Sports teams in Cottingham to benefit from Commuted Sums

joint application from East Riding Leisure Haltemprice and King George V Trust has been awarded £45,950 Inding from East Riding of Yorkshire Council as part of Commuted Sums from local housing developments.

The funding has been awarded towards the facility improvements at King George V Cottingham. The works will involve the resurfacing of a 45m x 35m 3G Sports pitch; drilling of drainage holes in the existing tarmac to improve the water runoff; provision of a shock pad; and supply of a 40mm fibrillated 3G carpet with line markings including sand and rubber infill.

The new resurfaced 3G area pitch will provide a much needed facility for the local sports teams in the Cottingham Area, as existing facilities are oversubscribed and teams often have to travel several miles for winter training. During match days there are not enough pitches for games. The improved facilities will also support the provision of wider community activities, such as Twilight Football.

Alicia Mail, Director of the KGV Cottingham Trust, said, "We are absolutely delighted to receive this award - it will mean so much to Cottingham Sports pavilion and to East Riding Rangers, the home football club, and indeed other sports clubs and individuals, including our local village schools and user groups.

"The multisport area on KGV Cottingham has been unused for a number of years as very little sport was played, as the surface was old fashioned and soon became unsafe underfoot. This award will bring the area back to life with a new purpose built FA registered 3G surface for 7x7 and 5x5 football games and training sessions.

"It not only provides a clean safe area for people to play sport, but it will bring in revenue to help sustain the pavilion, which is a charity registered business managed by a volunteer trust.

"It will make a big difference to the community and offer more scope, including day time use from schools, groups and walking football with the possibility of starting a walking football league.

"The trust, along with East Riding Rangers who are a partner group, have further plans for KGV Cottingham. The refurbishment of the multisports area is phase one of a large project with aims for phase two and possibly phase three which will bring good things for the ever expanding village in terms of sport and recreation.'



Covid-19 and Care Decisions

The CQC's review into the application of Do-Not-Attempt-Resuscitate (DNAR) orders during the Covid-19 pandemic reveals incorrect and ageist use. As a solicitor specialising in supporting older and vulnerable people in the East Riding of Yorkshire, I know that sadly, this is nothing new. Widely condemned by the CQC and medical bodies, it has emerged that instead of being applied on an individual basis, blanket DNAR orders were applied to groups of care home residents.

It's horrifying to think about DNAR orders being applied to groups of vulnerable people. This isn't how they should be used and however stretched our health and care services are, this kind of disregard for older people cannot be accepted.

Best practice guidelines have been set out by the Resuscitation Council UK, but they aren't being followed everywhere. Too often these are ignored or treated as a tick box exercise rather than prompting meaningful consultation with patients and loved ones.

There is clearly a need for all of us to initiate our own conversations about whether we'd want CPR, and also about our wider care wishes. Once we're in an emergency situation it's often too late.

Worryingly, only 59% of those aged 70+ have talked to loved ones about their care wishes. And whilst 81% of us think planning ahead for later life is important, only 22% of us have a Lasting Power of Attorney in place, setting out our wishes in writing in a legally binding way.

As a country, we must start talking about our wishes should we lose mental and/or physical capacity or require emergency medical treatment. This recent investigation into the use of DNARs must encourage us all to have those difficult, but vital conversations, no matter our age.

Housebuilder supports NHS workers in Hull with £465k contribution to buying scheme

A winter checklist for landlords

We have had one of the wettest run ins to winter that I can remember, winter is now firmly upon us and the days are shorter. Every year we see many weather-related property incidents at this time of year, and there is a lot that can be done to safeguard against this.

As a landlord, winter poses some unique problems. Your property is at its most vulnerable during the coldest months, and you need to take steps to protect it. As well as helping you fulfil your obligation to provide reasonable accommodation to your tenants, these simple steps will help to ensure that you avoid major problems further down the line.

Check the pipes

Frozen pipes can cause major damage to your property. Pipes are more likely to burst when they are frozen, and this can cause flooding and water damage. This is an expensive prospect

You can minimise the potential for damage of this kind by making sure that all outside pipes are properly clad. You can clad pipes yourself, and the material to do so is cheap and readily available from

If you notice cracks or fissures in pipes, make sure they are dealt with as a matter of urgency. These will only get worse, particularly in cold weather.

