Property News from Martin English of Homelink



Property Investment Strategies

The question I am most often asked by investors who are keen to embark in the property market is "What is the best property to invest in?". At the risk of not giving a definitive reply, put simply, there is no right or wrong answer. An investment property should be chosen very carefully and some key principles apply when choosing a property, none more so than 'LOCATION, LOCATION'. It is no coincidence that one of the leading TV programmes has captured the expression donned by property experts for decades.

I would suggest that if a property is clean, well presented and maintained, then in most cases there is absolutely no reason in today's market why any property should not let in a reasonable time frame – providing it is priced realistically for what it is and where it is.

A great example is an investor may only get a return of £400 per calendar month for a property purchased at say £75,000. Another investor may get a return of £550 per calendar month, a much better monthly return on the face of things. However for this increase in return, it may have cost the investor £125,000 almost double that of the previous investor. In theory the first investor for a little more could have bought 2 cheaper properties giving a return of £800 for a similar investment as the second investor, achieving a significantly greater return on investment.

The debate doesn't end there; by enlarge an investment property should be an informed decision that suits the needs of the individual. Clearly on a monthly basis the second investor appears to be worse off than the first investor, or so it may seem. Although we have seen a slump in property prices over the last couple of years, historically over time the general trend for property prices has always been an upward one.

Such is the composition of property price increases, that if prices in a region increase on average by 20% in 5 years, generally speaking, properties of greater value and more so in popular locations will be the properties that hit and exceed this growth rate, and generally lower priced property tends to see lower increases, meaning that potentially the second investor realises a greater capital growth over a 5 year period than that of the second investor, which could mean a greater net and capital gain than that of the first investor despite receiving a lower monthly rent for the money invested in the property.

These investment scenarios are often referred to as 'Cash Cow' and 'Trophy Asset' investments, it is only the individual and their long term investment plan that can determine what suits the individual best, as there are lots of differing reasons and motivations for someone wanting to invest in property.

One piece of advice I would give the would-be investor is, do your homework and speak to an expert. Engage a reputable expert before you make possibly one of the biggest investments of your life and draw from their expertise, which could result in you avoiding costly mistakes.

raroo has been tweaking its broadband packages again recently, and at prices from just £5.99 now is the time to get onboard. And here's a tip. If you have been a broadband customer for more than a year or two, call them and check what is best for you. You may find you can change to a different plan, save a few £'s and get a new router! This is definitely the thing to do if you still have a Speedtouch modem (a small black box with just two green lights on it), as they are not capable of giving you the higher speeds available on the network now. At the time of writing, one of the discounts was only available until March 8th; so get on the phone and review that plan!

iTunes the popular (and legal) entertainment download site from AppleMac, is as I write this, heading for its 10 billionth download!! So someone may have already won the \$10,000 iTunes gift voucher. But if you have used the site recently, check to be on the safe side! wv

Music downloading is often in the news for all the wrong reasons. Usually court wrangles between the music industry and illegal download sites, that work on a file-sharing system, which basically means getting music from someone else's computer for free; thereby depriving the record labels of their earning

To many people however, this music downloading business will be a whole grey area that may appear of little interest or seem too confusing. But of course most people buy music at least occasionally. Certainly CDs have come down in price and you can often pick them up in stores for around £10, or even half that for older collections. But suppose you just want one particular track? Well how about 79p and you don't even have move from your computer! Yes that's right, there's been quite a bit of competition in the market for a while now, and the big boys of the online shopping world have moved in, Amazon and Tesco to name but two. I mentioned in a previous article that when Amazon launched its service, I managed to download a good few tracks at only 29p each and even a whole album for only £4.99 They are currently offering 49p specials, so it's always worth a look. You don't even need a special music player to benefit. Think maybe it is an area worth considering now? For that reason I will be doing a future help feature on 'music & entertainment on your computer', see details in our advert below.

On my visits to customers, and during my phone-in feature on Radio Humberside, I get asked a variety of questions. Here is a selection, along with the

Q: Where can I find the history of all the websites I have visited recently?

A: In Internet Explorer, you can either click the small down arrow to the right of the address bar (where you type in the www address), that will show the whole list. Or if you prefer a keyboard shortcut, type Ctrl, shift and H at the same time. To close the history click the small x in the corner of that column.

Q: I sometimes have problems with Internet Explorer, and you mentioned Google Chrome as an alternative web browser. How do I get it, and is it free?

A: Just go to www.google.com/chrome and click on the download button. If you see a security warning asking if it is ok to run click yes/ok. It will then install and be ready to use in a few moments. And yes it's free and will use your existing Internet connection settings and even import your favorites if you wish.

