The process of baking is an excellent way to keep both the body and brain active as it involves weighing, measuring and mixing ingredients and stimulating smell and taste.



## Dog Exclusion Zones come into force on four East Riding beaches on 1 May

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council's Coastal Services team are reminding all dog walkers that the annual dog exclusion zones on Bridlington, Hornsea and Withernsea beaches will come into effect from Saturday, 1 May and will

remain in place until 30 September, 2021.

Download a map of the dog exclusion zones by visiting: eastridingcoastandcountryside.co.uk/coast/beaches

The four beach areas affected by the dog exclusion zones are: **Bridlington north beach** – from the north pier to a line extending east from Limekiln Lane.

**Bridlington south beach** – from the south pier to a line extending east from Kingston Road.

**Hornsea beach** – from Headland View to a line extending east from Sands Lane.

**Withernsea beach** – from the steps to the north of the slipway at Seaside Road to the steps opposite Memorial Gardens.

The areas of the promenades in Bridlington, Hornsea and Withernsea adjacent to the beach exclusion zones carry a restriction requiring owners to keep their dogs on leads in those

Outside the restricted areas, dogs are still welcome, along miles of beaches - all the council asks is that dog walkers clean up after their animals and are considerate of other beach users.

Council officers will carry out regular patrols of the beaches and promenades and any owner found breaking the rules will receive a £75 fixed penalty notice.

Officers will also be patrolling other areas to make sure owners clean up after their dogs.

#### £2.3million road improvement scheme aimed at preventing potholes is underway

ork is underway on a £2.3million road improvement scheme across the East Riding which will help to prevent

East Riding of Yorkshire Council's highways maintenance team began work on its annual road surface dressing scheme as part of essential works being carried out on 6 April 2021.

Over the next five months, the highways crews will upgrade road surfaces at 207 locations.


Around 13,000 tonnes of stone chippings will be laid on 67 miles of road, from A roads to unclassified routes.

This year's surface dressing programme has been extended to incorporate some urban sites that were delayed from last year due to the COVID 19 pandemic.

#### £1.2 million improvement scheme planned for busy A164/ B1232 roundabout

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council is developing a £1.2 million scheme to improve the A164 junction with the B1232 at Willerby, also known as The Ketch roundabout.

Queues are often formed on the approaches to the roundabout, particularly on the B1232 from Willerby as motorists wait to turn right onto the A164 towards Beverley. Traffic is forecast to increase in the future with new housing to be built in the area.

To address these issues, the council is designing a scheme to help manage traffic flows and reduce congestion at the junction. The scheme includes the installation of traffic lights on each arm of the roundabout (except Albion Lane), and widening and re-marking of the carriageway to allow more room for traffic to travel through the junction.

The scheme has been developed following in depth discussion with local ward members, after concerns were raised by local residents about the existing traffic issues.

The majority of the funding for the scheme comes from developer contributions secured from local housing developments when planning permission was granted.

Work is likely to start on site in early 2022 and will take around six months to complete. The construction process will be managed to minimise disruption to motorists where possible, although the works may cause some delays to journeys.

When complete, it is anticipated that the scheme will improve overall traffic flow through the roundabout by balancing the demand on each arm of the junction. The council will then consider whether a more significant, longer-term option is required to help manage the future predicted increase in traffic volumes along this key route.

Councillor Chris Matthews, portfolio holder for strategic property and infrastructure, said: "I am delighted that ward members and officers have worked together to agree a much needed improvement scheme for this key junction on our highway network. Motorists will certainly benefit when the works are completed.

"We would like to apologise to any motorists who are caused by delays to their journeys when the work gets underway."

## SAVE TAX BY USING YOUR SURPLUS INCOME

Many clients are worried about paying Inheritance Tax. One way to save tax is to give money away.

A little-known rule concerns "gifts out of surplus income".

Ordinarily if you have surplus income it would accumulate in your bank account and you could end up paying IHT on this at 40%. But the surplus income exemption means that you can give away this income and it will be immediately exempt from IHT, without having to wait 7 years like most lifetime gifts.

