

# Taxman to take second bite of offshore

lans to offer British taxpayers a second chance to come clean about offshore bank accounts could help speed up a complex crackdown on evasion.

HM Revenue & Customs has already granted one amnesty to those hiding money in offshore accounts to pay outstanding tax, plus interest and a 10% penalty.

Last year HMRC raised £400m after UK taxpayers with money in offshore accounts run by high street banks were offered leniency in return for voluntary disclosure.

Tax experts said HMRC raised less money than it hoped under the offshore disclosure

facility, however, and have called for the second amnesty to be given more publicity.

A second amnesty on the income tax owed on interest earned in overseas accounts could help HMRC clear the backlog of cases in its offshore banking investigation, covering tens of thousands of investors with bank accounts in offshore centres ranging from Liechtenstein to Bermuda and Jersey

Last month HMRC said it had opened enquiries into 12,000 accounts and would proceed with a further 79,000 over the next two years

Plans for a second amnesty come as HMRC faces growing pressure to show a breakthrough in its investigations.

It is keen to announce a high-profile criminal prosecution of taxpayers to act as a deterrent and show progress, but none has been forthcoming.

Some experts have said HMRC does not have enough experienced staff to manage the investigation and much of the information it has obtained from banks is of poor quality.

At a meeting earlier this month with tax experts from the accountancy institutes and big firms, HMRC confirmed that it was considering a final offshore tax amnesty. It is expected to be based on information from a much wider range of financial institutions possibly more than a hundred.

HMRC has also told accountants that it is considering a series of offshore tax amnesties, although this is thought to be the less likely option. 'It's aimed at clearing the bulk of low risk and low value [unpaid tax] cases,' said one tax partner familiar with the HMRC offshore crackdown.

Tax experts expect the penalty for a second tax amnesty to be slightly higher than it was under the first one, probably at around 15%.

Our advice is If a client [with undeclared tax from an offshore account] phoned me tomorrow my advice would be to settle now rather than wait for a second offshore disclosure facility.

HMRC has always insisted that the investigation remains on track, adding it has enough staff working on the investigation.

In an effort to clear some of the smaller cases, HMRC has written to around 5,000 individuals who are suspected of failing to make disclosures under the first tax amnesty. The letters are a more low-key approach to formal enquiries that do not involve large sums of money but can be expensive and time consuming.



# Report from the Local Police

Councillors pointed out to the police any areas of the village where they felt specific problems were being experienced and the police will monitor. Residents must be vigilant and maintain security of property at all times.

# Removal of the Parrots in St. Mary's Church Grounds

A reply had been received from ERYC who had investigated who would be responsibility for trapping the parrots. The Diocese office had informed ERYC that the Parochial Church Council would need to give permission for the work to be carried out and that they would pay for it as they are the landowners. Investigations are ongoing.

# **Planning Applications**

Application no 2459 – erection of Nitrate Removal Process building and wastewater tank and construction of access road at Keldgate Pumping Station, Keldgate Road, Cottingham for Yorkshire Water Services Ltd. Councillors unanimously felt that if ERYC were minded to approve this application then stringent conditions should be attached to ensure that the surroundings are suitably landscaped; the building materials are similar to the original buildings and sympathetic to the surrounding and that if possible the building should be sunk into the ground to minimise the impact on the landscape.

# Report from the Allotment Committee

There were continuing problems with vandalism and vermin but overall the plots were in a very good condition. There was still a waiting list for plots.

# **Capital Projects**

Tree Planting – Only one site had been identified for tree planting following an article in the *Cottingham Times*. It was suggested that more trees could be planted at the top of Harland

Way. Any additional suggestions from Councillors and residents would be gratefully received. It was pointed out that Mr Wiles at Cottingham Golf & Leisure Club had embarked on a large tree planting operation and Members asked the Clerk to send a letter recognising this.

# The Community Plan

The draft plan was discussed at the Steering Group meeting which took place on Thursday 9th October. Once the suggested changes have been incorporated it was agreed that the draft plan would be circulated to all interested parties, together with a covering letter supplied by D Hickling. A six week consultation period would be allowed with hard copies available from the Parish Council office and an electronic version loaded on a suitable website.

# Proposed Zebra Crossing near Park Lane/Northgate Junction

Consultation documents had been received about a proposed zebra crossing; Cllr Cooper had received numerous complaints from residents that the site was dangerous and he had drafted a reply to ERYC. Mr Reed, ERYC Engineer, had e-mailed to report that prior to the public consultation process they had consulted the traffic police, EYMC and the ERYC Traffic and Highways section all of whom had no concerns with regards to road safety issues on the proposed location. Councillors had no objection to a crossing but did not feel that the proposed location was the safest place.

# Proposed Zebra Crossing on Caukeel Lane/Northgate

Consultation documents had been received about a proposed zebra crossing. The Council supported this proposal.





# **Beef Casserole**

340g/12 oz lean stewing beef, diced.

2-3 Sticks celery chopped

2 carrots diced

227g/8oz swede, peeled & diced

340g/12oz cabbage shredded

426/3/4pt stock made with Bovril seasoning

- 1. Pre-heat the oven to 180°C/Gas 4 Place the beef in casserole dish with the celery, carrot, swede and cabbage. Pour the stock over, seasoning to taste.
- 2. Cover and cook for 2 1/2 hours until the meat is cooked and tender. Serve with a selection of vegetables.



# Shepherd's Pie

Serves 4

Tip If you are not a fan of turnip, you could use mashed swede or carrot (or all three mixed - its delicious)

454g/1lb Turkey mince

1 large onion chopped

1 carrot finely chopped

113g/4oz mushrooms sliced

seasoning - including beef or chicken bovril from the jar 681g/1 1/2lbs turnips mashed

You can use lean beef, or lamb instead of turkey

- 1. Preheat oven to 200°C /Gas 6
- 2. Mix the turkey or beef/lamb, onion, carrot and mushrooms in a casserole dish, season, cover and bake for 35-40 minutes until the turkey is thoroughly cooked.
- 3. Meanwhile peel and cut the turnip into cubes, place in a large saucepan and cover with water. Add a pinch of salt, bring to the boil and cook until tender. Drain well.
- 4. Top the turkey mixture with the turnip and crisp under a pre-heated grill for 10 minutes or until the turnip browns. Serve with a generous helping of green vegetables.

# Creamy Pasta Bake

255g/9oz dried penne pasta 4 Courgettes

1 Red and 1 yellow pepper

2 red onions

4 garlic cloves

Fry Light

2 x 400g cans of chopped tomatoes

2 tsp dried mixed herbs

Salt and pepper

300g pot very low fat natural fromage frais

- 1. Preheat oven to 200°C/Gas 6 Cook the penne pasta according to the packet instructions, drain and set aside.
- 2. Cut the courgettes into thick strips, deseed and cut the peppers into strips, peel and roughly chop the onions and peel and finely chop the garlic. Place the vegetables in a large roasting tin and sprinkle over the garlic. Spray lightly with Fry Light and bake in the oven for 15-20 minutes or until tender.
- 3. When cooked, transfer the vegetables to a bowl. Add the chopped tomatoes and dried herbs, season well and stir to combine. Place the mixture in an ovenproof dish.
- 4. Beat the fromage frais until smooth, season and toss with the drained pasta. Spoon over the vegetables and return to the oven to cook for a further 15-20 minutes. Remove from the oven, divide between four warmed serving dishes and serve immediately with some boiled green beans.





puppy I thought, after all I've been telling people how to look after dogs for twenty years, it will be easy!

First though I sought the advice of our head nurse Louise Norman. Louise runs the behavioural side of the practice, Scallywags, and is very keen on puppy behaviour and socialisation. Louise's first words of wisdom were "get a pen for your puppy".

So one Friday night I brought the little puppy home, the kids couldn't believe their eyes as she ran around the garden with her long gangly legs, neither could my wife, who is afraid of dogs(the result of her grandparents' dogs biting her when she was a child).

The easy part was bringing the puppy, now called Jazz, home. Now the hard part, looking after her!

Ground rules had to be laid down. At night she would sleep in her puppy pen, her bedroom if you like. Dogs will not mess where they sleep so this made house training easier, along with over the first weekend taking out into the garden every couple of hours and rewarding her if she "performed". In two days we had managed the housetraining.

Socialising Jazz at a young age was the most important thing. Puppies cannot go for walks until they are 13 weeks old but need socialising before this, so walks consisted of being carried around the streets in our arms so she could get used to the traffic noises and people in the street. We encouraged lots of different ages of children to come and see her at home so she was not afraid of young children.

Jazz attended the practice's "puppy parties" when she was 8 weeks old, where she would meet and socialise with other young pups while my wife and daughter were helped with behavioural advice by Ruth, our dog trainer.

Not everything went to plan though. Jazz is very possessive over food, so to avoid this Louise told us to feed her in the garden and spread the food around and this has worked well.

A year has passed now since we got Jazz and she has been the best 40th birthday present Sally says, hard work at times, but a joy to see her running on the beach enjoying herself.

# **Home Improvements**

Although a modern extension can look good on an old house, when it comes to selling on it is important to appeal to the average buyer's taste. Therefore it is more advisable for an extension to match the architectural style of the existing house.

Be strategic: Extra bathrooms and large kitchens are usually good investments in family-sized homes, and a garage in a busy, urban area will also add value.

The room that usually benefits the most from enlarging is the kitchen. Adding a kitchen/diner creates the farmhouse kitchen most people want and provides extra space. The old dining room can become an office, playroom, or an extra sitting room. 





# Switch on Night 2008 November 24th Don't Miss It:



The 27-year history of Cottingham's Christmas Lights will have a new first this year when two winners from raffles taking place within Cottingham, and Mabom Shearer, son of Chris Shearer switch on the illuminations for the much-vaunted festive-season spectacular on Monday, November 24, at 7pm.

The youngsters will be accompanied on the switch-on rostrum, opposite the Memorial Gardens in Hallgate, by BBC Radio Humberside presenter Steve Massam, who lives in Cottingham, and who will be Master of Ceremonies - a duty he has undertaken for many years.

After switch-on night, the lights will be in daily operation from midafternoon until early January, but they will be switched on all day on Saturdays and on Christmas Eve.

After year-long planning, installation got underway in October, with Hull-based lifting services firm, Peter Hird and Sons Ltd., of English Street, assisting with hoists.

Although the displays this year have not changed significantly since 12 months ago, there has been further massive investment in the lights, which have become a crowd-pulling Christmas highlight and placed Cottingham under a bright and colourful spotlight in the much wider East Riding area in the last 27 years.

A large percentage of the cash injection has been on refurbishment and "unseen" maintenance work including welding repairs carried out by Les Fisher free of charge. To meet increasingly stringent health and safety requirements, renewal of power supply cables and wiring which carries the festoons - the straps of lamps which criss-cross the streets - has also been a major and costly project. All scaffolding has been donated by Alan and Shirely Reid of B. A. Scaffolding.

The hi-tech, energy-saving lamps offer a five-colour sequence change and produce a flowing wave-like effect from the traffic-lights junction to George Street.

As well as adding to the spirit of Christmas and the New Year, it is hoped that, as in past years, the illuminations, which are concentrated on the main village-centre shopping areas - and overlooked from the east by the floodlit towering St Mary's parish church - will again attract visitors and shoppers to Cottingham from throughout the Hull and the East Riding region and even further afield.

In addition to grants from the Cottingham Parish Council to each of the three sections - King Street and West End, as well as

Hallgate - additional money has been raised from a series of regular annual activities. They include a golf tournament, bingo sessions, a Christmas raffle, as well as a stall, operated by the West End Section, on the village's Thursday Market.

The resurgent children's favourite, Chitty-Chitty-Bang-Bang, the flying car - enhanced by four light-spangled Christmas trees - will this year feature on the roofs of the Chinese and Indian take-away restaurants in Hallgate.

Carols and other festive-season music, commencing at 6.30pm, will be provided by the award-winning Cottingham Band on switch-on night when, in addition to a wide variety of side-shows and charity stalls throughout the village, there will be children's fairground rides in Hallgate and on the Market Green, where the trees will be festooned with festive-season lighting.

Street sellers have again been asked to apply for a "Cottingham Lights Official Hawker" badge, and officials have has appealed for the public to buy items only from the official hawkers displaying their official badge.

Also making a return this year will be the KCFM Radio's promotional vehicle - and stage - which took part in Cottingham Day 2008 celebrations.

Based outside the Duke of Cumberland Hotel on the Market Green, one of the station's presenters will compere the activities - including music and competitions for which there will be prizes - led by the promotion team, who will mingle with the crowds and also collect money to donate to the lights fund.

"We will interact with the people of Cottingham and our emphasis will be on enhancing what is always a brilliant event", said Sarah Harrison, Marketing and Events Manager for KCFM, which broadcasts to Hull and East Yorkshire.

Throughout the afternoon and evening, village-centre road closures and parking restrictions will be in operation. Parking will not be allowed on the Market Green after 3pm. Hallgate will be closed at 5.00 pm and other road closures, from 6pm until 9.30pm, or at the discretion of the police, will be: Hallgate (from Arlington Avenue to West Green); the George Street junction with Hallgate; King Street, from the junction with Finkle Street to Somerfield's car park, which will be open.

This year, Gary Mitchell the new owner of the Post Office in Finkle Street will be holding a super Tombola with prizes including, Spirits, Wine and chocolate and many other excellent prizes on the Lights Turn on night within the Post Office. Tickets for the tombola are £1 for five tickets. All proceeds to the Cottingham Lights Fund.

There will also be many Craft and other stalls in the Cottingham Civic Hall on the Market Green.

The Cottingham Neighbourhood Policing Team, said that, throughout the event, police officers and PCSOs, in high-visibility uniform, will patrol on foot to provide the public with reassurance and to prevent any public disorder or alcohol-related incidents. The principle intentions are to ensure the safety of persons attending the event and to control the traffic, minimising any inconvenience caused to the general public and other road users.

Officers will deal with any incident promptly and efficiently to minimise disruption to the event and reduce danger to the public, he stressed.








Here is Paul's ninth walk in his monthly column. This month his destination is South Cave.

Maps:- EXPLORER 293 Start at GR. 923313 Roadside Clock Tower. Distance 4.5 Miles.



eave the cross roads near the clock tower and walk in a north easterly direction towards Beverley/Cottingham.

After about 400 metres turn left into a surfaced lane and follow this lane as it bears right and then becomes a track through Little Wold Plantation. On reaching the track at the top of the plantation, turn right and follow this track to meet the road at a point known as Beverley Clump. Turn left on reaching the road and follow the road as it swings to the right and pass the Radio Masts. On reaching the entrance to Weedly Farm on your left, locate a stile on your right and cross into the field and walk with the hedge on your right. Cross a second stile and walk along a grassy track with the hedge on your left and, on reaching a junction of paths, turn left towards Mount Airy Farm. Pass through the farm and leave on a surfaced road. This road swings sharply to the right and after a further 400 metres, locate a path on the left and follow this towards South Cave. On reaching the road turn left back to the cars.

An alternative route can be taken. On reaching the path junction prior to Mount Airy Farm, instead of turning left turn right and follow a clear path to meet the farm road and continue down this farm road to meet the main road. Turn left and walk back to the cars.

# In the Garden





# Fruit and Vegetable garden

Plant any cane, bush and tree fruit ordered last month. Do not plant if the ground is frozen or waterlogged. If the planting site is not ready when plants arrive, then heel in the bare-root ones in a spare piece of ground, and leave containerised ones standing - but water them when needed.

Start winter pruning of established, open-grown, apple and pear trees (not cordons, espaliers, pyramids or fans).

Gooseberries, redcurrants and blackcurrants can be pruned from around now, but it might be better to wait until late winter/early spring, so that any winter damage can be removed at the same time. Grape vines can be pruned from now through the winter. Doing this early for those under glass will allow more light to reach other plants in the glasshouse or conservatory. Prunings can be used as hardwood cuttings.

Cut out the fruited canes of blackberries and hybrid berries, if not yet done

Formative pruning of young, free standing, fruit trees and bushes (under three years old) can also be done from now. They should first be pruned to encourage branching and bushiness from the main stem. Subsequently, they should be encouraged to form an open centred 'goblet' shape of main branches, without any being misplaced or crossing.

# Mulch fruit trees and bushes.

Lift and divide rhubarb plants to propagate them, or to rejuvenate old

Strawberry runners that have been potted up for forcing in February and March next year, should now be turned on their sides, or placed in a wellventilated cold frame. Excess moisture or warmth could cause rots or precipitate premature growth.

Hardwood cuttings can be taken this month - this is a great way to propagate blackcurrants, redcurrants, white currants, gooseberries and grape vines - providing they are disease (especially virus) free.

Grape vines can also be propagated using eye cuttings. These are shorter than standard hardwood cuttings (having only one bud, or 'eye'), and are used commercially to produce a large number of plants. Only attempt these if you are confident, as longer cuttings have more buds to rely on for root-

Clean and store bamboo canes in the shed (or other dry place) to ensure they're still in good condition for next year.

# Vegetables

Harvest leeks. They can be heeled in horizontally into a shallow trench outside the back door, for easy access.

You may have other vegetables ready for harvest: Jerusalem artichokes, winter cabbage, spinach, Swiss chard, kohl rabi and radishes can all still be cropped

Cauliflowers can be harvested, or left in situ with the leaves snapped and folded down over the curds to protect them.

Lift and store root crops such as carrots, beetroot, turnips and swedes.

Parsnips can be left in the ground until needed, or lifted and then buried in a shallow trench for easy access when needed. They taste better when frosted. Make sure to mark the trench.

If you have Brussels sprouts ready for harvesting, pick the largest sprouts from the bottom of the stalk first.

Stake any Brussels sprouts stalks that look leggy and vulnerable to wind

Plant garlic cloves in modules inside a cold frame, or outdoors in mild areas in its final position (free-draining soils and low rainfall areas only).

Dig over, incorporating well-rotted organic matter if available and weed vacant areas of the vegetable plot. Once they are fully wetted by winter rain, cover them with thick black polythene or other opaque covering, and leave them until next season, when they will be easy to prepare for planting and sowing.

# Top 10 jobs

- 1. Clear up fallen leaves especially from lawns, ponds and beds
- 2. Raise containers onto pot feet to prevent waterlogging
- 3. Plant tulip bulbs for a spring display next year
- 4. Prune roses to prevent wind-rock
- 5. Plant out winter bedding
- 6. Cover brassicas with netting if pigeons are a problem
- 7. Insulate the greenhouse from frost bubblewrap works well
- 8. Stop winter moth damage to fruit trees using grease bands around the trunks
- 9. Put out bird food to encourage winter birds into the garden
- 10. Use a seasonal bonfire where this is allowed

After digging, you may want to mulch.

Now is a good time to get ahead and prepare new asparagus beds for planting up in the spring. Plenty of organic matter and grit will help to improve drainage to the level required by asparagus. A raised bed could be a good investment on heavy clay soil, to make it more asparagus friendly.

# Flower garden

Plant tulip bulbs this month. Some tulips persist year to year, some perform less well and are treated as bedding, and replaced every year.

Lily bulbs can still be planted in pots this month (if available). They can either be brought inside next spring to 'force' them into an early display, or left outside to flower naturally in summer.

Last chance to plant out winter bedding. You could try wallflowers, forget-me-nots, Bellis, Primula, Viola (winter pansies) and other spring bedding plants, planting them into well- prepared ground, or pots of suitable compost. Water them if no rain is forecast, using stored rain or recycled water wherever possible.

Now is a good time to plant new herbaceous perennials, as the soil is still warm, but moister than it was during the summer.

Penstemons are best left as-is (except for deadheading) until the spring, when they can be cut back further. In mild areas they can carry on flowering well into the late autumn and early winter. The old faded stems will help to protect the crowns from cold. Mulching over the crowns in colder areas

It is still a good time to lift and divide overgrown clumps of herbaceous perennials. This can improve shape, vigour and flowering, as well as increasing your stocks of favourite plants.

Lift and store dahlias, cannas and tuberous bedding begonias that have been hit by the first frosts. Only in mild areas can dahlias and cannas be left to overwinter in the ground, covering the crowns with a protective layer of straw or bracken, but they may come into flower very late the following year as a consequence of cold weather. Begonias should always be brought in, dried out, and stored in a similar way as for dahlias.



# Carbon Monoxide Detector Alert

ast Riding of Yorkshire Council's Private Sector Housing Team would like to make residents aware of the safety recall of non-com-✓ pliant JO-EL domestic carbon monoxide alarms.

In tests commissioned by the council's trading standards service, the JO-EL COA-001 domestic CO alarm, which is stocked by John Lewis amongst other retailers, failed to respond to potentially harmful concentrations of carbon monoxide. This resulted in an immediate safety recall at the end of July.

The trading standards team has advised that retailers and consumers should only purchase alarms that have been proven to comply with the European standard- EN 50291.

Residents who believe that these alarms may be installed in their property are advised to alert landlords and tenants of the potential danger of these devices and urge them to ensure that all carbon monoxide detectors comply with EN 50291. 

# Secure your PC & keep your data safe

BC Radio Humberside asked me to do a short 'security special' on the breakfast show recently, following a report by Humberside Police that more businesses in this area were being targeted by hackers and Internet fraudsters. Security is of paramount importance, and whether you are running a business or just using your computer for fun, and you're connected to the Internet, then the advice is the same.

A simple 4 step process: Updates / Anti-virus / Anti spyware / Firewall. Make sure you are getting the latest updates for your software, i.e. Windows Updates, go into Control Panel and ensure Automatic Updates are On. Check your anti virus & anti spyware programs are also updating themselves. If your subscription has expired (and we come across this all the time!) make sure you renew it, or get yourself a new one. This sort of protection is not an option – prevention is cheaper than cure! Check your Firewall is switched on, again in Control Panel. Or you may have a program like Zone Alarm, or an all in one security suite that includes a firewall.

Wireless networks are also a hot topic, so if you have one, ensure that is secure/encrypted. It is not a good idea to use your own name or address as the network name, as this information will be beamed to anyone else who has a wireless device in their home or office in your area. Keep it anonymous and secure. Then your computer is actually safer behind a router, because it also has an in-built firewall.

Lastly, do an inventory of your equipment; is it reasonably up to date? You shouldn't really be running a business from a 7 year old PC for instance. Why? – because modern components like the latest processors, have a more secure architecture to begin with, so you are building on a stronger foundation.

Which leads on to security of data. The mention of backing up data will have most people shuffling uncomfortably or finding an excuse like walking the dog in order to put off the job. But it need not be a daunting task and it certainly should be on the list of everyone's priorities. Most of us have much of our lives stored on our computer. Just think about it; important correspondence, emails & address book, your family tree (how many hours did that take?). All those irreplaceable family photographs or even videos, and maybe a whole music collection. We have had computers brought into the office that have failed to start and their owners are understandably concerned about 'all the stuff stored on there'. When we enquire if they have a back up of their important data, the answer is normally a sad refrain that it was done a couple of months ago, or it was on the to-do list!

So how do you go about doing a back up? In the old days when things were in black and white and files were much smaller, you would just insert a floppy disk and save to that. But nowadays, files are huge so you need a better solution. The nearest thing now to the old floppy is a memory stick, or pen drive, call them what you will, but they will take thousands more items in one go! Just plug in and they are ready to use (provided you have Windows XP or later). Then there are CD, or now DVD writers (another reason for using a newer computer). A CD-R will hold around 650Mb and a DVD-R up to 4.7Gb (dual layer disks take over 8Gb). That's many thousands of pictures or even hours of

To back up to a disk in Windows, just find the folder/s, right click, and on the 'Send to' menu that appears, click the name of your CD or DVD writer drive. Windows will then make a copy ready to burn. If you want to create a DVD, use software like Nero or Roxio to choose the files you want to save. A good tip here is to do it as a 'data disc' not a 'back up' format, because then you will be able to view the contents and open or save onto any other PC. Lastly a very popular option now is the external hard drive, which has a huge capacity up to 1Terabyte (1,000Gb). Couple this with some very easy to use back up software and your worries are over!

# Do You Know about E-Smog?
