Indian Head Massage

ts proper name is Indian Champissage but is more commonly known as Indian Head Massage and is based on the ancient healing system of Ayurveda, which has been practiced for over one thousand years. Massage has long been an integral part of everyday life in India.

According to Ayurvedic custom, a weekly massage is recommended for men and women to maintain a healthy balance of doshas (three vital energies or forces) and promote soft skin and strong shiny hair. Before a wedding, the bride and groom are massaged with special oils to promote health, beauty and fertility. Women are massaged to help them cope with the physical and emotional strain of labour and for forty days after the birth, new mothers and their babies receive a daily recuperative massage.




A few names I recall from 50 years ago.



National Trust Meeting learns of 'Doctor Lee and his Houses'

octor Charles Alfred Lee began his practice at 1 Pryme Street in 1848. Mr Kerr showed slides of its imposing front door with brass plaque, entrance hall, and dispensary. Doctor Lee (born 1825) died in 1912 a bachelor, and left money in his will to build houses to provide accommodation for retired people of reduced circumstances. A Board of eight Trustees was set up to carry out his wishes. A site of six and a half acres on the corner of Pickering Road and Anlaby Road was chosen. A competition for the design was held, won by Hare of Nottingham. By September 1915 the houses were complete and the first residents moved in. The visitor's book at that time was signed by James Reckitt, and other well known names appearing over the years TR Ferens, Wilfred Pickles and Brian Rix. The houses consist of 120 flats, four being taken up for administration leaving 116 to let. They take the form of a rectangle surrounding a very pleasant garden, entered through an imposing archway. The circular porthole windows distinguish the houses from the Trinity Homes close by. There were 1500 applications in the first two years for the flats. Mr Kerr assisted by his projectionist Donald Simpson showed us the slides of the interiors of the flats, the garden with its dovecote lawn and willows. The dovecote no longer contains doves being sealed up, but pigeons still get in! A central community Hall (The Library Hall), provides a social centre with newspapers and books. There is a Museum containing some of Doctor Lee's possessions, the brass plaque from his practice in Pryme Street, a coal scuttle, bird cage, his personal drawings and writings, a very large pipe, and many photographs. The houses had a resident nurse, who's title was changed in the 1990's to welfare worker. In 1897 Doctor Lee had a house built for the Newland Orphan's Homes, and the old Royal Infirmary had a Lee Ward. On his birthday flowers are laid at the statue of charity in the grounds.





Distance 5.0 Miles.







On reaching a gate pass through the gate into a field crossing this field to a second gate which pass through and then follow a well defined track eventually turning right and then left to follow the field boundaries to reach Risby road.

Cross the road and walk down the side of Fishpond Wood but keeping outside the wood. Follow this round and cross a ditch then walk along a well defined track climbing gently to meet the Bentley to Walkington road. Turn left on reaching the road and then left again through large gates and follow the track eventually keeping the hedge and woods on the left.

After crossing a stile at Silver Fir plantation, follow the track on the left and keep the hedge on your left to reach the road a short distance to the south of Risby Park Farm. Turn left and follow this track/road to reach a gate and emerge onto the Little Weighton/Bentley road.

Turn left on reaching the road and after about 500 metres locate a stile/opening on the right, pass through the hedge and follow the path with the hedge on your right. At the top of the field, turn left and then after about 200 metres cross a stile on the right and follow the path to reach the Skidby/Little Weighton road on a bend. On reaching the road turn left and then immediately left again and walk on a path with fields to the left and houses to the right. Continue on this path to Church Rise, turn right and then turn left at the Village Hall and walk up the main street to the starting point.

ivide clumps of herbaceous perennials that you want to propagate, those that have outgrown their allotted space, and those that are flowering poorly or have lost their shape. Cutting back clumps of spring-flowering perennials such as Pulmonaria and Doronicum can encourage a fresh flush of foliage, which is more attractive than old, mildew-covered stems.

The plants will also remain more compact and flower better next year.

