I can actually report that we will be opening five days a week. When this will happen and what the exact hours will be is yet to be determined. Grants to Local Organisations (including new small grants)

Cottingham Parish Council may award grants to any community groups or charitable organisations that are beneficial to the village. If you belong to an organisation and wish to apply for grant funding from the Parish Council, then in the first instance, please contact the Parish Council Office for more information and an application form. Please note that there are criteria elements to this form that need to be taken into consideration. All application forms received are decided upon at the next scheduled Finance & Asset Management Committee Meeting. The next meeting of the committee is **Tuesday 10**th **July 2018**.

At our meeting in May a grant was given to the Cottingham Village Trust.

As well as individual grants, the Parish Council donates money received through the sale of dog waste bags. For the 2017/2018 financial year the money will be given to Cottingham Wild Spaces and for the 2018/2019 financial year the money will be given to the Cottingham Village Trust. The charge for the bags remains at 50p per pack (each pack containing 50 bags) and is limited to 2 packs per person per month.

Small Grants

The Parish Council have recently decided that small grants (up to £50) will be made available via

a streamlined process without having to complete a full grant application form or waiting until the next Finance & Asset Management Committee meeting for a decision. Under normal circumstances a grant can only be given to an organisation but in certain circumstances they can be given to individuals i.e. if the grant relates to something in our remit such as littler collection, so please feel free to enquire. Any grant given must be for the benefit of the village.

Noticeboards.

The Parish Council operates a number of noticeboards throughout the village. Normally you would have to ask us to place any notices in the boards, however, we have recently had the noticeboard near to the Co-op store altered so that it can be opened without keys. We also hope to install a new noticeboard onto the back of the bus shelter in Market Green. This too will be accessible to the public without keys.

. Memorial Gardens, bunting, and village flowers.

The mural in the Memorial Gardens in now complete and I hope residents of the village are as pleased with it as the Parish Council is. If you have not seen it I would highly recommend that you pay a visit.

The mural is part of the Parish Councils ongoing aim to improve the look of the village, you may have also noticed the bunting that has gone up in King Street and Hallgate. Likewise the village flowers will soon be planted up for the summer season.

Cottingham Day, Sunday 1st July

After a break last year, Cottingham Day is returning on Sunday 1st July with a childrens' fairground on Grandads Park, a market on King Street/Market Green, a craft market inside the Civic Hall, and live music performances on Market Green with more to be announced as we get closer to the day

BEWARE THE BEAR TRAPS OF BARE TRUSTS

Bare trusts are one of the simplest types of trusts. Clients often call them "bear trusts" but the correct spelling is "bare trust". These are effectively a nominee arrangement whereby one person (the trustee) holds assets on behalf of another person (the beneficial owner).

Bare trusts are normally used to hold assets on behalf of people under the age of 18 because they cannot legally own assets such as shares or property.

The simplest type of bare trust is where a grandparent opens a bank or building society account on behalf of their grandchild. Such accounts are often opened in the name of the grandparent and designated with the grandchild's name, e.g. "William Smith a/c Emily Smith".

For shareholdings, the beneficiary's initials often appear after the trustee's name, e.g. "William Smith a/c ES".

Sometimes, clients draft a formal declaration of trust to show that they have given away the beneficial ownership of the assets. This might be done for tax purposes.

Bare trusts can be useful for tax purposes. Any income is treated as belonging to the beneficiary, so that they can utilise their personal allowance of £11,850. The exception is where a parent creates a bare trust for their minor child, where any income in excess of £100 is taxed on the parent.

Any capital gains are taxed on the beneficiary, so that they can utilise their annual exemption of £11,700. This can be useful where the bare trust holds shares. The CGT allowance also applies where a parent sets up the trust.

For Inheritance Tax purposes, the transfer of assets is a potentially exempt transfer, so that after 7 years the assets no longer form part of the donor's estate. The assets transferred will form part of the beneficiary's estate for IHT purposes as soon as the trust is set up.

