Council drawing up strategy to improve playing pitches

ocal sports clubs are being urged to help draw up a new strategy to improve sports pitches across the East Riding.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council is developing a new Playing Pitch Strategy for the next five years, covering playing areas for cricket, football, rugby league, rugby union, hockey, tennis, athletics, bowls and crown green howls

The strategy aims to

Protect, improve and grow playing pitch provision, ensuring efficient maintenance and management to meet need now and in the future

Support funding bids, open space assessments for planning applications, and development of the local plan.

Help to widen participation in sport by ensuring all communities are supported to use playing pitches.

Encourage and support community use of playing pitches.

Support residents to enjoy their maximum potential for health and wellbeing.

Encourage environmentally sustainable maintenance and development of playing pitches and facilities.

The council is posting out surveys to local sports clubs, schools, town and parish councils and any other organisations that provide playing pitches in the county.

Their feedback will be key to identifying gaps in local sporting provision, and areas where improvements should be a priority.

Anyone who completes the survey will be entered into a prize draw for one of five one-month East Riding Leisure passes and a £100 sports shop voucher for their club or facility. The prize draw is not open to schools.

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
Councillor Nick Coultish, cabinet member for culture, leisure and tourism, said: "We're asking clubs and organisations across the region to help us drawn up our new Playing Pitch Strategy.

"In some cases, being included in the Playing Pitch Strategy may be necessary for organisations to access funding, so it is really important that they complete the survey at return it to us as soon as possible."

The council is developing the strategy on behalf of Sport England and national governing bodies such as the FA, as part of a national planning framework.

The Playing Pitch Strategy team have also been carrying out non-technical assessments of pitches in accordance with the timings specified by each sport's National Governing Bodies.

Precept

Following careful consideration the Parish Council has agreed to increase the precept for 2024-25 to £32.48 per year for a Band D equivalent property. This is an increase of approximately 27.22% or £6.95 more per annum (equivalent of just under 60p per month). Whilst this represents a significant percentage increase compared with previous years, it is a relatively small cash increase per property due to the low initial base. Overall, the increased budget reflects the ambitions of the Council which it has set out in its newly developed Strategic Plan.



Trust is hard-earned and easily lost. The choices we make matter!

This article is a brief review of the likely consequences of our actions concerning the **operant quadrant**. (Our choices in shaping future behaviour)

Negative reinforcement R-, Negative punishment P-, Positive punishment P+ and Positive reinforcement R+

Have you ever sat back and contemplated that you just handled a situation in the wrong way? The realisation that you just messed up big time or regret the words you chose to use or the actions you just took? What will be the lasting consequence of that moment in time and how will it affect the future relationship and behaviour with that person, child or colleague?

What on earth did you just do?

Did you choose harsh and hurtful words that hurt the receiver emotionally? Were you lying about something? (Self-protection or Resource guarding). Could it be that you took something away from another person which you knew would feel punishing? (P-) or some physical action where you lashed out, struck, hit, poked or worse? Every single one of us knows that physical abuse hurts in 2 ways—through the actual pain inflicted as well as the emotional pain and fallout felt afterwards. (P+)

Choices!

Thinking back on your actions, assess how your choices made you feel at the time. Were you dominating because you could? I guess it must have felt good at the time! Did your choice stem from frustration or fear on your part? Were you protecting something or someone else? Were you withholding something from someone on purpose, knowing that it would have a desired, punishing effect? Were you reacting against something they did to you or that you had perceived that they had done to you? Were you trying to make that person do something against their will? (R-)

Now let's think about how many choices you actually had!

Was the situation in your control or was it the fear of losing control which instigated your choices in reaction? What exactly made you want to gain power over that other person?

Turn all this around into the place of the receiver. Has this happened to you? How did it make you feel? Does the memory still haunt you even after years have passed by? Given a similar environment or stimuli, will it make you behave in a certain way or feel sad, fearful or emotional? (classical conditioning)

All these scenarios are happening in our human world all of the time

How do we decide to treat each other? How do we react to situations we find ourselves in? What reactions spring to mind when you feel unfairly treated or have had something taken off you with no choice? What are those powerful feelings which happen when someone is bullying or dominating you? Do you feel angry (rage) or would you shut down and try to let it simply wash over the top of you? What makes you feel the need to protect something or someone? Social bonding and care for others will trigger the need to show defensive actions and words.

Trust is hard-earned and easily lost.

The choices we make will always have a ripple effect like dropping a stone in still water. They will touch into and effect future relationships, interactions and behaviour.

