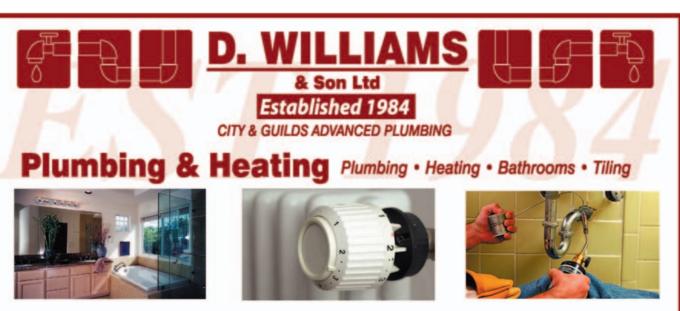

Thousand of Pounds worth of damage to the stonework at St. Mary's Parish Church

housands of pounds worth of damage to the stonework at St Mary's parish church was caused late last month when vandals climbed scaffolding being used for repairs to the south transept roof to gain access to the roof of the nave from where three heavy stones, which formed the parapet-style crenellations, were wrenched away and hurtled to the graveyard 30 feet below.

The incident at the 12th Century Grade 1 listed building is thought to have occurred on Wednesday, May 23, between 10pm and 10.30pm, and added to a five-week spate of vandalism which included a break-in at the vestry - also on the south side of the church - and the theft of a neck-microphone.

Church officials understand that passers-by on the snicket, which loops from Hallgate round the southern side of the church, saw a group of people on the roof, but have not been able to identify them.

Cottingham's village-centre CCTV system covers a section of the church, where there is also internal security camera coverage.

Several empty larger bottles, recovered from close to the scene of the damage, have been placed under security wraps and will be used as evidence, if necessary, during the on-going investigations into the damage.

Following a request to Cottingham Parish Council late last year by St Mary's Parochial Church Council for an extension of Cottingham's no-drinking zone to cover the church grounds, the village authority asked the East Riding of Yorkshire Council to implement their request. The extension had not been sanctioned by the time of the nave roof incident, but an ERYC spokesman said that it should be in place in the near future.

Although damaged, two of the three sand-stones plummeted onto soft ground in the graveyard, but the badly-shattered third crashed onto a headstone and tipped it well away from its upright

The third annual Cottingham Day is set to take place on Saturday 7 July 2007, at various locations around the village.

There will also be the Crime Prevention Bus, a Fire Brigade tender and a St John Ambulance as well as a climbing wall supplied and manned by the army.

Host of events and shows

Grandad's Park once again will play host to most of the child-orientated events and shows.

Shows already booked for the day include a Dog Show, Giant Jenga, a Penalty Shoot-out organised by Cottingham Rangers, mini tennis organised by Cottingham Lawn Tennis Club and a broken crockery stall organised by the Scouts.

Also booked to keep children entertained is a children's workshop organised by Scrapstore and a circus skills display and workshop put on by the Magic Carpet Theatre and the Daylight Theatre, as well as children's rides and a bouncy castle.

Just in case, there will be a manned Red Cross First Aid Post.

The Civic Hall is fully booked as usual with trade stalls which will be open from 10am to 4pm with the Darby & Joan Club playing host to an array of charity stalls with a steam organ in the car park.

In the Memorial Garden on Hallgate there will be a display of 1940's clothing. Next door, the Methodist Church will be holding a flower display between 10am and 4pm as well as serving light refreshments.

The Memorial Club in Finkle Street is having an open day between 11am and 4pm so call in and have a look round this old building.

Vintage Cars and Motorcycles

This year we will see a Vintage Car and Vintage Motorcycle display (weather permitting). The Motorcycle Club will show their bikes in the car park of the Memorial Club and the East Yorkshire Thoroughbred Car Club, along with the Morris Minor Owner's Club, will put on a display of their cars down Hallgate.

George V Playing Fields

The George V playing fields will host a family fun day event starting at 4.00pm.