There are some pitfalls. First, the beneficiary will become entitled to the trust assets at age 18. This can cause problems if a large amount of money is put into the trust. Also, if the beneficiary should die during the donor's lifetime, then the assets will revert back to the donor's estate, which could negate any IHT advantages. For these reasons, some clients may prefer to create other types of trust.

GDPR and less junk mail, or maybe not?

■ DPR - short for the EU General Data Protection Regulation, came into force recently. This is a major shake-up in the way that personal data is collected, stored and processed. It affects all of us. Prior to 28th May you will probably have received lots of emails from organisations asking you to re-subscribe to their mailing lists. The reason is that under the GDPR it will be unlawful to keep sending emails to customers unless they have categorically agreed to receive them. In the past it has become accepted practice that organisations assume your approval to receive marketing communications by some pre-ticked box on a web page. So, if you haven't re-subscribed then you will certainly be receiving less marketing stuff in your inbox. The bad news is that on the other side of the fence, the hackers and spammers of this world flout the law anyway, so they will just keep sending out all the junk mail regardless!

But email is just a small part of this new regulation. More important is the way that our personal data is used, and this can mean everything from name, address, telephone number and email, to financial data. Every organization no matter how big or small, that keeps customer records has to have a policy in place to explain why they keep data, ensure that it is stored securely and not processed unnecessarily or passed on, without prior consent. Customers also have the right to ask what information is being held about them, and if they so wish can demand that their details be deleted, provided of course there is no ongoing binding agreement in force such as finance etc. It is worth adding that even though this is an EU regulation, the UK will still be bound by it when we leave! Junk email aka spam has of course been an annoying part of our online existence for many years. As mentioned above

with new schemes and scams. So, don't agree to anything unless you are sure it is from a reputable organisation that you trust. And conversely don't click an 'unsubscribe' link from any organization you don't recognize, because if it is from a scammer it will just alert them that yours is a live email address. Windows 10 April Update - yes I know this might seem a bit late, but this big update was delayed and has been rolling out to computers all over the world ever since. As usual with these big releases, like the Creators Update a while ago, it has not been without a few glitches, so watch out for this one. Not that you can do a lot about it as the update process is now fully automated and cannot be turned off! Also, after this update you will be presented with some screens relating to data privacy such as using voice and diagnostic data, to which you have to agree or disagree. ESET also has a program update available for most users, so if you see a notification from Eset popping up advising you to update to the latest version, it is safe to do so.

So, whenever you start to install a program or sometimes an update, you will be presented with that familiar, but somewhat worrying message, that says a certain program wants to make changes to your computer, do you agree? To which of course you have to agree, unless you were not installing anything or don't recognise the program.

Smart socks send data to your Physio :- } Meanwhile over on the BBC Click website, this is one of the news headlines, which seems wacky but has a distinct medical purpose!

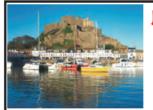

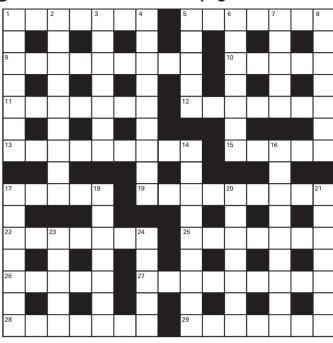

WITH ROY WOODCOCK

Wine from God's own Country

s a passionate advocate of English wine I make no apologies for returning to the subject again; a recent wine tasting organised by the outgoing Mayor of Beverley as the last charity event of her year in office, allowed me to catch up with all the news from one of two thriving vineyards here in

The evening, hosted by Councillor Ann Willis and held in The Guildhall in Beverley, saw us tasting the current six wines that make up the Laurel Vines collection - five whites and a rose.

It's still a surprise to many people that just seven miles from the centre of Beverley is a thriving vineyard and winery and one that is currently getting a lot of national acclaim (the other local one is the Little Wold Vineyard at South Cave).

