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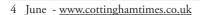

Commercial property is a highly developed market, which can be harsh on unsuspecting tenants. Here are a few points to keep in mind to help you redress the balance.

- Try to get a rent free period if you are expecting to renovate or fit out the property
- Leases of more than three years should contain a break option; an 'escape clause' if your business does not succeed
- Agree a schedule of condition containing photos of the property showing its condition.
 Once attached to your Lease it can limit expensive repair bills at the end of the Lease
- Your lease should say that the property should not be left in a better state of repair than that which you found it
- Make sure that the Landlord & Tenant Act 1954 protection is included; it allows you to renew your lease

- Where the rent increases during the term try to have the *rent review* linked to inflation or agree a stepped fixed price increase over the full term
- Be careful when agreeing to pay the other side's legal or agency costs; these can exceed £1000
- Ask if VAT is payable on the rent. Some commercial properties are subject to VAT. If you are not VAT registered then you will pay 20% more rent.
- Get a good lawyer; early legal advice from Graham & Rosen could save you thousands of pounds in the future.





DVLA digital driving licences, ransomware and Windows 10 updates

It's been a busy few weeks for trade conferences and training seminars. I write this as I return from the PC Retail event at the Emirates Stadium in London (where incidentally no time had been wasted in digging up the pitch ready for re-laying). Lots of products and services were on display, and some of the upcoming trends highlighted were 'smart home' and virtual reality products, and the fact that more people are now shopping on their smart phone or tablet.

With that in mind, I will also mention the DVLA plan to introduce a digital driving licence which will essentially be a photo card on your smart phone. This will be stored in the same place as tickets and other official documents, i.e. the Wallet app on your iPhone or Android device

What an essential item the smart phone has become. As I travelled to London with Hull trains, my M-ticket was on there, which I just showed to the ticket inspector on-board and at the exit at Kings Cross. I used the Underground app to check my onward connection, and then Google Maps to guide me on foot to my final destination. Oh and there's even WiFi on large parts of the Underground system now courtesy of Virgin Media.

Staff on the Underground have apparently nicknamed the automated voice on their trains 'Sonya'. Because after a while it gets

You may have noticed that if you allowed notifications, and the fact that your smart phone is 'location aware' you will receive offers tailored to where you are at the time. In other words if you go past a pub or restaurant that has an offer on meals, you will immediately get an alert on your screen. Could be handy



Now the serious subject of computer security. Recently I attended the annual Eset conference where we were brought up to date on all the latest and emerging threats. The nastiest of these is a new version of ransomware called 'Jigsaw' - hence the unpleasant

and the threat that you have 72 hours to pay a ransom in order to get a code to release all your files. The really twisted bit of this strain is that for every hour that passes 100 of your files will be deleted, and if you try and escape by turning it off 1,000 of your files will be deleted.

As harsh as it may seem, the best advice however is not to pay the ransom, because your money will most likely disappear and no code will be forthcoming. Or even worse your credit card will be scammed or sold on. The moral of this sorry tale is twofold – have a good recent back up of all your data and ensure you have a good security product installed. Free anti virus products cannot really be relied upon now. The old adage holds true 'you get what you pay for'. Now here comes the sales pitch; is your security worth around 75p per week? Well that's what a year of Eset Smart Security will cost you, and why we have so many safe and happy customers who rely on, and always renew their

In the IT business we're always talking about data. Security of data, preventing data loss, backing up important data. But often when I talk to home users they say 'ah well I don't keep much stuff on my computer'. Let's hold that thought for a moment. 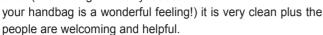

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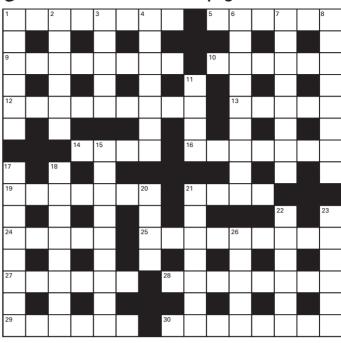