There are some special rules about this exemption. First, you can only give away income. This includes your salary or pension, interest, dividends and rental income. Secondly, any gift must not affect your usual standard of living, Thirdly, you must intend for the gifts to continue into the future.

With many taxpayers not being able to spend money on holidays or eating out, they may have surplus income. This could be given away.

Common uses of the surplus income exemption are to pay a regular standing order to your children or grandchildren, to pay school fees, or to contribute to a relative's pension scheme.

There is no limit on the amount of surplus income you can give away. So if you received a large bonus or an unexpected dividend payment then this could be given away free of tax. Also the amount given away can vary from year to year.

You must keep careful records to claim the exemption and we can advise you on this.

Potholes - Continued from page five

Surface dressing is carried out every year by the council between April and August, as a quick and economical way of repairing, maintaining and extending the life of a road.

The work involves spraying hot, bitumen on to the road, spreading chippings on top, and then using a roller to press them in.

The process actively reduces the risk of potholes forming as it seals the road and stops water from entering and damaging the surface. It also improves skid resistance for vehicles

Surface dressing is carried out during the spring and summer months as it requires warmer temperatures for the bitumen and chippings to take effect.

#### Residents and motorists notified in advance

Signs will be placed on all roads involved in the surface dressing a week before the work takes place.

Disruption to traffic will be kept to a minimum, but 20mph speed limits will be in place to protect both the travelling public and the council's workforce. We apologise for any delays to journeys these repairs may have for residents.

Loose chippings are recycled

After the surfacing dressing is complete, any loose stone chippings left behind won't go to waste. Mechanical road sweepers are used to collect up all the loose chippings, which are then stored.

Every two years the council hires a giant industrial washing and grading machine to clean all the loose chippings so they can be recycled and reused on the roads the following year.

The process recycles more than 7,000 tonnes of chippings and saves around £60,000 of council tax payers' money

Adam Holmes, head of infrastructure & facilities at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "We have a trusted track record of delivering innovative schemes to help our residents and businesses. This scheme allows us to continue to improve roads across the East Riding which are in need of repair. We understand that potholes are a nuisance to our residents, so we hope this work can help to treat the roads which require the work most. We'd like to apologise in advance for any inconvenience these works may cause, but look forward to the improvements the scheme will provide'



# Multi-award winning schemes will reduce flood risk to thousands of homes and businesses

The Anlaby and East Ella Flood Alleviation Scheme (AEEFAS) and Cottingham and Orchard Park Flood Alleviation Scheme (COPFAS) have officially opened at a combined cost of over £40 million. Together these multiaward winning schemes will reduce the risk of flooding to over 8000 properties.

In combination with the £14 million Willerby and Derringham Flood Alleviation Scheme (WADFAS), in 2016, the schemes reduce the risk of surface water flooding to over 14,000 properties in the Hull and Haltemprice area. The projects delivered by East Riding of Yorkshire Council (ERYC) in partnership with the Environment Agency and Hull City Council are amongst the largest flood alleviation schemes of their kind in the country and have gained prestigious awards and commendation from industry bodies.

AEEFAS is funded through £16m Flood Defence Grant in Aid (FDGiA) administered by the Environment Agency, and £5.1m from the Governments Local Growth Fund (LGF) secured by the Humber LEP as part of the Government's commitment to the Northern Powerhouse. COPFAS was funded through £14m FDGiA and £5m Local Growth Fund, secured by the Humber LEP and part of the Government's commitment to the Northern Powerhouse, as well as a £0.9m land contribution from Hull City Council.

Following significant flooding in 2007, the council embarked on a series of detailed flood modelling studies across the East Riding. A hydraulic modelling study was completed for the Hull and Haltemprice area to establish the key flood mechanisms and identify a solution in the form of a suite of major flood alleviation schemes.

AEEFAS has been delivered in three phases and includes a new flood storage lagoon capable of storing up to 115,000 cubic metres of water constructed on the site of the former Sydney Smith School. Flood water is diverted away from residential areas in the West Ella Valley and into the lagoon through a series of newly constructed interconnected watercourses, upgraded culverts and a stormwater tunnel. This 1.5km long tunnel was constructed using two 17-tonne tunnel-boring machines. The scheme also utilises an existing storage lagoon alongside Beverley Road to provide additional floodwater storage.

Phase 1 works were undertaken by principal contractor PBS Construction. Phase 2 works were taken on by principal contractor Colas-SIAC Ltd and sub-contractor Humberside Excavations. Phase 3 works were carried out by principal contractor NMCM Plc and sub-contractors Active Tunnelling Limited

COPFAS is split into two phases. Phase 1 consists of a of a large floodwater lagoon constructed in the Orchard Park area. The lagoon temporarily stores water diverted away from residential property through a series of flow control structures and a 500m long siphon. A new fishing pond and wildlife area has been created as part of the scheme to enhance the amenity value of the neighbourhood. Phase 1 works were completed by contractor Jacksons Civil Engineering.

Phase 2 consists of a series of 9 interlinked flood storage lagoons along Westfield Road and Eppleworth Road in the Raywell Valley, Cottingham. Together both phases of COPFAS have the capacity to store over 330,000 cubic metres of floodwater. Phase 2 works were completed by principal contractor Esh Construction.

The storage areas will be dry for the majority of the time, only filling during times of extreme wet weather. This allows for multi-purpose amenity use in the form of sports pitches in the case of the lagoon constructed on the former Sydney Smith School site. Other lagoons will remain as agricultural land. Both schemes have already operated as designed over the winter of 2019/20 and again during Storm Christoph earlier this year, to reduce flood risk to thousands of residents in the Hull and Haltemprice area.

Councillor Chris Matthews, East Riding of Yorkshire Council's portfolio holder for strategic property and infrastructure, said: "It's a real credit to the council's staff and our partners that these two award-winning flood defence schemes are operational.

"We understand how much flooding can have devastating impacts on our communities so schemes such as COPFAS and AEEFAS are essential to reduce the consequences of future flooding in the East Riding."

Stephen Parnaby OBE, Chair of the Humber LEP, said: "We're extremely pleased work has been completed on these two important flood defence projects, which the Humber LEP supported through the Local Growth Fund.

"Communities across the Humber continue to be affected by flooding and we are very glad to see both flood alleviation schemes completed and begin to help protect residents and businesses across Hull and East Yorkshire."

Dean Hamblin, Environment Agency senior flood advisor, said: "It's fantastic to see these two award-winning flood alleviation schemes completed. East Riding has done a superb job developing these three innovative flood storage schemes, better protecting thousands of homes from flooding and making the area more resilient to climate change.

"Flood storage areas are a key defence against flooding in Yorkshire and worked to great effect during Storm Christoph in February where they helped reduce the impact of flooding to thousands of people by storing floodwater and slowing the flow through towns and villages. They also provide vital habitats for wildlife, and green spaces for communities to enjoy.

"The schemes form a key part of the £200 million package of work being delivered in East Yorkshire and Hull to reduce the risk of flooding to more than 50,000 homes and businesses."

#### Wines of the Languedoc-Roussillon

Slightly strange, I know, but I want to write about some wines that you can't actually buy in this country, right now. Hopefully that will change soon but the important point is that it gives me a chance to write about a region whose wines I really love.

It may comes as a surprise if I say that my favourite French wine region is the Languedoc-Roussillon. And while it may not have the immediate glamour, say, of Bordeaux, Burgundy or the Rhone, I would argue it has a claim to be the most important.

To explain why, it's necessary to explain a little of the complicated way wines are classified in France (and the rest of the EU).

As a way of maintaining quality and consistency, wine is classified in two product categories - they are either a PDO (Protected Designation of Origin), which means they are "produced, processed and prepared in a given geographical area, using recognised know-how", or PGI (Protected Geographical Indication), which, to confuse matters even more is usually referred to as an IGP.

Broadly speaking, it means a product closely linked to the geographical area in which it is produced, processed or prepared, and which has specific qualities attributable to that geographical area.

Each EU country has its own quality categories which correspond to both a PDO and a PGI; in France the former is AOC (Appellation d'Origine Contrôlée) while the latter is VDP (Vin de Pays). It's those AOC and Vin de Pays terms that you are most likely to see on the labels of the wines you buy.

So, back to the Languedoc . .

The PGI/IGP category is further sub-divided into geographical areas and the IGP Pays d'Oc covers the Languedoc-Rousillon, one of the largest wine-growing areas of France, producing the majority of the country's IGP wines; hence the argument that it is the most important.

The Pays d'Oc spans an extensive area running from the Pyrenees along the Spanish border to the Camargue. It runs parallel with a 200-kilometre stretch of the Mediterranean coastline yet also extends inland over rolling hills and mountain foothills.

This 120,000-hectare swathe of vineyards fosters a variety of weather patterns and soil types, that unleashes huge potential for a selection of classic, native varieties. But when you combine them with an eclectic choice of 58 permitted grapes, the possibilities are endless.

Some of the varieties such as Riesling or Gewurtztraminer may seem counter-intuitive, whilst others - like Tempranillo and Nielluccio - are a long way from home. All of them, though, have been given the chance to express themselves freely by the region's creative winegrowers, under the watchful eye and stringent palates of the custodians of the Pays d'Oc IGP designation.

The traditional southern varieties that are Grenache, Carignan, Syrah, Viognier and Rolle (aka Vermentino), which double up as appellation mainstays, feature both as stand-alone varieties and in red, white and rosé blends, again ramping up the region's diversity.

Of those just mentioned, it's Carignan that I really have a soft spot for, ever since I visited the Fitou wine region, and more specifically the village of Tuchon, as the guest of the local wine co-operative.

Carignan is traditionally the signature grape variety in Fitou, although today it shares prominence with Grenache. For almost a century Carignan was regarded as a high-volume, cheap wine, or as a variety to be blended with more "noble" varieties to provide freshness. Under the Pays d'Oc IGP label it is possible to discover its potential, with rare fine wines coming from old vineyards and some new plantations.

While Grenache gave fruit and sugar, Carignan was known for its tannins and acidity. This acidity which was regarded for so long as being a disadvantage is today recognised as offering attractive vibrancy. Carignan even has its own fan club. I'm a member.

Styles can range from vibrant wild berry fruit and a crunchy character to intense spice, blue-black Cassis fruit, rich black chocolate and amazing acidity.

So, to those wines not yet on sale in the UK . .

You WILL find many examples of Languedoc wine on our shelves but there's a current campaign by the Pays D'Oc to promote them generally to demonstrate the diversity found across the region and as a result I was sent three samples to taste. The hope is they will become available in the future.

Old Star Carignan Noir, from the family winery run by Olivier Coste is an example of 100 per cent Carignan. The fact that it's not a blend is relatively rare but is what makes it so special. Aromas of dark stewed fruit and spice make it delightful to drink on its own or with hearty, rustic, meals. Currently it costs 8 euros in France.

Les Jamelles Le Beillon is another example of a 100 per cent Carignan red wine and a step up in class (it currently sells for 19.95 euros). It offers an exquisite variety of aromas and flavours: dark fruit (blueberry, blackberry), floral notes (elderflower) and a spicy finish (pepper) with a delicate hint of menthol. Stews or venison dishes would be a perfect match.

Finally, I tried a biodynamic Syrah - Secret De Lunes, which was a revelation. Very aromatic, it offered a lovely freshness, fruit notes mixing with subtle toast aromas. This wine, currently selling for 9.8 euros, would go well with red meats, either grilled or with a sauce.

I do hope we see these wines on Uk shelves in the future; in the meantime do look our for some Pays d'Oc wines already on sale.

## **Instinctive Horse Training with Melanie Watson**

Part 2 of my article covering the complex issue of Separation Anxiety in horses

In my first article on this huge subject of separation anxiety in horses, I covered the reasons as to why this emotional state happens to some individual horses. I explained the causes and where it can all stem from. In this part 2 article, I am covering what separation anxiety looks like. The observable behaviours and the predictors which will likely elicit this unwanted emotional state in a horse.

#### What does separation anxiety in horses look like?

**Suffering horses show inconsolable grief.** Their behaviour can become extremely manic and has the potential to become very dangerous for not just the horse. Horse owners and handlers have to deal with this situation and can put them in the line of fire.