Service the boiler

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You have a range of legal responsibilities when it comes to the boiler in your property, including a requirement to secure an up-to-date Gas Safe certificate. In addition, though, you must make sure that this piece of equipment is fully functional – and this never more important than during the winter months

You should consider having the boiler serviced before the winter. As well as keeping your tenants warm, a properly working boiler will help to ensure that your pipes do not freeze.

Instruct your tenants

Properly informed tenants are your most useful tool in the battle against winter. By making sure that your tenants have the information they need you can significantly reduce the potential for damage

Consider preparing an information pack that outlines things like how the boiler works, and the location of the stopcock. You should also suggest that they leave the heating on at a low setting if they intend to leave the property empty for a few days, for example over Christmas. This will help to ensure that the pipes do not freeze.

Consider void periods

An empty property can begin to degrade remarkably quickly over the winter. If you are currently suffering from a void period, make sure that you visit the property regularly to do some simple maintenance.

Windows should be opened to air the property, and the heating system should be turned on regularly. Some systems feature automation that will perform this task for you. You should also make sure that the pipes have not frozen, and that the taps work correctly.

Blocked gutters can cause water to accumulate, and ice to form. This in turn can increase the chances of overflows or frozen pipes. You should therefore make sure that the gutters around your property are clear of leaves and other detritus, particularly if you anticipate heavy rain or very cold conditions.

Winter property maintenance might seem like a hassle, but it is very much part of the landlord's job. By taking a few simple steps before the cold weather sets in, you can help to minimise the potential for bigger problems later on

Sandra Ackroyd, Chief Executive of Sight Support HEY said "All of us at Sight Support Hull & East Yorkshire are delighted to have been shortlisted in two of the Visionary award categories and to have won the 'Connect' award category. This award is a great recognition of the hard work of our staff and our partner organisation 'FitMums & Friends', another local charity, with whom we work very closely to deliver this project for the benefit of blind and partially sighted people".

"The project is a huge success and sees sighted volunteers support people with visual impairments to participate in fitness walking, running and other physical activity to improve physical health and mental wellbeing as well as developing lasting friendships along the way".

Many of those who have taken part in the sessions have expressed an improvement in not only their fitness levels, but also their selfconfidence and general well-being.

"It's really helped me with my mental health. It's taken me out of myself. When I'm alone and a bit under the weather I can go into a bit of a downward spiral. Just coming on the walk and talking with so many friendly people, it lifts me every time."

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



Slow cooked chilli

• Total time: Ready in 1 hour 45 minutes. Serves: 4

Ingredients

400g pack Waitrose Aberdeen Angus Beef Lean Minced (10% fat)

- 1 tsp hot smoked paprika
- 150ml Baron des Tours Medoc red wine
- 1 Knorr Beef Stock Pot

Beef and ale stew

Preparation time: 10 minutesCooking time: 105 minutes

• Total time: 1 hour 55 minutes . Serves: 6

Ingredients

1 tbsp light olive oil

2 onions, chopped

500g Cooks' Ingredients casserole vegetables

2 tbsp tomato purée

700g essential Waitrose British beef diced braising steak,

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trimmed of fat

- 4 tbsp plain flour
- 2 sprigs rosemary
- 2 bay leaves
- 500ml dark ale
- 250ml Cooks' Ingredients beef stock
- 2 tsp essential Waitrose redcurrant jelly
- 480g steamed green vegetables, to serve
- 600g boiled new potatoes, to serve

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C, gas mark 4. Heat the oil in a large ovenproof casserole dish, add the onions and fry over a medium heat for about 5 minutes or until softened and lightly browned.
- 2. Add the casserole vegetables and cook for another 5-8 minutes or until slightly softened. Stir in the tomato purée and cook for 1 minute.
- 3. Place the beef in a large bowl and season with freshly ground black pepper. Add the flour and toss to coat. Add the beef to the pan with the vegetables and stir well.
- 4. Add the rosemary, bay leaves, ale and stock, stir well and bring to the boil. Cover with a lid and cook in the oven for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours or until the beef and vegetables are tender
- 5. Stir in the redcurrant jelly and remove the rosemary sprigs. Serve the stew with the steamed green vegetables and boiled new potatoes.

