that may cause a potential leak) that could damage the downstairs flat. Then, following this, the top floor landlord ignored

this warning and then the leak occurred. In practice, there is almost no chance of this happening as by the time a leak is discovered, the likelihood is that the damage has already been caused. This is therefore classed as an accident as far as the buy-to-let insurer is concerned and therefore would not be the top floor landlord's fault.

Therefore, the property investor who owns the downstairs flat has several options. Firstly, depending on the terms of the tenancy the tenant if insured could claim on their contents insurance. It may well be that the insurance company that provides the buildings cover also includes cover for floor coverings such as carpets within the policy.

Therefore, where a residential block insurance policy is in place the costs of both carpets could be claimed for together along with the costs of repair to the ceiling. This would have the benefit for both landlords of not having to get into an argument with the tenant about who is responsible for the costs and then for one of the parties to have to make a separate claim. Where this extent of cover is not in place then the property investor may decide to claim off their own buy-to-let insurance. In this case the property investor and owner of the downstairs flat is not likely to be happy, but it is down to them to pursue their insurer for further advice.

Their insurer could ultimately pursue the top floor landlord's buy-to-let insurer under the negligence clause. The reality is unless the amounts are large and the case clear cut that it is very unlikely to happen. Landlords should always remember that a conciliatory approach is likely to produce a more effective long-term solution than an aggressive confrontational one.





lean and repair your garden tools, book the lawn mower in for a service and check garden furniture for any rot. When it is warm enough to brave the elements, treat sheds, fences and trellis with wood preservative; brushes and rollers are fine for most things, however a sprayer is well worth buying for tricky projects such as woven panels!



When soil conditions allow, continue to dig over beds and borders, incorporating as much organic matter as you can. Forking over not only helps prepare the soil for next year, it helps reduce pests by exposing them to hungry birds.

Get kids into the garden

Gardening isn't just for grown-ups, just for summer or just for those with gardens. There are hundreds of ways children can have fun both in and outdoors, all year round. From miniature gardens to planting bulbs, from weeding and digging alongside adults to having a little spot all of their own – gardening can occupy them for hours and even help you out.

A good way to get children interested in gardening is to stimulate their senses with brightly coloured flowers, aromatic foliage, scented blooms, tactile leaves and fast-cropping edible plants. It may be necessary for you to explain things initially, making suggestions and putting forward ideas, but in the end the child should feel it's his or her project. And don't worry if you're a beginner yourself – gardening with children is the perfect excuse to go back to the drawing board together!

When the weather allows, carry on clearing paths of moss and leaves.

Helping Out

Smaller children love to get really messy, but you can turn it to your advantage by getting them to help you with digging, weeding and watering.

Very small children may be scared of the creatures that live in the garden, so it's worth spending some time explaining what they do. Soon they'll be merrily collecting them in jars. You can explain:

- A weed is really an 'ugly' plant in the wrong place. Because they compete for food in the soil, it's best to pull them up. Take care to show children which are weeds, or precious plants could come a cropper!
- Some weeds, like dandelions, have deeper roots than others and are a bit difficult to dig up. Start with those that are easily lifted.
- Digging and forking the soil lets in the air which is important for the plants' roots and for all the animals living in the soil.
- To prepare the soil for a flowerbed, you have to turn over down to a depth of about 30cm and break up all the large lumps, adding organic matter, such as well rotted manure or compost.

10 Jobs for this month

- Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch
- 2. Ventilate the greenhouse on sunny days
- 3. Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already
- 4. Repair and re-shape lawn edges
- 5. Inspect stored tubers of Dahlia, Begonia and Canna for rots or drying out
- 6. Prune apple and pear trees
- 7. Start forcing rhubarb
- 8. Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season
- 9. Keep putting out food and water for hungry birds
- 10. Prepare a polythene shelter for outdoor peaches and nectarines, to protect them from peach leaf curl.



FUN TIPS:

- Put a small box around the fruit of a tomato when it's little, the tomato will grow into a square much more fun to eat.
- If you tape a fridge magnet letter to a young apple, then the fruit will grow around the letter. When you remove it you have your own personalised fruit!
- Grow a 'head' of long, wild green grass by cutting off the foot of an old thin sock or thickish tights, tying a knot at the cut end and filling that end with compost and grass seed so you end up with a good-sized head. Knot the other end like a balloon and make a nose by pulling out a lump in the middle and fixing an elastic band around it. Cut out felt features, stick on with fabric glue and leave to dry, then sit it on a cup of water and watch your new friend grow grassy hair.

STIMULATE THE SENSES:

- Introduce your children to 'noisy' plants such as the rattling seedheads of Nigella (love in the mist) and poppies, and rustling grasses and bamboos.
- Let them experience the distinctive scents of Helichrysum italicum (curry plant), cherry pie heliotrope, chocolate cosmos and Melissa officinalis (lemon balm).
- Fun to touch plants include furry Stachys byzantine (lamb's ears), sticky Petunia or prickly Eryngium.

Once a child is happy digging and weeding, they're all set to prepare a small garden of their own.



