### A Little Bit of Parish Council History

In early May bound copies of the minutes taken at Cottingham Parish Council meetings between 1999-2007 where handed over to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council, Treasure House, which is situated at Champney Road, Beverley. The Archives and Local Studies Service looks after over 6,000 metres of shelves with documents and printed local studies material from the 12th century to the present day. They provide a secure and environmentally controlled storage for records in a modern purpose built repository, they work within The National Archives Standard for Record Repositories and are recognised as an approved place of deposit of public records.

The minutes are a record of decisions taken by the Parish Council since its inception in 1999 and as such are part of the history (albeit recent) of the village. In the future residents and historians will be able to look back at how the Council dealt with the problems and challenges faced by the village as it went into the 21st century.

These records belong to the people of Cottingham and you are very welcome to go along and have a look at them during The Treasure House opening hours which are Monday, Wednesday and Friday 9.30am-5pm, Tuesday and Thursday 9.30am – 8pm and Saturday 9.00am-4pm.

# News online and Beware of Malware!!

BC Radio Humberside invited me in again last month to follow up on the BBC First Click campaign, and the Government's Race Online initiative. Guests included a tutor from a local community learning centre, and two of ladies from her class. It was encouraging to see the enthusiasm with which these people spoke about computers, and how technology had opened up a whole new world of experience for them. If you have interested in finding out more, you can phone the BBC Helpline to find out about free courses on: 08000 150 950. Or visit the Library or Cottingham Adult Education Centre.

Last month I talked about the way that newspapers are moving toward more of an online presence, and in some cases chargeable content. Indeed the omnipresence of the internet is changing the way we do things and how information is dispersed. The recent 'super-injunction' fiasco just showed that although you can stop the press from publishing stories (in England!), anyone with a computer or mobile device can find out much more from Twitter or Facebook etc. It is interesting that a the chairman of panel of judges said that the internet had "by no means the same degree of intrusion into privacy as the story being emblazoned on the front pages of newspapers", which "people trust more".

However, he warned that modern technology was "totally out of control" and "society should consider other ways to bring Twitter and other websites under control". This last comment has worrying implications in terms of freedom of speech online, as currently no-one controls or censors the internet.

Malware is a continuing threat to online computer users, and comes from compromised web pages, catching out innocent surfers and infecting their Windows operating system. Now a similar threat is affecting Apple computers. as there has been a dramatic rise in the number of reports of a fake security program called 'MacDefender'. The Mac operating system has until now been virtually free of any such infection. Windows users would be well advised to purchase a good line in protection such as Malwarebytes, only around £20, call us for details.

Recently we have had a number of laptops that have suddenly developed problems that have turned out to be terminal. Laptops can be very expensive to fix, so major repairs are sometimes just not viable. So look after your lapton, and if it getting 'past its sell by' do make sure you make a good back up of your data in case the worst ever happens. See the O&A section below.

Internet Explorer 9 (for Windows 7 & Vista) seems to have been causing a few problems since its recent launch. As it arrives through the normal Windows Update procedure, and you cannot un-install it, the only way to go back to the previous version if you are having problems, is to use System Restore, Start, Programs, Accessories, System Tools, System Restore. As mentioned last month, Windows XP users remain with version 8

Wireless networks are now extremely popular, and for some the only way they connect to the internet. The main thing is to make sure yours is secure

When you connected the first time you should have entered a password, also know as a WEP or WPA key, that your computer would save against the name of the your network. This prevents any unauthorized access from outside. Remember that wireless has quite a long range, so some of your neighbours will be able to see your network, as you will theirs. If you click on the list of wireless networks in the corner of your screen, you will be able to see next to the name whether they are secured or not. Another tip is not to use your own name or house number as your network name, as it would make it to obvious to anyone with hacking intentions!

Checking your email online in an internet café or other public place? If you use a computer other than your own, be careful to ensure it is not set to retain username and passwords on pages such as Hotmail, Yahoo etc. Be wary also using your own laptop or mobile etc on public wireless networks; financial transactions are not a good idea here.

