

Council Tax frozen for third

year

The ERYC council tax charge will be frozen for the third consecutive year (1st April 2012 - 31st March 2013) following decisions taken by elected members at a meeting of Full Council on 9th February.

Councillor Stephen Parnaby OBE, leader of the council, said: "I am very pleased that we have again been able to freeze our charge. This is the right thing to do and a recognition that council tax is a significant outlay, especially for pensioners and others on fixed incomes.

"I believe it is fairer for people to pay for any cost increases in services they use, which we have generally kept in line with inflation, rather than hitting everyone with a higher council tax bill."

Councils which choose to freeze council tax in 2012/13 are getting additional funding, which for the East Riding amounts to £3.6 million, but this funding is not available next year and the council has still had to find £2.2 million of additional savings to keep its charge at the current level.

The council also receives around £100 per person less funding than the average for similar authorities as a result of the government grant formula.

The council needs to make savings of approximately £43 million over the next three years 2012/13 to 2014/15 as a result of the Government funding reductions and increasing costs (for example caring for the increasing number of older people). The council's early action in planning for inevitable changes to public funding following the global financial crisis enabled £13.7 million to be placed in a fund to help cushion the impact of cuts over the next few years.

In addition, the council has implemented a business transformation programme to review the way services are delivered. To date, nearly £10 million of the target £14 million target savings have been identified through finding different ways of delivering services, better use of buildings and more effective procurement of goods and services.

For the current financial year 2011/12, the council is on target to achieve base budget savings of £9.4 million which is on top of savings of £9.5 million achieved the previous year. These are sustainable savings and not just one-off underspends.

Concillor Parnaby said: "It is a very challenging time for local government but I would stress that we are achieving reductions in a planned way.

"Unlike the situation in many other councils, our budget proposals do not involve the closure of any council facilities like libraries, leisure or day centres and the annual spending of £22 million with the voluntary and community sector will continue."

A very positive outcome of the budget is that the council will again be undertaking an extensive programme of work to improve the East Riding's infrastructure and facilities such as schools, housing and roads.

Now worth more than £600 million across all years since the council's inception in 1996, this investment in the capital programme is possible through successful bidding for funding and efficient use of the council's resources.

Among the schemes proceeding in the coming year, with the help of Government funding, are the A164 Beverley/Humber Bridge improvements and the Beverley southern relief road.

Councillor Parnaby said: "As well as bringing about major improvements, the investment supports many local contractors and jobs and is a big boost to the local economy."

NOTE - The 2012/13 council tax will be formally determined at the Council meeting on 22 February after the Humberside Police and Fired authorities have set their separate precepts. Town/parish council precepts are also added to the council tax.



Cottingham Emergency Plan

Who could forget that dreadful day in June 2007 when many parts of Cottingham were flooded and dozens of residents had their homes ruined by the flood waters. The memories of that day will be with all of us for a very long time.

It is the responsibility of the local councils to have Emergency Plans for such events and, in our area, the main responsibilities lie with the East Riding of Yorkshire Council.

However, each of the parish and town councils in the County also has a role to play, albeit a much smaller and more local responsibility.

Cottingham Parish Council has now set up a Working Group to prepare a plan for Cottingham to come into being in the event of any major emergencies, whether it be flooding, or major failures in the supply of electricity, gas or water or similar problems.

In the smaller villages of the East Riding the plans can be very local as, in many cases, the residents know virtually everyone. However, in the largest village in England, Cottingham, this just cannot be the case, so we are looking at how we can interact with the East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Emergency Plan without duplication.

Of course, the Emergency Services, (Police, Fire, Ambulance and Coastguard Services) have their own very specific roles and we would not wish to in any way interfere with these. So the first thing we have to identify is just what role the Parish Council can actually play.

The first step in this investigation is a meeting with the East Riding of Yorkshire Council Emergency Planning Officer and this is scheduled to take place during the first week in March. From this meeting we hope to move forward to prepare a local plan for Cottingham with information to our residents as probably the most important piece in the jigsaw. These could include who to contact if there is an emergency, what to do in the immediate aftermath of such an event and/or the provision of emergency shelter for anyone who is unable to continue to live in their homes.

There may well be a need for volunteers to help in putting any plan into action, either as passers-on of information or with specific roles. Over the coming weeks we will be considering all our options.

We will keep you informed of progress.

20,000 – the number of separate wireless frequency assignments estimated to be needed for the London Olympics (including cameras, microphones and security communications)

500,000 – the number of headsets sold by HMV in December; one every 2 seconds!

