Controlling who WILL inherit your estate when you die

Do you want to decide who inherits your estate? If your answer is yes then you need to make a Will.

"I don't have time", "I'll think about it when I'm older" and "I don't want to think about dying, it's too morbid!" are some examples of the excuses people give for not making a Will. If you do not have a Will in place then you have no control over who inherits your money, your property and all of your possessions; it is decided based on Statutory guidelines written nearly 100 years ago. This can result in people who you don't wish to inherit, benefiting from your estate.

Dying without a Will can cause difficulties and problems for your loved ones at an already difficult time. It may take them time to establish whether you have a Will, and if there is no Will, they may need to go through the courts to be granted the power to deal with your estate. This would delay the process of gaining access to your assets and may result in your family members having to pay for your funeral and other expenses.

If you have children under 18, then making a Will is essential to ensure that the people who you would want

to look after you children do so in the event of your death. These people are called "guardians" and they can be appointed in your Will. If you do not appoint guardians, then it is the authorities who decide who looks after your children. These may not be the people who you would have chosen and could cause distress for your children and family members.

A Will can be used to establish a trust for your children allowing you to have some control over the money they inherit, how it is used and when they receive it after your death.

If you have an estate that is liable for Inheritance Tax, making a Will can help reduce the Inheritance Tax liability, or even eliminate it altogether. A Will can therefore ensure that there is more money for your loved ones and less for the taxman. A Will can even be used to mitigate payment of care fees.

The simple question is: Do you want to make things as simple as possible for your loved ones and ensure that they are the ones who inherit your estate? If yes, then make a Will!

Windows 10 and emails - love or hate them

nce a device is upgraded to Windows 10, we'll be keeping it current for the supported lifetime of the device," said Terry Myerson, executive vice president of the Operating Systems Group. "With Windows 10, we think of Windows as a service...the question 'what version are you running' will cease to make sense." Interesting comments from Microsoft regarding the launch of Windows 10 which is scheduled for next month. At the time of writing they still haven't announced pricing yet after the first 'free year' however.

Could this be the last version of Windows as we know it? I predicted a few years back that owing to the dominance of the internet, ultimately a computer will only need a means of starting up and getting online. This has been proved with the launch some time ago now, but perhaps not very well known, of the *Chromebook*. This is a small laptop device that uses the *Chrome* operating system, basically an extended version of Google's Chrome browser. It boots in a matter of seconds, you sign in with your Google account, and it connects to a wireless network and you're online. Anything you want to store or work on is kept up there 'in the cloud'. Basically that means Google's own servers. Tablets are of course a good example of this also, but with added apps, you just pick it up and it works. The future looks interesting....

Vista users should plan to upgrade to a new PC, as although support is quoted as being until 2017, there will be no upgrade options on that system, only available to Windows 7 & 8 computers. Vista was launched 8 years ago now, so many systems will be a bit past their sell by! If you're looking for a new PC, you know who to call, written quotes available, just call or email.

'Microsoft telephone scam.' Police are warning computer users to be vigilant as there has been a rise in the numbers of people reporting being cold-called by someone claiming to work for Microsoft. I have featured this scam in my article several times as I have had customers calling me for advice. These callers (often from bogus call centre in India) aim to take control of your computer remotely, cause all sorts of mayhem and then ask you to pay for their service. Best advice is that if anyone contacts you purporting to work for Microsoft or anything to do with Windows, or saying you have a fault or virus on your computer, tell them quite firmly you are not interested or hang up. If you think you have fallen victim to this, the Police advise to report it to Action Fraud UK on 0300 123 2040. Also contact us to have your computer cleaned and/or security checked.

Email – love it or hate it, it's part of modern life, and it's not without problems. Firstly it is estimated that around 80% of the world's email is junk, so the likelihood is that every time you open your email application, you open the floodgates. But if you never use your email address online to buy things or sign up for newsletters etc., you're probably safe. The old email adage holds true, if you don't know the sender, or the subject it looks too good to be true, then delete it. Be particularly careful with emails

purporting to be from banks and other financial institutions, and in recent months there has been a rash of emails with attachments such as 'remittance advice' or 'outstanding invoice'. Don't fall for any of these, don't open them and just hit the delete key. Or you could use the Junk setting, by clicking on the email and mark the sender so that in future all email from that address will go into the Junk Mail folder.

Karoo - being our local internet service provider (ISP) also provides a free email service that many people use locally. There are two ways to access your email: either through an application like Windows Live Mail, or Thunderbird, (or a professional product like Outlook, which comes as part of the Microsoft Office paid-for packages), or using what we call webmail. This is where you go online to the Karoo home page (now called HeyToday), and click on Mail and enter your email address and password. This takes you directly to your inbox. The advantage of this method is that you can use it from any computer anywhere, whereas using an application only works in this area. It is worth mentioning here that Karoo has launched a new-look webmail service recently, you will have noticed the difference by now. One important point is that your contacts (address book) won't be transferred to this new system, so make sure you have a note of them before they shut down the old system.

Windows Live Mail it's fair to say has not been without issues since launch, but it is widely used as it is provided free by Microsoft. One important thing I have discovered recently is that because of the way Windows Live mail is designed, back up applications like Memeo etc. are unable to back up the mail store. So if you have a lot of important emails stored, you would need an alternative way of backing them up in case of a system crash. Contact us for help with this. The promotion run last month proved there is a need for home computer back-ups!

Gmail, Hotmail and Yahoo Mail are other online alternative email services, and you are probably signed up to one of these if you have a tablet or smart phone. Again you can use these services from any device anywhere.

A camera powered by the light it uses to take pictures has been invented by American scientists. 

Strawberries

The strawberry is a member of the rose family and is unique in that it is the only fruit with seeds on the outside rather than the inside. They are also a very healthy fruit, being rich in vitamin C and a good source of folic acid as well as being high in fibre.

Origin and History of Strawberries

Strawberries were cultivated by the Romans as early as 200 BC and in mediaeval times strawberries were regarded as an aphrodisiac and a soup made of strawberries, borage and soured cream was traditionally served to newly-weds at their wedding breakfast.

Native American Indians were already eating strawberries when the Colonists arrived and it is believed that in 1780, the first strawberry hybrid was developed in the USA.

Strawberry Soufflé

Ingredients

4 eggs, separated 75g/3oz Caster Sugar 20g/3/4oz Gelatine Leaves, soaked The Juice of 1/2 a Lemon 6 tbsp water 300g/11oz Strawberries, sieved 150ml/5fl.oz. Double Cream Grated Chocolate to decorate Whipped Cream to Decorate

Instructions

- 1. Encircle 4 dariole moulds or small ramekins with grease-proof or parchment paper, so that the paper overlaps and stands approximately 2 inches above the rim of each mould and fasten with string or sellotape.
- 2. Place the egg yolks and sugar in a bowl and place over a pan of hot water. Whisk until thick and creamy then remove the bowl from the heat.

- 3. Place the gelatine, lemon juice and water in a bowl and place over a pan of boiling water. Stir until dissolved then beat it into the egg mixture. Remove from the heat and set aside to cool and slightly set.
- 4. Meanwhile, in another bowl, whisk the cream to the soft peak stage then fold in the strawberry puree. Pour the gelatine and egg mixture into the strawberry and cream mixture, stirring all the time. Blend well.
- 5. Whisk the egg whites until stiff. Add a quarter of the egg whites to the strawberry mixture to lighten it, then gently fold the remainder of the egg whites into the strawberry mixture. Pour into the moulds, refrigerate and leave to set overnight.
- 5. To serve carefully remove the paper from each mould. Gently press the grated chocolate on the protruding sides of the soufflés and decorate the top of each with piped cream and a whole strawberry.

Strawberry With Mascarpone

Ingredients

250g/8oz Fresh Strawberries 100g/3oz Caster Sugar 1 tbsp Vanilla Extract 1tbsp Vodka 200ml/7fl oz Single Cream 250g/8oz Mascarpone Cheese

Instructions

- 1. Place the strawberries in a mixing bowl, reserving 4 whole ones for garnishing, and crush lightly with a fork.
- 2. In another bowl mix the caster sugar vanilla, vodka and cream together.
- 3. Add the mascarpone to the cream mixture and beat until smooth.
- 4. Spoon a little of the crushed strawberries into the bottom of serving glasses then add a layer of the mascarpone mixture. Repeat the layers finishing with a layer of the cream and garnish with whole or cut strawberries.

Summer Sweetcorn Salad

Serves 4 Ingredients

400g/14oz frozen Sweetcorn Kernels 100g/4oz frozen Whole Green Beans 3 tbsp Cider Vinegar 1 tbsp Olive Oil

1 tbsp freshly chopped Parsley Salt and Black Pepper

½ Green Capsicum (Sweet Pepper), chopped 50g/2oz Spring Onion, chopped

Instructions

1. Cut the green beans into 12mm/½ inch lengths. Bring a

saucepan of lightly salted water to the boil, add the beans and sweetcorn, bring back to the boil then simmer for 3-4 minutes until just tender. Drain well in a colander and allow to cool.

- 2. Meanwhile, place the vinegar, olive oil, parsley, salt, and pepper in a serving bowl and whisk together until well blended
- 3. Add corn kernels, green beans, red pepper, and onion to the dressing in the bowl and mix well. Cover and refrigerate until ready to serve.

Ham and Asparagus Quiche

Serves 4 Ingredients

225g/8oz Shortcrust Pastry 25g/1oz Butter 1 Onion, chopped 100g/4oz Ham, cut into thin strips 75g/3oz Asparagus, cooked 2 Eggs, beaten 150ml/5fl.oz. Single Cream Salt and Black Pepper

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200C, 400F, Gas Mark 6.
- 2. Roll out the pastry to 6mm/1/4 inch thickness and use to line a 20cm/8 inch flan tin. Prick the base of the pastry with a fork then line with greaseproof paper and fill with baking beans. Place on a baking tray then bake in the oven for 15 minutes.
- 2. Meanwhile, heat the butter in a pan, add the onion and fry gently until soft and transparent. Cool slightly then spread over the base of the partly cooked pastry case.
 - 3. Arrange the ham and asparagus on top of the onions.
- 4. In a bowl, beat together the eggs, cream, salt and pepper then pour into the flan case over the onion, ham and asparagus.
- 5. Return to the oven and bake for 30-35 minutes until set and golden brown. Serve hot or cold.

Wines from the UK

K wine has long since shaken off its second rate reputation and, believe it or not, can now compete with some of the very best in the world. I'm a huge fan and can count myself in good company, as The Queen always serves English fizz as opposed to French Champagne at Buckingham Palace.

If you love the fresh, hedgerow flavours of New Zealand Sauvignon Blanc, you'll love some of the English white wines, particularly those made from the Bacchus grape, which seems to suit our climate. My only plea is for more of our UK supermarkets to get on board to make it easier for English wines to be discovered.

Waitrose is usually a good bet to track down a bottle or two, as is Marks & Spencer and our specialist outlets, but the rest of the big stores have a lot of catching up to do.

It's certainly not because there is any lack of wine - UK winemakers are toasting a bumper 2014 harvest as production continues to grow, with the country's vineyard area more than doubling in the last seven years.

Producers made 47,433 hectolitres of wine last year, the equivalent of 6.3 million bottles and up 42 per cent in volume terms on the 2013 crop – itself a record-breaker.

Vineyards in the UK now cover more than 2,000 hectares of land, the majority of it planted for sparkling wine production, which has risen by nearly 150 per cent in the past five years.

Chardonnay and Pinot Noir are now the most planted grape varieties – followed by still wine stalwart Bacchus – and total plantings have risen by more than 230 per cent in the last eight years.

Julia Trustram Eve, marketing director for English Wine Producers, said she expects the sector's "steady sales growth" to continue this year. She said the industry in general was in buoyant mood heading into 2015, particularly following a strong 2014 harvest.

Several larger players in the industry, such as Chapel Down and Ridgeview, have said they are working harder to increase exports and a growing number of winemakers are lobbying the Government to ensure that English wine is served in more British embassies around the world, to increase its profile.

Ridgeview's Bloomsbury 2011 was served earlier this year to the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge during their tour of New York and we can only guess their choice to wet baby Charlotte's head following the recent Royal Birth.

Although the South claims the most acres of vines, Yorkshire has its fair share, too. In East Yorkshire, there's the family-owned Laurel Vines at Aike, near Driffield, and I enjoyed sampling a bottle of their 2013 dry white - the first to be bottled - at a function I attended recently at the KC Stadium in Hull.

Easy drinking in style, this bright light white is only in limited supply at the moment; so, too, their other white choice, called Simply White, and their fruity rose. All have secured protected geographical indication (PGI) status and the family hope, in due course, to increase production. Inquiries and further information is available from their website, www.laurel-vines.co.uk

Also worth checking out is the Little Wold Vineyard at South Cave, which was planted in spring 2012 with 1000 white vines. A further 500 red vines were planted in 2013 and now, this year, they are planning to plant a further 500 vines.

The first harvest was last year and I'm currently still waiting to hear news of their first release of wine. Meanwhile, it is possible to join a tour of the vineyard on selected dates - visit their website, www.marketplacefarm.co.uk, for details.

Further afield one of the most successful Yorkshire vineyards is Leventhorpe, based at Woodlesford, near Leeds, which was established 30 years ago and makes some superb wine. Helmsley Walled Garden Vineyard is also worth checking out.






Don't be a Stray . . . Chip today!

ooking out of the window, I am asking myself, has the summer arrived? Today I am not so sure but my two cats, Bisley and Saffie think otherwise. As long as it's not raining, they love to bask outside catching the odd ray of sunshine. Thankfully they stay close by and never stray far but it is the 'FAR' I do worry about. How many of us know really how far our cats explore?

We do hear of the person down the road feeding him/her, just like my cat Bisley used to do, or a sighting in a nearby field but they can go further. A friend of mine moved home from one side of Hull to the other and her cat had great delight on taking a long journey every so often to the 'old' house. This became so frequent that my friends old neighbour looked out for her cat, who then immediately rang her on his sighting to go and collect him. What if her cat didn't get as far as the 'old' house and was collected along the journey by a well intentioned member of the public who thought he was a 'stray'?





Each day I am sadly reminded of this. We have a Hull Animal Welfare Trust rehoming board at the Cottingham surgery featuring many photos of dogs and cats who are looking for new homes. Some are taken there by couples who have sadly 'split up' and regrettably no longer have the time or finances to commit to their beloved pet or sadly their owners have passed away and have no one within the family circle to take them on. These are a minority because there are a vast amount who go in as so called 'strays'. I say 'so called' because really they may belong to someone out there who is frantically looking for them. So how can we help to stop this? EASY! IDENTICHIP!

I know it sounds simple but more often than not, this is all it will take. On making an appointment with the nurse, here at KINGSTON, a chip (about the size of a small grain of rice) is placed into the back of the pets neck. This chip holds a number which is unique to that pet and is subsequently registered on the Data Base, via the website, where it is held for reference. If your pet then strays and is taken to any veterinary surgery or rescue centre in this country, it will be scanned for the chip number which will then appear on the hand held scanning device and after a quick search on the data base...pet and owner are reunited. Simple! It can take away most of the trauma caused when we go through the episode of looking for missing pets, by reuniting them sooner. In the event of moving house, the chip address should also be altered by contacting the data base. So many owners forget to do this and therefore, sadly, this is another occasion which finds the pet within a rescue centre.

Identichips are not just on offer to cats but also dogs, rabbits and most surprisingly, tortoises.

FINALLY....IMPORTANT NEWS.

With effect from 6th April 2016... ALL DOGS MUST BE IDENTICHIPPED and registered to an approved data base by the time they reach 8 weeks of age. Every dog that is not currently micro chipped, the 'keeper' (or owner as they were known) will have until 6th April 2016 to get them chipped and registered. NO ONE IS EXEMPT!

Please note, the 'keeper' of a dog which is NOT microchipped AND registered on the data base, a notice may be served requiring them to have their dog chipped within 21 days. If the 'keeper' does not comply with this then a hefty fine will be served.

So there we have it. For one small one-off fee, you have the peace of mind knowing that you and your pet have a greater chance of being reunited...ONE CHIP...that's all it takes...ONE CHIP to help take all the stress away.



Should I invest in a buy-to-let pension?

hanges that came into force recently now allow many pensioners to take part of their pension as a tax free lump sum or draw down their capital over time. This potentially enables many of them to raise at least the deposit to go and purchase an investment property for the first time.

Five reasons why pensioners should invest in a buy-to-let pension

1. Buy-to-let can provide a steady income from residential rents and the benefit of potential capital lift over time as hopefully house prices continue to rise above the rate of inflation. The long-term increase above inflation according to the Nationwide has been 2.3%.

2. Landlords buying an investment property can gear their property. That means they can borrow more money than they are able to or are prepared to invest. The upside of this is that should house prices rise then their return on their initial capital will be much greater. For example: a lump sum of £25,000 invested as a deposit for a £100,000 property with a £75,000 loan. Say the net yield on the property was 5% or £5,000 per year. The gross annual return on the initial capital sum (your deposit) would be a massive 20%. If property prices rose a modest £25,000 over 10 years or just 2.5% the return on the investors initial capital would be 100% on the capital alone. These are the types of figures that attract many buy-to-let investors including pensioners to this asset class

3. The capital value of residential property has a relatively low level of volatility compared to for instance investing in an individual share or the stock market. Prices do fall but historically rarely fall in actual terms particularly over the longer-term. Residential property has an intrinsic value which means that it's value is always protected. This means that pensioners where investing horizons are relatively short are exposed to a relatively low likelihood of a

4. Residential property and rents can increase which means that this class of investment and the income derived from it keeps track with inflation and prevents the devaluation of the investment and the subsequent investment

5. Buy-to-let is a great little retirement business. You have the control of running your own small business but without the constant demands on your time and energy that running a full time trading business involves. For those of you who want to completely relax away from any hands on approach can place all the hassle and worry of managing your investment in the hands of a reputable letting agent.

Considerations

Whilst there is many compelling reasons to invest in Buy-to-let pensions there are some considerations to ensure that this is the right investment for you

- Retirement means less not added responsibility. Renting out property means added responsibility, and if this is not for you, you would need to employ the services of a reputable agent.
- Both income and capital appreciation from buy-to-let property is taxable. Property investment could add additional tax liability to an investor and you should carefully plan your tax affairs along with any other retirement investments.
- Whilst there is now an opportunity to borrow money following retirement to buy a rental property. There is only a limited number of lenders and rates for borrowers wishing to borrow past their
- Property investment is a 'lumpy' investment where it is only possible to release capital from it on the sale of the entire investment.

Investing in a property pension conclusions

You can see that there is good and bad reasons why pensioners should consider a property pension. It's not clear cut. However, given that many people are looking to retire at a relatively young age (from their 50s) and that life expectancy is increasing at a breath taking rate. Those in their 50s now may be looking at another 40 years of life and providing for themselves during that time. A buy-to-let property gives pensioners an income producing asset that is ideally aligned to providing during their retirement years. Equally more retirees are looking for a bit of a challenge in their retirement years

Planting New Roses

For first time rose growers you can chose to grow your rose in a container or plant it straight into the ground. If you chose to plant your rose in a container the plant will benefit from well draining compost and rose fertilisers through out the year.

When planting your rose you will need to prepare the



soil. The best way to do this is by adding farmyard manure like horse or chicken manure.

Dig a hole roughly twice the size of the roots and the depth of a spade's blade to allow room for the rose. Add a general fertiliser to the hole to help the roots establish and grow further once planted. To aid the rose over the summer and to avoid drought in summer gently tease out the roots so they can grow out once planted.

Place the rose in the hole and fill with compost making sure that the compost covers the roots completely to avoid future dieback. Water thoroughly.



10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Keep weeds at bay by hoeing your borders and beddings regularly.
- 2. Maintain the lawn by mowing it once a week.
- Plant summer bedding.
- 4. Shade your greenhouse to prevent it getting to hot over the summer.
- 5. Be careful not to waste water over the dry months. Conserve water by investing in a water butt or using bath and kitchen water that isn't too dirty.
- 6. Harvest early potatoes, radishes and salad leaves like lettuce.
- 7. Once the sun has ripened them, strawberries should be perfect for harvesting.
- 8. Remove rose flowers as they fade to encourage new flowers.
- 9. Plants like tomatoes, courgettes and celery can be planted outdoors.
- 10. Tie stems of tall growing plants to supports.



