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Microsoft buys LinkedIn and Windows 10 last chance

icrosoft has agreed to purchase LinkedIn for US\$26.2bn (£18bn). LinkedIn describes itself as 'the world's largest professional network with more than 433 million members in 200 countries' - or alternatively you might say a sort of Facebook for business. Many see it as a website that employers use to recruit staff by looking at prospective candidates' details published on there. However, it has to be said that many users, or potential users have been put off by a constant stream of emails saying that someone wants to 'connect with them'. One smart commentator said that the boss of Microsoft only bought LinkedIn to stop receiving the emails! Whatever view you take, that is a huge amount to spend on what is basically buying a list of email addresses.

How much is an email address worth? About \$60 it seems by Microsoft's calculations, although most observers say they have paid way over the odds! Other estimates are a lot more conservative than that, but it just makes you think about every time you fill in a form, or register on a website, or are asked at the till of a store for your email address. Just don't agree to your details being passed on to third parties.

Windows 10 'nag screen' continues to be the bane of most home users lives. telling you that you ought to update. Or worse as a lot of people have found, their computer just gets updated by stealth and suddenly becomes Windows 10. Well this month should see an end to that, as the free upgrade offers expires on July 29th. It will be interesting to see if the nag screen just disappears the following day!

So if you have been putting off the upgrade, it's now decision time, do you or don't you? Although as mentioned above it has become increasingly difficult to avoid upgrading (or updating as Microsoft now call it). However, Windows 7 support should continue until 2020 and Windows 8 three years later. So if you really want to stay as you are, there is a fix we can install that will stop the upgrade, but otherwise you may as well go with the flow

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upgrade for you, you know who to call! After the offer finishes it will cost around £100 to buy Windows 10, plus installation. Customize Windows 10 - Users of Windows 8 upgrading to 10

will probably be glad to see the return of the start button, and will be more familiar with the tiles now pinned to the right hand side of the start menu. Any of these can be removed by right clicking and choosing unpin from start. You can re-arrange the order by just drag and drop. If you want to add a folder or app, just go to it, right click on it and click pin to start. Strangely there is only a tile for Pictures, so if you want add a shortcut to your Documents folder, go to it using File Explorer (the yellow folder icon on the bottom taskbar) and right click on it and click pin to start. You will find Windows always adds new tiles to the bottom of the list, so you then drag it to the top as required. To find Control Panel and other admin type tasks, right click on the start button and you will see a black and white menu pop up.

Email in Windows 10. An important point is that the Windows Live Mail program is still there so if you have always used it to pick up your Karoo email, nothing has changed, it should be on the All Apps list. Don't try and use the blue Mail tile at the top of the start menu, as this is designed for Microsoft mail like Hotmail

Now here's a round-up of useful apps for your smartphone or tablet.

Hive, the British Gas central heating app has been completely revamped. If you have the app already, you should this new improved version installed if you have all your updates downloaded from the app store.

If you're off on holiday soon and need to buy some currency, a very neat app is called 'What's the rate' from Thomas Cook. This gives you all the latest rates, and how they have gone up or down, and lets you place an order for collection at your local TC store.

Likewise, you'll want to know the weather so get the BBC weather app. Here you can load up to ten different locations and just scroll through them for a graphical view of the forecast which is always pretty accurate.

Haystack 'Never be without a business card again'. This useful app lets you create a digital version of your own card and gives you the ability to scan in anyone else's card and add their details to your own contact list, and of course send them your own. Available for both Android and iPhones.

Everyone likes a bit of free advice, so on my website you will find a free guide with some answers to often asked questions like: 'Why does my computer start and then stop at a black screen? Why does my Windows10 start button not work and I can't get emails?' And not least 'Why isn't my internet working?' (download it while you can!)