O: How do I change the font so it stays the same every time I type an email in Outlook Express?

A: At the top of the Outlook Express window, click Tools, then Options, then Compose, then Font Settings and change to the font style and size you require.

Q: I sometimes receive email attachments that I can't open, what do I do?

A: Last month I mentioned .pdf files that require Adobe reader to open. Just go to www.adobe.com and download the free reader. Another popular file format is .pps which requires PowerPoint to open. You can also obtain a free reader, this time from Microsoft. Go to www.microsft.com/downloads and search for PowerPoint Viewer 2007. Also available from the same site is a viewer for Excel spreadsheets.(.xls file type)

Q: I have Windows Vista, and whenever I click to shutdown the computer/laptop just goes into hibernation, why?

A: The red icon that looks like an off button, actually just puts the computer into hibernation. To shut down properly, click on the right arrow next to it, and then from the menu, click shut down (or restart etc)

Q: Can I upgrade my computer from XP or Vista to Windows 7?

A: Yes you can. From Vista to Windows 7 (provided the computer doesn't have any existing problems) is a straight upgrade, meaning you can keep all your data and programs etc. But from XP, it can only be done a 'clean install' which means saving all your data first, as the hard drive will be wiped. You will also need to install all your programs again. Windows 7 does need at least 1Gb of Ram, so if your computer is a few years old, it may not be upgradeable. Then there is the cost

Q: Whenever I insert changes into a word processing document, it erases the next words also, how do I stop that?

A: Just press the Insert key on your keyboard (which is next to the backspace key), and it will insert the new text and push the existing words along.

Lastly, the race to be on the Internet wherever you are at the time continues unabated with news th0at the number of mobile devices used to go online will exceed one billion by 2013. The staggering statistic was revealed by analysts IDC recently, who also said that currently there are around 450 million mobile devices used to access the Internet. With some mobile phones now even offering SatNav for free, other companies in that market have some serious com-

Lowest Ever East Riding Council Tax Agreed

he council has today set a budget for the next financial year (1st April 2010 to 31st March 2011) of £269 million, which requires a council tax at Band D of £1,212.20, an increase of £17.91 or 1.5 per cent.

The council tax increase is the lowest ever set by East Riding of Yorkshire Council and will mean that the increase for an average household will be less than £16 per year.

Although Band D is used as the benchmark national average council tax charge, more properties in the East Riding fall into the lower bands B and C. The council tax at these bands will be £942.82 (Band B) and £1,077.51 (Band C).

Councillors had as a basis for discussion a budget prepared by the council's corporate management team which indicated a 3 per cent rise in council tax. However, this increase has been halved by taking money from various reserves and budgeting for a half per cent pay rise, which is in line with national expectations, and not from front line services.

As in previous years, setting a budget has been a challenging task, with the council needing to balance budget pressures, mainly arising from existing commitments or from legislation, against the requirement to make savings in other areas. Among the budget pressures are the costs of caring for vulnerable children and adults - in particular the large and growing elderly population in the East Riding - and the need to meet the Target 45 goal for the percentage of waste generated that is recycled by the year 2015.

Schools are funded separately through a specific and ringfenced government grant. As part of its existing commitment, the government is ensuring that schools will receive a minimum 2 per cent increase in their budget. The actual amount for each school is determined by pupil numbers and these are still to be confirmed to calculate individual school budgets.

Councillor Stephen Parnaby OBE, leader of the council, said: "I believe this is a responsible budget based on sound principles and the council's record of excellent financial management. It protects essential services while taking account of our residents and their ability to pay. We all work hard to limit the council tax increase, especially in these difficult economic times, but we face issues that are outside the council's control. While the costs of providing services in a large but quite sparsely populated area like the East Riding are high, the level of national grant, which makes up the bulk of the available money, is low compared with other councils - around £100 per person below the national average and more than £300 per pupil below average for schools.

"Together with the inequitable way some £7.7 million of our

grant settlement has been 'clawed back' by the Government, the result is that East Riding residents are having to pay more than they should and are in effect subsidising other parts of the country that do better through the national funding system.

"Nothwithstanding the financial challenge, I shall be working to deliver a similar or hopefully even lower council tax increase next year."

Councillor Parnaby also warned that future funding for local government, as for all the public sector, was likely to be significantly reduced as a consequence of the fall-out from the global banking crisis and particularly as a result of the huge government debt.

He said: "Our budget for the forthcoming financial year is protected as part of a three-year government deal for local authorities, but for the future I am in no doubt that there will be reduced levels of public expenditure and we face challenging times."