Aftercare

Over the next two summers you will need to keep the new rose well watered to keep the roots healthy especially over dry spells. Your rose will also benefit from an extra feeding with a general rose fertiliser every spring followed by mulching with bark chips or well rotted manure. Be careful to leave a space around the stem of the rose when you are mulching.

Pruning

It is a good idea to prune back your rose in the first winter after planting, and then in late winter to early spring thereafter. With all roses you will need to remove dead, damaged and weak growths. Pruning then depends on the variety in your garden.

- Climbing or rambling roses need to be pruned back to around 30-40 cm away from the base.
- Large flowered varieties are best pruned back to 10-15cm away from the base of the plant.
- For cluster flowered varieties prune back long stems to about 15cm away from the base.

Avoid pruning the remaining long stems on shrub roses.



Plant of the Month: Roses

The rose is our plant of the month. They are grown for their spectacular and iconic flowers. They are favourite around the world and often used as a token for love. Roses also make excellent gifts for special occasions with variety names like 'Ruby Wedding' and 'Special Anniversary'.

"All the roses will grow well in this area as we have water retentive soil," says John Meikle, the Coletta & Tyson horticultural manager. "If you dig in organic manure and plant the rose with bone meal and rose tree and shrub planting compost, keep well watered and spray regularly for pest and diseases your roses should do very well."

Roses like to be positioned in full sun where they are not competing for root space larger shrubs and trees. Keep them well watered but avoid drenching the leaves to avoid burning in the summer. If they are allowed to dry out the rose becomes more susceptible to disease and pests.

Feed your roses regularly in the growing season from spring to summer with organic fertilisers to help flower production.








eave the parking area and take the road sign posted Coneysthorpe/Malton and walk along this road. Shortly after passing the last house on the right, pass through a substantial wooden gate and bear left. Immediately cross the access road and cross the grass field diagonally aiming for the









sewerage works. Continue past the sewerage works. At the end of the field pass through a kissing gate and bear right and keep the wood to the right.

At the end of this field pass through gates and turn right and then at the end of this field pass through trees to emerge on a farm track and turn left and on reaching Bog Hall turn left again. Continue ahead passing through a small wooded area and on reaching a larger wooded area turn right.

Follow this round the Alamo Trekking Centre to emerge on a track and turn right signed for High Gaterley. Pass through a metal gate and continue straight ahead. At the next junction of paths turn right on the path signed Low Gaterley. At the end of the field pass through a gate and bear slightly left (keeping high) and aim for finger posts at the field boundary.

Pass through a gate and turn right following a stone road. Emerge on the road after passing Low Gaterley and turn right, Follow this road for about ¾ miles and then turn right on a wide path to eventually cross over a bridge over the lake (marked on the OS map as New River).

After crossing the bridge aim for the Temple and then follow the wall. Bear left with the wall and pass through a kissing gate and follow the path through an over grown area to emerge on a stoney lane and follow this to reach the substantial gate, pass through this gate and return to the parking area.

t the end of April I was invited to go down to the South of England Showground with my amazing little Toby Pony to demonstrate Positive reward training to a live audience in the main arena. TCL was a huge venue run by YOUR HORSE magazine to help owners of horse's country wide to access top horse trainers in every sphere of the horse world.

It was an innovative idea and the first of its kind in the UK. Over two days there were demonstrations in lots of outdoor arenas in every aspect of horse care and horse training. Rescue centres were there showing what they do in rehab of their desperately damaged charges. The Race horse rehabilitation centre from Lancashire were there showing their training methods with their ex Race horses. Natural Horsemanship trainers were there alongside some of our top Competition riders and trainers.

Lessons arranged

There were lessons arranged for people to bring their own horses to for help with Eventing, show jumping and dressage with top industry trainers and lots of retail opportunities for those who love shopping!

This was the very first time "Clicker training" has been

given the chance to be shown to the greater audience so I was very pleased to be asked.....and main arena too!

Getting the message across to horse owners that it is possible to train a horse purely by concentrating and marking the moment when something happens which you would like repeating it big stuff. Setting up the training so the horse can succeed is vital, introducing a scary stimulus at a distance which the horse can cope with and positively rewarding a try or a calm emotion etc.

Toby the star

Toby was a star as ever! On the first day there were moments when the sheer size of the audience was a little too much for him so he backed away, which was fine because it was his choice. I work him loose and free in demos. I need him to want to participate, not force him too (which when you have a rope attached is exactly what happens) Give the animal the choice to leave at any time empowers them. Reward the tries, the stays, the behaviours you want and the "moves".

Together we showed the audience that it is possible to have a horse who will accept a worming tube and dose himself. All horses hate being wormed. We always force the tube inside the mouth and we dose them. It's just simply how it is. To have Toby trot across the arena to me and put the tube inside his own mouth made the audience gasp! We played with the umbrella, he put his own bridle on, all sorts of behaviours Toby volunteered to participate in, which in real life would normally frighten horses or which we usually "make" them accept. The audience were charmed by his basketball moves!

It opened some eyes I'm glad to say and gave the audience food for thought re how they approach training their own horses.

Toby made me proud and made the 8 hour journey worth it.

I wonder what the little boy in the audience is thinking watching Toby play with the big ball!

Results of the Beverley to London Express Train Survey

In response to our survey, we received 37 replies, all very positive. Some were from residents in Willerby and Skidby who were also keen to use the service if it stopped in Cottingham.

From general conversation, we thought parking might give cause for concern, but our survey showed that 67.6% don't require parking, 27% do require parking and 5.4% didn't reply to that question. Most current early morning rail users catch the train in Hull, with only a few going to Brough, and some even went to York or Doncaster.

From talking to people on the street and reading the additional comments on the survey, we felt that stopping at Cottingham would increase usage due to the convenience factor. The reasons for travel were mainly leisure and family, and this very early train would be helpful in connecting with other country-wide services and Eurostar.



This in turn could increase rail travel usage over the whole network.

We are never going to have large numbers wanting to catch this train, but our survey has demonstrated interest. We're sure a more professional survey would back our findings, but whether the numbers would be high enough to justify stopping in Cottingham is a commercial decision for Hull First Trains.





Sanctuary Stones

was recently asked why there is a stone statue with a fence around it just as you leave

Beverley heading towards Hessle on the A164 near to its junction with the A1079? After a little investigation it turns out that this stone is actually the remains of a medieval sanctuary cross which in the 15th century was known as the stone cross of Bentley, or simply as Mile cross.

Further research (courtesy of the internet) revealed that Beverley was one of the major sanctuaries of the Middle Ages and was unusual in that criminals could claim asylum within the whole town not just within the church itself. Legend has it that King Athelstan granted Beverley sanctuary privileges for the otherworldly assistance of St John of Beverley in winning the battle of Brunanburh in 937AD which made Athelstan the first king of all Britain. There was no police force or Social Services and local government didn't exist so the church was all things to all people.

The boundary of the sanctuary or 'peace of St John' extended for a league (the Domesday use of the word implies a mile and a half) from the Minster where St John is laid to rest. The outer limits of the sanctuary were marked with stone crosses; the exact number of crosses is unknown, but may have been five as this would account for the five main roads into Beverley. The penalty for apprehending a criminal who had claimed sanctuary within this boundary was eight pounds and increased in value until at The Frith Stool or stone chair near the altar within the Minster the offence was termed 'bootless' i.e. unpardonable. Two other sanctuary stones, all but unrecognisable as crosses remain.

The Killingwoldgraves Cross beside the York road (A1174). This is set back slightly from the road behind a hedgerow not far from the Killingwoldgraves roundabout. This cross still had a legible Latin inscription in the 18th century: 'Pray for the soul of Master William de Walthon' but it is now covered with lichen with no visible inscription.

The Walkington Cross is beside the B1230 near to the traffic lights and the fourth stone was probably situated in the valley a little beyond the hamlet of Molescroft on the edge of Leconfield Park. The fifth may have been The Spay Cross, later called Stump Cross, where Swinemoor Lane meets the Holderness road to the east.

So, although the remains of these stones may not be particularly important now, if you were a felon fleeing capture in medieval times you would have been glad to see them.

This got me thinking – wouldn't it be lovely if there was a project to restore some if not all of the stones?
