Supply and Demand in the Rental Market

he rental market as it stands today can be argued that it is as buoyant as it has ever been. Northgate Allotments

To help alleviate the ongoing problem of rabbits, the Allotments Association plan to erect a wire mesh screen to a height of approx 1 metre fixed to the security fence at the north end of the site.

There is an ever growing waiting list for plots on the Northgate site fuelled by popular television programmes and the current trend for 'growing your own'. Keeping an allotment combines exercise with healthy eating and is becoming more and more popular with the younger generation rather than the traditional older, retired gentlemen!

From now on the Parish Council have agreed that only residents of the parish of Cottingham will be eligible for a plot on the Northgate Allotment site and applications from anyone living outside the parish boundary will not be accepted. If you live outside the parish, therefore, you should contact your own Parish Council. If you already have a plot or are already on the waiting list then this decision will not affect you.

Yorkshire in Bloom

The spring judging took place on Wednesday 8 April; luckily for us the weather was kind - bright and sunny if chilly. The judges seemed very impressed and it was hard to fit everything they wanted to look at into their allotted time. The date for their summer visit has yet to be agreed but keep an eye out for it in a future edition. Your ongoing efforts to keep the village clean and tidy are always helpful.

Jesmond Road – housing development

Councillors were disappointed that planning permission had been given for the erection of five detached dwellings on Jesmond Road although it did appear that stringent conditions had been attached to the permission to deal with residents and Councillors' fears of possible drainage problems.

Tubs & Basket Bonanza

As some residents are still struggling to re-establish their gardens to their former glory following the floods of 2007 the Council decided to postpone the annual garden competition for another year. Replacing this the Parish Council thought that a competition involving tubs and baskets rather than full

gardens would be ideal. This allows not only private residents to get involved, but shops, public houses, and anyone with even the smallest yard or garden to enter. So get planting!

Tubs and baskets can be of any size and categories will be split between 1-3 tubs/baskets and over 3 tubs/baskets. Judging will take place some time in July (depending on weather!) – actual date to be decided nearer the time. Applications forms can be obtained from the Parish Council office.

Southwood Garden Shop

The Council had been asked for its support in the Southwood Garden Shop's quest to obtain permission from the East Riding of Yorkshire Council for a brown tourist sign to be placed at the roundabout on Southwood Road. The Council was happy to support this request.

Hallgate Junior School

The Council has been inundated with comments from residents regarding their disappointment of the Hallgate Junior School building not becoming a community facility. Cottingham Parish Council made its feelings very clear to ERYC in support of its acquisition as a local amenity and had no part in the final decision.

Trees

The Parish Council is concerned about the rising number of requests for felling trees in the village. As a result Councillors are stating on each application reply that they do not wish healthy trees to be felled but, if after consultation with a Tree Officer, it is necessary, then a mature replacement tree should be planted.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting will take place at 7pm on Thursday 21 May 2009 at the Methodist Church Hall, Hallgate, Cottingham. All residents of Cottingham are invited to attend. This will be followed by the AGM of the Cottingham Parish Council.

To add yet more houses into the current system could spell disaster - I hope I am proved wrong. Thave just returned from my favourite spot - the Canadian Rockies; there is a real treat awaiting our group in July! Having seen the mountains covered in their winter coat I cannot wait to see the summer views in the next few months. Unique folded mountain shapes await along the continental divide not to mention the wildlife. The first bear was spotted in Banff on 27th March this year; I have to admit we did not see one this visit although we saw Elk in abundance around the town of Jasper.

Following a pick up from home and a direct flight to Calgary, 3 nights at the Calgary Stampede starts our summer adventure with inclusive tickets for the Rodeo, Chuckwagon racing and the evening spectacular show. Daily tickets for the C train allow you to come and go as you wish from our hotel; the station is just behind the hotel and a very frequent service operates. One stop north to Stampede Park, one stop south to the Chinook shopping Mall, the largest in Calgary. Your pass will also allow you to explore the city sights and if you need to relax the hotel has an indoor pool at your disposal.

Rise and shine, 7.30am we bid farewell to Calgary for the drive of your life along Highway 93. I guarantee a mind blowing experience for the next nine hours or so.... The scenery will be so stunning at each turn it will be hard to believe your eyes. Travelling through the Banff National Park, Lake Louise and on through Jasper National Park. More than 100 glaciers hang along the Icefields Parkway along with tumbling waterfalls and lakes it will take your breath away as we travel along the continental divide with its jagged folded mountains. The backdrop of mountains sheltering the blue icy glaciers; at its foot a crystal clear lake along with many waterfalls tumbling down the sheer cliffs. Today also includes a tour on the Glacier in a special vehicle allowing us access onto the ice. You are sure to feel dwarfed by the surroundings.

