

(7) Hornbeam Drive – within large grassy area which already has trees planted. Opposite Snuff Mill Lane pathway.	1 hornbeam 2 birch





In the Kitchen

Ingredient of the Month - Honey

oney is one of natures wonders and has been a treasured commodity for centuries. It is produced naturally by bees as a lot of it as you'll read further on) then we come along and reap the benefits of their hard labour. In fairness, it should be mentioned that European honeybees, genus Apis Mellifera, produce far more than the hive can eat which is why they are found in beekeepers' hives worldwide.

History of Honey

It is acknowledged that bees have been producing honey for 150 million years, but some of the earliest written references about honey have been found dating back to the 40th Century B.C. in ancient Egypt and it is also referred to in the Old Testament Bible - in particular the well known saying "the land of milk and honey".

Later, when the Spaniards conquered Mexico and central America in the 16th Century, they found that the natives had already developed beekeeping where a distinct family of honey bees were native to the Americas.

European settlers introduced European honeybees to New England in about 1638. North American natives called these "white man's flies." Until the middle of the 17th Century, honey was the most important sweetening agent in the western world, at which time West Indian cane sugar became more affordable to the masses.

What is Honey and how is it produced?

Basically, honey is nectar with added enzymes. Nectar is the clear liquid that drops from the end of a flower blossom, which is 80% water with some complex sugars.

Honeybees suck the nectar out of the flowers then store it in their "honey stomachs" (they actually have two stomachs). Once their honey stomach is full, they return to the hive or nest. But consider this: Honeybees must visit between 100 and 1500 flowers in order to fill their honey stomachs and when full, it holds almost 70 mg of nectarwhich is almost as much as the bee weighs itself!

Once back at the hive, worker bees suck the nectar from the honeybees' stomachs, then "chew" the nectar for about half an hour. During this time, enzymes are passed into the nectar breaking them down into simple sugars to make them more digestible for the bees. The nectar is then spread throughout the honeycombs where it evaporates into a thick syrup, aided by the bees fanning it with their wings. Once the honey is thick enough, the bees seal off the cell of the honeycomb with wax and there it is stored ready to be eaten.

Whilst bee nests obviously occur naturally, commercially "farmed" honey is usually obtained from man-made beehives. Once the honeycombs are removed from the hives, extractor tanks, or centrifuge machines, whirl the honey-combs around so the honey is separated from the wax comb. This produces a liquid honey.

What gives honey its flavour?

The aroma, flavour and colour of honey varies quite dramatically depending on the type of flower from which the bee collects the nectar.

Most honey comes from bees feeding on various flowers. These are known as polyfloral. However some plants provide enough nectar during their short flowering season to enable the bees in the area to feed solely on that type of blossom. This honey, known as monofloral, is keenly sought by beekeepers and consumers alike.

Many monofloral honey carry the characteristics of the herb or tree whose flower the bee has visited, such as Orange Blossom or Rosemary and are much sought after for culinary purposes.

Origin of Honey

There are many types of honey

Important: Honey can contain bacterial spores that cause Infant Botulism and should therefore never be fed to babies under 12 months old

Honey in Cooking

What's the difference? Runny or Set

There is no difference in the taste or nutritional value of clear and set honey. Honey can always be restored to a liquid state by standing it in warm water for an hour or so or popping it in the microwave for a few seconds however, avoid extreme temperatures.

Monofloral or Polyfloral

There is no nutritional difference between blended honey and monofloral honeys. The extraction process is essentially the same for all types and grades of honey. However, use of monofloral honey in recipes can create a dramatic difference in the overall taste, especially in dressings.

Hot Honeyed Chicken

Ingredients

120ml/4fl.oz. Honey

1 tbsp Hot Red Pepper Sauce

4 Chicken Breasts

Instructions

- 1. In a small bowl, combine the honey and hot pepper sauce and mix
- 2. Make 3 or 4 diagonal cuts in the chicken breasts, about 1cm/1/2 inch deep then spread the sauce over each chicken breast, making sure the sauce penetrates the cuts.
- 3. Grill for 15 minutes, basting occasionally, or until the chicken is cooked through. Serve hot and use any remaining sauce as a dip.

Honey Nut Biscuits

Makes approx. 36 biscuits Ingredients
100g/4oz Ground Almonds
100g/4oz Ground Hazelnuts
2 tbsp Honey
250g/9oz Caster Sugar
50g/2oz Candied Peel, chopped
2 Egg Whites
For the icing
4 tbsp Icing Sugar
1 tbsp Lemon Juice

Instructions

- 1. In a large mixing bowl, mix together all the nuts, sugar, honey, peel and egg whites. Knead into a workable dough then leave in a cool place for at least 30 minutes.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 170C, 325F, Gas mark 3 and lightly butter and flour 3-4 baking sheets.
- 3. Turn the dough onto a surface which has been thickly dusted with icing sugar and roll out to 5 mm/1/4 inch thickness. Cut into squares or diamonds and transfer to the baking sheets, spacing well apart. Bake in the oven for 25-30 minutes.
- 4. In another bowl, mix together the icing ingredients and use to cover the biscuits whilst they are still warm. Cool completely before eating.

