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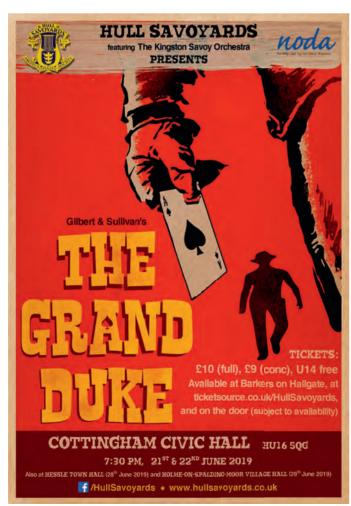

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# "BUT IT'S A COMMON LAW MARRIAGE"

This is a refrain that family lawyers are used to hearing. If you have been in a committed cohabiting relationship for a number of years and think that you are a "common-law spouse" then I am afraid that you are in for a shock; it doesn't exist.

Of course, what people mean, by "common-law marriage" is that they expect, because they have been in a relationship with someone for a number of years, that they have the same legal rights that a married couple have to property, upon separation. In most cases this is completely wrong. Unless an asset is in joint names, one partner may have no claim whatsoever against the property owned by the other.

If there are children then the partner who has full-time care can make a court claim for financial provision to enable them to support and house them. This is often only any help in cases where there is a lot of money available and even then any financial support will disappear on the child's 18th birthday, leaving the recipient in Cinderella-like poverty.

It is possible for a partner to make a claim, in civil law, for an interest in the property owned by the other, but such claims can be legally complex, lengthy and expensive.

Couples who are considering cohabiting should consider in advance how they want to divide property and assets if they separate, and obtain legal advice prior to moving in together. A solicitor can draw up a 'cohabitation agreement' setting out couples intentions, which can help to avoid unnecessary arguments.

It is clear that what needs to happen is a change in the law to provide some protection for cohabiting couples. This is a politically sensitive area however and it remains to be seen if any future government has the political will to grasp the nettle. Until then, if you want to be sure that upon separation you have the full range of claims as regards family property, the only advice can be "get married".

**Eset banking app.** If you have Eset Internet security installed on your computer, you will also have a shortcut to the Banking & Payment App. Please do make use of this whenever you are doing online banking. (the exception will be if you are also using Microsoft Edge as your web browser, as the app will not work with that). This app doesn't change the way you log into your bank, but does provides an extra layer of security by encrypting your details as type them.

IBM Trusteer also known as Rapport - this is a piece of

software provided by some banks in the UK to do a similar job of encrypting personal details and is worth having if you have a different internet security product i.e. **not** Eset. But please note it will **not work along with Eset's** version of encryption. So before using the Eset Banking & Payment app, just check if you have the above-named product installed too. Go to Control Panel, Programs & Features, and see if either name appears in the alphabetical list of programs. If so, click on it and click the top button that says uninstall. When you get to the part that tells you to type in the characters shown, type them in and then you have to hit the enter key, there is nothing to click on to continue.

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KCOM Lightstream routers are dual band – that means they broadcast two Wi-Fi signals, normal and 5g. Most computers (and printers) will only use the normal signal, which is fine. But for mobile phones and tablets you will receive a better speed by using the 5g signal. The password (which is shown on the base of the router) is normally the same for both. If were given a plastic card by the Kcom engineer with the router details on, you will see a QR code (one of those squares with blocks inside, like below), all you have to do is point your device's camera close up to it and it will offer to connect you automatically! If by chance it doesn't work on your device, you may need to download a QR reader app, which will be free.



If you have never used a QR code before, try pointing your mobile's camera at this one to go straight to the RDM website.

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Scam telephone calls – there has been another raft of these recently. So, I would again like to remind everyone, to NEVER let an unknown caller take over your computer remotely, even if they say they are from Microsoft or Windows. These companies, or any other reputable firm, will NEVER make unsolicited calls to home users. The other thing to watch out for is that these scammers have started cloning UK numbers, so in other words instead of your telephone caller display showing 'International' or 'out of area', they may now show a London, Leeds or Sheffield number for instance. If you give them access to your computer, they will cause all sorts of mayhem, and then ask for a credit card number, so they can extract your hard-earned cash

If you haven't already upgraded to ESET Internet Security, now is the time to do it. Go to the website <a href="https://www.eset.com/uk/home/free-trial/">https://www.eset.com/uk/home/free-trial/</a> and download a *free one-month* trial! Just make sure you uninstall any existing anti virus you may have, even if it has expired. For prices, upgrades and licences — just give us a call.