An extremely positive outcome of the 2010/11 budget is that the council will be carrying out its biggest ever building or 'capital' programme, with £148 million to be spent on improving essential infrastructure like roads, housing and schools. The programme has been boosted and accelerated by the fiscal stimulus of £100 million approved last year which is resulting in the council bringing forward many schemes to assist the local economy and support local businesses.

In addition, the council is undertaking a £33 million programme over the next year which will see the first new council homes in the East Riding for many years. Some 275 properties are to be built and more will follow as a result of additional funding that has been secured. This building programme will also help support local businesses and especially the construction industry.

The East Riding of Yorkshire Council council tax figures for 2010/11 are set out below (2009/10 in brackets) to which needs to be added the precept requirements of the Humberside Police and Fire authorities, town/parish council precepts and any special expenses. The Police and Fire precepts are due to be set in the next few days. These will be reported to a meeting of the Council on 24 February when the final council tax resolution will be approved.



White Chocolate Truffles

Ingredients

225g/8oz Good Quality White Chocolate 50g/2oz Butter 50g/2oz Icing Sugar 1 teasp Almond Extract 1 Egg Yolk 75g/3oz Chopped Almonds, lightly toasted Icing Sugar

Ingredients: 1.8kg/4lb Leg of Lamb 2 Cloves of Garlic 1 teasp Crushed Rosemary leaves Juice of half a Lemon 50g/2oz Butter Salt & Pepper

- 5. When cooked, transfer the lamb to a heated serving dish and let it stand for 15 minutes before carving.



Bananas with Fudge Sauce

Ingredients 4 Large Bananas 1 tbsp Sugar For the sauce 1 x 170g/6oz tin Evaporated milk 50g/2oz Butter 75g/3oz Soft Brown Sugar 25g/1oz Good Quality Plain Chocolate, chopped



East Yorkshire National Trust members receive presentation on "The Growth of Goole"

eeting of the East Yorkshire Association of the National Trust at Cottingham Civic Hall. Thursday January 21st -2010. Mrs S. Butler on " The Growth of Goole"

Mrs. Butler covered the changes in Goole over many centuries. Beginning with a 14th Century map showing the area surrounded by three rivers, the Trent, the Ouse, and the Don which in its final stretch divided in two to make the area virtually an island.

Goole began as a small fishing village, on low lying land liable to flooding, drainage was improved in the 17th C by Dutch engineers digging a canal. Most of the growth came when in 1823-4 the Aire and Calder Canal Company decided to build docks at Goole to give itself access to the sea.

Their scheme for the integrated development of the town and docks was an early example of town planning. One of the first buildings erected was the Lowther Hotel, used as a base by the Directors of the Canal Company. Two docks were built, first a barge dock and then a ship dock, together with the houses and facilities needed for the expansion of the time.

In 1826 their canal was opened with great celebration and their clock tower was built, still there today though in a different location. A unique feature of the houses built by the Company was their corners, instead of the usual right angle they were curved to make it more convenient for carts to turn. The level of the land was raised by allowing some areas to silt up, then using the silt to raise other areas. This gave some houses the unique feature of having two stories at the front and three stories at the back!

The coming of the railways resulted in the railway dock being

built in 1846. In 1848 the church and vicarage were built. By the 1860's ships captains were having their own private houses built in the town so both Company and private development was going on. Mrs Butler has gathered together a large collection of early photographs so we were able to see developments and changes up to the present day. A zeppelin raid in 1915 damaged the Lowther Hotel but was repaired.

The Police Station became a Hospital and then a pub, "The Jailhouse". The Primitive Methodist Chapel was replaced by a Library. Initially Goole was cut off from the East Riding by the river, the only access being the ferry, shown by a photograph of it carrying a vintage car (then probably the height of fashion). It was replaced by the Boothferry Bridge in 1929.

The extension of the railway to Gilberdyke provided an alternative route to the East Riding. Mrs Butler was thanked warmly for her beautifully illustrated talk on the town.



So, Go On Then, How Do We Whiten Teeth?

I get asked a lot about the tooth whitening toothpaste. Most of the "tooth whitening" toothpastes available help remove and keep down surface staining. They will not remove heavy staining and really are best at keeping on top of things after proper professional clean. The majority work through abrasion. The rule of thumb is that the gels are less abrasive. Some of the smokers' toothpastes are much more abrasive and this in itself may lead to a rougher surface that takes up more stain. There is a toothpaste that works using natural fruit enzymes to help break down staining. On the whole though most toothpastes do not actually lighten a clean tooth significantly or at all.