Cook's tip

A meat stew is the type of dish that can easily be prepared ahead of time. Make the day before and leave overnight in the fridge for the flavours to develop. Alternatively, make a double batch and freeze half for dinner one night next week. To transform your beef & ale stew into beef bourguignon, swap the ale for 250ml red wine and 250ml water. Add 250g closed cup chestnut mushrooms (whole) for the last 30 minutes of cooking.





Chicken casserole with dumplings

• Total time: Ready in 45 minutes. Serves: 4

Ingredients

1 tbsp oil

800g pack essential Waitrose British Chicken Thighs, scored 500g tub essential Waitrose Gravy

195g can essential Waitrose Sweetcorn, drained

4 essential Waitrose Fresh Garlic Bread Slices

200g essential Waitrose Spring Greens or cabbage or kale, shredded

3. Add the spring greens and beans to the casserole and cook, covered, for 10 minutes. Remove the lid and add the dumplings to the casserole, pressing down slightly. Cook for 10 minutes until golden.

Sticky ginger loaf

This fantastic gluten-free cake is sweet and squidgy in the middle with a cool ginger icing on top. The stem ginger syrup is made with white sugar, but you could replace it with maple syrup or honey to make this recipe refined sugar free, too.

• Preparation time: 25 minutes, plus soaking

· Cooking time: 1 hour

• Total time: 1 hour 25 minutes, plus soaking. Serves: 10

Ingredients

175g unsalted butter, melted, plus extra for greasing 100g dried pitted dates

3 balls stem ginger, roughly chopped, plus extra to decorate 100ml maple syrup

3 large eggs

200g ground almonds

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50g rice flour 1 tsp baking powder 1 tsp ground ginger ½tsp salt

For the icing:

50g dried pitted dates, roughly chopped 3 tbsp stem ginger syrup large pinch ground ginger 125g Philadelphia soft cheese

Method

1 Preheat the oven to 170°c, gas mark 3; grease and line a 900g loaf tin. Cover the dates with boiling water; leave for 10 minutes. Drain and whizz in a food processor with the butter, ginger and maple syrup until smooth. Add the eggs, then whizz to combine. Add the dry ingredients and whizz until just combined.

2 Tip into the prepared tin, level out the top and bake for one hour, until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. (cover with foil for the last 10 minutes if it browns too fast.) leave to cool completely in the tin.

3 For the icing, soak the dates in 75ml boiling water for 10 minutes, then tip into a blender (ideally a high-speed blender or nutribullet, or use the small bowl of a food processor). add the ginger syrup, ground ginger and a pinch of salt, then blend until smooth; cool completely. using electric beaters, whip the soft cheese briefly, then whip in the date mix. ice the loaf and top with extra stem ginger.

A look to the future ...

irst of all, let me wish every reader a Happy New Year - I think we need it after the 12 months we've just had. And let's raise a glass to happier and safer times.

Predictions are being made that with an accelerated vaccination programme and hopefully the banishing of Covid-19 from dominating the headlines, we'll all be looking forward to something like normality and the freedom to explore again.

The latest Waitrose Food & Drink Report says alternative formats and comforting old favourites rose in popularity during 2020 as consumers sought comfort and convenience in uncertain times. But it also says the (hopefully) justified new confidence in better times ahead will also extend to socialising and entertaining, predicting 2021 is likely to see more exploration in terms of lesser-known wine regions and grape varieties, exotic spirits and unusual flavour combinations.

Master of Wine Pierpaolo Petrassi, boss of the Waitrose beer, wines and spirits team, said: "Lockdown saw people reduce the number of visits they made to shops, so larger formats like bag in box were in demand and customers haven't looked back," pointing out that wine in cans, cocktails in post-friendly sachets and bag in box wine have "pushed the boundaries of how people expect to buy good-quality drinks" and predicts the trend will only grow on the back of innovation in the industry and more customers embracing different types of packaging.

But looking ahead, he said: "For 2021, our sense of exploring the new will be refreshed with 20 per cent of us saying we plan to continue experimenting with new drinks at home, rising to a third among 18-24 year-olds."

He continued: "We also expect to see a rise in popularity of lesser-known wine regions and grape varieties as well as more exotic spirits and unusual flavour combinations."