In my world of horse (and animal) training, I see all of the above scenarios running all of the time with how we treat our pets – especially the domineering way horses are endemically treated and trained. I see how historical experiences and associations drive unwanted behaviour (reactions) in horses all the time. I see how badly humans handle a horse who is reactive, scared, angry or frustrated. The hard-held belief that we need to master or dominate horses, is the main criteria endemic worldwide. Why do we humans feel the need to behave this way- **BECAUSE WE CAN!**

I'm saddened by how very common it is for the human to assume that a horse is being "awkward", "stupid", "doing it on purpose" or "naughty", when none of those labels are true in behaviour terms. They are very unfair. Absolutely none of that terminology applies to animals. It is not in their psyche to think in those anthropomorphic ways. They react to environments immediately associated with their consequences to them based on primal survival drive, self-protection or historical associations (memories).

The more violent we humans are with horses, the more harm we cause and the worse the predictable future behaviour will become. Somehow, we still have the right to carry and use whips on horses. The racing industry is all about legal abuse by its allowed use of "riding out with whips" to the finish post. Heaven forbid you ever see humans being whipped to make them work harder or see a dog being beaten as you drive by. Those scenarios are illegal.

Humans are such a dominant species— just look at our histories of war-making and killing. The rape of our planet for money, to which we are now really paying the price, despite decades of unheeded warnings. Every single day 100 species are being wiped off the face of the earth forever. What gives us the right?

Animals do not make war. They do not behave as we do yet they suffer the outcomes of our dominance in every single way and all of the time. This is because they have no power. Our processes in farming animals for their meat, especially live transport abroad and the whole mass slaughter industry are endemic in cruelty and all based on making maximum profit. The animals have no choice in their fate yet it is theirs to suffer.

This article is about giving you all some food for thought. Can we change our behaviour enough to make the lives of our helpless animals better? All animals everywhere are powerless because it is we who hold all the power.

The Kept Animal Bill

Could we possibly grant animals sentiency in law? Here in the UK, there is a huge public push towards that goal but our politicians refuse to listen because it will cost the country too much money. Granting all animals in our care the recognition of sentiency is the one most amazing and massive outcome which would, could or should, make a huge difference to the quality of life of all our animals- the whole pet industry, the entire farmed animal process and the entire equine industry. It would strengthen welfare laws enormously and increase our Law Courts and magistrates' power for sentencing offenders.

Could we ever give power to our most vulnerable species to enable all animals to have the same rights of a safe, pleasurable and pain-free life as we human overlords?

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



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

What drives you to buy a particular wine?

mage, personal preference, perceived quality, price . . . what is it that drives you to buy a particular bottle of wine? And do you stick with what you know or take a gamble on trying something new? I ask because of some interesting facts and figures that came out of a tasting for the wine trade held recently.

It was organised by the New Zealand wine industry and, already, I know a few of those ingrained "truths" about particular wines will have come to the fore. After all, we all "know" New Zealand wines, like home-produced English wine, comes with a price premium.

At this particular tasting it was revealed (and I have to say no one was really surprised) that New Zealand producers are able to charge more for their wines in the UK market than producers from any other still wine-making region.

And UK consumers are more than willing to meet these higher prices.

While the average sales price per litre of still wine is £8.88 in the UK market, wines from New Zealand are priced at an average of £11.10 per litre, representing a £2.22 premium. And according to Philip Gregan, president of trade body New Zealand Winegrowers: "In the last 12 months we've maintained our price premium, which is so, so important to us."

He added that he was pleased the New Zealand wine industry had protected its "cache and reputation with the trade and with consumers."

What's not in doubt is that higher prices are no barrier to sales, when it comes to UK consumers

Between 2022 and 2023, the volume of New Zealand wine exports to the UK jumped by 5.6 per cent compared to the volume growth of the rest of the still wine category in that market which saw a 2.9% lift – meaning that New Zealand enjoyed just short of double the volume growth of other countries within the UK market.

Currently, the UK represents 25 per cent of New Zealand wine exports, and generates half a billion pounds worth in retail sales.

Some of this growth can be attributed to the free trade agreement signed in May 2023 between the UK and New Zealand, which Wines of New Zealand said had "removed technical barriers to trade".

The rate of sale for New Zealand Sauvignon Blanc in particular was "almost three times greater" in the last 12 months than the rate of sale for Sauvignon Blancs from other nations such as Chile and South Africa, combatting concerns over these countries in particular grabbing a bigger slice of the pie following New Zealand's significant wine shortage in 2021.

* One country still with a lot to do when it comes to wine exports is Greece. In the ancient world, Greece was once one of the foremost producers of wine. However, in contrast to the country's important wine heritage, modern Greek wines are only recently reaching the rest of the world.

The revitalisation of the industry is supported by modern wine-making techniques and a generation of motivated, quality-focused producers.

The portfolio of 21st-Century Greek wine includes everything from fresh, citrus-scented whites and sparkling rosé to lusciously sweet reds.

All of which is setting the scene for a wine-tasting in Beverley this month, organised by Roberts & Speight.

