# Commuted Sums benefit two clubs in Swanland

wo clubs based in Swanland have been awarded £29,303.91 funding from East Riding of Yorkshire Council as part of Commuted Sums from local housing developments.

**Swanland Bowling Club** have been awarded £16,303.91 towards purchasing ground maintenance equipment and upgrading the current kitchen and toilets on the site. The project will allow the club to have hot water from the taps for the first time. In addition to the Commuted Sums funding, Swanland Bowling Club will be funding £1,811.55.00 of the £18,115.46 project from their own funds.

David Mitchelson, Committee Member at Swanland Bowling Club, said: "The Bowling Club are delighted to be recipients of the Commuted Sums

Funding Award. It will enable us to undertake a long overdue renovation of the ladies' and gents' toilets and replace most of our green maintenance machines which are proving to be expensive to repair."

**Swanland Cricket Club** have been awarded £13,000 towards their club upgrades project. The funding will allow the club to purchase new sight screens, to replace the existing ones which have been damaged; wicket covers; an electric cricket scoreboard; a line marker; and two extra cassettes for ground maintenance. In addition to the Commuted Sums funding, Swanland Cricket Club will be funding £1,449.72 from their own funds towards the £14,449.72 project.

Alan Smith, Chairman at Swanland Cricket Club, said: "This award provides funding for equipment, which is vital for a club like ours, to enable it to move forward and prosper, within the village of Swanland.

"The new equipment will replace that which was vandalised during lockdown, allow wickets to be covered during periods of inclement

weather, enabling more cricket to be played, and ground maintenance equipment necessary for the continued improvement of the playing surface.

"The award really does mean the difference between surviving or thriving. Currently with no external sponsors or funding, the only revenue string for the club is from members' subscriptions.

"Having to pay for, but also prepare, our own wicket, it is essential we have the right tools for the job, which this award provides. The club can now look forward to a bright future, maintaining a summer focus in the village and providing increased opportunity for all, be it playing, practicing, or simply supporting their local team.

"Our gratitude and thanks go out to all the Commuted Sums team, but in particular Lea Anne Wright, Rob Laycock and Theresa Gale for their continued hard work, professionalism and assistance delivering the award process - a big thank you from everybody at Swanland Cricket Club."

Councillor David Tucker, portfolio holder for planning, infrastructure and housing, said: "I am very pleased that we have been able to facilitate these two awards of Commuted Sums provided by local housing developments as a condition of their planning approval. It's clear that both awards will form a lifeline for both of these clubs, and I wish them both well for the future."

# Fitmums & Friends founder wins a regional BBC Unsung Hero 2021 Award

The BBC Sports Personality of the Year's Unsung Hero Award recognises the volunteers in sport whose efforts are making a difference to our communities. This year's winner for BBC East Yorkshire and Lincolnshire is Sam Barlow, founder and chief officer of local charity, Fitmums & Friends.

Fitmums & Friends is passionate about supporting everyone to be more active. It offers running, walking, cycling, boot camp, buggy and junior athletics sessions which enable men, women and children of all ages and abilities to be active in friendly and supportive groups.

Sam started Fitmums & Friends in 2009 as a way to meet and socialise with other parents, and her idea quickly grew. Today, there are 11 Fitmums & Friends clubs across Hull, Yorkshire and North East Lincolnshire with more than 850 members. For the most part, its sessions are organised by a network of dedicated volunteers. The organisation became a registered charity in July 2017. In 2019, international runner and five-time Olympian, Jo Pavey, joined the charity as its patron.

Sam continues to lead the development of the charity, supporting existing activities and introducing new programmes to enable more people to access regular exercise and feel the physical and mental health benefits of physical activity and social connections. Sam also coaches adult run

Sam used this personal experience of bereavement to develop a programme of walking and yoga sessions for adults and an outdoor activity project for children which now support others in Hull who have experienced the death of someone close to them.

explains why Sam is a deserving winner: "Sam's initial desire to keep active and make friends herself has grown into a passion, enthusiasm and willingness to help others be more active in a supportive, friendly environment. That passion is infectious and is the drive that keeps our activities moving and new ones developing. It means Fitmums & Friends has helped thousands of people over the years since it began.'