Writing in the report, Waitrose Wine buying manager Jamie Matthewson predicted that sherry, English wine and no and low-alcohol drinks would continue to see growth in 2021.

Sherry, he said, saw a steep increase in popularity during the year just gone, with consumers rediscovering classic or traditional styles of Manzanilla, Amontillado and Oloroso – where previously it was all about sweet cream sherries. He also noted the rise of martinis with a sherry rinse, sweet sherry and more consumers discovering the food matching potential of sherry, with everything from salty cured meats to rich, indulgent desserts.

Elsewhere, he said English wine was set to grow on the back of last year's excellent harvest. "The quality of the 2019 vintage of English and Welsh wine is the best we've ever seen and this, combined with the increase in popularity of English and Welsh reds – particularly lighter styles – made a bumper year for home-grown wine," he said.

Rosé sales had also seen its strongest year, up 57 per cent during the autumn alone, compared to the same period ikn 2019, proving that "pink is officially for all seasons", Matthewson said. "Rosé wine had its biggest year ever last year, and this will only continue to grow in 2021."

Spanish Albariño and Primitivo were also tipped for growth, with the former set to "have its truly mainstream moment in 2021".

Sales of no alcohol alternatives was also up 22 per cent year on year, the retailer said, with 18 per cent of consumers planning to try more low-alcohol or alcohol-free drinks as part of the wider trend to reduce alcohol consumption and boost health.

Meanwhile spritzers and flavoured vodkas area also on trend. "The growing trend for flavoured spirits, led by gin, has seen flavoured vodka become the latest spirit of choice," Matthewson said, pointing to "fun" flavours such as fir, rhubarb and marmalade, that are likely to do well.

* Syrah and Shiraz - different wines? Not a bit of it; they are simply the two names of the same grape variety, although that grape can produce wines of very different style. The dark-skinned grape, used primarily to produce red wine, is the offspring of two obscure varieties from south-eastern France.

So why the different names? In truth I'm not sure, but wines from the grape produced in France, and some other countries, including the Americas and South Africa, are labelled Syrah, whereas "New World" wines, particularly in Australia, where the grape is the most widely planted, are bottled as Shiraz. The typical "Old World" Syrah is lighter and leaner than the intense Shiraz wines of the New World, which tend to be richer, riper and more full-bodied.

Interestingly, in the recent "best Syrah" category in the 2020 Global Wine Masters awards, it was Shiraz wines that dominated the under £10 category. And for unoaked varieties there was a silver medal for a real value-for-money example stocked by Aldi.

From Aldi's Exquisite Collection, their Exquisite South Australia Shiraz (£5.99) is high in alcohol (14%) and intense in fruit and spice flavours and is fantastic value and works well with rich pasta dishes or beef.

My 2020 year in review. Fear to the fore!

Thinking back on the horses and owners I have worked with over the last year, the main criteria which repeated itself over and over again, was fear. Fear of traffic, fear of humans in general or specific to something like having a human on its back, fear of needles, vets, farriers or foot handling in general, fear of procedures like clipping or worming, fear of loading into horse transport trailers or lorries. Head shy, ear shy, uncatchable- the list is endless.

Yet again, I have met so very many horses fearing things and so many owners who are fearful of their horses reactions in certain situations because they have experienced their horse performing violent or frightening behaviour.

Fear is the most enormous subject to try to cover when talking about behaviour in any animal.

Fear is one of the most highly developed brain systems in all mammals because the need to survive is the reason it exists and survival is the trigger to it coming to the fore.

Fear behaviours range from being on high alert in general, to massive, violent physical reactions in order to escape. High alert in horses keeps them vigilant: living on the edge, constantly tense and scanning the immediate environment for anything it feels it may need to escape from. Dependant on the triggers, the horse is basically ready to flee at any time. The animal suffers the inability to be able to relax. Fear over rides the ability to make calm cognitive processing. It creates such tension as to disable any way to problem solve in a rational way: these are all in the mix when a horse lives in fear. We humans are just the same. We react in exactly the same way when we are in fear. Try putting yourself in an emotional place as described above- what would you be doing and how would you be feeling?