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Pork, chicken & apricot pie

By Martha Collison

• Preparation time: 30 minutes + overnight chilling

• Cooking time: 1 hour 30 minutes

• Total time: 2 hours + overnight chilling. Serves: 10

Ingredients

454g pack essential Waitrose British Pork Sausagemeat

6 rashers back bacon, chopped

1 tsp ground mace

100g lard

10g salt

250g strong plain flour

200g plain flour

350g pack essential Waitrose British Chicken Mini Breast Fillets

200g ready-to-eat dried apricots

1 medium Waitrose British Blacktail Free Range Egg, beaten

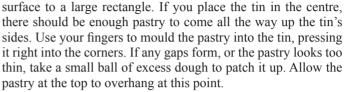
3 leaves gelatine

1 chicken stock cube

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C, gas mark 4 and line a 900g loaf tin with a long strip of baking parchment so the pie is easier to remove later.
- 2. In a large bowl, combine the sausagemeat, bacon and ground mace, then season well with salt and pepper.
- 3. Place the lard and salt into a small pan with 250ml water and heat on medium until the water is boiling and the fat has melted. Meanwhile, weigh the flours into a large bowl. Pour the boiling mixture into the flour and stir until a dough comes together. Turn out onto a floured surface and knead for a few minutes until the dough is smooth. You will need to move quickly here, because as the dough cools it becomes more difficult to work with.
 - 4. Take two-thirds of the dough and roll it out on a floured

- 5. Press half of the sausagemeat mixture into the bottom of the pastry case. Arrange the mini chicken fillets in an even layer over the top, pressing them down firmly to make sure there are no air gaps. Top with the dried apricots in an even layer, followed by the remaining sausagemeat mixture. The loaf tin should be filled to the top.
- 6. Roll out the remaining pastry into a rectangle roughly the same size as the tin, and lay it on the top. Use your fingers to crimp the lid onto the pie, making sure you get a really good seal. Use a sharp knife to trim any excess pastry from the edges and use the handle of a wooden spoon to make a hole right in the middle of the lid to allow steam to escape.
- 7. Brush the top of the pie with beaten egg and bake in the centre of the oven for 1½ hours, or until the pie is golden brown and crisp. If the pastry starts to colour too much, cover it with tin foil and continue to bake so the inside is properly cooked.
- 8. Allow the pie to cool in the tin for around 10 minutes, then carefully lift it out using the strip of baking parchment to help. Move the pie onto a wire rack to cool completely.
- 9. To make the jelly, soak the gelatine leaves in cold water for 5 minutes. Dissolve the stock cube in 200ml boiling water in a small jug, and then stir in the softened gelatine leaves. When they have fully dissolved, slowly and carefully pour the jelly into the hole in the top of the pie. When it is full to the top, refrigerate the pie for a couple of hours (preferably overnight) until completely chilled and set.

Pork loin with apple, sage & pine nut stuffing

Preparation time: 20 minutesCooking time: 1 hour 45 minutes

• Total time: 2 hours 5 minutes. Serves: 4 with leftovers

Ingredients

FOR THE PORK

1.5kg pork loin joint

FOR THE STUFFING

2 free range pork sausages

70g breadcrumbs

1 large dessert apple, unpeeled, coarsely grated

6 sage leaves, finely chopped plus extra for the roasting tin

25g pine nuts, toasted and roughly chopped

4 onions, sliced into thick rounds

500ml dry cider

2 tbsp plain flour

400ml chicken stock





Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C, gas mark 4. Untie the pork and lay it upside down on a board. Using a sharp knife cut down the length of the meat to open it to create a fairly flat surface.
- 2. To make the stuffing, remove the skin from the sausages and place the meat in a bowl and add the breadcrumbs, grated apple, sage, pine nuts and season. Mix together and then shape to fit down the centre of the opened-up pork loin. Fold the meat and skin back over the stuffing and press together to resemble the original shape. Lay seam side down and tie with string at intervals to hold it together.
- 3. Arrange the rounds of onion in the bottom of a roasting tin. Scatter over the remaining sage leaves and sit the pork loin on top, seam side down
- 4. Rub the joint all over with salt and pepper and pour about 300ml of the cider into the bottom of the tin. Place in the oven and roast for 20 minutes per 450g plus an extra 20 minutes, about $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours in all. Make sure the liquid in the bottom of the tin doesn't dry out top up with more cider and water when needed.
- 5. When cooked through with no pink meat, remove the pork from the roasting tin and transfer to a carving board. Cover with foil and leave to rest while you prepare the gravy.
- 6. Place the roasting tin (including the onions) on the hob and bring to a simmer. Sprinkle over the plain flour and beat in with a wooden spoon then gradually pour in the stock and any remaining cider and simmer until you have a thickened gravy. Strain though a sieve into a jug making sure you press through all the juices from the onions. Serve with the slices of pork and stuffing and a Swiss chard gratin.

