

EYMS have been very supportive and the changes in Bus Routes are listed below and will appear in full on the back of the Cottingham Day programme which will be available both before and during the day itself.

<u>CHANGES TO BUS SERVICES FROM 11am to 6pm Service 60</u>

Normal route to New Village Road, then continue along Northgate, West End Road, Baynard Avenue, Southwood Road and The Parkway. Return via outward route reversed.

Service 60A

Normal route to Beck Bank, Hallgate, then right into King Street, Northgate, West End Road, Baynard Avenue, Southwood Road and The Parkway. Return via outward route reversed.

Service 64

Normal route to Newgate Street, then South Street, Baynard Avenue, West End Road, Eppleworth Road and normal route to Castle Hill Hospital. Return via outward route reversed.

Service 105

Normal route to Newgate Street, then South Street, Baynard Avenue and West End Road to The Lawns. Return via outward route reversed.

Service 115

Normal route to Newgate Street, then South Street, Southwood Road, The Parkway, Burton Road and normal route to Castle Hill Hospital. Return via outward route reversed.

Service 180


Normal route to Harland Way, then West End Road, Baynard Avenue, Southwood Road, The Parkway, Burton Road and normal route to Hessle. Return via outward route reversed.

All bus stops along the line of routes will be in use, even if the bus stop is not on the usual route of a particular service. There will be a temporary taxi rank in Finkle Street, opposite the Post Office.

Getting on-line using different browsers and some useful and handy hints to make surfing pleasureable

can't get online" Some of the most frequent calls I receive are through loss of internet connection. Here are a few tips to help you. If you get the dreaded 'page cannot be displayed' message, and you're using Internet Explorer (the big blue e), first try another browser if you have one on your computer, like Google Chrome or Firefox. If you get online then you know it is not your internet connection that's down, just Internet Explorer playing up, which is not unusual. If that doesn't work, look at your router to make sure its switched on, and then check the light marked 'DSL' or ADSL' is green. This signifies the signal coming in from your internet provider, Karoo in this area. If no light or flashing, turn off your router, leave it a few minutes, then switch back on and try again. If you are on a wireless connection and you have tried the above, then disconnect from your wireless network and re-connect with the password if necessary.

Shopping online is a big part of many people's computer experience. Supermarkets offer 'you shop, we drop', and other stores offer very successful 'click n collect' services. But experienced shoppers with a more blasé attitude can sometimes let their guard down after a few glasses of wine when buying or selling online, and this a phenomenon known as 'hic n click!'

Windows 8 is to receive a major update probably in late summer. Originally codenamed *Windows Blue* which some thought was going to be yet another version, it turns out it is to be a *Service Pack*, adding more touch features etc. Rumours abound that Microsoft are being pressured to bring back the Start button to Windows 8, but I can't see that happening.

After much research he discovered over 12,000 call centre phone menu options, and has set up a website called: www.pleasepressl.com/

Yahoo email hacking has been going on for some time now, mostly being carried out in the USA but affecting users worldwide. Now news has broken of a major hack of Yahoo in Japan, with around 22 million user names being stolen. So watch out for more of those junk emails.

Want to try a different and independent way of searching the internet? Try Duck Duck Go (yes really!). duckduckgo.com

The IT industry is full of techno-babble, that we all take for granted, so here is an explanation of some of those everyday terms:

Web browser: a piece of software used to get you online and navigate the web. i.e. Internet Explorer, Chrome, Firefox, Safari etc. As mentioned earlier it is always a good idea to have more than one on your computer. They are all free to use, you just download and install.

Email client: This is a program that is installed on your computer and is designed to send and receive emails. i.e. *Outlook, Outlook Express, Windows Live Mail, Incredimail* etc.

Search engine: online software used to scour the internet and find what you are looking for. Examples include *Google*, *Ask*, *Bing*, etc.

What is 'pop-based' email? Karoo uses the pop system, known in full as 'Post Office Protocol. It delivers mail directly to your computer, and sends it out via a mailbox system.

What is Gmail? Gmail is Google's own email service. It is web-based so used widely on mobile phones, tablets and other devices as well as on computers.

What is RAM? Random access memory, used to speed up your computer. It does not store anything, it is only used help the processor work faster. So the more your computer has the better!

Q: I use Windows 8, how can I get my Karoo account to work?