Laurel Vines, based in Aike, between Beverley and Driffield, is a family business run by Ian and Ann Sargent and their daughter Rebekah and Rebekah's partner Jonathan, along with Ian's brother, Neil. Although there are around 700 vineyards in the UK (mainly in the south), Laurel Vines is among a fairly

select number that also make their own wines on site as well as grow the grapes

The first vines were only planted in 2011 but since the first wines were bottled four years ago Laurel Vines has been garnering national acclaim with three bronzes at the UK Wine Awards; two in the English Independent Wine Awards; and last year carried off the title Best Wine Maker and Grower of the Year for the North of England.

Rebekah is the company's sales manager and passionate to spread the word about the family business. "We have lived in Aike for 20 years; it's a lovely village to grow up in and I can't imagine living anywhere else," Rebekah told me. "My dad runs a successful electrical business in Hull but around 15 years ago decided he wanted to make wine. He wasn't an expert by any means, but enjoyed drinking it!

"He bought some land at nearby Laurel Farm (hence the name) and just took it from there - we've learned as we went along and have since acquired some more land," she said. "We currently have 9,000 vines planted and will have planted another 2,800 by the end of this month, making us the biggest vineyard in East Yorkshire.

Whether by accident or design the decision to buy the land at Aike has proved fortuitous - it's south facing, so getting plenty of sun, and predominantly heavy loam with chalk underneath that helps with

"It's a perfect location - a little bit of France in East Yorkshire," Rebekah told the attentive audience at

The six wines we tasted and which make up the current portfolio started with Ortega, made with 100 pert cent grapes of the same name. It's medium dry, delicately creamy with a fruity nose. Grassy and crisp, it's 11 per cent alcohol by volume with a hint of asparagus on the palate - a good wine to partner summer salads.

All Laurel Vines wines are single varietals named after the grapes they are made from and next up was Phoenix, a touch paler than Ortega but once again a medium dry white wine with slightly more alcohol (12 per cent) and perhaps the vineyard's closest example to a Sauvignon Blanc. I detected tastes of fresh ripe fruit and we agreed this would be best served with savoury dishes and salads.

Two down and four to go . . . the third wine was a dry white, Seyval Blanc, a French grape variety that was citrus on the nose and delivering intense fruity flavours. A fairly light wine, it proved very quaffable and with only 10 per cent alcohol by volume I can imagine this being the perfect accompaniment to an al fresco dining afternoon.

Surprisingly, for a drier tasting wine, this one did deliver a slight sweetness on the finish.

Our fourth wine, a bronze award winner, was Solaris and probably my favourite of the whole evening. Asparagus notes on the nose and a fresh fruity palate, this dry white would be great on its own or as an aperitif but would also make a great partner for spicy dishes.

The final white wine tasted was the pale, straw-coloured Madeleine Angevine - a white grape variety from the Loire Valley that's also popular in Germany, making an attractive fruity wine with a flowery nose - crisp and dry and pairing particularly well with seafoods such as crab and oyster.

The last wine of the night, a rose wine called Rondo, was for most people the star of the show; a bright raspberry red in colour but a wine full of strawberry notes with a touch of creaminess thrown in - a bit like drinking strawberries and cream one of my fellow guests commented.

I can definitely see why this is a popular wine, but perhaps a tad too sweet for me!

The Laurel Vines story continues to gather apace and Rebekah told us the next year will see their first red wine introduced and also their first Champagne-Style fizz.

Currently stocked by some of the area's best restaurants, including Cerutti 2 in Beverley, the Pipe and Glass in South Dalton and 1884 Dock Street Kitchen in Hull, Laurel Vines wines have to battle the same problem as all other English wines - price. Because of the duty levied by the British Government (roughly £2.50 per bottle as opposed to pence by French producers) the average supermarket price is likely to be pounds higher than the overseas wines we are more used to buying - around £12 per bottle.

But believe me, it is worth seeking out. And the good news is it can be bought direct from the supplier at £9 a bottle - just place your order and collect on site. Or it can be delivered.

Phew!!