Some horses who have had an awful upbringing filled with bad experiences are most likely to live on the edge of fear most of the time. Horses who have had bad experiencers in a given environment will always attach high alert when faced with the same scenario. The environment can be the initial trigger rather than a specific stimuli.

Traffic fear is the most frequent reason for owners to make contact



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with me. It's the largest category for horses to come to my yard and into my training. The roads are so busy now filled with enormous vehicles and modern day horses tend not prepared for this situation properly when growing up or when they are sent to trainers for "breaking in". (That is a terrible term most commonly used in the horse world. It stems back to the days when horses were broken in spirit in order to be useable! I use the statement "starting under saddle" instead as I do not use abusive methods for any horse training)

A lot of the old skills have been lost. All young horses should be endlessly long-reined out on roads during starting training. It would appear that more and more horses see nothing more than the inside of a ménage or schooling area during training. Young horse training tends to be more rushed these days because some owners want the training done as quickly and as cheaply as possible. It is what it is. Being ill prepared is a recipe for disaster, sets the horse up to fail and ultimately puts the human in danger.

The last young horse I had in for training was exactly as this described and had suffered enormous trauma while out riding with his new owner. They were both left traumatised as a result. Which brings me to the next point.

Human training is as import as the horse training. Owners are left emotionally damaged too so very careful, slow and repetitive training is done with both horse and owner by the use of systematic desensitisation and counter conditioning. They must both gain confidence. They must both gain mutual trust and become a cohesive partnership. I absolutely love helping partnerships to develop, it's the whole reason why I do what I do!

I gain huge satisfaction in the phone/video Behaviour Consultancy side of my work. The internet has made our world so connectable. I have helped horse owners from all across the world during this last year. A show jumper in the Caribbean, a new young horse owner in Austria, a producer of competition horses in the USA, a Dressage horse owner in South Africa- to name but a few International clients. Mostly though, I help horse owners from all across the UK to understand their horses better. To unpick why unwanted behaviour is happening and to create hugely positive training protocols and management plans to change what is happening and produce calm, safe and cohesive partnerships.

So, here's to the New Year and to helping more and more people learn how to help their horses and themselves in the process.

My thanks go to all of you who follow my work and who read my words. I wish everyone all good things for 2021.


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


Catastrophe

s a family, we have had numerous cats over the years, the first being a tabby kitten called Suiki. She was a feisty little thing, well respected amongst the 'Animal Kingdom' and definitely Top Cat. So, when Bisley, my one and a half-eared cat, came along to join our ever-increasing family, emotions ran high. Hissing and spitting first, then followed by an abundance of fur and sadly Bisley came off worse! Over a period of time, they learnt to respect each other's territory that was UNTIL Jaffa arrived, our beautiful ginger tom kitten. Once again, we were back to square one, hissing, spitting, fur flying. Then, you guessed it, we finally adopted number 4, a lovely grey tabby called Saffie. At the time, we thought that the feline species get on with each other, just like their counterparts the canines, and that they enjoyed being a member of a pack. For one or two cats this may be true but surprisingly to the majority, they are solitary...enjoying their own company combined with their owner's affection.

Here is a scenario:

I have bought a new kitten Simba to keep my other cat Theo company. I think Theo is jealous of Simba. He doesn't sit on our knees any more but hisses and runs away if we try to stroke him. He hardly ever comes down from the top of the kitchen cupboards and he will not use his litter tray any more. Instead, he is spraying (urine) on the



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furniture and curtains

Simba is very good, always using the litter tray and is happy to sleep in the cat's bed. She loves being stroked, nuzzling and rubbing her head as we do so. I don't know if we can keep Theo as the smell is awful. I haven't been letting him out since we lost his brother on the road but there have been moments when I have been tempted to risk it.

LET'S HEAR IT FROM THE 'CATS WHISKERS'......

"Hi, my name is Theo. My territory has shrunk to the top of the kitchen cupboards and I am TOTALLY stressed out. I was purrfectly happy sharing my territory with my brother but now??? Unfortunately, he crossed the main road once too often and then I quickly settled down to life on my own. I like my own company and like most cats am not overly sociable with others of my own kind. I want to hunt the prey on my territory, not share it. I was quite content even though I was kept inside most of the time - a little dull but tolerable.