A: Download Windows Live Mail from Microsoft Windows Live Essentials.



Report by Carl Bevan on his trip to the Everest Base Camp for Cancer Research - Part Two

ay 8 was the hardest day to date with a long slog up to Lobuche. There had been quite a lot of snow overnight and we had a few tricky paths to negotiate. As ever the scenery was breathtaking and I spent far too much time staring at the mountains rather than watching where I was going, rude not too!

Day 9 The big day! Today all 30 of the team slogged it to Everest Base Camp. I grew up reading about Chris Bonington and Doug Scott's trips to the Himalaya and was overcome with emotion when I made it to base camp. It is a soulless unforgiving place. All I could think of was how the hell do these guys spend weeks here. Tough people and my respect for any climber who makes it to the top could not be higher. I was not sure that seeing Everest would make me want to come back one day and get to the roof of the world.

Seeing it in the flesh, I have realised that I am far too much of a coward for that. I was at peace with reaching base camp - my destiny! A number of the group headed into the glacier and came back full of enthusiasm and intrigue with this magical natural phenomena. I should have gone but all I could do was think of my friend - the reason I was here. We headed back to Gorak Shep where we stayed for the night ahead of our 2nd objective, Kala Patthar and the magical views to Everest and the surrounding giants!

Day 10 Whilst all 30 of us got to base camp, the night at 5190 metres took its toll and eight of the group decided that Kala Patthar was a walk too far! The rest of the group very slowly made it to Kala Patthar and were rewarded for their efforts with stunning views.

We spent the next four days retracing our steps and moral was high as the prospect of reduced altitude effects and beer was forthcoming.

I think we had forgotten how demanding some parts of the walk were as I made a note in my diary that the day back from Pangboche to Namche Bazarr was "the hardest day of the trek!". Thank god for yak steak and the Irish Bar! We had a great night celebrating and I have great memories of singing Mumford & Sons at full blast and playing countless games of pool! Namche Bazarr - awesome place!!

We enjoyed ourselves far too much again in Lukla and then had two brilliant days in Kathmandu with a celebratory nine course meal in a luxury hotel in fancy dress!

Strawberries

he strawberry is a member of the rose family and is unique in that it is the only fruit with seeds on the outside rather than the inside. They are also a very healthy fruit, being rich in vitamin C and a good source of folic acid as well as being high in fibre.

Origin and History of Strawberries

Strawberries were cultivated by the Romans as early as 200 BC and in mediaeval times strawberries were regarded as an aphrodisiac and a soup made of strawberries, borage and soured cream was traditionally served to newly-weds at their wedding breakfast.

Native American Indians were already eating strawberries when the Colonists arrived and it is believed that in 1780, the first strawberry hybrid was developed in the USA.

Strawberry Soufflé

Ingredients
4 eggs, separated
75g/3oz Caster Sugar
20g/3/4oz Gelatine Leaves, soaked
The Juice of 1/2 a Lemon
6 tbsp water
300g/11oz Strawberries, sieved
150ml/5fl.oz. Double Cream
Grated Chocolate to decorate
Whipped Cream to Decorate

Instructions

1. Encircle 4 dariole moulds or small ramekins with greaseproof or parchment paper, so that the paper overlaps and stands approximately 2 inches above the rim of each mould and fasten with string or sellotape.

- 2. Place the egg yolks and sugar in a bowl and place over a pan of hot water. Whisk until thick and creamy then remove the bowl from the heat.
- 3. Place the gelatine, lemon juice and water in a bowl and place over a pan of boiling water. Stir until dissolved then beat it into the egg mixture. Remove from the heat and set aside to cool and slightly set.
- 4. Meanwhile, in another bowl, whisk the cream to the soft peak stage then fold in the strawberry puree. Pour the gelatine and egg mixture into the strawberry and cream mixture, stirring all the time. Blend well.
- 5. Whisk the egg whites until stiff. Add a quarter of the egg whites to the strawberry mixture to lighten it, then gently fold the remainder of the egg whites into the strawberry mixture. Pour into the moulds, refrigerate and leave to set overnight.
- 5. To serve carefully remove the paper from each mould. Gently press the grated chocolate on the protruding sides of the soufflés and decorate the top of each with piped cream and a whole strawberry.