Not many I can imagine. It is just so nice to go out on an evening after work, knowing that the balmy evenings will linger on to almost 10pm. Plenty of time to walk our pets. Dogs do love a good frisbee throw in the park, a fast game of fetch in the garden or a romp on the beach. They seem happy, dashing around with tongue lolling and slobber dripping and many dog owners figure their dog will know when to stop. But that's not the case. Dogs are so are excitable and very playful. They just keep on going and often don't feel the effects of overheating until it is too late. We must take that responsibility and know when enough is enough, allow the dog to rest and offer plenty of cool water.

Dogs also like to go along on car rides but they should NEVER be left inside a parked car. Even in weather that seems cool, a vehicle can quickly become a deadly 'green house'. Did you know that on an 85 degree day, it takes only 10 minutes for the interior of your parked car to climb to 102 degrees? In half an hour, it can reach 120 degrees. Leaving windows partially open does help to cool things down inside the vehicle BUT it just is not enough. To make matters worse, dogs have a higher body temperature than people and they don't cool down as efficiently as we do. The car body is designed more for insulation from the cold than for cooling down.

We have sweat glands all over our body, but our dogs are confined to their nose and the pads on their feet. A dog that is hot can only normalize their body temperature through panting. This doesn't get the job done under extreme conditions and because they do not sweat, are actually at higher risk of heat stroke than humans, who perspire over most of their body.

Panting, quickly passes air through the moist tissues of the dogs mouth and cools it, much like a breeze on a sweaty face cools a human. This is a form of evaporative cooling and that's where most of the slobber comes from in a panting dog. If a dog begins to get too hot, their breathing increases to panting but when their body heat climbs faster than the panting system's ability to cool itself, heat stroke becomes a threat.

So what are some of the signs of our pets overheating?

- 1. Profuse and rapid breathing
- 2. Bright red tongue
- 3. Thick drooling saliva
- 4. Wide eyes with glassy look and lack of coordination
- 5. Vomiting and diarrhoea

If you think your pet is suffering from heatstroke, you need to take IMMEDIATE action as well as contacting your vets.

- 1. Move them immediately to a cool area either shade or preferable air conditioned area
- 2. Are they conscious and panting? If so, offer them small amounts of water to drink but never put water in a dogs mouth which can't swallow on its own.
- 3. Place cold wet towels over their body, remove quickly and re-cool with wet towels.
- 4. Turn a fan on them. It will speed up the cooling process.

Cats are also susceptible to heat stroke. As well as the above points, you may also look out for:

- 1. Restlessness to find a cool spot, plus staggering.
- 2. Vomiting/Lethargy.
- 3. Place cold wet towels over their body, remove quickly and re-cool with wet towels.
- 4. Turn a fan on them. It will speed up the cooling process.

Once again, if you think your cat is suffering from early stages of heat stroke, the same IMMEDIATE action must be taken, as in our canine friends.

It is critical to your pets health to cease all measures as soon as it becomes apparent that treatment is working. Their body temperature will continue to drop after the treatment stops, and then they will become in danger of it becoming too low.

Now what can we do to help prevent all the above happening? Most of it is common sense! Take for instance our canine friend being left in a car, as described previously. Would we sit in a tin can, wearing a fur coat in 90 degrees heat? No!

- 1. Always make sure plenty of fresh clean water is available at all times.
- 2. A clean coat can help prevent summer skin problems, so keep your dog/cat well groomed. Give your dog a shorter hair cut, but do not shave down to the skin as this robs him or protection from the sun. A cat should be brushed frequently to keep their coat tangle free.
- 3. Exercise only in the coolest parts of the day, but do not overdo exercise or play sessions.
- 4. In extremely hot weather, don't leave your dog standing on the street and keep walks to a minimum. His paws can burn since they are not protected by shoes so the jumping around is not them being impatient but their pads are melting.
- 5. Please be sensitive to old and overweight animals in hot weather plus those with heart or lung diseases should be kept indoors as much as possible.
- 6. Always provide shelter if outside, or bring your pet inside during the heat of the day, and let them rest in a cool part of your house.
- 7. As for rabbits, you could always spray their ears with cool water. Please avoid soaking the full body, this is because thick wet fur may encourage FLY-STRIKE (a condition where blue bottles lay their eggs, then maggots hatch out and feed off the rabbits skin.)
- 8. Give frozen treats take bananas or apples and cut into chunks and freeze. For many rabbits this equates to an ice cream in the heat, they love it!
- 9. Rabbits hutches should always have a cool, shady spot. You can also freeze plastic bottles of water to pop in the hutch for the rabbits to lie against. My rabbits love this.