To whiten the body of a tooth we need something that will penetrate and be left in contact for period of time and be safe. Most whitening gels use active oxygen to penetrate and break down internal staining compounds. The gels usually come as hydrogen peroxide or carbamide peroxide in different concentrations. The carbamide peroxide breaks down to hydrogen peroxide and urea. Is anybody other than chemists falling asleep at this stage? Some brands may contain other ingredients to help eliminate or reduce sensitivity and some to improve surface—lustre.

Never Mind The Chemistry Stuff, What Do I Have To Do?

Well this depends on which method you go for. Professional tray whitening has been around for many years now and has been refined, well documented and studied. It is a safe and relatively straight forward and cost effective way to give you some pearly whites.

What you have done is simply to have impressions (moulds) taken of your teeth. From these plaster models are made and then custom well fitting flexible trays. The trays are quite thin and are comfortable to wear. Sometimes reservoirs are left between the tooth and the trays to leave space for the gel. However, studies have shown that having a closer fit gives the same results and possibly less chance of sensitivity. This is a real bonus as you use less gel at a time so it goes further so you have more left for top ups. So here is the nitty gritty stuff. You give your teeth a good thorough clean, put a small amount of gel into the tray, dry your teeth and put the tray in. Now most people will sleep in this so it does not interfere with normal life. Others will wear it during the day for approximately 40-60 minutes. You can mix and match this. It is advisable to stay clear of things that stain teeth e.g. curry, red wine, tea, coffee and smoking. Obviously this not a full set of instructions.

Come On How Long Does It Take Then?

Well this varies because there are so many variables. I am not trying to be wishy washy, honest, it's just how it is. How dark are your teeth to start with? How susceptible are they to the whitening gel? How white do you want them? Do you use it on consecutive days? It's a bit like pushing a car in that it's easier once you get it going. The average is about 2 weeks all being fair but it can take as little as a couple of days to over a month.

The beauty of this technique is that it is very flexible. You can fit it in when it is most convenient. As it is a steady procedure it tends to give really stable results and you have the kit to top up at your leisure. If you run out of gel you can buy extra without breaking the bank. You may be able to tell but I like this technique. There are other techniques of "power whitening" but that's it for now.

My daughter's football team did well at the weekend. They lost but only by one goal at 4-3. They are starting to come on a bit. Roll on the warmer weather though, us parents and the poor substitutes are all nithered on the touchline. Nithered, that's a word I learned in the East Riding. Until next time.





Start at GR. 187284 Drapers Lane, Hedon. Distance 5.0 Miles.

ralk in a southerly direction along the grassed area on Drapers Lane and cross a footbridge over Burstwick Drain and then turn left in front of the The Haven Arms and continue along this lane passing farm

buildings to the right.

On reaching a minor road, cross straight over and continue along an enclosed path/lane with allotments to the left. After a short distances, follow the track sharp right ignoring a foot bridge ahead, and then enter a grassed area. Walk to the main road, cross a stile, cross the road and continue straight ahead with the drain on the left.


Cross the next foot bridge and then turn right and keep the drain on the right. At the end of the houses continue straight ahead again keeping the drain on the right. Pass through a hand gate and follow the path to a second gate and emerge on the old railway track. Double back to the left and follow the railway track back towards Hedon. Cross a minor road and continue ahead on the railway track.


At the next main road (Hull Road) again cross over and continue down the track passing the old Hedon railway station on the left. After a short distance leave the railway track by a gap on the left and walk with the hedge on the left, cross over a drain and turn right.

After a short distance, cross the drain by a foot bridge and pass through a metal gate and then pass through a kissing gate and emerge on the road. At the end of the road, cross a grassed area diagonally to the right and then join a tarmac path and continue to emerge on the main road.

Turn right and after passing the bus stop, cross the road and walk along the grassed area with the drain on the right and housing estate to the left. Continue in this direction and pass through a gate and immediately reach Burstwick drain ahead. Turn left and keep the drain on the right to eventually reach the grassed area at the end of Drapers Lane. Turn left to return to the start.

In the Garden



his month there are signs of the approaching spring, with bulbs appearing and birds and wildlife waking up as light levels and temperatures increase. There's plenty to do indoors this month, all in preparation for the season ahead. Outdoors, the garden is coming to life again, and its time to prune shrubs, such as Wisteria.

A changing climate could have consequences for all gardeners. Weather Damage

Most trees and shrubs have a few leaves that suffer damage or disfigurement during the growing season. Often our first thoughts are attack by pest or disease, but many times it is due to the weather.