Then CATASTROPHE! Two weeks ago, a young kitten TOTALLY invaded my territory. How would you like it if a total stranger moved into your home uninvited, started sleeping on your bed, eating off your dishes and even using your toilet!! Fine if you are a dog.

Clearly, scent marking my territory from my facial glands is not sufficient. The boundaries need stronger defences so I have begun spraying on the curtains and furniture. I feel a bit safer when there is plenty of my scent in the air. Good news on the toilet front too. When IT is asleep, I sneak down and I have found a quiet corner behind the chair to use instead of the litter tray followed by scratching my claws into the stair carpet on the way back. Fortunately, IT is unable to get up there. My owners are of no help, allowing IT on my things. They then try to touch me when they stink of IT. That really does tick all the wrong boxes - I cannot bear them to touch me! If I could just get outside again and put a bit of space between me and IT, I would have something else to think about."

Cats hunt small prey and often live solitary lives other than when reproducing and caring for their young. Siblings may share parental duties, but go hunting separately. There is no advantage to hunting together. There is benefit in holding a territory to hunt in and avoiding physical conflict through scent marking and respecting other cats' boundaries.

The introduction of a new cat into the household IS possible and there are ways of conducting the introduction to give the best chance of having 2 happy cats living together. This may vary from pheromone sprays/diffusers to relax the atmosphere, to positioning and increasing the number of litter trays.



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"The Tooth and **Nothing** but The Tooth"

ello again, I hope that you are safe and well. A very happy new year to you!


Hope is here, the future is brighter

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Motoring - with Roy Woodcock



Skoda's Kodiaq might be named after a bear but it has more than the bare necessities of motoring life - Roy Woodcock tries one for size . . .

he car market is brimming over with SUVs and there seems to be no let-up in demand. But it needs something special to stand out from the crowd and for all sorts of reasons the Skoda Kodiaq does just that.

Launched almost four years ago (so don't be surprised if we see a refresh sometime soon) it was the Czech company's first seven-seater SUV and quickly made a mark as an impressive all-rounder, being comfortable, practical and good to drive.

Named after the 3,500 Kodiaq bears that live on a remote island off the southern coast of Alaska, it comes in a mind-boggling array of trim levels and configurations, so that opening statement about it being a seven-seater needs some clarification - at entry-level, the Kodiaq SE, it is possible to specify the car with just five seats.

That obviously makes it the cheapest variant - from £24,900 on the road - but as you go up the range, for those wanting premium levels of equipment and comfort, it remains highly competitive and actually delivers cost savings against most of its rivals.

It's not fanciful to start talking about this car and its capabilities in relation to much more expensive models from Land Rover and Audi, for example.

The closest rival is perhaps the Volkswagen's Tiguan Allspace, but that's more expensive, while the Nissan X-Trail and Peugeot 5008 don't have quite as much space as the Kodiaq. Elsewhere, the Hyundai Santa Fe and Kia Sorento offer seven seats, but are bigger and heavier, so not as economical or nice to drive, while the Land Rover Discovery Sport has a hefty price premium over the Kodiaq, but arguably isn't as versatile.

The range comprises seven trim levels; SE, SE L, Edition, L&K, SportLine, Scout and vRS. I was driving the Kodiaq Edition 2.0 TDI (190PS) model with a DSG gearbox and four-wheel drive (£39,960 on the road) and it's the seven-seat versions where the Kodiaq really comes into its own because of its tremendous versatility

While the car is just 40mm longer than the Skoda Octavia, it offers a larger-than-average interior for the SUV segment. The interior length is 1,793mm, elbow room is 1,527mm in the front and 1,510mm in the rear. Head room is 1,020 mm in the front and 1,014 mm in the rear. Rear legroom measures up to 104 mm.

The middle seat row can be folded 60:40, features individually adjustable backrests and can slide lengthways by 180mm as standard. The third row of seats can be folded neatly into the floor space to create a larger load area - the biggest in its class, in fact, at a whopping 2,065 litres

All models in the range are equipped with LED daytime running lights, alloy wheels, leather multifunction steering wheel and air-conditioning. Front Assist, DAB digital radio, touchscreen infotainment systems and SmartLink are also standard across the line-up.