Strawberry With Mascarpone

Ingredients 250g/8oz Fresh Strawberries 100g/3oz Caster Sugar 1 tbsp Vanilla Extract 1tbsp Vodka 200ml/7fl oz Single Cream 250g/8oz Mascarpone Cheese

Instructions

- 1. Place the strawberries in a mixing bowl, reserving 4 whole ones for garnishing, and crush lightly with a fork.
- 2. In another bowl mix the caster sugar vanilla, vodka and cream together.
- 3. Add the mascarpone to the cream mixture and beat until smooth.
- 4. Spoon a little of the crushed strawberries into the bottom of serving glasses then add a layer of the mascarpone mixture. Repeat the layers finishing with a layer of the cream and garnish with whole or cut strawberries.


Chip today, so your pet is not a stray





Unintended consequences - the aristocrat

In about 1850 a single English aristocrat aged about 35 carefully made a will leaving all his landed estates to his family. He then went on a round-the-world tour. When he got to Malaysia he had a whirlwind romance with a Malaysian girl and married her. Soon after, he died very unexpectedly. The Malaysian girl then came to England and said the law said his landed estate was now hers. His shocked English family went to the courts and tried everything to disinherit her.

But she was right. They had lost a fortune. The moment you get married, any will written before the marriage instantly becomes invalid. The aristocrat's will leaving his estate to his family became null and void the moment he said "I do". He should have made a new will immediately after the wedding leaving most of his estates to his family. Similarly, if you have been divorced or are a widow or widower, and you are now in your second marriage, you may need to make a new will urgently, especially if you have children from a first marriage. Otherwise they could get nothing.

Remember - the law says marriage cancels your will. If you have friends or relatives who have remarried, mention this to them. They probably don't know the consequences, just like the aristocrat.

Should you get a lasting power of attorney done?

Michael is 74 and lives in Swanland. His wife Andrea is 72 and they are a lovely couple. A year ago Michael mentioned that Andrea was losing her short term memory. I suggested he got a lasting power of attorney (LPA) done, quickly, while she was still of sound mind. This meant that if she did get dementia, he could legally do things on her behalf like signing cheques for her, sign her tax returns, change her investments etc. I saw him again two weeks ago. He hadn't done it. Andrea did get dementia so it's too late now for her to sign an LPA, never mind anything else, and the Court of Protection, not Michael, has taken control over her affairs. Every year he has to send accounts to the Court detailing her income and what he has spent it on, and also has to pay an expensive fee every year to the Court. He is despondent. He already has enough to cope with. It would have been much simpler and cheaper if Andrea had done an LPA.

You download an LPA from the internet. It is 11 pages long, but is not difficult to complete. Go to http://www.justice.gov.uk/forms/opg/ lasting-power-of-attorney and look for form LPA117. In the example above, three people would have signed it - Andrea, Michael, and an independent person, often a doctor or solicitor, who certifies that Andrea is of sound mind, fully understands what an LPA means, and that she hasn't been pressured into making the LPA.

I have husband and wife clients in Beverley who are aged about 75 and both bright as buttons. They had each been persuaded to get LPAs done by a big Hull firm of solicitors, and had paid £1000 for this. Neither will ever get dementia. I didn't say anything, because it would only have upset them, but for them it was a waste of £1000.

My wife and I haven't bothered with LPAs, even though she tells me I've driven her potty every day since we got married. But if either of us starts to show memory loss, other than the normal forgetting names and faces as you get older, an LPA will be done in a flash.

If you know anyone like Michael and Andrea, or have elderly parents or grandparents who are showing early signs of dementia, mention LPAs to them. Otherwise, I wouldn't bother. Also bear in mind that only one person in 20 over 65 will be affected by Alzheimer's, and only one in five over 80.



This month his destination is Bainton

The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.


Map:- EXPLORER 294

Start at GR. SE964525 Lay-By to the North of the village. Distance 10.0 Miles.

eave the lay-by and walk towards the village of Bainton, cross the main road (B1248) near the garage and take the lane, known as West End, to the right of the garage. When the lane comes to a sharp right bend, follow the lane round as it becomes Preston Lane and follow this to reach the B1246 and then turn right. On reaching the round about on the B1248, turn left and walk along the grass verge. Immediately past the first

plantation, turn left onto a footpath and walk with the plantation on the left. After about one kilometre, turn right at a footpath sign and walk with the hedge on the left towards a second plantation and on reaching this keep it to the right to reach the north west corner. On reaching this point turn right and continue walking with the plantation to the right to reach the B1248 again and then turn left.

On reaching the village of Tibthorpe, take the first lane on the left and follow this round as it turns sharp right. At the next junction turn left and follow the minor road. After a short distance look out for a very colourful garden on the left. Follow this minor road for about two kilometres and then locate a way marker on the left and take this path keeping the hedge on the left. At the bottom of the shallow dale (known as Deep Dale), turn right to the next hedge and locate a gate on the left. Pass through this gate and double back for about 200 metres then bear right and ascend the short hill to emerge in a field.

Continue straight ahead with a dilapidated fence to the right Continue in the same direction for about 2.5 kilometres to emerge on the road (B1246) in North Dalton. On reaching the road, turn left and continue to the first sharp left bend. At this point turn right and leave the road, after 100 metres turn left following the Minster Way path towards Bainton.

Cross a farm lane and pass through a metal gate, at the end of the field, turn right and then after about 100 metres pass through a kissing gate on the left and walk across the field heading for houses. Pass through a kissing gate and emerge at the corner of West End and Preston Lane. Follow West Lane back to the B1248 and the Lay-By.

June is here and the sunshine will hopefully stay out of hiding. The days get longer in June with the 21st been the longest day of the year. With this extra light and warmth comes more weeds and these will sprout up from seemingly nowhere. Keep on top of them by hoeing regularly in dry conditions. Herbaceous borders are reaching their early summer peak, filling with colour and excitement.

Choosing Sunny or Shade spots for your plants

Just like people, some plants love sun while others flourish in cooler, shadier conditions. Most gardens have a combination of sunny spots and shady corners, so choose your plants carefully to make the most of the different areas in your garden.

Many sun-loving plants have thick, silvery coloured leaves with hairs to reduce water loss. Numerous flowers are well suited to a dry, sunny site, giving you the opportunity to create all kinds of dazzling displays. And don't forget to select a few varieties that release scent for those warm summer evenings.

Similarly, you shouldn't be daunted by shade – it provides a wonderful opportunity to grow many marvellous plants. While some varieties do not flower well in shade, many plants originate from woodland, so you can create fascinating effects with foliage. And if your bed is shaded by overhanging deciduous trees, try using bulbs to create colour in spring before the trees come into leaf.

Whichever plants you choose, making the most of your sunny spots and shady corners is easy and needn't take long – and you'll enjoy seeing all parts of your garden thriving with plants that suit the conditions.



PREPARING THE SITE

It's not hard to create the right conditions for plants to flourish, although obviously it takes a little longer to prepare the ground for a large bed than a tiny corner.

Ideally, soil should be about 60cm deep and loosely packed for plant roots to penetrate.

Whether you're planting in sunny or shady conditions, there are similar rules to follow for ground preparation:

- Weed thoroughly and use a hoe to save time and effort.
- Dig over with a fork, especially if your soil feels heavy, as it needs loosening up before planting.
- To help retain moisture and improve heavy soils, add plenty of organic material, such as well rotted manure, garden compost or planting compost.

- Add water-retaining gel granules to very dry soils to help retain moisture.
- To create more light in shady spots, cut back selected branches

SUNNY SPOTS Sun & Shade SUNNY SPOTS SHADY CORNERS

For sunny spots, combine a mixture of shrubs, herbaceous perennials (plants that usually die back in winter and grow again the following year) and bedding plants. Lavenders are perfect for sunny, dry conditions; Oriental poppies add a splash of colour; and annual bedding plants such as begonias, lobelia and alyssum are great for the front of a flowerbed. It's especially easy (not to mention cost effective) to grow plants from seed on a sunny site.

Shady SHADY CORNERS

In shady corners, mix shrubs, herbaceous perennials, ferns and bulbs. Damp shady areas are ideal for ferns and lush woodland plants such as wood anemones, primroses and trilliums. However, shady sites beneath hedges and trees are often dry and more suitable for bulbs such as bluebells and snowdrops, shrubs such as daphne or mahonia, perennials including bergenia or hellebores and woodland plants such as foxgloves and epimediums.

PLANTS FOR SUNNY SPOTS

- Allium (ornamental onion) purple globes in summer followed by seedheads. 1.5m
- Anthemis: aromatic foliage and yellow or white daisy flowers.
- Aster novi-belgii (Michaelmas daisy): late summer. 15cm-1.2m
- Aubrieta: low-growing mats of pink and mauve flowers.
- Caryopteris: small shrubs with many fluffy blue flowers. 1m
- Cistus x purpureus (rock rose): bright rose-pink summer flowers with evergreen foliage. 1.5m
- Dianthus (pink) (pictured): pink, white or red summer flowers, often patterned, silvery leaves. 25–45cm



- Euphorbia characias: evergreen, elegant spikes. 1.5m
- Fritillaria imperialis (crown imperial) orange, red or yellow flowers in early summer. 1.5m
- Genista (broom): small-leaved, yellow-flowered shrub. 60cm
- Helianthemum (rock rose): many colours, evergreen. 10–20cm
- Lavandula (lavender): blue, pink, mauve or white spikes, silvery, aromatic foliage. 45cm

10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Cut the lawn every week
- 2. Regularly de-weed your borders and keep on top of weeds
- 3. It's time to put summer hanging baskets and containers outside
- 4. Keep a look out for slugs on new plantings. They particularly enjoy hostas.
- 5. Keep topping up our compost heap. Remember to balance grass clippings with other garden material.
- 6. Be water wise, use your water butt and keep on top of watering bedding in particular
- 7. Stake tall or wobbly plants and keep an eye on tieing climbers to supporting trellis to guide where you want the plant to grow
- 8. Plant out all Summer bedding
- 9. Pinch outside shoots on tomato plants

- Anemone nemorosa (wood anemone) creeping perennial with white spring flowers. 8-15cm
- Astilbe (false goat's beard): perennial with red, pink or white plumes in summer. 30-60cm

- Cyclamen coum: compact bulb with white, pink or red flowers in winter/early spring. 5-8cm



- Hosta (plantain lily): perennial with fine foliage and purple/white flower spikes in summer. 15-90cm





Here is the latest article from Chris Catchmoore who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

ello and welcome once again fellow anglers to this month's fishing news. The date is 20th May 2013. Well are we going to have a summer this year or what? I certainly hope so!

Hopefully as you read this article you are just applying your first layer of factor 15 suntan lotion! If that is true don't forget to pack some in your fishing gear, you all know how easy it is to get burnt near water. Plus at this time of year it is a good idea to have some insect repellent with you.

How has your fishing been lately, good I hope. I am receiving fantastic match results in the shop every week. This informs me that at last the fish are back on the feed once again. If the fish have not already spawned at the water you are visiting this week, then they are about too, so don't forget your inside lines later on in the day. This can be a blessing if you have struggled during the day. Feed them quite liberally once every half hour, but do not go over it until late afternoon.

Over the years I have found it is better to wait and gain the confidence of feeding fish in the margins rather than go and attack the margin at the first sign of movement in the edge. The other thing to observe is that the bigger fish will move into the margins later rather than sooner so I advise that you step up your margin gear in preparation.

How many of you have a garden pond? Or have you the facility to look at your neighbour's pond. Have you noticed that many of the fish are up in the water; quite a lot is there not? Guess what, if the fish are up in the water in the garden ponds you can be sure most of the commercial ponds will be the same temperature, therefore the fish will be up in the water at these venues as well. So why not target them?

There are lots of ways to do this from:

- (a) Fishing a polly ball with maggot
- (b) The pellet waggler approach
- (c) Surface floating baits
- (d) Popped up zig rigs
- (e) Good old mid water waggler fishing

Remember try not to stick to fishing the bottom everywhere you go, chop and change, that is the key to a more successful angler. After all Bob Nudd did not become world champion by fishing one method all his life. Give it a go, the signs are there to be seen and if you own a pair of polarised sunglasses you may see them sooner than you normally would.

Here is something that I am often asked. Where can I go night fishing for Carp? Listed below are a few local venues.

Please, when you book to fish any of these venues do so at a sensible time of the day as some of these phone numbers are personal and we do not want to wake the kids up do we? Seriously though fellow anglers please ring during daylight hours, as like most people that receive a phone call after a certain time of the day it can mean an emergency.

I will pick on Rainbow Lakes just because it was last on the list to describe what you can expect to get for your money. On the evening you are locked in at the venue so you should be safe and undisturbed. There are very clean toilet facilities here with a combination lock. The pegs are a plenty and all are very comfortable. The setting here is fantastic and the lake is stocked with plenty of Carp pushing up to 30lb in all strains, what more could you wish for? On that point ask to see John's stocking album, you will be very surprised and impressed.

In store Lug worm orders are still being taken for all you beach anglers, and as always we stock plenty of frozen sea baits for you as well.

Leasehold and Freehold Property

terms 'freehold' refer the two main different ways which properties in England and Wales can be owned. This article explores the differences between freehold and leasehold, and provides an outline of some of the main issues surrounding leasehold, the more complex of the two.

If your property is freehold, you own it, and the land on which it is built, outright. When you die, it is part of your estate and can be bequeathed to your heirs. Your entitlement to do with it as you please is limited only by planning and other laws. Any necessary repairs are your responsibility, but you can generally choose not to carry them out if you so wish.

For these reasons, freehold properties (or, in the case of a flat, a property with a share of the freehold) are usually more desirable than leasehold ones, and so are often worth more.

Leasehold

Though houses can be leasehold, this type of ownership applies more usually to flats. Under a leasehold agreement, you own your property only for the period stated in the lease. The freeholder (who, as we have seen, owns the property outright) grants you the right to do so, and ownership reverts to him when the lease expires.

The length of a lease, naturally, diminishes over time; its initial term can be up to 999 years. Not surprisingly, the duration of the lease purchased has a direct bearing on a property's value. In some cases, leaseholders have the right to extend their lease or even buy the freehold.

Because leasehold is, in effect, a form of tenancy, an annual fee (known as ground rent) is payable to the landlord (that is, the freeholder or his managing agent). Ground rent may be a nominal sum. A maintenance (or service) charge is also levied, to cover things like managing the building, external redecoration and repairs, gardening, window cleaning, buildings (though not contents) insurance, and so on. Such charges may rise annually without limit, but they are required by law to be reasonable.

The leaseholder usually owns everything within the walls, including the floorboards and plaster, while the freeholder owns the structure, the land on which it is built, and the common parts (which include communal entrance halls, staircases and so forth). The freeholder may be an individual, a company, a local authority, a housing association or a residents' management committee, under which leaseholders join forces to buy the freehold of their building.

Leasehold's main advantage is that it assigns clear responsibilities for upkeep and repairs, protecting individual leaseholders in the event of, say, a leak from a flat above. On the downside, it can be more difficult to obtain a mortgage on a leasehold property; much will depend on the length of time the lease will have left to run after the end of the mortgage term.

1st International Animal Trainers Conference . . . Twycross Zoo

ast month I was invited to attend this very first conference of its type in the UK. Over three days I sat and listened to some of the world's most respected and skilled Animal trainers.

The majority were highly qualified scientists from Zoo's all over the world talking about their projects and their experiences. Some of the video footage was amazing however the UK itself is doing fantastic work in all sorts of spheres outside as well as inside Zoos.

Animal training and the concepts therein have changed profoundly over the last decade especially. Within zoos now the most dramatic changes have been from giving care, handling and training from inside the cages of Zoo animals to their new procedure of something called "Protected Contact". This is where the enclosed animals are trained by clicker, targeting or stationing techniques from outside of the enclosures. No one enters inside anymore.

A Real Eye Opener

It opened my eyes completely as their world was all new to me. They train every form of animal.....marine mammals, reptiles, mammals, fish, birds etc, herbivore and carnivore alike............ you name it and they do it! These animals are no longer handled inside their enclosures but are trained to perform certain moves and undergo thorough desensitization to certain stimuli (really essential things like needles for blood draws) from outside the mesh. Vets and keepers can examine inside the mouths of Tigers by training them to open the mouth on cue. Elephants will lift a foot onto a platform for treatments, Crocodiles load themselves into crates for transport.....it goes on and on.

Performing Killer whales and sea lions are trained through all their moves through Positive reinforcement techniques.

The term "Enrichment" kept coming up. How do Zoos and Parks enrich the lives of their charges in order to give the animal's better care and a better way of life which is full rather than empty of stimulation?

Preventing animals getting bored

There is a huge amount of effort going into lateral thinking here to prevent stereotypical caged boredom behaviour.......cage walking, weaving, head bobbing, rocking.......we have all seen it and it happens to horses too, especially to racehorses who have been stabled up for 23 out of every 24 hours whilst in their years of training. Providing better designed enclosures with the emphasis on more natural feeding....... hunting for and hence finding food, digging for it, climbing for it, reaching for it, pickling it out of tree trunksso many ideas out there all designed to help recreate a more natural environment which is species orientated. Daily training in its own right helps keep enclosed animals more engaged and proactive, lessening stress and boredom......enrichment through training.

Whatever people's feelings are over the existence of Zoos and parks there is most definitely more need of them now than ever before. So many animals are appallingly endangered in the wild and so many have totally lost their habitats as we continue to plunder our world for space and resources at the expense of our wildlife. The work going on behind the scenes in Zoos is highly commendable for breeding programs in particular. The public may only ever get to see "wild life" this way and will hopefully become more aware of the effects of us humans ravaging the planet. Education is everything. Enriching the lives of these animals is paramount and the science behind the behaviour of each and every enclosed animal is stunning. My eyes have been opened massively.

The delegates came from many different backgrounds internationally. Here in the UK I met many people making huge differences to both animals as well as people. The work of the Medical Detection Dogs Charity here in the UK where dogs are being trained to detect the scent of cancer and other debilitating diseases within the body of humans was awesome. They literally save lives.

Monkey World

The work of "Monkey World" (an ape rescue centre) where they rescue apes from horrendous lives on Spain's public beaches, the pet trade worldwide, laboratories or the entertainment business and rehabilitate them back into being social group members with cohesion.....amazing work done here and highly commendable.

Graham Hill from our very own "The Deep" highlighting the work and training done there with fish, Rays and sharks to create the cohesive environment found there. Enrichment with training being a main focus so that feeding time is now no longer the free for all, dangerous and stressful situation that it used to be. His work and passion is wonderful......and on our own door step too! It turns out that fish do not have an 8 second memory after all.....in fact completely the opposite. Hull citizens can be proud of their Marine World

These were just three in the UK out of so many more. I will write more next time about the work of so many dedicated people worldwide who are making huge differences to animal's lives, their environments and public awareness through education as well as desperately trying to keep wild animals safe in the wild.

What did I get out of it personally with my world of training horses and people? Too much is the answer to that! However there can never be too much knowledge and I gained insight into techniques which are new to me and can be applied into my rehab work. I have already been playing with my little traumatised rescue pony "Toby" using more clearly defined target training in a more identified way. Tomorrow I am having a day's training with a lady I met there who has been out in the USA learning from a trainer of renowned skill

Wills - why use a solicitor?

urrently, will writing is an unregulated industry in England. This means that you may be charged a fee for the preparation of a Will regardless of training, supervision, insurance and qualifications

Yet another problem!

We have had a bit of a problem with the mains water supply to the house this month. As you may know, before we moved in over a year ago we had a water storage tank fitted incase of water shortages or supply problems and have had no problems up to now, despite the water meter being 500 metres away down the hill. We discovered the problem late one night after taking our friends back to the airport and on our return couldn't get any water in the house. I checked the pump which was ok and, as it was pitch black outside, decided to leave further investigations till the morning.

The next day I checked the 15000 ltr tank to find it totally empty, with no water coming through the ballcock. After checking the meter, which wasn't turning at all, I rang the water companys emergency number but, as expected, the guy at the other end didn't speak English. As my Spanish wasn't good enough to explain my problem he put his 10 year old son on who spoke English and between us managed to arrange a call out and met at the meter. He disconnected the mains side of the meter and confirmed water was coming to the meter and then tested our side and no water came out. He said the meter was ok so it must be our non return valve that was faulty and if we replaced it then it should be ok. As our builder Charlie was away till the Monday I had to rig up a pipe from our well to fill up the tank and wait for a replacement to be fitted. On the Monday he fitted the new valve but we still had no mains water and the meter wasn't moving but as its quite a long run decided to leave it for a few days to see if any pressure would build up but after a week we still had no mains water. As we were coming to England for a week, I asked Charlie if he could get hold of the water company and try and get it sorted while we are away so hopefully when we return it we will have mains water back on. On the plus side at least I won't have a water bill to pay this month!!!