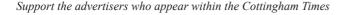

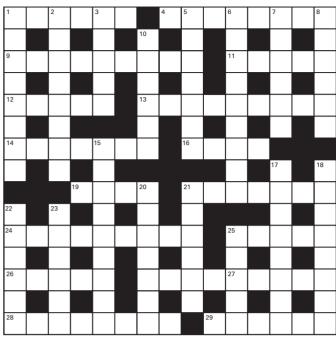

#### Jersey Royal, brie & asparagus frittata

A seasonal frittata to make the most of the asparagus and Jersey Royal potato season. This dish makes a lovely supper served warm or enjoyed cold for lunch the next day with salad. Another time, try with goats' cheese or feta instead of the Brie

- Preparation time: 10 minutes, plus cooling
- Cooking time: 30 minutes
- Total time: 40 minutes, plus cooling. Serves: 4

#### **Ingredients**

- 300g Waitrose & Partners Jersey Royal New Potatoes
- 5 tsp olive oil
- 230g pack asparagus, trimmed and halved widthways
- 6 British Blacktail Medium Free Range eggs
- 1 onion, sliced
- ½ x 230g pack Somerset brie, sliced

#### Method

- 1. In a large pan, cover the potatoes with cold water, bring to the boil and simmer for 12 minutes. Meanwhile, heat 1 tsp oil in a frying pan over a high heat. Fry the asparagus for 5 minutes, tossing regularly until charred; set aside. In a large bowl, season the eggs and beat together with a fork.
- 2. Heat another 2 tsp oil in the frying pan and fry the onion for 2-3 minutes. Drain the potatoes and rinse under cold water; cut into 0.3cm slices. Add to the pan with the onions; season and fry for 2-3 minutes until golden. Set aside.
- 3. Heat the remaining 2 tsp oil in a 20cm non-stick frying pan over a medium heat. Stir the veg into the eggs; tip  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the mixture into the pan, swirling so it sets on the base. Lay the brie on top, pour over the remaining egg mix, cover with a baking sheet and cook over a medium heat for 5-6 minutes.
- 4. Remove the sheet and place a plate over the pan. Carefully invert the pan so the frittata turns out onto the plate, then slide it back into the pan so the uncooked side is on the base. Cook for 5-6 minutes. Cool for 5 minutes, then serve.

# Toad in the hole, with Swiss chard & mustard cream sauce

Preparation time: 20 minutesCooking time: 40 minutesTotal time: 1 hour. Serves: 4

#### **Ingredients**

454g pack 8 essential Waitrose Pork Sausages, pricked with

2 essential Waitrose Red Onions, peeled, trimmed and cut into 6

120g plain flour

2 essential Waitrose Medium Free Range Eggs, beaten

100ml whole milk

100ml carbonated natural mineral water

400g Swiss chard, thinly sliced

#### Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 230°C, gas mark 8. Arrange the sausages and onions in a shallow ovenproof dish. Cook for 20 minutes until cooked through.
- 2. Meanwhile, place the flour in a bowl, making a well in the centre, and whisk together the eggs and milk in a jug. Gradually whisk the egg mixture into the flour until you have a thick batter. Gently stir in the water and pour into the hot pan of sausages, return to the oven for a final 20 minutes until golden and puffed up.
- 3. Meanwhile, gently fry the chard with the olive oil, adding a couple of tablespoons of water to the pan to encourage it to wilt, until the leaves have softened and the stalks have started to become transparent. Just before serving, stir in the cream and mustard, and serve with the toad in the hole.

Cook's tip Need a meat-free option? Use vegetarian sausages. Roast them with the onions and a little oil, adjusting the cooking time in step 1, until cooked through.