Crunchy almond & raspberry cake with dark chocolate

• Vegetarian

Preparation time: 10 minutes
Cooking time: 60-65 minutes
Total time: 70-75 minutes. Serves: 8

Ingredients

175g butter, at room temperature
175g golden caster sugar
3 medium Waitrose British Blacktail Free Range Eggs
150g self-raising flour
75g ground almonds
150g Doria Amaretti Biscuits, crumbled
50g dark chocolate, roughly chopped
200g raspberries
Mascarpone or cream, to serve

Method

- 1. Grease and base line a 20cm, loose-bottomed cake tin. Preheat the oven to 160°C, gas mark 3.
- 2. Using electric beaters, whisk together the butter, sugar, eggs, flour and almonds until smooth and creamy. Carefully fold in two-

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thirds each of the biscuits, chocolate and raspberries, and spoon into the prepared tin. Scatter the remaining biscuits, raspberries and chocolate on top.

3. Bake for 60-65 minutes or until risen, golden brown and set. Leave to sit in the tin for 5 minutes then lift out and leave to cool completely. Slice and serve with a spoonful of mascarpone or cream. *Cook's tip* - Any leftovers should be kept in the fridge for up to two days and are delicious served chilled.

WITH ROY WOODCOCK

A wine app called Vivino and some mistakes made by wine drinkers

was in a wine bar in London recently - great place; shelves and shelves of wine with an automated system where you could buy by the glass. Why am I telling you this? Well my son, who'd taken us there, also introduced me to a new wine app, called Vivino, which can be downloaded to your smartphone (Apple or android).

Basically, you can use your phone to take a photo of the wine label, which the app then uses to tell you all about the wine . . . reviews, ratings, average price etc. Brilliant stuff and I find I'm using it all the time to check new wines that I come across on the supermarket shelves.

Even better news, the app is free. It also has lots more, including wine news and advice.

Here, for instance, is their list of the worst mistakes wine drinkers make:

1. Filling your wine glass up to the brim: Wine isn't beer. Just because some wine glasses can fit an entire bottle of wine in them, doesn't mean you'll want to fill your entire glass. It makes for a heavy glass, looks silly and makes the wine difficult to drink and enjoy.

Rather, you'll want to stick to about a 5 ounce pour. This will allow you to swirl and sniff your wine and drink and enjoy your wine with ease.

2. Holding your wine glass by the bowl: Hold your glass by the stem, not the bowl. Your wine glass has a stem for a reason. When you hold your wine glass by the bowl, the body heat from your hand warms the wine up.

Unless you want your wine warmer, stick to the temperature the wine was poured at and hold your glass by the stem. In a room full of wine drinkers, you can always tell who are the experienced wine drinkers by the way they hold their glass.

- **3. Buying wine because of the label:** Simple rules: Don't judge a book by its cover. Don't buy wine because of the label. You won't be so amused with that interesting label if, once opened, you find the wine isn't very good.
- **4. Drinking the same old stuff:** Think you only care for white wines? Think you only care for specific varieties? Think you only care for specific regions? Nonsense. There are over 6 million wines out there, stemming from thousands of different regions and grape varieties. What makes wine fun is the infinite possibilities. You can always find something new and interesting to sip on to explore and enjoy. Don't get trapped into thinking you only like a handful of grapes and regions.
- **5. Sticking to classic wine pairing rules:** There are some traditional rules to pairing wine with food, like pairing red wine with red meat and white wine with seafood. These are guidelines, not absolute rules to live by. Don't always stick to these rules. What makes wine fun is trying new wines, trying new occasions to enjoy wine, and finding new pairings on your own. They're your taste buds; if you like drinking bold reds with light meats, then so be it.
- **6. Drinking too fast:** We're all guilty here. Wine can be so good, sometimes we forget to slow down and learn about the wine. Who makes it? Where is it from? What's going on with this grape variety? What do I like and dislike about this wine? What am I tasting? These are the kinds of questions that help us learn about wine, enjoy it more in the long run, and help us become knowledgeable in wine. Slow down and learn about wine, don't drink it too fast!
- **7. Dissecting wine on the initial pour:** On the other hand, when your server pours you a little splash of wine to make sure it tastes okay before serving the rest of the table, this is supposed to be somewhat quick. Many people think they're supposed to slow down and dissect the wine, talk about it, and tell the waiter whether or not they like it. This is not the point of the initial pour, however. The server simply wants to know if the wine is corked or not, or some other flaw. A quick sip or sniff will do. Taste vinegar or some other flaw? If no, give the server approval to pour the rest of the table. Then you can dissect the wine with the rest of your party.