Cottingham Day will kick off around 11am with a parade around the village featuring groups from the local primary schools, Scouts, Guides and Brownies, starting from Hallgate School and finishing at approximately 12 noon. It is hoped that the vintage cars and bikes will also be part of this parade.

The whole day should give everyone a fantastic, funfilled day out with enough entertainment for even the most diverse tastes.

The success of the day will depend on everyone turning out and having a good time, supporting all the events and, because of the anticipated numbers; FREE parking will be available at The Lawns site on Harland Way, just a short walk from the action.

It should be noted that some of the activities may not be available if the weather is inclement.

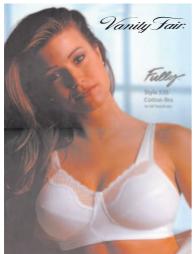

King George V water pipeline - work delayed

Work to replace the existing water-pipe which crosses King George V Playingfields from the sports pavilion to the allotments site has been delayed.

It had been anticipated that the work would be carried out before the end of May, but the contractor was forced to postpone the start of the operation.

The need for a replacement pipe became a priority after the East Riding of Yorkshire Council would not allow the water to be turned on using the existing pipe because it was damaged and uneconomical to repair.

The Finance Committee agreed to a request by Coun. Donald Hardwick, chairman of the Allotments Committee, for funds so that the contractor could find another sub-contractor for trench work to start as soon as possible or to fund an increase in the amount and frequency of deliveries to water-troughs on the site until the work is completed.

Membership of Council for the Protection of Rural England renewed

Cottingham Parish Council has renewed its membership of the Council for the Protection of Rural England (CPRE) at a cost of £27.

Review of Cottingham Day preparations by Angela Devine

Coun. Angela Devine, Chairman of Cottingham Parish Council, outlined the preparations which are underway for Cottingham Day 2007 - it will be held on Saturday, July 7 this year - in a comprehensive review of the authority's activities for the 12 months to March 31 at the parish meeting on May 17 in advance of the annual general meeting.

Cottingham Day in 2006, which was blessed by superb weather, was a fantastic occasion, said Coun. DeVine, who thanked those who helped to organise - and also took part in - the "brilliant" event. "This year's event will be bigger and better than ever", she added, but stressed that volunteers are still required.

At the subsequent annual meeting it was announced that the next meeting of the Cottingham Day 2007 Committee to which volunteers will be welcomed - will be held in the parish council offices (9, The Cottages, Market Green) on Wednesday, June 6 (6pm).

In her review, the Chairman also praised Coun. Win Knight and her colleagues on the village's Yorkshire in Bloom group for their hard work which resulted in a Silver Gilt category award in 2006.

At the parish meeting, Coun. Knight reported that the spring judging for 2007 had been completed and that the summer judging is due to take place between July 2 and July 20.

In their comments following their spring visit in April, the judges praised the efforts made at Grandads' Park, Cottingham Parks Golf Club, King George V Playingfields, Cottingham High School and the wildlife areas in Millbeck and The Dene. They were also impressed by the absence of dog fouling, graffiti and litter.

But, Coun. Knight told the meeting, they had commented that the retailers could do more to improve the village centre.

Concern over excess traffic on Park Lane by juggernauts

Judith Macklin, Clerk to the Cottingham Parish Council, has written to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Highways and Forward Planning Department to ask if representatives from the authority would attend the village council's June meeting in an attempt to resolve problems in Park Lane.

At the parish council's annual meeting, Coun. Donald Hardwick referred to the large amount of traffic - including juggernauts - now using Park Lane to access growers and a caravan storage facility.

Riders from equestrian centres - as well as other horse riders - use the bridle paths from Cottingham to Beverley which link in with Park Lane, which is less than 2.5 metres wide.

The surface, which is broken and uneven, cannot take the weight of the traffic, said Coun. Hardwick, who added that there have been serious incidents - including riders thrown from their horses and a horse falling when a manhole cover collapsed - on the road. The surface has been patched but, with the heavy traffic, repairs are not sufficient, said the councillor.

