Celebrating ten years in business, Office 2013 and be careful to whom you give your personal information

Tell time flies, and I am delighted to say that it's 10 years ago this month that RDM Computers set up in business!

Back then a new PC had just 256Mb of ram and an 80Gb hard drive; and if you wanted one of

these new-fangled flat screen monitors, a small 15" model would set you back around £225! Now you can get a much larger wide-screen for about £100 less, and Computers, even Laptops, come with hard drives and ram at least 8x times the size. Now, in such a fast-moving business, what will be quoting in 2023?

Office 2013 (Word, Excel, PowerPoint etc) has now been released and is available as a purchased licence, or for the first time as an annual subscription called Office 365. Neither version comes with a disc anymore, only as a download. (For those that prefer to have the 'physical product', we can still order Office 2010 on disc until supplies have run out).

Office 2013 comes in Home & Business versions, and the starting price includes the three products mentioned at the top, going on up to the Professional product which includes Outlook, Publisher and Access. However on the 365 subscription model, you can get all these premium products for just £79.99 per year. It is somewhat confusing I admit, so call us for details or see www.microsoft.com/office



Eset Home Security v6 has now been upgraded to include an anti-theft module. Once activated, in the unfortunate event of your laptop going missing, you can it report online, and it will be tracked, and all the data hidden. Many other features are now included, call us or

see www.eset.co.uk for details. If you have another version, you can upgrade to Home Security, or if you wish to purchase a *new licence costs £59.99 for 2 years of worry-free cover*.



We now subscribe to ISL Light Remote Access software. This means that when a customer has a problem that needs looking at, we are able to (only with their permission of course!) take control of their computer online right from our office and sort it out.

There is no security risk as any session is a one-off with a unique ID and leaves nothing on the owner's machine. This can be a very cost-effective solution in many cases as we are currently offering this new service from only £15.

Cookie Policy is something you will have seen appearing on most reputable websites. This is just designed to warn the computer user that the website being visited will plant a cookie on their system. This is normally a quite innocuous procedure that just identifies the computer to the website on the next visit. It can also store information about preferences and likes. So if you look at a particular type of book or music on Amazon for instance, next time it will offer you similar titles. If you don't want this information stored them clear out you cookie folder regularly. For Internet Explorer, go into Control Panel, Internet Options and you can choose to remove them all. For Chrome, click on Settings, Tools and Clear browsing data. Remember this will usually remove stored website passwords too.

Many internet users quite rightly worry about how much data is being stored online about them. Remember that data is a valuable commodity of course and lists of names and addresses, and email addresses change hands for money all the time. So do be careful how much information you give away online (or on the phone), and to whom. Reputable websites will only ask for the minimum amount of information, unless of course you agree to being informed of updates and special offers (look out for the little tick box that lets you opt in or out if you don't want to be overwhelmed by regular emails).

Here are a few hints and tips to help you along:

Q: A McAfee or Norton security scanner icon has appeared on my Desktop, how did that get there?

A: These normally get downloaded along with another application or update like Adobe or Java. Look out for a little tickbox that mentions these when. You can safely uninstall them anyway.

Q: How can I get back the 'File Menu' at the top of a Program

A: Press the Alt key on the keyboard for it to appear again.

Q: I don't have Word or Excel on my computer, how can I read an email attachment?

A: Microsoft offers a free reader for both Word & Excel documents (and PowerPoint too)

Q: I have a WiFi tablet with its own browser, are there any other alternatives?

A: Yes, try the Dolphin browser, or of course Chrome.

Why is it that people constantly seem to have problems with their insurance in the event of a claim?

'There are two main problems – firstly, arranging a policy correctly is not anything like as easy as people think, the second problem is inertia.' explains Christine. 'Whilst people will search endlessly for the right car, TV or a laptop, few people expend the same amount of energy on ensuring that their insurance is even adequate for their needs. I believe that if you have a nice home and nice things and you accept that you need to insure them – why not do it properly? I recommend that people put in the work up front to ensure that any claim they need to make will be a formality rather than a struggle?'

'Any good broker worth his (or her) salt should be able to help you arrange a policy to cover your basic needs, such as: providing the right amount of cover and they should be able to explain to you the key areas of cover, any exclusions and excesses that apply - before you agree to proceed. However, most brokers will fail to pick up any special circumstances that may apply unless you mention anything that is out of the ordinary.'

'This could be that you don't have items 'specified' that should be' explains Christine 'For example, how many people who receive a new piece of Jewellery will immediately think to contact insurers to add the item to their policy, and if they did, would they know its value?'

But, if they fail to specify items they will probably run into problems in the event of a claim.

'We heard of a lady recently who had her £6 000 engagement ring stolen during a mugging on her doorstep. It wasn't a 'specified item', it wasn't stolen from inside her property and it exceeded her 'personal belongings' limit on the policy, so the insurer – which wasn't one that we deal with - didn't pay out anything at all!'

Another thing that people need to consider is what effect the recent surge in the value of gold and gemstones has had on jewellery values. 'It is not unusual for the replacement value of a piece of Jewellery to have doubled in the last 5 years – how many people will have acted upon that?' Christine points out.

Christine has made her name, in recent years, as the broker of choice for what is called 'Mid to High Net Worth' insurance - a clumsy term, but it describes perfectly what she does – she provides a bespoke service for those who want the best protection for their possessions.

She takes care of everything. From visiting your home and assessing your possessions, she will advise if your current cover is adequate - or not. She will advise on the best way of insuring expensive items or collections and will assist with the obtaining of insurance approved valuations and take photographs for the file.

Finally, following the floods of 2007, one of Christine's insurers sent a Fortnum and Mason Hamper round to one of her clients who was still out of their home at Christmas – having already given them £500 in cash as an 'emergency payment' within days of their claim!

So what are the best things to do to keep yourself properly insured and watertight? Following a few simple rules will improve the effectiveness of your insurance, and if you are one of the many people who are inadvertently 'overinsured', perhaps even save you money.

Begin by assessing the values of your home, vehicles and possessions. Compare these figures to your current sums insured which should be given on your policy documentation. Check all the paperwork you are given, particularly the sums insured on policies and if you do have anything that is a little bit 'special' or that would be hard to replace – take photographs, get a professional valuation and observe any security requirements laid down by the insurance company.



