



Cottingham Parish Council

LAT – Haltemprice & Hunsley

Mr Wilds explained the role of the Local Action Team (LAT) and his part in it. Public Services, Fire, Police, Voluntary Section and NHS are all involved to help improve the quality of life of residents. They meet approx every 6 weeks. Meetings are held in public but is not a public meeting; the public do have the chance to discuss issues with partners in the group. Councillors identified two areas that the LAT might wish to investigate; provision of facilities for the Scouts and Guides and the review of the Cottingham Clinic. The next meeting of the LAT group will be held at 10am on Thursday 12 March 2009, venue to be arranged.

Litter Bins

The Parish Council plan to provide six more litter bins and Cllr Abel has arranged a meeting with an officer of the East Riding Council to agree sites.

Seats

Concerns were raised about the state of some of the wooden benches around the village. The Parish Council are responsible for maintenance of the seats they own which are the green slatted metal seats. East Riding Council are looking into a means of adding all other seats to their street furniture register.

Proposed Car Parking Charges

The Chairman and Clerk attended a meeting of the East Yorkshire Town Councils Network where they had the opportunity to put forward the view of Cottingham Parish Council that it does not want car parking charges within the village. Cllr Felicity Temple, Chairman of the Car Parking Review Panel was in attendance and informed the meeting that a public consultation exercise is planned by ERYC although details are not know of where and when this will take place; however it does look like no decision will be made, either way, until at least September of this year.

Cottingham Day 2009

The first meeting of the Cottingham Day Committee has been held and it was felt that the programme of events put in place last year had worked extremely well (despite the weather!) and this would be the blueprint for this year's event. It was decided that the event would begin an hour later but this will be well publicised nearer the day – Saturday 4 July 2009. Once again, if anyone wishes to be involved in the organisation of the event the Committee would welcome any input. The next meeting of the Committee will be held in the Parish Council offices at 6pm on Wednesday 11 March.




Westfield Primary School opens extended school provision

Handy and helpful Hints when using your computer

¬eedback is always welcomed, and from what I have received recently I thought it might be time to do a 'back to basics' feature again. I did this on my last Radio Humberside session and it proved quite popular. There is always someone getting into computers for the first time - maybe pressure from family, particularly children or grandchildren!

There is plenty of computer-speak around, (too much sometimes!) for example ok means yes or I agree, and cancel means no or go away! Default means normal, not a misdemeanour. And if you see a message like: 'you have performed an illegal operation don't worry, it's only Windows complaining about something, you won't get an unwelcome knock on the door!

The old 'turn it off and turn it back on again' routine really does cure a lot of computer problems, just save any work you were doing first (if possible). It is quite well known that Windows does not like to be switched off (i.e. by pulling the plug), but if all else fails and you can't switch off using the buttons on screen, then press the on button on the tower or laptop for about 8 seconds and the machine will shut down. Another point on that subject is with Windows Vista, when you click the Vista button to close down, there is a button that looks like an off sign, but it is actually a hibernate button. To shutdown or restart properly you need to go across to the small arrow on the right to get the choices menu.

Another question we are often asked is about updates, should you do them? The short answer is yes, because they are normally Windows security updates that are essential. This will be indicated by a small yellow shield that appears in the corner of the screen near the clock, which is known as the 'system tray' or 'notification area'. Many programs will also require updating in the same way, especially of course your anti-virus which is definitely essential, but others may be Java, Real Player, MSN Messenger; all these are ok to do.

Last month I detailed some email tips, on that subject again another topic that often confuses people is that of attachments. But worry not; if you can send an email you can do an attachment! First of all what is an attachment? Quite simply it can be a document, a photo, even a video or music clip. Whatever you want to send must be already saved on your computer (or be on a drive plugged in, like a memory stick). If it is not on yet you can use a scanner to save it on first.

There are two ways of doing attachments. The first is when you have composed your email, click on the paperclip icon at the top and that will bring up a dialogue box asking where you want to look for the attachment i.e. My Documents etc. Go down the list and when you locate it, double click on it and it will attach itself to the message. It is worth noting that this will only be a copy of the item, the original will stay where it is.