A copy of the Clerk's letter has been sent to the Environment and Transport Committee at the ERYC, who can recommend to the council's Cabinet that action should be taken. Meanwhile, Coun.Hardwick said that he is willing to meet ERYC representatives in advance of the June parish council meeting to discuss the situation and to give them time to report to their appropriate committees.

WiFi and frequently asked questions

Wireless networks, owing to their current proliferation, continue to be in the news for various reasons, the latest being a 'health scare', particularly in relation to their use in schools. The argument against is similar to that of using a mobile phone regularly, and the wave frequency is the same as that of home cordless phones and microwave ovens, so nothing too new here. The World Health Organization however has published a report claiming there is no danger to health from wireless networks.

Known generally as WiFi, wireless networks work by beaming out a signal carrying your broadband Internet connection. This can then be picked up by any wireless enabled device, like a laptop, within range. However, many of these WiFi networks are not secure, so a lot of people are surfing for free, in other words using someone else's Internet connection, which is actually illegal. Whilst this doesn't cost the owner of the network financially, there is the potential for one of these rogue users to be able to view or even steal data from the owner's computer/s. Perhaps even worse is the possibility that if one of these users indulges in any illegal activity online, it is the owner of the network who would be traced.

But fear not, if a WiFi network is set up correctly, with proper security, none of this can happen, and you will have the convenience of using the internet wherever you are in the home or office without wires!

Now let's look at some frequently asked questions . . .

O: 'How can I access my email while I am away from home or office?'

A: The good news is that this is quite easy to do. Many email providers subscribe to a service called 'mail2web' (www.mail2web.com), that lets users sign in from any computer anywhere just using their normal email address and password. If you use Karoo, you can get there easily by going to www.karoo.co.uk and click the link on the right hand side 'Karoo email'.

The other method is to sign up for a free Internet email service such as Hotmail, run by Microsoft MSN, or Yahoo, or Gmail, run by Google. These are easy to use and because you view and send your mail purely online and don't download anything to the computer, they are safe and accessible from

Q: 'How can I get my own domain name on the Internet?'

A: A domain name is a unique name that is registered and cannot then be used by anyone else. So if you want to have a personal or business website, or just protect your own name, you can register it with a suffix such as .com or co.uk or .org for less than £5 per year. There are numerous web hosting companies out there, have a look for starters at: www.uk2.net or www.1and1.co.uk or www.fasthosts.co.uk for packages available and check

if anyone is using your name already!

Q: I keep seeing a pop up in the corner of my screen that says updates are ready for my computer, click here to install. Is this safe to do?

A: If the message is coming from an icon like a small yellow shield, then it is Windows advising you that it has downloaded updates and needs you to click to agree to install them. This is quite safe, and indeed important that you do so to keep your computer's security up to date. If you have never noticed this, go into Control Panel and check that 'Automatic Updates' is switched on. Many other programs will update themselves in a similar manner, including Google, Real Player, QuickTime, MSN etc.

Q: What is MSN Messenger and why are the children on it all the time'

A: If it was Microsoft's intention to keep children glued to their computers from the time they get home from school then it has succeeded! MSN Messenger is an instant messaging program that lets you chat to your friends by typing messages to each other. You can also transfer files & sounds, send emoticons (icons or pictures designed to convey emotions) and of course use with a webcam so you can see each other at the same time. See www.msn.co.uk

Q: 'My computer takes ages to start up and then runs very slow'

A: There can be many reasons for this, from an old PC struggling under the weight of programs and perhaps a hard drive that is almost full, possible adware/spyware or virus activity, to a new PC that came with insufficient

In the first case you should uninstall any programs and games that are no longer used, as they take up the most space, then use disk cleanup (found in Accessories, System Tools) to rid the drive of temporary files etc. If you suspect other activity, make sure your anti-virus is up to date and run a scan, and then download a program like Adware and/or Spybot (try www.download.com), install, and update and run a scan also.

