The 'end' of Windows XP and the birth of Windows 8

indows XP the stalwart operating system launched in October 2001, and still used by many, will reach end of life in April 2014. This means that although it won't stop working, there will be no further support or security updates from then.

Since XP there has been Windows Vista and of course the current and very successful Windows 7. Now Microsoft has announced that its forthcoming Windows launch in the autumn will be available in three versions. Billed as the biggest redesign since Windows 95 (but not going overboard on names!) Windows 8 will be the version used on PCs and laptops; Windows 8 Pro for business, and confusingly for mobile devices like tablets and phones the system will be called Windows RTF.

I have mentioned previously about the 'tile based' appearance of Windows 8, and anyone who has a new Windows phone like the Nokia Lumia will already be used to that look and feel. This touch screen approach is sure to be the future of computing, and the best bit is you can experience it even now with Windows 7!

Touch screen PCs are already available, and are becoming very popular. We recently installed some super new units at Castle Park Dental Care (a regular contributor to this very magazine) and the feedback has been very positive. "We love our new computers and find that the speed and touch screen has already become a firm favourite with the practice team. We are using our new IT equipment in our efforts to be environmentally responsible by reducing the amount of paper generated on a daily basis. It also means that we can offer patients a more interactive approach when looking at different treatment options as the large touch screens are brilliant for this!" quoted Practice Manager Gillian Fisher.

So you can see the future of computing and the way we all interact with them is very exciting. Touch, handwriting recognition and even gestures will eventually replace the traditional static keyboard and mouse.

Now Laptop hints and tips. Laptop batteries are expensive items, so you don't want to be buying a replacement. The first tip is not to leave your laptop on charge all the time especially when it's new; in other words unplug it and work off the battery for as long as possible. The more it is plugged in, the shorter life the battery will have. If the

screen is not bright enough for you, you can turn it up by using a combination of keys on your keyboard, usually the Fn key and one with a ? icon. You can put your laptop to sleep by just closing the lid, and it will keep your work in memory until you open the lid and log in again. This is useful too if your laptop takes a long time to boot up normally.

Power saving is of course an important issue nowadays, so you may have noticed that most new PCs also go into hibernation mode if they are left on unattended. However this is controllable in Windows on any type of computer. Just go into Control Panel, and Power Options and you can set the time for all these actions.

Web browsing tips: When you do a search on the internet, ever wondered why the top results (first ones displayed, often on a tinted background) always seem to be selling something? This is because they are! They will be sponsored adverts, in other words, companies have paid the search providers to put them at the top of the list. If you want a more balanced view, move down the list of results. It is interesting that 94% of people only look at the results on the first page of search results, with only 6% clicking on to page 2.

Email Tips: Most people know by now that if you don't know the sender of an email it is probably best to just delete it. But do remember to empty your deleted items folder to prevent a big build-up of junk! If you decide you don't want to receive emails anymore from a reputable source like a store for instance, look at the bottom of the email as there will be an 'unsubscribe' link that they have to provide. Some emails may contain a hyperlink; a line you click on to connect to a webpage, if it doesn't work you may have hold the Ctrl key whilst clicking. If that still doesn't work, highlight & copy the link and then open up your web browser and paste it into the top address bar (not a search box). For security reasons only ever do this if you trust the source of the email. If you receive an attachment you can't open, look at the file name and see what the last three letters are to determine which program you need. For instance: .pdf requires Adobe Reader; .doc or .docx needs Word; .xls needs Excel, .pps or .ppt needs PowerPoint. You can download a free 'reader' version of all these if you don't own the program.

Special measured lifted at **Hallgate Primary School**

Staff and pupils at Hallgate Primary School in Cottingham are celebrating after being taken out of special measures.

A recent visit by Ofsted inspectors, conducted under the new and tougher framework introduced last term, found the school had made sufficient progress that they were judged to be providing their pupils with a satisfactory quality of education and it is improving.

Hallgate Primary School was placed in special measures in December 2009, but during the visit in March, inspectors found that "over time, the school has tackled the deep-rooted weaknesses highlighted by the previous inspection that placed it in special

They said the satisfactory and improving achievement is reflected in the children's good progress during the Early Years Foundation Stage and the satisfactory progress pupils make between Key Stages 1 and 2. Pupils' attainment is in line with the national average and improving in both English and maths.

Teaching was also found to be satisfactory and improving and while a significant minority of parents and carers, pupils and staff feel that pupils' poor behaviour and bullying require improvement; inspection evidence indicates that behaviour and safety is satisfactory overall.

Inspectors also said the impact of leadership and governance has improved significantly and both aspects and are now satisfactory and improving. They added: "They have unequivocally demonstrated that they can improve the school's academic performance and the quality of provision pupils receive."

The school were given areas to work on which would improve the school further and these include:

- * ensuring pupils meet or exceed challenging termly and annual targets based on their starting points and capabilities in all subjects but particularly in maths and English
- * ensuring all teaching systematically develops pupils' knowledge and understanding of all key concepts and skills, securely and
- * improve the behaviour of the very small minority of disruptive pupils who, on occasions, adversely affect the climate for

Christine Lacey, head teacher at Hallgate Primary School, who took over the running of the school in April 2009, said: "We are delighted that we no longer need special measures.

"The school is a different place today. Effective teaching and exciting lessons mean the children are making real progress, a skilled and hard working team of staff are catching children who may be falling behind and helping them back on track, while children with talent are noticed and stretched.

"A new and talented leadership team is already plotting a course to make Hallgate the school of first choice in Cottingham."

Councillor Julie Abraham, portfolio holder for children, young people and schools at East Riding of Yorkshire Council said: "Coming out of special measures is just the first step for Hallgate Primary School.

"It has been on a journey to get to this position and I congratulate the team at the school and all who have worked so hard to arrive here.

"However, the journey must continue and the school recognises this. With such enthusiasm the school is in a great place to build on this solid foundation and I wish all concerned the very best."

Mike Furbank, head of achievement and inclusion at East Riding of Yorkshire Council said: "The journey through special measures is different in every school and this one has taken patience and

"The leadership of the school, including the governors, has shown real commitment to improving outcomes for children and this is shown in the report.