Please also do not forget to apply sun screen to the tips of the ears and noses of your pets if they have white fur. Unlike other coloured coats, pets with white fur have a thinning of hair on these areas so are susceptible to sun burn and later on skin cancer (just like in humans) as I sadly found out with my white cat, Bisley. He had the top of his ear removed after skin cancer was diagnosed due to being a sun worshipper.

If you do happen to find your pet in the above situations, please seek IMMEDIATE MEDICAL attention.

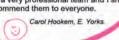

The Less Obvious Stuff

Sleep medicine and airway medicine is the up and coming thing. It was highlighted on the TV just this week about how many more people are experiencing poor sleep and are constantly tired during the day. I was horrified to see that loads of school kids had to have caffeine before school, as they were so tired. Now this is a different thing to do with mobile phones taken to bed and blue light.



There is a condition called Upper

Airway Resistance Syndrome. This is when the upper airway collapses causing resistance to airflow. OSA is the extreme, snoring we all know about, but it can be less obvious and affect many of us. Some snorers sleep great. Lucky so and so. This is thought to be because the sensors at the back of the throat have been beaten up that much by vibration that they no longer fire and wake you up with a snore. Now for people that do not snore or only really snore after alcohol these sensors can be stimulated when you get close to a snore and airway is about to collapse and you wake up for no apparent reason. This is a so-called arousal from sleep. It can interrupt the normal cycle of sleep and disturb hormone balance. This can cause tiredness as well a load of other stuff that will list in a bit. When the airway collapses a bit it can create a negative pressure that can suck up fine droplets of acid from the stomach that can reach the throat and nose and even the sinus. This is different to heartburn or Gastro Esophogeal Reflux Disease (GERD). It is called Laryngo Pharyngeal Reflux Disease (LPRD) and can lead to symptoms of post-nasal drip, sore throat, cough, and even chronic sinusitis. This can go hand in hand with a poor night's sleep. If you



are interested a great book is Sleep Interrupted by Steven Y. Park, M.D. (an ENT specialist who came across this paradigm shift in thinking how we treat some common ailments by getting to the cause, i.e. the airway). According to Dr. Park this is a list of some of the ailments/symptoms that UARS can be associated with but limited to: the nasal stuff mentioned above, hoarseness, throat clearing, teeth grinding/clenching Tempero-Mandibular Dysfunction

(TMD), heartburn (GERD), cold hands, postural hypotension (dizzy when stand up quickly), depression and anxiety, migraine headaches, chronic fatigue syndrome, and weight gain (which compounds the situation. He even feels that ADHD (Attention Deficit Hyper-activity Disorder) is associated with UARS. It's all interesting stuff. Or is it just me? Some top tips next time as run out of space today. I was on a role, eh?

Warning to take care when choosing where to board your pet dog

og owners across the East Riding looking for day care or boarding facilities should take the time to check to make sure individuals or businesses they are using are licensed and insured.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Licensing Team has seen an increase in the number of adverts for home boarding or day care provision which may seem an appealing option for dog owners who do not wish to put their pets in a kennel environment.

In addition, some dog kennels which were previously licensed no longer hold a licence to trade with the council so they should not be taking dogs in from customers as it is unlawful to do so.

Licensing officers are warning that while the majority of

individuals and businesses are legitimate and have the correct license and insurance, some may not and they are urging owners to check the details to make sure their beloved pet will be in a safe environment whilst they enjoy their holidays or a weekend break away.

Louise Attwood, interim licensing manager at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "Our simple message to dog owners is, don't leave your pet anywhere that doesn't hold a licence issued by East Riding of Yorkshire Council, always ask to see it or contact us to find out if they are licensed.

"We are supportive of small businesses and new business initiatives; however we recognise that locally there has been an increase in the provision of home and day care boarding facilities for dogs and not all seek licences from the council.