The other method that works if you use Outlook, Outlook Express or Incredimail, is to find the item first, then right click on it and from the menu that appears, click Send to, and then Mail recipient. If it is a picture, Windows will ask you if you want to make it smaller or keep the original size. This is useful as pictures can be huge files nowadays. If quality is important, keep the original size, but if you choose the smaller option, the file will be compressed to a fraction of its original size. Windows will then open your email program and attach the file to a new email all ready for you to complete. Either way you can add as many attachments as you wish, size permitting. The maximum size limit for any email with Karoo is approx 7Mb, but don't try that with a dial-up connection though! Try and keep attachments to a smaller size to save time sending and receiving. A really useful tip if you want to send items bigger than this, like technical drawings etc., is to use a website appropriately called: www.mailbigfile.com They offer a free trial where you upload the file to their site and then let it send a message to the recipient advising the file is ready for download - sim-

What about saving webpages? If you just want a picture, right click on it and click Save picture as, and then decide were to save it on your computer and what name to give it. If you want to keep a piece of text only, you just drag your mouse across it to highlight the piece and right click to copy, and then paste it into a program like Notepad or Word, then save. That way you only get what you want and not all the adverts and banners.





Leeks

ST. DAVID'S DAY

1st March is St David's Day: the traditional day of the Welsh. Dewi Sant as Saint David is called in the Welsh language, was a Celtic monk who lived in the sixth century. The Black Flag with yellow cross is the flag of St. David.

Although not that much is known about him, some information is gleaned from a book written by Rhigyfarch called Buchedd Dewi (the life of David) in the 11th century. He reached the status of archbishop of Wales, and was one of many early saints who helped to spread Christianity among the pagan Celtic tribes of western Britain. Apparently he lived a frugal life, eating mostly bread and herbs and only ever drank water. Dewi died on 1st March 589AD and was buried at St David's Cathedral in Pembrokeshire which became a place of pilgrimage throughout the Middle Ages.

St David's Day dates back to 1120, when Dewi was canonised by Pope Callactus II, at which time March 1st was added in the Church calendar and today St. David's Day is celebrated by Welsh people all over the world and is a time when the wearing of the national emblems of Wales - a leek or a daffodil - is a must.

The Leek Connection

Although the leek has been recognised as the emblem of Wales since the 16th century, its association with the Welsh can be traced back to 633 AD when, at the battle of Heathfield, a monk apparently suggested the Welsh soldiers wore leeks in their caps to distinguish them from their Saxon opponents. Not a bad idea all in all - and they won the battle.

It's also suggested that St. David himself included leeks in his meagre diet. Furthermore, all £1 coins dated 1985 feature the Welsh Leek on the reverse? It was decided that from 1984, British £1 coins would feature different reverse designs representing the four countries of the United Kingdom.

Leek, Potato & Caerphilly Bake

Ingredients

2 Medium Potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced

25g/1oz Butter

75g/3oz Welsh Caerphilly Cheese, grated

1 Large Leek, well washed and thinly sliced (including the green part)

300ml/10fl.oz. Milk

Salt and Black Pepper

A little extra grated Cheese to finish the dish

Instructions

1. Preheat the oven to 190C, 375F, Gas mark 5 and well butter a relatively deep ovenproof dish.

- 2. Place a single layer of potatoes in the bottom of the buttered dish, sprinkle over a little of the cheese, top with a single layer of leeks and season well with salt and black pepper.
- 3. Continue with these layers until all the ingredients are used up, ending with a layer of potatoes remembering to reserve 1-2 tablespoons of the grated cheese for later use.
- 4. Dot the top with butter, pour over the milk then cover with a double layer of aluminium foil and bake in the oven for about 45 minutes.
- 5. Remove the foil, test for doneness using a sharp knife. The potatoes should be soft however depending on how thickly you sliced the potatoes, it may need a further 15-20 minutes covered baking.
- 6. Once the potatoes are cooked, sprinkle the remaining cheese over the top of the potatoes and return to the oven for 15-20 minutes until the cheese has melted and is golden brown. Serve immediately.

Frodo Baggins was the First to do What in February 2000?

"Eureka"! I thought "for once I know the answer to one of my son's quiz questions from school."

Frodo Baggins was a 5-year old pug, which was the first dog to use the Pets Travel Scheme to gain re-entry into the United Kingdom from a European Union country without having to go through the trauma of six months in quarantine.

So what is the Pet Travel Scheme?

The pet travel scheme allows cats, dogs and in some cases ferrets to go on holiday with their owners to European Union countries and return without having to be placed in quarantine.

What do you need to be able to use the pet travel scheme?

To qualify for the scheme your pet must meet the criteria below:

1. Your pet must have a microchip implanted before anything else. For those of you whose pets are not already microchipped this involves injecting a small grain of rice sized, implant under the skin of your pet, a procedure similar to having an injection. This can then be read electronically by a microchip reader giving your pet a unique identification number.

2. Your pet then needs vaccinating against rabies, as long as it is over three months old. Boosters for rabies must be given as recommended.

- 3. A blood sample must be taken, usually 21-30 days after the vaccination and tested to check that immunity to rabies has been achieved. This is successful in the majority but not all cases.
- 4. If the blood test was successful then a pet passport can be filled out and you can go abroad 21 days after the rabies vaccination, however you cannot come back into the UK until SIX MONTHS after the successful blood test.
- 5. To complicate matters your pet will also need to be treated for ticks and tapeworms 24-48 hours prior to embarkment on the return journey to the UK by an official Veterinary Surgeon.

As you can see from the above details it is a strict regime and will take at least 8 months before you can re-enter the UK so forward planning is essential. A small proportion of dogs will fail the blood test and need vaccinating again and this will put another couple of months onto the re-entry time. Pay careful attention in the passport to the expiry date on the rabies vaccination, as miss that date and you and your pet will have to go through the procedure again!

Once abroad however the excitement continues. There are several diseases that your pets will be exposed to that we do not have in this country. Ticks carry two diseases, Ehrlichiosis and Babesiosis, so you should keep regular tick treatment up while abroad.

Heartworm is common in the Mediterranean area and needs treating while you are out there and until a month back in the UK.

Leishmaniasis is a nasty infectious condition carried by sandflies. Sandflies only come out at night, so keep your pet indoors from dusk to dawn and us a special insecticidal collar.

In summary, yes you can now take your pet on holiday abroad with you but do plan well ahead and do contact your veterinary surgeon and DEFRA (www.defra.gov.uk) for advice.

Or as in my case go to the Lake District, where the dog loves the views, enjoys a sip of good British beer and takes her coat for the rain!





Here is Paul's thirteenth walk in his monthly column. This month his destination is Hedon Maps:- EXPLORER 292 & 293 Start at GR. 187284 Drapers Lane, Hedon. Distance 6.0 Miles.

ralk in a southerly direction along the grassed area on Drapers Lane and cross a footbridge over Burstwick Drain and then turn left at the Haven Arms. Pass in front of the Inn on the road and follow this road in an easterly direction passing farm buildings on the right. On reaching the main road, cross over and continue walking in the same direction along a tree lined path with allotments on the left.


Ignore a footbridge on the left and continue to walk ahead to reach a small grassed area. After about 200 metres cross a stile and cross the road. Bear right and follow this road to Thorngumbald. Bear left along the footpath after passing Cottage Plant centre and, on reaching the Thorngumbald sign and speed restriction, cross the road and walk down Villa Lane to Villa Farm, pass in front of the house and pass through a small white gate.

Bear left to the field hedge and walk along the path with the hedge on the left. This hedge first sweeps right and then left, ignore the bridge on the left hand sweep and continue ahead. At the end of the second field, cross a farm track and continue along the third field with the drain on the left.

