



Lung diseases caused by asbestos include:

- Asbestos related pleural effusion
- Pleural thickening
- Asbestosis
- Mesothelioma (a form of lung cancer)
- Lung cancer

Where asbestos related lung disease is developed, compensation and benefits may be payable, even if the former employer no longer exists.

For mesothelioma sufferers, it may be possible to obtain compensation to fund treatments which are not available on the NHS such as immunotherapy which can prolong life expectancy.

This same opr tunity runs through to the Universities where I have always had ve terinary and ve terinary by iotherape students come spend time with us dring their courses.

I think it is very impresent for young p objecto get a glimp e of working life as they d cid where their lives may take them in their chosen career p thway. For some it is a shock! Working with any top of animal will alway require hard work and d it cation. Horses esp cially. There

There can **b** high risks when working with horses who are infamous in their p ed ctab e unp ed ctab lity Und rstand ng how we can make b g imp cts on safety with the judge ments we make and he actions we take, is massive ly impr tant.

Alongside the animals, there are pt ential **d** ngers in every environment and with some of the eqi pn ent we use. The muck trailer can **b** fallen from. Trip hazard on rough ground Prok mity to the large Plant hire and farm ver hicles who I share our world with. All I can ever d is make every ne aware and then hand them a mirror. Why a mirror? Its simp e really. The person looking **b** ck at you in that mirror is the person who is response ib e for the d cisions mad. Ultimately we are all response ib e for our own health and safety. All I can ever d is arm every ne with all the relevant information and the risk factors and our pover n strategies to stays afe.

Sall y, increasing numb rs of small bs inesses no longer offer work exp rience opr tunities to young \mathbf{p} op e b cause of the risks. No one wants to b sued if any hing went wrong while they are in our care and control. It's a dub e edge d sword I guess. I dn' t b ame bs inesses for op ing out however, if young \mathbf{p} op e d not get opr tunities in life, I feel we are failing them.

We alway really enjoy hav ng young p ob e join us. It gives my staff the opr tunity to grow as teachers and mentors. Sometimes they forget just how much they d know! I enjoy watching everyone flourish, form friendships and a in so veryon uch in their mutual interactions.



We **d** see **q**i te a few cases of chocolate poisoning on a monthly **b** sis and more so around Easter. Some dg owners have never heard how **p**i sonous chocolate is and heyf eed t to their dg a s a treat.

Chocolate contains theob omine, a pi son that affects the central nervous sy tem and the heart of a dg. If a dg gets to a \mathbf{v} t in time, it can be mad to b sick and also give n active ted charcoal to ab orb any tok n left in the **i**d gestive sy tem. In two of our cases, the dgs almost **i**d ed **b** fore recove ring, so it is **i** tal owners act **qi** ckly."

So that was Teal's claim to fame...my chocolate thiev ng Lab adr . Please **b** careful when Easter ap oaches. The smell of chocolate is not only temp ing to us, **b**t more so for our furry friend.

You can imagine the conversations I had with my family when I d cid d to have another Lab addr when Teal sald y p ssed away. "They are not all like that" I insisted "Surely she was a one off". WITH ROY WOODCOCK

Pairing wine with food

Some ait ce for **p** iring food and wine can **b** overly strict. The truth is, you can eat **p** etty much whater **r** you want while **d** inking whicher **r** wine you choose. I enjoy **d** a rare steak with a coup e of glasses of an oaked Chardnna y recently and it was, I have to say, something that worked eallyw ell.

۲

Which \mathbf{p} or \mathbf{v} s the $\mathbf{p}i$ nt - a red will \mathbf{b} the go-to choice for most \mathbf{p} of \mathbf{p} , I guess, when it comes to \mathbf{p} iring wine with steak, bt at the endof the **d** y it's what works for $\mathbf{y}u$.

Yes, red wines **d** work well with red meats (and more to come abut that, with ex mb es, **b** low). It's the tannins (the **d** y feeling yu get in yur mouth when yu' re **d** inking red wine or ex n a cup of tea) that work well against the robust flavours and fattiness of a great cut of steak. But which red?

If we really want to refine this particular steak/red wine "match" we need to consider about the cut of meat you're going for. Sirloin, flank and bavette are examples of leaner steaks while ribeye and rumpa re more **p** werful ones.

Sauce matters too. If $\mathbf{y}\mathbf{u}'$ re hav ng something sp cy, $\mathbf{y}\mathbf{u}'$ ll want to tone dw n the pw er in the wine so it's not all too much in $\mathbf{y}\mathbf{u}$ mouth. If $\mathbf{y}\mathbf{u}' \mathbf{v}'$ got some creamy $\mathbf{p} \mathbf{p}$ room sauce going on, $\mathbf{y}\mathbf{u}$ m ight want a little more acid n $\mathbf{y}\mathbf{u}$ wine to cut through all that richness.

Malb c and Cab rnet Sauv gnon, **p** rticularly Malb cs from Argentina, the home of steak, certainly work well. Malb cs generally taste like lush **d** rk fruits and have b enty of those hand tannins, making them a great match for meatyd shes.

Cab rnet Sauvignons, \mathbf{p} rticularly those from California, are sup r pw erful wines that go well with steak cuts like Rib \mathbf{y} or other bne -in $\mathbf{t}\mathbf{p}$ s. They too have lots of nice **d** rk fruits and tannins going on.

If you' or got a leaner cut, like a sirloin, you could try a Sy ah from France, a South American Cinsault, Italian Montepl ciano d'Ab uzzo or Sp nish Temp anillo. These wines are usually light to med um bid ed (you dn't need as much bol if your steak isn't as meaty and have nice acid ty. Plus, they're sup ror rsatile, so if you'or got half a bt the leftor royu could have it with a bw l of ragu or sausage casserole.

And then, of course, there's the Chardn nay op ion! And hav ng said that, here's a few more food and v ine suggestions yu m ight want to ignore . . .

Pinot Noir: Pair with earthy flavours: Recipes made with earthy ingredients like mushrooms and lentils taste great with red like Pinot Noir, which is light-bil ed bt full of savoury d p h. Pinot is also often delicious alongside salmon, proving that red wine and fish can go together brilliantly.

Sauvignon Blanc: Goes with tart dressings and sauces: Tangy foods — like scallops with a grapefruit-onion salad — won't overwhelm zippy wines like Sauvignon Blanc, Vinho Verde from Portugal, and Verdejo from Spain. Sauvignon Blanc also works well alongside vinaigrette, roasted or sautéed fish, and goat's cheese.

Dry Rosé: For rich, cheesy **i** shes: Some cheeses go **b** tter with white wine and some sing alongsid red Almost all, hower \mathbf{r} , \mathbf{p} ir well with \mathbf{d} y rosé, which has the acid ty of white wine and the fruit character of red. Rosé also works well with grilled fish, fresh salad, and even a big plate of charcuterie.

Pinot Grigio: Pairs with light fish dishes: Light seafood dishes seem to take on more flavour when matched with equally delicate white wines, such as Pinot Grigio from Italy, Chablis from France, and Vinho Verde from Portugal.

Malb c: Hold up to sweet-sp cy **b** rb cue sauces: Malb c, Shiraz, and C6 es-d- Rhôe are bl d enough to drink alongside foods brushed with heavily spiced barbecue sauces — just be careful that the sauce isn't too sugary sweet, which can throw off the wine's fruit.

Sy ah: For highly sp ced **d** shes: When a meat is heav ly seasoned look for a red wine with lots of spicy notes. Syrah or Cabernet Franc are good choices. But be careful with spice heat, however: For hot **d** shes like those, t ryt o avi dhi gh-alcohol wines, w hich will amp if the sizzle.

Off-Dry Riesling: Pairs with sweet and sp cy it shes: The slight sweetness of many Rieslings, Gewürztraminers, and Vouvrays helps tame the heat of spicy dishes and goes toe-to-toe with the lift of more aromatic ingreid ents. A sp cy green salad is a d licious p rtner for any of those wines. Zinfand 1: For Pâtés, mousses, and terrines: If you can ab y the same ajl ective s to a wine and a it sh, pairing them will often work. For instance, the words "rustic," "savoury," or "rich" are often used to d scrib Zinfand 1, Italy s Nero d Avol a, and Sp in's Monastrell, as well as a creamy liver mousse. Spice and fruit-driven Zinfandel also has a natural affinity for barbecued or sauce-slathered meats.

Champ gne: Perfect with any hing salty: Many d y sp rkling wines, such as b ut Champ gne and Sp nish Caw, actually hav a faint touch of fruity sweetness. This makes them ex ra-refreshing when served with salty foods. They also cut through the richness and oil of fried dishes. Great with fish and hip !

Moscato d'Asti: Loves fruit desserts: Sweet sparkling wines such as Moscato d'Asti and demi-sec Champ gne help empa sise the fruit in the d ssert, rather than the sugar. It's also d licious alongsid a simp e summer fruit salador even sp ashed not it.

Motoring - with Roy Woodcock



Roy Woodcock revisits Britain's most popular - and most reliable - car; the Nissan Qashqai...

When Nissan took the bl d step of launching the Qashqai in the UK in 2007 there was nothing else like it on the road It offered an ex ellent balance b tween the comp ct d mensions of a hatchb ck, with the sense of robs tness and elex ted iv ew afford d b a trad tional four-wheel d is , without the size, weight or efficiency penalty.