Standard equipment on Edition versions include 19-inch alloys, cornering LED front fog lights, dual zone air-con, electrically-adjusted and heated front seats, electrically-adjusted and heated door mirrors, headlamp washers, automatic lights and wipers, leather upholstery, rear parking sensors, privacy glass, electrically-operated boot and a sat-nav system with online infotainment.

And of course being a Skoda it comes with a host of "Simply Clever" extras. These are the odd little presents Skoda stash in the car for that moment you remember you've forgotten your umbrella – and find one in the door, or need a light and discover a torch in the boot.

There's also door-edge protection, which deploy automatically thanks to preloaded springs when opening the car door to prevent the metal edge of the door from coming into contact with a garage wall or an adjacent vehicle. When shutting the door, the trim folds itself back in, helping preventing bumps and scratches to your own car, as well as neighbouring vehicles.

The 2.0-litre TDI diesel with the automatic gearbox and all-wheel drive in the most powerful engine available (there are two petrol and three diesels to choose from) and proved more than capable of hauling this big car along. But what was surprising was just how quiet it was; remarkably so.

The Edition trim level meant it was also fitted with a Drive mode selector, so you can choose Comfort, Normal or Sport mode depending on the terrain, your mood or your company. The slick DSG automatic gearbox suits the car extremely well, too.

Did I mention that the Kodiaq can handle pretty rough terrain, too? No? Well I can vouch for its Off-road capabilities - just one more thing that make this car hard to beat. So, a pretty impressive package all round, particularly if useable space is one of the boxes you need to tick.

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The Bo-Men of Belgium march on the UK

Among the many striking artworks on show at the Artmarket Gallery, the remarkable Bo-men – small ceramic figures whose never-ending activity symbolises humanity, survival and the joy of life – always attract attention from curious visitors.

The square-headed little people, symbolising humanity's essential oneness with each other and ever-hopeful determination to overcome life's struggles, are the creation of Belgian artist Daisy Boman, and can be found worldwide — although in this country, the Artmarket Gallery is the sole stockist.

The sculptures are pretty sturdy but are, nonetheless, ceramic — so Artmarket Gallery directors Robert and Michelle

Power like to give them the VIP treatment. The latest consignment of Bo-men are handpicked by Robert and Michelle from Daisy's beautiful studio in Belgium.

"Daisy is special to us," says Robert.
"You can't buy the Bo-men anywhere else in this country, and we love our regular trips to Geel."

"I think the Bo-men, large or small, speak for themselves, and are very easy to understand," says Daisy. "They are about humanity, survival, and the joy of life. They are on different levels, as we all have a little bit of a struggle to get to the next level of our lives, and sometimes get on top of each other a little."

The Bo-men were originally inspired by a serious and very personal crusade:
Daisy's wish to remind people that we are all equal. She lived in South Africa in the early 1980s when her architect husband's work took the family there, and was appalled by the violent discrimination and inequality of the

racial segregation of the Apartheid regime at the time.

Already a trained artist – she'd studied art at the Sissa school in Antwerp and the Academy of Fine Arts in Mol – she undertook a ceramic art course in Johannesburg, and exhibited widely in South Africa.

On the family's return to Belgium in 1987 she created the 'Bo-mannetje' ('mannetje' being Belgian Dutch for 'little man'), later shortened to Bo-men. The egalitarian figures soon caught the attention of the wider art world — Daisy exhibited at London's Halcyon and New Bond Street galleries, and respected British art critic Estelle Lovatt praised their 'primitive and rough' forms, saying they were 'raw in their natural state. Stripped back, so as to illustrate man's equality and stability, each fits into a shared cast with shared objectives'.

lean and repair your garden tools, book the lawn mower in for a service and check garden furniture for any rot. When it is warm enough to brave the elements, treat sheds, fences and trellis with wood preservative; brushes and rollers are fine for most things, however a sprayer is well worth buying for tricky projects such as woven panels!



When soil conditions allow, continue to dig over beds and borders, incorporating as much organic matter as you can. Forking over not only helps prepare the soil for next year, it helps reduce pests by exposing them to hungry birds.

Get kids into the garden

Gardening isn't just for grown-ups, just for summer or just for those with gardens. There are hundreds of ways children can have fun both in and outdoors, all year round. From miniature gardens to planting bulbs, from weeding and digging alongside adults to having a little spot all of their own – gardening can occupy them for hours and even help you out.