# Fresh strawberry & vanilla New York-style cheesecake

Serves: 8-12

#### **Ingredients**

125g McVitie's Hobnobs biscuits or Waitrose Vanilla Viennese Swirls

125g Seriously Gingery All Butter Dark Chocolate & Ginger Biscuits

25g butter, melted

600g cream cheese

75g caster sugar

4 large essential Waitrose Free Range Eggs

Tip into a bowl, add the melted butter and mix well. Press the biscuits into the base of the tin and place in the fridge to chill.
- 2. Beat together the cream cheese and sugar with an electric hand whisk until smooth then carefully add the eggs one at a time, with the vanilla extract, until well mixed be careful not to over whisk. Pour the mixture onto the chilled biscuit base and bake in the middle of the oven for 50 minutes until just set. Turn off the heat and leave the cake to cool in the oven with the door open.
- 3. Meanwhile, place the strawberries in a bowl with the icing sugar and mint and toss together well.
- 4. When the cheesecake is completely cooled, spoon the soured cream over the top and spread to give a thin layer then decorate with the fresh, minted strawberries.

#### Martha's Carrot cake traybake

'A sprinkle of crunchy walnut brittle on top of moist carrot cake jazzes up an old favourite!'

• Preparation time: 25 minutes

Cooking time: 35-40

• Total time: 60-65 minutes. Serves: 12-15

#### **Ingredients**

150g soft dark brown sugar 150g golden caster sugar

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300ml sunflower oil

3 medium Waitrose British Blacktail Free Range Eggs

300g plain flour

1 tsp bicarbonate of soda

1 tsp baking powder

1 tsp ground cinnamon

½ tsp ground ginger

½ tsp salt

300g carrots, grated

100g walnuts, chopped

For the topping:

100g full fat cream cheese

30g unsalted butter, softened

200g icing sugar

100g chopped walnuts

100g caster sugar

#### Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 170°C, gas mark 3. Line a 23cm x 33cm tray with baking parchment.
- 2. In a large bowl, whisk the sugars, oil and eggs together until smooth. Slowly add the flour, bicarbonate of soda, baking powder, cinnamon, ginger and salt, and continue to beat until well mixed.
- 3. Stir in the grated carrots and chopped walnuts until they are evenly dispersed. Pour into the lined tin and bake for 35-40 minutes or until golden brown and a skewer inserted comes out clean. Allow to cool in the tin for 20 minutes, then cool fully on a wire rack before icing.
- 4. To make the icing, use an electric whisk to blend the cream cheese and butter together. Add the icing sugar in a few separate additions until it is all combined, then whisk on high speed for 5 minutes until the mixture is thick, pale and light.
- 5. For the brittle, arrange the walnuts on a baking tray lined with baking parchment and place the caster sugar in a saucepan with 2 tbsp of water. Simmer over a medium heat until the sugar has dissolved, then turn the heat up and boil until it turns a dark amber colour. Carefully pour the hot caramel over the nuts and leave to cool completely before breaking up and blitzing in a food processor to create chunks of brittle.
- 6. Spread the icing over the cooled cake and sprinkle the brittle over the top before slicing into squares.

#### Latest wine news and Waitrose launch nine new wines

Thought I would use this month's column to do a round-up of some of the latest wine news doing the rounds, starting with the fact that Waitrose is launching nine new own label wines this month from "lesser-known" grape varieties.

The "W" range, which launches on June 17, will feature wines from different regions and countries including Sardinia, Austria and Chile.

It follows a survey by the supermarket which showed the most familiar grape varieties in the UK are Chardonnay, Sauvignon Blanc and Cabernet Sauvignon. They were recognised by at least 85 per cent of the 2,000 people surveyed.

However, 78 per cent of people had not heard of the nine wines in the "W" range.

There are four reds: A Marselan IGP Méditerrané from the Languedoc region in France, (RRP £6.99), a Pais from Chile (£7.99), a Cannonau from Sardinia, Cannonau being the local name for Grenache (£8.99) and a Mencia from north-western Spain (£9.99).

Added to these will be three whites; an Elbling from Germany (£6.99), an Arinto from Lisbon, a versatile grape grown in most of Portugal's wine regions (£7.99) and a Petit Manseng from Juraçon in France (£9.99).

Finally, there will be one rosé - Zweigelt from Austria (£8.99); and a sparkling Pecorino from Italy (£8.99).

Waitrose wine buying manager James Bone has said: "We want this range to inspire and encourage our shoppers to experiment even further with their wine choices and try something they've never heard of or tried before.