Sam responds: "It is such an honour to have been recognised award, especially for this knowing how many amazing unsung heroes there are in communities across the region doing invaluable work. # Pinot Noir one of the most popular red wines

There's something comforting about cosying up with a glass of red wine on a winter's night; and Pinot Noir has the right amount of spice and complexity to chase away the biting cold. It's one of the world's most popular red wines, made from black-skinned grapes that thrive in a narrow spectrum of cooler climates. It's also notoriously difficult to grow, but when done right, it produces lighter-bodied wines of elegance, complexity and longevity

Pinot Noir is one of France's oldest grapes, cultivated more than a century ago by the Cistercian monks in Burgundy. Today, collectors prize Pinot Noir for its finesse and age-worthiness, especially from the most famous vineyards in Burgundy. Due to its popularity and difficulty to grow, it's one of the world's most expensive wines.

But while Burgundy has long been the spiritual home of Pinot Noir, as the wines rose in fame and price, winemakers around the world sought to emulate the region's success. This led to plantings of Pinot Noir throughout other parts of Europe and the New World and today it is considered to be an "International" variety.

Switzerland, Germany, Austria, New Zealand, Australia, the United States (California, Oregon and New York) and Chile all produce Pinot Noir and some cracking examples, too.

Typically, Pinot Noir is dry, light-to-medium-bodied, with bright acidity, silky tannins and alcohol that ranges between 12–15 per cent.

The best Pinot Noir taste has complex flavours that include cherry, raspberry, mushroom and forest floor, plus vanilla and baking spice when aged in French oak. Pinot Noir wine taste varies based on climate and producer style. Cooler climates produce more delicate and light-bodied Pinot Noir. Warmer climates produce riper and fuller-bodied Pinot Noirs with higher alcohol.

Some producers age their wines in 100 per cent new French oak which creates a fuller, textured wine. The best food pairings for Pinot Noir complement the wine's pretty fruit flavours, bright acidity and elegant style. These qualities make Pinot Noir a perfect partner to lighter red meats like duck and lamb, or white meats like turkey, pork and chicken. Fuller-flavoured fish like salmon go well, or using bolder tasting cooking methods on fish as well.

Earthy vegetables and herbs like mushrooms and thyme match the wine's savoury flavours, especially when folded into risotto and pasta.

Pairings that don't work with Pinot Noir are foods that are dense and richly flavoured. They can overpower the delicacy of the wine.

Serving it at the right temperature can be important - it has an ideal serving temperature range of 55–65 degrees Fahrenheit. Pinot Noir can be delicate and fresh, or rich and oak-aged. You can serve lighter wines closer to 55F, and fuller-bodied Pinots closer to 65F. And if you don't finish a bottle of Pinot Noir, replace the cork and stick it back in the refrigerator. The flavours will stay fresh for one to three days. Beyond that, the wine will start to oxidise.

A great example of Pinot Noir I tried recently reflects the grape's spread around the world - Vina Leyda is the most awarded coastal winery of Chile and is renowned for its Pinot Noir – one of their emblematic grapes. The new 2020 Viña Leyda Reserva Pinot Noir is available now from Tesco priced £12 per bottle.

Both aromatic and intense, this Pinot Noir is made with grapes from two of Viña Leyda's vineyards, one of which is the most extreme in Chile, being based only 4km from the Pacific Ocean. It is a true expression of the variety, with an abundance of red and black fruits, spices and earthy hints, with just a hint of creaminess, and I thoroughly recommend trying it.

A sign that the "booze cruise" is consigned to the dustbin of history came last month, when Majestic announced the closure of its two Calais stores as changes to the duty-free alcohol allowance brought about by Brexit weigh on the economics of the business.

The two stores are understood to have raked in £10m in annual sales prior to Brexit and the onset of Coronavirus. They are also said to have contributed £1m to the retailer's bottom line, according to Retail Week. But Majestic's Calais stores have been pushed into the red as revenues have dropped to a fraction of that level since April.

UK residents were previously able to transport any amount of alcohol for personal consumption across the channel. Now, each adult can bring a maximum of 42 litres of beer and 18 litres of still wine into the UK. Also permitted are an allowance of either four litres of spirits or nine litres of fortified wine, sparkling wine or alcoholic drinks up to 22 per cent ABV, although this allowance can be split.

And if you want to bring back quantities in excess of this, you have to declare that and pay the duty before you come back. You lose the allowance on the whole of that category, so if you bring back 20 litres of wine, you don't get any wine allowance and have to pay duty and VAT on all 20 litres.

Pleasures are taken where you can- a wonderful sun set, watching horses play in the fields, being hounded by my



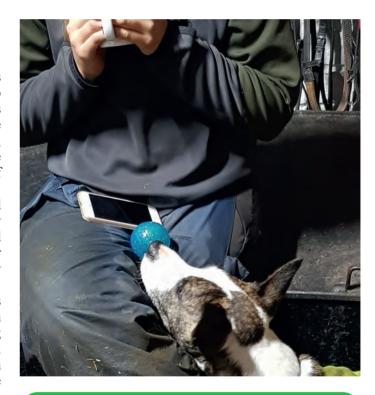

# When tomorrow starts without me

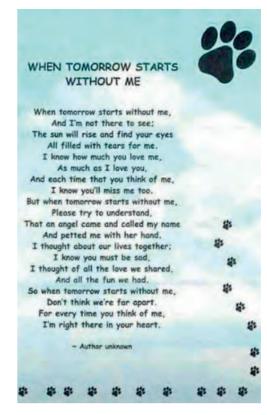

# Whoops a daisy - Don't Panic

ello again, I hope that you are safe and well. Happy New Year to you! Let's hope it starts to get better than the last .two strange ones to say the least.

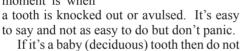
I started my first job as a qualified dentist 29 years ago in January 1993. I've seen some of my patients grow up from kids and have their own. Makes me feel old at times. It's been a journey I can tell you and it's not ready go stop just yet. I did my first in the flesh course last month since the beginning of the pandemic. I loved it. Asked loads of questions and got involved. It was a small affair and well organised.

# Whoops a daisy

Winter obviously is a colder time and the chance of ice and snow. This can lead to accidents and dental trauma whether it's having a great time sledging of just a slip on black



ice. The heart the mouth moment is when



try and put it back, it won't last, and you damage the adult tooth underneath. If it's an adult tooth it's best to put it back.

# Time is of the essence

The longer a tooth is out of its socket the less chance of it refixing and lasting. It's best to get it back in immediately. It



may not be for the faint hearted though. If the tooth is dirty then a gentle clean in milk, saline (if available), the patient's saliva or very gently in water is OK. Water is not good to store the tooth in. Fresh milk is the best. Also be careful but to hold the tooth by the root as this can damage the cells on it that are important for

the refix. Hold the tooth by the crown that have no cells on and make sure you have it the right way round. When you are happy it's clean and the right way round seat it the socket and it all the way home. Keep pressure on it for a good five minutes to let the clot secure and hold the tooth. Then get the patient to bite down on a gauze or handkerchief to secure in place. Then seek immediate dental help. It will need to be assessed and splinted in place for a couple of weeks

Success is best if put back immediately and, definitely, within 30 minutes even if stored in milk. If the tooth is out of the socket for 60 minutes or more, even if stored in milk the chances of success diminish. However, it's usually worth a go to keep it for a bit and keep options open to a different way to sort it out later when a bit older, especially with children. Also, the sooner the tooth is put back the easier and less painful it is. The area is sort of concussed and there is less chance of a clot forming hat gets in the way. It will need to be checked out every few weeks to see how it is doing. Older teeth (from about 10 years old) will need root canal treatment, most likely.

# It's a good life skill

I just thought that it was a good thing to share as you never know when it could really make the difference.

# **Motoring - with Roy Woodcock**



The Fabia has been a mainstay of the Skoda range for 21 years; now, as it comes of age with a new fourth edition, it's bigger and better than ever.

Roy Woodcock reports . . .

Skoda's popular Fabia has come of age with the fourth generation of a model that, while still billed as the Czech company's smallest car, now actually offers more space than the Skoda Octavia of 1996, which was judged a comfortably-sized family car in its day.