'The satisfactory and improving outcome under the tougher 2012 inspection framework is really an achievement for the school and staff from East Riding of Yorkshire Council that have been involved in supporting the school over the recent months.

"My thanks to the staff who have shown skill and commitment to bring about this splendid outcome."

Ingredient of the Month

Chocolate

The common cacao tree is classified as Theobroma cacao and belongs to the family Sterculiaceae. They are very delicate and need much protection in their first four years of growth. With careful cultivation, the trees of most strains will begin bearing fruit in the fifth year. The fruit containing the seeds are about the size of a small pineapple when harvested.

How chocolate is made

The processing of the cacao seeds (cocoa beans) is not a simple task. Firstly the fruit is fermented which takes 3 to 9 days, during which the heat dries the seeds and turns them brown. The beans are then dried in the sun and cleaned in special machines before they are roasted. This loosens the outer shell which separates the shell from its center or "nib" which is further processed into Chocolate Liquor, by grinding it to a smooth, liquid state. Further processing takes place for the various types of 'eating' chocolate as follows:-

Dark Chocolate is chocolate liquor with additional sweeteners and

Milk Chocolate is chocolate liquor with additional cocoa butter, milk, sweeteners and flavorings.

White Chocolate has no formal definition. White chocolate contains sugar, cocoa butter, milk solids and flavorings such as vanilla but does not contain non-fat cocoa solids, so is mostly used as a coating.

Couverture is a term describing professional-quality coating chocolate that is extremely glossy. It usually contains a minimum of 32% cocoa butter, which enables it to form a much thinner shell than ordinary confectionary coating.

Ganache is a thick, extremely rich chocolate spread. It is made by pouring hot cream over chopped up chocolate and whipping the mixture until the chocolate melts and the mixture becomes thick and stiff

Cocoa contains as much as 20% protein, 40% carbohydrate, and 40% fat. It is also mildly stimulating because of the presence of Theobromine, an alkaloid closely related to caffeine.

A Brief History of Chocolate

1502 - Christopher Columbus introduces chocolate to Spain from his fourth voyage to the New World in 1502 but not as the product we know today. It was only consumed as a drink. The word "chocolate" was derived from the Aztec word xocolatl which means bitter water.

1615 - Anne of Austria (wife of Louis XIII) declares chocolate as the drink of the French Court , although this was only after much skepticism, as initially it was considered a "barbarous product and noxious drug".

1640 - chocolate finds its way to England, among other European countries.

1657- the drink becomes a best seller in England and excessive duties are imposed on chocolate. It takes almost 200 years before the duty is dropped.

1828 - Dutch chocolate maker Conrad J. Van Houten created the hydraulic cocoa press. The press enabled chocolate makers to crush the "nibs," or centers, of roasted cacao beans into a paste (Chocolate

Liquor). After crushing, some of the cocoa butter was extracted.

1848 - English chocolate maker Joseph Storrs Fry created the first eating chocolate by further refining the cocoa, adding sugar, and mixing the cocoa butter back in.

1875 - Swiss Daniel Peter added condensed milk to chocolate and marketed the first solid milk chocolate bar.

Chocolate in cooking

When using chocolate for culinary purposes, use as high a quality as you can afford - i.e. containing higher proportions of cocoa solids, preferably 40% for milk chocolate and 70% for dark chocolate. This information can usually be found in the ingredients section on the label.

Be very careful when melting chocolate as too high a heat can make it spit. Therefore always melt in a heatproof bowl over very hot water in a small saucepan. It can also be successfully melted in the microwave using a medium setting.

Chocolate Dream

225g/8oz Mascarpone Cheese 270ml/9fl.oz. Double Cream 4 tbsp Icing Sugar Zest and juice of 1 Lemon 175g/6oz Plain Chocolate

Instructions

- 1. Break the chocolate into pieces then place in a bowl over a saucepan of very hot water. Stir to melt.
- 2. Mix the mascarpone cheese and cream together, then divide the mixture between two bowls.
- 3. Add the sieved icing sugar, lemon rind and juice to one bowl and mix thoroughly.
 - 4. Stir in the melted chocolate to the other bowl.
 - 5. In four individual tall glasses, place alternate layers of the chocolate cream first, then the lemon cream, finishing with the lemon cream.
 - 6. Decorate with grated chocolate and chill before serving.



Mississippi Mud Pie

Ingredients
For the Filling
400g/14oz Plain Chocolate
225g/8oz Butter
2 tbsp Instant Coffee
30ml/1fl.oz. Boiling Water
300ml/10fl.oz. Double Cream
300g/11oz Brown Sugar
6 Eggs

For the Crumb Base

50g/2oz Butter 150g/-5oz Digestive Biscuits, crushed 25g/1oz Sugar

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 190C, 375F, gas Mark 5 and lightly grease a 20cm/8-inch springform tin.
- 2. Melt the butter in a medium saucepan then add the crushed digestive biscuits, and the sugar, mixing well and adding a little more melted butter if necessary to bind the mixture.
- 3. Spoon into the prepared tin, spreading it evenly and pressing it firmly down. Set aside.
- 4. Place the chocolate, butter, instant coffee and water into a large saucepan and heat gently, stirring well, until the butter and chocolate have melted.
- 5. Remove from the heat and beat in the cream, sugar and eggs. Mix well then pour the mixture on to the biscuit crust.
- 6. Bake for 1° hours or until the filling is set. Allow to cool before removing the tin.

Serve cold with whipped cream.

Little Pots of Chocolate

Serve 4

Ingredients:
450g/1lb Plain Chocolate
Grated zest of 1 orange
Juice of 3 oranges
50g/2oz Butter
2 tbsp Grand Marnier or Cognac
4 Egg Yolks
2 Egg Whites
Extra Grand Marnier or Cognac to serve

1 Orange to serve

Instructions

- 1. Break the chocolate into the top of a double boiler. Add the orange zest and juice to the chocolate, together with butter. Heat the mixture over simmering water, stirring occasionally, until the chocolate has melted. Remove from heat and stir in 2 tbsp Grand Marnier or Cognac. (Chocolate can be melted in the Microwave).
- Combine the egg yolks in a large mixing bowl and beat together thoroughly. Strain the chocolate mixture on to the egg yolks, beating constantly with a hand-held electric whisk, if possible. Allow the mixture to cool.
- 3. In a clean bowl and using a clean whisk, beat the egg whites until stiff but not dry. Using a spatula, gently but thoroughly fold the whisked whites into the chocolate mixture.
- 4. Pour the mixture into 4 individual 150ml/5 fl.oz. Glass or china dishes, cover and chill in the refrigerator for about 2 hours until set.
- 5. To serve cut 2 thin slices from the centre of the whole orange and cut each slice into quarters. Arrange 2 quarters, with the points facing, on top of each dish. Pour 1 teasp of Grand Marnier or cognac over the top of each dish and gently rotate each dish so that the entire surface is coated. Serve immediately.

Bananas with Fudge Sauce

Ingredients

4 Large Bananas

1 tbsp Sugar

For the sauce

1 x 170g/6oz tin Evaporated milk

50g/2oz Butter

75g/3oz Soft Brown Sugar

25g/1oz Good Quality Plain Chocolate, chopped

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C, 350F, Gas Mark 4. Peel the bananas, place in an ovenproof dish, sprinkle with the sugar and bake for 20 minutes
- 2. Meanwhile place the evaporated milk, butter and brown sugar in a saucepan and cook over a low heat, stirring, until the sugar has dissolved and the mixture is well blended.
- 3. Bring the mixture to the boil and continue to boil for 2-3 minutes.
- 4. Remove the pan from the heat, stir in the chocolate and mix well. Keep warm until ready to serve poured over the baked bananas.

What the Green Deal means for you

ast month Martin English of Homelink spelled out what the forthcoming Green Deal means for landlords and their tenants. I want to build on his excellent article by outlining what the Green Deal means for you as a homeowner.

Hallgate school host their own field of golden daffodils




Start at GR.TA 018338 Street parking near Half Moon Public House, Skidby. Distance 6.0 Miles.

alk along the road towards Cottingham and after a short distance turn right heading towards the Mill. Turn right down the lane leading to the mill and pass through a kissing gate on the left into a field and walk through this field with the hedge on your right.

After a short distance you will pass a coppice known as Gallows Hill (Note the memorial to a local boy) and after a further short

distance turn left and follow the path towards White House Farm crossing four stiles to reach Eppleworth road just to the East of the farm.

On emerging onto the road, turn right and walk along the road until reaching the drive up to Hessle Golf Club. Turn right and walk up this drive to the buildings and, on approaching the first building take the path to the left. This path follows the perimeter of the Golf Course. When reaching a path on the northern perimeter, take this path heading north to reach a track known as Ripplingham road.

Turn right onto this track which eventually becomes a surfaced road and enter the western end of Skidby. On emerging at the Little Weighton road, turn left and follow the road to a point where the road turns sharp left. At this point, locate a foot path on the extreme right and follow this as it passes behind houses. Continue on this path to emerge on Church Rise. Turn right and on reaching the village hall on the left, turn left on main street and walk back to the Half Moon.

In the Garden



Flowers

Seed of half-hardy bedding plants may be sown in trays in greenhouses or on windowsills, pricked out when large enough to handle into individual pots, remembering to water regularly and given a weekly feed. Summer bedding plants raised earlier can be planted into hanging baskets or containers and grown on in the greenhouse until moving outdoors at the end of May/early

- 5. Start to feed citrus plants
- 6. Increase the water given to houseplants

- 8. Sow new lawns or repair bare patches
- 9. Prune fig trees
- 10. Divide bamboos and waterlilies

June, depending on weather conditions. A wide range of hardy annuals can be sown in their flowering positions and these would include cornflower, cosmea, echium, helichrysum, limnanthes and matthiola. Sweet Peas may also be sown outside in their flowering position. Spring flowering plants such as primroses and pansies should still be looked after by removing any dead-heads or fading flower-heads to encourage further flowers.

It's also a good idea for plant support frames to be placed over clumps of tall perennials letting new stems grow through them which will completely hide the supports.

Bulbs

Begonia tubers can still be planted into pots for growing in the greenhouse, remembering to make sure the concave part of the tuber is uppermost and lightly covered with compost. A weekly feed is recommended and as they grow can be potted on. Towards the end of the month plant dahlia tubers outdoors, if weather conditions are suitable, with a 10cm (4") covering of soil, however, if it is still cold in your area leave planting until later in the month. To prolong the flowering period of gladioli plant at intervals. For filling in gaps in the garden, lilies can be grown in pots enabling you to move them around.

Fruit

A good thick layer of well-rotted organic matter can be used for mulching any type of fruit. Summer and autumn fruiting raspberries that have been newly planted should be cut back to approximately 23cm (9") from the base. To encourage early flowers cover strawberry plants with cloches. Early rhubarb should be harvested now; remember to remove any flower spikes that may develop. Keep a check on plants for pest and disease, taking any preventative action if needed. **Vegetables**

Many vegetables can be sown in the greenhouse to obtain an early start. Sowings can be made of runner and french beans, aubergine, capsicum, celeriac, courgette and marrow. Towards the end of April sowings of cucumber and melon may be made. Seed of tomato can also be sown now in a warm place which will provide plants for either planting out in early June or growing on in an unheated greenhouse.

Herbs can be sown in the greenhouse and many can be sown outdoors. Cauliflower seedlings produced from seed sown earlier may be pricked out and placed in seed trays for growing on so plantings can be made later in spring. Continue to make sowings of carrot and lettuce on a regular basis. Second early potatoes should be planted during the early part of the month and main crop varieties towards the end.

Onion Sets, along with seedlings already grown, can be planted in rows remembering to leave enough space so as you can use the hoe for weeding. If shallots haven't already been planted they should be done so as soon as possible. Leeks can be sown in the nursery bed and then transplanted into their final rows in the summer.

Plant asparagus crowns in beds that have been prepared well. Previous herb cuttings from last summer that were potted up which are now well-rooted can be potted up separately. Sweet Corn seed can be sown in warm conditions at this time so that plants will be ready for planting outside in early summer.

Lawns

Provided the weather is mild and the grass is growing, applications of lawn fertilisers and weedkillers can be made to established lawns. Should moss have become a problem, treat with a moss killer. Rake out dead moss and then fork over so that growth and surface drainage will be improved. Apply lawn fertiliser to promote strong, healthy growth.

Depending on growth regular mowings may be necessary. Keeping a regular check on weeds is essential so that they can be dug out. It is the best month for sowing grass seed and, as mentioned last month, our Rapid Green Lawn seed will solve all your problems!







Hallgate Schools -

By Peter Railton - Local Historian

The Year is 1934

The new year and the new term opened with good attendance and a full staff in the girls's department and twenty girls started an advanced course in cookery.

The Rev. French went about his business of checking the register that January and soup was provided for all children staying at school at dinner time and was paid for by the T.O.C.H. foundation - this was of course before the days of school dinners organised by the L.E.A., and various add-hoc schemes were in operation provided by benevolent charities or individuals as we have seen.

New Student Teachers

Students from Hull Training College arrived for teacher training practice in four classes in February and the school dentist returned and 'performed many extractions'. Poor dental health went hand-in-hand with often poor physical health - we have seen how vunerable all pupils were to the various 'bugs' and diseases endemic in the schools - often poor diets caused through financial hardship tended to leave some pupils less resilient to infections of different sorts; and then the less serious kinds like coughs and colds were passed on to the teachers. Everyone was glad when the Spring and Summer weather arrived.

An interesting entry in May of the year records that -

"On Thursday morning several girls were withdrawn from school to attend a Church Service at St. Michael's, Cold Harbour Lane. The vicar there sent a letter to the school saying he was legally in order in doing this".

Cold Harbour Lane is now Orchard Park Road and is off Middledyke Lane - evidently the Hallgate catchment area extended down to somewhere near the Orchard Park Estate - I remember a farm and a few houses just before and just beyond a broad ditch or dyke which marked the Cottingham and Hull boundary on the edge of the North Hull Estate beyond it; anyway the vicar of St. Michael's saw the children as of being in his Parish - the problem was resolved later, as we will see.

In June, the violin orchestra repeated their success of the previous year at Hull Music Festival and won the Shield (see photograph). The girls were taught and coached by a peripatetic teacher in the employ of the L.E.A. who went from school to school in the area teaching the violin, with excellent results for Hallgate girls. Later in the month, girls entered the Inter-Divisional Sports held at Malton and won the Maxwell Trophy which was given to whichever school gained the highest total marks in the sports. Cottingham girls were also responsible for helping Holderness to gain the Bickersteth Trophy at the same events.

On Monday morning the 16th of June -

"A very pleasing ceremony took place. Sir Godfrey McDonald of the Isles Bart., came to school and presented to the girls the Maxwell Trophy. All the Managers were present and Mrs. Holtby also spoke, and the girls were given the afternoon off as a holiday."

Girls successful in obtaining places at Beverley High School that year were Rosina Taylor, Joan Pool, Emily Coupland, Kathleen Sands and Hilary Boynton. The first week in August saw the admission of girls from the infant's department, the presentation of the Holtby Cup for the 'House' with the highest marks, a bazaar held by the senior girls, presentation of needlework to parents in the hall and a display by the netball team who came top of their Schools Division.

School reopens after summer holidays

Four weeks holiday was given and school reopened on the 4th of September with 321 girls on roll. On the 3rd of October the Headmistress attended the 21st Anniversary of the founding of Hull Training College, on Cottingham Road - originally opened to girls first and men later. Hallgate schools were always happy to provide teaching practice facilities for the students and an excellent relationship has been built-up over the years. Also that month the school nurse attended and pronounced all the girls' hair clean and no signs of skin disorders; Miss Brimelow was of course very pleased!

The boys' school opened on the 9th of January with a visit of the dental surgeon, Dr Harris, resulting in 95 children needing dental treatment of some kind. Mr J. Firby, Head of Anlaby C of E school gave a lantern lecture on "The Yorkshire Moors and Dales" on the 2nd

March: 100 slides dealt with towns, villages, abbeys etc. In the three Ridings and 'some lovely scenery was thrown upon the screen.' This lecture was well received by a capacity audience and £1.3s.0d was raised towards expences. This was followed on the 18th by "An interesting Lantern lecture given by the Headmaster of the school, Mr R Becket Brookes entitled 'The Ancient City of Chester' and was illustrated by 140 slides."

This was in the Head's own hand! The Chair was taken by Mr. W. Arbon of Haltemprice Urban District Council who proposed a vote of thanks at the end of the presentation. Audience size and cash collected is not recorded, but I have it on good authority that Mr Brookes did make his lessons very interesting when he took them and was always willing to explain things, for example in geography; to those who asked he was patient - but wobetide the miscreants! The Rev Dakin made his first visit of the term on the 7th March and inspected the registers and once again wrote in glowing terms of the work of the headmaster and his staff, the orderliness and discipline of the boys and the fact that the head must be congratulated on the success he has won in his work in the school!

Hobbies Exhibition

On April 12th and 13th a hobby exhibition was held in the hall for parents and pupils to view. This consisted of hand work done by the boys at home during the long winter evening, (what - no TV, computer games etc.?) Models and specimens in wood, leather, wool, cardboard, raffia etc. where displayed and prizes won by over 30 boys for their

Brian Steves, Harold Forsey, Brian Hunter, Ronald Carr and Arthur Freer won scholarships and on the 17th of May the Combined Hallgate Schools House Sports Festival was held at the Woods Lane ground; the usual programme of events took place organised by the teachers, and parents, clergy and councillors attended. The Holtby Trophy was won by the Livingstone House and was presented by Mrs W Grindell. It was a cool afternoon and evening but was well suited for the purpose, This was followed on the 7th June with the Holderness Schools Annual Sports Festival on the same ground. Heavy rain fell all morning and during the early part of the afternoon and many competitors sheltered in the schools, or sat in the buses that had brought them to the ground. Rain cleared at 2.30pm and the games began. Cottingham avenged the defeat of the 1933 events and won the Lambert White shield. -Withernsea, winners that year, came second.

A petition from parents to the East Yorkshire Motor Company, asked if a bus could be provided for the children living in the Priory Road and Settings Dyke areas to get the children to school just before 9am. at the time they caught the 7.50 am bus and got to the schools at 8.15 am as they had to stay at school over lunch time, it made a very long day especially for the younger ones. The result of this request is not recorded.

Mr. North took charge of the department in September because Mr. Brookes was given leave of absence on medical grounds for three months. Mr. North introduced more specialised teaching in history, geography, science and music to be taken by himself, Mr Bramley and Miss Crawford. Mr Brookes returned on the 17th of December whether the changes introduced by Mr North were continued is not recorded.

Such an angry horse

ne of our latest training horses in is a big impressive 17hh+ show jumping "Warmblood"(Germanic bloodlines) gelding called Maverik. He is supposed to be a very talented jumping horse and his whole career has been centred round that particular sport. However, talented a competition horse may be and in whatever sphere that talent may lie, they are worthless if the owner cannot load them up in the wagon and take them to a show.

Most professional Show-jumping yards will take a minimum of 3 or 4 horses at a time to a show and the loading /travelling must work like clockwork. Apparently Maverik has never loaded easily in his entire life and he has never accepted a towed horse trailer. His whole transit life has had to be in wagons. I guessed that the confines of a trailer had always been too claustrophobic for him or he had been panicked inside. Even in a wagon he would instantly turn round and leap back out before the partition could be closed on him. This is a huge towering horse weighing 700 kg....

He was on loan to a top class junior rider down in Suffolk from his owners in North Yorkshire. Their yard was one of perfect facilities with a huge 70m by 70m ménage, hot water horse showers and heat lamp drying rooms for their residents! (More than my lot get! "Nowt" wrong with a cold hose! ?)

However, for all the aesthetic charms of a yard, their inability to load him up to go to a show was proving far too time consuming and incredibly frustrating. I heard how it was always two hours there and at least three to get home. They tried loading with an old pony alongside, tempting him with his favourite food, cajoling, shouting, pleading!however they did promise that they had never hurt him. It took 31/2 hours to load him to come to me! I think that they were, understandably, very glad to see the back of him despite his jumping talent.

When I start to work with any new horse, there are certain things I do which will give me a good idea of what has happened in its past and why they do what they do. One thing is for sure, HORSES NEVER LIE.

This was one seriously, dangerously, angry horse who's issues were brought to the fore by attempting to load. His general attitude to Humans was one of dominance. His height and his weight gave him a power to move us about and out of his way at will. He had perfected his set of nasty tricks over years and years. He spat his dummy out with me massively the very first time I went to work him. Without any warning whatsoever he went in to attack me the very second I lead him into my school to start his ground training. He leapt at me with all his force and ears laid back and fury in his eyes. This forced me to instantly back off in order to avoid his attack. This perfected move on his part then gave him the power to rear up to full height, spin on the spot and let drive with both hind legs straight at my head. Nice! It worked because I moved! ?

More by luck than good judgement I managed to avoid being touched, it would have broken me in two. The trigger for this horrendous violence I later realised was because I had picked up the lunge whip on my way in to the school.

There can be only one conclusion to this reaction to the whip, he knew all about the feel and pain of its bite when used in temper in a human's hands. I don't blame the owners, the loaners or any other past owner. He must have learned to fight the loading by fear in a trailer a very long time ago. His first owners had a trailer but he was sold on with the rules of a wagon only...that in its own right poses the question why? Each and every person in his life since had failed to realise that force will simply never work long term and that horses with a predilection to aggression will learn anger so deep, it will consume them and will then appear in so many other directions. Resentment builds into hate... Self protection builds into defence.....a violent downward spiral develops.

Maverik had learned to control people on the ground when something did not suit him. My method of training him was to reclaim control of his feet...forward, backward, left, right and to ground tie (to stay where I put him through my body language command.) I had an interesting few days! I use a whip as an essential extension of my arm for control and drive...not for punishment. The whip needed to give him pleasure from scratching motion. By reverse pressure training I now have him relaxing while I throw the whip all over him, he moves forward, backward, left and right by certain subtle moves of my body and the whip. He has learned to trust it in my hands and no longer shies away or gets angry when I ask him to yield his body and go where I ask. It has been hairy 2 weeks to say the least.

When we first reintroduced the trailer he immediately reverted back to anger. He came at me, he reared , he spun round , he lashed out with those hugely long hind legs but because I did not get cross with him and rewarded every tiny correct move on his part, he calmed down. He slowly started to follow me in but could not bear to stay inside for any length of time. Again through reward he started to stay in it and relax for slightly longer periods of time. When we first tried to fix the bar behind him he instantly panicked and collapsed to the floor while reversing in pure panic. That was so horrible. It upset me greatly to witness his complete instant fear. I at least had my answer as to why he had never been travelled in a trailer. He was terrified of being shut in. It also answered as to why he always tries to turn round and leap back out of the wagon the instant anyone actually got him in.

My next aim was to give him the confidence to load himself inside. If I could get him to want to go in all by himself then this would change everything. Following me in was a really fantastic result but not good enough for him to accept staying in it through his own calm acceptance. This is done through drive....by working him in trot left, right, left, right.....always moving and controlling his feet and direction. He finds that the trailer is where he gets to rest. He reverted back to fury as he fought my control over him and I had 2 near misses again. However the desired change happened. He found rest if he took himself up at ramp. He found relaxation and praise and reward every time he entered that space.....to the point of not even wanting to walk out of the front. All his anger disappeared. His ears pricked and he started to enjoy that space.

We can now just show him the trailer and he puts himself in before we are even ready! He is relaxed, happy, calm, enjoying praise and has let go of all that fear.....a lifetimes worth. We can shut him in from behind now and he is allowed out of the front door...where I might add, he is no longer in a hurry to walk out. He stood on that open ramp yesterday and decide that the hay inside was too nice to leave so he stepped back inside for another few mouthfuls! We all had the biggest smiles on our faces! What a result and what a huge change in this angry horse. His life in everyday terms now will be such a nice life. To no longer feel the need to fight and fear will be heaven on earth for this horse.

He goes home this weekend. The real test will be a short journey first. Fingers crossed he will be able to cope. He has taken such a huge leap forward in trust of humans. His acceptance of that claustrophobic space where there was fear is now soft and willing. Stationary is one thing but motion in transit is another.

WATCH THIS SPACE!!!!!

I want to add something here for all the car drivers who think that we horse trailer drivers are going slow to simply annoy you in your hurry to get from A to B. Horses find it very hard to balance in transit so we have to drive slowly and carefully especially when the horse inside is a baby learning or a damaged one like Maverik. Please don't hassle us or be cross and impatient. Simply understand that we ask a big ask from the occupant when we travel horses and we want them to learn to cope and relax. When you cut us up, blast on the horn while passing or stuck behind and worst of all force us to brake hard, you cause collateral damage to the horse and frighten us owners to death. We cannot be in a hurry and apologise to you for any inconvenience caused to temporarily hinder your progress. It's our world too.

Our Mystery Diners visit the Alishaan, Hallgate, Cottingham



The real taste of India in Cottingham

few years ago, when I was first asked to do reviews of the restaurants and pubs in Cottingham, my first review was of the Alishaan Indian Restaurant on Hallgate, Cottingham. At the time it was one of the few places in the village you could eat out in the evening. Now of course, you are spoilt for choice and you can get food from around the world.

Over fifteen years later, Alishaan is still with us, serving what many people, including me, think is the best Indian food in Hull and despite all the new competition appears to be still going strong.

So, as this will be my last review, I felt it only right to re-visit the Alishaan and see what, if anything had changed.

The Alishaan is situated at 205 Hallgate, Cottingham, near the junction with George Street. Parking is on the street, but all the village carparks are within easy walking distance.

On entering the restaurant, you come into the bar area, which is also used as a waiting area for tables and for takeaways. It is comfortable area, but at busy times it can get a bit crowded.

My wife and I visited on a Wednesday evening in mid-March and decided to go a bit earlier than usual and try the 'Early Bird' menu which is available from 5.30 pm to 7.30 pm at an amazing price of £8.95 for three courses.

When we arrived, the place appeared to be empty as the main room had nobody in it. The waiter took us to our table which was in the rear of the dining room where other diners were sat. I don't understand why the staff sit the small number of diners in this room instead of the main room so anybody looking in gets the impression that the restaurant isn't empty. Anyway that ended up being my only negative criticism of the restaurant.

Our two waiters were friendly and polite and not over attentive, as in some Indian restaurants. They provided us with menus and a wine list, which for an Indian restaurant was quite comprehensive.

The menus are very smart and easy to read and the main menu is very comprehensive with a huge range of starters, ranging in price from £2.95p to £4.95p. These include everything you would expect, from Onion Bhajees, somosas and a selection of kebabs.

The selection of main meals covers everything I would ever expect in a quality Indian restaurant, from Tandoori Specials, the full range of curries, balties, korahi, vegetarian and Chef's specials, ranging in price from £5.95p to £13.95p. Add to this a selection of rice, sides and naan breads and, I think even the most fussy diner will have something to suit their palate.

Because we were both going to have something from the 'Early Bird' menu, we put the main menu aside and having been served our drinks, a glass of house white and a bottle of excellent chilled 'Cobra' beer, we studied the menu.

We started with a couple of popadoms, which were very fresh and crispy, served with a choice of four piddes, again fresh and tasty. For our starter course we both had dishes we hadn't had before. My wife and Aloo Tikki, a sort of potato pancake with cheese and I had a Haryli Kebab, both served with salad and yoghurt and really tasty.

The choice of starters on this menu is obviously limited with about 10 choices and so are the main courses, but don't let that put you off, as they cover all the most popular dishes.

From the main courses, I chose Tandoori Butter Chicken, tender pieces of chicken pieces in a smooth almondy sauce along with a place of pillau rice. My wife had her favourite, Chicken Korma, again with a serving of rice. Both dishes were really tasty with nothing left but a drop of sauce.

We shared a large peshwarri naan bread, which was hot, crispy on the outside and soft on the inside. Unlike a lot of 'Early Bird' menus, the portion sizes here are not reduced in size, they are the same as the main menu, which makes it even better value.

Overall the quality and quantity of the food was excellent and at a total price of £31.25 including a glass of wine and two bottles of Cobra, meant it was fantastic value for money.


This restaurant is an important part of the life of Cottingham and has been for a number of years, has won numerous awards for its food, and if our latest visit is anything to go by, it will for many more.

Moving Abroad? A monthly column by Nick Russell

elcome to the third part of the story where, after a search lasting five years, Nick Russell (ex-Spectrum Video) and his wife Rita finally find the house they have been looking for in Andalucia, Southern Spain. Our next viewing trip was planned for June 2011 and we had decided to look at the area between Antequera and Granada. It is an area that is well served by good roads and the A92 motorway runs right through it. It is also only about one hour from Malaga airport, which is important for us.

We began with our usual internet searches and came across several properties which might be suitable for what we hoped to do. We use Kyero as our property search engine in Spain and it became apparent that properties can appear with more than one agent and more importantly all at very different prices. Therefore, it is very important to do a thorough search as you can.

Selection of Properties

We selected about a dozen properties from three agents across the area which all looked as though they would fit the bill. But as we have found out in the past, that is not always the case. During the weeks leading up to our viewing trip, we kept in constant contact by phone and email with the three agents, hoping that this would help them understand more clearly what we wanted from the search. This might save us wasting time. A couple of the houses were above our budget but the agents felt the sellers would be open to offers due to the state of the property market in Spain and the fact we were a cash buyer. In the time leading up to our visit, we would receive almost on a daily basis, properties that had been reduced in price by up to 70% so we were hoping that we would finally find something suitable and at a bargain price.

We arrived at Malaga airport and headed off in our hire car to meet the first agent, who was showing us a couple of houses quite close to the airport. The first property was in fact two houses in a lovely plot and met all our criteria with the exception of the very high price. The agent assured us the owner would negotiate on this if we were interested, but at 100,000 euros over budget it was unlikely to be a front runner. The second was a no-no from the start as it consisted of a house and two static caravans - not really what we expected.

The next day we moved a bit further inland to the area of the town of Iznajar and met up with the next agent Ed. He showed us a couple of lovely houses, both under our budget which we both liked more than anything we had seen up to then, but my wife was not sure if the location was exactly what we wanted. So the search continued the next day.

If you decide to look at properties in Spain and you set a budget, remember there are 'extras' to add on to the purchase price. These include local taxes, lawyers fees, notary fees and more, and can add between 8% to 10% to the agreed price. The only fee you don't seem to pay is the estate agents fee - the seller pays that!!!

Getting an N.I.E. Number

Also as a foreigner wanting to live in Spain and buy property, to buy a car, open a bank account or the like, you need to have a N.I.E. number. This is an identity number and is used like your National Insurance number over here. It also is used as your tax number for income tax purposes. To get one of these you need to go to a police station with a 'foreigners' desk, usually found in some of the bigger towns, fill in a form, provide passport ID and an address in Spain, which if you are house hunting could be a bit difficult. Also these offices are only open at certain times and in 'tourist' areas can get very busy, with people queuing from 6am. Once the form is filled in, you are given a receipt which you take to the bank to pay, they then stamp it for you and then you return to the office the next day to pick up your N.I.E. on production of your receipt. What a performance but we were lucky that the next estate agent Paul Barnet of Inland Andalucia helped us tremendously by taking us to the office and helping us sort the paperwork out. We still had a problem the next day when he we went back to pick up our N.I.E. numbers, as the guy who dealt with it had gone sick and no-one else could deal with it. Very frustrating as he had to go back the next day on our behalf to collect it. If you need to get one please be very patient!

My wife and I both felt we were now in the hands of an agent who was going to help us find the house of our dreams, and as it happened this was the case.

We had picked out a few properties from his webite to look at, and he met us at our hotel with his business partner Judith to take us out for the day.

It did not start to well as the first couple of houses, although big enough, just did not tick enough boxes. In fact it got even worse as the next couple of houses did not tick any boxes at all.

So feeling a bit frustrated, again, we decided to stop for lunch to discuss our next move

Paul told us he had a property that had not yet gone back on the market after the sale had fallen through in the last couple of days and he thought it might interest us. We thought it was worth a visit, so we headed back to his office to pick up the keys and headed off towards Granada to look at this mystery property, which had been empty for 18 months.

On the way to the property, Paul filled us in the history of the house. It was currently owned by an English couple who had split up and had loads of debt tied into the house, including a massive mortgage that had not been paid for two years, HP payments, utility bills and council tax bills that had not been paid for ages.

Paul explained that, because of these debts, it was very important to get a good lawyer because the buyer becomes responsible for these debts if they are not paid out of the proceeds of the sale. A good lawyer will check al these out and highlight them before the sale is finalised, so you end up with the house free from debt.

The Mystery House

We arrived at the mystery house, after turning off the main road and going up a dirt road for about 500 yards, to be confronted by a huge white country house, or cartijo, surrounded by olive groves as far as the eye could see. The house itself was situated behind electric gates and a boundary of conifers and trees.

Once inside the gates we could fully appreciate the house and huge garden, swimming pool, bar and a smaller house to reform. It also had a fishing lake in front of the house which was quite unusual.

Compared to what we had looked at over the years, this was amazing and we found it hard to believe it could possibly be anywhere near our budget.

Paul showed us around the garden, while Judith opened up the house. Bearing in mind it had been empty for more than 18 months, the garden was in a remarkable state as was the bar area and pool. Obviously the whole area needed a clean and plenty of TLC but it was all cosmetic and straight forward.

Judith had unlocked the house and raised all the shutters on the windows by now, so we went to have a look around the inside. Compared to what we had looked at in the past, the house was huge. It had six bedrooms, three bathrooms, two living rooms, a kitchen and dining room, and, from the first floor balcony, stunning views of the Sierra Nevada mountains as well as the local village and surrounding countryside. The room sizes and layout were perfect for what we wanted to do, and we both had the feeling that, with a bit of work, this was the house we wanted to buy.

Dream House

After the guided tour, Paul and Judith left us to have a wander around again on our own. Although the previous owners had left loads of belongings and rubbish in the house, we could both see past that and as we walked round we were both planning what we could do with the place.

We rejoined Paul and Judith who then took us to look around the three acres of olives that also came with the house and Paul explained how these would give us a small income each year as they could be harvested by the local cooperative and sold for olive oil. This was a bonus that we did not expect.

So after the tour in 45 degree heat, we went back inside the house to cool down and Paul asked us what we thought. My wife and I looked at each other and both said that we loved it and that it was perfect for what we wanted to do.

My only concern was that it would be way above our budget and we were going to be very disappointed. Paul explained that when it first went on the market two years ago the price was 700,000 Euros, way, way above our budget, but, because of the owners financial situation and the bank wanting their money back, the price had now been reduced by a staggering 70% but the deal had to be done within the next three months. If that was not possible, the bank would re-possess the property and sell it at auction. We did not want that to happen, so we agreed there and then to go for it, finally ending our search for a dream home in the sun.

Thank you once again for reading this installment and in next months issue we will go through the trials and tribulations of actually signing for the property and completing the sale, which was not as straight forward as we thought.



New supermarket plans to bring 250 jobs to Cottingham

Station Road Retail Ltd are excited to announce that they have submitted a planning application for their new supermarket proposals at Station Road, Cottingham. The application has been lodged with East Riding Council and follows an extensive public consultation exercise, attended by 500 plus local residents and a number of businesses and stakeholders last October. A wide range of comments were expressed in respect of the proposals during this consultation exercise which led the design team to reassess the scheme in order to address those comments and in order to maximise the benefits for Cottingham.

Simon Dixon who heads up Station Road Retail Ltd states: "we believe that our revised design has addressed a number of the comments expressed relating to concerns in respect of the potential impact of our proposals on the local highway network and the trading position of existing retailers within the village, however much support was also expressed for us to deliver a modern supermarket to address unsustainable shopping patterns which finds 90% of residents undertaking their main food shopping trip outside of Cottingham.

In a direct response to comments we have made the significant decision to reduce the scale of the supermarket by 20% and to no longer include a petrol filling station within our proposals. This will result in 39% less vehicle trips; a major revision that we hope will be welcomed locally. The reduced supermarket will still be of a sufficient size to allow customers to undertake their weekly shop locally and lead to a higher level of retained expenditure within the local area, this change has the added benefit of us being able to retain the majority of the existing business on the site. Whilst Stoneledge Plant and Transport Ltd and Boards (Cottingham) Ltd will still be relocated to more suitable

premises, the new scheme will allow for all existing businesses such as Jacee Print, Cottingham MOT Centre and the Cottingham Cycle Centre to continue trading at Station Road. With the added benefit of the supermarket creating approximately 250 new job opportunities in the local area, we hope this will be seen as a really good economic outcome for Cottingham".

Phil Gorman of Boards (Cottingham) Ltd who supports the scheme states 'whilst we will be sorry to leave Station Road, we are looking forward to relocating the business to a purpose built site that can provide a better sales experience for our valued customers'.

Phil Greenwood of Stoneledge Plant & Transport Ltd comments 'having moved to Station Road in 1978 to accommodate 9 items of plant we have since expanded to over 50 major items of machinery therefore significantly outgrowing our existing premises. By relocating to larger modern premises this will substantially mitigate crippling fuel costs by housing all of our transport under one roof ensuring the protection of jobs, further investment in the business and the sustainability of one of East Yorkshire's longest established companies'.

Station Road Retail Ltd have also made further significant changes to the design of the supermarket which will be highly sustainable, in addition to reinforcing landscaping, tree planting and pedestrian and cycle links across the development site. Whilst at this stage no occupier of the supermarket has been confirmed, various national supermarket operators have expressed interest in the development. Station Road Retail Ltd hope to secure planning permission by the end of the summer.

Museum commemorates Titanic centenary

The community museum in the Beverley Guildhall is today putting on a display about the Titanic almost 100 years after the event, which will include stories about people with links to the local area, and will be on show until 25th May.

The Guildhall (next to the main post office in Register Square) is open every Friday between 10am and 4pm with free admission.

This month sees the centenary of the sinking of the Titanic, which struck an iceberg on the night of 14 April 1912 and sank within two and a half hours, resulting in the loss of over 1500 lives.

At the time this tragedy shocked the world, and 100 years on we are still fascinated by this particular story.

Fiona Jenkinson, curator of the Beverley Guildhall, said: "We are very grateful to people who have come forward to tell us the stories of their relatives who were on the ship, and their knowledge of other links with the Hull and East Riding area.

"Personally I have found researching this display to be very moving. Some of the first-hand accounts written shortly afterwards bring the events of that night vividly to life and go some way toward explaining our continued fascination with Titanic."

Meeting of the **East Yorkshire Association** of the National Trust

Speaker: Dr. David Neave On "Hull's Historic Buildings"

ur speaker illustrated Hull's great history, and pointed out that despite the losses in WWII there are many historic buildings still to be seen.

The town was given the name Kingston in 1293 when it was acquired by Edward I as a New Town. Hull was a convenient base for expeditions against the Scots, its building material was brick, the Walls and Holy Trinity Church, one of the largest in the Country, are of brick. Slides of the interior of Holy Trinity included the colourful angels and stained glass. Edward planned to have just one church in each of his New Towns, though other churches including St. Mary's Lowgate were later built in Hull. The town was a port for exporting wool, with the wharfs for the ships along the river Hull and the merchants had their homes and warehouses behind them along High Street, formerly Hull Street. The town walls including Hull Castle and the Citadel were extended to the East-of the river Hull. Hollar's plan of 1640 show the town was still within these walls. Many fine houses of a later date can still be seen along the High Street, Wilberforce House, Blaydes House Crowle House and Maister House. The Old Grammar School of 1583 was a dual purpose building the school being on the ground floor, and the merchant's trading being done on the upper floor.

By 1784 a Dock had been built replacing part of the Walls and George Street, Charlotte Street and others appear outside the Old Town. The only part of the town walls now remaining are the foundations of Beverley Gate at the end of Whitefriargate, it is always worth looking up when walking down Whitefriargate to see the pediments of its buildings, and just round the corner that of Trinity House.

It was the 19th Century which saw the greatest expansion of the town the construction of many of the fine buildings we see today began with the granting of City status to the town. The Market Hall(1902), the Guildhall(1904), the Maritime Museum, The City Hall (1903), the Dock Offices (1867) now the Town Docks Museum, and many more 20th Century buildings were shown. One of the largest audiences of the season were not disappointed, and showed their appreciation at the end of the talk.

Juicing For Health

regetables are good for our bodies and our minds but sometimes they get kind of ... well ... boring.

Beetroots are not a vegetable that appeals to everyone but they are an acquired taste. Beetroots are rich in a variety of vitamins and minerals. Beetroots help to improve the quality of the blood and they also enhance and strengthen the gall bladder. Do not make a beet juice drink on its own however as it can be very strong. Instead combine it with other vegetables and then blend yourself up a juice that is not only delicious but also very healthy for your body!

Cabbage in its raw form is rich in vitamins, minerals and sulphur compounds. It is also very good for the health of your colon.

If you decide to blend up a juice with cabbage in it then you should drink it as soon as possible. The reason for this is because the essential elements of it will begin to oxidize very quickly. Like beets cabbage should be blended with other veggie to make a juice. You cannot store cabbage juice therefore only make as much as you can drink at one time. Juice the other vegetables first and then juice the cabbage last.

Broccoli is very nutritious for the body. It is a member of the cruciferous family and is full of nutrients and loaded with protein. Broccoli is a green vegetable you can juice and the same can be said for Brussels sprouts. Both have tremendous health benefits and can taste very yummy in a juice once you get used to the taste.

Green vegetables in particular are very worthwhile for juicing.