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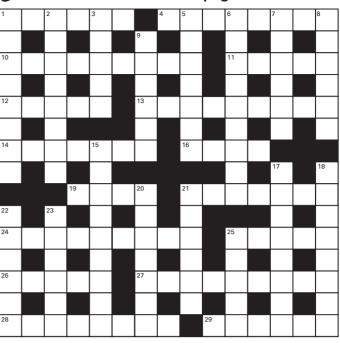

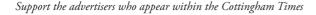

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Minestrone pasta bake

- Low Fat
- Vegetarian
- Total time: 20 minutes. Serves: 4

Ingredients

100g fusilli pasta

200g Love Life Wholemeal Fusilli Pasta

1 tbsp oil

1 onion, chopped

1 clove garlic, chopped

Pack 6 tomatoes, diced

1 courgette, diced

400g can cannellini beans, drained and rinsed

150ml vegetable stock

2 tbsp tomato purée

125g pack lighter mozzarella, grated

Method

- 1. Cook the pastas in boiling water for 9-11 minutes or until tender, then drain.
- 2. Heat the oil in a frying pan and fry the onion and garlic for 2-3 minutes, add the tomatoes, courgette, beans, stock and tomato purée and fry for 4-5 minutes. Season and stir in the pasta. Transfer to an ovenproof dish and sprinkle over the cheese. Place under a preheated grill for 2-3 minutes until golden.

Slow-cooked, soy-glazed short ribs

- Preparation time: 10 Minutes + marinating
- Cooking time: 2 hours 45 minutes
- Total time: 2 hours 55 minutes + marinating. Serves: 4





Ingredients

- 4cm piece root ginger, peeled and roughly chopped
- 4 cloves garlic
- 4 tbsp hoisin sauce
- 2 tbsp soy sauce
- 1 tbsp clear honey
- 2 tbsp vinegar, such as white wine or cider vinegar
- 4 Waitrose British Beef Short Ribs, about 1.4kg
- 150ml hot water

Method

- 1. Place the ginger and garlic in small food processor and whizz to make a paste. Add the hoisin, soy sauce, honey and vinegar, and whizz again until smooth.
- 2. Spoon the marinade over the ribs, rubbing in until well coated. Leave to marinate in the fridge for 1-2 hours, or more if you are preparing ahead of time.

Prawn jambalaya

Ingredients

1 tbsp oil

1 onion, chopped

1 red pepper, diced

1 tbsp cajun seasoning

150g brown basmati rice

Wine sales in the UK have dipped in the 12 months to end of January

ine sales in the UK took a dip in the 12 months to the end of January this year, but only by one per cent in volume and value, suggesting that the market is

Notably, the biggest declines in sales by volume has occurred in the £5-6 price band. In terms of colour, both red and white wine have experienced a one per cent decrease in volume sales during the course of 2015, while rosé has dropped by seven per cent in both volume and value, probably a sign that consumers are moving away from the blush-style pink wines that dominate this sector.

As for grape varieties, falling sales of Pinot Grigio and Chardonnay account for the overall decline in white wine sales, although Sauvignon Blanc continues to increase in sales, rising by nine per cent in volume and value during 2015, increasing its lead as the UK retail sector's best-selling grape.

Among the red grapes, it's Merlot that leads in sales - it also enjoyed a nine per cent increase in volume and value during the past 12 months. Following this upward trend is second best-selling red variety, Shiraz, while Cabernet Sauvignon, in contrast, has suffered a slight decline.

Meanwhile, Champagne (which is treated as a separate category from "sparkling") is also enjoying growth, with average retail price in the UK currently standing at £26.17.

One supermarket wine enjoying a huge boom in sales is Asda's own-label La Moneda Reserva Malbec 2015 from Chile's Central Valley, now discounted to just £4.37.

It was a high-profile winner in the Decanter World Wine Awards recently, winning a best in show gong and once news began to spread the supermarket's website crashed!

The own label wine stood out amongst international competitors in the Best Red Single-Varietal Under £15 category, scoring 95 points out of 100 points.

Marks & Spencer also won a platinum – best in show for the best white blend under £15 for its Colinas Del Itata Old Vine Field Blend 2014 from Itata Valley in Chile, which retails for £10 - as did Tesco for its Tesco Finest Dessert Semillon for best sweet

* Meanwhile, Lidl is set to beef up its range of Proseccos and is extending its own label with a new tier of regional wines.

It is adding a Prosecco Treviso Frizzante to the core range which will hit shelves "imminently", and retail at £4.99, which joins its existing Prosecco DOC Spumante (RRP: £5.29). Later on this year it will also bring in a Prosecco Conegliano Valdobbiadene Superiore DOCG to give consumers the chance to trade up.

"Prosecco has become a classic and our customers love it," wine category director Anna Krettman said. "We're given consumers the option to buy it at a different price point."