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Marlo's Journey . . .

Te all have had, at sometime in our lives, a hectic life style, worked long hours or had family commitments which, when all combined, can lead to tiredness. I, for one, can be extremely shattered when getting in from work around 7.30 pm following a 10 hour day (nearly all enjoyable I hasten to add) and all I want to do is eat then bed! I can justify the tiredness but if this feeling extended to day time and included an increase in thirst with possible weight loss and a change in appetite, then maybe a trip to the doctors would be on the cards.

How many of us would notice this in our pets? I would like to think that most pet owners would but its quite reasonable for one or two to think its maybe the change in weather or just an 'off' day their pet is having. This may not be so if the change in character is on going. If its ourselves then a visit to the doctor is made so why any different for our four legged friend? Yes it maybe a false call and your mind will be put at rest but what if???

In humans, the symptoms named above combined with others such as sweet/fruity smelling breath, vomiting and frequent visits to the toilet will be more often then not followed by blood tests taken by the doctor, to be analysed. Diabetes may be one of





the key factors shown. Everyone knows about diabetes but how many of us know what to look out for in our pets?

Diabetes can be classed as either type 1 (lack of insulin production) or type 2 (impaired insulin production along with an inadequate response to the hormone). The most common form of the disease in dogs is type 1, which occurs when the pancreas is incapable in producing or secreting adequate levels of insulin. Type 2 is more centred around the lifestyle of your pet, ie increased fat, poor diet and lack of exercise.

It is thought that female dogs may run a greater risk of developing diabetes later in life, so spaying your dog is recommended as female sex hormones can have an effect on blood sugar levels and stop the insulin from working.

If diabetes is not noticed, it can prove fatal by developing a ketosis state which may lead to coma and death.

Marlo's journey......

Marlo, a little Yorkshire terrier was brought in one day in 2011 by his worried owner, Sheila who noticed he was urinating more and drinking obsessively. After a urine sample and extensive bloods were taken, it showed Marlo was very ill so had to be admitted to the hospital at our KINGSTON, Park Street surgery. He was immediately put on a drip and a regime of insulin injections.

The nurses and duty vet monitored Marlo through the night, looking for any signs of deterioration. Much to the amazement of the day staff, Marlo had made it into the next morning. More bloods were taken and after 4 days of tests and careful monitoring, to the delight of Sheila, Marlo was allowed home. On his discharge appointment, there was one more surprise. Marlo had to be given daily insulin injections for the rest of his life. So pleased that her beloved companion was still here, Sheila was not to be daunted by this and was given lessons on how to inject him. That was 5 years ago, this year!

At the ripe young age of 13, Marlo is enjoying his twilight years of caravan holidays and walks, along side Sheila.

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erosion. Not everyone is suitable for tooth whitening so my advice is not to waste your money on people who know nothing about dentistry or oral health. Rant over, deep breathes. Only kidding, but be careful.



So Will It Work For You?

Tooth whitening works superbly well for so many people and in most situations I see the answer is yes to the above question. It is particularly effective for natural yellowing of teeth and teeth that have darkened through the rigours of daily life including tea and coffee. Whitening will only work on natural tooth and not on crowns, veneers or fillings. It is also very good for mild tetracycline staining (tetracycline is an antibiotic) and mild mottling/staining from

fluorosis (excess fluoride intake during tooth development). Some more intense staining and mottling may not be amenable to straight forward tooth whitening alone. Obviously your teeth need to be in good nick. Trying to do tooth whitening on bad, decayed teeth is a non-starter and may well cause pain and discomfort so is really not a good idea at all. If you have some discoloured fillings and want your natural teeth whiter it might make the filling stand out more. A simple solution is tooth whitening and replacement of the filling or even just to resurface the filling if it is otherwise sound. Simple, yet extremely effective, both visually and in your pocket.

Do You Fancy Some Tooth Blackening?

Has Branfield gone mad? Just keep with me a moment. There is an old custom in Japan for the blackening of teeth by married



women and courtesans as an enhancement of their beauty. The custom, rooted in antiquity, had gradually become proof of the married status of women. Before a new bride entered her husband's home she would visit seven relatives to receive dye and then underwent "the first blackening". The dye was primarily derived from ferric tannate and was applied by a brush made from a crushed twig. The dye would be reapplied as it wore. It was seen that blackened teeth showed evidence that a wife

had sworn eternal fidelity to her spouse. My wife was having nothing of it.