"We know there are a lot of responsible dog boarders in the East Riding operating lawfully, providing a valuable and caring service.

"We need to address those individuals operating unlawfully, for a profit, with little regard to the safety and welfare of those pets living temporarily in their private homes or kennels.

"If you place your beloved pet during the day or overnight with a boarding kennel, stranger, friend or relative for payment, please check whether the home or kennels are licensed to provide that service and that your pet will be safe.

"If it is not licensed, you could be putting your pet at risk and should anything go wrong your pet is unlikely to be covered for insurance purposes."

Anyone who has information relating to any unlicensed activity of dog boarding should contact the licensing team at East Riding of Yorkshire Council at licensing@eastriding.gov.uk.

A public register of those premises and individuals licensed to board dogs can be found on the council's website at www.eastriding.gov.uk.

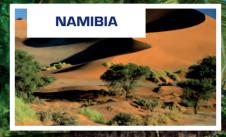

June is a great time to be out in the garden. Many plants are in full bloom at this time of year and the weather (should be) warm and sunny. Keep watering your garden to avoid your plants from wilting. A great way of recycling water and saving money is by using a water butt system that will collect rainwater from summer showers. Planting New Roses

For first time rose growers you can chose to grow your rose in a container or plant it straight into the ground. If you chose to plant your rose in a container the plant will benefit from well draining compost and rose fertilisers through out the year.

When planting your rose you will need to prepare the soil. The best way to do this is by adding farmyard manure like horse or chicken manure.

Dig a hole roughly twice the size of the roots and the depth of a spade's blade to allow room for the rose. Add a general fertiliser to the hole to help the roots establish and grow further once planted. To aid the rose over the summer and to avoid drought in summer gently tease out the roots so they can grow out once planted.

Place the rose in the hole and fill with compost making sure that the compost covers the roots completely to avoid future dieback. Water thoroughly.



10 Jobs for this month

- Keep weeds at bay by hoeing your borders and beddings regularly.
- 2. Maintain the lawn by mowing it once a week.
- 3. Plant summer bedding.
- 4. Shade your greenhouse to prevent it getting to hot over the summer.
- 5. Be careful not to waste water over the dry months. Conserve water by investing in a water butt or using bath and kitchen water that isn't too dirty.
- Harvest early potatoes, radishes and salad leaves like lettuce.
- Once the sun has ripened them, strawberries should be perfect for harvesting.
- Remove rose flowers as they fade to encourage new flowers.
- Plants like tomatoes, courgettes and celery can be planted outdoors.
- 10. Tie stems of tall growing plants to supports.



Aftercare

Over the next two summers you will need to keep the new rose well watered to keep the roots healthy especially over dry spells. Your rose will also benefit from an extra feeding with a general rose fertiliser every spring followed by mulching with bark chips or well rotted manure. Be careful to leave a space around the stem of the rose when you are mulching.

Pruning

It is a good idea to prune back your rose in the first winter after planting, and then in late winter to early spring thereafter. With all roses you will need to remove dead, damaged and weak growths. Pruning then depends on the variety in your garden.

- Climbing or rambling roses need to be pruned back to around 30-40 cm away from the base.
- Large flowered varieties are best pruned back to 10-15cm away from the base of the plant.
- For cluster flowered varieties prune back long stems to about 15cm away from the base.
- Avoid pruning the remaining long stems on shrub roses.
 With all roses you will need to remove dead, damaged and weak growths. Pruning then depends on the variety in your garden.
- Climbing or rambling roses need to be pruned back to around 30-40 cm away from the base.
- Large flowered varieties are best pruned back to 10-15cm away from the base of the plant.

Grow Your Own: June

- **Peas:** are a trouble free crop that enjoy cooler weather. Sow them directly into the ground from March to June and look forward to the incredible sweet flavour of fresh picked peas from June to August. All they require is support for their stems simply erect some chicken wire or netting between supports at each end of the row. You'll be amazed at how good fresh peas taste and the more that you pick them, the more they produce!
- **Broad Beans:** What could be simpler! Sow Broad Beans in spring in small 7.5cm (3") pots of compost, and within a few weeks these quick growing beans will make sturdy plants that can be planted out in the garden. If that sounds like too much work then sow them directly in the ground. Watch the bees pollinate their pretty flowers and before you know it you will be harvesting a bumper crop of fresh picked beans from June onwards, with a flavour that puts supermarket beans to shame.