Signs of weather damage include:

Brown leaves:

Scorched leaves: Indicate water is being lost from the leaves faster than it is being replaced. This usually happens to plants situated in positions that catch the sun all day, or those in exposed sites.

Physical damage: Leaning, tearing, breakage or abrasion is normally due to wind exposure or mechanical damage.

Top 10 jobs

- 1. Prepare vegetable seed beds, and sow some vegetables under cover
- 2. Chit potato tubers
- 3. Protect blossom on apricots, nectarines and peaches
- 4. Net fruit and vegetable crops to keep the birds off
- 5. Prune winter-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering
- 6. Divide bulbs such as snowdrops, and plant those that need planting 'in the green'
- 7. Prune Wisteria
- 8. Prune hardy evergreen hedges and renovate overgrown deciduous hedges
- 9. Prune conservatory climbers
- 10. Cut back deciduous grasses left uncut over the winter







Creased leaves: This type of stop-go growth happens where temperatures and soil moisture fluctuate.

Bud and leaf drop: Caused by lack of moisture, fluctuating growing conditions, frost or wind damage at any time between bud formation until flowering.

Dieback of shoots or whole plants: Browning of shoots suggests that something is preventing moisture reaching the affected leaves. Waterlogging and drought may be involved, but pests and fungal root diseases are also often to blame.

When all leaves uniformly turn yellow or brown, the cause is most likely to be one that affects roots and water, or nutrient, supply.

A single weather event can cause damage, such as a storm, snow or frost. But sometimes worse damage is by prolonged weather events such as drought or waterlogging. And new plants often are more susceptible than established plants

Unfortunately the symptoms of weather damage are often similar to those caused by pest, disease or nutrient deficiency. And in some cases, the symptoms from weather damage might take weeks (or months) to show up in a plant.

When faced with brown leaves, wilting or dieback, do consider the weather over the past 12 months, as well as looking for signs of pest, disease or nutrient deficiency.

Drought: In dry spells, roots cannot gather sufficient water to sustain the foliage. Leaves start to wilt first, followed by leaf and bud loss, and ultimately die-back of shoots or whole plants. Parts of the plants furthest from the roots are usually affected first and most severely. Newly planted climbers, shrubs and especially trees are at extra risk because their root system takes several years to develop to the point where they are drought-proof. Do remember that root diseases cause similar symptoms.

Sun: As well as water loss, excessive sunshine can lead to scorched areas of leaves, typically on the sunny side of plants and not on the lower leaves, those within plants or on the shaded side. Woodland plants such as Acer palmatum are especially vulnerable to sun damage. Water on leaves can act as a lens that concentrates the light leading to burnt patches.

Flooding: Soil filled with water contains too little air for plant roots to thrive. In winter when plant roots are dormant they can survive quite long periods of flooding, but in summer when the water demand of roots is high, even short periods of a few days can be fatal.

Heavy rain: Tends to affect the top of plants with rain damage breaking delicate shoots and flowers. However it is soil saturation and flooding that causes most harm.

Frost: Also tends to affect the top of plants where the freezing is most intense. Lower leaves and areas inside the leaf canopy are less affected. Frost can damage plants randomly in an affected area with some plants losing buds, foliage, flowers and fruits and others being unaffected.

Snow: As well as freezing damage, mechanical damage is caused by the weight of snow breaking branches.

Hail: Causes bruising and abrasion and occasionally defoliation or loss of fruits. Hail causes tiny scars on young leaves and fruits that become very noticeable as the plants develop. Hail damage mainly affects the top of plants.

High winds: Cause damage to the upper and windward sides of plants. In severe cases plants can be uprooted. Windy weather also dries out leaves leading to browning, scorching and loss of buds, flowers and leaves.

Do:

Make long-term plantings of trees, shrubs and hedges that are drought tolerant.

Plant long-term shelter to protect the garden from stormier weather. Improve soil with grit, gravel and organic matter to ensure drainage and nutrients; additional drainage may have to be installed before planting long-term plants.

Build water collection and disposal measures into new hard landscaping, greenhouses and sheds.

Invest in water features and ponds - they will benefit wildlife and will be appreciated in hotter, drier summers.

Don't:

Make long-term plantings in areas liable to flood.

Clear established vegetation from slopes, but work new plants into existing growth.

Devote extensive areas to plants that suffer in wet winters and summer droughts - including lawns on dry soil.

Remove long-established trees and shrubs - these often have extensive root systems that can withstand drought and protect soil from erosion.





Cottingham Wild Spaces Group

The members from the Friends of The Dene and Mill Beck Wildlife Group decided in Spring 2007 to join together to form the Cottingham Wild Spaces Group.

The group is supported by Cottingham Parish Council and exists to develop wildlife projects in the village and has completed successful programmes at Mill Beck, King George V Woodland and at Dene Wood. Successful grant applications have been made to the National Lottery, these have helped the group to achieve many of our aims including the installation of the sculptures in King George V woodland and the production of leaflets for Mill Beck and the purchase of equipment for the litter picks.

The volunteers carry out a litter pick on the first Sunday of each month starting at 10.00 am alternating between The Dene and Mill Beck, King George V Woodland. There are 17 active members, of which two, are our East Riding ward councillors, but we are always looking for new members to share in our activities.

Litter picks are followed by refreshments and a chance to discuss future projects. We are currently working with the Yorkshire Wildlife Trust on developing a new project to raise the profile of the important wildlife sites of Snuff Mill and Priory Fields. The objective being to have them designated as Local Nature Reserves.

100 trees have been planted on Mill Beck and in King George V woodland over this winter to continue the enhancement of these sites for wildlife. The group organises guided walks and practical days often in conjunction with Yorkshire Wildlife Trust and Cottingham Wildlife Watch Group.

We welcome new members and volunteers to help us with our work. The next meeting is on Sunday 7th March at 10.00 am in The Dene, followed by a meeting on Sunday 4th April (Easter Sunday) at Mill Beck. There may be small Easter Eggs for volunteers who attend meeting in the allotment car park at 10.00 am. They will be joined by members of the Cottingham Wildlife Watch Group at 11.00 am.

Hallgate Schools - continued

January to December 1921

by Peter Railton (Author and Local Historian)

n the 3rd, of January 1921, Mr. Ness the Attendance Officer called at the schools regarding certificates necessary for employing boys and girls under 13 years of age after school delivering newspapers, as errand boys, helping on the land and so on. Staff shortages and illness persisted and on the 15th of January Mr. Moorby records that,

"It has been desperate work - short of staff - it is a great strain." Then he fell ill again and his wife stepped into the breach once more, but she had to keep leaving St.V to their own devices periodically to attend to the doctor and the parents of infants who were being examined over a couple of days. Mr. Moorby returned to school on the 21st, but was so ill that a doctor had to be called to the school and he was taken home, but returned to school later on the 24th, when another teacher fell ill.

Merry-go-Round of Teachers

This state of affairs persisted until February, with a merry-goround of teachers appearing then vanishing; classes were often combined - there was no alternative. It still happens occasionally when a teacher is suddenly absent, say for half a day and the Head is unable to step in, but a supply teacher is usually called in for longer periods of a teacher's absence. It certainly must have been a great strain for everyone concerned.

It was Mr. Moorby's birthday on the 2nd. of March and "Information leaked out and no end of boys offered congratulations -both by word of mouth and by letter."


- an example of the esteem in which Mr. Moorby was held. Miss Cumberbirch of Hull Training College on Cottingham Road, wrote to him regarding the placing of more of her students on teaching practice in the boys' department, and eight female students arrived in due course and were distributed among the various classes in May; no doubt the Head would have appreciated these arrangements a few weeks earlier.

At the end of May, Mr. W. Richardson the school caretaker retired after 26 years at the school and was presented with a 'suitable memento'. A total of £7.00 was subscribed by the pupils of the three departments. Mr. Arthur Sewell, an old scholar who had started his school days under Mr. Moorby in 1882, was appointed in his place.

Sunday School Feasts

The various Sunday School Feasts were held and the schools closed early as appropriate. Cottingham Clubs Feast was held in July for the first time since 1914 and the schools were closed for the day; the event was celebrated in great style with the usual parades, food stalls, swings and roundabouts, dancing on the green - a return to local traditions after the traumers of the Great War.

Several scholarships were awarded that year - to Wm. S. Hall, Henry Padget, Reginald Skinner, Basil Nias, and Arthur Bullivent. Horace Ashton of St. VII had reached the age of 14 and left of his own accord on his birthday; this was contrary to directions from County Hall and he was brought back to school until the end of the term.

Teachers and Pupils Struck Down with Flu

In the girls' school, the redoubtable Mrs. Holmes was struck down with the flu in March, along with some of the girls who had been affected by illness in their school as well as the boys' and infants' departments, which was understandable as brothers and sisters passed the 'bugs' between them, then on to the teachers - or vice versa.

Doris Scott and Doris Fussey were granted Conditional Exemption Certificates and left school after the Easter holidays in April. Tuesday the 24th of May was Empire Day and was as usual, observed by all the scholars; flags were flown, patriotic songs were sung and much marching up and down was the order of the day, and a half day's holiday was given in the afternoon. The significance of Empire Day was redoubled after the First World War and was always observed in the schools.

Martha Scott was granted an Exemption Certificate and Mrs. Holmes records that -

"St. VII is now a very small class indeed."

Mrs. Peak began duties as a supply teacher at the end of June and took St. I. A Miss Cleater commenced duties as a certificated teacher in July, and thirty four little girls 'went up' to the 'big girls' after the summer holidays and were in the charge of Miss Wright in St. I.

Dental Examinations

A dental examination took place in October in all the departments, and back in the girls' school there was a display of gymnastics and dancing to parents, which was under the direction of Miss Wolstenholme from County Hall. Lessons had to be suspended due to the fact that most girls were involved and consequently there was a great deal of coming and going in the corridors and the classrooms were used for changing anyway; the venue is uncertain but these events could have been held in the infants' hall because it was bigger than the girls' hall - just a guess; 'Drill' classes were held every Friday by Miss Wolstenholme and at other times by the teachers. Nurse Ward paid regular visits to the school-checking on the health of the girls.

Clearly there was a tremendous effort directed towards the general health and well being of the girls and this was mirrored in the boys' department and was part of a drive undertaken by local authorities and the government to improve the health of children after the Great War, which had shown up many lamentable cases of poor health and physique among service personnel.

H.M.I.'s paid regular visits to the departments to check on exam results and local inspectors were frequent visitors along with the Rev. Lowndes from the Board of Managers - health, progress and administration were carefully monitored. It can clearly "be seen that great strides forward had been made in all aspects of children's education and health in those few years after the end of the war in 1918. It is to the credit of the three head teachers and the staffs of the departments that they usually had terms like "very satisfactory", "great improvements", etc. appended to reports on the schools.

In December, Sts. VI and VII wrote essays on -

"How we can help our disabled soldiers and sailors"

Very significant locally as well as nationally and was also taken up in the boys' school, where Mr. Moorby - ever enthusiastic about Gilbert and Sullivan - taught the song 'The Merry Maidens and the Tar" from H.M.S. Pinafore to the older boys. The school gardens were 'cleaned up' and the last of the potatoes dug up in October - Arron Comrade did well it seems. On November 17th, three coats were taken from one of the cloakrooms between 9.00 and 10.45 a.m. They belonged to B. Reeves, G. Gardham and H. Foster and they were never found; Mr.Moorby told the school that he had informed the police as a deterent to any future thefts.

Boys in the upper standards did some paintings to adorn calendars for 1922 to be sold for the "Hull Bootless Bairns" fund - an indication of the poverty experienced by many families, especially after the death of the 'bread winner' during the Great War. Schools closed at 12 noon on the 23rd of December 1921.

Last Chance Alley

ow that the big freeze has abated, I have been able to pick up the training side of my work, three horses have come to me...two from Rugby and one from Bury near Manchester. Their desperate owners have travelled far to bring these animals to me to see if we can turn them around.

The mare from Bury is called Kiera and she has a significant problem....she is unrideable! Bless her, she suffered a severe trauma to her spine and has had extensive treatment from her owners vets and physio's. The end result is that the mare has known pain and therefore expects pain, which is why she displays severe resentment to being saddled even, let alone allowing a rider back on board.

We do know that she is no longer in pain which gives me, and

everyone else who deals with her, the confidence to now ask her to let go of her habitual fear and her habitual protective behaviour. We have had her two weeks now and in that time we have gone about her training, by making her face her fears and let go of the panic. We repeat and repeat the exercises, always giving her positive reinforcement. Little by little Kiera has started to think instead of panic, rationalise instead of reacting and she is really coming round nicely.

In this short space of time we are now able to saddle her without tension or reaction and are just nicely sitting on her without the desperate and violent reactions of before. It is not much fun sitting on a horse which wants nothing more than to dump you unceremoniously at the first opportunity!

Her owners have been trying for over a year to turn her round and she has been to another trainer who did not manage to help. Yesterday Kiera started to walk round the school on her own volition, no resentment, no fear and no violence....fingers crossed for our continued success with winning her back from the brink.

The next horse is Abby. She is a beautifully bred Dutch horse with amazing movement and energy. Her problem is that she is so stressy that she has lost the ability to think, let alone concentrate on her work. The end result of this is an incredibly erratic horse who is not safe to ride. She has only ever been inside indoor schools so has never faced the big wide world of traffic, objects in general (ie Bins, prams, dogs, children or people on pavements), all the outside influences of noise and weather conditions etc. As she is only 5 years old, this time with us must work. She should have a career in competition ahead of her if only we can teach her to cope with "Life".