"We've worked with talented winemakers across Europe and South America to bring together a range of wonderfully exciting wines at affordable prices, some of which have never been widely available in the UK before. We see this as an ever evolving range which we hope to expand even further in the future."

Waitrose said the survey also showed that France and Italy were the most popular European countries with UK wine drinkers, with 68 per cent of respondents saying they had tried French wine compared to only 11 per cent of people that had tried wine from Sardinia.

And while on the subject of supermarkets and wine, I found this story interesting . . . it seems trials of till-free stores by Sainsbury's has meant that wine and other alcoholic drinks cannot be age verified and so cannot be sold legally.

It seems Sainsbury's has got around this by removing all alcohol from those stores.

The concept of shop and walk where cameras monitor what you have purchased and charge you automatically has been tried by a number of retailers, including Amazon. There are a number of potential solutions such as RFID tags (currently used in the UK over the lids of high value spirits) but they require the customer to go to a sales representative to have the cap removed and this slows down the sales process, defeating the object of going till-free.

\* Environmental issues are rightly well to the fore at the moment, so this caught my eye: Claims that the higher carbon footprint associated with organics, and the environmental damage from over-relying on one spray, mean organics should be dropped to save the environment.

That's the view from climate change activist and leading Port producer, Adrian Bridge, who has made it clear that he wouldn't be embracing organic approaches to vineyard management in a bid to make his business more environmentally-friendly.

Bridge gave an example of Taylors LBV Port: "Currently, our carbon footprint for Taylors LBV is 2.8 kilos of carbon per litre, which is down seven per cent over the past two years, but, if I compare that figure to 2014, when it was 2.4 kilos, then you would think that we have got worse – we are producing more carbon dioxide."

He explained the difference was associated with lower yields, not a change in CO2 consumed. With organics producing 25 per cent less grapes, it means 25 per cent more carbon per bottle vs non-organics.

And Miguel Torres, in a discussion with on-line magazine The Drinks Business, said that he wouldn't be converting all his estate to organics because of the increased amount of energy required to manage vines in this manner, as well as the extensive use of copper.

The restriction in sprays to manage mildew means organic producers used more of the copper sulphate than other growers which builds up in the soil.

Miguel also said that because copper is less effective than synthetic chemicals against fungal diseases such as mildew, it needs to be applied more often, which in turn produces more carbon emissions from the greater number of miles travelled by the vehicles spraying the heavy metal.

Meanwhile, the Wine And Spirits Trade Association has come out against the inclusion of glass bottles in a Deposit Return Scheme currently being investigated by the Government; although it has to be said the main driver for the scheme is to reduce the estimated 13 billion plastic drinks bottles a year that UK consumers get through.

WSTA chief executive Miles Beale said: "The WSTA has long argued that there is no evidence to support the inclusion of glass in the deposit return scheme. What is clear is that including glass drastically increases costs, which ultimately will end up being paid for by the consumer."

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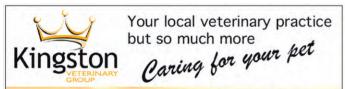

#### National Dementia Action Week

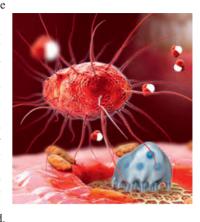

There are 850,000 people in the UK, who are affected by dementia, and it does not just affect the elderly, 40,000 people in the UK under the age of 65 suffer from early onset dementia. It is believed that by 2051 the number of people who have dementia in the UK will have risen to 2 million.

#### What have Gums Got To Do With Brains?

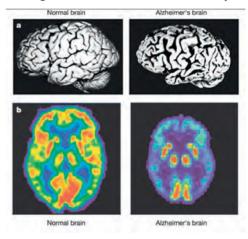
There has been quite a lot of research all over the world in top class

research centres of late trying to find the cause of Alzheimer's. There has been an association with gum disease shown by several Teams. One of the most recent was in January this year.