The discounter is also introducing a tier of regional New World wines to its Cimarosa own label brand at a slightly higher price point. There are currently 18 wines in the brand, which was introduced in 2009 and is relaunching in August following a packaging refresh, but it will add "a few" New World wines as a sub-brand to celebrate regional variations over the next 12-18 months.

The discounter is rolling out 23 new Spanish and Portuguese wines from August 4 as part of its latest Wine Cellar promotional range, which will be its largest ever focus on Iberian wines. The wines been selected specifically to offer "refreshing summer drinking", Krettman said, but is supplemented with a selection of new French wines.

"Spanish and Portuguese wines have seen a great uplift in sales and they have done very well with the Cellar range, so we wanted to focus on Iberia as a theme," Krettman said. There was, she noted, a huge response to the Hungarian wines released in March, as well as the Canadian ice-wine released in time for Christmas, which she argued was not something the majority of shoppers would otherwise be able to see or try.

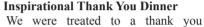

More hours of free childcare for working parents in the East Riding

housands of working parents in the East Riding will be entitled to extra hours of free childcare from next year.

The extended free childcare entitlement for working parents of three and four-year olds will provide eligible parents with a total of 30 hours of free childcare per week, over 38 weeks or 1,140 hours across more weeks throughout the year.

The additional 15 hours of free childcare will be rolled out from September 2017 for eligible families. It is in addition to the existing 15 hours of free early education which is available to all three and four year olds..

It will help families to manage the cost of childcare and also support more parents into work.

Eligibility criteria for the additional free childcare include:-

Both parents are working (or sole parent in a lone parent family) and both earn a weekly minimum equivalent to 16 hours at the minimum wage £107 per week (for under 25 year olds) or national living wage (over 25), and less than £100,000 per annum per household.

Both parents are employed but one or both parents is temporarily away from the workplace on parental, maternity, paternity or adoption leave, or statutory sick pay.

One parent is employed and the other parent has substantial caring responsibilities.

One parent is employed and one parent is disabled or incapacitated.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council has been selected by the Department of Education to be an early innovator to support the rollout of the extra free childcare ahead of the launch of the full implementation of the additional entitlement from September

As an early innovator, the council will be developing and trying out ideas ahead of the rollout, including working with childcare providers and schools to help ensure there are enough childcare places available.

To help plan for this, the council is carrying out surveys with parents, carers, childcare providers and schools to help determine how many childcare places are currently available in the East Riding, and the potential demand for additional hours.

The survey will ask whether families are currently accessing paid-for childcare in addition to the 15 hours early education entitlement, whether they are using informal (unpaid) childcare and whether they plan to use more childcare if they are eligible for the additional free 15 hours from September 2017. All the replies will be kept anonymous and parents and children will not be identified in any reporting of the survey.

Councillor Julie Abraham, the council's portfolio holder for children, young people and education, said: "The entitlement to extra hours of free childcare should make a major difference to thousands of hardworking East Riding families by helping them to manage the cost of childcare and support parents into work, or to work more hours if they wish to do so. The council will also be working with parents, childcare providers and partners to further develop the support available for children attending childcare provision with special educational needs and disabilities, and working in an area with higher unemployment to look at ways of supporting access to childcare to help parents and carers back

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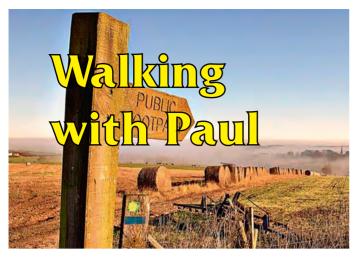

The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.

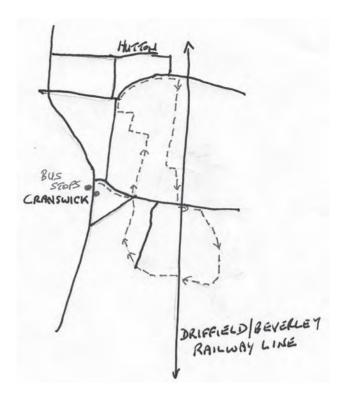

Start at GR.TA 022524 Cranswick Bus Stop. Distance 3.8 Miles.

alk down Cranswick main street and on reaching the White Horse Inn turn left and walk through the car park in a northerly direction and then walk down a

distinct path through shrubs and pass through a metal kissing gate into a field. Pass through a wooden kissing gate and cross the next field with the hedge on the left. Pass through a second wooden kissing gate and cross the next field diagonally aiming for Hutton Church.