Baked Honeyed Vegetables

12 Small New Potatoes, halved 60ml/2fl.oz. Honey 3 tbsp Dry White Wine (check manufacture) 1 Garlic Clove, crushed Salt and Pepper

- 2 teasp freshly chopped Oregano
- 2 Courgettes (zucchini), thickly sliced
- 1 Small Aubergine (eggplant), thickly sliced
- 1 Sman Aubergine (eggpiant), unickly succed 1 Red Capsicum (sweet pepper), deseeded and quartered lengthways
- 1 large Onion, thickly sliced

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200C, 400F, Gas Mark 6. Place the potatoes in a saucepan, cover with water, bring to boil and simmer 10 minutes.
- 2. Meanwhile, place the honey, wine, garlic, salt, pepper and and oregano in a small mixing bowl and mix well.
- 3. Drain the potatoes and place in a large bowl together with the remaining vegetables.
- 4. Add the honey mixture and toss thoroughly.
- 5. Transfer to a shallow ovenproof dish and bake, uncovered, for 25 minutes or until tender, mixing 2 or 3 times during the cooking period. Serve immediately.

Chelsea bun recipe

Makes approx 16
Ingredients
For the Dough
450g /1lb Strong White Bread Flour
A pinch salt
50g /2oz Butter or Margarine
50g /2oz Soft Brown Sugar
1 x 7 g Sachet Fast Action Yeast
150ml/5fl.oz. Tepid Milk
2 Eggs, beaten

For the Filling 50g /2oz Soft Brown Sugar 100g/4oz Dried Mixed Fruit 1 teasp Ground Cinnamon 25g /1oz Butter, melted For the Glaze: 50g /2oz caster sugar 2 tbsp Milk 50g /2oz Butter 50g /2oz Honey

Instructions

- 1 Mix the flour and salt together in a large mixing bowl then rub in the fat until well incorporated.
- 2. Stir in sugar and yeast then add the milk and eggs and mix to form a dough.
- 3. Turn out onto a lightly floured surface and knead well for 10 minutes then place dough in a bowl, cover with oiled clingfilm and leave in a warm place for 60-90 minutes until dough has doubled in size.
- 4 In a bowl, mix together the dry filling ingredients and grease two 20cm/8-inch sandwich tins.
- 5. Once the dough has risen, turn onto a lightly floured surface, roll out to a 35 cm/14 inch square, brush with melted butter and sprinkle over the fruit mixture.
- 6. Roll up like a Swiss roll then cut up into 16 slices, arrange cut-sides down in the sandwich tins, cover with oiled clingfilm and leave in a warm place until the buns have increased in size again about 30 minutes.
- 7. Meanwhile, pre-heat the oven to 200C, 400F, Gas Mark 6. Once risen, bake for 25-35 minutes until golden brown. Turn out onto a wire rack.
- 8. Make the glaze by melting all the glaze ingredients together in a saucepan, bring to the boil stirring constantly, and allow to cook for 1 minute until the sugar has dissolved. Brush over warm buns and allow to cool before serving.

Fears for Tears

At the practice we have made March Dry eye month.

ry eye or its technical name Keratoconjunctivitis sicca (we'll stick to dry eye) is a very common condition affecting 1:22 dogs where there is a lack of tear production caused by destruction of the tear gland by the dogs own immune system.

The loss of tears causes the eye to become very dry and uncomfortable. Conjunctivitis, eye infections and ulcers become more common and if untreated the surface of the eye becomes pigmented leading to permanent blindness.


Certain breeds are predisposed to developing dry eye, the English cocker spaniel, West Highland white terrier, Cavalier King Charles Spaniel, Shih-Tzu and other breeds with bulbous eyes.

So if your dog is one of the above breeds or has suffered from recurrent eye infections then you should have a dry eye test done at your veterinary surgery.

How to diagnose dry eye?

Testing for dry eye is very simple using a test called the schirmer tear test, a very posh name for placing a piece of filter paper in the conjunctival sac of the eye and measuring how far the tears travel in a minute. If after a minute the tears have travelled more than 15mm than that is normal, between 10-15 mm is borderline and repeat testing in a month will be necessary, less than 10mm and your dog definitely has dry eye.

How is dry eye treated?

