Property News from Martin English of Homelink

All White on the Night

ith the recent announcement of a general election taking place, I thought we would take a look at a new 'Housing White Paper' released by the government that might give some important insights to the direction of future legislation and how this might impact on Landlords.

The paper acknowledges that the lack of homes built creates upward pressure on house prices (good for landlords), and upward pressure on rental values (again good for landlords). However, landlords are not responsible for house building, house prices or rent levels, all these are outside their direct control. The idea that building more homes will reduce the price of housing and therefore reduce rent levels is actually mentioned in the White Paper.

Whilst this will not excite landlords, in truth it will not excite the 64% of households who own their own home either. One can only presume that in reality it is more likely to be a lowering of the rate of growth than house prices actually falling. This is confirmed when you look at the target for the number of houses to be built and compare this to the people looking for a home. Without significant public sector house building, more than is currently being talked about, in many areas of the country councils will continue to rely on private landlords in order to fulfil their homelessness functions

Another thread in the White Paper, brought through from the budget Autumn statement, is the ban on fees charged by letting agents to tenants. Whilst in the 1980s it was the norm to charge up to 15 percent 'commission' of the rent for management, increasing competition on the high street has meant that there has been increasing pressure to keep headline commission rates low and seek to make enough money to pay the bills elsewhere. This brought about the practice of charging tenants for some of the costs involved in lettings. The White Paper confirms the Government's intention to consult and then ban agent fees as soon as Parliamentary time allows. The consultation is taking place now and the

legislation is likely to come into force probably in April 2018. In order to continue providing services, this will require agents to raise revenue from other sources and/or cut costs, which in turn is very likely to see a rise in rents to compensate Landlords and agents.

The White Paper is also suggesting that new large scale build-to-let developments should use a three year tenancy. This is an interesting proposal as many tenants may prefer this security. It may also mean that some landlords and agents renting privately may also want some of those tenants seeking longer term stable rentals. To effect such a change in the private rented sector would require many mortgage lenders having to change their terms and conditions.

The Housing and Planning Act 2016 is still awaiting commencement orders bringing into force the sections that will affect private renting. Notable here is the ability to ban landlords and letting agents who are found persistently guilty of not following the law when operating in the private rented sector. In the same vein, the Housing and Planning Act creates the ability for local authorities to have a list of rogue landlords. Banning orders to remove rogue landlords will be introduced.

Another part of the White Paper raises the possibility of introducing mandatory electrical safety check on rented properties for all landlords. These checks are already required on houses in multiple occupation (HMOs) every five years. Mandatory licensing of HMOs currently applies for houses that have five or more people and three or more 'qualifying' storeys. The White Paper also includes a proposal to alter the rule about the number of storeys. This would mean that any house in multiple occupation that has five or more people would need to be licensed by the local authority for the area in which the property is

Earth and Apps and Windows Live Mail News

Windows Live Mail (WLM) is the program that most people use if they are on the Karoo (Kcom) email system. There was a bit of commotion last year when Microsoft discontinued support for their own Hotmail service via WLM, forcing users onto their web service Outlook.com, or the Mail App, which is a tile on the Windows 10 start menu. However, what has been less well publicised is that Microsoft discontinued support for WLM in January this year. That means that although the program may be working fine at the moment, if it goes wrong its going to be difficult to fix, and we can no longer install it for new users, or anyone who has Windows re-installed. There are other mail programs around such as Thunderbird (by the makers of Mozilla Firefox), and Incredimail for those who like smiley faces and animations in their email, and there is another one I have been testing at the moment that hopefully will be viable. For more professional email use the best alternative is Outlook, part of the Microsoft Office suite, but it does cost about £100 more than the home version. But for those who subscribe to Office 365 it is included.

If you're a bit of a plane-spotter or just have a general interest in aviation, there's a new app called *Airspace Explorer*. This lets you explore UK airspace in 3D and see hundreds of planes flying in almost real-time (although some planes are hidden from view for security reasons). It is based on software used by air traffic controllers at the company NATS, and is also designed to re-assure the public on how safely our airspace is managed. At the moment the app is only available for the Apple iPad, but other platforms are being considered. In the meantime, another app that's been around for a few years is *Flightradar24* which provides flight tracking worldwide, gives updated timings, aircraft type etc. You can search by departure/arrival points, airline, country or even nearby flights. Its particularly useful if you have to collect someone from the airport, or if you're travelling yourself!

Google has refreshed its Earth app and website, adding detailed 3D imagery and new "tours" that give people a guided look at exotic locations. The search giant said it had spent two

years developing the new version of the app, which features video content from the BBC and other partners. Some of these include the voice of David Attenborough.

Google Maps and Earth are great for independent travellers. A good tip if you book a hotel is to find it on one of these apps then zoom in to get a 'Street View' and have a look around the area. I have done this a few times and find that when we arrive at the destination and start walking I can recognise the area and get straight to the hotel.

Talking of maps, Ordnance Survey has also released a 3D imagery service to give walkers and cyclists a foretaste of an area they may be planning to visit, showing the landscape in great detail and any hazards that may be missed on a paper map. An annual subscription will cost £19.99 but OS is offering a free 7 day trial here: www.getoutside.co.uk/3d.

Printers and printing have become more troublesome for quite some time now. The main issues are with Wi-Fi printers and failure to communicate, some computers not being compatible with these newer type of printers, and by contrast some older printers not being compatible with Windows 10! If you have a static PC or a laptop that's always used in the same place, I always recommend cabling direct to the printer with a USB cable. That way you have a direct connection, with less chance of anything going wrong. But what happens when your print queue builds up and nothing comes out? The trick is to clear queue and start again. Go into your printer properties via Control Panel, Devices and Printers and cancel all documents (this only clears them from the queue, it doesn't delete any documents as long as you have already saved them). This Microsoft page gives an explanation: https://bit.ly/2oUi9n6



Piri piri chicken and cannellini bean salad

A great make-ahead lunchbox option. Flattening the chicken breasts makes it easier to cook them evenly.

Preparation time: 15 minutes
Cooking time: 10 minutes
Total time: 25 minutes. Serves: 2

Ingredients

- 2 chicken breast fillets
- 1 tbsp Waitrose Cooks' Ingredients piri piri rub
- 3 tsp olive oil
- 1 yellow pepper, deseeded and cut into 0.5cm strips
- 400g can cannellini beans, drained and rinsed
- 10 baby plum tomatoes, quartered
- 1 lime, juiced

- 2. Heat 1 tsp oil in a large frying pan and fry the pepper for 5 minutes. Add the beans, season and warm through, then mix with the tomatoes and transfer to a bowl. Add another ½ tsp oil to the pan and cook the chicken for 3-4 minutes on each side, until cooked through; set aside.
- 3. Mix the lime juice with the remaining ½ tsp oil and a pinch of salt; toss with the pepper and bean mix, spinach and most of the coriander. Divide between plates and top with the avocado. Slice the chicken and scatter over the salad, sprinkle with the remaining coriander and serveral lime wedges, if liked.

Haddock & prawn pie with cheesy potato topping

Preparation time: 10 minutes
Cooking time: 45-50 minutes
Total time: 55-60 minutes. Serves: 4

Ingredients

800g Maris Piper potatoes, peeled and cut into even-sized chunks

30g butter, plus an extra small knob

30g plain flour

400ml whole milk, plus an extra 4 tbsp

400g skinless haddock or cod, cut into large chunks

180g pack Waitrose Raw Jumbo King Prawns

150g frozen petits pois

- 4. Drain the potatoes well, then mash until smooth. Beat in the extra butter and milk, then spoon over the filling. Scatter over the reserved cheese, season and bake for 30 minutes until the fish and prawns are cooked through and the pie is bubbling and golden.

- 3. Heat the butter in a large frying pan and gently cook the brioche sandwiches for 3-4 minutes each side until golden brown. You will probably have to do this two at a time.
- 4. Transfer the fruity eggy bread to serving plates and serve while still warm, dusted with icing sugar.

It's all a matter of taste ...

s in all matters of taste, the topic of wine and food comes with its share of controversy and debate. And where it's especially heated is on the subject of matching wine and cheese.

There are certain wines and foods that delight the taste buds when mixed. Wine seeks relationships with the finer ingredients in life, yet many have a tough time making a sound partnership with cheese. Red is the perceived correct choice but in fact, some cheeses can make a good red wine dull and lifeless.

If you love to end a special meal with a cheese platter, balance the flavours of your wines and cheeses carefully. The stronger the cheese, the more intense its partner should be. But remember that balance isn't about matching like with like . . . in fact, it can be as different as chalk and cheese.

And as with all advice about wine, also remember the golden rule - there is no golden rule! It's what you like that's right. As Oz Clarke says: "Give me a rule and I'll break it. When I see the proliferation of publications laying down rules as to what wine to drink with what food, I get very uneasy and have to quell a burning desire to slosh back a Grand Cru Burgundy with my chilli con carne."

Among the cheeses commonly associated with red wine are blues such as Roquefort and creamy cheeses such as Camembert. However, the creaminess of the cheese can be drowned out by the flavour of the reds' tannins.

Soft, creamy cheeses such as Brie and Camembert coat the palate with a layer of soluble fat, masking tastes. Even if you are drinking an excellent red, you will loose some of its flavour. Instead, a lighter white such as Sauvignon Blanc or Pinot Gris can be a magic combination and, if you're feeling really decadent, match soft, creamy cheeses with extra-dry Champagne and the effervescence will clean the fats from the palate.

If you must be awkward and insist on red with your cheese platter, choose a concentrated, rich red such as Amarone della Valpolicella. This Italian dry red is made from air-dried grapes and can stand up to the most pungent cheeses including Parmigiano-Reggiano and Pecorino. A cheaper alternative is Ripasso di Valpolicella made in the same region.

A perfect partner at any restaurant or at a dinner party is Port and creamy blue cheese. A non-vintage Port is a perfect partner for creamy Stilton, while vintage Port pairs beautifully with feisty cheeses such as gorgonzola.

Epcurious.com wine expert Anthony Dias Blue says: "Port has an element known as rancio - a desirable, rich, oxidised quality, which meshes reliably with the luxurious flavours of such mould-laced cheeses."

But one of my particular favourite wine and cheese matches is to go for something really sweet. When serving a sumptuous cheese platter at a dinner party, try removing the reds and opt for a fruity, vibrant white to complement your range of cheese. Sweet, spicy and fruity German wines such as Gewürztraminers and Rieslings are good all-rounders.

For blue-veined cheeses, choose a sweet pudding wine, particularly Sauternes, which will also work well if you are also serving desserts at the table.

* Lidl is focussing on lighter wines from the Mediterranean for its summer Wine Cellar, with around 35 wines rolling into store towards the end of this month.

The store's consultant, Master of Wine Richard Bampfield, said some were hard to find wines, like an "unquestionable unusual" red Fronton, from Arborescense in the South West of France (£5.99), or the two "interesting" Chardonnay Viogners, one from the Val de Salis in Languedoc-Rousillon, the other a Chardonnay Viogner Reserva Privada from Viajero in Chile (£4.99), as well as a sparkling Ribeiro Santo from Dão in Portugal (£8.99).

However Bampfield said his star wine from the Mediterranean Collection was a Palmela from Portugal (£4.99), a "perfumed, light wine" which was both "grapey and a bit spicy".

s I left work yesterday evening, I attended my local blood donor session and it was whilst giving my 'whole arm full', my thoughts wandered to how similar human bodies are to animal. Yes, it is fairly obvious that we both have a heart, lungs, liver and kidneys but how many of us realise that our pets also have the same medical opportunities as we do?

We at KINGSTON pride ourselves of these ever modernising techniques so I thought I would guide you through some of our latest technology......

CT SCANNER-

We are proud to announce the arrival of a CT scanner that is now up and running once a month at our Anlaby surgery. This is great news because we can now offer advanced diagnostic imaging on-site.

KEYHOLE SURGERY -

Keyhole surgery, known as Laparoscopy, involves smaller incisions and reduced risk of complications. That is why keyhole procedures are routinely performed in human surgery. It involves making 2 or 3 small incisions and inserting a camera and surgical instruments into your pets abdomen to perform the procedure. By reducing the size of the wound

and not placing hands or large bulky instruments into the abdomen we significantly reduce the trauma and pain associated with abdominal surgery. There are also many other conditions that can be investigated and treated using minimally invasive surgery ie: retained testicle castration, aid to diagnosis of liver, pancreas and bladder conditions, tumour investigation and removal and intestinal foreign body removal.

RADIOGRAPHY -

Radiography is an invaluable tool which we use to evaluate a wide variety of problems from broken bones to bladder stones via heart disease and intestinal obstruction. We have invested in excellent facilities to take high quality radio-graphs quickly and with minimal distress to the patient. We are fortunate to have a veterinary surgeon with a certificate in Veterinary Radiology, one of the only few in the UK.

ULTRASOUND -

Ultrasound helps fill in the gaps where x-rays are not so useful. It is excellent for looking at other organs in the body such as liver and heart as well as the first stages of life with pregnancy diagnosis. We have invested in colour Doppler ultrasound. This is a sophisticated technique that allows us to assess leaking heart valves and heart failure in particular. Two of our veterinary surgeons have had extensive additional training in ultrasonography.

IN-HOUSE LABORATORY -

We have a good range of in-house tests which we can run on blood samples. This lets us get results quickly and reliably without needing to send samples to external labs at all the branches.

HOSPITALISATION -

We have wards at all our branches but patients requiring overnight hospitalisation are always transferred to the Park St Hospital where we have night shift nurses so that your pet is cared for 24/7. Your pet will never be left unattended. Our night staff are passionate about their work and will provide continual intensive attention if necessary. We have separate air conditioned dog, cat, small furries and isolation wards and a reptile vivarium. It is this fine detail which sets us apart. If your pet needs hand feeding at 3 am, it will get it. If your pet becomes uncomfortable at 4.00 am it will be noticed and attended to. We have invested in an oxygen therapy cage and infusion pumps to safely administer small drug volumes over time to our smaller patients.

ECG for detecting and diagnosing heart irregularities.

At the beginning of this article I mentioned blood donors and yes.... believe it or not, we actually have a register of canine blood donors. There are requirements that they must measure up to just like human donors but they are simple. Your pet must be aged between 1 and 8 years, weigh more than 25 kg, be generally healthy and not have travelled outside the UK. What can be less simple yet so rewarding? If you have a pet who you would like to register then please do not hesitate to call our Park St surgery.

Kick the Habit

rello again. I hope that you are well. Now then, last month a new report came out that I found disturbing. We are going backwards in child dental health. This particularly grates at me as in some remote parts of Morocco it is improving due to the 'Teeth For Life Programme' that Dental Mavericks have introduced, working with local communities.

So What's The Habit?

The habit is SUGAR, too much to often. Even with good cleaning and Fluoride the balance is tipped in favour of dental decay when there is too much sugar. The other thing is that sugar is known to be worse than fat for obesity and heart disease as well as type 2 Diabetes.

What's The Report Then?

NHS figures obtained by the Royal College of Surgeons (RCS) show there were 9,206 tooth extractions performed on children aged four and under in 2015-16, an increase of 24 per cent since 2006-07. The research by the Faculty of Dental Surgery (FDS), part of the RCS, is the first time long-term data for this age group had been published.

"When you see the numbers tallied up like this it becomes abundantly clear that the sweet habits of our children is having

a devastating effect on the state of their teeth," said Professor Nigel Hunt, Dean of the FDS.

Of the 84,086 tooth extractions on four-year-olds and under between 2006-07 and 2015-16, 47 were performed on babies under the age of one. The data is set





against a 16% rise in the population of children aged four and under over the same period.

The Government has pledged to tackle childhood sugar consumption by means of the Soft Drinks Levy, scheduled to come into

force in 2018, whereby manufacturers will be taxed for the amount of sugar they use in their products. However, Professor Hunt questioned whether the measure went far enough to successfully limit children's exposure.

"Children can eat their daily amount of sugar at mealtimes with no problem, but constantly snacking between meals and bathing their teeth in fizzy drinks gives them no chance," he said. "Removal of teeth, especially in hospital under general anaesthetic, it not to be taken lightly."

Now This Bit Is Interesting

Professor Hunt added that people whose first contact with dentistry was when having a tooth removed were less likely to visit the dentist throughout their life.

Now this makes things like a spiral getting worse. We see quite a bit of this in Cottingham, usually associated with the old school dentist and a bad experience. This creates a programme that is running in the brain. Our job is to provide an update disc. It's not easy sometimes but so rewarding when we see the change in dental health and confidence just coming to see us. It's truly "Life Changing". That's where we get our "Buzz".

You Can't Win Sometimes

As well as allowing their children to consume food and drink which are obviously sugary, many parents feed their children fruit juices without realising that these also have a high sugar content.

Showing My Age

Did you notice that the sweets above are old fashioned ones from the 70's and 80's.

Going to Morocco again with Dental Mavericks in 2 weeks. I'll let you know how we got on this time.



Pollinators in particular are vital for gardens and countryside yet they are in decline. There are a number of plants you can add to the garden that will provide a haven for pollinators. Things like lavender and forget-me-nots are perfect for bees while geraniums and primroses will bring different varieties of butterfly to the garden.

Plant some native British wildflowers or sow wildflower seeds that can be found in our garden centre. They are great for pollinators and look beautiful in borders. Avoiding the use of insectisides in the garden will encourage birds who can then act as your own personal pest control. Add a bird feeder or a few fat balls to encourage sparrows and robins to come to your garden, they will soon feast on those pesky bugs.



10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Prune early spring flowering shrubs now that blossoms have finished.
- 2. Plant up summer bedding and fill hanging baskets.
- 3. Begin growing your own vegetables. A growbag is a beneficial start for your vegetables.
- 4. Keep on top of weeds and regularly hoe bare soil.
- 5. Cut evergreen hedges but check for nesting birds and animals first.
- 6. Tie shoots of climbing plants like clematis to supports.
- 7. Plant container grown roses and shrubs.
- 8. Start slug-proofing your plants with cloche or try traditional methods of crushed eggshells or coffee grounds.
- 9. Plant and grow your own herbs ready for summer. Great for the bees and great for the kitchen.
- 10. Spread shredded bark mulches around shrubs and trees to keep the soil moist for the roots.

Make a Wildlife Habitat

Making a wildlife habitat can be easy. Buy a birdhouse or a bee hotel to you garden, out of the way from cats and dogs. They come in a variety of sizes and shapes. You can even add a little birdhouse that looks like a cottage. Alternatively grow low spreading shrubs or let your hedges grow out so birds and hedgehogs can keep hidden and nest.

If you have room, building your own pond is an excellent way to help the local wildlife. A water source could invite frogs, toads, newts, and maybe even a heron. Adding pond lilies that bloom in the summer will make it a beauty spot as well as a wildlife home. Even a tree if your garden is big enough will help nesting birds and add a place to hang a wildlife house or feeder.

Adding a few logs to the bottom of the garden can also be beneficial if you don't fancy the idea of a tree or pond in your garden. It is a lost cost way to help your local wild-life.



Plant of the Month - Herbs

Create your own culinary herb garden that looks almost too good to eat!

Try planting a selection of tasty herbs valued as much for their ornamental appeal as their flavour. From sage to thyme, rosemary to clipped bay and flowering chives, combine herbs valued for their ornamental beauty to produce long-lasting displays as well as regular pickings for the kitchen.

There are no hard and fast rules about creating herb gardens, but successful designs often define the space using brick pavers, dividing-up the area with small paths to provide easy access for picking. Go for an informal mix or choose a formal pattern or cartwheel design. As a centrepiece plant a large, shrubby herb such as rosemary or sage, a formally clipped bay tree, or a potted herb arrangement.

Rosemary (Rosmarinus officinalis)

Mint varieties

Chives – both regular onion flavoured and Garlic Chives.





Local Beekeeper Neil Gower continues his quarterly look into the world of beekeeping

Has spring finally sprung?

Inever like to tempt fate, but after two awful Spring seasons things aren't looking too bad at the moment in my beekeeping world. My bees have over wintered well and are starting to increase in numbers, and the weather has shown distinct signs of being springlike. The ERYC have started their grass cutting programme and gardeners and allotmenteers alike are hard at work all around Cottingham.

It is at this time of the year that my beekeeping colleagues and I start to prepare for the swarming season and with that in mind a recent story on the BBC sport website caught my eye. Those cricket fans amongst you will be aware that a recent One Day International between South Africa and Sri Lanka in Johannesburg was interrupted when a swarm of bees descended onto the pitch.

They decided to cluster on the wicket-keepers helmet which fortunately was not on his head at the time, but laid on the ground. Play was halted and the players and Umpires had to leave the field. The ground staff were clueless, and even tried to spray the swarm with a fire extinguisher which only served to make them angry. Eventually a local beekeeper who had been watching the game on TV got into his car, drove to the ground and properly collected the swarm so that play could resume. A number of newspapers commented that despite his efforts the beekeeper was not named "man of the match".

It is often stated that bees are at their most docile when they swarm as they have gorged themselves on honey to prepare for what may lie ahead. As a seasoned swarm collector I can assure you that I have evidence to the contrary, so if you see a swarm of bees this season please do not approach them or spray them with water or a fire extinguisher but go to the Beverley Beekeepers Association website and follow the process.

My piece on Manuka honey in the last article appears to have resonated with a number of people and I would like to thank those of you who have commented to me on my travels around the village. You may be interested to know that there have been some further developments and in the latest edition of the British Beekeepers Association newsletter it seems that The Sunday Times recently commissioned the Government scientific agency FERA Science Ltd to carry out some tests.

They were keen to see if the honey in the jar matched the claims on their labels. Fera tested nine different samples of Manuka being sold in the UK and found that three of the samples did not contain the compounds that make up the unique signature for authentic Manuka honey. A number of stores including Fortnum and Mason have now withdrawn the affected products from sale.

I mentioned at the top of the article that my bees had over wintered well. We had an Indian Summer which extended well into the autumn and was followed by a mild winter. I had applied fondant to my hives in early December to supplement the honey stocks as the bees remain active during mild winters and tend to eat more.

I had checked on the consumption regularly throughout the winter months and in mid February I added some pollen substitute to the hives. This is usually the time that the queen starts to lay eggs, and pollen is needed to feed the grubs. The pollen substitute also contains supplements which promotes general well being and good health in the bees. As the land emerged from its winter sleep and the spring flowers and blossoms started to open I could see that plenty of natural pollen was also being brought into the hives in the pollen sacs situated on the worker bees legs.

I was able to carry out my first full hive inspections a good two weeks ahead of my expectation and for the first time in a number of years I was quite pleased with what was laid out before me. My hives had plenty of bees who appeared to be in good health, there was plenty of sealed brood and newly laid eggs showing that I had active queens, and the Spring nectar and pollen were both in good supply and being put to good use. The hives also had drone brood present and as you may remember from previous articles, the drones are the male bees required to mate with new queens. This would suggest that the colonies are preparing themselves for new queens and subsequent swarming.

At the beginning of April I added 'supers' or honey boxes above the brood box on each hive. This gives the bees more space and also allows them to store excess honey in an area which the queen doesn't have access to as it is separated by a queen excluder. This is the area from which I will harvest honey, but more about that at a later date.

I look forward to updating you further in the August edition.

'Times of Old: Retold' - a new oral history project in the East Riding

ast Riding Archives, at the Treasure House in Beverley, are taking steps to ensure that memories of bygone times in the region are recorded for posterity in a new oral history project - 'Times of Old: Re-Told'.

Archives staff are appealing for volunteers to come forward and give interviews about their past experiences of living in East Yorkshire, under one or any of the following themes:

'Village Life'; 'Second World War'; 'Industry & Agriculture'; 'Shopping'; 'Sport & Leisure'; and 'Transport'.

Archives assistant Dr Alex Ombler will be conducting the interviews and has extensive experience of documenting oral histories. He said: "During the 1970s, oral history in Britain was a facet of folklore studies. However, it has since grown to become a vital part of community histories. Today, oral history continues to be an important means by which we can 'make history' that can be recorded, archived and studied.

"We plan to invite members of the public to the Treasure House, either individually or in groups, to share the memories and experiences that they feel are important to their lives in the East Riding."

The recordings will be preserved in the Digital Archive at the Treasure House in Beverley so that this and future generations can benefit from them. Archivist Sam Bartle added: "We already have a valuable audio archive resource, but this project will allow us to build a more extensive collection of material and provide a more detailed and comprehensive record of our social history.

"They say 'there's a book in all of us' and, during the course of our lives, we all have a story or two to tell – some of us more than others. All too often though, these stories go untold, and unrecorded, with many people modestly assuming that no-one would ever want to hear what they had to say.

But they couldn't be further from the truth - what most people don't realise is that, over time, their life stories become a part of the history of the times in which they lived, and they give us an invaluable window on the past and our social history.

It's crucial that these stories are not lost and forgotten."

In the East Riding, the walks described in the booklet include a walk from Hotham village; Beverley Commons; North Newbald; walks around Huggate, Warter, Millington and Fridaythorpe in the heart of the Wolds; Sancton; and Allerthorpe Common.

Walkers are reminded that they are responsible for taking proper care of themselves and any children and dogs that accompany them. Dogs are allowed on Open Access land, but must be kept on leads between March and July.

Planning permission granted for two major flood alleviation schemes – for Cottingham and Orchard Park and Anlaby and East Ella

wo major flood alleviation schemes for the East Riding, each costing £22 million, have been given planning permission.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Planning Committee today (Thursday 9 March) unanimously approved the two schemes – designed to reduce the risk of flooding in the Cottingham and Orchard Park areas and the Anlaby and East Ella areas - subject to planning conditions.

Together they are designed to reduce the flood risk to more than 7,000 properties.

As lead local flood authority, East Riding of Yorkshire Council and Hull City Council are working in partnership to deliver flood alleviation solutions in the area, aimed at reducing the threat of repeat flooding incidents.

The Cottingham and Orchard Park Flood Alleviation Scheme (COPFAS) includes the creation of nine water storage lagoons along Westfield Road, Eppleworth Road, Cottingham and Orchard Park Road, Hull.

Most of the lagoons will remain as agricultural land and grazing paddocks, which the Orchard Park lagoon will remain as playing fields. They will be dry for the majority of the time, only being filled during extreme events of wet weather.

Work on the COPFAS scheme is provisionally scheduled to take place between 2017 and 2020, subject to all approvals being in place and successful land purchase agreements.

The Anlaby and East Ella Flood Alleviation Scheme (AEEFAS) involves the creation of a water storage lagoon, alterations to a second lagoon which would be linked together by a large storm water culvert and watercourse.

A surface water collection area would be sited on the existing Easenby Drain site at Kerry Pit, west of Kirk Ella, and the large lagoon built in the grounds of the former Sydney Smith School off First Lane.

As a further part of the scheme there are plans to create a sports facility and sports pitches on the site off Tranby Lane, however this will be subject to a further planning application.

Work on the AEEFAS site is provisionally scheduled to take place between 2017 and 2020, subject to all approvals being in place and successful land purchase agreements.

Both projects are aimed at preventing further devastating floods like those that struck the East Riding in 2007, affecting hundreds of homes and businesses.

The schemes were developed in close consultation with the Environment Agency, Yorkshire Water and local flood action groups.

Ground surveys and computer modelling of rainfall of the whole catchment area of Hull and Haltemprice have already been carried out to help shape the scheme before the plans were submitted.

Councillor Stephen Parnaby OBE, leader of the council, said: "I'm pleased these important alleviation schemes are going ahead because they are vital to help protect both these areas from the threat of further flooding.

"The 2007 floods had such a devastating affect on so many people and both East Riding and Hull councils have worked together on these and many other schemes to help prevent that ever happening again."

Councillor Alan Clark, Hull City Council's portfolio holder for neighbourhoods and communities, said: "Although flooding hasn't happened for some time now in the wider part of the city it is vitally important that we still need to protect against it and avoid a repeat of 2007.





"Working with the East Riding of Yorkshire Council we can do a lot to mitigate against flooding and the two schemes will do just that.

"I'm very pleased and excited that the schemes will now happen and look forward to working with the East Riding again on the next project to help protect the city."

Funding for the scheme has already been secured from both the Flood Defence Grant in Aid (FDGiA) administered by the Environment Agency, and the Humber Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP), with a grant from the Local Growth Fund.

Street food comes to Beverley's Wednesday Market

Peverley's Wednesday Market will be adding some international flavours from this month.

Street Food @ Beverley Wednesday Market, a new initiative bringing new stallholders to the town selling tasty street food from across the world as well as locally sourced products is now up and running.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council, which runs the market, is aiming to attract new and exciting food businesses from the local area and from across Yorkshire and Lincolnshire to set up their stalls, serving freshly made food cooked on site to residents and visitors throughout the day.

Traders already booked to come initially include those selling pizzas, hog roast and American barbecue, an artisan bakery and locally sourced burgers and sausages, as well as fruit and vegetables.

The council hopes to increase the number of stalls, mixing both traditional and street food, and build on the success of the outdoor cafe culture that already exists in the Wednesday Market area.

Councillor Jane Evison, portfolio holder for economic investment and tourism, said: "We really want to develop the mid-week market and bring the street food experience to Beverley.

"Street food stalls will be something different for the town and we really hope residents and visitors will look around all the stalls, have a bite to eat, and then carry on their shopping in the town, or just visit in their lunch hour.

"We are working with local shops and restaurants because we want to make Wednesday Market a bigger attraction to benefit everyone."

Both Wednesday and Saturday markets in Beverley date back to the 13th century, and traders are still governed and guided by a royal charter.

The council took over the running of the Wednesday market in December 2015.



round 5,000 bags of compost are to be given away free to East Riding residents next month.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council's annual compost giveaways will be held over two weeks at 10 locations across the area, starting in Market Weighton on Tuesday 9 May.

Residents are invited to go along to their local event to collect two free 15kg bags of compost per car, which will be placed in their vehicles by council staff.

All the compost being given away originated from residents' brown bins.

All the food and garden waste placed in the bins – including grass cuttings, hedge trimmings, small branches, leaves, flowers and weeds, all cooked and uncooked food, peelings, plate scrapings, bones, meat and egg shells – gets recycled into quality compost for the garden.

Councillor Symon Fraser, the council's portfolio holder for asset management, housing and environment, said: "The council has been running the compost giveaways for a number of years as a gesture of thanks to residents for their fantastic efforts in recycling their rubbish.

"The East Riding is now the second best authority in the whole of England for its recycling rate and that's down to the support of residents.

"And it's great that the recycled garden and food waste is going to good use and returning to people's gardens as compost."

The giveaways start at 4pm at each site, except the Beverley event which starts at 10am.

The giveaways end when all the bags have been handed out on a first come first served basis.

Piano star Peter Donohoe takes on Hull Philharmonic concert-goers' challenge

he audience has spoken and the Hull Philharmonic is ready to play.

The programme for the orchestra's second concert during Hull City of Culture 2017 will be based on votes cast by concert-goers.

Even before the results were known, renowned pianist Peter Donohoe had agreed to take on whatever challenge came up.

He will be soloist in Tchaikovsky's much-loved Piano Concerto No.1 and in the lesser-known Konzertstucke by Weber at the City Hall on May 13 (7.30pm).

As well as great European classics, the orchestra will take on a celebration of Hull streets by local composer Anthony Hedges and music from Argentina's cowboy country.

Musical director Andrew Penny said audience members were invited to vote for the music that meant most to them.

"It is not strictly a first past the post system as we have to take out the recently performed, the impractical and the unavailable before deciding on a short-list for a balanced and practical programme," he said.

"The vote usually brings a surprise or two. While Grieg's Peer Gynt Suite was a shoe-in for this concert, we're also enjoying rehearsing Estancia by the Argentina composer Alberto Ginastera, which is a great nomination.

"Although Venezuela's Simon Bolivar orchestra has brought it to the wider world, this exciting music is unlikely to have been heard before in our region.

"But there is no surprise about requests for the Tchaikovsky No.1. It's one of the great piano concertos."

Peter Donohoe's debut with the Hull Philharmonic was 35 years ago in Mr Penny's first concert with the orchestra soon after taking joint first place in the International Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow. He has made nearly a dozen visits since as player and conductor.

The orchestra also has a long relationship with Anthony

Hedges, who moved to the Hull area in the 1960s.