At the far corner of the field pass through a kissing gate then follow the distinct path through a small plantation and emerge onto the Cranswick to Hutton road. Turn right and follow the road through Hutton towards Skerne.

About 50 metres before the level crossing, locate and turn right down a way marked path between hedges and then cross a stile into an open field and walk diagonally across this field to the far left corner. Pass through a kissing gate onto an enclosed footpath with the railway line to the left. On reaching the main road turn left. Cross over the level crossing and eventually turn right into Sheepman Lane.

Follow this lane as it becomes a grass track and eventually a grass footpath. After about ½ mile (on Sheepman Lane) locate a path on the right and take this across Priest Ings, cross the Railway line and on approaching a cottage emerge onto the road, turn right and follow this road to the village green. Cross the green diagonally back to the White Horse and then the bus stop on the main A164 road.

How I did it.

Bus No. 121 departing from Hull Interchange at 10.25am arriving Cranswick at 11.24am.

Completed walk at 1.00pm and boarded Bus No.121 for Hull Interchange at 1.14pm arriving Hull 2.15pm.



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July is often one of the hottest months of the year and a great time to sit out and enjoy your garden. Fingers crossed the sun comes out this year. Keep your plants looking good by regularly dead-heading and you'll enjoy a longer display of blooms. Make sure you keep new plants well watered and hoe off weeds, which thrive in the sunshine. Not only can we enjoy our plants in the Summer we can also relax and unwind in the garden on the warmer evenings with a chimenea, garden furniture or hopefully a few bbqs.



A guide to watering and feeding your garden

If you want a healthy garden with an abundance of flowers, watering and feeding are essential. Without water, plants will simply wilt and die. A complete fertiliser or specific nutrients are essential – particularly for plants growing close together. But when should you water and feed?

During long hot dry spells, plants definitely need water – but make sure this is given at the right time and in the right way. Plants need to be fed during periods of active growth – not when it could encourage new growth later in the season.

How to water

Watering cans: Use one fitted with a fine watering can rose. This leads to less soil disturbance and possible root or plant damage.

Sprinklers: Try not to use them in hot sunny weather as this can cause leaf scorching. More importantly the water applied has more time to be absorbed in the soil when applied in the cool of the evening or in the early morning.

Trickle or soaking hoses: deliver tiny amounts of water over an extended period of time.

Root Watering: Sink 5–8cm diameter pipes or plastic soft drink bottles with the bottoms cut off in the soil next to trees or shrubs, or in containers. Top these up with water on a regular basis.

Watering Tips

- It's better to soak plants from time to time rather than watering little and often.
- Make sure water gets right down to the roots, by placing the hose or watering can spout at the base of a plant and water gently. If soil is very dry, water twice.
- Do not water plants too forcefully. Never direct a jet of water at the base of a plant as it will wash away the soil, exposing the roots. Make a hollow around the plant base and fill with water.
- Re-use 'grey water' from baths and sinks or recycle rainwater by using a water butt.

New Plants

New plants need a good deal of care and attention to help them adjust to their new surroundings and grow away well.

When planting new plants, prepare the soil to ensure they get enough water and food.

Dig the soil between 25 and 50cm deep. This will let in air and water to prevent root suffocation.

Add some water-retaining gel or try some well-rotted manure, garden compost or peat alternative, as these will act as a sponge, retaining water.

Lawn Irrigation

If grass does not spring back after it has been walked on, water as soon as possible, as long as there isn't a drought!

10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Place Conservatory plants outdoors
- Regularly de-weed your borders and keep on top of weeds
- 3. Dead head bedding plants and repeat flowering perennials
- 4. Paint sheds, decking, fencing and furniture while its dry
- Spray roses with fungicide to ward against black spot and mildew
- 6. Be water wise, use your water butt and keep on top of watering bedding in particular
- Feed your lawn, particularly if you didn't do a Spring feed
- 8. Look out for Scarlet Lily beetles on your Lilies before they ruin them
- Also keep a look out for other pests as they thrive in warm weather
- 10. Chop lupins, delphinium and poppies down once they have finished flowering



If it is very dry, spike your lawn with a fork before watering. The quickest way to water your lawn is to use a sprinkler but

to ensure you don't over-water in one place, place a jar next to your sprinkler and move it once the jar has 2.5cm of water in it.