Mind you it's not really a good look is it?

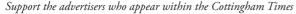

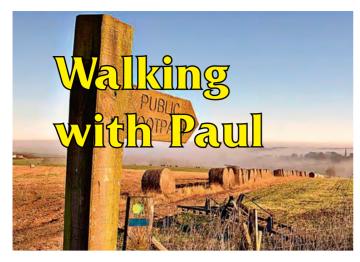

Here is Paul's latest walk in his series of monthly rambles.

This month his destination is North Frodingham

The map is for a general guide only. Please use an Ordnance Survey Map or similar if possible when walking.

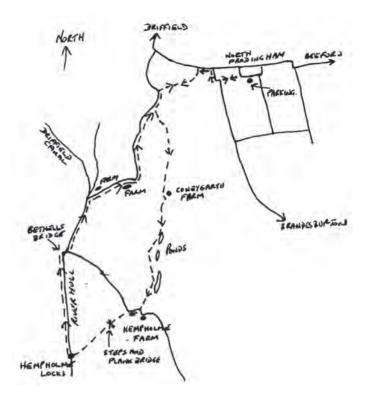
Map:- EXPLORER 295

Start at GR.TA100530 Near the village hall. Distance 6.0 Miles.

eave the village hall and walk in a westerly direction to the sharp right hand bend, continue straight ahead down an enclosed grass path. On emerging on the road, follow



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this road as it swings to the right. At the junction with the main road, turn left passing the Star Inn. Continue along this road until the motor garage on the right and then turn left after passing the last building on the left. Follow this farm track bending slightly to the right until you reach a surfaced lane, turn left on reaching this lane and follow it to a right hand bend. Leave the lane at this point by continuing straight ahead passing a large silver coloured barn on the right.

Follow this path as it zig zags slightly eventually heading for Coneygarth Hill Farm. Cross one stile and pass through three metal gates eventually passing the farm to the left. Continue to a fourth metal gate and then turn right after passing through the gate. Pass a pond on the right and then pass through a wooden kissing gate and walk ahead with a dyke on the left. Pass ponds on the left and pass through two metal gates.

After a short while, walk diagonally to the right climbing gently. At the corner of the field, turn right keeping the hedge on the left and pass through a metal gate on the left. Head diagonally across the next field and pass through a further metal gate and head towards a telegraph pole. This area is very boggy but the aim is to reach a small hand gate on the left to emerge on a surfaced lane leading to Hempholme Farm. On emerging on this lane, turn right and follow this as it turns sharp right, then immediately turn left and pass through a farm yard. After passing through the farm yard, continue walking in the same direction and after a short while descend a short flight of wooden steps to cross a wood plank bridge and then walk diagonally to the left across this field to a post. On reaching a farm track turn left and then after about 50 metres turn right and head towards some distant trees, cross a footbridge and head towards a gantry rig over the river Hull, cross over the locks and turn right and walk along the river bank with the river on the right.

Continue along the river side path to reach Bethells Swing bridge, cross over the bridge and then turn left to continue walking along the river bank with the river now on the left. After a short while cross a stile and continue along the river bank. Just before a fork in the river (junction of the river Hull and Driffield canal) Pass through a metal gate and pass Low Emottland and High Emottland farms to reach a tarmac road. Turn left at the point and follow the road for about ¾ of a mile. After passing the large silver barn on the right which was passed on the outward leg of the walk, retrace the route back to the cars at North Frodingham







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June is a great time to be out in the garden. Many plants are in full bloom at this time of year and the weather (should be) warm and sunny. Keep watering your garden to avoid your plants from wilting. A great way of recycling water and saving money is by using a water butt system that will collect rainwater from summer showers. 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Planting New Roses

For first time rose growers you can chose to grow your rose in a container or plant it straight into the ground. If you chose to plant your rose in a container the plant will benefit from well draining compost and rose fertilisers through out the year.

When planting your rose you will need to prepare the soil. The best way to do this is by adding farmyard manure like horse or chicken manure.

Dig a hole roughly twice the size of the roots and the depth of a spade's blade to allow room for the rose. Add a general fertiliser to the hole to help the roots establish and grow further once planted. To aid the rose over the summer and to avoid drought in summer gently tease out the roots so they can grow out once planted.