In the Kitchen

Chips or Fries

hips or fries are a favourite in many parts of the world, but so much so in the UK. Unlike some other countries, we make and eat our chips in a variety of ways - from thick to thin, as an accompaniment or on their own, with vinegar, brown sauce, tomato ketchup and more recently mayonnaise (comme les Belges) and not forgetting one of our most traditional of meals, fish and chips. Below are some interesting facts relating to our long term love affair with the humble chip.

Interesting facts about Chips

1790s - The first chips or 'pomme frites' are thought to have been served in France.

1860s - Fish and Chip shops started to open in the UK

1920s - There were around 35,000 fish and chips shops in Britain

1960s - Frozen chips first hit the shops in the UK in the 1960s

1980s - Oven Chips are introduced for the health conscious

1980s - Microwave chips become fashionable as a time saving "instant" convenience

Did you know.....

1 in 4 of all British Potatoes consumed in Britain are eaten as chips

Chips are eaten by 80 per cent of all UK households

There are now around 8,500 fish and chip shops in the UK (quite a drop from the 1920s)

Over 277 million portions of chips are sold in UK fish and chip shops per year

Best types of potatoes for chips

For chips, a floury potato is the best option as they have soft, dry textures when cooked. All-rounders such as King Edward, Maris Piper, Romano and Desirée potatoes are suitable for making chips or, if you can get them, specialist types such as Estima, Pentland Dell, Maris Bard. If you are unsure what type of potato you have just mix one part salt to 11 parts water

in a jug and put the potato into the solution. If it's floury it should sink to the bottom if it's waxy it should float....well that's the theory anyway.

Cheesy Grilled Haddock

Ingredients

675g/11/2lb Haddock Fillet

A little Oil

40g/11/2 oz Butter

3 level tbsp Flour

360ml/12fl.oz. Milk

100g/4oz Mature Cheddar Cheese, grated

Salt and Pepper

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the grill to medium hot. Skin the fish and cut into 4 portions. Place on the grill rack, brush with oil and cook for 7-10 minutes on each side depending on how thick the pieces are
- 2. Meanwhile, melt the butter in a pan, add the flour and cook for 1-2 minutes, stirring, then remove from the heat. Pour in the milk gradually, stirring all the time then return the mixture to the heat and bring to the boil. Cook until thickened.
- 3. Remove from heat then add 75g/3 oz of the cheese and season to taste. Place the fish in a serving dish and cover with the sauce. Sprinkle with the remaining cheese and brown under the grill.

Baked Tuna

Ingredients

4 Tuna Steaks

100g/4oz Butter

4 Garlic Cloves, crushed

6 Fresh Tomatoes, chopped

100g/4oz Fresh Basil, chopped

Salt & Black Pepper 1/2 teasp Sugar 2 tbsp Lime Juice

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, Gas Mark 4.
- 2. Melt half the butter in a medium sized saucepan, add half the garlic and sauté until soft.
- 3. Add the tomatoes, basil, salt, pepper, sugar and lime juice, bring almost to the boil then reduce the heat and simmer very gently for 15 minutes.
- 4. Meanwhile, place the remaining butter and garlic in a small pan and melt over a medium heat. Cook over a low heat for 5 minutes until softened.
- 5. Arrange the fish in a shallow ovenproof dish then pour the butter and garlic from the small pan over the top.
- 6. Bake for 7 minutes, then turn the fish over and bake for a further 7 min
- 7. To serve spoon the tomato mixture over the fish. Serve immediately.

Scottish Herring in Oatmeal

Ingredients

8 Herrings, cleaned, gutted and boned 1 Egg, beaten Coarse Oatmeal to coat Salt and Black Pepper Olive oil for shallow frying

Instructions

- 1. Make sure the fish are well scaled and cleaned
- 2. Season the beaten egg with plenty of black pepper and some salt then dip the fish in the egg.
- 3. Place the oatmeal on a plate and use to coat the herrings on all sides, pressing the oatmeal firmly into the fish.
- 4. Heat the oil in a large frying pan until hot then fry the fish, skin side up first for 4 minutes on each side until cooked and lightly browned.
- 5. Drain the fish on kitchen paper and serve immediately.

Haddock and Spinach Pasta

Ingredients

225g/8oz Short cut Pasta e.g. conchiglie (shells), Spirals, Bows

450g/1lb Smoked Haddock, skinned

Salt and Black Pepper

15g/ 1/2 oz Butter

450g/1lb Baby Spinach Leaves

150ml/5fl.oz. Sour Cream

2 level tbsp freshly chopped Chives

1 tbsp Lemon Juice

Instructions

- 1. Bring a large saucepan of water to the boil, add plenty of salt and the pasta and cook for 8-10 minutes until just tender.
- 2. Meanwhile, season the haddock with salt and pepper.
- 3. Melt the butter in a large frying pan, add the haddock and sauté over a medium heat for about 2–4 minutes on each side until just cooked through. Remove from the pan with a fish slice, flake into large pieces then cover with foil to keep warm
- 4. Add the spinach to the frying pan and cook for 1–2 minutes, stirring from time to time until just wilted.
- 5. Drain the pasta well then return to the saucepan together with the flaked haddock, sour cream, chives, lemon juice, salt and stir gently over a low/medium heat until well mixed and heated through. Serve immediately.




That's nearly an arm full!

s Tony Hancock once exclaimed in his Radio show titled 'The Blood Donor', "That's very nearly an armful!" If you have ever given a pint of blood, it certainly does feel like that after lying on the bed for 15 minutes or more but one thing that does amaze me, you do not feel a thing.

Well I say not but the needle going into the vein in your arm may just sting a little. After that.....nothing. It's just a relax on the bed followed by a cup of tea and a biscuit. What better gift can you give someone in such a short space of time and at no cost involved to you at all? A PINT OF BLOOD! If it wasn't for the marvelous, generous donors along with the incredible hospital staff, I am sure there would be less people surviving serious accidents and illnesses.