In di ng so, it d liv red the b st of bt h world b breaking dw n the b rriers to SUV ownership and the Crossov r was br n. The concep certainly struck a chord with by rs, p rticularly families, and since then more than 600,000 Qashqais have been registered for UK roads and millions more sold worldv id . All bi It in the UK, of course.

The car's success shows no sign of ab ting, ex n though there are now **1** if rect comp titors to the current Qashq i in Europ. The latest, third generation, of the mod l was introduced in 2021 and the range now includes an e-POWER option alongside 1.3 and 1.5-litre mild hybrid petrol engines.

The e-POWER **b** \mathbf{g} e d \mathbf{v} rsion **d** aws technologies from the company's pioneering Nissan LEAF electric vehicle and uses a 1.5-litre petrol engine as a generator for the electric motor and **b** ttery, without a **d** rect line **b** tween the combs tion engine and the wheels. It's a smooth and refined system that makes the car feel a bit like an EV most of the time, and it costs an awful lot less than rix 1 **b** ug-in h**b** id.

Perhap no surp ise then that the Qashq i was the UK's most popular car in 2022, with 42,704 sales. Second was the Vauxhall Corsa with 35,910 registrations followed by the Tesla Model Y with 35,551 cars sold. It's also recently been d clared the UK's most reliab e car in the annual sure yc arriedout b Which

The new Qashq i is b gger thanks to an ext end d wheelb se that give sit more presence and the front features the large Nissan V-motion grille finished in chrome. There are slim full LED head ights with bom erang d ty ime running lights and large 20-inch alloy wheels are available.

With an egy on the comp tition Nissan has also taken the cab n up arket and my car featured amb ent lighting, pw er op rated qi lted leather seats and a stack of technology. The infotainment sy tem has **b** en up rad d and includ s easy integration of smarthone s **i** a A \mathbf{p} e CarPlay and Android Auto, in-car wi-fi and a 10-speaker Bose surrounds ounds y tem.

Depending on which specification you opt for - the range goes from Visia to Tekna + in five steps, you can also enjoy a heads-up display, 12.3-inch driver TFT screen and heated seats that can also come with a massage function. Prices start at just over £26,000 all the way to £41,000 p us.

The Qashq i is no slouch bt it focuses on comfort rather than sp ed and that is just what most of its by rs will want. There are d iv mod s called Eco, Stand rd and Spr t that alter the v hicle's respns es, while the ProPilot set-up assists with steering, acceleration and b aking and help maintain the car's lane ps ition and id stance from the v hicle in front -i d al for motorwayw ork.

The Qashq i offers lots of grip and there is not a lot of **byt** oll even in tight corners.

The longer wheelb se means there is more room insid for \mathbf{p} ssengers and four adl ts can trave 1 in comfort and five for shorter journeys.

A pw ered tailgate (Tekna and abv e) offers easy access to the boot which can take 436 litres of kit and this increases to 1,379 litres with the 60:40 split-folding rear seats dropped flat. A double boot floor is also part of the d al.

The third gen Qashq i ba sts a wealth of safety kit including the clever Intelligent Forward Emergency Braking with p ed ctive function. This is ab e to read the road ahead of the car in front to d tect if a ve hicle sud nly b akes and reacts accord ngly. Another new feature is a central airb g that p otects front occup nts in the event of a sid collision.

Build ng a Crossov r v hicle is easy. Build ng one as good as this Qashq i is a whole lot tougher, as comp titors have found This remains a b nchmark car from a b and that clearlyknow s its market.

Now, those voters who are eligibe to out e and on the electoral register and wish to attend a polling station on 4 May will have to show an ap or d form of pot o ID, which can includ :

• UK, European Economic Area (EEA) or Commonwealthp assport

•U KE EAor C ommonwealthd riv rs'l icence

• an older person's bus pass or a disabled person's

busp ass

•b lueb adg

Voters will also **b** ab e to use exp red ID as long as the photograph still **b** ars a strong resemb ance to the **p** rson.

But for \mathbf{p} ob \mathbf{p} who \mathbf{d} not have a form of pot o ID from the list and who wish to $\mathbf{v}\mathbf{t}$ e in a pl ling station, they can now ab y online for a free voter certificate – as long as the app icant is alread registered to $\mathbf{v}\mathbf{t}$ e and on the electoral register.

The ab icant will then breqi red to p ov d a current photo, their full name, d te of birth, ad ess for which they are registered to vt e as well as their National Insurance numb r.

The full list of accep ed ID as well as the link to the voter authority certificate can be found on the Electoral Commission's web ite – <u>www.</u> <u>electoralcommission.org.uk/</u> <u>voterID</u>

But there are a numb r of other way for \mathbf{p} ob e who are eligible, and on the electoral register, to cast their of e ahead of 4M ay.

For ex mb e, if the b ot is in shad for most of the d y and the soil tend to b moisture retentive a x riety of Ferns may b b st.

Similarly, if the b ot gets a lot of sun and the soil d ies out qi ckly yu should consid r a d ought tolerant b ant like Law nd r or Heb.

The ow rall amount of light our entire gard n receives $\mathbf{d} \mathbf{p} \mathbf{n} \mathbf{d}$ on the \mathbf{d} rection it faces. A North-facing gard n will get the least light and can $\mathbf{b} \mathbf{d}$ mp whereas South-facing gard ns will receive the most light. An East-facing gard n will receive the most light in the morning and a West-facing gard n will get afternoon and \mathbf{e} ming light.

Shad low ng b ants will thrive in a North-facing gard n. Ferns d great in moist and shad areas but yu' e also got a great choice for colours. Consid r Vinca (Periwinkle) as ground cov r; this ever green b ant is hard and has beautiful purple-blue flowers. For height, Mahonia is an exe ellent choice and has y ar round interest. It is a hard ever green shrub with attractive spiky leaves and y llow flowers in winter. Camellias also thrive in shade and are frost hard meaning they will need little p otection in the winter months. They also have beautiful spring flowers and can b grown in a container of ericaceous comps t to b ighten a p tio.

For South-facing gard ns p one to a lot of light it's **b** st to p ck sun-lov ng p ants. Helianthemum (Rock Rose) is id al for a grav l gard n or a d y stone wall, id al for summer colour.

A **b**l b id al for sunny **p**s itions is Allium, or the Ornamental Onion. This unique looking **b** ant with star-like flowers is frost hardy and dries well for floral arrangements. The foliage is a silve ry grey and looks **b** autiful in a br d r or container.

Temperature

In the North East of England we are p one to cold wet and wing weather. This January we saw heay snow, frost and \mathbf{v} ry low temp ratures meaning our gard ns got a b t of a b ttering. Town gard ns tend to b warmer than rural ones b cause of the shelter prov d d b bi lid ngs, however check your gard n for potential frost pc kets caused b cold air b coming trap d b the house or hede.

When taking a look at your b ot you should consider where the most sheltered pints are in your gard n or if you can imp ove them (heging is an id al wind eaker).

Choose \mathbf{y} ur \mathbf{b} ants \mathbf{b} sed on the minimum temp ratures they an surv \mathbf{v} ;

Hardy: - Can surive to +5 C. They can stay in the ground all y ar and urive.

Frost Hardy: - Can surve to S C bt will need p otecting dr ing p rticular coldw inters.

Half Hardy: - Can surv $\boldsymbol{\mathfrak{v}}$ to $\boldsymbol{\theta}$ C will require winter protection

Tend r: - Protect \mathbf{b} low \mathbf{a} C and they cannot surve outsid during winter so will need o \mathbf{b} b ought insid.



Satire, humour, and witt: an introduction to David Shrigley

Inspired by a simplicity of sorts, David Shrigley's art is recognisable for his flat compositions accompanied by satirical comments on mundane, everyday situations.

Perhaps his darkly amusing artwork provides a much needed antidote to daily life, or perhaps it just makes us laugh. Whatever the case, David Shrigley's work needs little explanation.



197 Hallgate Cottingham, HU16 4BB Oftentimes featuring a cartoon elephant, penguins, basketballs or people, Shrigley finds himself influenced by the animated spirit of contemporary visual culture.

David Shrigley's cartoon-like characters are accompanied by his humorous and witty narratives, leaving the onlooker lost in the satirical world of David Shrigley.

Born in Cheshire in 1968, Shrigley started studying art at Leicester Polytechnic in 1987 before heading to Glasgow School of Art for his degree in environment art in 1988, a time when he believed "there wasn't a precedent for people selling work that wasn't figurative painting."

Shrigley believes he is an outsider to the art world for his flat compositions taking on the inconsequential, the bizarre, and the disquieting elements of daily life. The artist has exhibited across the world, with his work featuring in high profile collections across the globe including the Museum of Modern Art, New York and Tate, London. In 2020, David Shrigley was awarded an OBE for his service to visual arts.

The artist's career progressed, with a major milestone In 2003 when David Shrigley animated a music video for Blur before starting a weekly between cartoon





for The Guardian newspaper 2005 and 2009. In 2013 Shrigley was shortlisted for the monumental Turner Prize following his major mid-career retrospective at the Hayward Gallery, London entitled 'Brain Activity'. Today, David Shrigley's art is recognisable for his satirical drawings, which explore the mundane through a childlike wonder and incisive sense of humour.

David Shrigley is an artist celebrated for his hilariously nihilistic creations. He's experimented with a massive array of media and styles over the years, but is best known for his colourful sketches and drawings – interspersed with witty and wicked written commentary.