4 billion – the number of YouTube clips played daily; according to owner Google.

10 billion – the likely number of mobile devices existing by 2016 – nearly 3 billion more than the estimated world population at that time!

Tablets (like the iPad) are still the big sellers in the IT world, with PC sales reportedly down. But then again, as brilliant as tablets are, they don't replace a PC or Laptop, most people will still want to be able to sit and type documents and do other office-type tasks.

Barclays Bank has released a money transfer app that at its launch attracted 20,000 applicants in the first two days. 'Pingit' is basically an easy way of transferring money between mobile phones. Once registered and security verification has taken place, one user can 'ping' up to £300 per day to another person's account via their mobile. You need to be a Barclays account holder at the moment, but the bank is planning on rolling this out to other financial institutions.

Windows 8 'Consumer Preview' Recent press releases point to a preview version of the new operating system being available for download by the time you read this. Microsoft seem very keen to get as much consumer input and feedback before the official launch of the new product in the Autumn. One thing we have all become used to over the last 17 years or so with Windows will apparently be missing however – the Start Button! It will be interesting to see how everyone cope without it...

Mobile broadband is something I am often asked about. So if you don't know your dingle from your dongle, this is the lowdown. A dongle is a small plastic USB device that looks a bit like a memory stick, and acts as an aerial. In other words, whereas most of us get our broadband service down the telephone line and through a router; with mobile broadband it is distributed over the mobile operators' networks and therefore your computer or laptop needs a means of picking up that signal. Generally in my experience, mobile signals are not of great

quality in this area, so mobile broadband will never be as fast or stable as a wired connection. But if you travel around a lot with your laptop or just take it away with you on holiday, then it is a good means of staying connected and of course the speed will be dependent on the area you are in at the time. Dongles are available on contract from about £10 per month or even on pay as you go.

Questions and answers section:

Q: My ESET anti virus is expiring soon, what can I do?

A: Just phone us for the discounted renewal figure, and we can action it for you. You have up to 30 days from the expiry date to renew.

Q: My computer tells me there are some Windows Updates to do, is this safe?

A: Yes definitely, these will be security updates that Windows requires to stay secure. Just click to agree and let them install. It is quite normal also for your computer to take longer than normal to shut down and to flash a message saying 'do not power off your computer' while updates are being installed.

Q: What is System Restore?

A: This is a very useful utility built into Windows that takes a regular 'snapshot' of your computer's operating state and files it away. The idea being that if you ever run into trouble and Windows is not running as it should, you have the option of going into System Restore and telling it to go back to a previous restore point when you knew it was working properly. Just like going back in time! You'll find it under Accessories and System Tools on the Programs menu. Or just click Start and type system restore into the search bar.

Make money whilst the sun shines

In the January issue of the Cottingham Times we wrote about a warm home being a happy one. Now that we're approaching spring and summer, thoughts will be turning towards warmer weather and, hopefully, sunshine.

The sun is an incredible source of energy and can be tapped in many and various ways to provide electricity, light and heat and in this issue we want to talk about all three.

Solar photovoltaics (PV) for electricity generation has enjoyed a fast rise in popularity due to a rebate scheme that allows the owner to make money from the electricity it generates. Despite the government's recent reduction in the tariff, solar still makes financial sense. Currently the rate paid is 21p/kWh generated, so on a standard sized system of 2.5kW (approx 10-12 panels) you would expect the system to generate 2084kWh of electricity annually giving you an income of £437. In addition to this you can expect the system to save you approximately £135 annually on electricity you would otherwise have had to buy (using a typical price of 13p/kWh). A further £32/annum can be made on 'exported' electricity giving you a total 'saving' each year of £604 over 25 years. On a system costing £7000, this represents a return on investment of approximately 8% with a payback in year 11 and will most likely add value to your home when

you come to sell (although the system could be taken with you and installed on your new home).

Solar thermal converts the sun's energy into heat and is used primarily for the free production of hot water. Estimates show that a typical property owner will reduce their costs of hot water production by up to 70%. It will also be eligible for the forthcoming Renewable Heat Incentive due in later this year whereby the homeowner will receive an annual rebate similar to the solar PV scheme. Solar thermal is also cheaper to install than you might think.

And finally, do you have south-facing windows that let in a lot of sunlight which cause furniture, carpets and paintings to fade? We have the answer in the form of UV-protection window film which can be applied retrospectively and reduces the UV ingress by 99%. Although no rebates are available for this, it has been shown to significantly reduce glare and fading.