The study, published in the journal Science Advances, uncovered a potential link between Porphyromonas gingivalis. the bacteria associated with periodontal disease (commonly known as gum disease) and Alzheimer's. Researchers analyzed brain tissue, spinal fluid, and saliva from Alzheimer's patientsboth living and deceased—and found evidence of *P. gingivalis*. Gingipains, the toxic enzyme secreted by P. gingivalis, were found in 96 percent of the 53 brain tissue samples examined,



with higher levels detected in those with the pathology and symptoms



Alzheimer's study confirmed via animal testing that P. gingivalis can travel from the mouth to the brain and that the related gingipains can destroy brain These neurons. findings are noteworthy in that they suggest biological mechanism how periodontal disease bacteria may play a role in

the development and progression of Alzheimer's.

#### **Carried In The Blood**

When gums are infected with P.gingivalis it causes inflammation and gum disease from early gingivitis to bone loss and loose teeth. When you brush and eat the bacteria get into the blood stream and travel to other sites in the body including the brain. So, getting your gums looked at and treated if needed could be more beneficial than just saving your teeth. Often the mouth can be looked at as the gateway to your health.

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June is a great time to be out in the garden. Many plants are in full bloom at this time of year and the weather (should be) warm and sunny. Keep watering your garden to avoid your plants from wilting. A great way of recycling water and saving money is by using a water butt system that will collect rainwater from summer showers. #### **Planting New Roses**

For first time rose growers you can chose to grow your rose in a container or plant it straight into the ground. If you chose to plant your rose in a container the plant will benefit from well draining compost and rose fertilisers through out the year.

When planting your rose you will need to prepare the soil. The best way to do this is by adding farmyard manure like horse or chicken manure.

Dig a hole roughly twice the size of the roots and the depth of a spade's blade to allow room for the rose. Add a general fertiliser to the hole to help the roots establish and grow further once planted. To aid the rose over the

- Keep weeds at bay by hoeing your borders and beddings regularly.
- 2. Maintain the lawn by mowing it once a week.
- 3. Plant summer bedding.
- Shade your greenhouse to prevent it getting to hot over the summer.
- Be careful not to waste water over the dry months.
   Conserve water by investing in a water butt or using bath and kitchen water that isn't too dirty.
- 6. Harvest early potatoes, radishes and salad leaves like lettuce.
- Once the sun has ripened them, strawberries should be perfect for harvesting.

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summer and to avoid drought in summer gently tease out the roots so they can grow out once planted.

Place the rose in the hole and fill with compost making sure that the compost covers the roots completely to avoid future dieback. Water thoroughly.

#### **Caring for Containers**

Like new plants, those in pots and hanging baskets need special care as they run out of water more quickly than established border plants – which have bigger root systems and more soil from which they can reach water.

- Add water-retaining granules or gel (right) to compost in pots and place a small pipe or plastic bottle in the compost to help with root watering.
- Aim to keep the compost moist at all times, watering daily in hot weather.
- If the compost looks pale, has shrunk away from side of the pot, or if plants are droopy and wilting, stand the container in a bucket or pan so that it can soak water right up into the compost.

#### **Dealing with drought conditions**

Attach a water butt with a tap to your drainpipe to collect rainwater

- Keep borders well weeded as weeds compete for moisture.
- A 5–7cm protective layer of mulch such as compost, cocoa shells, bark or even gravel spread on the soil between plants reduces evaporation.
- Stop sprinkling lawns in drought in autumn they will recover!
- Hoe weeds at the roots to save time and avoid disturbing the soil and increasing water loss from the surface.
- Leave grass clippings on the surface of the lawn after mowing to recycle nutrients.

#### **Different Plant foods for different plants:**

- Shrubs & trees –Bonemeal when planting in autumn/ winter; Growmore in spring/summer.
  - Bulbs Bonemeal after flowering.
  - Bedding plants fortnightly general liquid feed.
- Container plants –general liquid feed weekly in spring/ summer.

All living things need food and water and plants are no exception. They need a mixture of the following three main types of plant food:

- Nitrogen promotes leaf growth.
- Phosphates help roots develop.
- Potash increases production of flowers and fruits and improves fruit flavour. It also increases winter hardness. They also require trace elements of calcium, boron, iron, magnesium and manganese. By applying a range of garden fertilisers, you can ensure your plants receive sufficient food to perform to their full potential.

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# Independent broker moves with the times to reach 50-year milestone

n independent insurance broker which has expanded throughout East Yorkshire is celebrating its 50th anniversary after moving with the times and seeing off tough competition.