Place the rose in the hole and fill with compost making sure that the compost covers the roots completely to avoid future dieback. Water thoroughly.



Aftercare

Over the next two summers you will need to keep the new rose well watered to keep the roots healthy especially over dry spells. Your rose will also benefit from an extra feeding with a general rose fertiliser every spring followed by mulching with bark chips or well rotted manure. Be careful to leave a space around the stem of the rose when you are mulching.

10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Keep weeds at bay by hoeing your borders and beddings regularly.
- 2. Maintain the lawn by mowing it once a week.
- 3. Plant summer bedding.
- Shade your greenhouse to prevent it getting to hot over the summer.
- 5. Be careful not to waste water over the dry months. Conserve water by investing in a water butt or using bath and kitchen water that isn't too dirty.
- Harvest early potatoes, radishes and salad leaves like lettuce.
- 7. Once the sun has ripened them, strawberries should be perfect for harvesting.
- Remove rose flowers as they fade to encourage new flowers.
- 9. Plants like tomatoes, courgettes and celery can be planted outdoors.
- 10. Tie stems of tall growing plants to supports.



Pruning

It is a good idea to prune back your rose in the first winter after planting, and then in late winter to early spring thereafter. With all roses you will need to remove dead, damaged and weak growths. Pruning then depends on the variety in your garden.

Climbing or rambling roses need to be pruned back to around 30-40 cm away from the base.

Large flowered varieties are best pruned back to 10-15cm away from the base of the plant.

For cluster flowered varieties prune back long stems to about 15cm away from the base.

Avoid pruning the remaining long stems on shrub roses.



Plant of the Month: Roses

The rose is our plant of the month. They are grown for their spectacular and iconic flowers. They are favourite around the world and often used as a token for love. Roses also make excellent gifts for special occasions with variety names like 'Ruby Wedding' and 'Special Anniversary'.

"All the roses will grow well in this area as we have water retentive soil," says John Meikle, the Coletta & Tyson horticultural manager. "If you dig in organic manure and plant the rose with bone meal and rose tree and shrub planting compost, keep well watered and spray regularly for pest and diseases your roses should do very well."

Roses like to be positioned in full sun where they are not competing for root space larger shrubs and trees. Keep them well watered but avoid drenching the leaves to avoid burning in the summer. If they are allowed to dry out the rose becomes more susceptible to disease and pests.

Feed your roses regularly in the growing season from spring to summer with organic fertilisers to help flower production.

The first was a classical design in an urn using lots of different greenery some of which had tints of white including Soloman Seal and Cotton and all white lillies. The second was arranged in a large white tall flat container using a mixture of hosta, viburnum and rhododendron leaves and pink cherry blossom, lillies and roses all loosely arranged to give the arrangement in Craig's words a "frivolous" feel.

The third was in a gorgeous blue large urn using blue dyed palm husks to form a modern version of a Hogarth curve. Craig said his inspiration was the blousiness of the Peony. After putting in foliage the arrangement was filled with peonies, roses and orchids in all shades of pink and peach and was stunning.

The fourth was quite tropical and bold using a dried palm tree husk flowing down and green palm leaves across the top so it looked like a palm tree blowing in the wind on a beach. This was filled with varies shades of pink anthuriums, gloriosa etc and was bolt and densely filled. The fifth was totally different and saw bleached tall white mitsumata branches in an ark shapes container. This was filled lower down with blue iris on mass and around the bottom ice blue hydrangea heads to striking effect.

Craig told us all about the Wode plant and dyeing material to Wode blue, telling us he has dyed his shirt very successfully and the drape used with the arrangement.

The final arrangement was on a disc with a shallow basket on one side and filled on the other with all shades of yellow flowers including lillies, euphorbia, small sunflowers, roses and gerbera -showing tints, tones and shades in 1 colour.

We all had a wonderful evening with a demonstration by a fabulous flower arranger, and watching and listening to him you can understand how he is in demand around the world – we were so lucky to see him at our Club. We have an evening out in June around 4 gardens in Little Weighton followed by a meal, so the next demonstration at North Ferriby Village Hall is on Thursday 14th July when we welcome John Thexton from Cumbria with his title being "Shop Full of Summer". Give them time to work at their speed. Reward each try. Create good memories because there will always be another journey another day.



Allow them to leave for a little while if they feel the need to. They will be computing what has just gone before. Reward them heavily for coming back into attention to you and the task ahead.