Remove the 'troot' from the oven.

Puree a quarter of the troot and chop the remainder into small pieces. Stir in most of the Parmesan, the beetroot puree and chopped beetroot through the risotto, until

Feel the Warmth

n East Riding charity has launched an urgent campaign to help older people to stay warm in the bitter cold weather, and combat the effects of rocketing heating bills.

The Feel the Warmth project launched by Age UK East Riding aims to help people aged over the age of 50 across the county who are suffering fuel poverty.

Recent rises in fuel costs have left many older people, who are often on low incomes, facing a choice between keeping warm and eating proper meals.

The charity has received grant funding from the Two Ridings Community Foundation to provide a practical support package for people who are most at risk.

The campaign will include free confidential information and advice on issues including fuel options, understanding fuel bills, methods of payment, benefits advice and information about crisis loans.

The charity is also working in partnership with East Riding of Yorkshire's Health Through Warmth scheme and refers clients with health-related issues for assistance with replacement heating systems, loft and cavity wall insulation.

To help support them during the referral process, the charity will provide a free Feel the Warmth pack. The packs will contain a blanket, hat and scarf, vacuum flask and packet soups as well as support and advice to help them keep warm.

Figures from National Energy Action show that 19.3 per cent of households in the East Riding are living in fuel poverty, in which fuel bills account for more than 10 per cent of household income.

Many elderly people are particularly at risk, among them pensioners in rural areas of the East Riding, who may be socially isolated, without ready access to information.

Liz Pullen, Information and Advice Co-ordinator for Age UK East Riding, said fuel poverty is a major threat to older people in the area, and the charity is currently receiving many enquiries from clients who are struggling to cope.

"We have clients, often long-term sick and on low incomes, seeking help with fuel or replacement costs, following breakdown of existing heating systems," she said.

"We have even had cases of individuals living without heating or hot water for two, even four years before making contact with Age UK East Riding."

Staff and volunteers from the charity are launching an intensive six-week campaign to raise awareness of the help which is available, working with older people's organisations and groups and partnership agencies.


The Dental Mavericks Have Done It



a stile and continue in the same direction passing the copse of trees on the right to another stile which leads into a narrow cultivated field. Cross this field to meet the road, turn left and follow the road down hill to meet the Beverley road again. Turn left and after a short distance, cross the road and follow the Wolds Way sign passing a bungalow on the left. Cross a foot bridge and continue walking up hill to reach a track at right angles, here turn right and continue walking up hill through the belt of trees.

On reaching another track at right angles, turn left and follow a wide track passing the quarry on the left. This eventually becomes a surfaced road and meets the South Cave to Sancton road. Cross this road and turn left and after passing the cemetery, pass through a kissing gate on the right. Follow a distinct path which eventually leads onto the Golf Course. Cross the golf course along a line of trees to reach a stone track. Turn left and follow this track which becomes grassy.

On approaching a large building on the left, cross a stony track and continue on a grass path passing through a kissing gate leading into a small paddock. Continue in the same direction and locate a kissing gate on the left. Pass through this and immediately turn right and walk down the surfaced road leading into South Cave.

Pass the Church and the entrance to Cave Castle Hotel on the left and on reaching the main road turn left and walk back to the centre of South Cave.

In the Garden





pring usually arrives by mid-March and the frequent sunny days provide the opportunity for an increasing range of gardening tasks. It's time to get busy preparing seed beds, sowing seed, cutting back winter shrubs and generally tidying up around the garden.

Sowing and planting

Hardy annuals can be sown in pots or modules to provide colour in the garden. In mild areas you can sow directly outside. Marking out irregularly shaped seedbeds and broadcasting drifts of different seed gives a more natural look.

Sweet peas can be sown outside this month. Place autumn-sown sweet peas in a sunny position, perhaps on a high shelf in the greenhouse that gets plenty of light. Sow summer bedding plants in a heated propagator or under glass.

Early spring is an ideal time to plant herbaceous perennials, including Geranium, Astrantia and Oriental poppies.

Plant summer-flowering bulbs. Prepare the soil first, to ensure that drainage is sufficient to prevent the bulbs rotting. Anemone coronaria tubers need particularly well-drained soils.

Plan a continuous crop of cut flowers for this summer. Perennials such as Delphinium and annuals can be grown to produce a useful and beautiful display.

When space becomes available in the greenhouse, pot up cuttings of tender perennials taken last summer and at the beginning of this year. Bulk up plant numbers by taking more cuttings from the largest of the new plants.