Arrival into Jasper will be the evening and the scenery will still be with you. Jasper is a quaint little town and our hotel is well located opposite the Railway Station. Try out the hot tubs to soak away the day with mountain views as the sun goes down. Tomorrow you have a full day to do as you wish: stroll or cycle around the town keeping an eye open for wildlife at all times. Pyramid & Patricia Lakes are good places to spot. I had my best steak in Jasper that I can ever remember! Karouso's has a varied menu, I chose a 10 oz prime rib cooked rare, I shall be eating here again. Anyone wishing to eat here, I am happy to make you a reservation in advance. Otherwise, if the weather is nice the upstairs patio at Earls is a great place for views and the food is fun too

The next part of the tour is MY summer adventure; the territory is unknown to me but I know that no one will return disappointed as we continue our journey by Dome train with a 180° panoramic viewing car to the Prince Rupert on the west coast, with time to explore this coastal town for a day before your full day scenic ferry journey to North Vancouver Island and coach touring, eventually arriving in Vancouver - my favourite city of the world! Here we bid farewell to some fellow travellers and hello to others as we head up to Alaska on our second leg

of the adventure: a seven day cruise.

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National Herb Week 6th - 9th May 2009

There isn't a chef alive who wouldn't agree that the use of herbs plays an important roll in cooking, from relatively mild parsley which you can use by the handful, to sage whose pungent aroma and taste ensures it's usually used sparingly.

Omelettes aux Fines Herbs Serves 4

Ingredients
8 Eggs
Salt and Pepper
1 tbsp Parsley, finely chopped
1 tbsp Chervil, finely chopped
1 tbsp Tarragon, finely chopped
1 tbsp Chives, finely chopped
50g/2oz Butter
4 teasp Olive Oil
Parsley to garnish

Instructions

- Preheat the oven to very low. In a bowl, whisk the eggs lightly. Add the herbs, salt and pepper and whisk in.
- 2. Heat a quarter of the butter and 1 teaspoon of olive oil into an omelet frying pan until it starts to sizzle. Pour in a quarter of the egg mixture. As it begins to set, draw in the mixture towards the centre with a spatula, allowing any remaining liquid egg to run to the sides of the pan.
- 3. When almost set, fold the sides over. Slide onto a warmed plate, cover loosely with foil and keep warm in the oven whilst you cook the last three omelets in the same way. Serve hot.

Origin & History of Asparagus

Asparagus is believed to have originated in the eastern Mediterranean area, however archaeologists have found traces of wild varieties in Africa and it is also thought to have been cultivated in ancient Egypt as evidenced by ancient Egyptian writings.

Asparagus gets its name from the ancient Greek 'aspharagos' which in turn originates from the Persian word 'asparag' meaning sprout, stalk or shoot. It was popular with the ancient Greeks who believed it to have both sacred and aphrodisiac powers and it is known that Hippocrates used it for medicinal purposes such as the treatment of diarrhoea and urinary problems.

They were popular with the Romans too who had written instructions on how to grow asparagus. So prized were these perennial shoots by the Romans that not only did they enjoy eating them in season but they were also the first to preserve it by freezing as early as the 1st Century AD when fast chariots would take the fresh asparagus from the Tiber River area to the Alps where it kept for six months until the Feast of Epicurus.

The Romans are responsible for having introduced asparagus to England, where it gradually gained favour with the nobles and by the early 16th century, it was widely served in many of the Royal courts of Europe.

Battersea in the 21st Century

By the 17th Century, asparagus was being commercially cultivated in England and, believe it or not, one of the prime location for its cultivation was in the village of Battersea just outside the city of London, where they were famously sold as "Battersea bundles". Asparagus was so popular that the area of cultivation was widened to include Fulham, Gravesend, Isleworth and Deptford just in order to supply London.

Asparagus was so popular that they even got a mention by Samuel Pepys, the diarist, who recorded that he bought a bundle of "sparrow grass" in Fenchurch Street for 1s.6p.



By the 19th Century London was becoming so built up that new asparagus fields were established in The Vale of Evesham, Worcestershire, which is still regarded as the home of asparagus today.

Asparagus Nutritional Values

Asparagus is a good source of folic acid (vitamin B9) and also contains potassium, copper and iron. It is also rich in vitamins A, B1, B2, B6 and C. The asparagus contains a sour agent, which noticeably renders the urine potent when digested. It also contains asparagine, which gives it its particular flavour and which has diuretic properties

Around seven spears (80g) provides one of your recommended 5-A-Day servings, 69% of the RDA of Folate, 20% of the RDA of Vitamin C and 12% of the RDA of Vitamin B1. It is also one of the richest sources of Rutin which together with vitamin C, can help to protect the body from infections as well as being rich in soluble fibre.

Cooking with Asparagus

Asparagus has to be cooked to get the best flavour and texture. To prepare them, if necessary, snap or cut off the bottom stalk to remove the tough fibrous part. Wash gently in cold running water.

Asparagus can be cooked in many ways, but over-cooking should be avoided: they should be tender but not too droopy.

Baked Asparagus with Almonds

Ingredients

2 Large Tomatoes, finely diced

20 Young Asparagus Spears

2 tbsp Mayonnaise

2 tbsp Olive Oil

2 teasp Wine Vinegar

Salt and Pepper

4 tbsp grated Parmesan Cheese

2 tbsp Flaked Almonds

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, Gas Mark 4 and place the asparagus and tomato in a shallow ovenproof dish.
- In a small bowl, whisk together the mayonnaise, olive oil, vinegar, salt and pepper.
- 3. Toss the dressing with asparagus and tomato, sprinkle the Parmesan and almonds over the top.
- 4. Lay a piece of aluminium foil over the top of the asparagus mixture and bake for 25-30 minutes, removing the foil for the last 10 minutes. Serve immediately.

Springboard Live Music Festival takes place on May 29th, 30th and 31st at six venues throughout Cottingham

The event which started just as single all-dayer in the King William IV Pub with just 19 acts in 2006, has now expanded to six venues (eight stages) with well over 200 acts for 2009. Up and coming singers, songwriters and bands, mostly from East Yorkshire, will play a wide variety of styles including, acoustic, rock, indie, blues, jazz, punk, electronic, folk, heavy metal.

Highlights for 2009 and certainly not to be missed are Hull ska/punk band 'Kill Youth Culture', featuring enigmatic front man Jim Sorrow.

Also featuring is nationally acclaimed singer songwriter Jeremy Warmsley who will take a break from a short European tour just to play the festival. Jeremy plays the new 'eskimosoup' stage (which is upstairs in the Duke Of Cumberland) on Saturday 30th May.

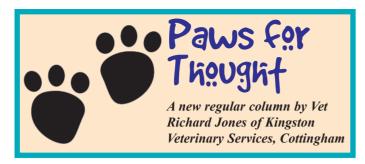

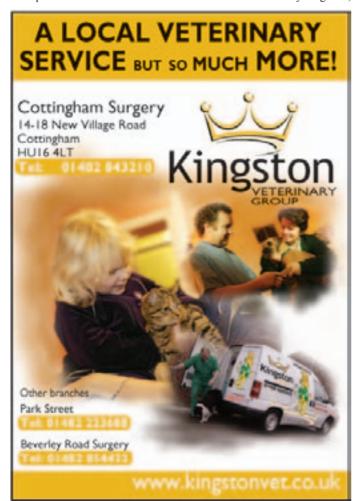


An inspector calls

ur mission statement at Kingston Veterinary Group is to provide a professional and caring service to our clients and their pets by investing in our staff, equipment and premises. Over the last 6 months at our park street surgery we have taken this to the extreme though as we have just finished a major refurbishment to bring the premises up to the standard of a veterinary hospital culminating in an inspection last week by the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons to see if we had reached our goal of becoming Hull's first private veteri-

Our goal was to improve our existing facilities, increase our hospitalisation wards as we were working at full capacity. We now have separate cat and dog wards with thirteen kennels for dogs including three walk in kennels for our larger friends and twenty cat pens in a peaceful area of the building. This is on top of our seven isolation kennels in a separate ward and reptile vivarium. The nursing staff is very pleased with how the extra room and separate wards helps the animals recover better from surgery and the night nursing staff has commented how the inpatients are a lot more relaxed. You may not be aware but we have nursing staff on all night working looking after the inpatients and helping the veterinary surgeons with emergencies. We are one of the few practices in Yorkshire with this level of care.

Our operating theatres have been full upgraded to include a separate orthopaedic theatre. We needed this as one of our veterinary surgeons,





Mr. Robinson's orthopaedic theatre).

Mr. David Robinson, has a keen interest orthopaedics. He performs all kinds of orthopaedic surgery including a complicated procedure known as tibia plateau levelling osteotomy(TPLO), used to treat large dogs with cruciate ligament damage. He is one of very few veterinary surgeons in Yorkshire who does this surgery. (pictured right,

An all too common sight in our waiting room at park street was large dogs at one end and all the pussy cats at the other as owners tried to keep their pets as relaxed as possible, so we now have a separate cat waiting room, where our feline friends can feel a bit more relaxed as if coming to the vets wasn't stressful enough!! Added to this we have a



separate bereavement room now where clients can spend time with their loved one before and after euthanasia without feeling rushed.

At times the building work was stressful for all concerned but we were very lucky in the fact that the builders were very accommodating, stopping when we needed quiet and working around us and also we are very fortunate in having staff that organised things well and would go beyond the call of duty to ensure things ran smooth-

As if all this building work wasn't enough as soon as it had

finished we had a Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons inspection. This entails a full audit of the practice. As well as making sure the premises and equipment are all up to standard, staff training is checked on, veterinary surgeons have to undertake at least 35 hours continuing professional development a year, all health and safety reports, full COSHH reports on all chemicals in the practice (over five hundred separately researched reports) and many other important bits of paper work!

At the end of an exhausting day trailing the inspector round we were given the great news that Park Street will be awarded VETERINARY HOSPITAL status. Our other two branches both surpassed their status levels as well so an all-round great day. As I said to all the staff however I could build the best surgery in the world and buy all the equipment easily but the most important element is having the dedicated staff to work with which I am very in lucky in having and this was echoed by the inspector. Needless to say the staff was elated after all their hard work.

I hope this also gives you an insight into all the work and investment that goes on in a veterinary surgery. I know people always say vets are



expensive, but in our case the vast majority of the fees are reinvested to keep our facilities, equipment and staff up to date for you and your

"The Tooth and Nothing but The Tooth" by Chris 'Dr. Smile Maker' Branfield Keeping your Kids Smiling for Life - Part One

elcome to the first article of 'The Tooth...'. Here I will be sharing with you some of my thoughts and Top 'Dr Smile Maker' Tips on how to keep your kids smiling for life. I hope that all parents, would be parents, grandparents and carers get something from it. We all want our children to grow up happy and in the best of health. It is not always easy and there is no definitive manual or recipe. I know, I have two kids Edward and Harriet aged 12 and 10. Well, here goes.

Diet. Most of us know that sugar is bad for teeth and causes decay. Now, that does not mean that kids should grow up in a sugar free zone and be denied it completely, kids should be kids, but everything in moderation. Your teeth can usually manage three meals and two snacks a day. Remember there will be hidden sugars in meals including natural and processed. A little bit of science - sort of. Each time that you have some sugar from whatever source bacteria in your mouth make acid from it and this causes tooth decay. Your saliva is there to protect and can neutralise this acid and help repair your teeth but it takes time. If you have another intake of sugar before your saliva has chance to finish the job then the decay process has the upper hand and irreversible damage is caused and decay takes a hold. Therefore it is not the amount of sugar necessarily that causes the decay but the frequency of sugar intake or how long the sugar hangs around for in the mouth.

Example: Several packets of polos eaten in 10 minutes are not as



bad for your teeth as one packet eaten steadily through the day. After 10 minutes your saliva gets to work in neutralising and repairing. If you do not have any other sugar intake for a few hours then it can finish its job. If you have one polo and then another before your saliva has a chance to get finished, then another, then another the decay process will win.

Top tips: If you must let your child have one sugary snack between meals that has to eaten in one go, e.g. A bar of something. Or have a sweetie treat straight after a meal as a reward for good behaviour during the day. The meal and the treat count as one intake so they can fill their boots within reason. I hope I am not hunted down as a heretic for having un-pure dental thoughts.

Sugary drinks in a bottle or beaker with a lid as a pacifier are a definite NO! The small sugar intakes over a prolonged time period do not give the teeth a chance. This gives rise to RAMPANT decay and is awful to see and terrible when a young child has to have a general anaesthetic for their teeth out. Milk and water are fine.

Dried fruit is sometimes the only way of getting fruit into our little beloveds as part of the well publicised 5 a day. However, be warned. This stuff gets stuck in teeth and stays there for ages. This releases concentrated natural sugars that cause decay. I know what you're thinking, '..you can't win'. I said it wasn't easy.

Top Tips: Brush really well after dried fruit. It is best not to have in the lunch box at school. You might think I'm mad but try early on to make raw vegetables a treat as a snack, carrots or celery are excellent for this. Cheese and nuts are good for teeth but obviously are a no-no with young children.

Are you still with me?

Fizzy drinks are acidic and cause dental erosion, i.e. they dissolve teeth. The diet ones are worse as extra acid is added. The non diet ones are full of sugar so all of the above applies to them as well. Other acidic drinks are fruit juices. Citrus are the worst e.g. grapefruit and orange. Your beautiful saliva will help repair the damage after acid attack. Again it needs time. If your teeth are brushed too soon after acid intake this rubs off the softened surface layer of tooth, never to return

Top tips: Have a low frequency of acidic drinks. Do not brush your teeth for an hour or more after an acidic drink. Rinse with water after the drink to dilute the acid. Milk is great.

Here is the one you've been waiting for. Visit your dentist to pick up problems and solve them early and for proper professional advice. We only get one crack at it so invest in your child's health as things have a habit of coming back to bite us. Pardon the pun.

I really hope this has been of help. There are loads more stuff to get through including more on prevention.

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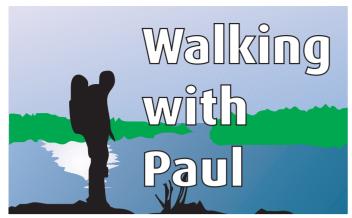

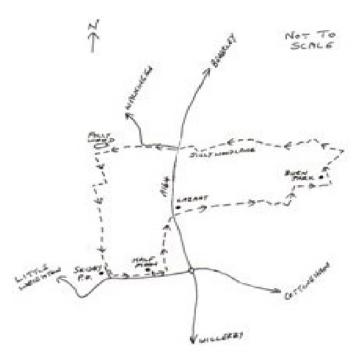

eave the car park and turn left and after a short distance, turn left and walk down the old road heading towards Beverley. Ignore the first waymarker on the right but continue ahead to meet the A164. Cross this road with care and bear right and then left at a waymarker and walk under the power lines with Lazaats Restaurant on the left. Continue ahead with the hedge on the left and the Golf course to the right. Sweep right at the end of the Golf Course and then left through bushes and then left on a wide track with a second Golf Course on the right.

After a short distance, locate a waymarker on the left and enter a field and walk with the hedge on the left. Sweep right at the top of the field and continue towards Burn Park Farm. Ignore the waymarkers directing across the paddock on the left but continue ahead to meet the

farm road. Turn left and walk through the farm then bear right and walk along the field with the hedge on the left.

After a short distance turn left and follow the waymarked footpath "Beaver Trail". Continue as the path twists and turns with a ditch on the right and eventually enters Jilly Wood. Continue on a tree lined path to meet the A164 road opposite the Walkington road. Cross the A164 with care and walk along the Walkington road and, at the sharp right hand bend continue straight ahead along Dunflat Road. On reaching Folly Wood, turn left and walk along a wide track and follow this track/path to emerge at Skidby on Church Lane. After passing the Village Hall, turn left and follow the main street back to the Half Moon.

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In the Garden



The Flower garden

Divide clumps of herbaceous perennials that you want to propagate, those that have outgrown their allotted space, and those that are flowering poorly or have lost their shape. Bamboos and clumps of bulbs or rhizomes can be divided in the same way. Just make sure that the transplanted divisions have roots, shoots, and are given adequate water to settle into their new positions.

Cutting back clumps of spring-flowering perennials such as Pulmonaria and Doronicum can encourage a fresh flush of foliage, which is more attractive than old, mildew-covered stems. The plants will also remain more compact and flower better next year.

Divide Primula (primroses) after flowering, planting them in a nursery bed until they are ready for planting out again in the autumn, for a display the following spring.

Divide hostas as they come into growth.

Spreading and trailing plants such as the annual Lobularia (sweet alyssum), and the perennials Alyssum and Aubrieta, can become tatty and patchy. Trimming them back after flowering encourages fresh growth and new flowers.

Deadhead tulips and daffodils. Apply a liquid fertiliser to spring bulbs after they have flowered, to encourage good flowering next year, and help prevent daffodil blindness. Allow the foliage of daffodils and other spring-flowering bulbs to die down naturally rather than tying in knots. Only remove it or mow it once it has turned brown and floppy.

Lift clumps of forget-me-not once the display wanes, and before too many seeds are released. They can become invasive if left unchecked.

Put supports in place for herbaceous plants before they are too tall, or for those - like peonies - that produce heavy blooms. Adding rigid supports afterwards usually looks unattractive and results in bunched stems lacking sufficient ventilation. Criss-crossing strings from hidden or decorative posts work well, allowing stems to grow up in the gaps between strings.

Harden off plants raised from seed and cuttings by leaving them outside for gradually increasing periods of time. Start with only the warmest part of the day, and build up to overnight exposure. Doing this for 10-14 days before planting



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them outdoors permanently (whenever the risk of frost has passed), will reduce any check to their growth while establishing in their final position.

Plant out cannas and dahlias when danger of frost is past.

Thin out direct sowings of hardy annuals. This is best done in two or three stages at fortnightly intervals. Final spacing should be between 10-20cm (4-8in), using the upper limit for tall or spreading plants, and the lower limit for smaller plants. Prick out indoor sowings when they are large enough to handle without damage.

Sweet peas need training and tying in to their supports to encourage them to climb and make a good display.

Pinch out the leading shoots on plants such as Chrysanthemum and Helianthus to encourage bushy plants. However, if tall thin sprays are preferred, they can be left un-pinched, perhaps removing a few buds (known as 'disbudding') to encourage larger blooms.

Liquid feed plants in containers every two to four weeks.

Keep tubs, hanging baskets and alpine troughs well watered. Use collected rainwater, or recycled grey water wherever possible.

Remove faded wallflowers and spring bedding from beds and containers, to make space for summer plantings.

Tubs can be planted up with summer bedding in milder areas. In cold areas, it is advised to wait until well into June, or until all risk of frost has passed. You can always keep some horticultural fleece handy to cover pots in the event of a cold night being forecast.

If you want to grow your own spring bedding for next year, many common choices (including wallflowers, pansies, and Bellis perennis) need to be sown between now and July in order to flower next spring, as they are biennials (which live for two years, and flower only in the second year, as opposed to annuals, which live and flower for one year only).

Winter bedding plants for the following winter can also be sown from now until July. Attractive choices include ornamental cabbages, kales and winter pan-

Take softwood cuttings of tender perennials like Argyranthemum, Pelargonium and Fuchsia. They will provide new plants for display later this

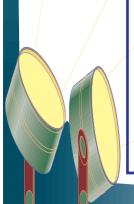

Some helpful basic hints and tips resulting from your feedback

hank you to all those who sent feedback about my intention to put together a computer help book. The opinion most people seem to have, not surprisingly, is to start at the beginning, and not to assume knowledge (which I hope I do in these articles). For instance, Windows files and folders is a subject I am often asked about, so I thought it would be a good idea to do a refresher here.

Whichever version of Windows you are running – 95, 98, XP or Vista, the structure is always the same. There are always folders set up for your own use: My Documents, Pictures etc. Anything you create, like a document, picture etc is called file, and what you put it in is called a folder, exactly the same as in a normal filing cabinet. It is important to save your files in there as tidily as possible. If you just save things in any old fashion, everything will always be there, but you might have a problem finding it!

So if you want to have a spring clean, go into My Documents for instance and have a look at all the documents you have in there and decide what folders you could put them in, like family, correspondence, holidays etc. To create a new folder just click (at the top of the window), File, then New, then Folder, the title will be highlighted in blue waiting for you to give it a name, just type the name and press enter. If you get it wrong, you can just right click on the folder and click Rename, and type it again. Then you can drag and drop your files in there. That means just click on the file, hold down

the left button and drag the file over the new folder and then release the button, and in it goes. Repeat as necessary!

A year or two ago, I spent a good few hours going through all my family photographs, which were all in individual folders anyway, but I thought it would be a good idea to put them into year order. So I created a folder for each year and dropped each picture folder in as appropriate. It did work well and now it is much easier to locate an event like birthdays, holidays etc. Folders within folders! There are some useful notes and even a demo video on the Microsoft site, go to www.microsoft.com and type in the search box: working with files and folders.

Lots of customers have been changing over to Eset antivirus when their AVG comes up for renewal, and all is working well. One thing worth mentioning to all that have the latest Eset version 4, is that if the icon turns orange and says maximum security is not ensured, it is actually monitoring Windows security updates. Open the Eset control panel and just click on the link that says 'here' and it will take to Microsoft update site and download the updates you need.

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Hallgate Schools - continued

'umps were taking their toll in both the girls' and the boys' departments in May 1916, plus measles in the girls', all of which were notified to the local Medical Officer of Health. By the end of the month 32 boys were off ill and a similar number of girls - these illnesses had their repercussions in the infants' school which also reported a lot of absences and illness spread through whole families and were a great worry to parents already alarmed by the frequent Zeppelin raids and the constant lack of sleep. After a raid in early May only 81 girls were present at school.

To add to the dislocation two teachers went off sick, Miss Pumfret and Miss Brown, so Misses Whitehead, Raper and Verity were sent from the infant department to help out. One teacher returned fairly quickly and so Miss Whitehead was sent back to her infant classroom. Two girls, Madge Dixon and Ida Downes were granted partial exemption certificates.

On a brighter note, Mr Eyre called to inform four teachers of an increase in their salaries - always welcome news! The laundry and cookery lessons were very popular both in practice and theory and though needlework and knitting continued to be taught, these two subjects were no longer the core subjects for girls, but even so the traditional mold of the ascribed place of girls as first and foremost homemakers was not broken.

Boys left to work on the farms

In the boys department, Henry Horsley was allowed to leave school to work on a farm at Burn Park (at the bottom of Park Lane.) During the Empire Day observations a collection was initiated for the Overseas Club to send parcels to British Prisoners of War in Germany and thirty shillings was raised - perhaps not a lot but there were other appeals at the time - the Belgian Fund, the Serbian Fund and so on and many purses were stretched in those days especially when the breadwinner was away in the forces. The Whitsuntide week's holiday was omitted that year at the suggestion of the government - what difference that could make as regards a school is questionable, but it was good for moral, all willing to make sacrifices for the national good.

Five boys passed the labour exam and left - Wm. Chester, H Jarvis, Wm. Horsley, K. Liversedge and H Isgate. on 30th June some of the scholars gave a concert to the rest of the school and the infants which was held in the 'Central Hall' - Hall A, in the boys' school. This was in aid of the Serbian Relief Fund and was repeated to parents the same evening and a total of £6.15 shillings was raised.

Thirty seven boys were admitted from the infant department and the classes were St. I, 38 pupils Miss Coulter; St. II, 52 pupils Miss Lathem; St III, 40 pupils Miss Steel; St IV, 43 pupils Miss Hall; St V, 32 pupils Miss Wellstead; St.VI 24 pupils Miss Youngson; Sts VII and ex VII, 32 pupils Mr. Moorby - an all female staff now apart from the Headmaster, the male teachers having gone into the forces.

Jack Small, Frank Kingdom and Robert Donkin gained scholarships - two from the County Council and one from the Mark Kirby Trust who provided financial support under the revised endowment arrangements of this oldest organised Cottingham School near St. Mary's Church.

Teachers thirty minutes late

Several teachers lived in Beverley and two of them in the boys' department, Miss Hall and Miss Lathern went home for dinner each day; Mr Moorby complained that even though the train from Beverley was supposed to arrive in Cottingham at 1.20pm, it was often late sometimes 30 minutes late. It must have been a scramble in any case with only one and a half hours for dinner!

On 29th August, Mr Moorby attended his brother's funeral; he had been the Headmaster of Newland National School where Mr Moorby had been a pupil teacher in his teens. George Appleton and Alan Johnson were punished for playing truant for three days - Alan was blamed as the ringleader!

The Hall windows were covered with brown paper as had been proposed, so that evening meetings, concerts etc. could go ahead - whether this was detached during the day is unclear. An air raid on the night of 26 September resulted in only half the boys being present next day, the 'all clear' was not sounded until 3am.#Two week's holiday was taken for potato picking during October - one of the weeks being due from Whitsuntide and no mention of Hull Fair. The schools closed at 3.45pm during the darker months on account of the 'restricted lighting regulations' which was to give the cleaners time to work without lights and to enable the pupils to get home before dark.

Help with the Potato harvest

The Head was receiving urgent appeals from local farmers and gardeners for boys to help in the potato harvest which was still on-going and he was more sympathetic under the circumstances and referred the matter to County Hall who allowed certain absences. With many farm workers now in the army, plus the fact that more potatoes were being grown to feed the population during war time food emergencies, child labour was very necessary.

Air raids accounted from a lot of boys going to school late or not turning up at all during late November. An old scholar, Leonard Buttery, in khaki uniform called to see the staff and the boys on the 29th and another old scholar, Herbert Wilberforce, made a great impression in all the departments when he visited a day or two later in the uniform of the Seaforth Highlanders Regiment with kilt, stockings and Scotch

In the girls' school, there were several exhibitions of pupils' handwork during 1916 which were usually well attended by parents between three and four o'clock. The Rev. Lowndes took his daughter along one day and she was very impressed with the display and the singing abilities of the girls.

Outbreak of Mumps

An ex-scholar, Alice Brown, began her training as a student teacher in the school assisting with St VII during her first week there in October. Dorothy Tranmer was granted a conditional exemption certificate and Kathleen Legard was punished for truancy. The usual round of illnesses began in November and Jessie Giles and Gladys and Emily Ashton were excluded from school, and Miss Buttery was also off ill for four weeks; mumps predominated that December and more girls went off sick. Dr Helen Forbes went to the department and examined 'several delicate girls' and checked those that had returned after measles and mumps.

The year ended with the girls entertaining to a 'happy hour' of Christmas carols and the term ended on Friday 20th December.

The new term and new year (1917) began with family good attendances in all departments, but within a week severe weather struck with snow, sleet, rain, gales plus hard frosts which kept average attendance down to 80% with many children in outlaying areas unable to get through the deep snow to school; mumps and measles were still causing absences and a new disease began to raise its head - influenza which began to take its toll and was to become a terror killing thousands of people nation wide over the next year or so, including one of

Gales continued through the month and Mr. Moorby taught a new song in the boys' school - "Oh, Oh, hear the wildwinds blow," very appropriate! on 14th February the school yard was

"In a shocking state and dirty due to the fact of frost and thaw, with the result of dirty passages and classrooms."

February and March continued wet and cold; Mr Moorby secured another allotment of land close to the school for the use of St.V1 boys to cultivate when the weather improved.

In the girls' school, poor Kathleen Legard was punished again for truancy, she had only attended one half day since Christmas - not surprising really when she was caned on the one half day that she did turn up!

The first Head of the new Hallgate Primary School, Mrs Ann Hill, gave a combined retirement party along with her colleague Mrs Pam Sleap on 3rd April 2009 at the school. Staff and friends, past and present, enjoyed socialising and the more agile ones danced to an Irish rythems band. The best wishes of everyone there went with them both.

his month is a continuation of last month's issue about vitamins and minerals. Again, I hope you have found this useful and would stipulate that you consult your GP before taking any of these products, especially if you are on medication.

MANGANESE - an essential trace element - needed for synthesis of cartilage, collagen and structural molecules known as mucopolysaccharides and plays an important role in normal grown and development, especially of bones. It is also involved in many metabolic functions including the synthesis of amino acids, blood clotting factors, some hormones, brain chemicals, carbohydrates, cholesterol, it also acts as an antioxidant. Good food sources are Tea (enjoy a cuppa!), whole grains, nuts and seeds, fruits, eggs, green leafy vegetables/herbs, offal and shellfish and milk. Research women with osteoporosis have been found to have manganese levels that were four times lower than those without osteoporosis. There is no EC RDA for this trace element but an intake of up to 10mg per day is believed to be both safe and adequate.

PHOSPHORUS - is a mineral that makes up at least half a kilogram of your body weight. 90% is found in your bones and teeth where it forms calcium phosphate - a hard mineral salt also known as hydroxyapatite. As the structural mineral in bones and teeth it is found in muscle cells - essential for the production of energy-rich molecules. It is also an important component of the chemicals making up our genetic information. Good food sources include fish, poultry, meat, dairy products, wholegain cereals, soya beans, nuts, eggs and yeast extract, Vitamin D is essential for absorption of phosphorus and calcium from the gut and for their deposition in bone, EC RDA suggests 800mg the same as for calcium and should be used in conjunction with calcium. Deficiency can be linked to muscle weakness, joint stiffness, pins and needles.

POTASSIUM - is a mineral found inside body cells. Potassium is essential for normal muscle contraction, generation of a regular heartbeat, conduction of messages along nerve fibres, and for the maintenance of blood sugar levels. It is also involved in the production of genetic material, proteins and energy. Blood potassium levels are regulated in the kidneys. Good food sources seafood, fruit, vegetables, whole grains, rock salt and 'low sodium' salts. Can help with muscle cramps, constipation, fatigue, low blood sugar, and low blood pressure.

SELENIUM - is a trace element - essential for cell growth and immune function. It is involved in the synthesis of hormone-like substances as prostaglandin and thyroid hormones. Selenium can help with hair, nail and skin problems, age spots, thyroid problems, cataracts, muscle weakness to name a few. Good sources are brazil nuts, seafood, offal, whole grains, onions, garlic, broccoli, cabbage, mushrooms, radishes and celery. There is no EC RDA but intakes of around 75mcg have been suggested.

ZINC - is an essential trace element - helpful in the regulation of gene activation and the synthesis of specific proteins in the response to hormone triggers. It is vital for growth, sexual maturity and immune function. It is also essential for the proper function of over a hundred different enzymes. It can help with cravings of odd foods, sleep disturbances, poor hair growth and hair loss, poor nail growth, poor wound healing, skin problems such as eczema, psoriasis, acne and visual impairment in later life. Some people with tinnitus have low levels of zinc, in which case supplements help improve symptoms. Good sources are red meat, seafood, offal, brewers yeast, whole grains, pulses, eggs and cheese. The EC RDA recommendation is 15mg per day.

Again I hope you have found this useful and would stipulate that you consult your GP before taking any of these products especially if you are on medication.