Long-serving staff at Hedon Insurance have seen their sector dwindle to only a handful of current operators in the region compared with more than 200 when the firm started – before the introduction of direct selling through TV, telephones and the internet

But as other brokers around the country have closed, Hedon Insurance has expanded. The business, which was started when a "man from the Pru" opted to set up on his own, now employs 24 people in four offices.

Anne Walters, who joined the business in 1993 and took it over in 2006, said the strategy is to continue to grow gradually by providing a personal service supported by technology and extensive knowledge of policies and pitfalls.

Anne said: "The internet has had an impact. People go online and think they can get their cover at a lower price but they often come back to us when they find out they can't claim for something that's gone wrong.

"We have access to the same facilities as the direct companies – dynamic pricing, which can change on a daily basis, but you don't see the real value of the policy until something goes wrong and you have to make a claim.

"It's almost always the case that when people are claiming on a policy they are in a vulnerable position because something difficult has happened to them, their family or their property. That's when they find out whether the policy is what they wanted and what they thought they had signed up for. Our challenge is getting people to think about that when they take out the cover in the first place."

Jeffrey Cladingbowl was well known to householders and small businesses as the local agent for the Prudential when he set up Hedon Insurance in 1969, a year when the Yellow Pages listed more than 200 in its insurance classification in the Hull area alone. Known to all his staff as Mr Cladingbowl, he opened and subsequently sold a second office in Barton on Humber, and he sold the business when he retired in 1987.

The new owners ran the company for two years until it was bought by Mike Medforth, who had been looking to buy a local business after a long career with Smith & Nephew and Reckitts.

Under Mike's ownership, Hedon Insurance expanded to Hornsea and as he moved closer to retirement Anne advanced to the role of Managing Director.

Mike said: "At the time I bought the business there were about

60 different independent insurance businesses as well as large firms and individual operators, but quite a few were closing by the time I left.

"There was also more competition from national firms selling direct by phone and advertising on TV, but the location of our offices encouraged people to call in deal face to face. We survived by being friendly with people and looking after them. The bigger firms didn't look after their clients very well. Our business grew every year and it was down to customer service."

Anne opened a Hull office in Holderness Road in 2007 and in 2010 opened a Cottingham office which relocated to larger premises in 2017. The bulk of the business is personal insurance – home, motor and travel – but the commercial side is expanding.

Anne said: "Over the years some competitors retired and there were a lot of mergers and acquisitions. The larger firms have left the high street because they know they can make money from a digital service, and with other firms closing we've never been so busy.

"We made a conscious effort to streamline the way we did things and to be better from a business point of view, maintaining that face-to-face service that other businesses have abandoned. We are local people, we enjoy that approach and we realise the importance of it. We are part of the same community."

### Making Tax Digital - 10 Myths **Debunked**

aking Tax Digital (MTD) is an HMRC initiative designed to make sure the UK tax system is effective, efficient and easier for taxpayers. It began on the 1st April 2019 with VAT. From that date VAT registered businesses have to keep digital records and submit VAT returns using compatible software. With so much information available about Making Tax Digital it can be confusing. To help you prepare for the biggest shake-up in VAT and accounting in decades, the team at Yorkshire Accountancy have put together a list of common misconceptions and debunked them. Compliance doesn't have to be complicated as long as your records are up to date, stored appropriately and transferred to HMRC via an approved method, you're there!

1. Older bookkeeping software needs to be upgraded in favour of cloud accounting bookkeeping software.

No, any software can be used, it must, however, store individual transactions digitally. It must also have the capability to transfer the VAT return data in digital form to MTD enable bridging software

2. I must purchase a new software package in the place of using Bridging Software after the 12 month soft landing period.

No, bridging software can be used indefinitely, not just for the soft landing

3. Spreadsheets must not be used for digital record keeping.

No, you can use spreadsheets for digital record keeping. As was the case for bridging software, spreadsheets can be used beyond the soft landing period specified by HMRC

4. A 'digital link' does not include a CSV file transfer.

A CSV file is recognised as a digital link between where the records are stored and the MTD submission software

5. Copying and Pasting Data is sufficient to create a digital link.

Under the regulations, this is not considered to be a digital link and is therefore

6. I can go back to the old VAT 100 submissions if I don't like MTD for VAT. No, MTD for VAT is here to stay and compliance for VAT registered businesses is mandatory.