Spring Seeds

- Seeds that can be planted straight into the ground and produce fast growing, brightly-coloured flowers are best, as a few weeks can seem years to a child. Look for candytuft, nasturtiums, stocks and sweet peas and packets that say 'easy' or 'good for children'. Big tree seeds, like acorns, conkers and sycamore wings are ideal for young children.
- Use a stick to dig a trench 2cm deep and place large seeds in at least 1cm apart. Small seeds should be sprinkled evenly pinch by pinch.
- Cover with soil and pat gently. Then water thoroughly with a sprinkler watering can, taking care not to disturb the seeds.
- Label the area so you remember what you have planted and where!

Containers

If you have a patio or roof terrace, have fun with containers – they will get children used to planning, preparing and tending, and can be moved indoors when it's too cold outside!

Winter Bulbs

• Put a few pebbles in the bottom of a pretty pot 20–25cm in diameter and half fill with bulb fibre. Plant three hyacinth bulbs, putting bulb fibre around them but leaving the top of the bulbs just showing. Water well. Cover with newspaper to block out the light and keep in a cool frost-free shed or unheated room. Water every 2–3 weeks. After six weeks put it on a window sill and watch the flowers grow!

How to plant conifers after Christmas

es, yes, we know you don't even want to think yet about taking your gorgeous Christmas tree down, especially when you have painstakingly decorated it with glass of sherry in hand and Bing Crosby on your stereobut the reality is, the time will come when you have to say goodbye to your beautifully pine scented friend ... or do you ????

PLANTING CHRISTMAS TREES IN THE GARDEN – THE MOST IMPORTANT TIPS

If you plant potted Christmas trees or one of the larger conifers, but also the dwarf conifers sooner or later in your garden, there are a few things to keep in mind.

- 1. The right location is crucial so that the potted Christmas trees can develop unhindered. A size-limiting cut should not be performed on conifers, as this is often a considerable interference with its beautiful habit. And do not forget: the former Christmas tree should not obstruct or limit the garden inhabitants and persons in the house.
- 2. First, find out about the final size of the potted Christmas trees that you would like to plant later. How big will your conifer grow? With large conifers you will have to provide enough space! But even dwarf conifers should not be very hard pressed by other plants; due to their low growth, they then quickly disappear between other plants and get bare completely or on one side.
- 3. Dwarf coniferous plants, including the former compactly growing Christmas trees, work best together individually or in small groups with other weak-growing plants. Columnar conifers are well suited in pairs for marking entrances or passageways.
- 4. Most conifers we offer during the Christmas season are undemanding at the location you provide them. It should be sunny or partially shaded, with neutral or slightly acidic soil. Most conifers tolerate waterlogging poorly, so the soil must be well-drained, but in contrast it may not get too dry.
- 5. When planting, you can easily shake out the root ball, which makes it easier for the plant to grow its roots into the new soil. Make sure that the plants are not planted deeper than they were in the pot.

If you pay attention to these few things, then your Christmas tree will also develop well outside in the garden and you will enjoy it for a long time.



Fruit and vegetables contribute to good health

ruit and vegetables can really contribute to your good health because they have so much to offer you. The more that you consume on a regular basis the stronger will be your immune system and the greater your energy and vitality levels. To optimize your health you owe it to yourself to include these foods in your new year's meals!

Chia Seeds:

Chia seeds are very much like flaxseeds. They are a source of soluble fibre which is good for the heart. They are also high in protein and high in essential omega-3 fats. They are also rich in calcium, magnesium, iron and potassium. You only need a small portion of chia seeds to give you a boost of energy and to balance out your blood sugar.

Chia seeds make a great addition to your breakfast cereal, a bowl of oatmeal or a bowl of yogurt. These small health enhancing seeds contain six times more calcium than milk, three times more iron than spinach, two times more potassium than bananas and 15 times more magnesium than broccoli.

Pomegranates:

Pomegranates are a perfect food for the winter because they are most readily available during the early to mid-winter months. Often thought of as the "jewels of winter" this colourful and tasty fruit can add variety to your salads and your desserts.

Pomegranates are rich in an antioxidant known as ellagic acid which can help to combat inflammatory health conditions such as atherosclerosis, arthritis and a number of infections. Pomegranates and pears make for a tasty treat when eaten together.

There is a trick to eating a pomegranate. Submerge it is a bowl of water as you go about the task of taking off the outer rind and the white pith. This will cause the seeds of the fruit to sink to the bottom of the bowl. When you eat the seeds directly from the opened rind of the fruit you become conscious of how many you are consuming which makes eating too many highly unlikely.

Green Tea:

If you are a coffee drinker then it would not hurt you to give green tea a try. While coffee does have some health benefits, green tea also has its share of benefits that can do your body good. Both coffee and green tea contains antioxidants and help to promote weight loss. However green tea has also been shown to be an effective cancer fighter.

Approximately one-third of a green tea leaf is composed of antioxidants known as catechins. The main catechin is called epigallocatechin gallate. Due to its long name it is most often referred to by its acronym, EGCG. Research studies have shown that EGCG is effective in terms of boosting metabolism and it may be able to prevent the development of certain types of cancers, in particular these include bladder cancer and prostate cancer.

But the goodness of green tea does not end there. It also contains an amino acid called L-theanine which helps to relieve stress and anxiety and supports a relaxed and calm state of mind. Green tea is good in general (green ginger mint tea is quite a savoury treat!) but if you wish you can choose the most potent form of it known as matcha. This type of green tea is finely milled and very tasty to the taste buds! Yum!
