

KGV Jubilee Celebrations finish with a bang!

onday 4th June 2012 – a special day for Queen Elizabeth II – and even more special for KGV Cottingham Trust. It was our biggest event to date and to say we were nervous was an understatement.

The day dawned dull but dry, the first dry day for awhile and given the celebrations in London had been dampened by continuous rain we felt someone up there was looking down on us! The team assembled at 8 am to prepare the 40 loaves, kindly donated by Wm Jackson & Son, ice the buns and top the jelly off with custard to feed the 200 children who had booked for the street party.

Whilst the girls got on in the kitchen the men marked out running tracks for the children's races, assembled goals for the 5-a-side, cut up tiles donated by Tile Giant and put in place the large sheet of plywood donated by Boards of Cottingham which was to make a mosaic as a lasting memento of the very special day.

At 10 am the Army arrived in the form of Cottingham Army Cadets. They very swiftly and efficiently proceeded with the task of creating the all important beacon from wood received from East Riding of Yorkshire Council and Boards of Cottingham. By 1.30 pm the hall was dressed in red, white and blue and an exhibition of Cottingham in the 1950s put together by Katrin McClure was in place, everything was ready and the team were briefed on what the rest of the day had in store by our Co-ordinator Alicia Mail.

2pm prompt Cllr. Don Hardwick, Chairman of Cottingham Parish Council who had helped sponsor the occasion, officially opened the event and the fun began! Children took part in egg & spoon races, running races, dressing up races & three legged races. Then the adults joined in with a race to get their Queen to the finish line first. There were all kinds of stalls to enjoy including a very well supported cake stall, face painting, tattooist, craft stall & Cottingham Allotments plant stall were everyone could bag a bargain! During the course of the day the guests were invited to write in a memoir book donated by Barkers Newsagents and to place a tile on the mosaic which is to be placed on the fence at KGV as a lasting reminder of the day.

It was time now for the first sitting of the day! With 200 guests this had to be split into two sittings with the little ones going first and the older ones having to wait for their turn. While the children were being taken care of the adults were entertained by Claire Lyon who gave a fantastic Hooping session followed by The Halogens, a superb band of youngsters from our very own Cottingham High School, Victoria Eastwood, female vocalist and Max and Josh, two local guitarists who really wowed the audience. Before proceeding with the celebrations the task of choosing a King and Queen for the day fell to Cllr. Don Hardwick who, after long deliberation, chose King Jack and Queen Gabriella!

After everyone had had their fill and the lads had finished their 5-a-side tournament out came the tug-o-war rope and the battle lines were drawn. There were three hard fought fights but the victors on the day were – of course – the girls!!

The day had now moved on and at 7pm the Hessle Ceilidh Band struck up and the evenings entertainment began. There was much whooping and hollowing as the residents joined in this wonderful entertainment! At 10 pm the crowds were escorted outside to watch the lighting of the beacon by King for a day, Jack Hindle. This was a fantastic spectacle followed by an even more fantastic firework display which marked the end of what was definitely the best event yet we have held at King George V Playing Fields, Cottingham.

It only remains for me to thank all those who supported us with donations or help on the day, especially one very kind art teacher Kate McHugh who took over the mosaic from me on the day, but most of all to all the residents of Cottingham who never fail to amaze me with their support and generosity at these events.

Cottingham Care Home Worker voted the Best in Britain

ick Wise, the maintenance man at Hica's Overton House care home in Cottingham, has won a national award in a prestigious care home awards scheme.

Mick competed against eight other regional finalists in the Great British Care Home Awards to win the Ancillary Worker category after beating hundreds of regional entrants to reach the national finals.

At a gala awards dinner held recently at the Grosvenor House Hotel in London, Mick was presented with a glass plaque by Roger Pratap from Majesticare, who sponsored the award.

Mick later said: "When my name was called I was in absolute shock. To be nominated for the award was a great privilege but to be announced as the national winner was beyond my wildest dreams."

"It was very humbling to gain an award for what I consider to be just doing my job. I am very fortunate to work in a great environment with a wonderful team of people and I consider the award to be not only for me but also for everyone at Overton House," he added.

The organisers of the award were so impressed with Mick's dedication that they are planning to keep in touch with him so that he can help them to inspire others and to promote care and empathy in the profession.

The judges said that Mick "demonstrated a real understanding of what it means to be person centred. It was clear that he knows each resident, their likes and dislikes. He is happy to do extras and goes home smiling."

Mick, who started working at Overton House 15 months ago, carries out a "maintenance person's" role at the care home and also helps out at events and outings.

It was therefore a joy for all when she was presented with her wheelchair recently and now Hannah is free to roam over any terrain!!

This was from the proceeds of the very successful Band Concert featuring the East Riding of Yorkshire Band in the Church earlier this year. y name is Brian Smith and I was born at 15 Thwaite St which was a house owned by Hull Brewery. It was demolished on the death of my Grandmother – Alice Nicholls - in 1959 to make way for the Railway Inn to be replaced by a newer Railway Inn. I lived in Cottingham until I was 25 when on marriage we went to live in Willerby. We now live in Guisborough North Yorkshire.

I have many very happy memories of growing up in Cottingham and one of those memories was brought flooding back when I found the attached 'photo of the class of Junior 6 in 1952. Mr Pancke was the Headmaster and Geoffrey Howe was our class teacher. He emigrated to Canada shortly after

The 'photo was taken in the school yard looking towards what was then the woodwork room. We had a student teacher at the time but her name escapes me.

After nearly 60 years, I am afraid I cannot remember all the names and I have marked these with "?". They were great days. The following year in Junior 8, I went into Mr Altass' class which was held at the rear of the Zion Congregationalist Church as we outgrew the school space. Roger France always opened the Carol Concert at St Mary's, I know Roger Norrie went on to become an accountant in Hull, Dickie Bird lived at the Tiger Inn and his granddad had the largest collection of birds eggs ever from humming bird to Ostrich (strictly non friendly nowadays), Kelvin Casson was a very good artist and my good friend Allan Woodward who also lived in Thwaite St followed a career in education.

I hope this isn't too boring for you and some people may find it of interest. I would be pleased to hear what happened to any of these school chums. Also when we were in the Infants school, I remember Elizabeth Kirkwood whose mum was the local District Nurse/midwife and also Mary Nellis whose father had a woodwork class on one evening a week at the Toc H club in Finkle Street. 

In the Kitchen


o seriously do we take our sandwiches, we even have an official sandwich organisation! Sandwiches get their name from an Englishman who invented them. The story goes that John Montagu, the Fourth Earl of Sandwich, was such an enthusiastic gambler that he didn't like leaving the gaming table whilst playing so instead of breaking for dinner, he asked that someone bring him some meat between a couple of slices of bread. Later on, others would do the same saying something like "I'll have what Sandwich is having" and eventually, people would just ask for "a Sandwich".

The British Sandwich Association was founded in 1990 and states itself as being "The trade body representing the UK sandwich industry, including both commercially made sandwiches and the ingredients used for making sandwiches in the home." According to their website, their primary aims include safeguarding the integrity of the sandwich industry; promoting excellence and innovation in sandwich making; promoting the consumption of sandwiches; and providing a collective voice for all those involved in making, distributing and retailing sandwiches.

But is there really the need for a whole association just for sarnies or is this one of those British idiosyncrasies?

Well, approximately 2 billion sandwiches are purchased in the UK each year with the commercial market being worth approximately £3.5 billion – that's huge – bigger than the UK pizza market which is only worth £1 billion. Around another 2.67 billion sandwiches are eaten by way of lunchboxes which contain sandwiches and it's thought that 6.24 billion sandwiches are made within the home taking the total amount of sandwiches made to 10.96 billion per year – that's almost 200 sandwiches per person each year.

In short – not idiosyncratic – just business and relatively big business too. Also, when you think about all the other sectors involved – ingredient suppliers including farmers,

bakers, processors, fishermen) packaging including canning factories, cellophane, paper bag manufacturers) distribution, sellers including sandwich shops, pubs, restaurants, train stations, petrol stations and numerous other outlets – a significant contributor to employment., according to The British Sandwich Association "The commercial sandwich in the UK employs in excess of 300,000 people – more than agriculture".

Beetroot Salad

- 4 Medium Freshly cooked Beetroot, peeled
- 1 tbsp Wine or Raspberry Vinegar
- 1 tbsp Sugar

Salt and Black Pepper

2 tbsp Olive Oil

Instructions

- 1. Slice the beetroot as thinly as possible wafer thin then arrange on a large serving platter in 1 layer.
- 2. Sprinkle with the vinegar and then the sugar and allow to stand for 15 minutes.
- 3. Sprinkle with the salt, pepper and oil and leave for a further 30 minutes.

Coleslaw

Ingredients:

- 1 Small Firm White Cabbage
- 3 Carrots
- 3 tbsp Olive Oil
- 2 tbsp Wine Vinegar

Salt and Pepper

6 tbsp Mayonnaise

Instructions

- 1. Cut the cabbage into quarters, remove the core and very finely shred. Place in a large mixing bowl. Grate the carrot onto the cabbage.
- 2. Add the olive oil, vinegar, salt pepper and mayonnaise and mix thoroughly. Allow the coleslaw to stand for a while before serving.

Fresh Homemade Mayonnaise

Prep & Cooking time: 15mins

Ingredients


2 Egg Yolks at room temperature

1 teasp ready Made Mustard

1/2 teasp Salt

240ml/8fl.oz. Bland Vegetable Oil e.g. corn , groundnut or sun-

1 tbsp Fresh Lemon Juice or White Wine/Cider Vinegar.

Instructions

- 1. Place the egg yolks, mustard and salt in a large mixing bowl and mix well.
- 2. Start whisking in the oil a teaspoon at a time, whisking well between each addition to incorporate the oil into the egg volk mixture.
- 3. After you've added half the oil as above, which should take about 3 minutes, keeping the whisk running constantly at high speed, add the remaining oil in a slow thin trickle, stopping every once in a while to collect any mixture which has gone to the sides of the bowl.
- Once all the oil is added and the mayonnaise is thick and standing in peaks, add the lemon juice and whisk briefly to incorporate.
- 5. Transfer to a serving bowl, cover with clingfilm and refrigerate until ready to serve.

Will keep covered with clingfilm in the refrigerator for about three days.

Tangy Potato Salad

Ingredients:

350g/12oz Potatoes

120ml/4fl.oz. Soured Cream

2 teasp Olive Oil

3 teasp Freshly Grated Horseradish

Salt and Black Pepper

1/2 teasp Sweet Paprika

1 teasp Freshly chopped Chives

Instructions

- Cut the potatoes into even sized cubes about 2.5cm/1 inch square. Place in a saucepan with enough cold salted water to cover, bring to the boil then simmer for about 20 minutes or until tender.
- 2. Meanwhile, in a large bowl, mix together the mayonnaise, olive oil, salt, pepper and horseradish.
- 3. When cooked, drain the potatoes then add to the mayonnaise mixture whilst still hot. Mix thoroughly making sure all the potato pieces are completed coated. Leave to stand for 1 hour.
- 4. To serve mix again, turn into a serving bowl and sprinkle with paprika and chopped chives.



Lace for the High Sheriff

aureen Bromley, Chairman of the 'Wolds Lacemakers' was contacted last November by Julie Good to ask if it was possible to have handmade lace to complement her outfit for the role of High Sheriff of East Yorkshire.

A small team of lace makers, Judith Adkins, Dianne Chapman and Julie Medland agreed to help Maureen with the project, which entailed making a jabot and cuffs in torchon lace. Julie Good chose a pattern by Joyce Symes which was based on an old lace design. This was adapted slightly to make lace in two widths to allow layers to overlap in the finished jabot and cuffs.

Most people are use to being able to buy machine made lace by the metre which is quick and relatively cheap to produce. By comparison handmade lace is costly in time and is made to the size required. In this case, two lengths 16 inches long for the jabot and four lengths 24 inches long, two for each cuff. The lace took between 3 and 4 hours to make an inch in length. In all the jabot and cuffs took about 500 hours to make.

The finished Jabot and cuffs were handed over to Julie Good on 31st March ready for her inauguration as High Sheriff of East Yorkshire. She was thrilled with the finished articles

For members of Wolds Lacemakers it is good to know that our lace will be seen by people across the county as the High Sheriff carries out her role as the Queen's representative for law and order in East Yorkshire during the coming year.

As with any handmade items we make the lace because we enjoy keeping the craft alive and demonstrating our skills. I am pleased to say that Julie was delighted with the finished lace and in recognition for our hard work presented the Wolds Lacemakers Society with a donation. This money will be spent on furthering the Society's aim which is to promote lace making and maintain the skills for generations to come.

New solar power tariff will 'sift out fly-by-night firms and secure jobs'

N East Yorkshire company believes forthcoming changes to solar power feed in tariffs will 'sift-out fly-by-night operators and secure jobs in the

Payments to homeowners who install solar panels to generate electricity were due to be cut on July 1 but this has now been delayed to August 1, giving people another month to qualify for the higher feed in tariff.

Chris Whitelock, managing director of Cottingham-based Pure Renewables, believes the new tariff will benefit specialist firms and reassure homeowners the scheme is here to stay.

He said: "The initial tariff was so lucrative it was almost a no-brainer for people to go for it. There was a huge growth in the industry. Companies were springing up all over the place and quite frankly a lot of them out of industries with very little experience and knowledge of solar.

"What you ended up with were some very poor companies. The reduction in the tariff will sift out a large number of these businesses and leave the stronger experts and specialists in the market place.

"It will allow specialist companies to plan for the future and secure jobs. It will also reassure businesses and homeowners that this scheme is here to stay so they can plan their investments properly."

Energy and Climate Change Minister Greg Barker recently announced that from August 1 the feed in tariff will fall to 16p per KW hour from 21p to reflect the falling costs of solar panels. Earlier this year, the tariff was reduced from 43p to 21p.

The length of the tariff payments will be reduced from 25 to 20 years, although the export tariff - the amount consumers get for selling electricity back to the national grid - will increase from 3.2p to 4.5p per KW hour.

The current rate of return for a typical solar installation is about 7-10 per cent. Under the lower tariff it is estimated that homeowners will still get on average a 6 per cent return on investment.

To qualify for the current feed in tariff, the solar system must be installed and commissioned by July 31 and registered with the Microgeneration Certification Scheme (MCS).

A typical installation takes about three days but solar power companies are warning there could be a rush on stock as people seek to register before the

Pure Renewables was one of the first green-energy companies in the region when it was established five years ago. It has carried out more than 75 renewable-energy installations at homes across East Yorkshire.

Mr Whitelock added: "The original tariff was way too high and has had to be adjusted to bring it into line with a more sustainable model.

"We are in favour of that happening. The issue is how it has been implemented. The Government has given us very little time to respond and react to the changes they have been making. It could be said that they are adjusting it for austerity purposes but it was unsustainable in the first place.'

It is estimated that there were around 25,000 people working in the solar industry nationwide before the tariff was cut from 43p.

Announcing the change, Energy Minister Greg Barker said the plans represented an 'exciting chapter for the solar industry.

He added: "We can now look with confidence to a future for solar which will see it go from a small cottage industry, anticipated under the previous scheme, to playing a significant part in Britain's clean energy economy.




Dog Versus Cat

evening. It especially looked at the dental care of people who have been diagnosed with cancer. The actual treatment for the cancer can have an adverse effect on the mouth, either on the bone or on the lining of the mouth or the salivary glands. I have spoken about dry mouth before and this can be caused by chemotherapy and radiotherapy. Another treatment that is often given for advanced cancer is a drug in the bisphosphonate family. It is given when the disease has spread to bone.

Is Quality Of Life Important? Of Course It Is

The bisphosphonates affect the bone and can cause an untreatable condition where the jawbone dies of and is exposed (osteonecrosis). This is more common after a tooth extraction but can just happen on it's own. This condition can really reduce quality of life. The key here is to have the mouth as healthy as possible before starting the drugs. The difficulty here can be that there my be a lot of work to get the mouth healthy but you don't want to be hanging around but get on with the cancer treatment. It can be particularly challenging if you are a nervous patient. Another thing is that even in these cases dentistry is not free if you are not exempt from NHS charges.

The Same Goes For Osteoporosis

The bisphosphonates are also prescribed for osteoporosis. They usually end in "onate" or "onic acid" e.g. Alendronic Acid. The risk of the bone dying is relatively low in most cases but I feel that it is important for patients to be councelled by their Doctors and advise to have a comprehensive dental MOT and service, if required, BEFORE starting the medication.

Scare Mongering - NOT

I am really not trying to scare monger at all. That is not my style. I have placed dental implants on a lady who was on the medication under controlled conditions and it went perfectly. All I am saying is that is that it is best practice to try and avoid really nasty stuff happening if it is avoidable. A healthy mouth can give a much better quality of life.



Here is Paul's latest walk in his series of monthly rambles. This month his destination is Beverley. The map is for a guide only, please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.


Map:- EXPLORER 293 & 295

Start at GR. 029415 Picnic site to the north of Beverley. (Opposite the Hayride Public House). Distance 5.0 Miles.

eave the picnic site and on reaching the tarmac lane heading north west, turn left and shortly swing sharp right as the lane (known as Carr Road) bends. Follow this lane for about 700 metres and when you reach a sharp right bend, turn left and walk along a farm track.

On reaching Leconfield Low Parks Farm, turn right before the farm and walk with the field hedge on the left. Skirt round this field to reach the Beverley/Arram railway line. At this point, turn left and cross a wood plank foot bridge and then cross a stile to enter a field. Walk across this field keeping the fence/hedge on the right.

At the end of the field, cross a stile and immediately turn right and pass through a metal gate and cross the railway tracks. Walk in an easterly direction keeping North Bullock Dyke on the right, pass the derelict Carr House Farm and then in a short while, cross over the dyke and then continue in the same direction but with the dyke on the left.

After about 600 metres, turn left and follow a farm track to Arram Grange. On reaching the Grange, turn left and follow the farm road as it twists and turns to pass through Arram.

Keep to the road and cross the railway track and then immediately cross a stile on the left and walk with the track on the left.

Cross a second stile and then a third stile (or use the metal gate) and walk with the track to the left and the MOD ground to the right.

After about one mile, cross a stile and walk the earlier route in reverse past Leconfield Low Parks Farm and back to the picnic area.

In the Garden





Flower garden

utting back plants in baskets followed by feeding can encourage new growth and help revive tired displays.

Cut back delphiniums and geraniums after the first flush of flowers to encourage a second flowering period. Feed after cutting them back.

Deadhead flower borders regularly to prolong flowering. Disbud and dead-head dahlias if growing for large blooms. Leave roses that produce attractive hips.

Divide clumps of bearded iris.

Autumn-flowering bulbs, such as autumn crocuses, Colchicum, Sternbergia, Amaryllis and Nerine, can be planted now.

Prop up tall perennials such as lupins, delphiniums and gladioli if staking was neglected earlier in the season.

Liquid feed containerised plants and keep well watered in dry spells.

Some late-flowering border perennials may benefit from a quick-acting feed before they come into bloom, especially if the soil is not very fertile.

Mulching borders can help retain moisture, and keep down the weeds - this will save a lot of work. A really thick layer of mulch (5-7.5cm/2-3in all over) works best.

Take cuttings of patio and container plants ready for next year.

Pinks and carnations that have become leggy, can be propagated by layering or by cuttings. Propagation can improve the appearance of untidy clumps.

Start collecting seed from plants you want to grow next year, especially annuals such as Calendula, poppy and love-in-a-mist.

Top 10 jobs

- 1. Check clematis for signs of clematis wilt
- 2. Place conservatory plants outside now that it is warm
- 3. Water tubs and new plants if dry, but be water-wise
- 4. Deadhead bedding plants and repeat-flowering perennials, to ensure continuous flowering
- 5. Pick courgettes before they become marrows
- 6. Treat apple scab
- 7. Clear algae, blanket weeds and debris from ponds, and keep them topped up
- 8. Order catalogues for next year's spring-flowering bulbs
- 9. Give the lawn a quick-acting summer feed, especially if a spring feed was not done
- 10. Give woodwork a lick of paint or preserver, while the weather is dry.

Perennials and biennials can also be grown from seed, but will take a year to bloom.

Some seeds are best planted just after collection, and others may need specific climatic conditions to break dormancy (e.g. some alpines). If unsure, then sow seeds in 'batches', i.e. one immediately after collecting, one in winter, and one in the following spring.

Plants with a carpet-like growth habit, e.g. some alpines, can become patchy, with central areas dying off. These patches can be in-filled with gritty compost, to encourage re-growth.

Fruit

Cut back sideshoots on gooseberries to four or five leaves, or just beyond the fruit clusters. This will speed ripening (by increasing sun on the fruits), encourage fruit bud formation for next year, and control aphids on the new growth. Red and white currants may be pruned in the same way.

Sideshoots that form on pinched-out grape laterals can be stopped at one leaf. Leaves that are shading grape bunches can be removed, to speed ripening of the clusters. Harvest indoor grapes when the skin becomes translucent. When summer-fruiting raspberries have finished cropping promptly cut out the old canes.

Fruit picking can begin in earnest, with strawberries, cherries, summer-fruiting raspberries, currants and the earliest of the plums. Remember to harvest red, and white, currants in bunches, still on the stalk - they will keep and taste better. Blackcurrants can be picked singly or in clusters, as preferred.

Continue to tie in and train new blackberry canes. Keep new canes separate from older, fruiting canes to ease later pruning.

Continue to peg down strawberry runners if new plants are needed. This will encourage the plantlets to root.

If possible, water tree, bush and cane fruit thoroughly once every seven to 10 days during dry spells. Mulching will help them retain water. Keep large-fruited apples, such as 'Bramley's Seedling' particularly well watered to help avoid problems with bitter pit.

Remember to water plants regularly, to ensure healthy development of fruits.

Protect ripening peach, nectarine, and apricot fruits from the birds; trained trees can be covered with nets fairly easily.

Propagate blackberries and other cane fruits with long, lax stems by tip layering.

Thinking of growing blueberries? If so, check your soil pH is sufficiently acidic - blueberries need a pH of 5.5-5 to prosper. Otherwise grow in containers of ericaceous compost. Protect them from birds.

Vegetables

There's lots to harvest in the vegetable patch, including spinach, peas, beets, carrots, salads, potatoes and globe artichokes; shallots and spring-planted garlic may be ready as well.

Pick courgettes before they become marrows.

Overwintered onions can be lifted and used.

Plant out leeks and brassicas for a winter supply, if not yet done.

Sow spring cabbage, turnips, Oriental vegetables, chicory, fennel, and autumn/winter salads such as lamb's lettuce.

Carrots can still be sown, but beware carrot fly when thinning existing seedlings

Last chance to sow French and runner beans (south of England only).

Beans need sufficient watering to help the seed pods set.

Remember to pick your bean and pea pods as they mature, to stop them becoming tough and stringy later in the summer.

Climbing beans may need stopping, to maximise cropping on existing sideshoots. Stop them when they reach the tops of their supports.

Summer cauliflowers may need shading to prevent the curds scorching in bright sun.

Don't forget to stop cordon tomatoes by removing the main shoot. Look for the leaf that's above the fourth truss and cut it off here. This should ensure that all the fruits ripen by the end of the season. Bush tomatoes can be left to their own devices.

Climbing or cordon-grown vegetables may need checking to ensure they are tied in sufficiently to supports. Branches can easily snap off as the fruits mature. Leaves shading larger fruits can be removed to maximise sun exposure for ripening.

Any non self-blanching celery cultivars will need earthing up (with a protective collar of paper between the stems and the soil).

Herbs can be harvested to keep the young shoots coming throughout the summer. Excess pickings can be dried for use throughout the year.

Ensure all vegetables get a regular, consistent supply of water, using rainwater or recycled grey water wherever possible. This will aid healthy development, and help to avoid diseases, disorders and bolting.





Here is the latest article from Chris who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

ello once again fellow anglers to this month's fishing news the date is; 18th June.

It is that time again anglers, the magic river season has started, and it is brilliant to hear good Barbell reports despite the high waters we have been experiencing. The River Trent at Collingham has produced good Barbell from the Weir which we expect, but by far the biggest so far has come from Tins at an impressive 12lb 9oz, plus my friend caught seven in the one session. Unfortunately I have not had any reports from our River Hull yet, I will let you know how and where it is fishing next month.

I had a knock up match at Sam Hosticks of Plaxton Bridge at Woodmansey in the Kingfisher Lake the other day, and what a cracking day I had! My choice of tactic on the day was a long pole 12" from the far bank. For feed I fished a whole bag of 4mm RS Elite expander pellets and fished white maggot over the top. By the way I went through four pints of white maggots. My pole float was connected to a

5.5lb breaking strain tied to a B911 size 14 hook. It was none stop action from start to finish with Carp, Bream, Skimmers, Ide, Perch and a beautiful Golden Orff. I unfortunately was smashed off 6 times.

This was due to the far bank reeds being very close and the fish I had hit were very large. There was no point in using stronger gear as the fish I was hooking where very strong, it was just best to cut my loses and set up again.

Anyway, just after 41/2 hours I weighed in with an impressive 58lb. I won the match which was 6 hours long but as you may have guessed I had leave to early, (it was my daughters engagement party, if I had dared to be late she would have killed me!). On that point I wonder what I would have weighed in if I had caught the 6 bonus fish and fished for the full 6 hours, 100lb may be.

Here's one for you that I had heard from Rob the Tackle Tart. One of his carping crew has been fishing Ray fosters at Leven, and he has had 3 Tench into double figures, the largest being 14lb. The lad in question, who wishes not to be named, was on float fishing tactics with corn on the hook.

Again, as I have mentioned before there are some fantastic fish on this venue, such as Carp to 20lb, plus bream to well into double figures and Rudd pushing to 4lb. Plus at only £3 per day ticket, if you have not been then definitely go and check it out.

Sea scene: I am still getting good reports coming in from places such as Cowden and Dimlington etc. At these marks there are Skate and Doggies, and believe it or not an odd Cod still coming in. Bass are still coming in fairly regular from inside Spurn Point down to Chalky Point.

Fresh Lugworm is still available, but please book as early as possible to avoid disappointment. If you are too late for fresh Lug don't forget there is always loads of frozen baits available.

Please except my apologies now, but sorry to mention this but as we know time goes very quick and Christmas is only round the corner. I would like to remind you that here at Catchmoore tackle we have an all year round savings scheme. With things being a little tight, a bit like fishing little and often, it could be a good for you. Pop in anytime and ask for a page in the book.

Billions, Trillions, Tablets & Pi

et's hope we all survive 'internet doomsday' on the 9th, and all enjoy Cottingham Day on the 7th! In the meantime, let's have a look at what's happening in the tech world this month onwards...

Windows 8 for £14.99... I've mentioned a few times now about the forthcoming release of Windows this Autumn, and with this big launch coming up, Microsoft know that some people might put off making any computer purchase until the latest software is available. So with that in mind a scheme is in place from now until next January; buy a qualifying Windows 7 PC or Laptop and you will be able to register for a £14.99 upgrade version of Windows 8 as soon as it becomes available. See www.windowsupgradeoffer.com.

Microsoft has revealed that it is entering the tablet market, with its own offering to rival the iPad. At a launch event in California at the end of June, CEO Steve Bulmer announced and demo'd the 'Surface Tablet'. It is made of magnesium with an in-built kick-stand, a large 10.6" screen with Nvidia graphics, a clever magnetic cover that doubles as a flat keyboard, and will run the mobile version of Windows 8. Pricing is yet to be announced, but is likely to be at the upper end of the market.

The one billionth mobile customer in China switched on his/her device within the last few weeks. Quite a staggering statistic in a country of 1.3bn people!

The Internet is running out of addresses, which is not surprising when you read the previous paragraph. Hallgate Schools - continued

By Peter Railton - Local Author and Historian The Year is 1935

chools opened on the 7th of January with 285 boys present out of 300 on role. Several teachers rotated illness, with one or two being away at any one time all through the month - colds and 'flu

A lantern lecture on the 15th of February was well attended by senior boys and girls, teachers and some parents; 'Kindness to Animals' was the topic and Capt. Howarth of the R.S.P.C.A. the presenter. He dealt with the health, feeding and housing of dogs, cats, horses and smaller pets and went on to give accounts of animals and birds found wild in Yorkshire. Rev. Dakin was the Chairman, supported by Mr. D. S. Locking of Cottingham and Mr. Brookes worked the lantern; this was evidently a very popular show.

Geoffrey Stinson of St. 2 fell in the playground on the 26th of the month and cut his chin 'rather badly'. He was taken to Dr. Halliwell who lived in Hallgate nearly opposite the present Cottingham Mobility shop. He was in practice for many years and was our family doctor in the 1930's and he lived to a ripe old age, Geoffrey returned to school next day after a stitch and appeared non the worse for his fall.

A prize was offered and presented by Mrs. J. C. Jackson of Harland Rise for the best essay written by a pupil on any part of the recent lantern lecture. This was won by Leslie Davies of St.7 and certificates were awarded to Roy Elder, William Walker, Peter Hagues and Roy Ware for good efforts.

The Health of the Nation

The general health of the nation had been occupying the thoughts of government for many years, and as we have often seen locally in our schools, sickness and absence through sickness was endemic and it was felt that if recommendations by doctors, nutritionists and dentists were followed, and every child had access to milk this would alleviate many of the problems and would help to build healthier bodies that could ward off a lot of illnesses. So the Government School Milk Scheme began in 1935 and around 180 boys at Hallgate purchased a small bottle of milk:', for a penny. The Grade A milk was supplied by Mr. W. Moore of Spring Park Farm in Park Lane (the Golf Club and Riding Stables) under arrangements with the L.E.A.

"The Scheme gives promise of being highly successful and satisfactory," Mr.Brookes recorded; he would have been surprised at just how satisfactorily the scheme developed and grew into the free school milk for every child nationally, the burden of provision gradually being taken up by the larger suppliers - e.g. locally, Riley's Dairies and the Co-op, and continued until the late 1970's except for those with special needs.

This is Jubilee Year, 2012, but 1935 saw another Jubilee and the schools were closed from May 4th to May 8th in honour of the Silver Jubilee of King George Vth and Queen Mary. An extensive programme of events to celebrate the occasion was drawn up by local councillors, school heads and other village worthies. Monday the 6th of May was the day, upon which many of the main events fell. The programme was drawn up as follows -

11.30 am. Relay of Rational Broadcast service from Cottingham Market Green. Assembly of scholars and teachers on Market Green and procession with the Cottingham Silver Prize Band to Grange Park for Sports Programme (now part of the High School)

2.00 pm. Scholars Sports; 5.00 pm Tea for Elderly People in the school buildings.

5.00 pm. Tea for Scholars and distribution of souvenirs in the various Sunday

Schools. 6.00 pm. More children's sports. 8.00 pm. Adult races. 9pm. Presentation of Prizes.

9.30 pm. Fireworks Display.

10.30 pm. God Save The King. A sum of £30 was granted by the H.U.D.C. for the purchase of prizes. Hard on the heels of these celebrations came the Combined Cottingham Schools House Sports. All pupils, teachers, parents etc. assembled at the Ellerman's Sports Ground on the 6th of June and was very successful except for a rainy spell in the evening which prevented the Cottingham Silver Band from attending as planned. Prizes were awarded to the winning 'Houses', Shackleton in the boys' department, Baynard in the girls' and, in a new section, Buttercup in the infants' - yellow presumably.



An appeal for flowers to be sent to the annual Hull Sailors Orphan Homes Whitsuntide Festival to help decorate their floats, stalls etc., met with an excellent response and were sent to the Homes by carrier. Bernard Grimston, Alan Clark, John Williamson got scholarships to Beverley Grammar School.

In the girls' department a full staff is recorded but only 89% of pupils during January. The school had been visited by H.M.I. Mr. Lock the previous December and a very favourable report was received by Miss Brimelow. It covered all aspects of work including each subject taught and commented on the degree of specialisation which had been a recent feature, as in the boys' department. The report ends

"In all branches of instruction, good, conscientious work has been done and the Headmistress and her Staff deserve credit for the results achieved." Students from the Training College began teaching practice in Sts. 1,3,5, and 7 where they found many pupils away through mumps, chicken pox, scarlet fever and some cases of diptherea and others, though at school, were far from well with colds and 'flu. The lantern lecture given by Capt. Howarth of the R.S.P.C.A. in the boys' school was repeated in the girls' and, the Rev. Dakin wrote in the log book -

"I should like to pay tribute to the excellence of the essays submitted at a recent competitions these displayed an ability to reproduce the work learnt.

On the 7th of March, a fresh contributor appears in the log book -"I examined the Registers and found these correct. The children are happy and contented and their teachers take great interest in outside work, exercise etc. Chas. N. Arnett."

Death of Mrs. Moorby

Mr. Arnett lived in Cottingham and was a, member of Haltemprice Urban District Council. He was a military looking man, very smart, with a grey waxed moustache and usually carried a walking stick under his arm; I understand that he had been a warrant officer or sergeant major in the regular army in his younger days. The month of March also saw the death of Mrs. Moorby, the first Headmistress of the infant department at Hallgate. She had still lived in Lindon Avenue and used to visit a friend in Exeter Street and always crossed the railway line near the old warehouse in Station Yard. Tragically, she stepped out in front of a train leaving the station - she had gone very deaf in later years which probably contributed to her death.

Certificates for the R.S.P.C.A. essays were presented, and that written by Enid Bell was sent to the Society H.Q, in London. An interesting entry at the end of March records -

"The children from the Cold Harbour District made their last attendance at the school. This district is not a part of Hull and the children must attend Hull Schools.'

The problem referred to in May was therefore resolved, plus the pupils living in Settings and Priory Roads had to attend Ainthorpe Grove School later that year - thus solving the problem of the buses.

The Jubilee Celebrations were received just as enthusiastically in the girls' school and each girl, and boy, was presented with a tin of sweets bearing the images of the King and Queen - there must be still some kept as souvenirs - now probably minus the sweets.

People really love their horses

am still delighted to see just how much people are prepared to sacrifice in order to heal their damaged horses, as well as the shear distances they are prepared to travel in order to send them to me. Their love and profound wish for change will give them the confidence to take a huge leap of faith in order to make those changes happen.....and I am, after all, a stranger to them until I meet them face to face. At the end of the day I can shout from the roof tops and give all the talk in the world but walking the walk is all about results.

I have recently had three interesting horses in, extraordinarily, all with the same issues and fears. They bolted off with a rider on board and were all scared of everything including their own shadows.

HUGO from Oban in West Scotland was a fine upstanding 16.3 Frisian gelding who at seven years old had never accepted a rider in any way, shape or form. He spooked at every sound and external movement...e.g. leaves, birds or noises behind hedges etc. He had never faced traffic...which made Skidby quite a culture shock in its own right. Their choosing me to be their trainer meant that it took them 10 hours to travel their horse to my yard...wow. A huge commitment on their part.

OLIVER was from Manchester. He was a Welsh section D 14.2hh, 5 year old pony who had lived a Gypsy start as a youngster, as a result

of which was frightened of any new human and was in fear of pain and punishment from any direction. He would blow up into manic snorting at the slightest thing and got lost somewhere in his head when he could not cope. There was defiance and defence all in one as he had learned to protect himself by biting or stamping at you....always to keep you in front of him. He protected behind his eye line completely.

JUSTIN is from Ilkley. What a little poppet he has turned out to be! A whole lifetime of naughtiness all bundled up inside this little 13.2hh frame. Anger was worn on his sleeve as soon as you took him in the ménage, alongside a profound fear of punishment. Hence he was unrideable, bolted off as quickly as a wink and launched the rider up into the air with a horrid panic stricken type leap. At 12 years old he was always going to be an uncertain outcome as eliminating a lifetimes worth of learned behaviour is obviously a tough undertaking.

What can I say? I see these types of learned behaviours all the time. The price that horses pay on an emotional level is huge when humans get it wrong in their early dealings especially when training is done in a forced or unthinking way.

All three horses needed extensive de-sensitising to anything and everything in order to allow them to start to make rational choices instead of reverting back into their instinctive flight mode. We use plastic bags on long poles...by waving them high up above the horse and then back down and repeating the high, back down, high etc. We also use a very large gym ball to kick, throw and touch them everywhere with it including bouncing it on the ground, bouncing it on their backs, ribs, legs etc.

We end up being able to touch them everywhere with the bags, balls, plastic sheeting and tarpaulins. Anything you can think of can be used. A good one is a plastic bottle full of stones! So scary! These techniques allow us to change the way the horses feel inside their own heads. Instead of being terrified of everything and in permanent flight mode they become calm, accepting and start to interact with all of this.

The trick is to know when to put the pressure on and when to take it away. Because the horse is frightened of something we habitually and instinctively try to hide it from it....the opposite approach is needed.

The pressure of the object or noise goes away when they stop and look.... not when they runaway! The key is having the control in place to allow this to happen. When you can start to limit flight, teach them to trust and become willing to stay then all this will work. I always know when I am winning with an individual horse the minute it chooses to start to investigate its world and the scenarios we set up. Investigation and inquisitiveness is the key to all the changes needed. They start to participate and play in direct opposition to their original total inability prior.

Once they no longer feel that everything is a potential predator we can then start to introduce the rider behind the eye line. Traffic is chased away....not run away from! The list goes on and on in the scenario's we use.

All empowering stuff for both the horse in question as well as giving the owner the confidence to carry that mind set on with once they return home.

All three have come through with flying colours and are all enjoying being ridden. How fabulous is that?! Their lives are now about EXPLORING their worlds back home, with owners they trust and have bonded with. No more running away.

I love my job!

Moving Abroad? A monthly column by Nick Russell

New Home in the Sun

This month's issue follows the Russell family as they begin the move to Spain. Having now bought their new home in the sun, they have to pack up, leave family and friends and hope that all the work that needed doing has been done in preparation for their arrival, if you would like more information or if you are thinking of a move to Spain, contact Nick on nickruss@hotmail.co.uk.

o in October 2011, we finally signed for our house in Spain. It's ours, we have the keys and all we have to do now is move from Cottingham to southern Spain. Because of the proximity to Christmas and family commitments my wife Rita and I decided to revisit the house in January for three weeks. This was to make a start on clearing all of the rubbish the previous owner had left and to start painting the whole of the interior white.

My son Tom and his wife Adel, along with our two grandchildren Aiden and Katie decided that they would like to visit for a week with a view to moving out with us.

The plan was to stop at the house and tackle as many jobs as possible, ready for the final move sometime in April. We also thought about tackling the garden, pool and pond area, none of which had had any care or attention for more than two years. As neither of us are particularly brilliant gardeners or know anything about pools or ponds, I asked Paul the estate agent if he knew anyone who may be able to help. He introduced us via email to a guy called Anthony, who was a gardener and knew a bit about swimming pools.

He visited the house in November to price up the job of sorting the garden, cleaning and filling the pool and tidying up the pond and surrounding areas. He estimated it would take two of them five weeks to complete everything on the list, which I thought was a bit hopeful, but we agreed a timetable and price and he started in the December 2011. That's when we started to hit problems. The main concern was the lack of water supply to the property.

Although the mains water supply had been reconnected, the water storage tank emptied after five minutes and then took ages to refill. Also the well water wouldn't come through at all. Anthony said he knew somebody who would be able to check out the water pumps. These proved to be ok so he called in another friend, a builder, to check out the supply for leaks etc. Between them, they were unable to resolve the problem easily so we arranged to all meet when we came out in January. It didn't stop Anthony making progress on the conifers, grass, weeds, trees and all the foliage that was well overgrown. Because of the lack of water, Rita and I decided we wouldn't be able to stop at the house, so we stayed on the coast at our holiday home. It did mean trips of 11/2 hours each way, but at least we could shower and do our washing.