With the correct treatment dry eye can be managed long term for many years. As already stated the dry eye is caused by the dogs own immune system destroying the tear gland so the sooner this can be stopped the better. The best treatment is to us a topical eye cream containing cyclosporin, a powerful immunosuppressive that acts locally in the eye to stop the immune system destroying the tear gland but also acts to reduce the inflammation.

Usually there is a significant improvement in tear production in 2 weeks although full tear production may take up to 6 weeks. It is always tempting for owners when the eyes improve to stop the treatment however treatment for dry eye is for life and if it is stopped more tear gland destruction will continue and eventually there will be total destruction of the tear gland.

Other medications such as artificial tears and eye lubricants will help but will not tackle the underlying problem.

Occasionally the dry eye will not respond to the cyclosporin cream, usually because by the time the condition has been diagnosed the entire tear gland has been destroyed. In these cases lubricant and artificial tears will help but also there is a surgical option, a parotid duct transposition.

This is a very tricky operation where the parotid salivary duct which carries saliva from the parotid salivary gland to the mouth is diverted to the eye, so saliva lubricates the eye. This operation is far from ideal though as saliva contains a lot of calcium which congregates around the eyelids and must be seen as a last option. So if your dog is one of the at risk breeds or has recurrent eye infections book in for a dry eye test as prompt treatment of dry eye is all important.

ver wanted to look up one of the website addresses I often show in this article, (see next item also) but thought it was too long and complex to type? Well the good news is you can open the online version of the article and then just click on the link! Go to: www.rdmills.com and then click on the *Useful Articles* page and choose the article you want, and click to open it, and then the links shown will take you straight to the website.

Hyperlink is the term used to show a link to another page or website, and can be found on web pages and in emails as well as articles. The basic form is a website address, which would be underlined (as shown in the item above). But a hyperlink can be hidden behind a word or a picture. For instance if you receive a sales email from a company, it will often show a picture of a product that when you click on it, takes you straight to their website. These links are often blocked by email programs for security reasons, owing to the risk of being whisked off to a website you may not want to visit. There is normally a banner at the top of any such email telling you can click to unblock the links. If you trust the sender then it is no problem to do this.

Tip: If a link doesn't seem to work, try holding down the Ctrl key on your keyboard when you click.

Is the internet running out of addresses? This is a story in the news recently saying that the Asia/Pacific region has put in an urgent request for more addresses. All computer devices in the world have to have a unique number, known as an IP address, very much like a phone number, which makes it accessible to other computers via the internet. Because of the explosive growth of the internet, the original pool of addresses is running low. Although a new standard exists, it is a case of when it will become widely available.

Buying online is a massive market enjoyed by millions; but is a real no-go area for some people. This is understandable when you consider the number of scams and threats that exist on the internet, but it isn't all bad. It is about having confidence and enjoying the considerable benefits of online shopping. If you have never tried it, perhaps you could get a family member or trusted friend to sit with you and guide you through the process. Start with a small purchase like books or CDs to appreciate the convenience. Ouestions and answers section:

- Q: Why has Outlook suddenly appeared as my email program, but I have never used it before?
- A: This normally happens if you have just installed Microsoft Office which includes Outlook, or your computer has installed updates for Office. To get back your original program, Outlook Express for instance, find it on the Programs menu and open it, and it will normally ask you if you want it to be your default email program. Or go to Control Panel, Internet Options, and Programs to select the correct one from the drop down menu. This also works if your browser has changed from Chrome or Firefox to Explorer or vice versa.
- Q: I used Windows Mail on my new PC, now it has become Live Mail. How did that happen?
- A: It will be through Windows Update, Live Mail is the latest version of the program used in Windows Vista and Windows 7.
- Q: Whenever I go to print, a window comes up on screen asking me where I want to save the document. Why is that?
- A: This can happen if you have changed or deleted your printer. To check, go to Control Panel, Printers, and then right click on the correct printer and click: set as default.
 - Q: What is a memory stick and do I need one?
- A: Very useful bits of kit these. A memory stick, aka pen drive, usb stick etc., is basically extra storage. You can use one as a backup device to save all your photographs on for instance, or to move data between computers. Very low-cost, and space is pretty massive, starting at 1Gb. That's about the amount you may have had on your first PC's hard drive!



Obviously the first port of call was hospital and thankfully he was generally OK. When he came to see me his lips and face were swollen so I just did some remedial treatment to seal the teeth off to protect them. They were in a bit if a state. Luckily the pulp (nerve) was not exposed so we decided to do some bonding. Alex thought that he would have to lose at least one tooth. The damage was worse than they looked from the front as well.

We did some minimal surface preparation, mainly to remove the grit and then bonded on composite resin, building up in layers. It took about ninety minutes to do.