A good way to get children interested in gardening is to stimulate their senses with brightly coloured flowers, aromatic foliage, scented blooms, tactile leaves and fast-cropping edible plants. It may be necessary for you to explain things initially, making suggestions and putting forward ideas, but in the end the child should feel it's his or her project. And don't worry if you're a beginner yourself – gardening with children is the perfect excuse to go back to the drawing board together!

Helping Out

Smaller children love to get really messy, but you can turn it to your advantage by getting them to help you with digging, weeding and watering.

Very small children may be scared of the creatures that live in the garden, so it's worth spending some time explaining what they do. Soon they'll be merrily collecting them in jars. You can explain:

- A weed is really an 'ugly' plant in the wrong place. Because they compete for food in the soil, it's best to pull them up. Take care to show children which are weeds, or precious plants could come a cropper!
- Some weeds, like dandelions, have deeper roots than others and are a bit difficult to dig up. Start with those that are easily lifted.
- Digging and forking the soil lets in the air which is important for the plants' roots and for all the animals living in the soil.
- To prepare the soil for a flowerbed, you have to turn over down to a depth of about 30cm and break up all the large lumps, adding organic matter, such as well rotted manure or compost.

10 Jobs for this month

- Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch
- 2. Ventilate the greenhouse on sunny days
- Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already
- 4. Repair and re-shape lawn edges
- 5. Inspect stored tubers of Dahlia, Begonia and Canna for rots or drying out
- 6. Prune apple and pear trees
- 7. Start forcing rhubarb
- 8. Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season
- 9. Keep putting out food and water for hungry birds
- 10. Prepare a polythene shelter for outdoor peaches and nectarines, to protect them from peach leaf curl.



FUN TIPS:

- Put a small box around the fruit of a tomato when it's little, the tomato will grow into a square much more fun to eat
- If you tape a fridge magnet letter to a young apple, then the fruit will grow around the letter. When you remove it you have your own personalised fruit!
- Grow a 'head' of long, wild green grass by cutting off the foot of an old thin sock or thickish tights, tying a knot at the cut end and filling that end with compost and grass seed so you end up with a good-sized head. Knot the other end like a balloon and make a nose by pulling out a lump in the middle and fixing an elastic band around it. Cut out felt features, stick on with fabric glue and leave to dry, then sit it on a cup of water and watch your new friend grow grassy hair.

STIMULATE THE SENSES:

- Introduce your children to 'noisy' plants such as the rattling seedheads of Nigella (love in the mist) and poppies, and rustling grasses and bamboos.
- Let them experience the distinctive scents of Helichrysum italicum (curry plant), cherry pie heliotrope, chocolate cosmos and Melissa officinalis (lemon balm).
- Fun to touch plants include furry Stachys byzantine (lamb's ears), sticky Petunia or prickly Eryngium.

Once a child is happy digging and weeding, they're all set to prepare a small garden of their own.



Spring Seeds

- Seeds that can be planted straight into the ground and produce fast growing, brightly-coloured flowers are best, as a few weeks can seem years to a child. Look for candytuft, nasturtiums, stocks and sweet peas and packets that say 'easy' or 'good for children'. Big tree seeds, like acorns, conkers and sycamore wings are ideal for young children.
- Use a stick to dig a trench 2cm deep and place large seeds in at least 1cm apart. Small seeds should be sprinkled evenly pinch by pinch.
- Cover with soil and pat gently. Then water thoroughly with a sprinkler watering can, taking care not to disturb the seeds.
- Label the area so you remember what you have planted and where!

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Containers

If you have a patio or roof terrace, have fun with containers – they will get children used to planning, preparing and tending, and can be moved indoors when it's too cold outside!

Winter Bulbs

• Put a few pebbles in the bottom of a pretty pot 20–25cm in diameter and half fill with bulb fibre. Plant three hyacinth bulbs, putting bulb fibre around them but leaving the top of the bulbs just showing. Water well. Cover with newspaper to block out the light and keep in a cool frost-free shed or unheated room. Water every 2–3 weeks. After six weeks put it on a window sill and watch the flowers grow!

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