Indoor forced bulbs that were in the house for winter displays, but which have now finished flowering, can now be planted into the Sgarden, taking care not to disturb the roots.

Cutting back, pruning and dividing

Cut back ornamental grasses and other perennials left for winter interest, if you have not already done so. Even if they still look good, you need to make way for the new growth.

Cut off old leaves of hellebores that produce flowers from ground level (including Helleborus x hybridus and H. niger) to expose the flowers and remove possible foliar diseases such as hellebore leaf spot.

Divide and/or plant bulbs-in-the-green, such as snowdrops (Galanthus) and winter aconites (Eranthis hyemalis), if not done last month.

Divide clumps of herbaceous perennials that you want to propagate, those that have become too large for their allotted space, and those that are flowering poorly or have lost their shape.

Divide hostas before they come into leaf.

Divide hellebores and polyanthus-type primulas after flowering.

Top 10 jobs

- 1. Plant shallots, onion sets and early potatoes
- 2. Protect new spring shoots from slugs
- 3. Plant summer-flowering bulbs
- 4. Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials
- 5. Top dress containers with fresh compost
- 6. Mow the lawn on dry days (if needed)
- Cut back Cornus (dogwood) and Salix (willow) grown for colourful winter stems
- Weeds come back in to growth deal with them before they get out of hand
- Start feeding fish and using the pond fountain; remove pond heaters
- 10. Open the greenhouse or conservatory doors and vents on warm days



Propagation

Propagate more dahlias from tubers. Pot them up in multi-purpose compost so that the old stalk is just above the surface. Water and place in a warm, light position or in a propagator. Once the fresh shoots have grown to 7.5-10cm (3-4in), cut them off carefully with a knife. Dust the ends with hormone rooting power and push them into a pot containing cuttings compost. Place back in a propagator or plastic bag until roots appear.

Perennials that are showing new shots from the crown can be propagated via basal stem cuttings. Shoots 7.5-10cm (3-4in) high are cut from the parent plant with a sharp knife. Sometimes a piece of root can be taken with the cutting (which speeds establishment), but stems can be cut without root, and then dipped in hormone rooting powder before striking into growing medium, as for softwood cuttings.

General maintenance

Continue to deadhead winter-flowering pansies and other winter bedding. Pansies will carry on into the spring and even to early summer, if attended to frequently.

Deadhead the flowers of Narcissus (daffodils) as they fade, but allow the foliage to die down naturally. Herbaceous perennials infested with couch grass and other perennial weeds should be lifted so the roots of the weeds can be removed. Improve the soil by digging in organic matter before replanting.

Clear up weedy beds before mulching. Lighter soils can be mulched now, but heavier soils are best left until March, when the soil is warmer. Mulching with a deep layer of organic matter helps to condition the soil, suppress weed growth, insulate plant roots from temperature fluctuations, and conserve soil moisture during the summer.

Bulbs coming up in the rock garden or in containers may benefit from overhead protection from the rain. A sheet of glass or Perspex placed on piles of bricks will do the job.

Top dress spring-flowering alpines with grit or gravel to show off the plants and to help prevent stem rots. Mulch may need replacing after weed removal.

Improve the drainage of heavy soils by working in lots of organic matter.

Perennials putting on plenty of growth may need support by the end of the month.

Check whether containers need watering. Even at this time of year, they can dry out. Pots that are sheltered by eaves or balconies can miss out on any rainfall. If in doubt, check the compost at a hand's depth to see if it feels dry. Aim to keep pots moist, not wet, and don't let them dry out.

Pots and tubs benefit from topping up with fresh John Innes compost. Old compost can be removed and replaced with new if there is not much room for topping up.

Feed borders with a general-purpose fertiliser at the manufacturer's recommended rate.

It is best to get supports in early, so that the plants grow up through them, covering them discreetly. Adding rigid supports afterwards usually looks unattractive and results in bunched stems lacking sufficient ventilation. Criss-crossing strings from hidden or decorative posts work well, allowing stems to grow up in the gaps between strings.

In mild areas, you should remove winter coverings of fleece, straw, polythene etc, to prevent new shoots being damaged. In cold areas, you are best waiting until the risk of frost has passed.

Planning ahead

You may wish to get your sweet pea wigwam growing supports ready. In mild areas, you can transplant young plants to the feet of the wigwam, using a light twine to tie them in.



Here is the latest article from Chris who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

ello and welcome again fellow anglers to this month fishing news. The date is 10th February, and as I sit here writing this it is still white with snow outside, but the Catchmoore Crew cannot wait until another of our Sunday matches this week. We are going to Sam Hosticks this week, on Island Pond. It is fishable as Sam has been keeping the ice at bay with his pump. If you are like myself, and enjoy fishing through the winter season you have to put that extra effort in to find venues which are not frozen.

Hopefully by the time you come to read this article the snow will have dissipated and we will have lots of nice days ahead to look forward too. Don't forget this month the clocks go forward bringing lighter nights again, finally!

I would like to put forward some reminders on what you should be doing in the next couple of weeks. First of all for all those which have not had their gear out for a while, now is the time to get it out and check it over. Check your elastics in your top kits, make sure your reels are working efficiently, especially the drag on your reel, is it in full working order? Plus, is it about time to change the line on your reel? How are

your hooks? Rusty? If so discard them.

It is a good idea to do these things now, rather than everything going wrong whilst you are on the bank. Go and have a look in your sheds and check your nets and bags etc, just in case our little furry friends have been living among them all winter. The little s*ds have just eaten my spare boot liners; don't laugh yet unless you have checked yours! Finally 'please do not forget you rod licence is due on the 1st April'. Now that you have completed all your checks, we hope you all have a great new fishing season this year. Please, if you do have any questions you would like answering, just pop in to the shop, and if I can help I will with pleasure.

Thank you to all of you that have kept me informed about how our coast, the Humber, rivers and still waters have been fishing. Please keep this up so I can share this with all of you.

For all you pole anglers out there, have you got enough rigs made to last you the new season. If your reply is no, here are a couple of tips for you, to help make life a bit easier. Firstly slide the required float onto your chosen main line; about 2ft (60cm), then attach the required silicone sleeves. Now it is time to attach the shot, but before you do this tie your loop for your 'loop to loop' for your hook length.

This enables you to now place your bulk shot near the loop, avoiding having to move your bulk shot later. I always undo shot just a little to enable fine tuning whilst on the bank. As the float is only 2ft (60cm) up the line it is easy to swing in and out if you have made your rig about 10ft to start with. Another good tip is to always make two rigs exactly the same, and then if you get snapped off, you can carry on fishing with confidence with an identical rig.

Below is a rough shotting guide for you, we do have this shotting guide on the reverse of our business cards which you can pick up in store:

Twisting Fate.

ast August I hurt my left ankle in a silly way. When we "back" horses....a term used when you are teaching horses that it is okay for them to allow us to sit up on their backs and ultimately be ridden.....we go through a process of lying over them, touching and rubbing where we can reach. We do this on both sides of the horse so that he will completely accept the whole concept.

After a jockey can be legged up and the horse remains completely comfortable with the actual feelings and no longer feels that this is some sort of invasion of his personal space or anything to fear.....we move the process forward to wriggling around, bumping up and down, swivelling about and generally de sensitising the horse to the whole scenario.

We will start to rub the haunch with our foot and scratch the tail, swinging our leg up and down in a very obvious and up front way. The recipient should not feel intimidated or scared as all this is done calmly, quietly and with constant praise.....but it does feel strange to a young horse and terrifying to a damaged horse and their natural reaction is one of flight, fear or anger....we make it all nice! Little bits at a time is always the way forward, calmly executed and always for positive reinforcement.

What comes next is a planned move which is not as easy as it seems....you get legged up on one side then swivel across his back and jump down on the opposite side, missing out an actual sit position. The trick in the early stage of this manoeuvre is to not catch his back with your legs and to complete the whole movement in one sweep.

Not always easy and it does not always go quite to plan. In my case on this particular day I expected the ground to meet my feet sooner than the reality. I landed hard with all my weight on the left foot first. I was aware that it hurt but carried on with the exercise until the horse in question was quite settled and accepting. We were quite busy at the time so you tend not to make a fuss and simply just get on with all the work in hand. A couple of weeks or so later my ankle gave way sideways whilst in the school ground working a young horse.

Now this time it really did hurt. I hobbled for days and went to see my doctor. An MRI scan was organised.

As life throws cogs into wheels with monotonous regularity.... my head girl broke her toes doing nothing wrong. Carlie was riding a young horse out through the gateway onto the road. She was intending to go right, the horse decided half way across the road that it wanted to go left. This instant and very juvenile decision on the part of this young horse caused a loss of balance for both horse and rider. The horse did a nasty sort of buck/leap resulting in an unavoidable fall which caught her toes. Bless her, she was ambulanced away and was duly potted up, returned home and there Carlie stayed for the next three months.

I ran the yard with all the associated training to carry on with my other full time member of staff. I temporarily employed a new groom too who stepped into the breach and we managed well. I did not book any more jobs in, simply finished the horses in situ but unfortunately with one little pony just starting to be broken in.

Those other young horses were ridden away and sent home...Little Indie pony progressed nicely but my ankle was proving a real trial. I could no longer walk fast; I hopped along holding my heel in the air. I could no longer step back without a searing pain shooting through the joint. I could no longer ride.

The job out in Italy, which you may have already read about, proved to be very difficult for me especially as I received a massive kick trauma to my upper thigh on the same bloomin' leg! Insult to injury springs to mind! ?

Just as Carlie started to come back to work for short periods of time, I had to face the inevitable outcome of ignoring significant injury and undergo surgery.

Hence I have become as skilled as my head girl and mastered the art of non weight bearing on crutches for the last 6 weeks. The wheel chair, however, is a different matter altogether..... I have been tangled up in trouser rails in Next and my son has performed hand brake turns round the isles in Morrisons! He has proved to be somewhat zealous whilst pushing his poor old mum precariously balancing a basket of shopping on my lap!

I will very soon be back up and running as the saying goes....pun intended! Six weeks have passed quickly. The spring will yield the start of young horse training again and a trip back

to Italy in May. I am really looking forward to getting back up and going.

I would like to add at this point my gratitude to everyone who has helped me through these weeks....to those who have been there to help me on a personal level as well as those who have kept my business and horses well cared for and safe. The world is full of good people.....it takes a time like this to recognise who the very best are.



Hallgate Schools - continued

by Peter Railton - The Year is 1933.

It was fortunate that the two students, Miss Locking and Miss Naylor, were in the boys' department in January because a wave of sickness affected the staff: Mr. Brookes, Mr Bramley, Miss Hardy, Miss Warwick were all away at various times which meant that the students had virtual control of their classes. Either the Head or one of the teachers would go into the classroom at times to see that all was well, but it gave the two ladies the opportunity to get on in a 'sink or swim' situation and was a steep learning curve which could decide if the profession was for them.

I had the same experience on my first teaching practice at Hallgate in 1967, but all went off satisfactorily.

Two boys, George. F. Key and Kenneth Marshall had won scholarships to Trinity House School and started there in the February. Rev. French examined the registers and signed the log book on 14th of March, and Rev. Dakin followed him on 10th April and was:-

"able to testify to the good fellowship that quiet evidently exists between Mr. Brookes and his Staff and to the good work that is being done at school in general. The boys respond eagerly and capably to the questions asked and are happy in school as one would expect them to be."

The school House Sports Festival was held on the Ellerman's ground at 6pm on the 1st of June with the Revs. French, Dakin and Holm in attendance, plus Councillors Dixon and Jackson, Capt. Grindell and Mr. J. Darby. The four colour teams each had the name of a national hero - the Blue team were the Nelson House, Greens the Shackleton, Yellow the Livingstone and Reds the Wellington. Livingstone House were the winners and were presented with the Holtby Cup by Mrs. J. C. Jackson of Harland Rise. A Silver Medal was presented to Sidney Longbone who had scored 50 goals for the school in matches played during the previous season. Councillor Dixon spoke at the close of the events and stressed the athletic part of the curriculum as of being very important in the future development of the pupils at Hallgate Schools. John Graham Hall won a scholarship to Pocklington School as a resident that year.

On Friday the 16th of June, an excursion to Liverpool took place. This was a coordinated exercise with over 350 pupils, teachers and parent helpers from Hallgate Boys', Beverley Minster Boys', Dunswell mixed, Kirkella C of E mixed, North Ferriby mixed and Eastrington mixed. They were to visit Liverpool Docks, the Cathedral, and the newly opened Zoo, plus a visit to the White Star Liner 'Britannic', and a ferry across the Mersey to New Brighton. A full schedule demanded an early start and the Hallgate contingent en-trained at Cottingham Station at 4.28 am, the 'Special' having already picked up the Beverley group, the Dunswell and Kirkella groups joined at Paragon, the Ferriby group at their station and the Eastrington people at Goole. Liverpool Central was reached at 9am.

The weather was fine and all went to the Gladstone Docks and looked around the 'Britannic', then on to the Cathedral, the Zoo for 11/2-hours with a break at the cafe, then by tramcars to Pier Head and the ferry across to New Brighton where an hour or so was spent on the - sands and promonade plus a look round Port Perch (built in Napoleonic times), then the lighthouse before returning across the river for another tram ride to Messrs Lewis's Cafe in Ranelaugh Street for tea. Then came that most important part of any school trip - the spending of cash for souvenirs to take home, and the multitude took train for the return journey at 8.35pm - Cottingham was reached at lam.

What an enormous amount of preparation must have gone into that day's outing, not only as far as Cottingham was concerned, but coordinating times with other schools, the provision of transport here and in Liverpool - times and places for meals - looking for toilets - the mind boggles! It is hectic enough arranging and putting into operation a day's excursion for one school, let alone six of them. Many letters of appreciation were sent to Mr. Brookes and the Staff - they deserved, them

Withernsea Schools won the Lambert White Trophy that year but boys and girls from Hallgate acquitted themselves well in the East Riding Sports held at Welton and were part of the Holderness Division which won the Bickersteth Trophy which was presented by Sir Godfrey McDonald of the Isles, and was shown for a while in the Hallgate Schools.

The girls' school opened on the 10th of January with a full staff and only 19 girls absent; however, attendance began to slip and by the end of the month it was down to 78% with many cases of 'flu being reported. Mrs. Evans and Mrs. Wrigglesworth were stricken, along with ever more girls. Four students from Bull College started their teaching practice in Sts. 1, 3, 4 and 5 and one of them was taken ill shortly after as the virus spread relentlesly through the department.

A significant entry appears at this time -

"This is the third week when Soup has been provided on Tuesday and Friday for the chidren of the unemployed.'

This was a wretched time for many of Cottingham's poorer residents; unemployment affected a lot of homes and parents were put into the invideous position of accepting the charity of soup for their children - boys were included too. We cannot begin to compare unemployment in our village with that in Hull and it was even worse in many other towns and cities, especially in the North of England, but nevertheless the sting was felt. More inhabitants were thrown on to 'Relief'; a "Relieving Officer" was responsible for assessing the needs of individual families in the village and determining 'their cash benefits'. The term 'Relief' comes from the Victorian system of either entry into the workhouse or 'Out Door Relief', i.e. payments to the needy without the ignomy of going into the workhouse, of which there were many, including two in Hull. The local relieving officer, Mr. Robinson, lived in Newgate Street in one of the houses between Carrisbrook and Carrington Avenues and the cash came from the rates.

The SOUP was prepared, by the wife of Mr. Peckett the caretaker, who made 'bone broth' for the dinner children, plus pieces of bread set out on tables in the halls'. Other pupils brought sandwiches - usually the staple bread and jam - and in the girls' department Miss Brimelow bought crockery for dinner girls to eat off and provided cocoa at one

So what with unemployment, sickness and worsening weather with frost, snow and heavy rain, gloom descended on the village that January of 1933 - but these events were to be overshadowed in a few years time - Hitler was elected Chancellor of Germany.

On Saturday the 9th of March, 80 girls accompanied by some staff went to see 'Peter Pan' at the Alexandra Theatre. Rev. Dakin examined the registers on the 5th of April and declared himself pleased with all he saw. The girls of the violin group did well at the Hull Music Festival in May and became the proud recipients of the 'Holder Challenge Cup'; the firm of Holder Brothers were suppliers of musical instuments and gramophones in Hull and encouraged many young musicians.

The netball team were successful that year with victories over Hornsea and Northumberland Avenue Schools. Barbara Ashton, Violet Walker and Joan Hibbons won places at Beverley High School.

A new class, St.7b, was formed after the summer holidays and Miss Padget was put in charge and Miss Margaret Shepherdson began duties with St.2. Four day's holiday was given for Hull Fair in October and school times were changed from the 1st of November for the winter period; those living a long way from school left at 3.30pm the rest at 3.45 with the afternoon session, starting at 1.15 after lunch.

All departments closed for the Christmas holidays on the 22nd of December.

Moving Abroad?

I ive years ago, Nick Russell (ex Spectrum Video) and his wife Rita decided that, by the time they were 55, they would like to live and work in a sunnier part of Europe. The plan was to try and buy somewhere big to live in and earn an income from letting rooms on a Bed & Breakfast basis or self catering accommodation. Their search started in France but after a couple of years searching for the right property, it became apparent that to get a suitable property, both in terms of size and location, was going beyond their budget.

So a couple of years ago the search moved to Southern Spain - Andalucia to be exact. It is an area they know quite well as they have had a share in a house on the Costa del Sol for the last 30 years which has been used regularly for family holidays. This is the first part of their story of the ups and downs of trying to buy a dream property in the sun. The second part will follow in next months issue. Well we have finally gone and done it. On October 20th 2011 at 2.00 pm in a Notaire's office in Antequera, Spain, we put pen to paper, spent all our savings and bought our dream home - in the sun. From start to finish, it has taken over five years to find the property which we hope is our future in a foreign country. We are not the first to do it and certainly won't be the last so we thought if we put our experiences in writing, it might help anyone who might be considering doing the same thing.

At times it has been fun, frustrating and a pain, but ultimately we hope it has been worth it.

Anyway this is our story. We hope you find it interesting and maybe a help, but if you don't, then thank you for taking the time to read it.

The decision to move abroad was not taken lightly by either of us. The list of things to consider seemed huge - language, healthcare, cost of living, location and of course leaving the family and friends behind, as well as the actual physical move with all our belongings. Then we had to decide which country to move to. The choice was between France and Spain, two countrys we both love.

As it happened we were due to go to France in the Spring of

2007 so we thought we would make the first sortie into the French property market during the holiday.

We went without any real thought or plans as to what we wanted to look at, or exactly where we wanted to look, and that was a big mistake.

We did not do enough research, make any bookings or contact any estate agents. Instead we just picked an area, visited local agents and tried to spot properties that suited what we wanted in our price range. The hope was that we could arrange viewings there and then. This proved to be very hit and miss, mainly because of strange opening hours, non-English speaking agents and limited visiting opportunites. We did manage to see a few houses but none ticked the right boxes. We wasted a lot of time and drove miles and miles. France is a big country even if you pick a region, you can waste a lot of time. As a result of this trip we decided the next visit would be planned a lot better. The next trip was planned for the Autumn of 2008 so we had eighteen months to plan it!!

This trip was to the South West corner of France, around Bordeaux and Bergerac. We rented a house as a base, booked viewings with English speaking agents whom we had contacted via the internet.

limiting the number of viewings to 2 or 3 a day. This worked out much better and we saw some nice houses, which on the internet looked like they would suit our purpose. We were looking at houses with five bedrooms, a swimming pool, outside space, close to rail, road and airport. Near a village with shopsand bars, all within our budget.

Normally at that time of year, the weather down there is pretty good, warm and sunny. Unfortunately for the two weeks we were there, it rained nearly every day so not ideal to go looking at properties. None-the- less, we went viewing armed with our printouts from the internet, of choices which fitted our criteria. It quickly became obvious that in the flesh, some of these houses do not match their internet description. Simple things like 'connected to electricity'in one house meant one socket loaded with adaptors and cables, feeding the whole house. 'Rooms to be converted' can mean anything from animal pens to wooden sheds. The swimming pool at one house was just a concrete water storage tank!!

We viewed houses in deserted villages, at the side of motorways, up dirt tracks or in the middle of fields. We did however see one house that ticked all the boxes but it was well above our budget and what it was worth, and that house is still for sale now at the same price as five years ago!!

On returning home we were totally disillusioned with the way our viewings in France had gone and decided to forget

Early in 2009 we decided to change our search area to somewhere we knew quite well - Southern Spain. We have had some great holidays down on the Costa del Sol and touring around Andalusia and love everything about it. The weather, the people, the wine and the scenery are all fantastic, but we did decide we wanted to live in rural Spain, rather than an ex-pat community on the coast. Also because the Spanish property market is in a bit of a recession we felt we might get a bit more for our money. so we re-wrote our list of wants The wants ended up as six to seven bedrooms, three bathrooms, large living space, pool, outside space, rural location but close to a village, no building work and within one hour of an airport. A very tall order or so we thought.

So using the lessons we had learnt from our French trips,. we started to compile and research information from the Internet ready for our house hunting in Spain.

Celebrating the 10th anniversary of The Deep submarium, it brings together Hull Philharmonic Orchestra and six 'shoals' of young musicians from the East Riding, Hull and Lincolnshire. In a further strand, laptop musicians will capture the sounds of the deep, such as Arctic Ocean narwhals and seabed volcanoes.

The Hull Phil has commissioned the piece from composer Nigel Morgan, who is at the heart of the contemporary music concert scene.

Andrew Penny, musical director, said it would be a landmark occasion in the region's musical history.

ove House Hospice is looking for daring people to abseil from the Humber Bridge on Saturday 26th May 2012 to help raise vital funds for the local charity.



They are shaken onto mats, and then dried in the shade. These berries are grown without pesticides or other chemicals in one of the purest places on earth.