Alex was really chuffed and went to the trouble of writing me a thank you card which is lovely. He was a really good lad and made it easy for me to do so thank you Alex.

Keeping Teeth For Life, Now Who Would Like That?

As you can see this is a really neat technique and in keeping things so minimally invasive there is a much greater chance of keeping the teeth viable for life. The composite may wear or even break in time but they can be repaired. This keeps the biological insult to the tooth and pulp to a minimum which can only be a good thing.

Start at GR. 923311 Small free car park on left down Church Street or road side near Clock Tower.

Distance 4.3 Miles.

eave the cross roads near the clock tower and walk in a north easterly direction on the Beverley road.

After about 400 metres turn right onto a farm track and eventually enter a Willow planted field and take the path diagonally to the left heading for a copse of trees on the hill.



Cross this field to meet the road, turn right and follow the road as it bends sharp left to Mount Airy Farm

Pass the farm on the right and pass through a small belt of trees and then immediately turn right and walk with the belt of trees on the right. After about 100 metres turn right and pass through the narrow belt of trees and then immediately turn left. You are now walking with the belt of trees on your left and a small Hawthorn hedge on the right. From this point there are superb views over the river Humber.

Eventually this path begins to descend. Cross a stile and continue to descend on a well defined path. Cross another stile and continue to descend. On reaching the bottom of the hill, follow a well defined path to a kissing gate as you begin to climb. Continue through a metal gate (normally left open) with Woodale Farm on the right. Ignore the path to the left but pass round the farm keeping it on your right. Pass through a metal gate and then after about 20 metres emerge onto the farm road. Turn left and walk away from the farm on this metalled road. Continue along this farm road to emerge onto the Brantingham road at a sharp bend.

On reaching the road continue straight ahead and pass over the A63. On reaching the cross roads continue straight ahead into Ring Beck Lane. You are now entering Ellerker. At the next junction, turn right into Mill Hill and at a sharp left hand bend locate a path on the right, crossing a stream and walking along this enclosed footpath. The path eventually enters open fields with views of Mount Airy to the right. On approaching buildings, bear left and keep the fence and buildings to the right. Cross over a stile onto a farm lane, cross the lane and take the path on the right. Pass a gas complex on the left and follow this path through trees. Climb some steps to emerge on the South Cave slip road for the A63. Cross this junction with care, pass over the A63 and walk back into South Cave.

In the Garden





pring usually arrives by mid-March and the frequent sunny days provide the opportunity for an increasing range of gardening tasks. It's time to get busy preparing seed beds, sowing seed, cutting back winter shrubs and generally tidying up around the garden.

Cutting back, pruning and dividing

Cut back ornamental grasses and other perennials left for winter interest, if you have not already done so. Even if they still look good, you need to make way for the new growth.

Cut off old leaves of hellebores that produce flowers from ground level (including Helleborus x hybridus and H. niger) to expose the flowers and remove possible foliar diseases such as hellebore leaf spot.

Divide and/or plant bulbs-in-the-green, such as snowdrops (Galanthus) and winter aconites (Eranthis hyemalis), if not done last month.

Divide clumps of herbaceous perennials that you want to propagate, those that have become too large for their allotted space, and those that are flowering poorly or have lost their shape.

- 1. Plant shallots, onion sets and early potatoes
- 2. Protect new spring shoots from slugs
- 3. Plant summer-flowering bulbs
- 4. Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials
- 5. Top dress containers with fresh compost
- 6. Mow the lawn on dry days (if needed)
- 7. Cut back Cornus (dogwood) and Salix (willow) grown for colourful winter stems
- 8. Weeds come back in to growth deal with them before they get out of hand
- 9. Start feeding fish and using the pond fountain; remove pond heaters
- 10. Open the greenhouse or conservatory doors and vents on warm days.

Divide hostas before they come into leaf.

Divide hellebores and polyanthus-type primulas after flowering.

Propagation

Propagate more dahlias from tubers. Pot them up in multi-purpose compost so that the old stalk is just above the surface. Water and place in a warm, light position or in a propagator. Once the fresh shoots have grown to 7.5-10cm (3-4in), cut them off carefully with a knife. Dust the ends with hormone rooting power and push them into a pot containing cuttings compost. Place back in a propagator or plastic bag until roots appear.

Sowing and planting

Hardy annuals can be sown in pots or modules to provide colour in the garden. In mild areas you can sow directly outside. Marking out irregularly shaped seedbeds and broadcasting drifts of different seed gives a more natural look.

Sweet peas can be sown outside this month. Place autumn-sown sweet peas in a sunny position, perhaps on a high shelf in the greenhouse that gets plenty of light. Sow summer bedding plants in a heated propagator or under glass.

Early spring is an ideal time to plant herbaceous perennials, including Geranium, Astrantia and Oriental poppies.