7. Data cannot be adjusted once exported from the bookkeeping software.

Adjustments are necessary as part of the more complex VAT arrangements. HMRC recognise this and state that all adjustments must be documented within the spreadsheet

8. I must submit all of the transactions that make up the VAT return.

HMRC only wants the nine boxes of numerical data that make up the VAT

9. I can just type in the nine boxes of data.

No, all VAT records must be kept digitally. These records will be used to populate the nine boxes of information required by HMRC automatically.

10. My accounting software must interact directly with HMRC for MTD.

Some accounting software can interact directly with HMRC however this isn't necessary. Bridging software can be used in the place of a direct link.

# The evolutionary journey which makes up the modern-day horse - Part 1

o understand horses with all their intricacies and foibles, you need to understand exactly what is in the list of horse ingredients which makes up that one horse in front of you. Horses are constantly scanning the environment for danger- they still think they will be eaten by a lion even though it is the year 2019! They are quick to react to sudden movements, new or scary objects and always quick to flight- which is the main reason car drivers should drive past very wide and slow when passing horses on a road. Horses are outside of their comfort zone on roads so are more likely to suddenly spook away from something they perceive as life threatening. They will not think twice about leaping out in front of a car because something on the path or in the hedge is worrying.

Horses are, by nature, a complicated mix of genetics and experiences, all wrapped up inside a beautiful frame. Humans are drawn to horses as if by magic by their innate power, their beauty, their intelligence, their grace and those huge all seeing eyes!

Humans domesticated horse's way back in time- studies all agree it was around 5000 BC. However, that is not the start of the horse by any means, merely the beginning of cooperative human/ horse relationships.

To start to understand a horse, its basic needs and how it behaves, it is good to appreciate the difference between the 3 main categories in animal evolution-carnivore, omnivore and herbivore. Each category has its own innate set of hard driven behaviours and it's all about survival. These 3 categories have evolved specific conformation within their bodies, all very different from each other dependent on the environment they live in. However, many characteristics remain the same within each group.

The carnivore eats meat so it became the top predator and survives by being the hunter at the very top of the food chain (sadly now only in certain protected environments) Big cats have developed short strong legs on long powerful bodies so they can crouch down and silently stalk prey while staying hidden in the surrounding undergrowth so as to get as close as possible. Their coat/skin colouration have evolved to be similar in pattern and colour to its environment. This clever use of disguise maximises their chances of getting in up close to their prey and increases their chance of survival. They are built for short bursts of fast running but cannot be sustained for long- therefore the nearer they can approach their prey unseen, the better their chance of bringing down dinner. They have eyes in front of their face for targeted focus, short close ears with an amazing

hearing capability, short noses and a powerful sense of smell, long whiskers for sensitive touch in close environments/ assessing wind direction etc, massive claws for hanging on to moving prey until they can bring it down and finally, powerful jaws for killing and big teeth for biting, ripping open carcasses and tearing off chunks of meat. Their molars are razor sharp. (I have just described a Lion or a Tiger as well as a domestic pussy cat!) Their hunting success requires stealth behaviours. The Owl has developed huge eyes for motion detection in gloom or dark. It has evolved special feathers so that its wings are silent in flight. This clever mutation means that it maximises stealth approach in an already quiet environment. All carnivorous birds have the same big claws and strong short legs. Across the spectrum of carnivore, you will find the same behavioural and physical attributes all based on maximising hunting success and survival. Most big carnivores are solitary species but many species have evolved to live in groups where cooperative and coordinated behaviours have evolved to maximise hunting success.

The omnivore evolved to eat meat and plants and there is a massive array of different species under this evolutionary umbrella, humans being only one of them. Mammalian omnivores have a completely different set of teeth: - a mix of canines for biting and tearing as well as molars for chewing and crushing fibrous food. Bears, pigs, rats and badgers are another species of mammalian omnivores. Chickens and crows are bird examples and some reptiles also fit in here (turtles and lizards) All these omnivorous species eat both plant and animals. The human animal became top of the predator tree by our evolution of standing tall on only 2 legs and something called the opposable thumb. Our thumb is the reason why we are what we are. Our thumbs have developed the ability to be distinctly separate in actions from our other 4 fingers which means that we can hold things. In evolutionary terms, it led us to be able to make tools and weapons- humans became a very early version of both a hunter and a farmer. We could defend ourselves better. We could hunt down and kill all forms of available animals. in water and on land. Humans thrived because we learned to manipulate, alter and ultimately manage most environments. We are the dominant, top of the food chain species on the face of the earth! (Unless you are unfortunate enough to find yourself within the territory of a large predator with no way of defending yourself- in which case we jump right back down that evolutionary scale and become prey!) I innately fear sharks so I am nervous in deep sea water therefore I avoid that environment and stick to paddling in Bridlington! Omnivores tend to live in large social groups

Herbivores are purely plant eating species. They are food for both carnivores and omnivores and as such, have developed survival traits and bodily conformation in their own unique way. There is a massive list of herbivores-from rabbits to Giraffe- such is evolution re environment but they all rely on instant speed to flee. That is their main protection against being eaten. Each species has again adapted to its own environment on earth and horses are no different. All herbivores are flight animals so they rely on fantastic vision with large eyes placed on the sides of their faces. Although they cannot see directly in-front or behind, all it takes is a slight tilt of the skull and they can scan environments through

360 degrees. They all have very big ears which can turn sideways and backwards so achieving maximum sound detection ability. Plant eaters always have long jaws with big flat molar teeth for grinding down the fibre diet and sharp incisors in front for clipping away at stems. They need to be constantly eating as their diet is poor. Their sense of smell is acutely honed by the presence of large nostrils usually placed in front and to the side of the face.

# East Yorkshire cardiologists perform new heart procedure on first patient

man has become the first patient to undergo a new heart procedure in East Yorkshire which saves people having to travel across Yorkshire for treatment.

David Morris underwent Transcatheter Aortic Valve Implantation (TAVI) after Hull University Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust was commissioned to set up the new service by NHS England.

Performed at Castle Hill Hospital, heart patients in Hull, the East Riding, North Yorkshire and Northern Lincolnshire no longer have to travel to Sheffield or Leeds for treatment.

Mr Morris, now back home and recovering well, said: "It's been fantastic and I am now able to walk into town again.

"I am 86 and my wife's main carer so travelling to Leeds or Sheffield would have been difficult for us.

"Having it done here has made a big difference to us and meant my wife was able to visit me every day."

Some patients with heart disease are not considered fit or well enough for major heart surgery if they require valve replacements. Instead, they are often suitable for TAVI, which puts less strain on the body as the heart does not need to be stopped and placed on bypass.

During the procedure, a catheter with a balloon on the tip is inserted into an artery in either the upper leg or the chest which is then passed into the heart and positioned near the opening of the aortic value. The balloon is then inflated, creating space for a new tissue value which is put in position and expanded.

Mr Morris started experiencing chest pain while walking around

Cottingham and he was referred to the Centre for Cardiology and Cardiothoracic Surgery at Castle Hill Hospital by his GP.

Tests showed his heart valve was restricted, causing him to experience chest pain and extreme tiredness, and Consultant Interventional Cardiologist Dr Raj Chelliah, who leads the TAVI service, realised Mr Morris would be a suitable patient for the treatment

Mr Morris underwent TAVI under general anaesthetic in March and stayed in hospital for six days before he was well enough to go home.

Dr Chelliah said: "TAVI is an excellent procedure for some patients who may not be suitable for major heart surgery. It is less invasive, meaning patients can spend less time in hospital and can have a far quicker recovery time.

"For patients like Mr Morris, it can be a far better option for them as not only can they have the surgery right here, much closer to their homes and their families, it also takes less toll on their bodies which means they are able to recover more quickly and get back on their feet.

"We're really pleased with Mr Morris's progress since his procedure and look forward to offering this treatment to more patients that are suitable across our region."

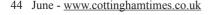

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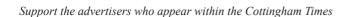

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# Are we doing enough about preserving our health

Five years later, I became a Tai Chi instructor. In 2002, I left the building trade and started teaching Tai Chi full time.

Tai Chi consists of very relaxing, calming, flowing movements that help to create natural strengths, balance and flexibility in the entire body. The very pure levels of meditative concentration, ease you away from the stresses and strains of modern-day living tends to create.