On reaching a brick bridge, cross the bridge and immediately turn right and walk down a stone road with the drain on the right and the gas terminal on the left and follow this stone road as it climbs a newly constructed bank. The footpath has been diverted at this point as a wet lands area has been developed. Continue along this track towards Paull.

On reaching Fort Paull Battery, follow the path down towards the river Humber and continue to reach the village of Paull. Walk through the main street and, on passing the Ship Building Yard, climb the river bank on the left and walk along the bank towards the BP complex. Follow this bank as it sweeps inland and follows a drain. On reaching a road, cross this road and continue in the same direction towards Hedon.

On reaching the Hedon By-pass walk under the by-pass and immediately turn left to cross a footbridge. After about 100 metres follow the path as it doubles back and then after a further 500 metres turn left along a grassed area and back to Drapers Lane.

Tenancy Deposits

f you rent out a property or are considering doing so, then as of 6th April 2007 new rules were introduced obliging anyone accepting a tenants' deposit to join a special scheme approved by government, this will protect the deposit and provide a way of resolving disputes about who owns the deposit at the end of the tenancy.

Which deposits are protected?

Deposits relating to Assured Shorthold Tenancies (ASTs) are protected by the new regulations. An AST is a tenancy where the annual rent does not exceed £25,000. It is however important to note that deposits only need to be protected on the commencement of a new tenancy. So if a tenancy commenced prior to the 6th April 2007 and a deposit was taken then you need do nothing.

How will the new regulations protect tenants' deposits?

Two types of scheme have been established for the protection of The landlord or managing agent decides which tenants' deposits. scheme to join. The two types of scheme are as follows:

A single custodial scheme - where the deposit is held centrally (ie by the scheme, not by the landlord /agent).

An insurance backed scheme - where the deposit is held by the landlord/agent

In both cases If there is a dispute at the end of the tenancy about who should have the deposit (the tenant or the landlord) the scheme will

refer the dispute to its dispute resolution service. An independent person will examine the facts and make a decision.

The protection offered by the above schemes should reassure tenants that disputes relating to deposits will be handled fairly and by an independent person.

Does the landlord have responsibility to advise the tenant of the obligations associated with tenancy deposits?

Yes, a landlord/agent must ensure that a deposit is safeguarded by ensuring it is dealt with by an authorised scheme. Within 14 days of receiving a deposit, the landlord/agent must provide the tenant with information about the authorised scheme protecting the deposit. If the landlord fails to comply with these requirements he will lose the right under the Housing Act 1988 to serve notice for recovery of possession on termination of the shorthold tenancy.

Since the implementation of the new regulations, it is evident that there is some confusion as to how the system works, some landlords / Agents have even taken the risky option of not taking a deposit to avoid the regulations.

One thing is clear, if you take the sensible option of taking a deposit then you should ensure that the deposit is correctly protected in line with regulations as failure to comply in the worst case scenario could be detrimental to removing a problematic tenant from the property and could result in a fine equal to three times the deposit value. There are various useful websites including the governments own website for information and your local property management agent should also be able to give you further advice.

In the Garden



Flower garden

arly spring is an ideal time to plant herbaceous perennials, including Geranium, Astrantia and Oriental poppies. Check that the plants you buy have strong, green shoots and plant them into well-prepared soil. Hardy annuals can be sown in pots or modules to provide colour in the garden. They are inexpensive and can provide fun activity for children. Suitable examples include Limnanthes, Nemophila, Lobularia and

Consolida. Plant summer-flowering bulbs. Prepare the soil first, to ensure that drainage is sufficient to prevent the bulbs rotting. Anemone coronaria tubers need particularly well-drained soils.

Sow summer bedding plants in a heated propagator or under glass.

Plan a continuous crop of cut flowers for this summer. Perennials such as Delphinium and annuals can be grown to produce a useful and beautiful display

Sweet peas can be sown outside this month in milder areas. Fleece covering can be used to raise the temperature and encourage seedling growth, or they can be started off in pots in a cold frame. Some varieties need chitting (nicking of the seed coat), and/or soaking, in order to germinate.

Place autumn-sown sweet peas in a sunny position, perhaps on a high shelf in the greenhouse that gets plenty of light.

Continue to deadhead winter-flowering pansies and other winter bedding. Pansies will carry on into the spring and even to early summer, if attended to frequently.

Vegetables

Cultivate and prepare seedbeds, covering them with clear polythene or fleece to warm up the soil before sowing.

Many vegetable crops can be sown this month, especially in mild areas

with light soil, including: broad beans, carrots, parsnips, beetroot, bulb onions, lettuces, radish, peas, spinach, summer cabbage, salad leaves, leeks, Swiss chard, kohl rabi, turnip and summer cauliflower. Be guided by the weather, and sow only if conditions are suitable (as per guidance on the seed packets)

Sweet peppers, tomatoes, cucumbers, aubergines, celery, salads and globe artichokes can all be sown in a frost-free greenhouse. Artichokes and celery can be transplanted outside later in the spring. Tomatoes can either remain in the greenhouse or be taken outside from early summer onwards. Peppers, cucumbers and aubergines do best kept under cover. Salad crops vary - it is best to check the temperature requirements cited on the seed nackets

Plant shallots, garlic and onion sets.

Plant Jerusalem artichoke tubers.

Plant asparagus crowns. A deep, friable, well-drained soil with plenty of organic matter incorporated is ideal.

Chit early and maincrop potatoes. In mild regions, earlies are planted out in the second half of the month. In colder regions, it is better to wait until

Pot up tomato seedlings when they develop true leaves above the more rounded seed leaves. After growing on in small pots, they can be planted into larger pots or growbags.

Continue to harvest Jerusalem artichokes, parsnips, spring onions, leeks, winter salads, spring cauliflower and cabbage, Brussels sprouts, chicory, rhubarb, kale and sprouting broccoli. Gardeners in suitable areas, who have got off to an early start by using fleece to warm the soil, could already be harvesting a new crop of radishes.

When spring cabbages are ready to harvest, cut them off the stem and make a cross in the top of the cut stem. Sometimes mini-cabbages, or 'spring greens' will grow from the cut stems.





Hallgate Schools - continued

by Peter Railton, Local Historian

n the 10th June 1915 the Revd. Wolstencroft informed Mr Moorby that he had resigned his post as school correspondent to the managers and that Mr Eyre would take up his duty.

June 14th saw the front playground (boys school) tarred and 'dusted' - to aid setting - and this was a source of great interest to the boys, who crowded around at playtimes and had to be shepherded in and out of the school to keep them off the new surfaces, but no doubt someone would leave their footprint on it - boys!!!

When school re-opened on the 16th August after the summer holidays, 236 boys were present out of the 278 on role. The Head was -"almost inundated by various applications for boys, off; for a day, or two days, or for an hour in the morning, or wanting to leave early, etc., etc."

Winds of Change

This must be accounted for by the fact that child labour was needed on the farms and market gardens as never before in the emergency of the 'Great War'. Requests of this nature were commonplace in the days of the school board as we have seen, and were usually granted by these local men who knew the necessity for parents to withdraw their offspring at busy times, but 'the winds of change' were blowing from County Hall after 1902 seeking to end these arrangements, but wartime needs dictated otherwise.

At the end of August Mr Moorby complains about the slowness of deliveries of school exercise books and other items from Brown's of Hull - "There is not a single pen nib in stock nor ink powder!"

Filling the desk inkwells after mixing the powder with water was a

messy job in unsteady hands and often resulted in splashed books and clothes. More fun was had by dropping the grubby pen, nib down, onto the wooden floor like a spear. Guilty in my turn, years later!

Domestic Science Increasing Important

In the girls' department domestic science was playing an increasingly important part in the curriculum; lessons in home management, cooking, laundry both theoretical and practical, were taught alongside the more traditional pursuits of sewing and needlework and more time was given to these newer subjects. A County Council Scholarship exam was due to be held on Saturday 15th May and there were three candidates; on the 22nd the Labour Certificate exams were held for which there were four candidates - applications for release after so many attendances was no longer allowed. Here were three girls seeking secondary education and four an earlier end to theirs, usually indicative of their social background, but not always, as in some cases children applied for exemption in order to augment family income in times of financial hardship. These two instances bring into focus the changing patterns of life at that time.


Air Raids Change Pattern of Life

Now into these changing patterns of school life came a more sinister change - a war which touched the people at home for the first time - air raids. Mrs Holmes records that -

"On the morning of Monday June 7th and Wednesday the 9th, quite a number of children were absent from school owing to the air raids."

This was to become an all too familiar pattern in the war and was repeated in the 1939-45 conflict, children waken up from sleep and too tired to go to school the next day, or going in late, or after dinner. In the same week the Wesleyan Sunday School Feast was held and the children from the three departments who were involved finished school at 3pm as they had been doing for years - traditional links with the past and a village routine that defied aggression from the sky.

School exams went on as usual and the results were on the whole satisfactory and Vera Leppington, Margurite Millard and Alice Andrews had all been successful in their scholarship exams, and the Head did not conceal her pleasure in these events. Twenty girls from the infant department were admitted in early July and extra laundry lessons were held in order to complete the course of work before the summer holidays which began on the 9th July and lasted until the 16th of August.

Zeppelin Raids

On the 14th of September Mr Moorby records that - "A number of boys late - Zeppelin Buzzers sounded last evening."

This corresponds to an entry in the infants' log book made by Mrs Moorby - "Children excited this morning because there was a Zeppelin raid over Hull last evening."

It appears that discussion had taken place regarding the traditional Hull Fair holiday, because Mr Moorby seemed to want to justify a break of some sort and the 11th and 12th of October were agreed on with County Hall. - "As otherwise there would be 19 consecutive weeks to Christmas without a break."

On the 11th of November St. VII had a practical lesson on wild fruits in the fields and hedges round the village and returned to school "with a good harvest".

On the 17th of November William Mitchell and Harold Jarvis were withdrawn from school with permission 'for agricultural work' Three St VI boys were punished for fighting outside the school gates; Mr Eyre called regarding the darkening out of the Hall windows and brown paper was proposed as suitable! A teacher, Mr Cooke left to train as an officer with Leeds University Officer Training Corps. and another teacher was off with flu, so the infant department 'lent' Mr Moorby a teacher in December.

Alfred Nichols age twelve and a half of St. V, hired himself to a farmer in Dunswell at Martinmas and went there on November the 8th. This was reported to the attendance officer with the result that the poor lad was back at school on the 10th.

Traditions die hard in 1915 Reg. Longbone and Richard Cox left school that Christmas on request as they had fulfilled the requirements of the Labour exam.

At the end of January 1916, Mr Cooke visited the school to say that he had completed his training and was to join the Motor Transport Section and was a "waiting his turn to go to the front." Another teacher, Mr Hall, went to Beverley Barracks for a day on 29th February and was 'passed' for 'garrison duties only' and was to await call-up.

Mr Vigrass, an HMI, spent two days in the girls' department examining the work of the various classes. The weather made attendances irregular and this was now coupled with the new factor of air raids which increased in March. Children in the village and surrounding areas were affected quite badly by sirens and whistles sounding in the night, rousing families and making further sleep difficult for the remainder of the night and consequently children were often kept at home next day to catch up on their sleep. Raids on the 5th and 19th March resulted in poor attendance and raids on three consecutive nights in April caused great alarm. Mrs Moorby records that - "Last evening's warnings about Zeppelins in the vicinity caused many parents to leave their houses with their children and wander in the fields and lanes till dawn

Nothing daunted, four rows of 'Gradus' peas were sown in the school garden in April - Zeppelins were not going to disrupt the school's vegetable production!

Footnote

The old school has been acquired by the Northmoor Educational Trust for the education of their children, and so will continue in the purpose for which it was built.

Results of informal check on **Cottingham Parking Numbers**

aving read the report of the ERYC Car Parking Review Panel, it is clear that, given the sheer size of the task, several of the Legislation recommendations are based on estimates not facts. Readers should be aware that no decision has yet been made to introduce charges, and in the present economic climate, it is not likely to happen in a hurry.

Car parks are not free. They are liable to Business Rates as well as the costs of lighting and maintenance, and all this has to be paid for somehow. Supermarkets are happy to pay for their car parks as a necessary part of their operation. In Cottingham the three public car parks are owned by the council, and since 1996 have been paid for by the charges made in Beverley and Bridlington. The Review Panel's idea was to spread the existing cost wider with any extras costs being met by new charges. Naturally the idea is being welcomed in Beverley and Bridlington, but being fought everywhere that charges are proposed.

The cost of installing pay and display machines, and employing extra traffic wardens is easy to calculate. The difficult bit is to know how much money this would raise. So far, the number of people parking in Cottingham, and how long they park for, has only been guessed at. We don't believe that such an important decision should be made without any hard facts, so we personally paid for a group of students to count cars in all three car parks one Friday.

The students made a note of each car parked at hourly intervals, from 10am to 4pm. A car counted just once could have been there for anything from a couple of minutes to nearly 2 hours and there was plenty of time for more cars to come and go unrecorded. Counting every car all day is a major task, but further surveys will be done for more detail, and for comparison to other days, but the results so far are worth sharing.

The smallest car park is Kingtree, opposite Finkle Street, with space for 67 cars, but used by at least 147 cars of which 27 parked all day, 70 were seen once, and less than 10 others stayed more than half the day.

Market Green is limited to 2 hours, and had at least 366 cars in the 70 spaces. 320 of these were seen once, although one car was there all day! If this becomes the only free car park, you can bet that it will be full of people taking full advantage of the two-hour time limit.

The biggest car park is in King Street beside Somerfield, and has parking for 138 cars. At least 462 cars stopped here, of which 337 were seen once, and 33 stayed all day. 40 cars were counted twice, 19 three times, and 18 cars were seen at four of the hourly counts.

It has been said that 'customers' find it is so difficult to park in the village because of workers parking all day, but this survey has shown that this is not entirely true. The most interesting finding was that the total number of free spaces almost halved each hour from 72 at 10am down to only 5 (mostly the disabled spaces) at 2pm, then rose again to 44 by 4pm. The lesson here is to avoid the village at lunchtime if you can. What was not measured is how many drivers were unable to find a space at busy times and whether they took their business elsewhere, came back later, or gave up altogether. Those staying for a few hours were clearly divided onto morning or afternoon, but the number observed only once was fairly constant at about 100 cars each time, spread evenly across both the hours and the locations.

There are certainly some parking problems in Cottingham, but the blunt instrument of parking charges, especially in our biggest and busiest car park, is not the answer, and parking here cannot be compared to an isolated market town or a tourist area, where people have little choice but to pay. Too many of our residents do not have the luxury of a car at all and would be the ones to suffer most if any shops or services were lost as a result of this proposal. We must also remember that not everyone is shopping - we have the library, adult education centre, doctors, dentists, opticians, churches, Hallgate school and the area's main post office all in the centre of the Cottingham.

So if you see someone with a clipboard making notes about cars in a car park, you will know that it is part of the fight against parking charges, and if charges are eventually forced upon us, we will have the information to direct them to do as little damage as possible.



Alternative Health Matters by Carole Headley

Vitamins, Minerals and Herbs etc.

he use of vitamins, minerals and herbs is not just nationwide - it is worldwide and in most cases extremely beneficial. However, if your immune system is not functioning at 100% then you will not reap the benefit from whatever vitamins or minerals or herbs that you take. A good healthy eating plan should give you all the nutrients that your body needs. Using local and seasonal food is by far the best way. Before taking any type of supplements, particularly if you are on any medication always consult your doctor or a registered dietician, who would be very knowledgeable about vitamins and minerals.

Why would you need to supplement your 'diet' with vitamins and minerals or co-enzymes to be able to function properly. Mostly because of the use of pesticides and insecticides on the land, our foods are deficient of many of the essential minerals. If essential micro-nutrients are lacking then vital re-generation and repair process can slow down and this can possibly cause -

a. Scaly skin and inflamed gums - this occurs when you are short of Vitamin A, a good source of Vitamin A is liver, meat, oily fish, dairy, cod liver oil and

b. Poor wound healing and easy bruising can be a shortage of Vitamin C or zinc. A very good source of Zinc is oysters - not everyone's taste or price. An excellent source of Vitamin C is kiwi fruit.

c. Nerve problems occur when your body is deficient of Vitamin B1 and Thiamin. A good source, meat products, especially pork and duck, seafood, fruit, nuts and vegetables, dairy products, eggs, pulses, yeast extract.

d. Mouth ulcers, sore tongue or cracked lips is often a sign of B2, B3, B6, B12, Folic Acid, Vitamin C and iron deficiency. A good source of B2 is yeast extract, liver, wholegrain cereals, eggs, leafy green vegetables and beans. B3 (Niacin) wheat and maize flour, meat, eggs, milk and yeast extract. B6 (Pyridoxine) wholegrain cereal, meat (esp liver) oily fish, soya products, bananas, walnuts, green leafy vegetables, avocados, egg yolk, and yeast extract. B12 (Cyanocobalamin) good for people with skin depigmentation condition, if taken with folic acid and good sources are liver, kidney, meat, oily fish (esp sardines) eggs and dairy products.

e. Folic Acid: When Folic Acid is in short supply, dividing cells become unusually large and when this affects the red blood cells a form of anaemia can result. A good source can be obtained from the following foods, green leafy vegetables (ie spinach, broccoli, brussel sprouts, parsley) wholegrain, beans, soya products, liver, kidney, citrus fruit, nuts, dairy products, eggs and yeast extract. Other vitamins such as E, D and K are essential for a healthy body and mind.

Minerals - Boron, Calcium, Chromium, Copper, Iodine, Iron, Manganese, Magnesium, Phosphorous, Potassium, Selenium, Zinc.

Boron - is a trace element which interacts with several enzymes and thought to be important for normal brain function. It also helps with bone health by improving absorption of dietary calcium (by promoting production of the active form of Vitamin D) this stimulates increased production of oestrogen and testosterone hormones. There are suggestions that a deficiency in Boron is linked to osteoporosis. A good source of natural Boron includes fresh fruit, nuts and green vegetables.

Calcium - is good for healthy bones and teeth, however the absorption of calcium in the small intestines depends upon the presence of Vitamin D. When dietary calcium is in short supply it is leached from the body instead to maintain a healthy heart beat. As a result bone thinning (osteoporosis) can develop when calcium intake is low. A good source are dairy products, such as cheese, yogurt, fromage frais (but not butter), green leafy vegetables (eg broccoli), tinned salmon including the bones, nuts, seeds pulses, white and brown flour (not wholemeal) and eggs.

Chromium:- What does it do? It combines with vitamin B3 and three amino acids to form an organic complex known a Glucose Tolerance Factor (GTF) This interacts with insulin hormone to help control the way cells take up glucose energy. Low levels of chromium have been linked with poor glucose tolerance and increased risk of diabetes. It may also reduce the risk of coronary heart disease by lowering harmful low-density lipoprotein (LDL) cholesterol and raising beneficial high-density (HDL) cholesterol. Best source is found in Brewers Yeast but can also be found in egg yolk, red meat, cheese, fruit and fruit juice, wholegrain, honey, black pepper, thyme and vegetables.

As you can see from the above list there is considerably more to write about but space is limited. The NES Scan can show where there is an imbalance of vitamins, minerals etc., and I would like to inform you that if you use vitamins, minerals and herbs then please be aware that there is a possibility - a strong possibility that they could be banned or illegal to use, recommend or prescribe. If you care about your own health, your family, friends, children, children's children etc. and this planet then please check out a website Google Codex Alimentarius.