Caring for Containers

Like new plants, those in pots and hanging baskets need special care as they run out of water more quickly than established border plants - which have bigger root systems and more soil from which they can reach water.

Add water-retaining granules or gel (right) to compost in pots and place a small pipe or plastic bottle in the compost to help with root watering.

Aim to keep the compost moist at all times, watering daily in hot weather.

If the compost looks pale, has shrunk away from side of the pot, or if plants are droopy and wilting, stand the container in a bucket or pan so that it can soak water right up into the compost.

Dealing with drought conditions

Attach a water butt with a tap to your drainpipe to collect rainwater.

Keep borders well weeded as weeds compete for moisture.

A 5–7cm protective layer of mulch such as compost, cocoa shells, bark or even gravel spread on the soil between plants reduces evaporation.

Stop sprinkling lawns in drought – in autumn they will recover!

Hoe weeds at the roots to save time and avoid disturbing the soil and increasing water loss from the surface.

Leave grass clippings on the surface of the lawn after mowing to recycle nutrients.

Different Plant foods for different plants:

• Shrubs & trees –Bonemeal when planting in autumn/ winter; Growmore in spring/summer.



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- Bulbs Bonemeal after flowering.
- Bedding plants fortnightly general liquid feed.
- Container plants -general liquid feed weekly in spring/

All living things need food and water and plants are no exception. They need a mixture of the following three main types of plant food:

Nitrogen promotes leaf growth.

Phosphates help roots develop.

Potash increases production of flowers and fruits and improves fruit flavour. It also increases winter hardness. They also require trace elements of calcium, boron, iron, magnesium and manganese. By applying a range of garden fertilisers, you can ensure your plants receive sufficient food to perform to their full potential. Some specific plants need tailored cocktails of fertilisers – roses are a good example.

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Council to invest in new multi service centre for Cottingham

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council is proposing to spend approximately £420,000 to create a new multi service centre in Cottingham.

The scheme will involve refurbishing, remodelling and extending the existing library building in the village to incorporate the customer service centre and registration services, which are currently located in Cottingham Civic Hall.

The new multi service centre, which forms part of the council's capital investment programme, will enable the council to co-locate the library service, customer service centre and registration service under one roof.

The scheme will allow the council to consolidate and improve a number of local services, and at the same time upgrade the building's quality for customer use. The new centre will enable residents to carry out a wide variety of transactions and have access to self-service facilities and information via public access terminals.

The scheme forms part of the council's wider asset rationalisation programme to deliver an efficient, cost-effective, flexible and well-utilised estate over the long term.

Councillor Symon Fraser, cabinet portfolio holder for asset management, housing and environment, said: "Making these changes is an important operational step as it will assist the council in saving money whilst also supporting the delivery of improved services. Whilst we do this, we will continue to work with the local community to make sure that opportunities to make viable use of the buildings are explored."

A public display of the development proposals will be held at the library in July, allowing residents to view and discuss the proposals with council staff. The council will then seek planning permission for the project.

Subject to planning approval, it is anticipated the scheme will start in autumn 2016 and be complete in spring 2017. During this period, the library will continue to provide a service within the village by operating from temporary accommodation very close to the current location.

Following completion of the project, the council will release its existing premises on Market Green, which will be surplus to the authority's operational requirements. The council will, in due course, be seeking expressions of interest for the sites and are keen to work with the local community, including the parish council, regarding their future use.

so where can I redirect my mail??

adly, we have lost a much-loved and well used facility – our sorting office. 'Thank you' to all the staff for providing us with such a good service over so many years.

We've discussed the problem with several traders in the village and currently, Barkers on Hallgate and Castle Park Newsagents have kindly agreed to take delivery of any redirected mail, if residents are out at the first delivery attempt.

As normal the postal staff will leave a red/white card which includes the Royal Mail contact details so either phone the 03456 number or use their web page and select the 'NEIGHBOUR' option.

If you are redirecting to **Barkers**, their post code is **HU16 4BB**, if it's **Castle Park Newsagents** then its **HU16 5JU**. If using the computer generated instructions, you may find you have to enter the post code without a space in the middle.

When collecting your mail please remember, that whoever goes along to collect the mail, they must also take the original red/white card, and then the staff will know they are authorised to collect the item.

Remember you can redirect to anywhere within the HU16 area and it includes 'signed for' as well, but do check when arranging the redirection as some categories of mail will have to be collected from Malmo Road.

If your post code starts with anything other than HU16, say HU6, then you can only redirect within the HU6 area. Hopefully, more shops will enter into the community spirit and provide this service.

We hope that this arrangement will lessen the impact of losing our village sorting office. Problem solving a fear in my dog re the use of hydrotherapy

ff topic for horse training but on topic for applying all the same Science of Learning and Behaviour.

My rescue dog Lucy needs Hydrotherapy to improve her problem shoulder and weak haunch muscles...so I book a course of 10 swims under bespoke qualified supervision.

The problem is my dog fears strangers and does not invite the touch of strangers. In order to swim my dog, she has to be handled by the staff and one of them has to be in the pool with her, holding her flotation coat while she swims.

During the initial trial swim session, I could see how very worried Lucy was about the whole scenario and as such made her swim very panicky. It upset me to see her emotions and it upset Lucy who showed all the signs of fear and panic. My plan to swim her for her physical benefit was not worth the price it was creating re her emotional wellbeing.

I don't force horses in training, so I cannot force my dog just because I can.

Home we went and I spent the evening devising a training plan for voluntary participation in hydrotherapy using the swimming pool

Plan in place proved no better for the second session.....it is not the swimming per se, it is the presence of the girls. Despite taking it all very slowly and keeping the whole experience highly rewarded with yummy special food treats and taking out one of the girls.....Lucy swam but it was still so stressful for her because of her capture by the girl in the pool to balance her body during swimming.

We had a meeting and we all agreed that this was not going to work ...so another change was proposed. Instead of using the pool which Lucy really was not happy about, we would use the water treadmill instead.

The treadmill is designed for resistance work which was not what my dog needed but it was explained to me that the water level could be raised high enough so that her body would be really buoyant and the treadmill speed would be controlled to be really easy for Lucy to just simply move freely. The staff discussed our situation and training plan with a dog behaviourist, who agreed that the extraordinary nature of the fear based problem, deemed such effort absolutely necessary. The emotional wellbeing of Lucy outweighed all else.

I was given access of the facility, when not in use, to train Lucy quietly by myself for voluntary entry and wait duration both through and inside the treadmill.

I took the lead off completely and allowed Lucy both free choice, and all the time she, needed to load herself through the tank. It took 7 sessions for me to pop over at weird times and train...always highly rewarded and using high value treats (strips of cooked liver, cooked sausages, special biscuits etc).

I booked a swim session after Lucy was completely happy self-loading and being able to enter the tank with the far door closing on her and opening with her waiting to leave on cue. Being shut inside without her being relaxed was the last thing I wanted....Lucy had to voluntarily participate and feel she had both the choice and be able to



leave whenever she felt she needed to.

I then introduced one of the girls who, initially, completely ignored Lucy until the dog relaxed more in her presence. The she started to highly reward Lucy with treats at exactly the time Lucy showed interest. It was lovely to see my dog start to sit and offer a paw! We were finally on the winning side of this whole scenario. We then introduced the water for small approximations in time. Keeping it all highly rewarded and short

We are now swimming her twice a week with one of the girls inside to keep her straight. Lucy is happily hand feeding from them, enters the tank happily on her own, on a cue I have shaped, and absolutely participating. YEY!!!!! (and never on a leash)

I have to massively thank Kimberley and Ruth from Swanbridge Veterinary Hospital for their help, support and patience with both myself, and more importantly, towards my emotionally fragile dog!

We have turned failure and stress into a really positive and successful outcome. Lucy now barks in the car when we turn up and is busting to come out.....

We can now give her body the benefit of the swim sessions, without the Hydro pool but by alternative use of the treadmill instead.

Having the ability to think outside of the box is a massively valuable tool in training any animal. Being prepared to be flexible, patient, laterally thinking, changing the environment to help create success and keeping it all short in duration with very many approximations and always highly rewarded.

Instead of giving up on the idea of hydro for my dog, I am so grateful to have been given the opportunity to train my dog the way I train my horses.

Dog owners urged to check boarding facilities's licence and insurance

s the summer holiday season approaches, dog owners are being urged to make sure the day care or boarding facilities they may be using for their pets are fully licensed and insured.