Divide Primula (primroses) after flowering, planting them in a nursery bed until they are ready for planting out again in the autumn, for a display the following spring.

Divide hostas as they come into growth.

Apply a liquid fertiliser to spring bulbs after they have flowered, to encourage good flowering next year, and help prevent daffodil blindness.

Allow the foliage of daffodils and other spring-flowering bulbs to die down naturally rather than tying in knots. Only remove it or mow it once it has turned brown and floppy.

Lift and divide over crowded clumps of daffodils after they have flowered.

Lift clumps of forget-me-not once the display wanes, and before too many seeds are released. They can become invasive if left unchecked.

Put supports in place for herbaceous plants before they are too tall, or for those - like peonies - that produce heavy blooms. Adding rigid supports afterwards usually looks unattractive and results in bunched stems lacking sufficient ventilation. Criss-crossing strings from hidden or decorative posts work well, allowing stems to grow up in the gaps between strings.

Harden off plants raised from seed and cuttings by leaving them outside for gradually increasing periods of time. Start with only the warmest part of the day, and build up to overnight exposure. Doing this for 10-14 days before planting them outdoors permanently (whenever the risk of frost has passed), will reduce any check to their growth while establishing in their final position.

Plant out cannas and dahlias when danger of frost is past.

Thin out direct sowings of hardy annuals. This is best done in two or three stages at fortnightly intervals. Final spacing should be between 10-20cm (4-8in), using the upper limit for tall or spreading plants, and the lower limit for smaller plants. Prick out indoor sowings when they are large enough to handle without damage.

Sweet peas need training and tying in to their supports to encourage them to climb and make a good display.

Pinch out the leading shoots on plants such as Chrysanthemum and Helianthus to encourage bushy plants. However, if tall thin sprays are preferred, they can be left un-pinched, perhaps removing a few buds (known as 'disbudding') to encourage larger blooms.

Liquid feed plants in containers every two to four weeks.



Microsoft has been busy launching service packs for Windows. Last month I mentioned Service Pack 1 for Vista, and having installed this several times now, it does seem to provide a slight performance gain.

Now XP sees the final release - Service Pack 3. Both these will both be available through the normal update procedure soon, which will be the safest method as there have been some compatibility issues with other software.

Windows XP is now due to be discontinued (for sale) by Microsoft on June 30th. Public pressure originally forced this to be delayed from January of this year. Interestingly, Microsoft has made a concession in permitting XP to continue until 2009 for 'ultra low-cost PCs, like the EEPC mini-laptop (also known as sub-notebooks); so general support is likely to continue until then. For those interested, we can still supply machines, both PC and laptop with XP installed.

If all that is not confusing enough, Windows 7 is the name of the next incarnation of the operating system, which will follow on in 2009. This will apparently include support for touch screens and ultra-mobility. Judging by the huge growth in laptop sales, this will certainly be the way forward.

Finally, we are still finding that some computer manufacturers are selling computers sadly lacking in memory (RAM). This can result in frustration for the user when their new PC is very slow. This is particularly true for those running Vista. We would recommend an absolute minimum of 1Gb of RAM for any

Vista machine, preferably more. For XP, 512Mb would be a reasonable amount, with 1Gb for the more advanced user. RAM is the best and most cost effective upgrade for any computer.

Property News from Martin English of **Homelink Estates**



7elcome to my first property news column for Cottingham Times. Property prices are a very topical issue for homeowners and those people that are struggling to get onto the property ladder. It has been well documented in the news lately that property sales have slowed nationally, largely due to various economic factors that our country is currently facing.

Despite a slow market the fact still remains and always will do, that people through circumstance, if nothing else, still need to move regardless of the current climate for reasons such as job relocation, illness, growing family sizes and a requirement to get on the property ladder. So there are buyers out there; however, in a slower market if you have your property already on the market or you are thinking about putting it on the market, its more important than ever that your property is presented in the best possible light to attract these would be buyers.