Plant summer-flowering bulbs. Prepare the soil first, to ensure that drainage is sufficient to prevent the bulbs rotting. Anemone coronaria tubers need particularly well-drained soils.

Plan a continuous crop of cut flowers for this summer. Perennials such as Delphinium and annuals can be grown to produce a useful and beautiful display.

When space becomes available in the greenhouse, pot up cuttings of tender perennials taken last summer and at the beginning of this year. Bulk up plant numbers by taking more cuttings from the largest of the new plants.

Indoor forced bulbs that were in the house for winter displays, but which have now finished flowering, can now be planted into the garden, taking care not to disturb the roots.

General maintenance

Continue to deadhead winter-flowering pansies and other winter bedding. Pansies will carry on into the spring and even to early summer, if attended to frequently.

Deadhead the flowers of Narcissus (daffodils) as they fade, but allow the foliage to die down naturally.

Herbaceous perennials infested with couch grass and other perennial weeds should be lifted so the roots of the weeds can be removed. Improve the soil by digging in organic matter before replanting.

Clear up weedy beds before mulching. Lighter soils can be mulched now, but heavier soils are best left until April, when the soil is warmer. Mulching with a deep layer of organic matter helps to condition the soil, suppress weed growth, insulate plant roots from temperature fluctuations, and conserve soil moisture during the summer.

Bulbs coming up in the rock garden or in containers may benefit from overhead protection from the rain. A sheet of glass or Perspex placed on piles of bricks will do the job.

Top dress spring-flowering alpines with grit or gravel to show off the plants and to help prevent stem rots. Mulch may need replacing after weed removal.

Improve the drainage of heavy soils by working in lots of organic matter.

Perennials putting on plenty of growth may need support by the end of the month.

Check whether containers need watering. Even at this time of year, they can dry out. Pots that are sheltered by eaves or balconies can miss out on any rainfall. If in doubt, check the compost at a hand's depth to see if it feels dry. Aim to keep pots moist, not wet, and don't let them dry out.

Pots and tubs benefit from topping up with fresh John Innes compost. Old compost can be removed and replaced with new if there is not much room for topping up.

Feed borders with a general-purpose fertiliser at the manufacturer's recommended rate.





Here is the latest article from Chris who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

ello and welcome again anglers to this month fishing news. It is the 16th Feb. How is your fishing going? Ok I hope. On a personal level my match weights have been steadily improving. When the big defrost came our average winning weights on silver fish waters, such as Newbridge large lake & Tiger Lake, where about the 10lb mark. Now on these same venues, using the same methods and baits, our winning weights are about 30lb plus.

Without being big headed I have won 5 matches out of the last 6 matches. I have been alternating feeder and pole, giving both swims a good rest after about half an hour on each. Even when the bites are still coming I have still switched swims, keeping the bait going in little and often.

The main baits I have been using are bread punch and hemp over liquidised bread. On my feeder line I have used maggot and caster with small amounts of ground bait. In three of my matches I have noticed an odd bonus fish come in on small worm. It would be a good idea to try them as well. A good tip at this time of the year is to stop feeding altogether and go on the bomb instead of casting out any loose offerings. When using this method it is sometimes quite wise to hook a bright

piece of corn, as the fish are not feeding aggressively yet and one piece of corn can entice a fish without spooking them with lots of food on show.

Speaking of our club, we don't officially start fishing for points or trophies until March, but these winter knock ups are great fun and the banter between the lads is great. Our mate Lou is a total beginner, and therefore is expected to win the wooden spoon award for coming last. Yet Dave who is an experienced angler has had his name on the wooden spoon award for the last four matches! He's not happy let me tell you. He keeps saying to Lou, you wait until summer, and then we will see. There is a £30 bet so far on Lou to win this award at the end of the season! It's good to have a laugh among friends.

I have been asked if there are any club places available anywhere, I don't know of any at the moment. So if any of you have any places, or will except riders, can you please let me know at Catchmoore Fishing Tackle 01482 803260 and I will advertise this to all our customers.

Venues that seem to be fishing well at the moment are: River Hull at shipyard with Roach reported to 2lb and bags up to 40lb. Ancholme at Brigg is throwing up regular bags weighing between 20- 30lb of small Roach, Perch and skimmers. Good weights have been reported from Newbridge (all lakes), Sam Hosticks (moat & kingfisher), Tiger lakes, Lambworth lakes (lambworth & tench) and Beverly Beck on town stretch.

Please keep these reports coming in so I can share them with you all. After all a good days fishing is better than a blank, ask Lou or Dave! So let's share these good spots and methods, thank you.