Recently, East Riding of Yorkshire Council's licensing team have seen an increase in the number of adverts for home boarding or day care provision, which may seem an appealing option for dog owners who do not wish to put their pets in a kennel environment.

While the vast majority of businesses that operate within the East Riding are legitimate and have the correct licence and insurance, some may not and licensing officers are telling owners to ask to see documents to make sure their pets are in a safe environment.

Councillor Shaun Horton, portfolio holder for community involvement and local partnerships at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "Our message to dog owners is don't leave your pet anywhere that doesn't hold a licence issued by East Riding of Yorkshire Council.

"Always ask to see the licence or contact the council's licensing team to see if they hold the correct documents.

"There has been an increase in the provision of home and day care boarding facilities for dogs and we know there are a lot of responsible dog boarders in the East Riding operating lawfully and providing a valuable, caring service.

"But we need to address those individuals operating unlawfully, for a profit, with little regard to the safety and welfare of those pets living temporarily in their private homes.

"If you place your pet with a stranger, friend or relative during the day or overnight for payment you need to check whether the home is licensed to provide that service and your pet will be safe.

"If it is not licensed, you could be putting your pet at risk and, should anything go wrong, your pet is unlikely to be covered for insurance purposes."

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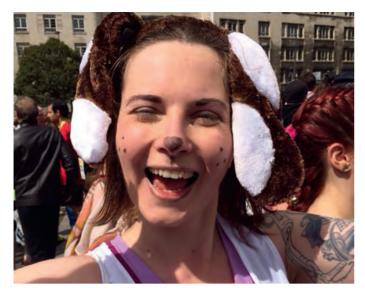

Smugglers! coming to Sewerby Hall and Gardens this summer

new exhibition – Smugglers! – opens for the summer this coming Saturday (25 June) at Sewerby Hall and Gardens.

Telling the story of free trade on the Yorkshire coast in the eighteenth century, the new exhibition will be fun and informative for adults and children alike. It runs until Sunday 4 September.

The exhibition will look at how smugglers illegally traded goods using remote beaches and secluded caves, usually at night, including those at Flamborough, in a trade which reached its peak in the eighteenth century.

Younger visitors will be able to dress up as a smuggler or as a revenue man, and the exhibition will be accompanied by a trail around Sewerby Hall, looking for hidden contraband. There will also be Bella the Boat - a soft play area - and a number of activities for children, including the chance to be photographed as a smuggler.

Adults can learn how the previous owners of Sewerby Hall – the Greame family – were caught up in smuggling themselves. In 1770, John Greame was found guilty of smuggling – his wife



admitted to being 'a small dealer in the smuggling way' (as were many local people at the time).

Councillor Richard Burton, portfolio holder for civic wellbeing and culture, said: "This will be a fascinating exhibition with a real local angle for people on the East Yorkshire coast. It will be fascinating to revisit an era when tea, for example, attracted a duty of 119%, and as a result, so many local people were directly involved in smuggling, including the then owners of Sewerby Hall!

"I hope that this new exhibition will prove a real hit with both adults and children alike, and will add an extra dimension to a visit to Sewerby Hall and Gardens this summer."

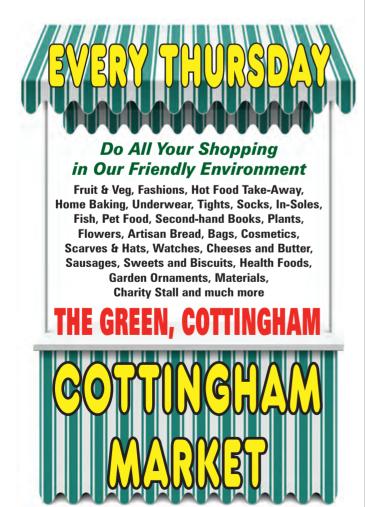

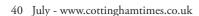
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Local Nature Reserves in the East Riding now even more welcoming

Irresponsible dog owners warned as number of fines increase

og wardens across the East Riding have issued more fixed penalty notices to owners who fail to clean up after their pets in the first six months of this year compared to the same period last year.

Between January 2016 and the end of May 2016 dog wardens from East Riding of Yorkshire Council handed out the £75 fixed penalty notices to 11 owners, compared to just eight in the first half of 2015.