Finally the best and most cost effective upgrade you can do for a computer is to increase the RAM. This is random access memory, in other words the part that makes the machine go faster. If you are running Windows XP you should have at least 512Mb of RAM, a few years ago the minimum was 256Mb but nowadays that is not really sufficient. To run even faster or indeed with Vista installed, you need at least 1Gb. In fact many newer computers will take up to 3 or 4Gb of RAM! At the moment prices are as low as they have ever been so now is the time to do it.

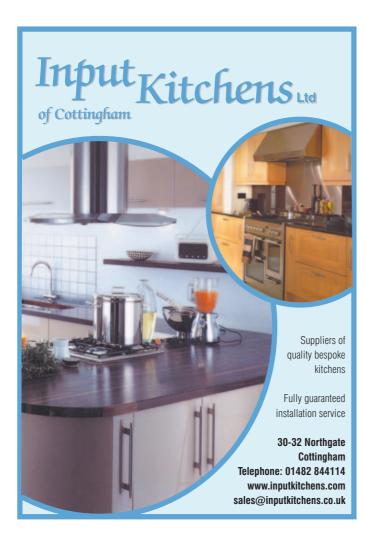

Ingredient of the Month Treacle or Golden Syrup

his is another one of those 'minefield' ingredients. Strictly speaking, Treacle is the British generic name for any syrup made during the refining of sugar cane. Therefore, theoretically, Treacle, Black Treacle, Molasses, Golden Syrup and Blackstrap are all treacles.

In practice however, there is a technical difference between 'treacle' and 'Molasses' in that molasses is obtained from the drainings of raw sugar during the refining process and treacle is made from the syrup obtained from the sugar.

In an effort to simplify matters, rather than start with the history of treacle, as with most of the Ingredient of the Month features, we are going to start with how the various treacles are obtained. The various types of treacle and Molasses are, in culinary terms, completely substitutable. Only the type of treacle/molasses used is of any importance when cooking.

Treacle in Cooking General

When measuring out treacle, lightly coat the measuring utensil with a bland vegetable oil so it slips off the spoon or out of the measuring cup more easily. Alternatively, dip the measuring utensil in hot water before measuring.

Baked goods using Black Treacle tend to darken more quickly In most recipes, do not substitute Black Treacle for Golden Syrup as the flavour will be too overpowering.

Golden Syrup has a clear golden colour and a sweet, rich, distinctive buttery flavour. It can be used just as it is, spread on bread or poured ice cream or pancakes, but in Britain has always been widely used baked goods and desserts, in particular the famous treacle tart, flapjacks and treacle pudding. It can also be used in many savoury recipes calling for sweetness, in particular sauces and glazes. It can be used as a substitute for corn syrup in most recipes.

Black Treacle has a slightly burnt caramel flavour that is a bit stronger than that of medium molasses. As the name would suggest, it is black (to all intents and purposes). It is most often used in confectionery such as toffee and baked goods such as breads, cakes and biscuits where it lends colour and flavour, but can also be used in savoury recipes such as glazes, sauces and stews or casseroles. It can be used as a substitute in most recipes calling for dark molasses.

Treacle tart

Makes one 20-22cm tart serving 8

Treacle tart is one of those classic comforting luxuries, although it can become a bit of a heavy stodge if you don't handle it with a bit of care. You can make this example the day before and leave it out at room temperature until required.



For the sweet pastry

2 medium egg yolks 225g unsalted butter, softened 1tbsp caster sugar 275g plain flour, plus a little extra for dusting

For the filling

225g golden syrup
50g dark treacle
220ml double cream
75g fresh white breadcrumbs
2 eggs, beaten
1tbsp lemon juice
Extra thick or clotted cream, to serve

Make the pastry a few hours ahead: beat the egg yolks and butter together in a bowl, then beat in the sugar. Stir in the flour and knead together until well mixed. Wrap the pastry in cling film and leave in the fridge for an hour before use.

On a floured table, roll out the pastry to about 5mm thick. Use it to line a 20-22cm flan or tart tin, about 3-4cm deep, just overlapping the edge, and leave to rest in the fridge for 1 hour. The pastry might seem a bit delicate, but don't worry if it breaks up a bit when you're lining the tart tin; it's quite forgiving and patches up easily.

Pre-heat the oven to 160C/gas 3. Meanwhile, make the filling by mixing the golden syrup, treacle, double cream, breadcrumbs and beaten eggs together, then stir in the lemon juice. Fill the flan ring with the mixture and decorate the top with lattice work of pastry strips from trimmings and bake for 40-50 minutes, then leave to cool. Serve warm with some good extra-thick or clotted cream.

We have included the <u>full</u> recipe again this month. Sorry once again. Happy cooking.



Bakewell Tart:

This is pretty easy because all you need to put it together is a pastry recipe and a frangipane recipe. Bakewell tart is a classic English teacake, which, if made with a bit of love and some quality jam, well deserves to be a dessert in its own right.

Ingredients.

For the shortcrust pastry 5 tablespoons butter 1 cup powdered sugar A small pinch of salt 2 scant cups flour Zest of 1/2 a lemon 2 egg volks

2 tablespoons cold milk or water

For the frangipane

12 ounces blanched whole almonds 1 cup plus 5 tablespoons unsalted butter 1 cup sugar 3 free-range eggs 6 tablespoons good-quality strawberry jam A handful of sliced blanched almonds 1 pint of crème fraïche

Instructions:

- 1. Score down the length of the vanilla bean, if using, and remove the seeds by scraping a knife down the inside of each half (keep the pod for making vanilla sugar).
- 2. Cream together the butter, powdered sugar, and salt and then rub in the flour, vanilla seeds, lemon zest, and egg yolks - you can do all this by hand or in a food processor. When the mixture looks like coarse breadcrumbs, add the cold milk or water. Pat and gently work the mixture together until you have a ball of dough, then flour it lightly and roll it into a large sausage shape - don't work the pastry too much, otherwise it will become too elastic and chewy, not flaky and short as you want it to be.
- 3. Wrap the dough in plastic wrap and place in the fridge to rest for at least an hour. Remove it from the fridge, slice it up, and line an 11-inch tart mold with the slivers. Push them together, then tidy up the sides by trimming off any excess. Place the tart mold in the freezer for an hour.
- 4. Preheat the oven to 350°F (175°C), then take the pastry out of the freezer and bake for around 15 minutes or until lightly golden. Remove from the oven, place to one side, and turn the heat down to 325°F (160°C).

Make the frangipane

- 1. Blitz the whole almonds in a food processor until you have a fine powder and put this into a bowl.
- 2. Now blitz the butter and sugar until light and creamy. Add this to the almonds with the lightly beaten eggs and fold until completely mixed and smooth. Place in the fridge to firm up slightly.
- 3. Smear the jam over the bottom of the pastry shell, pour the chilled frangipane mixture on top, and sprinkle with some sliced blanched almonds. Bake the tart for about 40 minutes, or until the almond mixture has become firm and golden on the outside but is still soft in the middle.
- 4. Allow to cool for about 30 minutes and serve with crème fraïche or custard.

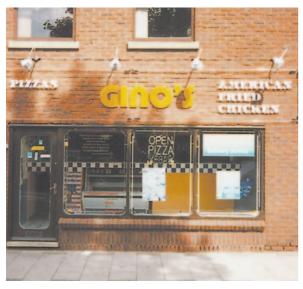

Herb of the Month - Thyme

Thyme Information and Medicinal Uses

vergreen, ever tasty, ever aromatic thyme flowers A member of the mint family, thyme is a perennial evergreen shrub, whose woody stems are covered with small, grey-green leaves. Its small, two-lipped flowers range in color from pale pink to purple and bear quadruplet nutlet fruits. The entire plant is aromatic. There are over one hundred varieties of thyme, with the most common being Garden Thyme and Lemon Thyme.

The many types are so close in appearance, it is often difficult to differentiate them. Lemon thyme has a slightly more-pronounced lemony fragrance, particularly good with fish. All varieties of thyme are highly attractive to bees. Honey from bees that feed on thyme flower nectar is a gourmet delight. Yet, insects are repelled by thyme. Make a cup of thyme tea, put it in a plant mister, and spray

around doorways and windows in summer to repel insects. Herbal medicinists use thyme in infusions, extracts, teas, compresses, bath preparations and gargles. Recent studies indicate that thyme strengthens the immune system.

The distilled thyme oils are used commercially in the production of antiseptics, toothpaste, mouthwash, gargle, hair conditioner, dandruff shampoo, skin cleanser, various toiletry items, potpourri, and insect repellent. It is an ingredient in commercial expectorants and antispasmodics prescribed for whooping cough and bronchitis.

Thyme selection, storage and usage

Thyme flowers Fresh, dried and powdered thyme are readily available year-round in most markets. If you are lucky enough to be able to grow your own, remember that thyme leaves are sweetest if picked just as the flowers appear. Store fresh thyme in a plastic bag in the vegetable crisper drawer of your refrigerator or stand sprigs in a glass of water on the refrigerator shelf. When cooking with thyme, know that one fresh sprig equals the flavoring power of onehalf teaspoon of dried thyme. As with most leafy dried herbs, be sure to crush the leaves between your hands before adding them to your recipe.

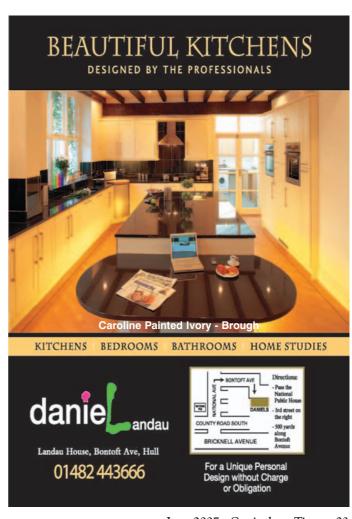

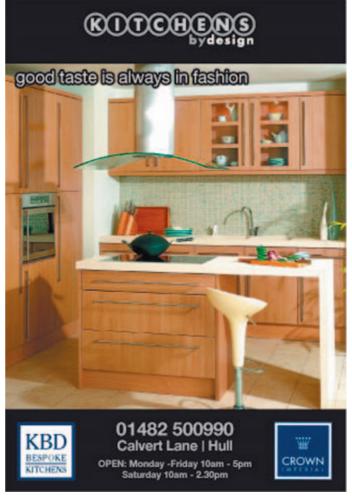

ottingham Cricket Club's youngsters have made a promising start to the 2007 season in their age-group categories in the East Yorkshire Junior League, reports Rob Rhodes, the club's Youth Development Officer.

Last month, the Under-11s played twice against Hornsea. Sutton started well in their reply, before P Greenman, with consecutive wickets in a two-overs spell which cost only six runs, put them on the back foot and they failed to chase down the total.

Opening bowler J Hagyard (2 wickets for 3 in 2 overs) helped to restrict Hutton Cranswick to 48 runs all out from 16 overs. It took only eight overs - and the loss of only one wicket - for Cottingham to knock off the runs. They started the run chase well with openers R Fish (10 retired) and J Cunningham (10 retired) before J Hagyard blitzed 14.

In an Under-13 league cup match, South Holderness scored 92 for 4 from their 20 overs with captain L James economical with a return of 0 for 7 from his four overs. Cottingham again enjoyed a good opening stand with M Hagyard hitting an impressive 41, including five fours and a six, which put them on their way to victory from 15 overs with seven wickets in hand.

Batting first Cottingham's Under-15 side scored 174 for 7 in their 20 overs when they opened their 2007 campaign against Sutton. Main contributors with the bat were Daniel Furlong (47), Jamie Richards (43), Rob Moy (35) and Mike Bell, unbeaten on 30. Sutton were dismissed for 41, with Richards (3-11), Bell (2-6) and John Keogh (2-10) the main wicket-takers.

The Under 17 side won one and lost one of their earlyseason matches. A third match was lost to rain. Against a strong Driffield side and with Dom Rhodes taking 3 for 18 in four overs, Cottingham were asked to chase 189 but, in fading light, they finished on 121 for 6 to which Rhodes contributed 37.

Hutton Cranswick scored 112 in their allotted overs against Cottingham Under-17s for whom Jamie Richards (1 for 7 off 4 overs) and Dom Rhodes (2 for 11 off 4) were the pick of the bowlers. In reply Cottingham lost three quick wickets, but Steve McNicol and Rhodes (25) steadied the boat before Daniel Furlong plundered a quick 28. With McNicol going on to an unbeaten 30, Cottingham won with an over to spare.

Matt's Monthly Motivation

y most recent articles have focussed upon quite specific genres. For that reason I'd like to return to the ëbasics' of lifestyle and return to nutrition. Breakfast is the meal of the day that comes with the most scrutiny. This month's article is an attempt to highlight exactly why we MUST ALL have breakfast.

After 8 to 12 hours without food during the night, our blood sugar levels naturally drop. Studies have linked low blood sugar levels to poor memory, concentration and learning. Eating breakfast raises blood sugar levels and helps us to function more effectively. After the overnight fast, the body requires a rise in blood sugar to recharge the metabolism and get the brain and body into gear. The trick is to eat food that doesn't cause a swift spike and trough in blood sugar levels, which lead to a slump in energy and the desire to eat a sugary snack.

Another reason for having breakfast is the kick-start it gives to the metabolism. After meals, there is a surge in oxygen uptake as food is digested and absorbed. During sleep the metabolism slows down, so eating soon after waking helps boost metabolism and gets the body going again. It gives that vital spurt of energy.

Eating breakfast also helps to develop a more positive attitude. It positively influences your morning mood and helps to reduce stress. A healthy breakfast gives you a good start to the day and keeps you fit and happy. People who eat breakfast are more likely to have more nutritionally balanced diets compared to those who miss breakfast. If you are feeling low, having a balanced breakfast regularly will pep you up.

If you're a breakfast skipper, here's the bad news. Research has shown that missing the first meal of the day may lead to an unhealthy pattern of snacking on high-fat foods throughout the morning. The person tends to go on a mid-morning binge and a craving for an early, calorie-packed lunch. They are ravenous by lunchtime and are a victim of the ëgobble syndrome' of speed eating. Experts say this is particularly bad for the stomach, as the secretion of digestive juices does not keep pace with the rapid food intake and can convulse the stomach.

Nutritionists recommend that breakfast should provide 25% of the daily nutritional requirements. People who skip breakfast miss out on many vital nutrients, which they are highly unlikely to make up for during the rest of the day. You can't set the balance right by tucking in at other meals ñ the body can't process vital nutrients optimally if consumed all in one go.

So what should you eat as your first meal of the day? You'll be pleased to know you don't have to stick to the cereal-toast-tea menu every day for breakfast. In fact, this menu, which is very common, isn't the ideal one. Processed cereal and toast contains high levels of simple carbohydrates which are converted rapidly into glucose and cause the sharp rise and fall in energy I mentioned at the start of the article.

If you must have cereals, add some chopped fruits and nuts in it. You can also choose cereals with high levels of fibre and added vitamins and minerals. Breakfast cereals fortified with vitamins and minerals provide at least 25% of the daily requirement of essential vitamins and 17% of iron, according to nutritionists.

Complex carbohydrates found in whole grains release their energy more slowly into the blood-stream. For this reason, porridge made of rolled oats and muesli is better than highly refined breakfast cereals like the cornflake style meals many of us are used to. Porridge is good because there is an enzyme in oats which cuts cholesterol and heated oats are good for health. Bran flake style cereals and muesli contain up to four times the fibre of luxury cereals and considerably less fat. The ideal muesli contains plenty of nuts and seeds which are rich in protein.

Remember to put yourself first. Boost your metabolic rate and reduce the feeling of hunger that can burden your shift at work by having a healthy breakfast from this point onwards!