She has become very attached to another horse as a result of her fragile disposition and suffers from separation anxiety when taken away. Again, lots of repetition and positive reinforcement, alongside exposure to all things in a controlled way, will hopefully turn her round as she has the potential to be worth a lot of money as a future Dressage horse. We will see!

The third horse is the most worrying to me. You may have seen me working her on BBC 'Look North' not long back. Her name is Star and she is aggression personified. This mare has gone over the edge and I really don't know if, in her own heart, she is capable of trusting anyone being on top of her again.

Yet again, as a result of having suffered severe pain in her back, she will not so much as let you attempt to get on her, let alone ride. In the beginning she started threatening us by being defensive and sharp in her stable, quick to turn her hind legs round at us (all very protective and threatening) now she is relaxed on the ground, in all ways too rugging, brushing, feet picked out feeding etc.

The trouble started in earnest when we attempted to start any work in the school. She simply attacks you any way she can and with her being very much taller than me to start with, we have had some wary moments!! I have had to start breaking down those barriers in her head which led her to be so defensive. We can now lunge her round us on a long rope...this was not possible before as we were warned that she would suddenly lunge at you with her front legs up in the air, ears laid flat back and teeth bared. And "Oh boy"...did she!!!! I do have to say that as a party trick in shear intimidation, she was very good at that one!!! If that failed to gain her ground, then she would spin in mid air and let drive with both hind legs...my head height!!! Not nice. One seriously angry horse I have to say, which in reality is so sad.

However, for the most part, she now feels that she can stop doing all that and in so many ways she is very much quieter and happier in her own skin. We are doing a lot of close contact work with her now, where she could get us at any time, only she is happy not to. At no point have we hurt her or harmed her in any way and we are constantly praising and stroking her face first to show that we are actually a nice place to be. However, we are quick to send her backwards or away at the first sight of intimidation.

Now we are at the nitty gritty stage.....trying to get her to allow us back on board. If you stand sideways on to her (as if to mount) we get bitten in front and "cow kicked from behind. If you move to avoid one, the other gets you! For my part, I have chosen repetition...going over and over the same exercises with soft praise in order to give her the chance to change her mind.

Will we win? I simply have no idea. If we don't then she will have a very uncertain future. She is not a candidate to breed from because of this aggressive side to her personality. I do hate having to be "last chance alley".

Potted History of the Wolds Lacemakers

rolds Lacemakers was set up in March 1985 by the founder Chairman Maureen Bromley, who with some of her lace colleagues, felt that there was a need for a Lace Society in

The Society originally met at Halls around the area of Hull and East Yorkshire (which was then known as Humberside) for the first year, but it was decided that it would be better if the group met regularly in one

The meetings were then held at Swanland Village Hall, but when the hall became too small to hold the members wishing to attend, it transferred its meetings to its current venue of St John of Newland Church Hall Clough Road Hull.

The meetings are held four times a year and a variety of talks and workshops are offered. A supplier is in attendance.

There is a newsletter which is issued four times a year which contains articles, details of upcoming events, details of the committee, patterns and a competition. A prize is awarded for the competition at the next meeting after the magazine has been issued. The Society also now has a website, www.woldslacemakers.co.uk which contains further information about the Society.

The Society's annual Lace Day is currently held at Hessle Town Hall, but the Society's first Lace Day was held at the Church Hall Chanterlands Road Cottingham Road Hull. Subsequently, the Lace Day was then transferred to the Army Transport Museum at Beverley for a number of years before being moved to the current venue at Hessle. Speakers vary from the antidotes of a bobbin maker to talks on antique lace. Suppliers are also in attendance.

There is an annual lace competition which is held in May, named the Elma Collier Lace Competition, after one of the members of the group, when those attending the meeting vote on their favourite piece of lace entered by putting money into a box. The piece of lace that has the most money on is the winner who receives a pair of bobbins inscribed "In memory of Elma Collier Competition". The money raised is then donated to the Charity of the winner's choice.

The Society entered the "Rings & Roundels" competition in the mid eighties with the then committee members designing patterns which where then made into a mobile. Unfortunately the lace did not win.

After that the Society then decided that it would ask the members to make a 3" square in lace. There were enough squares to make a banner which is displayed at all the Society's events. All the lace pieces are square, apart from two pieces, one is the Lincolnshire Imp and the other is a circular piece of lace in Milanese which is of a fish. The Society logo is also on the banner.

All are welcome to attend both the meetings and the Lace Day.




The walls used to be lined with books for the library, but now the travelling library visits the car park on Tuesdays, and the fish and chip van comes on Mondays.