So what makes us think that animals are exempt from this 'luxury'? Well it may surprise you but they are not, as they too are able to receive a blood transfusion. With increasing technology in the Veterinary field we can now administer blood to a patient before, during or after surgery as a result of an acute

illness or a serious accident. Where does the supply of blood come from? Unlike humans, there are few blood banks around, if any, so a supply of 'instant blood' is crucial. This is where the Canine Blood Donor Register comes in. Here at KINGSTON, we have such a register and its so easy to apply. I shall take you through each stage as not every one of our canine friends will be eligible, just the same as humans.

- 1: Firstly, our friend must like going to the vets. I know this may sound strange but it's easier to take blood from a pet who is happy to be with us than one who will be made far more stressed than when we started. We may need to sedate your pet if they are slightly nervous because the needle is inserted into the neck and not the leg (unlike Tonys armful). If this is the case, then we will keep our canine friend in until we are happy that they can go home. My beloved Tammy was very laid back and sat quite proudly for the duration whilst she donated her blood but not all our friends are the same.
- 2: They must weigh over 25kgs, be over the age of 1 year and fit and healthy.
- 3: They must never have been abroad and all their vaccinations be up to date.
- 4: With all the above taken into account, your pet must firstly come in to the surgery, to give a sample of blood (free of charge) so that we are able to 'type match' ready for future recipients.
- 4: You, as owner, should be willing to come in at short notice day or night, due to the blood not being stored and therefore will be transferred from pet to patient within minutes.
- 5: You must have your own transport. Time is of the up most importance.

So there we have it, quite simple really......and what's in it for our canine friend?

Well there is the drink and biscuit afterwards. Why should humans have all the treats!

If we are happy with them after approx 50 minutes (longer in large dogs) then they will be allowed to go home.



interested to see its origin. Apparently, horses' gums recede as they get older. So you can tell a horse's age by how long their teeth appear to be; that is, how much of the tooth is exposed.

The phrase "don't look a gift horse in the mouth" has the same origin. If someone gives you a gift of a horse, it's impolite to check its age right off; if someone gives you something with no strings attached, don't check to see if it's good enough for you

The truth is that a lot of mammals get natural gum recession with age and humans are no different. This can be exaggerated and speeded up by gum disease. Some people are genetically more prone than others for all sorts of reasons.

So What Is The Relevance Then?

There is quite a bit. One thing is that with gum recession there can be more nooks and crannies to clean and this can be a bit difficult. It can be even more difficult if you have arthritis or struggle with manual dexterity for any other reasons.

Here, electric toothbrushes can be a real help. They have thicker handles to grip and do quite a bit of the movement for you so it reduces some of the wrist movement that you would need with a manual toothbrush.

Dr "Smile Maker" **Top Tip: Anyone For Tennis?**

If it becomes difficult to grip a toothbrush due to arthritis, stroke or any other reason then you may consider a tennis ball. WHAT? Have you gone mad?

No, if you cut a small cross into a tennis ball and insert the handle of a toothbrush in it then this can make a real difference because it is easier to grip. You can do the same sort of thing with some pipe lagging. Cut a small length and tape it onto the handles if you need to. This could be put on an electric tooth brush as well if necessary.




Another great device is a waterflosser. There is a cordless one but this is a little bit trickier to use than the corded one. The" nano" model is the newest model and is smaller. It acts like a mini jet washer for around your teeth and gums. I don't think that Karcher do one yet. It is a good bit of kit and we have seen some fantastic results.

Earn £4250 tax free from your back bedroom

If you have a spare room in your home you can rent it out. The first £4250 is tax free

Rents average about £400 a month. The taxman calls it the rent-aroom scheme. You can do this even if you live in a council house or a rented house, but you should check first with the council or your landlord. You can take a lodger for a fixed term. Look at spareroom.co.uk for a guide of the rent in our area that you could get.

However, you need to tell your insurers as they may increase your premium, the room must be furnished, if you live alone you must tell the council because you will lose the 25% single person discount from council tax (unless you rent the room to a student), you need to get your gas appliances checked every year, you should vet your lodger first by asking for personal and work and credit references, and you should get a contract detailing the rent, when it is due, the length of the letting period, how you will share the bills, the notice period and guests. Go to www.gov.uk/tenancy-agreements.

Bliss – the telephone preference scheme

I remember years ago being plagued by phone calls selling me double-glazing, conservatories etc, so I joined the telephone preference scheme and I'm glad I did. That was 14 years ago and I have hardly had a junk phone call since. Once you join, the telephone selling companies are not allowed to ring you. I do still get calls from overseas, because the scheme only applies to the UK. To join, just ring 0845 070 007. It's free, it's an automated phone call so you just press the numbers they ask you on your phone to join, and it only takes a minute. If you prefer go online to www.tpsonline.org.uk.

I am told over ten million people have joined. I'm not surprised.

Would you bet if you had a 1 in 24,000 chance of winning?

No you wouldn't. But that's the odds of a £1 premium bond winning a prize each month. The rate of interest on premium bonds is 1.5% a year. (This is because premium bonds pay out 1.5% of the total amount invested in them as prizes each year.) They say you get the "excitement" of the chance of a big win. The best ISAs are presently paying 2.35%, and unlike premium bonds, where you hope you will win a prize, you are definitely guaranteed to get that.

Premium bonds are only for people who pay 50% tax.

Do you remember the many adverts in the newspapers for ostrich farms?

All those adverts were just a scam. ("Ostrich meat is healthy and you will double your money almost immediately".) There were only about 20 animals and all the victims who fell for the scam owned those same birds. The scammers just needed a few animals for the photos in the adverts. Nobody got a penny of their money back.

Scammers are often well-educated, well-spoken, likeable and very convincing, promising large rewards if you send them a cheque to invest in their exclusive, guaranteed, limited time available, big discount if you sign now, wonderful quick big profit opportunity. You lose every penny you send them.

Older people tend to be targeted because they are more trusting.

The plant and the dog



Start at GR. SE971481 Roadside parking in Lund. Distance 6.0 Miles.

This walk can also be started at GRSE983475 which is on the Bracken Road where adequate parking is available in a large lay by or on wide grass verges.

eave the centre of the village and take the Lockington road. Just before the end of the speed limit, turn left and pass through a small wooden gate walk diagonally across the field towards the


end of a hedge. On reaching this continue in the same direction aiming for a belt of trees. On reaching the trees, pass through the hedge and turn right and walk to the end of the wood.

Pass through the hedge and follow a clear track to emerge on the road and turn left. Immediately before the entrance to Lund Moor Farm cross a stile on the right and walk across a short paddock to a kissing gate, pass through the kissing gate and turn left to walk through the farm. At the end of the farm yard continue in the same direction with a fence on the left. At the corner of the field turn right and walk with a hedge on the left. At the end of this field, bear left and walk along a track to emerge on a road. Cross this road and take a tarmac lane keeping a belt of trees to the right.

At the end of this lane, pass through a small gate and continue walking in the same direction, cross a stile and foot bridge and then turn right. Cross a plank bridge and continue walking with trees on the right. Follow the path as it swings right then left, pass through a hedge and then turn right keeping a dyke to the right. After a short distance locate a finger post and turn right (Signed Minster Way), cross a bridge over the dyke and walk down a wide track. Emerge on the road in Kilnwick and turn right and follow the road passed the church and walled gardens. At the cross roads cross straight over and follow the road towards Lockington.

At the next junction turn right and then turn left at the second junction, again signed for Lockington. On reaching the "T" junction in Lockington, turn left and then immediately before the slight left hand bend turn right and either cross the Ford or footbridge and walk down the lane. On reaching a bungalow on the left, locate a kissing gate on the right and pass through this into a field and then walk diagonally to the left across this field aiming for a kissing gate half way along a fence (not visible at first). Pass through this kissing gate and again walk diagonally to the left to the end of a hedge then turn left and keep the hedge on the left. Cross a foot bridge and continue walking with a ditch and hedge to the left.

After the third field emerge on a road and turn right and walk down this road and passed the Lund Road on the right. Shortly after this junction and just before the road bends to the right, turn left onto a foot path keeping the hedge to the left. At the end of the field pass through the hedge and turn left, then cross a foot bridge and turn right. Pass through a small gate and head towards houses in the distance. Continue ahead at the next field and on reaching gates pass through these and walk down a tree lined lane to emerge on a road. Turn left and then at the next junction turn right then right again down a narrow lane and back to the centre of Lund.

What to do

You will need

- Craft knife
- Hose for marking out shape
- Plank long enough to reach over pond
- Spade
- · Spirit level
- Wooden pegs
- Butyl liner

- · Paving or turf for edging
- · Soft building sand

Marking out


- Define the perimeter of the pond, either with string, a length of hosepipe, or by trickling a layer of dry sand through your fingers.
- Remove the turf from the area and stack neatly away from the working place.

Digging

- Excavate the area with a spade to the depth of the first shelf. Mark the outline of the shelf with sand or string.
- Dig out the centre of the pond and either add additional shelves, or dig until the required maximum depth has been reached.
- Check each shelf is level.

Wildlife in mind

- Move the dug-out soil to another area of the garden.
- Check the sides of the pond following the profile you intended. It's a good idea to give one side of the pond a gentle slope to offer animals, such as hedgehogs, a means of escape if they fall in.
- · Pond profile- ideal for Wildlife



A pond which is ideal for wildlife will have:

- a minimum area of 4 to 5 square metres;
- a minimum depth of 80 centimetres (2 feet), so that at least part of the pond does not freeze over in winter;
- a shallow sloping area, to allow birds and other animals easy access; a range of depths, to provide appropriate positions for different plants;
- a marsh or bog area;
- an area of hard paving for access to the pond.
- If you do not have the space, then a smaller area or small containers may still be useful to wildlife. For example, old sinks or half barrels may still provide a home for aquatic insects, and breeding areas for dragonflies. Formal ponds will do the same. A shallow container can provide a birdbath.

Pond plants

Pond plants divide into several categories:

- Oxygenators.are usually submerged plants.
- Floating plants. The leaves of these plants float on the surface. Some of the plants may be rooted, but others float freely. The floating leaves provide shade for the water below, thus reducing build-up of algae. They also act as platforms for viewing, courting or mating for a variety of insects.
- Emergent plants have erect stems and leaves, which emerge above the water's surface. These are important for dragonfly nymphs to crawl up before they become adult flying insects.
- Marginal plants need to grow at the shallow edges of the pond.
 Some need to be permanently in a few centimetres of water, while others will tolerate periodic drying out.
- Marsh or bog plants are wetland plants that grow near the water's edge. Their requirements vary from those that must be in permanently wet soil, to those which need moisture retentive soil, but do not tolerate being waterlogged.

Top Ten Tips

- 1. Plant shallots, onion sets and early potatoes
- 2. Protect new spring shoots from slugs
- 3. Plant summer-flowering bulbs
- 4. Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials
- 5. Top dress containers with fresh compost
- 6. Mow the lawn on dry days (if needed)
- Cut back Cornus (dogwood) and Salix (willow) grown for colourful winter stems
- 8. Weeds come back in to growth deal with them before they get out of hand
- 9. Start feeding fish and using the pond fountain; remove pond
- 10. Open the greenhouse or conservatory doors and vents on warm days.

Lining the pond

- Remove any lumps or sharp stones from the hole. Then spread a 3cm (1.2in) layer of soft builder's sand over the area. This will help protect the butyl liner being punctured.
- A layer of pond underlay or old carpet above the sand will provide additional protection.
- Get a friend to assist in unfolding the butyl liner. Spread it evenly over the hole taking care not to damage it by dragging it on the ground. Secure the sides of the liner with bricks.

- Start filling the pool with water and pull the edges of the liner so that it fits neatly over the contours of the pond.
- Continue filling the hole with water until the pond is full.
- Trim the sides of the liner leaving a 30cm (12in) overlap around the sides of the pond.
- · Cover these with paving slabs, or if you want to create a more natural effect, lay turf up to the water's edge.
- The liner should be covered to prevent sunlight causing it to perish. Position plants and add oxygenators. If you want to add fish wait six weeks until the plants are established.

Plant of the month Forsythia

The spring garden would be a much duller place without the bright yellow flowers of forsyhtia. F. x intermedia 'Spectabilis' is a vigorous variety that is covered in large deep yellow blooms in early to mid-spring. Plant in sun or partial shade, ideally in moist but well drained soil, although the plants are not very fussy. For the best blooms and to avoid your plant becoming too big, cut back the branches that have flowered back to a pair of strong buds just after they have finished

This shrub will grow to a maximum of 2.5m high by 2.5m wide.



Council announce increase to car parking charges

After forgoing an increase in charges for council-run on-street and off-street parking last year, East Riding of Yorkshire Council will be increasing charges by 10p per hour from 8am on Thursday, 28 March.

The charges form part of a balanced budget announced by the council earlier this month, which included, for a third year running, a freeze on council tax. The increase will allow investment in the area's transport infrastructure.

The increase means that to park all day in the East Riding at council-run on-street and off-street car parking will cost £5.40, which compares favourably to neighbouring authorities.

Residents and special group permits, which have been kept at the same level for 10 years, will be increased by between £1 and £5 per annum and scratch cards for visitors/hotel guests are to be raised by £5 per book.

Annual standard permits will increase by £50, which will be introduced over two years at £25 per year, and coach parking will also increase by between 50p and £1 per hour.

Councillor Stephen Parnaby OBE, leader of East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "As part of the budget setting process, all of the council's business operations were reviewed and, to ensure a balanced budget was set, it was decided that car parking charges should be increased.

"Car parking charges are never popular, but serve an important purpose in providing safe and sensible parking for motorists and allow for a regular turnover of spaces to support local commerce.

"Contrary to popular myth, car parking charges are not a means for councils to 'make money', as all of what the council receives goes back into the area's transport infrastructure.

"The robust financial planning by this council has meant that charges in the East Riding have not changed since August 2010 and, even with the proposed increases, will now not need to change again until at least 2016.

"Even with the increases, charges in the East Riding compare favourably to those of neighbouring authorities in the Yorkshire and Humber region."

Beverley

As well as increasing charges by 10p per hour, the council has undertaken a review of its car parks and has re-banded Butcher Row and Spencer Street, in Beverley, to spread use between car parks and improve traffic flow.

These car parks will operate under a new price structure that is free for the first half hour, short stay only, and then £1 for an hour, £2 for two, £3 for three and £4 for all day.



Here is the latest article from Chris who will be reporting monthly with news and tips from the world of fishing

ello and welcome again fellow anglers to this month's fishing news. We hope you are all well and are enjoying your winter fishing; what's that I hear you say? No! Just remember the old saying, there's no such thing as cold weather but there is the wrong clothing. Seriously you can still really enjoy loads of our local waters in winter as long as you are warm. Today's date is 11th February.

Today I would like to talk about targeting our winter fish such as Roach, Perch and Skimmers. First of all feed; there are plenty of ground baits on the market but on a personal level I would look for one that either tells you it has been mixed specifically for silvers or choose a dark ground bait, for example Black Secret or Turbo Black. You may wish to mix this with your favourite ground bait. This is OK to do as long as you mix all your dry ingredients thoroughly before adding any liquid. The reason for using dark ground baits is it has been proven that most fish during winter feel more confident feeding over dark rather than any light coloured ground baits. Once again remember the golden rule, do not over feed, feed little and often as you can put more in but you can't take it out.

Hemp and caster is deadly bait at this time of year, with caster on the hook this usually attracts the better size Roach, and

if you add a little chopped worm to this mix I have found this attracts Perch and Skimmers as well. On the subject of Skimmers, if you are at a venue where they are your main target then I would always add a small amount of micro pellet or fish meal to my ground bait. From personal experience this brings the Skimmers into my peg even quicker.

Some people do not like targeting perch, but I say you're daft as more often than not they are in shoals which in turn mean you catch more fish. Nearly every time you start catching, shall we say 3-5 oz fish, the big bonus fish have a tendency to be in the same shoal, so you can build a good bag very quick. A good tip is if you are targeting Perch is put a worm on as your hook bait and twitch it regularly. This can bring more fish to the net a lot quicker than static bait. As I have mentioned before if you are targeting Roach don't forget bread. I would like to talk about this brilliant bait, but look back in your Cottingham Times issues and re-read all my bread tips for a brilliant days fishing on this versatile bait.

Now then have you noticed that most of our waters are fairly clear at this time of year? Yes, well why are some of you still using your pole? Put them away and go back to rod 'n' reel, either feeder or waggler tactics. Set both rods up from the start, because if you don't you will probably not only regret it, you will find that because it is winter once you have started fishing you cannot be bothered to set up your other rod.

Top feeder fishing tip; whether you are fishing a fixed paternoster rig or a sliding rig, put a snap link swivel on the line to attach your chosen feeder. Then should you want to change from a block end to a cage or a bomb or just to change the size of your feeder you can do so very quickly and easily.

Top float fishing tip: once you have shot your chosen float correctly, rather than setting the depth with a plummet try using a bb shot squeezed on the hook instead. This you will find is easier to cast and it also does not sink into soft silt as much as a plummet would, therefore your finished presentation on a hard day is a lot more accurate.

If you are a bit stuck on where to go for winter fishing pop in the shop and I will be very pleased to help you out with advice on where to fish and advice on the best way to fish the winter venues as well.

Anyway until it gets warmer i.e. summer (God, I hope we get one this year, don't you?) dig out your warmer clothes, boots and hats and surprise yourself. Catch fish, it's a lot more fun than being stuck in the house watching repeats on the telly!!

Hallgate Schools - continued

The Year is 1939

chool reopened on the 9th of January in that fateful year of 1939 with 259 boys and a full staff, but Mr. Brookes went off soon after the start of the new year suffering from 'flu and a chest infection and was away until the 13th of February. Mr. Clarke was in charge during his absence.

On the 24th of February Rev. Dakin presented the school museum (glass cases mentioned earlier, down the Senior corridor) with a South Sea Islands shark tooth spear. Gordon Dearing, a former scholar of Hallgate and Trinity House and then an apprentice on board H.M.S. Ganges, visited the school on the 3rd of March and the Head and several members of staff were pleased to see him and congratulate him on his appointment to his ship.

Illness struck the department in April, Mr. Clarke, Mr. Bailey and Mr. Wright had time off, then Miss Brown, Miss Warwick and Miss Rennie. Empire Day was observed as usual and the Union Flag flown from the pole near the 'woodwork room' this ceremony had always been keenly observed in the schools, but never with as much significance as in that year.

Glorious weather again blessed the Cottingham Schools Sports Festival held on the Ellerman's ground on the 25th of May. As usual, 'houses' competed with each other in separate boys and girls events and the total number of points for each 'House' in all departments were added together. Livingstone House were the winners wearing yellow team bands, Shackleton second wearing green team bands, Wellington third in red bands and Nelson fourth in blue bands. Races for 'old scholars' rounded off the proceedings and Trophies were presented by Mrs. Halliwell the wife of a local doctor.

On the 10th of June another excursion took place - this time to London again. Much the same route was covered as two years previously but with the addition of the Tower. Rain fell heavily during the morning (it always seems to rain more heavily in London when it does rain - especially on school excursions!) It had cleared up by lunch time and the rest of the day was very enjoyable; it was a long day as usual, 5.10am. start from Cottinham Station, returning at 1.45am - next morning.

A significant entry in the Log Book reads,

"7th. July. Two gentlemen from County Hall visited the school today re. provision of Safety to Children in School in the event of raids by hostile aircraft."

All three departments were visited and one of the men was my cousin Len. I was still in the infant's department then and I remember going up the slope from the cloakrooms into the hall and seeing Len at the top, just inside the doorway, a tall dark haired young man smiling down at me. That was the last time I saw him - he was killed in the Middle East in 1941.

In September 1939 I 'went up' into the juniors and into Miss Warwick's class, a kindly person with a rather a loud voice. This coincided with the outbreak of the second world war, and the entry in the log book reads -

The outbreak of war between Germany and the Allies France and Britain which occurred on Sunday 3rd. September, resulted in all schools in the Kingdom being closed for at least a further week, the closure of the Boys' Department here being until Wed. 13th. due to the redecoration of the department not completed. Every effort is being made to make the cloakrooms and main corridors bomb splinter proof so that those scholars who in the event of an air raid are unable to run home in 5 - 7 minutes and will consequently remain in school will be protected and made safe as possible. Windows and doors are being, sand bagged after being bricked up and wire netting and plywood have been fixed to the windows. An air raid practice dismissal has already been held and others will follow from time to time."

Similar precautions were being put in place in the other departments as we will see, but the essential work of the schools went on regardless. Miss Brimelow and Mrs. Wrigglesworth were both away ill and a supply teacher had to be brought in when the girls' school opened on the 9th of January. Three students from the College arrived for their

three week's teaching practice, and visits were paid to Wilberforce House by girls in Sts. 5 and 7 with their teachers and the students. Miss Cumberbirch descended on the department and declared herself very satisfied with the school and her students.

The Rev. Dakin went to the schools on the 27th of February to say goodbye to all as he was leaving the district - a popular and enthusiastic supporter of Hallgate Schools. Mr. Arnett 'found everything correct' on the 6th of March when he examined the registers.

Sports days came and went, with a mixture of successes and failures. The violin orchestra came second in the class that year at Hull Music Festival - just one point behind the winners of the Shield. The school closed on the 16th of June as most of the pupils and teachers were on the London excursion. Three girls gained scholarships - Lorna Blades, Edna Davidson and Dorothy Hill; three girls competed at Craven Park in the County Sports and one of them was to jump in the All England Sports, a great honour for the school - was Bessie Dyson and she had broken a record for the high jump at the sports held at Malton by clearing 4ft. 8ins.

The summer holidays were set to start on the 3rd of August and school to re-open on the 5th of September, but an addition in the Log Book reads -

" The school was closed for another week, until Sept. Ilth because of the war."

Week ending Sept. 15th, 1939. School re-opened on Monday Sept. Ilth. All week the joiners have been at work in the passage putting wire netting to the windows and blocking the glass of the doors. Many unofficial evacuees have been registered and many girls have left the district to go to safer areas. At the end of the week there were 294 on roll, 89%. Work is carried on as far as is possible as usual. The gas masks have been examined and a test of time given for those who live near school to see how quickly they could reach home if an alarm for an air raid was given." The joiners and builders continued work well into October. Brick screens were erected just outside the main entrances to all three departments to guard against blast, and sticky brown tape attached criss-cross to all widows to prevent glass flying through blast. More evacuees arrived from Hull schools and the number on roll rose to 301.

On Tuesday morning 17th of October at 11am., the air raid siren sounded - the rising and falling wailing sound sent a shiver down one's spine and T.V. films and documentaries still have the same effect on me now. Cottingham's siren was on top of the Council Offices on Market Green and this was the first 'real' alert of the war as far as Cottingham was concerned and the well practiced dispersal procedures were put into operation with great success. Those who could get home quickly were allowed to go and those staying filed quietly to their allotted places in the cloakrooms and sat on the forms in there - a relay radio was often switched on to music while the raid lasted; cloakrooms were not the ideal places - the youngest pupils went to the far end amidst much head banging on the coat pegs - shouts of 'I can't breath' or 'stop shoving me' and the teachers trying to sound reassuring at all times; what a weight of added responsibility then rested on their shoulders.

The 'all clear' (one single prolonged wail) sounded at 11.50am. and each department had around 50 absences that afternoon as children were kept at home. A start of the disruption to come.



Hull and East Yorkshire Hospitals NHS Trust has submitted the outline planning application to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council for mixed use development of hospital-owned land for the delivery of much needed housing, employment opportunities and local community services on land to the south of Castle Road, Cottingham.

Hull and East Yorkshire Hospitals NHS Trust aspirations:

The Trust's aspirations for the development of their land includes for family housing, key health worker accommodation, older persons' accommodation including extra care facilities, a primary school and the potential for some small commercial elements such as a public house and small convenience store. Plans also include extensive community use areas of green open spaces, sports pitches, allotments and an orchard.

The land is currently in agricultural use and lies immediately opposite Castle Hill Hospital at Cottingham. All monies raised through the sale of this land for development purposes will be reinvested into patient care and services.

Why Now for a Planning Application?

It has always been the intention of Hull and East Yorkshire Hospitals NHS Trust not to submit a planning application in advance of East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Sites Allocations Development Plan Document. Given the Council commenced consultation on the Draft Strategy and Allocations DPD on the 5th February 2013. The time is now right to submit an

The application more importantly sits within directives from central government, which are:

- To bring into use surplus land owned by Government Agencies, for example, NHS Land.
- To significantly increase house building to assist the 'kick-start' to the economy and get 'Britain Building'.

Background:

The Council has over the past three years been involved in the process of preparing a new Local Plan for the whole of the East Riding. During the early part of the Plan's preparation, the Council sought expressions of interest from landowners to put forward parcels of land available for development to meet ever growing housing and business needs. Land at Castle Hill Park was one of the sites submitted which has been reviewed by the Council and accepted as a site containing very few barriers for development. In other words the land is suitable and available and, subject to an appropriate layout and design, would make a sustainable extension to the settlement of Cottingham.

Over the last 12 months the Hull and East Yorkshire Hospitals NHS Trust have undertaken detailed consultation with the Ward Councilors, Parish Council, Cottingham Civic Society and the local people of Cottingham to present and explaining the evolving proposals. Residents will now have the further opportunity to provide comments upon these proposals direct to the Council during the Council's usual public consultation period.

The Hull and East Yorkshire Hospitals NHS Trust would like to thank Ward Members, Cottingham Parish Council, Cottingham Civic Society and the community of Cottingham for taking the time to contribute and share their ideas and concerns in order to refine development proposals.

Moving Abroad? A monthly column by Nick Russell

Olives

ur harvest of olives was completed over the last weekend in January. I was getting a little concerned as wet and windy weather had blown half the olives from the branches onto the ground and I wasn't sure how they were dealt with. Usually large nets are placed around the base of each tree and the olives are knocked off into these, but as so many were already on the floor, this wouldn't be possible. So when the four pickers started, I was quite interested in the whole operation and to see how they dealt with the olives already on the floor.

One of the pickers used a motorised tree shaker and two others used long wooden poles to knock the remaining olives from the branches. As they finished each tree, the fourth guy used a huge leaf blower to blow all the olives together into a couple of piles and then scooped them up onto a trailer ready to be taken to be weighed.

As this was our first experience of an olive harvest, I had asked if I could go with them to the olive co-operative to see what happened next. When they had a couple of trailers loaded up, I followed them to the co-operative in the town of Huetor Tajar, which is used by many of the local olive growers. Basically, you turn up with your load of olives and tip everything into a hopper in the ground-leaves, stones, soil, branches and the olives- ready for the sorting process to begin.

Firstly they go along a conveyor belt to the first sifting machine, which takes out all the soil and leaves, then up to another machine which removes all the stones and rocks and finally to the weighing machine. When it gets to this point you can view the net weight of your crop on a computer screen in the control room. The olives then complete the last part of the process to the huge storage hopper. As they leave the weighing machine a small sample is taken for acidity analysis at a lab and the result of this test can affect the end price. The higher the acidity, the better the price. All this process was carried out on machinery open to the elements and on this particular day it was really cold and chucking it down so I was quite glad when it was over.

Once your load has been weighed, a receipt is printed off and a copy is given with the weight you have processed that day on it. We

had to make three trips over the next couple of days before all my harvest had been weighed and I had all my paperwork. After the last load I had to go to the office to register all my details and this is when a lack of Spanish is a real problem. None of the pickers spoke English but fortunately Antonio, our head picker had realised this and organised for one of the office girls, who spoke a little English, to come over to help explain what happens next. Irene managed to explain that my olive samples would be sent away for analysis and once the results were back, the value of my harvest would be worked out and I would receive a cheque. This would take about three weeks, which I have since learnt is very quick.

The whole process of picking, transporting, sorting, weighing, and grading is very manual, a bit dated and archaic. Even the price for lab fees is still quoted in pesetas but it seems to work so why change it.

As the co-operative only handles and grades the olives, I wasn't able to see how the raw product was turned into oil. This process takes place at a plant near Granada, so getting my own oil is virtually impossible.

On a volume note, Andalucia produces 80% of the worlds olive oil and, of course, if you ask any Spaniard it is also the best in the world.

At the start of the harvest I had asked Antonio how many kilos of olives I might get from my 125 trees and he estimated around 2,500 kgs. As it happened we actually ended up with over 3,200kgs, which I am hoping to improve on next year as a mature, well looked after tree should give around 40kg per harvest.

On one of my visits to the office, Irene asked me if I was willing to help her improve her English, as her job involves dealing with customers all over Europe, who all speak English. Not having been a teacher, I said I was willing to give it ago, so she now comes over to our house for a couple of hours a week when we talk and do a few written tests, and as I help her, she helps me with a bit of Spanish so it works out well.

Olives are a major part of life in Andalucia so a good harvest is very important but because of the lack of rain in 2012, this years harvest is pretty poor. It looks like there could be a shortage of

olive oil so prices will rise in the shops. The hopeful spin off for the growers is that next year the value of olives will go up from the current value of around 50c/kilo as about five years ago the value was over 2 euros /kilo.

Spanish lessons

After 10 months of living in Spain, we have decided its time to have Spanish lessons and learn the language. Our grandchildren already have lessons at home as well as learning Spanish at school so we asked their home tutor, Eva, if she would help us. We now have an hour a week with her and, alhough its fun, it is quite difficult but it has to be done. Hopefully for me, with the extra help from my pupil Irene, I might improve a bit quicker.

Building work

Building work continues on the ground floor of the casitas but at a slow pace. We are still waiting for our builder to get back to us with prices for a septic tank, gas boiler and plumbing work. All the electrics are now in and just need the electrician to connect up to the main PCB. My son Tom has started plastering the walls and we have ordered the front door from a local business as it is not a standard size and will have to be made to measure. Despite the holdups we are still working towards having the two bedrooms and bathroom ready by the end of April for any guests who might want to come out during the summer but on a B&B basis. We also have the two bedrooms and bathroom in the house as well, so we can sleep up to eight people in total. E-mail nickruss@hotmail.co.uk for more details

The first floor is a different matter as we are still waiting for the architect to produce a drawing for the roof and to apply for planning permission, so that will happen as and when.

The garden

The weather has been perfect for gardening over the last few weeks. Its been sunny and warm most afternoons with plenty of rain falling at night so my wife Rita and daughter in law Adel have been busy planting rows and rows of vegetables in the allotment. I have managed to prune and cut back nearly all the trees and bushes around the pond and garden as well as build and lay a 60 metre path through the garden and re-stone the path around the pond. Rita and Adel have sown some grass seed to try and get some grass to grow back in the garden. In preparation for the summer, I have also started to lay out a watering system for the garden to try and keep it alive during the hot weather.

Next visitors

At the end of February, we are expecting our first visitors of the year. Our daughter Nicola, her partner Andy and our grandson Jack are coming out for a week and hopefully it will be warm and sunny. They will be followed by our friends Dawn and Steve, who are also coming out for a week.

If it is, then all the resident needs to do is respond to the offer letter and then the energy supplier will set up their new energy deal which lasts 12 months.

Councillor Symon Fraser, cabinet portfolio holder for environment, housing and planning at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "Switching energy suppliers is something that many of us never get round to doing or it can seem too daunting and complicated.

"The YORSwitch scheme makes switching energy suppliers really easy so that we can all start to save money on our gas and electric bills.

"It's easy to get involved either on line or in person and the more people that get involved the greater the buying power of YORSwitch."

Dunswell Primary School

his little school is still thriving today, providing education for the children of the hamlet and nearby areas. It has changed hardly at all at the front, but there have been additions at the back in more recent times to cope with demand.

Unlike most of the buildings in this survey of Victorian village schools, Dunswell was not founded by subscription or affiliated to the religious bodies; it was built by the Cottingham School Board in the 1890's to accommodate some 50 children, most of whom can be seen on the photo with the Master and two female pupil teachers.

The land upon which the school is erected was bought from a local farmer for the princely sum of two shillings and six pence a square yard - 12.5 pence in today's money - and built by Thomas Croats whose tender for the work was £429 4s 0d, just beating that of Robert Wilkinson's of £492 5s 0d, but a big saving then.

During the Second World War, an air raid siren stood on top of the school roof at one end - the base is all that is left now.

However, this thriving little school may become a casualty of restructured Government School Funding. With just under 100 pupils, and an unofficial catchment area that covers Kingswood, this school along with other small schools throughout the East Riding, are all under the microscope. Dunswell School is financially healthy and is oversubscribed; it also contributes to the community by hiring the local Community Sports Hall and consequently has a much better facility than many other primary schools. Foundation Years children have access to the Play Group, based at St Faiths, and that income helps to finance the church. The loss of the school would have a far reaching impact on the whole village. 

Important changes to Council Tax Benefit

t a full council meeting on 9th January, East Riding of Yorkshire Council members agreed the new local council tax support scheme that will replace council tax benefit in the East Riding from 1st April 2013.

On 1 April 2013 the current council tax benefit scheme will be abolished by the Government. This benefit is awarded to customers in low or no income households to help them pay their council tax. It is currently a national scheme paid for and regulated by the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP).

All local authorities have been required to design their own local schemes to support their residents who need help with their council tax from 1st April 2013. Pensioners are protected from these changes and will not see any changes to their benefits. The new scheme applies to working age residents only.

The government is reducing the funding it gives to local authorities to support working age residents who need help with their council tax and East Riding of Yorkshire Council's funding will reduce by £2.2 million. The council therefore had to decide whether to reduce the level of support offered to working age residents or find the savings from other services. The difficult decision was taken that the new council tax support scheme should limit the amount of help that working age residents can receive to 75 per cent of their council tax bill. The new scheme means that no one of working age will receive 100 per cent support towards their council tax, and every working age household in the East Riding will have some council tax to pay.

Councillor Stephen Parnaby OBE, leader of the council, said: "As the budget the council receives to pay council tax support will be reduced by £2.2 million from April, the council has to make difficult decisions to reduce the amount of help people can have towards their council tax bills.

"Even after limiting the amount of help that working age residents can receive to 75 per cent of the council tax bill, the council will still have to find £1.2 million to fund the scheme.

"I must stress that the changes to council tax benefit are entirely the result of Government policy and not anything decided locally by this council.

"The council has consulted closely with many people and groups about the changes. The general view has been that it is difficult to treat one group who may be vulnerable in a more or less favourable way than another, so a reduction in benefit across the board is the fairest way to proceed. The East Riding's 15,500 pensioners are exempt from the changes and will not see any reduction in their entitlement."

All existing customers will be automatically transferred on to the new scheme from 1st April 2013 and will receive notification letters and council tax bills in March 2013 showing how much they will have to pay.

Residents are urged not to ignore their council tax bill. It is important that payment is made as the bill specifies, or that contact is made with the council to discuss repayment options and how we can help.

ecently members of Cottingham W.I. enjoyed an outing to Hornsea Inshore Rescue. The excursion included a fish & chip lunch with mushy peas, bread and butter, tea/coffee and biscuits in a comfortable dining room.

Sue Hickson-Marsay (chair person) gave a talk explaining that the service became a registered charity in 1994 following public support for an independent rescue facility. Hornsea lost its former patrol boat prior to this during a review of the coastguard services. 3. Meditate your stress away:

Meditation involves a state similar to sleep where the body and mind are quieted and become completely focused on a person's internal world. Meditation is a type of inner consciousness where you must block out everything in your surroundings in order to concentrate on your breathing.

4. Add yoga to your life:

Yoga is a physical and mental discipline that is an amazing stress/anxiety reliever. Yoga is a set of exercises made up of stationary poses as well as a variety of movements. It also combines deep breathing to lend itself to a manner of relaxing the mind, body and soul. Use this Ancient Practice to Create Harmonious Living in Your 21st Century Life.

5. Be mindful of the present:

Mindfulness is all about living in the present moment and relishing it with no thoughts of the past or future intruding on your mindset. 6. Use EFT for stress reduction:

10. Be realistic about the realities of life:
