





Free compost giveaways to be held in May

The ever-popular free compost giveaways run by East Riding of Yorkshire Council are to be held in May.

Nine giveaway events are to be held across the East Riding from 13-27 May, where 55 tonnes of compost - around 4,500 bags - will be given away.

All of the compost has been recycled from the garden and food waste that residents have placed in their brown bins.

Residents are invited to drive along to their nearest event, where they can claim two free 15kg bags of compost. The bags will be placed in their car boots for them.

The giveaways follow successful events held in May and September last year, which were well-supported by residents.

The giveaways are expected to return this September.

Brown bins can take grass cuttings, hedge trimmings, small branches, leaves, flowers and weeds, all cooked and uncooked food, peelings, plate scrapings, bones, bread, meat, eggshells and small amounts of soups, sauces and gravies.

All brown bin contents get recycled into compost by the Biowise plant in Willerby – where all the giveaway compost comes from.

Carl Skelton, acting director of streetscene at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "These compost giveaways are always popular and are the council's way of thanking residents for recycling their waste.







Which side of the fence are you on?

he Grand National has just been run again amid big controversy.

It is a horse race which engenders many emotional responses depending on where you stand in support or against. This particular horse race certainly seems to be the one race in the entire British racing calendar to cause so many mixed emotions and THE most controversy.

It has certainly faced numerous challenges over the years, mainly related to the subject of animal welfare and the lack of it.

The main arguments against are:

• The undeniably high number of horse deaths and injuries on the track. According to Animal Aid, 62 horses have died at the Grand National Festival since 2000, and very many more (behind the scenes) have suffered life threatening stress fractures, ligament and tendon sprains, significant cuts and lacerations, alongside seriously deep and damaging bruising. Of cause, we never get to hear about any of that side of things! It is kept quiet

and out of the public eye as is the way in all horse sports events. Who wants to hear what the real impact is on individual horses across the board?

- The Grand National is considered one of the deadliest horse races in the world. The whole festival is racing horses over massively challenging fences and its death and injury toll is enormous. The next big killer of racehorses is the Gold Cup. Its 3 day festival always claims several horse lives each year. The National has 2 fences, which pose the greatest threat to the lives, legs and necks of the horses. Becher's Brook and The Chair. Both these fences have been lowered in recent years because of the death and injury toll to the horses, however they remain the main culprits in killing and crippling competing racehorses each and every year.
- That race horses are purely disposable commodities being exploited for entertainment and gambling.
- Too many runners allowed to start the race. **40 horses and jockeys** all setting off, jinking and crowding each other trying to find a good line. Being cut off in front of fences and having nowhere to land safely in balance. Too crowded. Too long. Too challenging and totally dependent on our variable weather conditions
- That there are not enough safety measures implemented and that the fences should be lowered and softened to try to stop rotational falls. Animal welfare should be the no1 priority which is sadly not the case. Start numbers should be halved.
- The jockeys are there by choice, being paid and all wanting that prestigious win. This impacts on welfare hugely as the chance to win will override any concern for the animal beneath them. The horse is merely a tool for their vanity. Whipping a tired, flagging horse is unforgivable. Whipping a horse anytime, any where is equally unforgivable yet racing has the legal right to allow and encourage the use of whips on horses. It is legal animal abuse.

And so the list goes on. Google offers up another 10!

In defence of the big race and the 3-day festival is the right to uphold its tradition. That there are vast amounts of money to be earned for a few (the racecourse itself, gambling businesses, TV and media deals and the sponsors). That local businesses like shops, hospitality, hotels and petrol stations all benefit, and that it creates employment (mostly temporary)

Jockeys, racing stables and their staff all need the employment. Farmers benefit by providing forage and bedding and feed companies provide the hard feed needed for the horses.

I'm weighing up the scales here. What are your thoughts?



Celebrate King Charles III with Champagne

"ell, here we are in May and what a month in prospect . . . I'm sure we'll all be raising a glass in celebration of the King's Coronation on the 6th; a glass (or two) of fizz is definitely in order - Champagne preferably.

Talking of which, not surprisingly, there are many anticipating our demand for anything that will help us remember this historic day. Souvenirs of all shapes and sizes abound and communities up and down the country plan to come together with special events that ensure we stay in celebratory mood across the whole extended weekend.

In the world of wine, Moët & Chandon is marking the Coronation of King Charles III and Queen Consort Camilla with the release of an exclusive Moët Impérial magnum that's fit for Royalty.

Moët has a longstanding historical association with the British Royal Family. In 1893, Queen Victoria granted the house a Royal Warrant, meaning that it was supplied to the Royal household.

In the 20th century, this relationship would continue, with Coronation cuvées being released for Edward VII (1902), George V (1911) and George VI (1937) and Elizabeth II (1953).

The house also marked the Silver, Golden and Diamond Jubilees of the late Queen with the release of limited-edition Champagnes. It was also one of a number Champagne brands to hold a Royal Warrant from Elizabeth II, alongside Bollinger, Pol Roger, Lanson, Mumm, Krug, Louis Roederer and Veuve Clicquot.

The souvenir bottle (a magnum, of course, being the equivalent of two standard bottles) features a badge commemorating the May 6 date of the ceremony in Westminster Abbey, and a label which commemorates the date, time and location of the ceremony and reads: "The House of Moët & Chandon are proud to present this special cuvée to celebrate the Coronation of His Majesty The King.

The recommended retail price for the limited-edition Moët & Chandon Impérial Magnum, which will be available online from May 1, is £96. And should you see the bottle as an investment, rather than for drinking on the big day, I've seen auction listings for Queen Elizabeth II's 1953 Coronation Champagne selling online in the range of £400 – £600.

I should also say I've seen, as a much cheaper option, souvenir Champagne gift packs, including one from Moët than includes a 20cl bottle (enough to raise that glass), along with a souvenir flag and beer mat in a commemorative box for £28. And I don't suppose there'll be any shortage of similar



Motoring - with Roy Woodcock



Deep pockets may be needed to step into the new Peugeot 408, but you'll be rewarded with something a little out of the ordinary. Roy Woodcock reports . . .

I'm going to wax all lyrical here, because sometimes new cars really make an instant impression. Now, I concede we tend to say good things about most cars these days (and it's a truism that there are few, if any, really bad cars any more) but Peugeot really have pulled off something to admire with the new Peugeot 408.

It only became available to UK drivers in February but I was lucky enough to be amongst the first motoring journalists to drive one and the week I spent with the car went by all too quick.

Let's get the negatives out of the way quickly . . . on the road prices can make you wince a bit, particularly as you go up the range. Prices for the 408 start from £31,050 for the 1.2 PureTech petrol in the base Allure trim, travel via Allure Premium at £32,175 and reach £34,650 for the GT.

Other engine choices, currently, are two plug-in hybrids, based on a 1.6-litre petrol engine but giving either 178bhp or 222bhp and if you choose the range-topping GT Hybrid with the most powerful PHEV powerplant then the price reaches £44,700 on the road, or £48,025 for the model I was driving, which came with things like a "spoiler sunroof" tinted with interior blind (£900), premium hi-fi (£600) and four digital cameras (£450).

Fully electric models will follow in due course, we're told. But back to what made me so impressed by this car: It's incredibly comfortable, oozes quality and is very smooth to drive. Journeys seemed effortless.

It's quite a head-turner, too, the dramatic five-seater, with an eye-catching sloping roof and deep macho grille, is an innovative cross between a sleek fastback, almost coupe-like, with almost SUV-like amounts of useable space.

Sit inside the 408 and you are faced with Peugeot's latest i-Cockpit, similar to that in the 308, which features a 10-inch digital instrument panel as well as a 10-inch touchscreen. The GT model uses 3D technology which allows things like satellite navigation instructions to stand proud of the other details on the screen which makes them much easier to view.

I found the cabin spacious and business-like yet at the same time trendy, with the trim again reflecting the interior of the new 308. But while leg room in the 308 is adequate in the 408 it's positively lounge-like.

A minimalist approach means there are few dashboard

switches as most operations are carried out on the touchscreen, but responsive voice control helps to lessen the time your eves are off the road.

The high-tech onboard technology on the 408 means the car can be set up to recognise individual drivers so as you take your seat your personal preferences are activated, changing everything from radio stations, to display settings and even ambient lighting colours. It's all geared to the Bluetooth connection on your smartphone.

The compact gear selector in the centre console falls easily to hand as does the button which give you access to a choice of three driving modes. All the cars also come with paddles behind the steering wheel for manual gear changing.

And as it's a family car there's generous luggage space, with 536 litres in the petrol models – rising to 1,583 litres with the rear seatback lowered - and 471 litres in the hybrid version, rising to 1,545.

The new 408 benefits from a range of convenience and safety features. As standard, new 408 models are equipped with a 180-degree Colour Reversing Camera, rear parking sensors and Peugeot "Smart beam" High Beam Assist, while safety is improved via Advanced Emergency Braking as well as Extended Traffic Sign Recognition.

A range of further safety features are available across the various trim levels, including Long Range Blind Spot Detection and Rear Cross Traffic Alert on Allure Premium models.

GT models get a powered hands-free operated tailgate as well as the bonus of a heated steering wheel and seats and full Matrix headlights as opposed to eco LEDs lights on Allure and Allure Plus models.

Performance wise, acceleration is crisp and precise, covering 0-62mph in 7.8 seconds. Hybrid models are capable of an electric range of 40 miles, resulting in a Benefit-in-Kind (BIK) rate of just eight per cent for business users (2022/23).

Overall, this has been a car a long time in the making (seven years from the first production sketches to an actual production model, we're) led to believe, but well worth waiting for. It's one of those vehicles that really does stand in a class of its own.



Instead of peat, which is excavated and can devastate the local wildlife and eco system, has been replaced with a 100% sustainable source, coir. Made from coconut husks, the coir is better for the environment and better for the plant as it protects the roots from over saturation making healthier plants. The roots and coir are kept together by biodegradable netting, which protects the roots, and means you won't be coated in mess.

Attract Wildlife with Plants

Adding animal and insect friendly plants to your garden for the summer will bring your garden to life (as well as help out the local wildlife). Pollinators in particular are vital for gardens and countryside yet they are in decline. There are a number of plants you can add to the garden that will provide a haven for pollinators. Things like lavender and forget-me-nots are perfect for bees while geraniums and primroses will bring different varieties of butterfly to the garden.

Plant some native British wildflowers or sow wildflower seeds that can be found in our garden centre. They are great for pollinators and look beautiful in borders. Avoiding the use of insecticides in the garden will encourage birds who can then act as your own personal pest control. Add a bird feeder or a few fat balls to encourage sparrows and robins to come to your garden, they will soon feast on those pesky bugs.



10 Jobs for this month

- 1. Prune early spring flowering shrubs now that blossoms have finished.
- 2. Plant up summer bedding and fill hanging baskets.
- 3. Begin growing your own vegetables. A growbag is a beneficial start for your vegetables.
- 4. Keep on top of weeds and regularly hoe bare soil.
- 5. Cut evergreen hedges but check for nesting birds and animals first.
- 6. Tie shoots of climbing plants like clematis to supports.
- 7. Plant container grown roses and shrubs.
- Start slug-proofing your plants with cloche or try traditional methods of crushed eggshells or coffee grounds.
- 9. Plant and grow your own herbs ready for summer. Great for the bees and great for the kitchen.
- 10. Spread shredded bark mulches around shrubs and trees to keep the soil moist for the roots.



Make a Wildlife Habitat

Making a wildlife habitat can be easy. Buy a birdhouse or a bee hotel for your garden, out of the way from cats and dogs. They come in a variety of sizes and shapes. You can even add a little birdhouse that looks like a cottage. Alternatively grow low spreading shrubs or let your hedges grow out so birds and hedgehogs can keep hidden and nest.

If you have room, building your own pond is an excellent

way to help the local wildlife. A water source could invite frogs, toads, newts, and maybe even a heron. Adding pond lilies that bloom in the summer will make it a beauty spot as well as a wildlife home. Even a tree if your garden is big enough will help nesting birds and add a place to hang a wildlife house or feeder.

Adding a few logs to the bottom of the garden can also be beneficial if you don't fancy the idea of a tree or pond in your garden. It is a low cost way to help your local wildlife.

Create your own culinary herb garden that looks almost too good to eat!

Try planting a selection of tasty herbs valued as much

for their ornamental appeal as their flavour. From sage to thyme, rosemary to clipped bay and flowering chives. combine herbs valued for their ornamental beauty to produce long-lasting displays as well as regular pickings for the kitchen.

There are no hard and fast rules about creating herb gardens, but successful designs often define the space using brick pavers, dividing-up the area with small paths to provide easy access for picking.



Weekend of medieval re-enactment to come to **Sewerby Hall and Gardens**

werby Hall and Gardens will welcome Sir John Savile's Household to the Grade I listed house for the first time this May.

The sound of handgonne fire and the clash of amour will be heard coming from the event field when the Household will demonstrate medieval warfare during The Wars of the Roses period. Visitors can expect to see a variety of warfare, with a contingent of archers demonstrating the use of the feared English longbow and a small company of foot soldiers which include bill men, men-at-arms, crossbowmen and gunners.

Sir John Savile's Household, which was formed in 1995, portrays the family, servants, and retinue of the Savile family from the middle of the 15th century until the beginning of the reign of Henry Tudor. It is a member of The Wars of The Roses Federation and stages historic re-enactment displays for several clients including English Heritage and The National Trust.

The group will be fully equipped with a living history camp, complete with medieval tents. They will demonstrate the everyday tasks of medieval life to visitors, such as chopping wood, fetching water, food preparation and often cooking meals on open fires to feed the camp.