Available since the end of September from £14,905 on the road, the new Fabia arrives 21 years after the first-generation Fabia set new standards for space, value and quality in the UK supermini sector. It now exceeds the four-metre mark for the first time and, compared to the outgoing model, is 111mm longer; its wheelbase has increased by 94mm to 2,564mm, and at 1,780mm, it is 48mm wider.

What all those figures add up to is more useable space inside the car. This is most noticeable in the rear seats and the boot - five adults will find themselves sitting comfortably, with good amounts of head and leg room for each.

The outgoing Fabia had the largest boot in its segment but the new model's luggage space has increased to gigantic proportions, doing better than rivals like the Ford Fiesta and Volkswagen Polo.

In total, it offers 380 litres of storage space, which is 50 litres more than before, and by folding down the rear seats, the capacity of the boot can be increased to 1,190 litres.

The UK range currently consists of four trim grades: S, SE Comfort, SE L and Colour Edition and while, sadly, a performance-orientated vRS version isn't planned, a sporty Monte Carlo trim will arrive early in 2022.

The entry-level S trim features LED headlights, Front Assist, Pedestrian Protection and Lane Assist, including road edge detection, as standard across the range, along with DAB digital radio, a 6.5-inch colour screen infotainment system with easy-to-navigate buttons and manual air conditioning.

S buyers also benefit from e-Call+, a system that establishes an audio and data connection to a dedicated emergency call centre if sensors within the car detect a major accident.

ŚE Comfort adds a host of additional features including 15-inch alloy wheels, front fog lights and a two-spoke leather multi-function steering wheel, rear parking sensors, height-adjustable front seats, adjustable lumbar support in front seats and leather-wrapped handbrake lever and gearshift knob.

The SE L benefits from larger (16-inch) silver alloys, chrome window surrounds and electric windows front and rear. Inside, SE L models are equipped with Comfort seats, chrome-edged air vents, ambient lighting package and micro-suede grey lower decorative trim with art grey stitching. In terms of infotainment, the SE L comes with an Amundsen navigation system with 9.2-inch colour display, Care connect and Infotainment online (one year), web radio and six speakers.

Dual-zone air-conditioning, along with two LED reading lights, a removable cup-holder and a front centre armrest are also fitted as standard.

Finally, Colour Edition adds 16-inch black alloy wheels, privacy glass and door mirrors painted to match the car's roof colour. Inside, there's a feature-packed Bolero radio with 8-inch colour display, Virtual Cockpit with 10-inch colour display and KESSY keyless engine start/stop. An umbrella in the door pocket completes the generous standard specification.

Not surprisingly, given automotive trends, there is no diesel option on the new Fabia; what is surprising is the fact there's no hybrid or fully-electric option. What we have at the moment is a 1-litre petrol engine with a choice of four power outputs, ranging from 64 to 108bhp. A 1.5-litre powerplant joins the range next year; I'm presuming this will be in the Monte Carlo version.

The three-cylinder unit might be small, but it only really makes its presence felt under hard acceleration; otherwise it's very subdued. Frugal, too, with economy figures in the mid-50s mpg on longer journeys.

Handling-wise it feels very "neutral", for which you should read smooth, with Skoda aiming to make this a car majoring on comfort and space.

Where the new Fabia has moved on considerably is with its build quality and finish and the cockpit is smart, well designed and very comfortable. Two-tone interior finishes, nice chrome detailing and a quality feel to all aspects of the interior are light years ahead of that seen in the Fabia when it first arrived back in 1999 as Volkswagen began to stamp its mark on the brand.

In short, the new, fourth generation, Fabia represents a significant shift up-market and in terms of the sector it competes in, it could easily be Czech-mate for Skoda!

lean and repair your garden tools, book the lawn mower in for a service and check garden furniture for any rot. When it is warm enough to brave the elements, treat sheds, fences and trellis with wood preservative; brushes and rollers are fine for most things, however a sprayer is well worth buying for tricky projects such as woven panels!



When soil conditions allow, continue to dig over beds and borders, incorporating as much organic matter as you can. Forking over not only helps prepare the soil for next year, it helps reduce pests by exposing them to hungry birds.