Flat rate expenses - a good idea or not?

ince 2013 businesses have been allowed to use simplified deductions for motor (and other) expenses, to work out their taxable profits. Does this sound like it might suit you? But could you lose tax relief by making the switch?

Flat rate or simplified?

It's five years since flat rate tax deductions were introduced. Their proper title is simplified expenses, but in practice using them doesn't actually simplify anything, but on the plus side they can be tax efficient. Only unincorporated businesses, i.e. sole traders and business partners, can use them, but not if a company is a member of the partnership

Which expenses?

Simplified expenses can be used for costs you incur in:

- working from home
- living on your business premises, e.g. in a guest house, nursing
- motor expenses for cars, vans and motorbikes.

We'll concentrate on motor expenses here.

How much can you claim?

Calculating the motor expenses is the easy part of using the simplified deduction. It involves multiplying the number of business miles travelled by a mileage rate. For cars and vans it's 45p per mile for the first 10,000 miles and 25p for each additional mile. For motorbikes, it's a straight 24p per mile for all mileage.

Relevant costs

The deduction covers all purchase and running costs of the vehicle from the time it's first used for the business to the time it ceases to be

Tip. Expenses relating to a business journey rather than a vehicle, e.g. tolls and parking but not fuel, can be deducted in addition to the flat rate. Don't record them in your books as motor expenses as it's then easy to overlook them. Record them with your other travel expenses.

Trap 1. Flat rates can only be used for vehicles where you haven't claimed capital allowances (CAs), i.e. a tax deduction for the cost of a vehicle. If you've claimed CAs, you'll have to wait until you stop using the existing vehicle to switch to simplified expenses. Once you start you must continue using the flat rate until you stop using the vehicle in your business.

Trap 2. Using simplified expenses doesn't mean you can stop keeping records of your actual motor expenses. Strictly, your business accounts should still show these. Lending and insurance companies, and your bank, might ask for accounts using actual rather than flat rate expenses.

The million dollar question

Which is more tax efficient, flat rate or actual expenses? There's no simple answer as there are many variables, e.g. the cost of the vehicle and repairs. As a rule of thumb, the lower the cost of the vehicle and the greater your business mileage, the more likely it is that the flat rate will benefit you. We have a comparison calculator which can help you decide - please get

Tip. Wait until you've prepared your accounts to decide which method to use. That way you can compare the options to see which is most tax efficient.

New display at Skidby Windmill looks at the East Riding's historic hospitals

new display by the Skidby Mill volunteer team has just opened. 'Historic hospitals: care in the East Riding before the Health Service' examines the beginnings of organised public health provision in the region in the 19th and early 20th centuries.

Some of the places covered in the exhibition are Castle Hill hospital, Cottingham; the Lloyd cottage hospital in Bridlington; and Withernsea convalescent home. Hospital treatment for soldiers during the First World War is also covered and the display features a variety of items from the Museums Service's collections.

Choice - one of the most important primary reinforcers to all living beings

s I started to explore pure Behavioural Science (with all its intricacies) some years back, the impact of understanding what reinforcers are to each individual animal regardless of species or breed of species in a myriad of environments, can be mind-blowing.

We all realise that air to breath, water to drink, shelter from extremes in temperature, food to eat and the desire to keep their species diversely strong through procreation, are the main primary reinforcers. However, owning the right or power of total personal choice is a huge behavioural desire for every species of animal on earth.

Here comes that magic word.....CHOICE! Our choice. Informed choice. No choice. Choosing to learn, stay, leave at any time, sleep, eat, and move wherever it is we wish to move to or away from. The list is endless and it is powerful stuff. As humans, living in a democracy, we have the power and empowerment of full choice in our lives, a blessing not so if you are a captive. The world has captive populations under despotic rule, prisoners behind bars, hostages and any other form of a lack of personal freedom. It is a situation and a right we fight hard to keep for ourselves always.