### **Questions and answers section:**

### O: My ESET anti virus is expiring soon, what can I do?

A: Just phone us for the discounted renewal figure, and we can action it for you. You have up to 30 days from the expiry date to renew, and it's the same price as

### Q: I can't shut down my computer, what can I do?

A: Hold in the power-on button for about 8 seconds, that will switch it off completely. This works for laptops too, and it is usually a good idea to remove the battery also and leave it for a few minutes before replacing and restarting. Only do this when there is no other option.

### Q: How can I back up my treasured photos, music and documents?

A: Buy yourself an external hard drive, (some even come with special backup software), or even a memory stick or two. It is as simple as copy & paste to get all your data on there. Or you can use a CD or DVD. However you do it, do it today, who knows what will happen tomorrow?

### Q: Is it safe to do my banking online?

A: This really depends on your computer. If it is a fairly modern machine and is completely up to date in terms of anti virus software and Windows updates, then yes it should be safe to do. Make sure your firewall is switched on too, and if you use a wireless connection at home, make sure it is secure (see below)

### O: How do I know if my firewall is switched on?

A: Click on Start & then Control Panel, and depending which version of Windows you are using, double click on Windows Firewall or click on Windows Security Centre. I f vou have a program like ESET home security or Norton 360 etc. these have their own firewall that replaces and switches off the Windows one.



### Lamb

### Lamb Steaks with Thyme

Ingredients

4 Slices Leg of Lamb, about 2.5cm/1 inch thick

2 tbsp Olive Oil

1 tbsp Lemon Juice

20 Sprigs Lemon Thyme

Salt and Pepper

### Instructions

- Rub each steak on each side with olive oil, lemon juice salt and pepper.
- 2. Pull the leaves off the thyme and scatter over the meat, on both sides. Leave for 1 to 2 hours.
- 3. Preheat the grill to hot. Grill the steaks for 5-10 minutes on each side, according to taste.

### Lamb with Basil Sauce

Ingredients

1 teasp Olive Oil

2 Garlic Cloves, crushed

4 Lamb Steaks

100g/4oz Sun-dried Tomatoes

2 tbsp Fresh Basil (including stalks)

2 tbsp Fresh Parsley, (including stalks)

300ml/10fl.oz. Fresh Lamb Stock

Salt and Black Pepper

### Instructions

- 1. Heat the oil in a pan, add the garlic and fry gently for 2-3 minutes. Add the lamb and sauté for 6-8 minutes each side until cooked through.
- 2. Meanwhile, place the sun-dried tomatoes, basil, parsley, stock and seasonings in a blender or food processor and process until smooth. Transfer the sauce to a pan, heat through and serve with the lamb.

**N.B.** You can also use lamb chops of cutlets. Allow 2-3 per person depending on their size.

### French Leg of Lamb

Ingredients:

1.8kg/4lb Leg of Lamb

2 Cloves of Garlic

1 teasp Crushed Rosemary leaves

Juice of half a Lemon

50g/2oz Butter

Salt & Pepper

### Instructions

- 1. Heat the oven to 220C, 425F, gas mark 7.
- 2. Cut the garlic cloves into slivers. Make small slits all over the lamb with the point of a small, sharp knife, and insert the garlic slivers deeply into the slits.
- 3. Combine the crushed rosemary leaves with the lemon juice, butter and salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste. Spread the mixture evenly over the lamb and place the meat on a rack in a roasting pan.
- 4. Place the meat, uncovered, in the oven for 20 minutes. Reduce the heat to 170C, 325F, gas mark 3 and continue to roast for 25-35 minutes per kg/12-20 minutes per lb, or until done to your liking.
- 5. When cooked, transfer the lamb to a heated serving dish and let it stand for 15 minutes before carving.

### **Strawberies**

The strawberry is a member of the rose family and is unique in that it is the only fruit with seeds on the outside rather than the inside. They are also a very healthy fruit, being rich in vitamin C and a good source of folic acid as well as being high in fibre.

Origin and History of Strawberries

Strawberries were cultivated by the Romans as early as 200 BC and in mediaeval times strawberries were regarded as an aphrodisiac and a soup made of strawberries, borage and soured cream was traditionally served to newly-weds at their wedding breakfast.