# Get kids into the garden

Gardening isn't just for grown-ups, just for summer or just for those with gardens. There are hundreds of ways children can have fun both in and outdoors, all year round. From miniature gardens to planting bulbs, from weeding and digging alongside adults to having a little spot all of their own – gardening can occupy them for hours and even help you out.

A good way to get children interested in gardening is to stimulate their senses with brightly coloured flowers, aromatic foliage, scented blooms, tactile leaves and fast-cropping edible plants. It may be necessary for you to explain things initially, making suggestions and putting forward ideas, but in the end the child should feel it's his or her project. And don't worry if you're a beginner yourself – gardening with children is the perfect excuse to go back to the drawing board together!

# **Helping Out**

Smaller children love to get really messy, but you can turn it to your advantage by getting them to help you with digging, weeding and watering.

Very small children may be scared of the creatures that live in the garden, so it's worth spending some time explaining what they do. Soon they'll be merrily collecting them in jars. You can explain:

- A weed is really an 'ugly' plant in the wrong place. Because they compete for food in the soil, it's best to pull them up. Take care to show children which are weeds, or precious plants could come a cropper!
- Some weeds, like dandelions, have deeper roots than others and are a bit difficult to dig up. Start with those that are easily lifted.
- Digging and forking the soil lets in the air which is important for the plants' roots and for all the animals living in the soil.
- To prepare the soil for a flowerbed, you have to turn over down to a depth of about 30cm and break up all the large lumps, adding organic matter, such as well rotted manure or compost.

- Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch
- 2. Ventilate the greenhouse on sunny days
- Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already
- 4. Repair and re-shape lawn edges
- 5. Inspect stored tubers of Dahlia, Begonia and Canna for rots or drying out
- 6. Prune apple and pear trees
- 7. Start forcing rhubarb
- 8. Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season
- 9. Keep putting out food and water for hungry birds
- 10. Prepare a polythene shelter for outdoor peaches and nectarines, to protect them from peach leaf curl.



# **FUN TIPS:**

- Put a small box around the fruit of a tomato when it's little, the tomato will grow into a square much more fun to eat
- If you tape a fridge magnet letter to a young apple, then the fruit will grow around the letter. When you remove it you have your own personalised fruit!
- Grow a 'head' of long, wild green grass by cutting off the foot of an old thin sock or thickish tights, tying a knot at the cut end and filling that end with compost and grass seed so you end up with a good-sized head. Knot the other end like a balloon and make a nose by pulling out a lump in the middle and fixing an elastic band around it. Cut out felt features, stick on with fabric glue and leave to dry, then sit it on a cup of water and watch your new friend grow grassy hair.

# STIMULATE THE SENSES:

- Introduce your children to 'noisy' plants such as the rattling seedheads of Nigella (love in the mist) and poppies, and rustling grasses and bamboos.
- Let them experience the distinctive scents of Helichrysum italicum (curry plant), cherry pie heliotrope, chocolate cosmos and Melissa officinalis (lemon balm).
- Fun to touch plants include furry Stachys byzantine (lamb's ears), sticky Petunia or prickly Eryngium.

Once a child is happy digging and weeding, they're all set to prepare a small garden of their own.



# **Spring Seeds**

- Seeds that can be planted straight into the ground and produce fast growing, brightly-coloured flowers are best, as a few weeks can seem years to a child. Look for candytuft, nasturtiums, stocks and sweet peas and packets that say 'easy' or 'good for children'. Big tree seeds, like acorns, conkers and sycamore wings are ideal for young children.
- Use a stick to dig a trench 2cm deep and place large seeds in at least 1cm apart. Small seeds should be sprinkled evenly pinch by pinch.
- Cover with soil and pat gently. Then water thoroughly with a sprinkler watering can, taking care not to disturb the seeds.
- Label the area so you remember what you have planted and where!

# Winter Bulbs

• Put a few pebbles in the bottom of a pretty pot 20–25cm in diameter and half fill with bulb fibre. Plant three hyacinth bulbs, putting bulb fibre around them but leaving the top of the bulbs just showing. Water well. Cover with newspaper to block out the light and keep in a cool frost-free shed or unheated room. Water every 2–3 weeks. After six weeks put it on a window sill and watch the flowers grow!