Most of the fixed penalty notices have been issued in relation to dog fouling in locations such as Sancton, Rawcliffe, Etton, Beverley, Driffield, Cottingham, Hessle and Laxton but one owner

Councillor Shaun Horton, portfolio holder for community involvement and local partnerships at East Riding of Yorkshire Council said the increase in the number of fixed penalty notices issued was due to the quality of information provided by the public to the dog warden team.

He said: "The dog wardens rely on quality information from the public in order to find those responsible for not cleaning up after their pets.

"Some of the information we are now getting from the public is very detailed and contains locations, time of day as well as descriptions of both the owner and the dog – this means the wardens can tailor their patrols in order to catch those in the act.

"The fixed penalty notices will be sent out to those offenders through the post and I would ask those people to consider whether they really want other family members knowing they are not a responsible dog owner and taking £75 from the household budget."

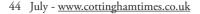

East Riding Museums Service commemorates the Battle of the Somme in Beverley

The exhibition which opened on Saturday, 25 June, at the Treasure House in Beverley, a new exhibition 'Remembering the Somme' looks at one of the most famous and costly battles of the First World War.

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1 July 1916, the opening day of the battle, saw the British Army suffer 57,000 casualties, with 19,000 men killed – the Army's worst ever losses in a single day. The battle lasted until November and resulted in perhaps one million casualties for the British, French and German armies

Dr. David Marchant, museums registrar with East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "The Battle of the Somme is generally remembered as an example of poor British generalship and an appalling loss of life. But is this the whole story? Today, we tend to base our views on television programmes such as 'Blackadder', without necessarily considering all of the facts. This exhibition aims to present a range of views on the battle and lets visitors decide the truth. We've also included stories of local men who fought on the Somme."

The exhibition is accompanied by artefacts from the Museum & Archive Services collections, as well as loans from private collections.

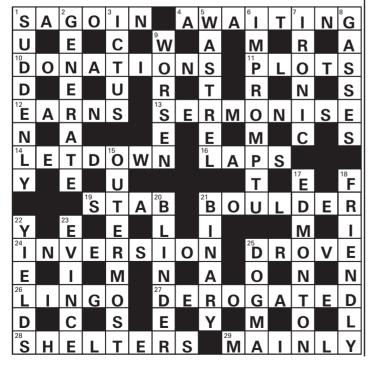

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Take good care of your skin by going organic

If you are someone who buys organic food then you are helping yourself and your family to live healthier lives. What you may not know is that organic does not just apply to what you put into your body but also what you put on the outside of it.

These include such things as soap, deodorant, shampoo, conditioner, hair gel, hair spray, cleanser, toner, moisturiser, body wash, shave gel (or shaving cream), body lotion, cologne or perfume, cosmetics, nail polish, etc.

The products you apply to your face, body and hair are absorbed into your skin.

Some of the chemicals from these products can build up in the body over time. At present it is not entirely clear at what level these chemicals can become toxic to the body. As well, scientists do not know how the chemicals from skin care products will react with DNA and to what extent they can cause health problems to occur. What we do know is that all of those products when used on a steady basis are doing SOMETHING to the body.

When you stop for a minute to think about all of the products you use every day you may feel overwhelmed by it. What this amounts to is that every individual is absorbing an abundant supply of chemicals on a daily basis. The solution to this is to switch to milder and more natural skin care products that are organic and do not cause damage to the skin or to the human body in general.

Add Organic Skin Care to Your Shopping List:

If you take the time to look you will discover that many stores are stocking their shelves with healthier non-synthetic and non-chemical products. Always read the ingredients listed on the products very carefully. Look for natural products listed as ingredients on the labels. Steer clear of products that list any type of parabens on the ingredients list, such as propylparaben and methylparaben. In the same way, avoid products that contain petrochemicals, sulphates, propylene glycol and urea (such as imidazolidinyl urea).

Look for products that use natural preservatives instead such as tea tree oil. It is also wise to look for products that contain a combination of essential oils such as lavender, lemon, sandalwood, sage, rose and rosemary. Other natural preservatives to look for include honey and grape seed extract.

While organic skin care products do tend to be a little more expensive than other skin care products they will do your skin and your body good both in the short-term as well as the long-term. Choose organic every time and you will not go wrong!



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