I would strongly recommend that you ask for your agents opinion on how your property is presented; a good agent should be able to give you an honest assessment of your property and advise you of the most cost effective ways to present your home.

The old saying of 'first impressions count' is also very true of your property; I have put together some tips to help ensure that the first impression of your property is a good one.

- Stand across the road from your property, ask yourself how does it compare with other properties in the street, does it let the side down? Are there any repairs that need to be done, such as replacing slipped tiles or slates? Make sure your home looks inviting and that it has 'kerb appeal'.
- If you have a front garden, it should be kept tidy no matter what the time of year, Hedges should be trimmed, plants kept tidy and lawns kept immaculate. Any dead leaves or rubbish should be removed.
- * If you have a front gate and fence paint it, if the brickwork to your wall is loose or needs pointing, have this repaired as signs of neglect from the outside will make buyers suspicious of the inside.
- * Make sure that any mould or moss is removed from the path. Slippery paths can be dangerous and the last thing you want is someone falling over and a court case for damages.
- * Clean windows can make all the difference especially on sunny days, and window frames repainted, if necessary. Peeling paint is unsightly.
- * Clean your porch as your visitors who are waiting for you to open the door, may look upwards; the sight of clouds of cobwebs and their builders does not create a favourable impression. Also make sure that light fittings are working and clean.
- Are your next-door neighbours as clean and tidy as you, or does their property have broken down cars in the front garden and an air of neglect? This is the time for some polite and friendly negotiation. If they are unwilling to cooperate, offer to pay for any minor repairs and repainting to areas that are really unsightly. It will make a difference to how your property is rated.
- The next thing to consider is what greets visitors as the front door opens. This is their first look at the property and what they see, hear and smell will colour their opinions for good, so it has to be really special. Stand on your front door step and ring the bell (make sure there is someone else home!). As the door opens what are your first impressions? - * Communal areas, such as the hall, stairs and landings in a block of flats, can be a real problem. Make sure everyone knows that you are selling and gently remind them to collect their post and help keep the front garden tidy. Make sure all the light bulbs are working and that there are fresh flowers or a leafy plant in the hall

In the Kitchen

Ingredient of the Month

Ginger

inger is the common name given to the underground stem (rhizome) of the perennial plant Zingiber officinale Roscoe. It is chemically classified as an essential oil with pungent principles, and has been in use as a flavoring agent worldwide for over 20 centuries, as well as for medicinal purposes as an anti-emetic (prevents vomiting in circumstances such as car sickness), anti-inflammatory, analgesic and other properties relating to the well-being of the body.

Usually grown in warmer climates, ginger is often referred to by its country of origin e.g. Jamaican ginger, African ginger, and Cochin ginger (Chinese) and although no-one really knows exactly where it originated from, it has always been a prized commodity: in the middle ages a pound of it had the same value as a whole sheep!

Today it is widely available from food stores and grocers and is a popular ingredient for culinary purposes, especially in oriental cooking. It can be purchased fresh, dried, powdered, crystallized, preserved in syrup (also known as stem or candied ginger) and even ready-grated in jars.

Gingerbread - Makes 1 x 18cm/7 inch square cake

Ingredients:

225g/8oz Plain Flour 1 teasp Bicarbonate of Soda 1 1/2 teasp Ground Ginger 50g/2oz Black Treacle 100g/4oz Golden Syrup 75g/3oz Margarine 50g/2oz Soft Brown Sugar 2 Eggs

Instructions

2 tbsp Milk

1. Preheat the oven to 170C, 325F, Gas mark 3 and grease an 18cm/7inch square tin and line the base with greaseproof paper. Sift flour, Bicarbonate of soda and ginger into bowl.

- 2. Place the treacle and golden syrup in a saucepan with the margarine and brown sugar and gently heat until melted. In a bowl, beat together eggs and milk.
- 3. Pour melted ingredients, then beaten eggs into the bowl containing the flour and mix to thick batter, then pour into the lined tin. Bake in centre of oven for 1 hour.

Cidered Chicken 45mins

Ingredients

4 Chicken Quarters

2 tbsp Olive Oil

25g/1oz Butter

1 Onion, chopped

1 tbsp Plain Flour

fi teasp ground Ginger

1 teasp Paprika

450ml/15fl.oz. Cider

1 tbsp Tomato Purée

1/4 teasp Sugar

1 tbsp freshly Chopped Parsley

Salt and Black Pepper

Instructions

- 1. Heat the butter and olive oil in a large frying pan until very hot. Add the chicken pieces and brown on all sides. Remove with a slotted spoon and set aside.
- 2. Add the onion to the pan and fry until soft and golden. Sprinkle in the flour, ginger, and paprika and cook for 1-2 minutes, stirring.
- 3. Add the cider a little at a time, mixing well between each addition and cook for 1-2 minutes to make a sauce. Then stir in the tomato purée, sugar and parsley. Season with Salt and pepper.
- 4. Return the chicken to the pan and baste with the sauce. Cover and simmer for 30 minutes, basting occasionally. Alternatively, cook in the oven at 180C, 350F, Gas Mark 4 for 30 minutes. Serve hot.





Cottingham Parish Council

Local Police Report

PCSOs Scott Foster and Lindsey Sewell attended the Parish Council Meeting and informed the council that the crime statistics were similar to last month. There had been an increase in shed and garage burglaries. The police are asking residents to make sure that everything is locked up securely especially in the lighter nights.

The police also reported that an additional police constable PC Neil Chambers is joining the LPT in Cottingham very soon and a new PCSO should be starting within the next three weeks so the LPT will be up to full strength.

Financial Committee Report

A S137 grant application has been received from the Cottingham Bowls Club to assist them in purchasing a new photocopier. It was agreed the council should incur the following expenditure and an award of £200 was made available.

Report from the Allotments

At its AGM the Northgate Allotments Association voted against increasing their level of responsibility for the management of the allotment site under the rules of devolvement. The Parish Council had offered to increase the level of responsibility from level 3 to level 2.

Under the current level (3), ownership and management of the allotments remains with the Parish Council. The Allotments Association have two elected representatives who are voting members of the Parish Council Allotments Committee and act as a liaison between the two organisations. Under this level the Allotments Association is able to apply for funding from outside agencies which may not be available to the Parish Council.

If the Association had voted to accept level 2 responsibility it would have given them responsibility for collecting rents; deciding on capital and revenue expenditure, letting of plots, tenants' contracts and application of the termination policy. The ownership of the land would have remained with the Parish Council.

The Drainage Committee

The Parish Council Drainage Committee has met with representatives from the East Riding of Yorkshire Council, the Environment Agency and Yorkshire Water in a bid to aid the effort to prevent further flooding in Cottingham. Another meeting is scheduled to take place early in May to see what progress has been made. Councillors have also met with Nigel Leighton, Director of Infrastructure and Facilities at ERYS to discuss the East Riding Council's responsibilities.

Cottingham Day

The Council are looking forward to the third annual Cottingham Day which this year takes place on Saturday 5 July 2008. The council have amended the Cottingham Day Licence to include the whole of the Market Green on behalf of the Parish Council. There will be no fun fair on the Green this year but in place KCFM are hosting a stage with many fun things happening throughout the day. This year there will be a display of street car vehicles as well as a repeat of last years classic cars down Hallgate.

Hallgate again will be closed on the day from King Street to George Street making it a pedestrianised area. There will be many events happening throughout various venues around the village.

An Open Day was held at the Civic Hall on Saturday 3 May which gave the opportunity for the people of Cottingham to have their say and influence the future of their community.

Topics involved were Sport Recreation and Leisure, Youth, Culture Heritage and the Built Environment, Community Wellbeing, Traffic and Transportation, The Natural Environment, Business and the Local Economy and Sustainability. The finished document will be sent to all agencies, eg. ERYC, Primary Care Trust, Local Policing Team, etc., to feed into their forward planning presentations.

Local Grandfather in Desperate Plea to Help Save Grandson's Sight

ur grandson Joshua is almost eight years old. He has a rare form of eye cancer known as Retinoblastoma. This is a cancer that develops in young children when the retina is growing. Often the only way to ensure the cancer doesn't spread is to remove the eve.

Joshua was diagnosed when he was 15 months old. After two courses of chemotherapy and numerous other treatments he lost his right eye when he was three and a half years old - he now wears a prosthetic eye.

Hower Joshua also has tumours in his left eye. He has had to undergo radiotherapy and two further courses of chemotherapy to stop a resistant tumour within that eve.

The only remaining treatment available in this country would be to remove Joshua's left eye to save his life.

Joshua's story has in the last eight years been well publisesed in the national press, local TV stations, GMTV and even on the Discovery Channel. He has also advertised for Childhood Eye Cancer Trust.

I am Joshua's grandad and I, along with my wife Lorraine, have helped to support him and my son, daughter-in-law and his elder sister Alice.

We have watched with dismay over the last six and a half years the slow, creeping effects of his cancer. The misery of him losing one eve and the invasion of the other.

The latest and maybe the last throw of the dice to save his sight, started on the 23rd March this year. The N.H.S. Cancer Hospital in Birmingham has arranged to fund a new treatment, unavailable in this country and he started this new treatment in the USA at the Sloane Kettering Hospital in Manhattan, New York.

The problem Joshua's family have is the cost of flights to and from America, hotel and living expenses and loss of earnings.

Claim Back Wages from the

Then your employees become parents they may take some maternity, paternity or adoption leave. If they earn more than the NI threshold (£87 per week for 2007/08) and have worked for you for at least 6 months, you will also be required to pay them at the statutory rate during most of that leave period. These statutory wages (SMP, SPP or SAP) must be paid at a flat weekly rate of £112.75 for 2007/08, although SMP is paid at 90% of a woman's average wage for the first six weeks of the leave period.

All this statutory pay for absent employees can leave you out of pocket, so the good news is you can claim it back from the Taxman. First you need to check whether the Taxman classes you as a 'small' employer or not. Small employers get 100% of the statutory (babyrelated) pay back, plus a 4.5% bonus, other employees can only claim back 92% of the statutory pay.

The test of being 'small' depends on how much NIC you were due to pay for the previous tax year. If this was £45,000 or less you qualify as a 'small' employer. Dig out a copy of the form P35 you submitted last year for 2006/07 and check the figures of NI reported on that form, to see if you are under or over the £45,000 threshold. Look at the total NI collected before deducting any amounts used to fund any statutory payments.

You should technically reclaim the statutory pay as you pay it out each month during the tax year. The Taxman wants you to hold back the statutory pay plus the 4.5% compensation, from the other payroll deductions you make each pay period. If you forgot to do that, all is not lost as you can complete a form SP32 to reclaim all the statutory pay paid out over the last few tax years. We can help you with that.

National Minimum Wage for Family Members

Every worker aged 16 or over is entitled to be paid at least the national minimum wage (NMW), although the hourly rates vary according to the person's age.

Members of the family who still live at home and work for an unincorporated business are exempt from the NMW, as are non-relatives that live and work within the home. However, if the business operates as a company this exemption does not apply, and all employees of the company must receive the NMW appropriate to their age.

There is an exemption for the directors or company secretary of a family company who do not have an explicit employment contract with that company. So if you work for your company mainly in your position as a director, you do not have to pay yourself the NMW for the hours you work. However, if you have a written employment contract with your own company you are technically a worker and an employee for the purposes of the NMW legislation, and you must pay yourself at least the NMW for all the hours you work under that contract. Therefore, if you adopt a strategy of low salary around the level of the personal allowance (£5435 for 2008/09) and high dividend to minimise NI costs, whilst still working full time, you should ensure you do not have an explicit employment contract.