So we arrived in Spain in early January and met up with Anthony the gardener, Tommy the electrician and Charlie the builder. The progress that Anthony had made in the garden was amazing, although there was still a long way to go. The water problem was a major hiccup and Charlie talked us through a possible solution. It all appeared to be typical Spanish plumbing – our stop cock and meter was nearly a mile away on the edge of the village and the pressure could be better. He felt the only way to be 100% sure of a constant water supply was to have a 15,000 ltr underground storage tank fitted in the garden and have all new feed pipes fitted. We also wanted to replace the electric hot water tank with an instant gas hot water boiler and have the oil fired central heating system checked and serviced as well as the oil tank topped up. Once again a price was agreed, which along with the gardening, took all our contingency money so we hoped for no more surprises. Charlie the builder was a bit of a life saver, and still is today as he speaks great Spanish, albeit with a Glaswegian accent. He

organised skips for us so we could clear the rubbish left in the house and, having spent two weeks painting a couple of bedrooms, we realised this job would take forever so he organised a team of painters to finish the job when we left at the end of January. If he hadn't I think we would still be painting now.

My son Tom and his family spent a week out with us and decided they would like to move out as well, which is great as Tom is a joiner and very handy for all the work that would be needed to get the guest accommodation up and running. On our return home we decided on the moving in date of April the 17th giving us about 10 weeks to get packed, and people informed and believe me we needed that time scale.

So now we had to organise the moving of two homes to Spain as well as six people and a dog. Because we would need a vehicle in Spain Tom and I decided to sell our cars and buy an eight seater mini bus/people carrier and drive to Spain. For the removal side of things, I approached Andy Dickerson at Britannia Removals for a quote and the help and advice he gave us in planning the move was much appreciated. We set the UK removal date as 13th April with the lorry then meeting us in Spain on the 17th. It was going to be a bit of a dash but do able. One thing we learnt when packing is don't underestimate how much stuff you will have to pack and how long it will take, even if, like us, you had de cluttered beforehand. Also no matter how much you mark the boxes, when you get to your destination you will still not find everything you want, three months on and we are still unpacking and looking for bits and pieces!!

So 13th April arrived, the lorry was loaded with the contents of our two houses, the minibus was packed with four adults, two kids and a dog and everything you could possibly think of for a four day trip down to Spain. One thing I didn't really expect was how traumatic it was, not only for us, but family and friends we were leaving behind. Tears flowed on both sides along with hugs and kisses. Because of the kids and the dog I had pre booked all our hotel stops on the way down, so we set off for the Euro Tunnel and our first night in Calais.

Over the next 3 days, we covered 1500 miles and arrived at our house on the morning of 17th April. Our new house is about 500m up a narrow track through the olive trees and I don't know how he had done it, but Gary the lorry driver had managed to get his 40' artic up the track and was parked outside the gates-brilliant. The Britannia team of four lads arrived from Malaga, started unloading at 9.00 am and by 4.00 pm had finished and gone home.

Like the guys loading in the UK, nothing was too much trouble for them making the whole experience as smooth and stress free as possible. We were now in our new home, surrounded by boxes and bags but fortunately during the afternoon my son Tom had built all the beds and my wife had found the boxes of bedding so at least we had some home comforts. During the weeks leading up to our arrival, I had been in regular contact with Charlie and Anthony at the house, as all we wanted was hot and cold water in the house and a pool ready to use. I had also asked Charlie to sort out the well water supply for the garden pond and pool as well as the olives. This turned out to be a major job and, of course, a massive expense as all the pumps and underground pipe work had to be replaced. The whole job ended up costing half our renovation budget, but it had to be done.

Anyway all the requested work was done, we were in, had hot water the electricity was on and the central heating worked (it was cold the first few nights!!). We all went to bed worn out ready to start sorting out our stuff in the morning. One of the main things we noticed as we drove through France and Spain was the difference in price of a litre of 4 star. In France it was about 1.80 Euros (£1.48) but when we arrived in Spain it was about 1.45 Euros (£1.20) and is now at 1.36 E (£1.12) it makes filling up a little less painful.

Amendments to the Energy Performance of Building Regulations

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council has written to landlords and letting agents in the area as part of an ongoing programme of informing and advising, following recent presentations by the council at landlord forums.

The letters inform landlords and letting agents of their obligations under the Energy Performance of Buildings Regulations 2007, which underwent a number of amendments at the end of 2011 and were enacted from April this year.

The changes relate, in particular, to the responsibility of making an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) available to prospective new tenants, which should be done at the earliest opportunity, when the prospective tenant is given information in writing or when a pre-arranged viewing of the building takes place.

There are a number of new duties placed on landlords and their agents in terms of ensuring an EPC is either in place or has been commissioned before marketing commences.

Additionally, Trading Standards officers now have the power to require landlords and persons acting on their behalf, such as letting or managing agents, to produce a copy of an EPC or evidence that one has been commissioned.

There are also changes around the marketing of properties. The front page of an EPC should now be attached to written particulars concerning properties for sale or rent, including those made available electronically, for example website marketing.

For rental properties, an EPC should be attached where the written particulars include at least two of the following, a photograph of the building or any room in the building, a floor plan of the building, the size of the rooms in the building, the measured area of the building or the proposed rent.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council will continue to inform and raise awareness amongst landlords and their agents and encourage compliance with the regulations.

STA Certificate in teaching swimming (STC F) at Haltemprice Leisure Centre

hold the Safeguarding and Promoting the Welfare of Children certificate (available online at www.trainsta.co.uk) or acceptable equivalent, hold an acceptable life-saving qualification, hold the STC[B], or an acceptable equivalent and attend an STA course of instruction that will have a minimum duration of 26 hours. Candidates must attend for at least 28 hours.

Candidates are assessed during the course and take a practical teaching examination and a written theory examination at the end of the course.

The Products You Use May be Detrimental to Your Health:
