



ERYC's Drop-In to discuss the refurbishment of the Woodhill Way Travellers' site and the extension to the Eppleworth Road site (Westfield Rd, Skidby)

ast Riding Council organised a public 'drop in' at the Methodist Church Hall, on Thursday 30th May, and residents from both Skidby and Cottingham were invited to attend. Three officers were in attendance and there was the opportunity to view the maps and discuss the two sites with the officers.

Woodhill Way – Government funds have been provided to refurbish this site and in doing so, while retaining the same footprint, by repositioning the location of the current pitches the number of pitches will be increased from 23 to 24. This will be carried out in a similar manner to refurbishing council houses and so some of the travellers will have to be temporarily rehoused.

The officers have recommended using the Jackson Construction compound, on Harland Way, which was set up for the A164 upgrade. Of the 80 or so residents who called in to see the plans this was the most controversial part of the refurbishment. Almost all the comments highlighted the road safely issues due to increased speeding traffic and the proximity to the Skidby roundabout. The travellers are very family orientated It was also felt that as there would be a very high risk of accidents as the travellers went back and forth to the old site visiting extended family and friends.

There was also the question of the children at the temporary site accessing the village schools. The compound is not served by a foot path and somewhere down Harland Way these travellers will be randomly crossing the road, raising more road safety issues. Despite the officers' assurance, all the residents at the drop-in expressed a lack of confidence in the Council's statement that the temporary site would not default to a permanent status.

An overwhelming majority of the objectors agreed that the temporary site should be located in the close vicinity of the existing site and that would remove all the health and safety issues. Cottingham North & Dale Ward members and both Parish Councils have also voiced their objections to the use of the construction compound.

In conjunction with the drawing up of the Local Plan (future housing needs) ERYC commissioned external experts to undertaken a needs assessment based on the current traveller population and their projected population increase. The suggested sites include current locations and also identify additional new sites round the county. Many of these new sites have already been discounted due to ownership problems and the lack of services and the locations.

Failure to provide additional accommodation for the increasing local traveller population could well leave the Council exposed to the Government Inspector failing the whole county wide Local Plan and also seriously undermine the Council's ability to take enforcement action against any illegal Traveller encampments. This would be the same situation that we would find ourselves in if we had no Local Plan, developers could then decide where and what they wanted to build, with residents having little or no say as to what happened. At ERYC's Eppleworth Road site officers have identified space for additional pitches which will go part way to addressing the needs assessment.

Ward Members and Parish Councillors are very concerned that we already have a high proportion of the County's permanent Travellers sites in our area and it now becoming apparent that we are being expected to take even more. The proposed expansion of the Eppleworth Road site was also met with unanimous objections by those residents who attended the drop-in.

The Connected Home, wireless networks, SSD drives and mobile phone signals

People always used to joke about video recorders and how they had to ask their children to explain how to use them. All these years later, the situation is apparently much the same as according to a survey by John Lewis and Microsoft, 67% of parents ask their children/grandchildren for technical advice on computers and mobile phones etc!

You know you're not up with the latest high tech when the last item you purchased involved Bakelite!

The Connected Home is another techno-term being bandied about. It is however quite a straightforward strategy of using technology to its best and help combine your computing and entertainment needs. Most people have a wireless network nowadays, and if you buy a TV it may well be a Smart model, which means it is capable of connecting to the internet to enable catch-up services like iPlayer, or even display web pages and download other content like YouTube. There are different ways of connecting these devices together, just call us for advice on how to do it the most cost effective way.

Talking of wireless networks, (aka Wi-Fi, wireless lan etc.), many people have had a wireless router for many years, and I have found recently on quite a few occasions that people have purchased new equipment like iPads, Kindles etc. and cannot get them online. The reason has usually been that older routers use a more basic security standard (but very long passwords!), that modern equipment cannot connect to. If this has happened to you, it's time to replace your router; call us for details.

What is an SSD drive? This stands for Solid State Drive, and is a newer type of hard drive for computers and laptops (also found in tablets and other mobile devices). It has no moving parts, so therefore is much faster and should be more reliable in the long term. Because the technology is newer it is more expensive than traditional drives, therefore you get less capacity for the same money. A 60 GB SSD costs about the same as 500 GB hard drive. This will change no doubt as sales increase.

Many of you will be familiar with the term SD card, as it is the probably the memory card inside your camera. But did you know there is a site called www.SDcard.org? This tells you all about the standard and has a very useful formatting tool for cards that leaves the 'protected area' required by cameras untouched.

Intel has introduced an exciting new processor called the *Haswell*. This new cpu uses less power and creates less heat, particularly important in laptops.

In a recent review of mobile signals in this area, EE (the company that owns T-Mobile & Orange networks) came out top. But to be fair, that is probably because they are the only network currently offering 4G (the new faster type of mobile broadband). Most would probably concur with my opinion that mobile coverage is not brilliant in this area, I certainly wouldn't want to rely on it for internet usage! In fact, after complaining of poor signal quality just receiving (or missing) calls to my mobile phone in and around my office recently, T-Mobile supplied me with a *Signal Box*. This is a neat little device that connects to your internet router and uses it to boost coverage when the normal 3g signal gets too low. It has worked extremely well so far I have to say.

Google has recently filed patents for the use of face movements, grimaces etc. to be used as 'passwords'. This could be an interesting innovation, as many users already make faces at their computer sometimes!

It's funny how computers take on a human dimension when they are misbehaving. As in: "it won't let me in" "it won't let me print" "it won't allow me to..."

If you own a laptop and have had it for a while, have a look at the Windows COA sticker on base, and make a note of the 25 digit number and the version of Windows, i.e. XP Home, Pro, Vista, 7 etc. This is your Windows licence number, and if your laptop ever crashes and needs Windows re-installed, this is the number that will be needed to re-activate the product. Being underneath the label suffers from a lot of wear and tear, and manufacturers are not usually any help if this sticker becomes unreadable, and so you may end up with a useless copy of Windows.

Office 2003 has been added to the 'end of life' list along with Windows XP in April 2014. Basically it means there will be no more support or security updates and fixes from Microsoft for either product. Office 2013 is now available in various editions for those wanting to upgrade. Re XP, many customers have decided to go for a new computer now, whilst Windows 7 is still available. For further advice just give me a call.





8 Garlic Cloves, crushed
2 tbsp Fresh Rosemary Leaves
6 Lamb Tenderloins cut into 2.5cm/1-inch pieces
180ml/6 fl oz. Robust Red Wine
120ml/4 fl oz. Olive Oil



Ear comes the sun!!

t is on beautiful days like today, when we are able (if you are one of the fortunate few) to relax, sit in the garden with a cool drink in one hand, a good book in the other and enjoy the warm sunshine. I must admit, I for one, do feel better when I begin to get that 'healthy glow' look . You know the one, when friends ask if you have been on your holidays and you reply with a wry smile saying 'Costa Del Garden'. As the sun beats down, the day gets hotter and our skin begins the tanning process of turning milk bottle white to tomato red (as it does in my case), we re-apply the sun screen, taking note of increasing the strength as the day goes on. Now, we are all aware of the dangers of the suns rays when we holiday abroad and how many of us spend a fortune on the different factors of sun cream.... factor 50 to start with going down to 25 or maybe less as the holiday progresses. With our climate changing so rapidly in this country, hopefully our education of protecting our precious delicate skin will extend to over here, after all there is only one sun and its rays are the same everywhere.

So there we are, applying the cream liberally to ourselves, children and grandchildren alike taking special attention to shoulders, faces, necks and not forgetting ears! How many of us do forget though? Forget to protect one of the most delicate parts of our body where the skin is so fine it only takes a few minutes to burn. Sadly, this is where my story begins but it didn't happen to me or even a member of my family, not human anyway, but to my beloved cat.

I fell in love with my gorgeous white cat Bisley over 16 years ago, after watching him being delivered by caesarian and he has been a member of my family ever since. Like most cats, he likes to be outside, doing the things that most cats enjoy, hunting, eating and..... lazing in the warm sunshine. I would often find him catching 'rays' on the garage roof or laid stretched out in his favourite place, the doorway of the garden shed.

Working within the veterinary field I have learnt over the years that white cats can be more of a candidate for sunburn than other coloured cats, especially on their noses and ears where the fur is much thinner. It's a bit like red/blond haired people who have a much fairer skin than dark haired so they tend to burn more quickly in the sun. Also cats are slightly more prone to burn than dogs, due to us not knowing their whereabouts every minute of the day (e.g. constant sun bathing!) and their ears are upright unlike their canine friends which are predominantly down.

With this in mind, I tended to Bisley's ears most days with a strong factor sun cream, paying particular attention to the tips. Now you may be thinking, as I did, that this would have been enough prevention from the suns rays but sadly it wasn't.

I first noticed the change towards the end of last year. It was whilst tending to Bisley that I noticed a small spot on the tip of his right ear. At first I wasn't too concerned and just thought he had caught it on something or had a bit of a tussle with another cat but then the spot began to grow and turn crusty. Over the months it grew, then one day it bled as he knocked it against something in the garden. Time for a visit to see the resident vet at our KINGSTON Cottingham surgery, Barbara Wynn. After a thorough examination my worse fears were confirmed.... sun damage! WHY???

I began to question all I had done for Bisley...was it enough? Maybe, it was because I wasn't applying the cream every so many hours EVERY day like we would to ourselves or the factor wasn't strong enough OR as Barbara suggested, I should have used more of a thick sun balm, a bit like the one skiers or swimmers use on their lips and cheeks. This would have then made more of a barrier and perhaps stayed on his ear longer.

So poor Bisley was admitted the following week, for surgery on his ear but it wasn't for just the lump to be removed. He had to have half his ear amputated! As Barbara explained, this was to make sure that all the cancerous tissue had been removed. Also, on examination of his left ear, it has begun to show the first signs of sun damage. Hopefully, we have caught it in time.

Exactly two weeks to the day of the operation, Bisley is still recuperating. The actual procedure has not perturbed him at all but its the buster collar (or lampshade as it is affectionately called) which he has to wear to protect his sutures from his claws, that is causing him the most annoyance. At the time, Professor Larry Hench was researching the resistant properties of glass to nuclear radiation. In August 1967, he shared a bus journey to an army materials conference in New York with a US army colonel who had just returned from Vietnam.

During their conversation Colonel Klinker – who according to Hench was not particularly interested in the effects of radiation on glass – posed a question which Hench later said changed his life. Having seen hundreds of limbs amputated every week in Vietnam because the patients' bodies rejected the metals and plastics used to mend their bones, the Colonel asked the following question:

"If you can make a material that will survive exposure to high-energy radiation, can you make a material that will survive exposure to the human body?"

Two years later, Hench achieved exactly that. He created a material that in effect could form a 'living bond' with bone, and bioactive glass was born. Trademarked as Bioglass, it has been successfully used in medicine ever since to mend bones and accelerate bone growth.

It Starts To Get Good For Teeth. Just add water

In 1996 other workers found that in the presence of saliva and water, a calcium phosphate layer forms and crystalises to form hydroxylapatite, which is similar both chemically and structurally to the minerals in teeth.

They found that particles of this hydroxylapatite could fill the tiny holes in teeth that allowed sensations like sweet, hot or cold to reach nerves and cause pain and sensitivity. So, Novamin it was and it is used in toothpaste.

Teaching a young child who cannot speak, see and hear you is very difficult. However, Anne guessed a way to do it. She poured water over one of Helen's hands and spelt w-a-t-e-r with her finger on Helen's other hand. Helen didn't understand what was happening. But Anne persevered, time and again pouring water over one of Helen's hands and spelling on the other. Eventually, Helen grasped what was happening – because she wrote the word water on Anne's hand. Anne's method of teaching had proved ingenious.

Helen then picked up other objects and asked Anne to spell them on her hand. By that evening, she had learned 30 words. She then nearly exhausted Anne wanting to know the names of other familiar objects. Within a matter of months, aged only 6, she had learned nearly 600 words, most of her multiplication tables, and how to read Braille.

It shows what inspired teaching can do.

Here is Paul's latest walk in his series of monthly rambles.

This month his destination is Hutton Buscel

The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.

Map:- EXPLORER OL27

Start at GR. 973842 On road near to St. Matthews Church. Distance 6.0 Miles.

eave the cars and walk in a westerly direction passing the church on the left and then turn right into Great Moor Road, pass the Pinfold on the left (this is a circular walled area where stray animals were kept until claimed by their owners). After about 500 metres, locate a path on the left and

follow this across the field with the hedge on the left. Cross a foot bridge over a stream and walk through a boggy area in the same direction eventually passing through a wall, turn left and then bear right at the corner of the field and continue with the hedge on the left. On reaching Wykeham Lane, turn right and then after 100 metres locate a path on the left and follow this to emerge on Ruston Lane. Continue along this lane to a "T" Junction and turn left heading for a house (Rowhowe House).

On reaching the house, walk behind the house and turn left then right keeping the hedge on the left. At the end of this field, bear right and follow the muddy path downhill through gorse bushes, cross the stream at the bottom and then turn left and follow the path diagonally up the hill passing steps on the left.

At the top of the hill, enter the village of Sawdon on Low Lane. At the road junction, turn left. On reaching the sharp right hand bend, continue ahead on a lane to a large wooden gate. Pass through the gate and follow the track to a second wooden gate set diagonally to the left. Pass through this gate and follow the short sunken track to the bottom and then veer right heading for a gate in the distance.

Pass through this gate, cross a stream and pass through another gate and turn right, then walk with the stream on your right. At the end of the third field, emerge onto the road (Ruston Lane) and turn left for about 150 metres then turn right and follow the enclosed path (walked on the outer section) On reaching Wykeham Lane, turn right and then left and follow the path.

On reaching a stile, cross the stile and then bear right heading to reach a point to the right of the buildings. Cross a stile and emerge on the road in Hutton Buscel. Turn **left back to the cars parked near the church.**

July is often one of the hottest months of the year and a great time to sit out and enjoy your garden. Fingers crossed the sun comes out this year. Keep your plants looking good by regularly dead-heading and you'll enjoy a longer display of blooms. Make sure you keep new plants well watered and hoe off weeds, which thrive in the sunshine. Not only can we enjoy our plants in the Summer we can also relax and unwind in the garden on the warmer evenings with a chimenea, garden furniture or hopefully a few bbqs.



A guide to watering and feeding your garden

If you want a healthy garden with an abundance of flowers, watering and feeding are essential. Without water, plants will simply wilt and die. A complete fertiliser or specific nutrients are essential – particularly for plants growing close together. But when should you water and feed? During long hot dry spells, plants definitely need water – but make sure this is given at the right time and in the right way. Plants need to be fed during periods of active growth – not when it could encourage new growth later in the season.

How to water

Watering cans: Use one fitted with a fine watering can rose. This leads to less soil disturbance and possible root or plant damage.

Sprinklers: Try not to use them in hot sunny weather as this can cause leaf scorching. More importantly the water applied has more time to be absorbed in the soil when applied in the cool of the evening or in the early morning.

Trickle or soaking hoses: deliver tiny amounts of water over an extended period of time.

Root Watering: Sink 5–8cm diameter pipes or plastic soft drink bottles with the bottoms cut off in the soil next to trees or shrubs, or in containers. Top these up with water on a regular basis.

Watering Tips

- It's better to soak plants from time to time rather than watering little and often.
- Make sure water gets right down to the roots, by placing the hose or watering can spout at the base of a plant and water gently. If soil is very dry, water twice.

- Do not water plants too forcefully. Never direct a jet of water at the base of a plant as it will wash away the soil, exposing the roots. Make a hollow around the plant base and fill with water.
- Re-use 'grey water' from baths and sinks or recycle rainwater by using a water butt.



New Plants

New plants need a good deal of care and attention to help them adjust to their new surrounding sand grow away well.

- When planting new plants, prepare the soil to ensure they get enough water and food.
- Dig the soil between 25 and 50cm deep. This will let in air and water to prevent root suffocation.
- Add some water-retaining gel or try some well-rotted manure, garden compost or peat alternative, as these will act as a sponge, retaining water.

Lawn Irrigation

- If grass does not spring back after it has been walked on, water as soon as possible, as long as there isn't a drought!
- If it is very dry, spike your lawn with a fork before watering.
- The quickest way to water your lawn is to use a sprinkler but to ensure you don't over-water in one place, place a jar next to your sprinkler and move it once the jar has 2.5cm of water in it.

Caring for Containers

Like new plants, those in pots and hanging baskets need special care as they run out of water more quickly than established border plants – which have bigger root systems and more soil from which they can reach water.

- Add water-retaining granules or gel (right) to compost in pots and place a small pipe or plastic bottle in the compost to help with root watering.
- Aim to keep the compost moist at all times, watering daily in hot weather.
- If the compost looks pale, has shrunk away from side of the pot, or if plants are droopy and wilting, stand the container in a bucket or pan so that it can soak water right up into the compost.

10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Place Conservatory plants outdoors
- $2.\ Regularly$ de-weed your borders and keep on top of weeds
- 3. Dead head bedding plants and repeat flowering perennials
- 4. Paint sheds, decking, fencing and furniture while its dry
- 5. Spray roses with fungicide to ward against black spot and mildew
- 6. Be water wise, use your water butt and keep on top of watering bedding in particular
- 7. Feed your lawn, particularly if you didn't do a Spring feed
- 8. Look out for Scarlet Lily beetles on your Lilies before they ruin them
- 9. Also keep a look out for other pests as they thrive in warm weather
- 10. Chop lupins, delphinium and poppies down once they have finished flowering





Dealing with drought conditions

Attach a water butt with a tap to your drainpipe to collect rainwater.

- Keep borders well weeded as weeds compete for moisture.
- A 5–7cm protective layer of mulch such as compost, cocoa shells, bark or even gravel

spread on the soil between plants reduces evaporation.

- Stop sprinkling lawns in drought in autumn they will recover!
- Hoe weeds at the roots to save time and avoid disturbing the soil and increasing water loss from the surface.
- Leave grass clippings on the surface of the lawn after mowing to recycle nutrients.

Drought tolerant plants

Plants with small, leathery, grassy, succulent, hairy or silver leaves tend to thrive in dry conditions.

- Euphorbia characias (spurge) A hardy shrub for full sun with lime green flowers and grey green foliage.
- Eryngium (sea holly) A clump forming perennial with branched stems and silver to purple-blue thistle-like flowers in summer.
- Potentilla fruticosa (shrubby cinquefoil) This hardy, compact shrub with white, yellow and pink flowers blooms all year.
- Genista has masses of pea-like flowers that smother the bush.

These shrubs prefer a sunny spot and not too rich a soil.

- Robinia Thriving in a sheltered, sunny location, this deciduous tree has pink and white flowers.
- Kniphofia (red hot poker) has attractive spiky foliage and dazzling summer flowers.
- Perovskia 'Blue Spire' (Russian sage) has plumes of long-lasting flowers and soft grey foliage.
- Echinops ritro (globe thistle) blue flowers, great for pollinating insects and for cut flowers.
- Verbena bonariensis has tall stems with clusters of small rosy-purple flowers in late summer and autumn.



hether it's simply "vodka and coke", "gin and tonic" or the more complex "Long Island Ice Tea" most people will have tried a cocktail of some sort in their life. Their beauty lies in the sheer volume of combinations that are possible, and the flavours that can be created from such simple ingredients make them appealing to so many.

Cocktails date back over 200 years. There are many arguments to say that they originated in America however new evidence suggests it may have been Britain that were the pioneers (of course!)

As with all drinks, they go through phases of popularity. Usually brought on by their relevance in popular TV and films. Sex and the City saw a rise in the demand for a Cosmopolitan – a heady mix of citrus vodka (usually lemon), Cointreau, cranberry juice, lime juice and angostura bitters. Its flavour combinations make it a fantastic cocktail and it deserves far more respect than it gets.

Of course we can't forget one of the most famous cocktail lovers in film history – James Bond. A mix of gin, vodka and vermouth with a twist of lemon as a garnish creates a Martini and keeps 007 happy in between driving flash cars and taking down bad guys living in hollowed out volcanoes!

Whilst my role as Wine Specialist isn't as exotic and thankfully doesn't require me to take out evil geniuses or bodyguards with deadly bowler hats! I do get the chance to try out making and tasting cocktails now and again.

One of my personal favourite is a Whisky Sour. I first had the chance to try it a few years ago when I visited Sin City itself – Las Vegas. The barmaid passed me a tumbler of brown liquid garnished with a cocktail cherry and after some slight hesitance at its appearance; I bravely took a sip and never looked back.

It's such a straightforward cocktail to make that I urge you to try it, even if you don't like whisky — this has enough about it to please almost everyones palate. All you will need is whisky (50ml), Monin Gomme (sugar syrup — 25ml), lemon juice (25ml) and angostura bitters (around 4 drops — believe me, you won't need more). More traditional recipes call for egg whites (1tsp), this adds more depth of flavour and a creamy head to the drink but don't worry if you don't want to add them, it's entirely up to you.

It helps if you have a cocktail shaker for this, however do not panic if you don't, just add the four ingredients to a glass and make sure you give them a really thorough stir to combine. Now if you want to pretend you're Tom Cruise in Cocktail then grab your cocktail shaker and give the mix a really good shake, then strain into a tumbler filled with ice, garnish with a slice of lemon or lime, sit back, relax and enjoy the magic that those four simple ingredients create.

The other beauty of this cocktail is the diversity of its components. You can poach fruit in sugar syrup, such as pears for a lovely dessert. Whisky can be used in a number of other ways, leave out the lemon juice and egg whites and make yourself an Old Fashioned, and as

for angostura bitters, well they can be used in everything from drinks to soups and even gravy!

For a really refreshing change, if whisky isn't your thing then try Amaretto. So go ahead and give it a try, you might be pleasantly surprised by your efforts.



Ello and welcome once again fellow anglers to this month's fishing news. It is the 14th June. I hope that by the time you come to read this article that it is still sunny!

Well, the fish have spawned and are bang on the feed. The match results I am receiving in the shop are fantastic, I would say it is the best year for fishing since the shop opened 5 years ago. Plus, hurray the rivers are open to fish again so get out there and fill your boots.

People often come into the shop and ask if I am going anywhere fishing at the weekend, the answer 9 times out of 10 is yes. To give you a clue I have 3 Sundays off from now till September, and the other Sundays are taken up with matches.

At the moment my wife is winning the championship. I would like to take all the credit for teaching her, but "no". Once you have been taught it is up to you the angler to get the best from the swim you have in front of you, so well done Katrina.

On that point it does bemuse me when some people never stop to look for signs of fish before setting up. The things you should look for are:

Watch for any signs of side vegetation moving.

Swirls on or just below the surface (if you are very quiet and tread very carefully you may see clouds of mud on your inside swim).

Change your tactics, many people don't change their tactics, for instance if you are watching me really bagging up with good Ide or Carp 1ft deep, to change tactics is the obvious thing to do. If you're

using your pole and not having much success but the bloke next to you is using a feeder rod with success, get your rod out too. You might not win the match but you might catch more fish.

You may notice now that the fish have spawned that from tea time onwards, if the weather is fine, that a lot of bonus fish are just below the surface. Try to catch one or two with floating baits such as soft floaters, dog biscuits, bread etc. It is great to catch a large Carp on the top. You will find this method of fishing very frustrating but very exciting too. The frustrating part is watching the big fish sucking in every loose offering except yours. The exciting part is seeing a large fish swim to your bait and to see its mouth open and take your bait, all hell breaks loose and your adrenaline goes through the roof, it's great! Give it a go and you will see what I mean.

On the local front, Sam Hostics at Plaxton Bridge is fishing its head off, all three ponds I am pleased to say.

The Folly and Tench at Risby Park, Walkington is the same. Good bags of small fish are also coming from the Carp pond. If it is Rudd you want with the odd bonus fish thrown in you won't go wrong taking your kids or grand kids to Northmoor Lane Nursery, there is a small lake here at the bottom of the car park, and it is stuffed with fish.

The next thing I would like to talk about involves a great big thank you to quite a lot of you. Do you remember last year when I organised a charity match at Halsham in aid of cancer for our Castle Hill Hospital? Well, I am doing it again this year and the thirty peg match was fully booked in just two days. For all of you who wish to still donate by means of raffle tickets etc. can still do so right up to the 28th July. It is nice to put something back into something good. As like last year I will be once again splitting the monies raised between Oncology and Cancer Research. With your help we should reach my desired target of £500, and thank you again to all those who have made a donation so far.

Next is I cannot believe that I am going to tell you that Dimlington has been fishing its head off lately! All the forums are full of reports of large catches of Smoothies, Skate, Bass, Doggies and Cod. At the moment the baits to use seem to be Crab or Squid. Most of the Smoothies have been caught with double squid on a pennel rig at distance. The Crab and Worm baits are for closer in work. Oh! Here's one for you, did you hear about that boat angler from Whitby who caught a 71lb Halibut, brilliant eh? I wonder how much that was worth!

Finally, I know I say it month in month out but please order your sea bait in advance, if you don't you may not get any as my digger has said if there are no orders he is not going to go digging at this time of year. Once again we do supply a vast range of frozen baits for you.

Next month I will let you know how our rivers are doing and where.

New stock is nearly arriving daily, pop in and check us out.

Till next month myself Chris, and the rest of the Catchmoore Crew wish you all "tight lines".



Hallgate Schools -

by Peter Railton (Local author and historian)

The Year is 1941

n January, Councillor Arnett made his feelings quite plain that insufficient precautions for the safety of the pupils had been taken. Part of an entry in the boys' log book reads -

"Beyond a few windows blocked up, nothing has been done for the childrens', masters', mistresses etc., protection. I would suggest that without further delay, sand, sufficient for each classroom with a surplus stored conveniently outside, be provided. Also stirrup pumps, at least one to each two classrooms, be provided and the elder children be instructed in the use of them also that sprays be fixed throughout the different passage ways."

This concern for the welfare of all pupils at Hallgate Schools and the uncompromising way in which he 'made his feelings clear' was typical of Councillor Arnett. He had the reputation of a 'fire eater' and one who got things done.

Cut arms and immunisation

On the 4th of February, Gordon Dobson aged 10, left the playground and went into the playing field alongside to build a snowman (snow had been falling heavily the previous night.) He fell and cut his arm badly on broken glass concealed under the snow; he was taken to Mr. Brookes who applied temporary first aid, then Miss Hardy took him to Dr. Nunnerly who inserted two stitches and then took him home.

During February and March, many boys were immunised against diphtheria. I remember we went into the hall class by class, formed a single file, rolled the shirt sleeve of one arm up high, and proceeded slowly to the awaiting doctor and nurse. As we got ever closer to the dreaded needle, the boy in front of me suddenly fainted and crumpled up on the floor. A teacher and the nurse lifted him up and laid him on one of the large, rough, P.T. mats which were thoughtfully sited close to the table. I looked bravely away as the cotton wool swab was applied to my arm and then the nasty prick of the needle - I confess to seeing a few stars myself - probably brought on by the sight of the pale lad on the mat.

Continual air raids

Two air raids took place on the afternoon of the 27th of February, the first at 1.30 pm; some boys went to the cloakrooms as usual and some turned around and ran back home (lunch time was from 12 noon to 1.30 pm then). The all-clear sounded at 2.20 pm and pupils emerged from the improvised shelter of the cloak-rooms and the boys who had gone home set off again for school; at 2.35 pm the sirens sounded again, so back to the cloakrooms went those in school and the lads setting off to return to school from home did a quick about turn - they were probably thanking the Luftwaffe for its timely arrival! The all-clear sounded at 3pm - too late to go back anyway. Difficult days - it is surprising that any pupils at all were able to benefit from school then, there was so comparatively little of it; for example 67 boys out of 300 arrived for school on the 19th of April due to all night alarms.

The Hull Blitz

Councillor Arnett swung into action opposing the system of letting children run home, back and forth, exposing them to danger in an air raid - he pushed for the building of shelters as the answer and in due course some were erected in the school playgrounds.

The most severe raids occurred on the 6-7th, 7-8th, 8-9th and 11-12th of May, the Hull Blitz, usually lasting all night on and off, with tremendous damage and loss of life the result; at least Cottingham pupils had a school to go to next day - many Hull schools were damaged or destroyed resulting in pupils having to be accommodated at other schools, often quite a long way from their

The manual room was broken into in mid-May and emergency rations stolen or destroyed; these were the property of the W.V.S. and to be distributed in Cottingham in the event of heavy damage

to food shops and property - tea, sugar, cocoa, biscuits, tins of sardines etc., clothing, towels, cutlery were strewn about -" wonton, barberous treatment " was the verdict of Mr. Brookes.

On the 15th of May he recorded the death of an old scholar, Pilot Officer Peter Foster Freer who was killed in action over London. He lived in Harland Way and a photograph of him is displayed in the new Hallgate Primary School. He was buried in Cottingham with Military Honours.

Sleeping on floors

There were raids on 14 nights in June, but Michael Rodmell, John Shirtcliff and Donald Curtis passed scholarships exams. Eleven raids in July saw many more people 'bombed out' and a lot came to Cottingham where many of them were accommodated' in the school halls, sleeping on the floors on make-shift beds and being fed and looked after by the teachers who worked tirelessly in shifts during those dark days and nights and what was left of the emergency rations were used for the new arrivals. Eventually, the L.E.A. closed the schools for two days so that the staff could get some sleep.

Food Shortages

The school was closed again in October as many boys and girls helped in the fields in the area picking potatoes - these were desperate times as the U.K. faced big food shortages and every hand was needed to harvest the corn and potato crops. In the girls' department, the year opened with a poor attendance due to a mixture of measles, snow, fog and air raid warnings. The College students were present on their teaching practice, with tutors paying visits to monitor their progress. Miss Buttery and Mrs. Evans were both away ill for two weeks.

There were several alerts during the first week of February - the Luftwaffe were not deterred by snow and fog. Pupils travelling in from Eppleworth by horse and cart were absent for a week along with other pupils who lived quite a distance away. In late February Dr. Herman, the M.O.H. came to immunise the girls - I wonder if any of them fainted? Measles made their appearance again in March and this, plus night air raids, kept attendances down to 75% at times. Councillor Arnett and Rev Hebron visited the school frequently to see all was in order as far as possible. The difficulties of the times for pupils, parents and teachers alike is very well conveyed by Miss Brimelow in the school log book in May -

"All through the week we have had terrible air raids lasting until 5 am or 6am in the morning. These have been very distressing and frightening, many girls have spent the night in the shelters. Some damage to life and property has also been reported in Cottingham and the surrounding district. The lessons have had to be given out of order but as far as possible the work has been as usual."

Air raids during daylight hours

In June most raids took place in daylight hours and this, plus good weather, saw an improvement in attendance. Miss Brimelow echoed Mr. Brookes in describing the influx of men, women and children into the building and having to help as they made their beds on the hall floor each night - some stayed all day and others made their way back to their homes in Hull next morning, hoping that they were still standing. In the midst of all this activity and disruption, termly exams went on - there was a grim determination to carry on in the schools in spite of everything; some of the staff were Civil Defence volunteers by night and everyone was thankful when the summer break arrived on the 20th of July - this was extended until the 18th of September, partly because of children helping with the harvest and partly to allow time to tidy up the premises after the Hull evacuees had gone, e.g. re-polish the floors and touch up some of the paintwork.

Thirty one infant girls 'went up' after the holidays and work proceeded as usual. The Poppy Appeal raised £5.11s.10d that year and £1.10s.51/2d was collected for the Russian Fund - they were our allies now after the German attack earlier that year. All departments closed for the Christmas break, from the 23rd of December until the 7th of January 1942.

So many passionate people!

must have touched on a subject close to people's hearts which created a lot of interest in my article last month. Thank you all very much for such positive feedback.....to have a love of animals is a very real blessing for everyone.

When you look at what motivates animals of any species to either be what they are by nature or to become what we desire them to be for our own benefit then it leads into a complex science. Understanding those motivations......both desirable and undesirable.....is fundamental in our ability to train them in a positive way.

Keeping things simple

Keeping things simple is a great start. Training in bite sized chunks is another. Positively reinforcing correct behaviour is essential. Understanding their stress or apparent inability to learn is another backed up by an understanding of how they perceive their world through their own eyes.

Past experiences, both good and bad, have an enormous impact on present "offered up" behaviour in any animal of any species. A lack of trust and feelings of fear present at one end of the emotional scale extending to a dominant lack of respect and bullying attitude whereby owners, handlers or trainers are being held to ransom at the direct opposite end of the scale.

Most of us own dogs and cats......predators by nature of species. Mostly we wish our dogs would not attack or defend, until it suits our need. Our well fed cats' still hunt wild birds by nature of species, which is no longer necessary when readily available food is present.....species first dictates they will always hunt.

Diverse group of people

At the 1st International Animal Trainers Conference at Twycross I talked about in the last edition I met an extraordinary and diverse group of people. Some care for and train inside Zoos, where others are out in the "bush"! Literally! I met and listened to a guy called Cyril Stannard and a lady called Anne Beckhelling from the Cheetah outreach in Paardevlei, Somerset West. South Africa.

Their work is two fold. Using cheetah ambassadors trained from birth to bring conservation reality to local schools of young children, collages of young adults (who could all start to make a difference) and communities who are affected or governed by their rural surroundings.....all in the hope that seeing the reality of the elegant beautiful touchable feline in their midst creates a bond with their bush surroundings, awareness of slaughter through poaching and farming herd protection using indiscriminate snaring and poisoning.

Training Anatolian Shepherd Dogs

The second string to their bow is training the big, strong Anatolian Shepherd Dogs to become farmer's partners in herd/flock protection. By very careful slow training from puppyhood, these dogs become permanently attached to a particular flock or herd for life. It is amazing work which creates such a successful outcome by using these dogs as a mitigation tool in the human predator conflict, focusing on the free ranging Cheetah and Leopard areas of South Africa.

The farmers benefit by reducing stock losses by 98%! The wild life (which includes all the large carrion birds, herbivores like Springbok, Gemsbok and Impala as well as the carnivores like the Serval, Leopard, Cheetah and Lion) benefit immensely by the removal of horrifically cruel indiscriminate killing by poison laying and horrendous myriad of variations in snaring.

Win Win situation

It's a Win Win situation! The dog never leaves the flock for all the rest of its lifeby training its natural instincts of protection and herding in guarding its charges. The farmers will provide all the care and nutrition the dog ever needs and is honour bound to preserve the wildlife. You may never look at your cat or dog in quite the same way again!

It is such a blessing to find people who dedicate all of their lives to work in such fields with immense passion and dedication. I found it all quite fascinating as well as humbling.

Change of attitudes

Hopefully we all do our bit to make sure we tend to, care for and protect all the people and animals in our lives and that we create no harm. It's good to feel that we may play some small part in changing attitudes, opinions or actions in others which may create harm or maybe we donate time or money to a chosen charity doing good works. It is always humbling to meet people who give their whole lives and "being" in order to protect, nurture and care for wild animals, their environments and the indigenous people in order for our children to inherit a wonderful and diverse world of wild life.

Moving Abroad? A monthly column by Nick Russell


can't believe that, as I sit and write this, we have nearly reached the longest day. Where has the year so far gone? We are already half way to Christmas.

A visit home

Since my last article Rita and I, along with her sister Pat, who also lives in Spain, made a quick visit to the UK to celebrate their other sisters 50th in Birmingham. Rita and I also went back to Hull to see our daughter, Nicola and her partner Andy and our grandson Jack. We drove rather than fly so we could buy a few things that are difficult to get hold of out here (dutch hoe, lawn feed and weed, flat bed sheets, printer ink to list a few things) and load up the car on the way back. We managed to do the 1500 miles in 2 days, despite the weather both ways through France been absolutely wet and horrendous. Its a bit more expensive than flying but much more fun and you see more of the country side through Spain and France as well as being able to buy whatever you want without the fear of luggage surcharges!!.

Most of the motorways through the two countries are toll roads, so if you ever decide to drive don't forget to add around £120 each way to the costs. Diesel prices also vary tremendously







from 1.22 euros per litre in Spain to 1.50 euros in France and even more in the UK but even with an overnight stop eachway, food and refreshments, the total cost for the three of us was about £650.

While I was at my daughters I had a walk around Cottingham to catch up with a few old friends and one thing that struck me was how quiet and lifeless it felt in the village. Returning to Spain

Since returning home to Spain, we have finished the bedrooms in the casitas, had more people staying and more bookings for the summer. The weather has dramatically improved as well this month and is currently averaging about 32°C and is hot and sunny. The pool is warming up nicely and getting plenty of use by the guests and the grandchildren although not by me...its still too cold.

I have been spending days in the Olives trying to get rid of all the weeds and getting bitten to death in the process, despite covering up and spraying myself in insect repellent. Its hard work and as its so hot, I can only do a couple of hours a day, so its going to take a while.

Poppy, our Jack Russell, has been having a great time catching rabbits, rats and a couple of snakes out in the undergrowth. She sits patiently until they try to make a run for it and then she pounces, and there is always only one winner.

The return of mains water

After having no mains water since the end of April, we have finally got a mains supply back on. I am still not sure what the problem was but when we returned from the UK still not having any mains water, I wrote to the water company asking them to sort it out.

After the first visit we had done everything that their engineer asked us to do and more. We changed the non return valve,



disconnected the pipe from the tank and flushed water down it to the meter and it flowed freely so we knew we had no blockages or leaks on our side.

When the engineer returned he still didn't understand why we had no water and left, saying he would investigate further.

The next day the water company had engineers, diggers and pumps in the village digging up the road and working away. I guess the problem was with their mains supply because the following day we had fresh water pouring into our storage tank, thank god.

A trip to Rio Frio

When our friends Dawn and Steve stayed, we had a night out in a little village about 20mins from our house called Rio Frio. It's a small village of about 300 people but it is known as the trout and caviar capital of Andalucia, probably Spain. There are about a dozen restaurants in the village, all serving full menus but specialising in trout from the local organic fish farm. If you like fish, especially trout, then you will love this place. We visited a restaurant we had been to be before and the food is really nice and great value. If you are ever in the area, pop into any of the restaurants and try the Trout in garlic, a full fish with head and tail on or Trout Genovese, an open filleted fish covered in ham and cream. Both are delicious and I guarantee you will go back.

The caviar is from organic sturgeon and is indigenous to this area of Andalucia and sells for about 90 euros for a very small tin.

My fish pond

After the disaster of last year when I lost more than 50 of my adult fish from my pond, I am hoping I don't have the same problem this year. Currently we have about 60 full grown brown carp and gold fish as well as over 100 babies and I hope they all survive this year. If anyone has any advice please e mail me. I will be very grateful.

Drinks and Tapas

One of the nice things about living out here is taking guests and friends out for a drink and watching their faces when the waiter brings out a snack, or tapas, as well as the drink. The usual comment is "do I have to pay for this?" Well in this part of Spain if you buy a drink, you get a tapas free. The more you drink then the more food you get. The history of receiving a free dish of food goes back hundreds of years when customers were given a plate with a piece of bread to put on top of their drinks to keep the flies out. Its great if a few of you go out for the night because you never know what tapas you are going to get when you buy a round. The tapas can vary tremendously from cheese or ham on a piece of crusty bread to a pork stew or seafood or salad or mini burgers. It's always a surprise and I find it amazing that the bars can afford to do it especially in the current economic climate here in Spain.



Beware of Holiday Scams!

ast Riding residents planning a summer getaway are being warned to be on their guard against holiday booking scams, with a warning 'Look before you book!'

Trading standards say there has been a rise in cases of holiday booking fraud, when people hand over money only to discover that their holiday, accommodation or flight doesn't exist, or the booking hasn't been made.

Fraudsters are scamming consumers by using fake websites, false advertising, bogus phone calls and phishing emails.

Recent research from the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIB) shows nearly 1,000 cases of holiday fraud reported in 2012, costing consumers about £1.5 million.

Common types of holiday booking scams include fraudsters targeting group bookings for sports and religious packages by offering 'special deals' for major events in long haul destinations which are often expensive because of high demand; fake airline tickets or tickets that never arrive: and fraudulent advertisements for holiday villas and apartments for which consumers are asked to pay directly into the owner's bank account.

An emerging target for fraudsters is the cloning or fraudulent websites for visa applications, with the ESTA visa required for the United States the most common target.

East Riding Trading Standards are advising local residents to avoid becoming a victim by taking a number of precautions.

- * Check the website address that appears in the top window is correct. Fraudsters can clone legitimate websites but will change the last part of the web address, such as from co.uk to org.
- * When entering personal details online, make sure the site is secure by having a padlock in the address bar and an address beginning shttp or https.
- * If you are booking accommodation online, avoid using sites where the owners advertise it directly and never pay directly into an owner's bank account.
- * When applying for a foreign visa, search thoroughly online to check the correct website information.

Councillor Jackie Cracknell, East Riding of Yorkshire Council's portfolio holder for community involvement and performance, said: "The majority of us work and save all year to be able to go on holiday, so to find that your booking was actually a scam and you have no holiday is particularly distressing. I hope that by warning holidaymakers what to look for it will help to prevent them being duped."

Anyone who is a victim of fraud should report it to Action Fraud at www.actionfraud.police.uk or speak to a specialist advisor on 0300 123 2040. People who have paid for the holiday using their credit card should report the fraud to the card issuer.

Recently Amended - National Planning Rules and Procedures

Central Government has made changes to planning requirements aimed at reducing the 'burden' on local Councils and Authority's that effect your Parish Council's ability to influence applications of various types with the following broad outlines;

- Residential Planning. The new rules introduced on the 30th May 2013 allow for a 'neighbour notification' system which gives immediate neighbours an opportunity to lodge an objection to a planning application submitted by a neighbour from an adjoining property within 21 days of notification. The Council can then consider the objection on the grounds of residential amenity only and must do so within 42 days otherwise the application will be deemed successful. The Parish Council plays no part in this process any longer.
- Applications are subject to the same building regulations and must meet maximum size criteria.
- Applications submitted for consideration within a conservation area must fulfil the previous planning requirements and The Parish Council will be given an opportunity to make recommendations.
- Changes to commercial applications for extensions and rights of use have also been implemented but again if the property is in a conservation area previous rules will apply.

These changes remove the opportunity for local Councils to have any kind of stake holding interest in a large number of planning applications which effectively become 'notifications'. These changes will remain in place for a minimum of three years when a further Government review will take place.

Whilst the Parish Council may no longer have an input into many aspects of the planning process if you are concerned or require advice about building works at a property near you please contact us for further assistance.