Keep your hooks small and your hook lengths light still. Using light elastics in your poles is still a must. Doing this is a guaranteed way of getting a lot more bites, don't be afraid that you will break off on a bonus fish; they won't fight as hard as they do in the warmer months.

Sea scene: there is still a good number of Cod coming in from Albrough, Rectory, Hillstone, Easington, Out Newton, East Newton and Runnels. Spurn road is producing a few good fish but there is still a weed problem on certain tides. Hornsea and Withernsea seem to be a slower sport but they are producing smaller fish. The best baits are still lugworm and rag worm tipped with either squid, mussel or razor fish. Crab Cart is catching the bonus fish.

Use either a 2 hook Pennell rig or pulley rig; these rigs seem to be the best to use everywhere.

On a final note, if fresh bait is required try to book early in your local tackle shops, as the diggers can only dig so much at a time depending on the tides.



Traffic training

n the last article I introduced Fillisin (Fillis for short). She was a 16.2hh big strong Irish bred mare from North Yorkshire who belonged to the most energetic and engaging 70 year old gentleman who you would wish to meet. Fillis is his first ever horse and is the culmination of a lifetimes wish to own a horse.....just goes to prove that it is never too late!

John is a relatively novice rider and bought Fillis in good faith. She has turned out to be perfect in every way apart from an all encompassing fear of any large, approaching vehicle. She takes John hunting, show jumping and gives him such a freedom to roam....apart from on the roads.

Fillis came to me instantly bolting forwards if anything was behind and spinning round and away at speed if anything came towards her. She was so heightened that noises raised alarm and instantly put her into stress. John had followed the advice of many people since he bought her last summer, including the usual forceful ways invariably adopted in the horse world.

The more John tried, the worse she got. When he hit her she exploded, when he used brute strength through her mouth she fought more....pain was making her fear worse which it would do as she was genuinely terrified. He was only doing what he was told to do but was increasingly unhappy that the "monster was getting bigger and more ferocious". He felt that there had to be another way to help him and his horse....rather than bullying, force and pain.

He adores this mare, she is his world. His wife understands and smiles! She is not threatened by his "other woman!" John found me on the internet and we talked endlessly as I came up with a game plan I knew would be the correct way forward.

We took Fillis back to grass roots by using the natural methods and gave her a huge trust in her handler/rider. Where we were represented safety...... thus doing, she stopped bolting away. Her fear was very real and still there, but it gave her the chance to face the horror and eventually the confidence to push it away.

Reverse pressure training meant that she felt she could stay and face, in order to chase it away.... instead of run in opposition. This

technique is profound in its aim and application, and profound in the ensuing results.

There is no cure with some invisible magic wand, but what there is is a method which works by patience and repetition. By having the ability to face that lorry, praise, no pain, praise, feel good factor, safety and technique for the rider, praise, growing confidence in her own skin and trust of her rider, more praise, a titbit (to soften the jaw...which in turn relaxes the mind through chewing), more praise......then confidence to chase and push the lorry away.

The biggest challenge for the trainer is to stop that instant reaction of instinctive flight....all the rest falls into place, with the rope halter training as the base method throughout. Once the base training and acceptance of these new rules were in place, we set up a scenario in my ménage by bringing in a digger for her to chase. The close contact of that digger in that confined space was way more pressure than a digger on the road. It was potentially an extremely dangerous situation but because the trust in her handler was in place, we turned it all round to our advantage. Rob (staff) sat tight and rode brilliantly, reassuring her the whole time with his voice and his hand.

He simply kept her facing that terrifying piece of kit. She gradually let go of her instinctive panic and bit by bit grew in confidence and trusted Rob enough to start to follow that digger! We gave her plenty of time to stop and relax. This allowed her to keep the power of rational thought. The second day was better than the first to the point of trotting to keep up!

The photo proves the reward. Here she is trotting after a digger on the road, hemmed in by a typically far too close car. There are horses on the opposite side which could have meant a route of escape for her. She ignores all in her quest to chase away that incredibly noisy and visually terrifying object! Fantastic! It was a good challenge which is now paying dividends in the real world out on the

John took Fillis home after 3 weeks with us with a method and a mind set and a real feeling of hope. He keeps me updated with all the victories he is achieving day in, day out. Fillis no longer bolts. She can stay and think and rationalise. John is empowered and safer as a result. They are a team now, trust, patience and positive reinforcement will win through.

I keep trying to convince the horse world in general that these methods work. The traditionalists will always pooh hoo Natural horsemanship and they are all the poorer for it in my mind. A wall is both built and can be knocked down brick by brick. It is my hope that the message is getting through slowly.

Demolition of the King Street Clinic in Cottingham begins

s residents will have seen demolition has started on the old flooded building and it is hoped to have the new Clinic up and running by the end of March or early April. The unexpected delay has been caused by the need for additional planning permission regarding the demolition. After exerting some pressure funding was found at the very last minute, after the original application had been approved.

The opening of the new clinic will signal the removal of one of the last scars of the 2007 flood, and at long last we'll have community health services under the same roof. The services include Consultation. Examination and Treatment facilities, Child Health and Asthma clinics, Community Dental services, Smoking Cessation services, Chiropody services and an Eye clinic.

The medical staff I've spoken to are very exited about returning to their 'home'. Geraldine and I well remember, having vacated her flooded house, standing in our wellingtons surveying a very depressing scene the night of the flood. In my position as a portfolio holder I set about maximising 'pester power' and brought this issue to the top of the PCT's agenda. Had it taken any longer I fear the funding would not have been available, so much so we've all had a few sleepless nights.

The existing services have been farmed out around Haltemprice or found temporary locations in the village, this is not the standard of health care our residents deserve. Residents, both old and young, have been very patient in tolerating this situation, it's just a pity it has taken so long to sort out. But let's be positive and look forward to seeing the clinic return to be the hub of the community, that it once was".





Hallgate Schools - continued

The Year is 1927

by Peter Railton (Author and Local Historian)

chools opened on the 5th of January with 233 boys present in that department out of 252. Colds and 'flu soon began to have their effects and by the end of the month 88 lads were absent and those remaining at school were sneezing and coughing so much that Mr. Brookes recorded that "it was noticeable all through the school', and he was absent for a few days himself.

The County Librarian Mr. Woodfield was in school during March to make arrangments for a library to be established in the schools for the use of the pupils, thus facilitating an expansion of the opportunities for more reading in and out of school.

School Broken Into

The department was broken into during the last week in March; the board of keys had been taken from the Head's room and cupboards opened in there and the 'contents strewn about the floor.' Classrooms were unlocked and entered and articles stolen, including personal things that the boys had left in their desks. A dozen rubbers were found later broken into pieces inside the yard door of the "Duke of Cumberland Hotel". The case was investigated by Sgt. Taylor of the Cottingham police station in Finkle Street.

Egg Appeal Reintroduced

Hull Royal Infirmary's war time appeal for eggs was reintroduced and 88 were collected and delivered by Mr. Len Thompson, the Hallgate grocer and worker for the Infirmary, presumably at a time of great hardship for many of Hull's poor and a small but welcome addition to the menu. Empire Day was observed with the usual hymns and prayers, and assembly in the yard, to witness the raising of the flag on the pole.

On the 10th of June.

"Scholars and four adults - parents and friends of the department plus teachers, went to Windermere for the day. A most interesting and enjoyable day was spent."

Mr Brookes does not record how many of the boys went - my guess is that the number was probably confined to two classes of older lads.

On the 27th of June, Miss Ethel Warwick was appointed to the Staff: she lived in Grovehill Road, Beverley and, like Miss Hardy, was to teach at the school for many years. She was my first teacher when I went up into the junior school from the infants in 1939 - she was a dark haired lady, wore glasses, had a loud voice, and was very kind. She married a soldier early in the War, becoming Mrs Atkinson and is one of the teachers best remembered by ex-pupils.

Only the Best and Worst Remembered

It is true that pupils -just the same as teachers - remember the good and the bad and the in-betweens get to be forgotten Over ICC scholars and parents went by buses to Withernsea on the 28th of June to watch or take part in the Holderness Sports Festival: some teachers went too including Miss Sowersby and some staff from the infants' department. Hallgate boys came fifth overall in the sports - not a bad result and Leven School won the Shield that year. Bert Button, Cyril Bickinson and Harold Shepherdson secured scholarships to secondary schools.

End of Cottingham Feast Day Holiday

Between 1922 and 1926, a half-day's holiday had been given for Cottingham Club Feast. In 1927 it was decided by the Heads and Managers that no holiday would be given - a reflection of the decreasing importance of the event in the village, although schools closed at 3pm to allow pupils to attend the fair in the Green for the occasion; this mid-summer fair was held annually until fairly recent times - a reminder of those pre-state provided health and unemployment services.

Mention is made of William Hall, a student teacher in September -I believe that he became a teacher at the school for many years and lived in Northgate. In the same month the Rev. A. Ferguson,

Correspondant to the Managers gave, notice that he was to leave Cottingham at the end of the year and a replacement would be found.

Two day's holiday was given for Hull Fair in October and afternoon school times went into 'winter mode', 1.15 pm.to 3.30 pm. Armistice Day was marked in the usual way with services and the two minutes silence. A collection held raised £2.13s.9, seven shillings and sixpence of which was used to purchase a poppy wreath which was laid on the memorial in St.Mary's Churchyard by two pupils, Frederick Nalton and. Harold Smith, who's fathers had perished in the Great War. The remainder of the money was sent to the British Legion Fund.

The new Rector of St. Mary's, Rev. E. W. and Mrs. French were invited to the annual service of carols in the Hall on December the 21st and presented the apple and orange gift to each boy.

"Standard" Classes replaced by "Forms"

In the girls' school the Staff for 1927 - 28 were as follows: (note the word 'Form' replaces the traditional'Standard'now). Form VI. Miss Cleator, Form V. Miss Buttery Form IV.

Mrs. Wrigglesworth? Form III. Miss Buck and Miss Brimelow, Form II. Mrs. Tethers Form 1 Miss E.Wright, who left and was replaced by Miss Rhoda Wright. There was no Form VII and ex-VII recorded.

Much of the interest in the girls' department occured during the latter part of the year. On the 7th of October, Miss Brimelow and Miss Buck took the school's Girl Guides to Hull and attended the parade in honour of the visit of Princess Mary (sister of King George VI) to lay the commemoration stone of the new Hull Central Library in Albion Street. Following on from the two day's holiday for Hull Fair, another day off was given in honour of H.R.H.the Prince of Wales' visit to Hull, the future, brief, King Edward VII who was also brother to Princess Mary.

Some of the older girls had entered a competition run by the Daily Dispatch newspaper for good needlework and an Art and Craft exhibition held at Beverley was also entered by nine of the girls and they, accompanied by three teachers, paid a visit there; where one of the girls won the first prize for her garment.

When pupils and staff arrived at school on Monday the 8th of November they found that the boiler had broken down and the school was unheated, so the pupils were sent home and told to return at 1.15 pm by which time the trouble was fixed.

Armistice Day was observed as usual, as in the boys' school. On the following day (12th of November) Miss Brimelow and twelve older girls attended the funeral of Percy Hobson at St. Mary's Church; she records in the log book -

" We all feel we have lost a very dear friend. Mr Hobson was a constant visitor to the school and was always ready to help and advise."

Some of the girls went to Hull Training College on the 26th of November to see a nativity play performed by the students; the College was part residential and part day, but for female students only at that time.

Girls' School Held in High Regard

The high regard in which the girls' school was held by many people often appears in the log book; the .enthusiasm engendered by Miss Brimelow was caught by her staff and passed on to the girls; an entry on the 26th of November reads -" The Cottingham School Managers held their first meeting since the summer term on Friday last. I am instructed to convey to you and the teachers and the school generally, their hearty congratulations. The continued 'success of Cottingham Girls' School is thoroughly appreciated by the Managers and they have ample evidence that not only in the Village, but in the County, the School has never stood higher in public estimation. I associate myself personally as well as officially with the expression of regard and thanks.

The girls' school was indeed held in high estimation and set standards of excellence in all aspects of education which continued until amalgamation with the boys' department over 40 years later.



East Yorkshire Association of National Trust - 'The First **Hundred Years of the Spurn** Lifeboat Station'

The first meeting of 2011 was addressed by Mr Roy Benfell on the history of the first hundred years of lifeboats on Spurn Point. Despite the vocal concerns expressed for many years by local people about the serious dangers to shipping, around the mouth of the Humber, it was not until the cause was taken up in 1810 by Holderness landowner Mr Francis Constable (of Burton Constable) that Hull Trinity House agreed to take action in support of his generous initiative in raising money and recruiting men to serve in the first lifeboat, whose master was to run the Life-Boat Inn in converted barracks at the end of Spurn. The volunteer crewmen earned a pittance by loading ships with gravel and cobbles from the beaches at low tide.

The first cottages for the lifeboat men and their families were built in 1830. However, there was no fresh water supply and they were subject to frequent flooding. A terrace often new houses were built in 1857, but there was no piped water supply until World War II! At first, the wives of crew members taught the children in their own homes. It was not until 1890 that the first very basic single-room school house was built, with one of the wives appointed as official teacher by Trinity House on a small salary.

Three years later it became a local authority Public Elementary School, with a certificated teacher. It closed in December 1945.

The school building was also used for religious services, a Sunday School and other community activities. Even in such a remote location, there was open rivalry and disagreements between the Primitive Methodists and the Church of England, who at one stage had to revert to holding their services in the Light House and even stopped them all together for 10 years.

Government legislation in 1907 transferred all responsibility for navigation in the Humber from Trinity House to the Humber Conservancy Board, including the running of the Spurn lifeboat station. Following several years of very low morale among the crew members and increasingly acrimonious relations with the new owners, responsibility for Spurn was eventually transferred to the RNLI on 1 May 1911, marking another milestone for this unique lifeboat station, which had owed so much to the vision of Francis Constable and the dedicated support of Trinity House for 97 years.