Never try to close the horse in until it reaches the point where it will stand at the front open door and not feel the need to leave. Never stop them if they need to go back out. Just repeat the ask again with reward. Provide great enrichment and give them time to compute the process used.....nothing but good things.

Train it all regularly until your horse feels safe, calm and that the whole experience is rewarding. The end game would be a horse who loads himself into a closed trailer or wagon with confidence and great expectation. It is all done one step at a time!



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Travel in - but make sure it's safe

People booking luxury private hire cars to get them to and from events in style this summer still need to make sure they are licensed correctly.

There is a growing trend for booking luxury cars such as Mercedes, Porsches and Rolls Royces for race days, proms, special events and airport runs but operators still have to adhere to the same licensing rules and standards as those who offer private hire, stretch limousines and novelty vehicles for hire.

Operating any private hire vehicle without the correct license is a criminal offence with rogue operators facing a maximum fine of £1,000 while operating or driving without the required license may also invalidate any insurance.

Councillor Shaun Horton, portfolio holder for community involvement and local partnerships at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "Our message is don't swap style for safety.

"We have seen an increase in the number of people booking luxury cars to take them to events but people need to check these vehicles are licensed and the driver is safe and fully vetted.

"Many people carry out their own checks on stretch limousines and novelty vehicles but these luxury cars are no different.

"There are a number of different licenses available for different types of vehicles but the key question to ask when making bookings is 'what type of license do you hold and can I see a copy?'

"Remember, an unlicensed vehicle could very easily be an unsafe vehicle or be uninsured."

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Otago - Strength and balance exercise for falls prevention

The Facts about falls

As we get older the facts are that we are more prone to falls. Falls can have a catastrophic affect on individuals.

After a fall, an older person has a 50% probability of having their mobility seriously impaired.

Falls destroy confidence, increase isolation and reduce independence, with around 1 in 10 older people who fall becoming afraid to leave their homes in case they fall again.

Tips for preventing falls in the home

Most people may not believe they are at risk of falls in their own home. Rugs around the home can be the highest risk and the most difficult items to persuade someone to move or part with!

However, there are some practical things that can be done to help avoid falls:

- using non slip mats or rugs. Better still remove mats/rugs altogether!
- · cleaning up spillages immediately
- think about de-cluttering to make moving around the home easier. This may include furniture that isn't used any longer. Call it 'downsizing'!
- ensure there are no trailing wires adequate lighting. Insufficient lighting and poor eyesight increases the risk of falls
- wearing well-fitting footwear that are in good condition, especially slippers. Not walking around the house in socks or tights.
- keeping feet in good condition. Nail trimming. Seeing a foot health practitioner if required.

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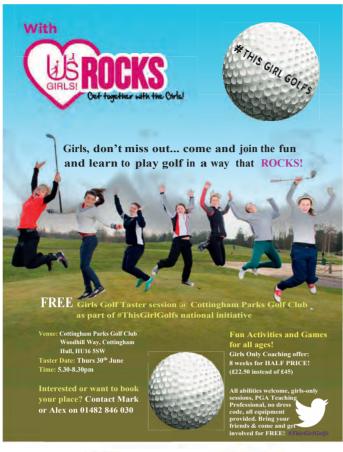

The members and volunteers had a wonderful time with the hall decked in Union Jack bunting and members singing and waving Union Jack flags, in an traditional party atmosphere.

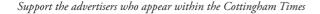




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Council warning over illegal dog breeders

People looking for a new puppy or dog are being urged to do their homework and make sure they buy from a reputable and licensed breeder.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council's licensing team is currently investigating five allegations of illegal breeding and is warning people to be aware of the dangers of buying a puppy or a dog from someone who is not licensed or may be from a puppy farm.

Anyone breeding dogs as a business – selling two or more litters in a year is considered to be a business – and the council enforces dog breeding legislation to protect the welfare of dogs used for breeding by setting standards relating to issues such as accommodation, food, water, bedding disease control as well as limiting the number of litters a female can have.

Unlicensed breeders may illegally import puppies into the UK and they are often sold online or via newspaper adverts or in car parks.