Native American Indians were already eating strawberries when the Colonists arrived and it is believed that in 1780, the first strawberry hybrid was developed in the USA.

### Strawberry Soufflé

Ingredients
4 eggs, separated
75g/3oz Caster Sugar
20g/3/4oz Gelatine Leaves, soaked
The Juice of 1/2 a Lemon
6 tbsp water
300g/11oz Strawberries, sieved
150ml/5fl.oz. Double Cream
Grated Chocolate to decorate
Whipped Cream to Decorate

### Instructions

- 1. Encircle 4 dariole moulds or small ramekins with greaseproof or parchment paper, so that the paper overlaps and stands approximately 2 inches above the rim of each mould and fasten with string or sellotape.
- 2. Place the egg yolks and sugar in a bowl and place over a pan of hot water. Whisk until thick and creamy then remove the bowl from the heat.
- 3. Place the gelatine, lemon juice and water in a bowl and place over a pan of boiling water. Stir until dissolved then beat it

into the egg mixture. Remove from the heat and set aside to cool and slightly set.

- 4. Meanwhile, in another bowl, whisk the cream to the soft peak stage then fold in the strawberry puree. Pour the gelatine and egg mixture into the strawberry and cream mixture, stirring all the time. Blend well.
- 5. Whisk the egg whites until stiff. Add a quarter of the egg whites to the strawberry mixture to lighten it, then gently fold the remainder of the egg whites into the strawberry mixture. Pour into the moulds, refrigerate and leave to set overnight.
- 5. To serve carefully remove the paper from each mould. Gently press the grated chocolate on the protruding sides of the soufflés and decorate the top of each with piped cream and a whole strawberry.

### Strawberry With Mascarpone

Ingredients
250g/8oz Fresh Strawberries
100g/3oz Caster Sugar
1 tbsp Vanilla Extract
1tbsp Vodka
200ml/7fl oz Single Cream
250g/8oz Mascarpone Cheese

### Instructions

- 1. Place the strawberries in a mixing bowl, reserving 4 whole ones for garnishing, and crush lightly with a fork.
- 2. In another bowl mix the caster sugar vanilla, vodka and cream together.
- 3. Add the mascarpone to the cream mixture and beat until smooth.
- 4. Spoon a little of the crushed strawberries into the bottom of serving glasses then add a layer of the mascarpone mixture. Repeat the layers finishing with a layer of the cream and garnish with whole or cut strawberries.

I mean, the woman would have loved it, it struck me. It did make me smile.

### Top Tips To Help Eliminate Nasty Niffs

I think that last month I mentioned that BBC Radio Humberside rang up to see if I could go on and talk about the issue of bad breath. I was away on holiday so couldn't do it. I was gutted. Anyway, I thought that could do a bit of rambling about it here. I am not sure if I have touched on it before (senior moment) and if I have I apologise but you're going to get it again. As you may be aware bad breath has a few names including halitosis and even oral malodour.

I really don't know who sits down and thinks up some names for things, there may be a European think tank for making up new names. Anyway I digress. Halitosis or stinky breath has mainly been attributed to volatile sulphur compounds. These compounds are not the only smell forming chemicals though. Hydrogen sulphide is the "eggy" smelling gas. There are some companies selling equipment that give you a reading or measurement of the volatile sulphur compounds in your breath but I think that this is unnecessary. What you really need is an organoleptic test undertaken by someone who is trained in the art of absolute honest opinion. Yes, let an honest person (who has previously agreed to it as you may get into bother otherwise) smell your breath. No need for expensive bits of kit or to pay someone with fancy kit.

### What causes it?

Bacteria. We all have bacteria in our mouths unless we have been brought up in laboratory conditions like experimental, gnotobiotic rats (rats without bacteria). Now this is a bit gross but if you lick the back of your hand and leave a few minutes, when you go back and have a sneaky sniff it may well niff a bit. That is because of the bacteria in the saliva. If you give the smell-forming bacteria a chance they will go for it. So, an environment in the mouth that causes stagnation, infection or rotting/putrefaction will cause a nasty niff. There is quite a bit of protein knocking about in the mouth and this is where the volatile sulphur compounds come from. Tooth decay is the removal of calcium from the enamel then dentine but as it gets into the dentine the bacteria start to breakdown and tot the protein and hence the possibility for a niff, especially if this is on a large scale. There is a bit more to all this though with several other factors at play. I will discuss this more next time.

### Let The Mid-Life Crisis Continue

Now that have passed my motorbike test I am looking forward to my trip to Germany at the end of June riding rather than going pillion passenger. I am not going to be a daft lad and aim to get back in one piece. My daughter has last league football match tomorrow night. 

At the top of the wood, walk through a fence and then walk up the field with the hedge on the right. At the end of this field, pass through a gate into a field which may contain horses. Cross this field on the same line and pass through a second gate and enter a field, again which may contain horses. Leave this second field by a gate and then walk diagonally to the right to a metal gate. Pass through this gate and turn right and then immediately left and walk with the hedge on the right.

On reaching a track, turn right and follow this track to a junction of tracks and then turn left and follow the Ebor Way signs towards Terrington. Continue along this track, ignoring the sign on the right for Terrington, and then emerge onto a main road. Continue in the same direction along this road and when the road sweeps sharp right, turn left and then immediately left again onto a track known as Broats Lane. At the end of this track, pass through a small wooden gate into a field and continue in the same direction with the hedge on the right. Pass across an indistinct farm track and continue walking with a small plantation on the right. Pass a pond on the right and a gate ahead and then cross over an extremely muddy section to the next gate. Pass through this gate and continue ahead across a field. At the corner of the field, pass through a gate and then walk diagonally across the next field to a gate in a wall.

Pass through this gate and climb up a wide track through a wood and on reaching the top of the hill, cross a stile on the right. Walk round the field headland to the left to reach the corner of the field. Cross a wooden foot bridge on the left and pass through a short plantation to reach the road. Turn right on the road and walk back to the car park area.

# In the Garden





### Chelsea Gold Winner

The 'Bulldog Forge Garden' has won a Gold medal at Chelsea this year. Mary Payne and Jon Wheatley designed the garden for Bulldog Tools, and Suttons Seeds provided the vegetable plants. The garden has been set in the 1940s and tells the story of a self-sufficient blacksmith making his own tools and growing his own vegetables and flowers, in an era that saw hundreds of similar small enterprises all over the UK, striving to maintain a reasonable quality of life.

The Garden was opened by Rosie Boycott the writer and broadcaster who has been appointed by the Mayor of London, Boris Johnson, to launch the Capital Growth Scheme. The garden was admired by the crème de la crème of the gardening, lifestyle and national press, famous personalities and royalty at Chelsea's special preview day yesterday.

Mary Payne has stated that 'I'm delighted that we have won a gold medal for our exhibit, which has been a perfect partnership between Bulldog Tools and the Stone Barn Team. It is a culmination of seven months of planning and hard work'.

The following is a list of the vegetables used in the garden: Beetroot: Action and Alto; Broad Bean: Listra; Cabbage: Serpentine and Resistafly; Cauliflower: Mayflower and Romancesco; Celery: Golden Self Blanching; Chard: Bright Lights; Florence Fennel: Tauro; French Bean: Algarve; Kale: Black Tuscany, Darkibor and Redbor; Kohl rabi: Kolibri and Lanro; Lettuce: Cos, Lollo Rosso, Nymans, Red Cos and Webb's Wonderful; Pak choi: Red; Pea: Greenshaft; Sweetcorn: Prelude; Turnip: Atlantic.

June 21 is the longest day of the year, and the extra light and warmth encourages the garden to put on an exuberant burst of growth. But this extra light and warmth also means weeds will sprout up from seemingly nowhere. Keep on top of them by hoeing regularly in dry conditions. Herbaceous borders are reaching their early summer peak and the kitchen garden is becoming productive.

# Top 10 jobs

- 1. Hoe borders regularly to keep down weeds
- 2. Be water-wise, especially in drought-affected areas
- 3. Pinch out sideshoots on tomatoes
- 4. Harvest lettuce, radish, other salads and early potatoes
- 5. Position summer hanging baskets and containers outside
- 6. Cut lawns at least once a week
- 7. Plant out summer bedding
- 8. Stake tall or floppy plants
- 9. Prune many spring-flowering shrubs
- 10. Shade greenhouses to keep them cool and prevent scorch

### Sowing and planting

Plant out summer bedding and seed-raised plants, if not already done so. Make sure they are well watered in and keep moist during dry weather.

Plant out cannas and dahlias once danger of frost has passed.

Gaps in herbaceous borders are best filled with annual bedding at this stage in the season. One exception is wood anemones (e.g. Anemone blanda or Anemone coronaria), which take about three months to flower after planting. The rhizomes are best planted now, after an overnight soaking, 5cm (2in) deep in a suitably moist but free-draining soil or compost with lots of added leaf mould or organic matter.

It is not too late to direct sow a few fast growing, late-flowering hardy annuals such as Calendula, Godetia and Clarkia.

Perennials such as Alcea (hollyhock), Delphinium and Lupinus can be sown directly into drills outside once the seed heads have ripened and started to split naturally. If garden space is limited you can sow them into pots and place them in a cold frame or by the base of a sheltered wall in filtered sunlight.

Thin out direct sowings of hardy annuals. This is best done in two or three stages at fortnightly intervals. Final spacings should be between 10-20cm (4-8in), using the upper limit for tall or spreading plants, and the lower limit for smaller plants.

Prick out indoor sowings when they are large enough to handle without damage, potting them on and then planting them out once they are robust.

If you want to grow your own spring bedding for next year, many (including wallflowers, pansies, and Bellis perennis) need to be sown between May and July in order to flower next spring.

Polyanthus primulas are best sown only when temperatures are reliably warm, as they need a constant temperature of around 15°C (60°F). A sheltered cold frame in June or July provides the right environment.

Winter bedding plants for the following winter can also be sown from May until July. Attractive choices include ornamental cabbages, kales and winter pansies.

Tubs can be planted up with summer bedding if not done already.

Hellebore seed can be harvested once the seed heads have ripened (i.e. when squeezing the pod causes it to split and release seeds). Seed needs to be sown immediately, while fresh, and need a winter's cold season in order to break their dormancy in order for germination to occur. Do remember that seed grown plants will differ from the parent plant.

### Vegetable Garden

Jobs to do now

- \* Sow seed outdoors of beetroot, carrots, chard, lettuce, radish, peas and spinach. Protect emerging seedlings from frosts with newspaper or horticultural fleece.
- \* Earth up potatoes when the shoots are 23cm (9in) high, in order to prevent the new tubers going green.
- \* Sow sweet corn outside in blocks, at 45cm (18in) spacing, with two seeds per hole. The strongest seedling can be selected later.
  - \* Liquid feed fruit trees growing in pots with a balanced feed.

### Soft fruit

- \* Peg down strawberry runners and remove cloches from outdoor strawberries once cropped.
  - \* Move forced strawberries outdoors.
  - \* Train in new shoots of blackberries and hybrid berries.
  - \* Summer prune red and white currants and gooseberries.

Here is the latest article from Chris who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

Tello and welcome again anglers to this month fishing news; the date is 22nd May.

We at Catchmoore Fishing Tackle hope you are all enjoying the start of the season. Firstly fellow anglers, have you all stepped up your terminal tackle yet? If you have not already done so, now is the time to do so. At this time of the year all the fish should have spawned or nearly finished spawning, in consequence, they should be well on the feed. Personally at this time of year the smallest hook size I use is a size 16 to about a 21/2 lb. hook length, on average I fish with heavier gear than that. It is advisable to check all of your elastications in all of your top kits, you certainly do not want to break off and lose that bonus

Tackle Tip: due to experiencing warm sunny weather lately, especially at certain times of the day; a lot of bonus fish have been feeding directly on the surface. To catch these fish use either a bubble float or a controller float. The length of line from your bubble/ controller float should be at least three foot; I have observed some anglers lately that have had their line to short when using this method. The reason for a three foot length of line, even on a calm flat day, is there will still be movement on the water and with a longer lash the float will not move your bait about quite as much. This in turn helps as the fish will not be spooked as much. Before you cast your own baits out, it is advisable to feed whatever floating baits you wish to use intermittently and wait a fair while. This way the fish become more confident as and when you cast your own bait out. It is important that you cast your bait out beyond the feeding fish and then slowly draw your bait to them. Do not forget to watch your bait not your float! As we all know the carp can be very crafty; have you noticed that if you fire out six loose offerings with your own bait, all the loose offering are eaten except your bait? Frustrating is it not? I have come to the conclusion that on certain waters the carp have become wise.

If they feel resistance such as your line on their dorsal fins, they just investigate the other baits. No more! Gardner tackle has invented what is known as a suspender float. This device is just as crafty as the carp, as it suspends your bait from the float at a 45° degree angle. This ensures that the carp feel no resistance and takes the bait with confidence.

Pond review: this week go and check out Lambwath lakes at Albrough. They are situated on the B1242 seaside road. There are five lakes to choose from on this venue, Lambwath, Tench, Carp, Moat and caravan pond, even on match days you should still have two or three lakes to choose from. These lakes are well stocked with carp, tench, roach, perch, ide and bream. There is no specific method of catching fish to be used as every method can work on the day. Please be pleasant to Adrian the bailiff, he is a very nice guy who is always willing to give you good advice.

Catchmoore A.C news: we have just had our third match; this was held at Risby Park on Tench Lake. Unfortunately last Sunday the weather was terrible for us. The wind had swung round to westerlies and the temperature dropped by at least 5 degrees. This weather switched off nearly all ponds so no good results came from anywhere that week. Our match was won by Katrina with 21lb 4oz. For those of you that are following the wooden spoon award, Lou did not come last again, neither did Dave! Well done.

Sea scene: there is still a lot of skate being reported at loads of our coastal marks. At Spurn inside the Humber stretches lots of schooly bass have been reported to 21/2 lb. – 3 lb. (please do not take all of the fish home, as the bass are in short supply nowadays and they take a long time to reach 3lb). Best baits used seem to be Mackerel and crab.

Shop news: we have arriving daily lots of new stock. The second hand gear keeps coming in, make a visit and grab a bargain. Tips and advice are always available with a friendly smile; we are here to help you not just to sell to you.



She visibly relaxed and eventually came to accept the unacceptable. We were able to get her to stand quietly whilst being mounted, from both sides, and we eventually simply rode out onto the main street and away. Her ears pricked, she relaxed and wanted to be out there.

The next two weeks were then about her having fun being ridden out and working with her owners to give them the time and confidence they needed to be able to take her home as a safe

riding horse. All went well and Jazz accepted them as her new riders with no problems at all....barring initial nerves from the jockey! How hard is it to get back on after the traumas experienced prior. This is where owners have to trust us implicitly....we still control their horses from the ground and they are passengers at first. I think that they feel more like guinea pigs! It is so hard for anyone to face your own personal fears. Remembered pain does not just affect the horse after all. Tarmac is a hard landing strip when you splat from 5 ft up....no argument there!

Anyway, Jazz was fabulous and her owners were brave ....they did it and made it through. Jazz is now home in West Yorkshire and proving to be a bit of a star. They never thought that the day would come when they could take her to a show. A very excited daughter rang me to tell me how they had come home with two first rosettes to boot! Wonderful and heart warming!

### Finn

Finn was the other horse, who had suffered greatly at the hands of several horse dealers. His road with us was a long, steep and rocky one...to which we held no false promise. His fear was all encompassing, his soul was in torment and violence was his answer to survival. His owners worried, we worried and the horse worried. They allowed us the time to turn him round. We thought we had failed on more than one occasion...he was extremely complex. However repetition, patience, bravery on our part and positive reassurance all played the part in his complete rehabilitation. He became so trusting and sure of our care that he came back from the brink.

Again the owners had to face up to the reality of climbing back up there....It was terrifying for them but they did it.

Finn is back home now in Sheffield and is riding out daily all over the place like a real pro! His owners are to be congratulated in keeping the faith and funding his future the way they did. He had a complete mental makeover and is now super confident, even when strangers approach or handle him.

It never ceases to amaze me how horses can come back into the light after so many years in an awful dark emotional hell. Finn is the winner here for he is very special and he humbles

#### Landlords need a will

must be getting old. Writing a will. Damn does this mean it's all about death and senility. Well not exactly. I've never thought about what happens to my properties should I shuffle pass away. I won't be around so somebody else's problem! However, as a result of my taking stock of my young family and recent marriage, it's an inevitable part of taking up your responsibilities and making sure that you protect the interests of those closest to you

#### Landlords not making a will

Firstly, if you have never made a will, you are not alone. Approximately 7 out of 10 people die intestate without making a will. The result is that the estate is divided between a landlord's spouse and their blood relatives according to the laws laid out by Parliament. Where there are no traceable relatives the estate goes to the crown.

#### Why make a will?

Many landlords don't consider themselves rich, because they may feel relatively cash poor. However they are often asset rich which can make them quite a target for 'gold diggers' may not be aware that in 1995 the government passed a new measure called the Law Reform Succession Act 1995. This amended the 1975 Inheritance Act which meant that the vast majority of couples living outside wedlock can now seek financial provisions from the estate of a deceased cohabitee. A landlords ex and their children can still make a claim. This situation potentially makes it open season if a landlord dies suddenly without making a written

The result is a potentially a contested will where the only winners are the solicitors! What you should include in your will:

Things that you should consider including in your will are:

- \* how much money and what property and possessions a landlord has.
- \* who a landlord wants to benefit from their will.
- \* who should look after any children under 18 years of age.
- \* who is going to sort out a landlord's estate and carry out a landlord's wishes after their death - that is your executor.

An executor is the person with the legal responsibility for administering a will. Traditionally it has been a solicitor although anybody can be appointed in the will to do it.

A word of caution. Professionalism doesn't mean financially disinterested! Professioral executors are entitled to charge fees relating to the value of the estate, typically 2-4%. Now that might equate to a couple of thousand on a small estate but could easily become a couple of hundred thousand where a landlord has a large portfolio. Where a landlord dies intestate the administration of the estate could run into years or even decades before disputes between the interested parties are resolved resulting in the executors pocketing a small fortune over the years. My advice would be to include a cap on the executors fees in your will.

#### Where should landlords go to get a will written?

A lot of people still go to a solicitor to get their will written. A solicitor will normally charge a landlord between £50 - £300 for writing a will depending on the complexity and time taken to draft it, if you decide to go down this route. Normal landlord rules apply. That's shop around to get the best deal.

In fact one in every five of us actually writes our own will.

If you decide to go down the non-custom route, there are numerous legal stationers that produce packs instructing a landlord how to go about writing a will.

The other alternative a landlord has is to use one of the burgeoning number of websites that provides an online template for landlords to write their will. Those websites charge slightly more than buying a stationary pack but have the advantage of providing online or telephone support to guide a landlord through the process of writing one.

#### Should a landlord write their will themselves?

I don't profess to be an expert on wills and stop short of recommending a method of drawing up your will, however if your finances are simple then you may feel there is no reason to employ a solicitor.

The consumer association Which? says you should certainly use a solicitor if you have:

- \* a complicated estate or the way you wish to pass it on is very detailed.
- \* remarried and have children from a previous marriage
- \* a business
- \* assets in excess of the inheritance tax threshold
- \* someone with mental or physical disabilities to look after.

Once you have made your will, it is important to keep it in a safe place. Not so safe that you forget where it is! Therefore it's always a good idea to tell your executor or a close friend or relative. If you use a solicitor to write your will they will normally keep the original and send

Once the will is made you need to keep it up to date. As your portfolio hopefully grows you might want to change or expand your generosity. Things happen like divorce, children etc, so remember to keep it current and up to date. Any change must be by 'codicil' (an addition, amendment or supplement to a will) or by making a new will.

#### And finally after all that....remember to sign it.