The observable behaviours related to separation anxiety will become obvious if a suffering horse is ever left on its own or if changes in its immediate environment predicts that it is likely to be left on its own. The horse will quickly become over threshold and its brain and body will immediately be filled with **adrenaline and cortisol**. Adrenaline raises the heart rate and evokes primal freeze, flight or fight emotions. Cortisol is the stress hormone which drive the horse into primal behaviours to find safety. In this heightened state of fear driven arousal, the horse will be displaying abject fear behaviours.

Inside a stable or in a small confirmed area, the suffering horse will boil over emotionally as its threshold or tolerance level is reached. Manic behaviours will come to the fore. The horse will start rushing around and around inside that space looking for a way to escape. It is very likely that it will charge at the door, rearing up at the door and trying to jump out. If a human is caught up inside this situation then it is very likely that he will be crushed at the door, squashed against the walls, trodden on or even kicked out at. In this moment, the horse will only ever perceive you as a threat to its wellbeing. You will not exist to that horse as anything other than to be avoided or got rid of. Getting a head collar on in that moment in time in

order to try to remove the horse is a huge risk to the human.

Unfortunately suffering horses will soon learn to associate us humans with forcing imprisonment and denying them access to the one place it feels safe- its bonded partner horse or herd. They could develop avoidance behaviours where they will not be caught.

**Separation stress will elicit vocalisation**. The horse will start to whiney and call out at the top of their voices, reaching out to any other horse for reply. This may still happen even while surrounded by unbonded horses if their friend of choice is removed.

In a field, an inseparable horse will suffer an emotional melt down if its friend is taken away or if it perceives that the human will be trying to remove him from that environment.

Its grief will be exhibited with the same behaviours as described above with confinement in a stable. That suffering horse will try hard to re-join its friend. In this heightened state and left on its own in a field, it may well try to run through or jump the gate or the fencing. It will start to pace the fence or gallop around the field.

If a human is trying to lead the suffering horse away from its friend, then be prepared for rearing, striking out with its front legs, spinning, pulling back, reversing, being dragged or even being run over. In this heightened state, hurting itself or hurting you will not be a consideration. The fact is that being left alone is so averse to that horse that come what may, it will try to find its way back to the company of another horse or its bonded partner.

In extreme circumstances, experiencing separation can lead to an emotional system called Rage – this is the very last place on earth we would wish our horse to visit. Resource guarding their pal can mean that this suffering horse could turn aggressive to any human approaching. It could charge at you with ears pinned back and do anything to stop you gaining access to the other horse. Equally it may learn that it needs to control that other horse so as to never allow it to become caught by a human. In this case you will be witnessing herding behaviours. Mostly humans would perceive and label these horses as dominant and dangerous. It is common to have these horses labelled as bullies and as being nasty, whereas in actual behavioural terms, that horse is just trying to control its environment so that it can feel safe.

In this article, I have taken some of the observable separation anxiety behaviours to the extremes, but mark my words- it is a very common occurrence worldwide.

There may well be gradual indicators in behaviour to alert you of the emotional state of your horse. My advice is to listen to your horse. There is never unwanted behaviour for no reason and every single behaviour is telling you something. Separation anxiety problems can be helped and changes can be made developing calmness in situations and on their own, willingness to check in with you and want to stay with you, confidence in their own skin and build mutual trust within your relationship.

It requires a very well thought out plan of campaign

The training is slow and you must be patient. Every day you will be setting up the training in small increments, a little longer in separated duration or a little further away from the "safe" place. It requires the use of **systematic desensitisation and counter conditioning**. Operant training with positive reinforcement and target training will come into the mix once a degree of emotional shift has occurred. **This is the role of a horse behaviour consultant** to mentor you through all the specifics, explain all the relevant terminology thoroughly and plan how you can manipulate your own environment to set up training



#### You are not alone

hoosing a pet can be an emotional decision. Pets we had as a child, pets we know through family and friends, or those we see in the media can all influence our decisions.

The UK is a nation of animal lovers, 95% of dog owners, 93% of cat owners and 91% of rabbit owners say that owning their pet makes them happy. Sadly, being loved doesn't always translate to good well-being and recent research shows that many pets are not having their 5 Welfare Needs met (ENVIRONMENT . . . living in a suitable place, DIET . . . having the right type and amount of food, BEHAVIOUR . . . being allowed to show normal behaviour, COMPANIONSHIP . . . living by themselves or with other pets and HEALTH . . . staying healthy). Understanding their needs before getting a pet is the best start but the report also shows that 21% of current owners had done no research before taking on a pet and over a quarter of owners (26%) were unaware of the Animal Welfare Acts, which outline the five Welfare Needs. For eg:

1.3 millions dogs ..13% are not walked every day, 1.9 million dogs ..19% are left alone for 5 or more hours every day, 55% of owners rely on past experience to train their dogs with 12% of dogs have had no training at all..67% of cat owners with 2 or more cats provide only 1 or no litter trays at all..43% of cats live in a

multi-cat household which can cause stress. 25% of rabbits are kept in inadequate housing condition, providing no hay which is their main daily food. 49% of rabbits live alone despite needing the companionship of their own kind.....THE LIST GOES ON.

FACT...Sadly, did you know that the main reason for euthanasia under the age of 3 years is due to behavioural problems? I am afraid that during 2020, mainly due to the pandemic, more and more problems are being seen such as separation anxiety. The most common scenario being, March 2020 when we saw the beginning of lockdown. People were sadly confined within their own four walls unless they were fortunate to not be furloughed. #### Motoring - with Roy Woodcock



# The push towards persuading all of us to go electric when we go motoring is gathering pace; witness the new all-electric Mazda MX-30.

Roy Woodcock reports . . .

azda is joining the electric revolution with its battery-powered MX-30 compact SUV. At a glance it's very similar to the Japanese brand's more conventional CX-30 but with rearward opening back doors, lashings of environmentally-friendly features and superb all-round handling the MX-30 will get the neighbours talking.

With zero emissions and fine performance, the MX-30 is set to carve out a niche for itself as a keenly-priced family car that competes with the best of its electric rivals. That said, the price went up £500 before I got the chance to put the test car through kits paces.

Blame it on the Government - which that very day lopped £500 off its previous £3,000 electric vehicle sweetener grant. Which must mean the Whitehall mandarins reckon we don't need as much tempting to turn to plug-in power as we used to, hoping to turn a trickle into a charge.

Initially, four trim levels will be offered with the line starting from £26,045 which,in the current EV world, is highly competitive.

The range will top out with high specification GT Sport Tech models costing from £30,345 with mid-grade Sport Lux versions sitting in the middle at £28,045.

For the time being Mazda is also offering the MX-30 in First Edition specification priced from £28,445 and these come with adaptive LED lights at the front, more at the rear, a satin finish side panel in the trim as well as an eco-friendly interior that can be found on all versions with grey or man-made leather seat upholstery made from recycled plastic bottles.

All versions have a high equipment list that includes a reversing camera, cruise control, sat nav and a heads-up display as standard.

The MX-30 has a city-friendly range of up to 165 miles on a full charge and in everyday use Mazda says it should be capable of around 124 miles before needing to be plugged in.

That's similar to what can be expected from the electric version of the MINI and the Honda-e and Mazda says its research indicates that most drivers travel less than 30 miles on a daily basis.

Recharging from a fast charger can be done up to 80 per cent of battery capacity in 36 minutes. A full charge from a home charging point will take around five hours.

Each model comes with a Type 2 AC charging cable and a socket for DC rapid charging and the car's recharging point is situated on the rear offside wing,

On the road it is as complete a family car as can be imagined and the Sport Lux model we tried was showing an available range of 116 miles at the start of our drive.

Fifty six miles of good motoring took the car's battery capacity down to 45 per cent and the remaining range to 58 miles with the onboard trip computer revealing we could have added a further 16 miles to our range had we not been using the climate control system.

The MX-30's systems can also be hooked up to a smartphone app for remote use and monitoring and give information about all aspects

of operation including how long it will take to recharge as well as allowing for journey routes to be loaded and for the car to be preheated before you get in.

It's all very civilised and makes the MX-30 as well equipped as some EVs costing almost twice as much.

Performance data reveals a 0 to 62 acceleration time of 9.7 seconds from the car's 145 horsepower powertrain, with a maximum speed of 87mph.

Boot capacity ranges from 366 litres to 1,171 litres with the rear seats folded – and that's much more than that of the electric version of the MINI or the Honda-e.

The MX-30 we sampled sat on 18-inch alloys and its SUV-like styling was embellished with body protection running from bumper to bumper and around the wheel arches and sills.

It's a stylish take on design and the MX-30 feels a real driver's car with precise steering, quiet running embellished by a faint "real car" noise from a sound generator and regenerative braking allowing for single pedal use.

The regeneration settings – which boost the car's range by putting power back into the battery under braking - are controlled via paddle shifters either side of the steering wheel and offer two levels to help get the best out of the electric motor.

Other handy features include an auto-hold function for the electronic parking brake which is sited on an elevated central control panel above a sizeable device storage area complete with two USB ports and a 12-volt outlet.

An 8.8-inch widescreen display screen sits at the top of the dashboard with a secondary seven-inch colour touchscreen to control the ventilation settings sited aft of the gear lever on the central console.

There's also a seven-inch TFT display contained in the instrument panel to give the driver extra information about the car's status and performance.

The cabin is designed to seat five in some comfort and the MX-30's "freestyle" doors are something of a wow factor.

Mazda had a similar arrangement on its RX-8 rotary engined sports coupe some 10 years ago but the set up on the MX-30 is much more practical. With specially=designed hinges that prevent the rear doors opening independently, the front doors of the MX-30 open to an angle of 82 degrees allowing the back doors to be released to an 80 degree angle.

As such there is easy access to either the front or back seats with a wide, pillarless opening with rear seat entry helped by a clever folding mechanism which moves the front seat forward at a single touch.

And while the rear side windows may be on the small side there is an adequate view out and the whole interior has a high class feel.

Safety systems include blind spot monitoring, rear cross traffic alert, lane keeping and emergency braking as well as a driver attention monitor.

Realistically, there is little missing and for a car that is little bigger than a Ford Focus a whole lot has been included with considerable style.

The MX-30 is a car for the modern age – electric, well equipped and packed with panache yet one that handles so sweetly it cannot fail to leave a smile on your face.

However, with a new season begins a new series of garden rubbish and mess.

- 4. Keep on top of weeds and regularly hoe bare soil.
- 5. Cut evergreen hedges but check for nesting birds and animals first.
- 6. Tie shoots of climbing plants like clematis to supports.
- 7. Plant container grown roses and shrubs.
- 8. Start slug-proofing your plants with cloche or try traditional methods of crushed eggshells or coffee grounds.
- 9. Plant and grow your own herbs ready for summer. Great for the bees and great for the kitchen.
- 10. Spread shredded bark mulches around shrubs and trees to keep the soil moist for the roots.





#### Make a Wildlife Habitat

Making a wildlife habitat can be easy. Buy a birdhouse or a bee hotel for your garden, out of the way from cats and dogs. They come in a variety of sizes and shapes. You can even add a little birdhouse that looks like a cottage. Alternatively grow low spreading shrubs or let your hedges grow out so birds and



herbs valued as much for their ornamental appeal as their flavour. From sage to thyme, rosemary to clipped bay and flowering chives, combine herbs valued for their ornamental beauty to produce long-lasting displays as well as regular pickings for the kitchen.



One-off grants of up to £6,000 are available for non-essential retail businesses, and up to £18,000 for hospitality, accommodation, leisure, personal care and gym business premises.

The Government has asked councils to obtain further information from businesses as part of the grant scheme. Therefore East Riding of Yorkshire Council has contacted all businesses who have previously been awarded a Local Restrictions Support Grant (closed businesses) to obtain supplementary information and an application is available for other eligible businesses that are registered for business rates. All applications will be subject to a number of fraud checks which the Government requires councils to undertake ahead of payments being processed.

The council started making payments from Thursday, 15 April 2021.