They can often be accompanied by incomplete or forged documents that lead the buyer to think the dog has been imported legally. Before buying a puppy the council advises people to:

- check the puppy has been vaccinated but to also be aware that vaccination cards are easy to fake if the vet's contact details are not visible or has a non-UK address the card may be false
- ask to see a pet passport imported puppies must have a pet passport or a vet's certificate confirming it is microchipped, vaccinated against rabies, treated for worms and was over three months and 21 days when it was imported
 - ask to see the puppy with its mother
- ask to see the father too, or at least a photo of the father be suspicious if the breeder cannot show you the mother or father pedigree certificates are not a guarantee for the condition of the dog and may not even mean the puppy is pedigree people should contact The Kennel Club for details of accredited breeder schemes.

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- ask to see a pet passport imported puppies must have a pet passport or a vet's certificate confirming it is microchipped, vaccinated against rabies, treated for worms and was over three months and 21 days when it was imported
 - ask to see the puppy with its mother
- ask to see the father too, or at least a photo of the father be suspicious if the breeder cannot show you the mother or father pedigree certificates are not a guarantee for the condition of the dog and may not even mean the puppy is pedigree – people should contact The Kennel Club for details of accredited breeder schemes.

Councillor Shaun Horton, portfolio holder for community involvement and local partnerships at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "Anyone thinking of buying a puppy or a dog should check the legitimacy of the breeder.

"Dog breeding can be a lucrative business and those unlicensed breeders who aim to make money will often cut corners and sacrifice animal welfare.

"The law on dog breeding is very clear and is in place for two key reasons – to ensure a high standard of welfare for animals and to give peace of mind to members of the public that they are buying from a reputable breeder.

"Any breeders found operating without a license are committing a criminal offence and could face prosecution or a fine."

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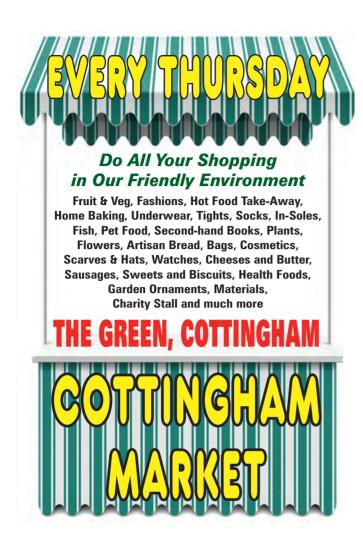

Eyes Hurt at the Computer? Eye Strain at the Computer? - Five Keys To Saving Your Eyesight

If you spend any length of time in front of a computer, you've probably experienced some form of eye strain, vision headaches or other stress in your visual system.

And you're not alone, upwards of 8 out of 10 computer users report some type of eye strain at the computer. The problem is so prevalent it's been given a name: Computer Vision Syndrome (CVS).

The symptoms of Computer Vision Syndrome include:

- eyes hurting or over-tired
- eyes burning or itching
- · dry, or watery, eyes
- double vision
- blurry eyesight (either at the computer or in the distance)
- the need for glasses for the first time
- the need for stronger prescriptions
- headaches, neck, shoulder and back tension
- increased sensitivity to light

Using a computer does place a unique set of demands on your eyes. But it's not inevitable for your eyes to hurt at the computer, or for you to experience eye strain at the computer, once you know how to use your eyes correctly for the task, and what to do at the first sign of tension or fatigue.

Saving your eyesight at the computer can be as simple as being aware of your vision in a new way. Knowing visual ergonomics and the simple keys to healthy computing should go a long way to alleviating the symptoms of Computer Vision Syndrome.

Here are five keys to taking care of your eyes at the computer.

1. Fit your set up to you:

- Set up your computer so that you can look beyond the screen. If at all possible, don't be in the corner, or face a wall.
 - Sit directly in front of computer, not off to one side or the other.
 - Sit 18-24 inches away from the screen
- Sit high enough so that your line of sight is level with or higher than the top of the screen
- Keep your wrists level with or below your elbows. Never bend your wrists up when typing
- Your knees should be below the level of your hips
- Place your feet on the floor. Use a footrest if your feet don't reach he floor.

2. Look away from the screen regularly.

Focusing on an object far away, such as the water cooler down the hall or a tree outdoors, is a simple stretching exercise for eye muscles. Quickly shift your focus from near to far 3-4 times.

A brief look into the distance every 2 to 3 minutes prevents the build-up of visual stress and discomfort and keeps your eyes healthy and active

These frequent micro-breaks offer much more relief to your eyes than an hourly break. A break every hour - however long it might be - does not provide all the relief and rest that your eyes need. Micro-breaks are more effective and beneficial.

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