As captive species, our pets are under house rule at all times. We make every decision about how they live their lives. Most are lucky with loving humans making good choices for them, so many are not of cause.

The reason for this article is because I have just had to really evaluate the power of choice in training goals with the arrival of two very different young horses in for training. Both are rescued black and white Gypsy cobs, found in appalling conditions and in desperately frail health. Thin beyond words, scared and fearful and covered in matted faeces. Their new owners have done an amazing job bringing them back into good physical health after 2/3 years of care. It's their emotional health and future training which is now on the table.

Buzz is weak in frame and stature. He still feels innately scared of being caught so if he loses the headcollar, there is no way of catching him. His mum has the best relationship with him and could sedate him out in the field so that foot care, inoculations, de-lousing etc could occur, but was never able to get him to break down that overwhelming fear of entrapment from being caught, head shy and body touch shy. Innately fearful of foot/leg handling, being tied up and being stabled.

Escape behaviours always to the fore, unless sedated (temporary helplessness). He would rather be on his own in the field rather than be caught and stay with his friends. He could not be led reliably because he would invariably seek escape, so he was unloadable to come to me for training of cause. They tried to load him next to his mate Woody but failed to convince him to able to comply. It took a different open trailer, another sedation and six people to finally get him loaded and ultimately travelled to my yard. We quietly herded him out at my end and quietly lured him

into a huge stable with a high value liquorice lick. He made me very sad.

Woody is a big, strong horse now, handle-able to an extent but cannot exist on his own, away from other horses. Separation anxiety is a huge problem to train away with lots of behavioural aspects, some very dangerous. He is emotionally fragile and just needs to learn how to feel safe in his own skin. Handling wise, he kicks out behind to avoid having his back feet handled. He slams his front feet down to avoid having them handled and body slams you out of the way both tied up or held. He uses his weight to escape anything and everything. Unfortunately he felt the need to try to escape his stable, getting stuck over the door and damaging himself and the door. He had company next to him but as one horse was led past it triggered this drive in him. He cannot cope being on his own and he fears being left on his own.

This was my start point with these two young horses. All the training being planned and implemented required my being able to empower these two individuals with as much choice as was possible to implement. I do not want to trigger avoidance or escape behaviours but still need to be actively able to train. In the first week, using clicker training(marking and rewarding desired behaviours or emotions), I have Buzz self-haltering (on top of another halter which stayed on) and leading quietly by my side. He now comes up in the field to be caught cautiously, as he is very much in charge of how it all goes. By week two we can take his halter off in the stable and out on the yard and he comes up to put his own halter on. Next step is trusting the training so much as to remove the halter in the field altogether. This can only happen when Buzz trusts us completely (he loves target training; loves being empowered with total choice and is visibly enjoying all that is happening with him)

We have started body touch and foot lift training. He has already mastered offering his front feet into our outstretched hands on a voice cue, as has Woody too! Hind feet are a work in progress but they have both learned how to relax and feel calm in this process, which is a massive emotional shift.

Woody can now manage to stay connected with us in the school so long as the field gate is wide open always. His need to be able to control his environment and his freedom is all encompassing. Years ago, I would have trained him traditionally on a long rope, sending him around me through force of my will and being the dominant "herd leader". This would have been violent until he came around to my way of thinking (requiring the horse to fear the human and fear making a mistake)

I am so glad I have left all this behind. Learning how to train horses on the emotional level, using proven science based protocols, rewarding every try, empowering them with choice and setting the environment so that they can succeed is so empowering to me too!

These first two weeks of bespoke investment have already brought forward massive changes in their behaviours, their trust of humans and their emotional wellbeing. They are so calm now and so interested in their surroundings as well as the training to which they are willingly participating in. My staff are brilliant partners here, all working from the same hymn sheet. We are sharing the training so that these two fragile animals can find safety and trust in everyone.

Onwards and upwards as they say.