The date for your diary is Thursday March 21 and the venue Beverley Cricket Club, when Effe Kaillinikidou, a wine maker and export manager for Lyrarkis winery in Greece, will be the guest.

Effie has participated in tasting panels for food and beverage magazines and written several articles for wine at Food and Beverages Magazines in Greece and has worked as tutor to restaurant staff conducting wine seminars and to consumers at Wine Clubs in Athens, while she was the Chief Oenologist in wineries at Cephalonia, Peloponnese, and Santorini in the beginning of her career.

She has been engaged in the promotion of Greek wines in Export Markets since 2000 and is currently the Exports Manager at Lyrarakis Winery.

In total, five whites, three reds and a rose will be tasted at the event, with a few tasty tapas to compliment things. Tickets cost £25 with more information at www.robertsandspeight.co.uk. Alternatively, call 01482 870717 to book.



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Motoring - with Roy Woodcock



Vauxhall continues to top the sales charts for smaller family cars and is also pushing ahead with its electric offering. Roy Woodcock gets to grips with the new Vauxhall Astra GSe sub-brand

auxhall says it will be an electric-only brand by 2028, seven years ahead of the UK Government deadline, and will this year deliver a promise of offering a fully electric version of every model in its range.

One of the building blocks was the introduction of an extended line-up for its popular Astra model last year -both all-new electra Astra and Astra Sports Tourer as well as a new GSe range - the latter a new plug-in hybrid performance sub-brand.

I was able to put the GSe hatch through its paces at a special event for northern motoring journalists based at Wetherby Racecourse (we were on local roads, not the track!) and came away mightily impressed.

GSe stands for Grand Sport Electric and integrates electric performance credentials with sharp handling and styling. The car features unique styling upgrades, inside and out, and comes with uprated electrified drive trains and improved handling, thanks to suspension and steering upgrades.

Both Astra GSe and the Astra Sports Tourer GSe feature styling upgrades to help them stand out on the road. A 10mm lower profile thanks to revised suspension and damping and 18-inch "Commodore" wheels give the vehicles a distinct stance, while a black roof and black Griffin logos are also featured.

Inside, Alcantara-trimmed performance front seats and a GSe-specific leather steering wheel are included as part of the upgrades.

Both Astra GSe and Astra Sports Tourer GSe come with upgraded performance from the Plug-in Hybrid powertrain seen on the conventional model range. Both models are powered by a 180PS 1.6-litre four cylinder petrol engine, connected to an 81.2kW (110PS) electric motor for a total power output of 225PS and maximum torque of 360Nm.

Featuring a 12.4kWh battery, Vauxhall claims cars achieve up to 40 miles of electric range, while Astra Sports Tourers achieve 39 miles between charges; in practice a full charge disappears quicker than that (no shock there, then!). But with emissions as low as 25g/km CO2 and 26g/km CO2, the Astra GSe and Astra Sports Tourer GSe models are eligible for a Benefit-in-Kind rate of just 8 per cent and 12 per cent, respectively, which could tempt some user-choosers to take the plunge.

The car felt decidedly sporty out on the road, 0 - 62mph in around seven seconds, and the steering has been recalibrated to deliver a response that is nine per cent faster while the electronic stability control has been set to engage slightly later. The car's handling feels assured and compared to the given performance times it did feel a tad faster.

The Astra GSe only comes in one specification, with the only options being a faster on-board charger, which can reduce charging times to under two hours, compared to the standard fitment. It will cost you an additional £500 on top of the £43,250 on the road price.

Standard equipment includes 18-inch alloy wheels, a head-up display, heated front seats and steering wheel, keyless entry and start, dual-zone climate control, a gesture-controlled electric tailgate on Sports Tourers, adaptive auto lights and wipers, adaptive cruise control with lane position assist, sat nav, front and rear parking sensors, a surround view camera, blind spot monitoring and rear cross traffic alert.

All of which makes the initially steep-looking price significantly more palatable.

Decent levels of space make this a more than suitable family car although for taller passengers the rear seating space might make you feel a little compromised in terms of leg-room. And, as is typical; for a plug-in hybrid, overall boot space is down compared to the petrol and diesel versions of the Astra.

It's still decent, though - 352 litres of boot space with the rear seats up and 1,368 litres with them folded, compared to 422 litres and 1,389 litres respectively, But if that's perceived as a deal-breaker, the attractive looking Sports Tourer could well be the option to go for.

The Astra has long been one of our best-selling cars, and for good reason. These new models will only see that situation continue for a good few years yet.



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pring is on the horizon and we should soon be enjoying some beautiful spring bulb displays of daffodils if they haven't sprung already. The improving weather is the first sign that we will be able to sit out and enjoy our gardens once again. At Coletta & Tyson we always find March one of the most exciting months of the gardening season as we can start planning garden projects and making our garden look stunning again. Whether that is re-painting a fence or planting bedding plants ready for our hanging baskets in the summer.

Whenever you visit us you'll find a healthy stock of bedding plants, bulbs and everything you'll ever want to start making your garden perfect this year. There is a myriad of tasks to undertake in the garden to spruce it up ready for summer. Simple pruning is a good task to do in March and tidy everything up a little, filling borders where you may now have gaps after winter or even choosing a large specimen plant for a focal feature.

Before choosing any plants it's always a good idea to assess the plot and look at a range of conditions:

- Sunlight
- Temperature
- Exposure to wind
- Soil type

For example, if the plot is in shade for most of the day and the soil tends to be moisture retentive a variety of Ferns may be best.

Similarly, if the plot gets a lot of sun and the soil dries out quickly you should consider a drought tolerant plant like Lavender or Hebe.



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Sunlight

The overall amount of light your entire garden receives depends on the direction it faces. A North-facing garden will get the least light and can be damp whereas Southfacing gardens will receive the most light. An East-facing garden will receive the most light in the morning and a West-facing garden will get afternoon and evening light.

Shade loving plants will thrive in a North-facing garden. Ferns do great in moist and shady areas but you've also got a great choice for colours. Consider Vinca (Periwinkle) as ground-cover; this evergreen plant is hardy and has beautiful purple-blue flowers. For height, Mahonia is an excellent choice and has year round interest. It is a hardy evergreen shrub with attractive spiky leaves and yellow flowers in winter. Camellias also thrive in shade and are frost hardy meaning they will need little protection in the winter months. They also have beautiful spring flowers and can be grown in a container of ericaceous compost to brighten a patio.

For South-facing gardens prone to a lot of light it's best to pick sun-loving plants. Helianthemum (Rock Rose) is ideal for a gravel garden or a dry stone wall, ideal for summer colour.

A bulb ideal for sunny positions is Allium, or the Ornamental Onion. This unique looking plant with star-like flowers is frost hardy and dries well for floral arrangements. The foliage is a silvery grey and looks beautiful in a border or container.

10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Plant shallots, onion sets and early potatoes.
- 2. Protect new spring shoots from slugs.
- 3. Plant summer-flowering bulbs.
- 4. Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials.
- 5. Top dress containers with fresh compost.
- 6. Mow the lawn on dry days (if needed).
- 7. Buy young bedding plants for the greenhouse.
- 8. Weeds come back in to growth deal with them before they get out of hand.
- 9. Start feeding fish and using the pond fountain; remove pond heaters.
- 10. Open the greenhouse or conservatory doors and vents on warm days.





Temperature

In the North East of England we are prone to cold, wet and windy weather. This January we saw heavy snow, frost and very low temperatures meaning our gardens got a bit of a battering. Town gardens tend to be warmer than rural ones because of the shelter provided by buildings, however check your garden for potential frost pockets caused by cold air becoming trapped by the house or hedge.

When taking a look at your plot you should consider where the most sheltered points are in your garden or if you can improve them (hedging is an ideal windbreaker).

Choose your plants based on the minimum temperatures they can survive;

Hardy: - Can survive to -15° C. They can stay in the ground all year and survive.

Frost Hardy: - Can survive to −5°C but will need protecting during particular cold winters.

Half Hardy: - Can survive to 0°C will require winter protection

Tender: - Protect below 4°C and they cannot survive outside during winter so will need to be brought inside.



Wind

Long term, winds can deform plants – (think of sideways growing trees in coastal areas) - and sudden gales can snap branches and stems. Colder winds can scorch your plants but there are ways you can protect your garden from winds.

- Use canes to support plants.
- Surround the garden in a 'shelterbelt' by adding hedging or 'open' fence.

These shelterbelts work because they are porous and will slow the wind down. Attempting to block the wind with a wall will force the wind up and over, creating vortices that will still damage your plants.

Coniferous plants like Thuja and Leylandii are the perfect wind protection as the thick and dense foliage can act like a wall without the damage.

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Soil Type

By digging deep into your plot you will be able to find what's beneath the top, looser soil. This subsoil can cause problems for your plants if not improved. Heavy, clay soils can retain moisture and become water logger in winter. Sandy or chalky soils can become dry in the summer causing dehydration.

Well rotted organic manure or products like Gro Sure Farmyard Manure can help improve most soil types and improve quality and drainage.

To work out what kind of soil is in your garden you will need to get your hands dirty. Get a handful and feel it. Clay soils feel slimy and sticky, and can retain its shape when moulded. Sandy or gravely soils feel gritty and will crumble apart. Peaty soils feel spongy and loam and slit soils feel smooth.

All soils can be improved with organic matter, as well as by digging in multi purpose compost or horticultural grit (which will improve drainage in clay soils).
