

Property News from Martin English of Homelink



What are the Landlord's rights of access for repairs?

have a problem with tenants renting a house as they will not allow anyone into the property to carry out maintenance works. I would like to rectify mould all through the house and replace a cooker that is not working. What is the Landlords legal position in regards to accessing the property?

Legally, the answer to your question is quite straightforward. The Landlord and his letting agent have a legal right to enter a property to carry out repairs.

Section 16 of the Housing Act 1988 deals with access for repairs and states:-

"It shall be an implied term of every assured tenancy that the tenant shall afford to the landlord access to the dwelling – house let on the tenancy and all reasonable facilities for executing therein any repairs which the landlord is entitled to execute."

Failure to provide access would be a breach of the tenancy agreement and a landlord could use ground 12 to obtain possession for that breach.

You would need to give at least 24 hours notice for entry at a reasonable time of the day to avoid getting caught by the tenant's implied right to quiet enjoyment.

A similar situation can arise when access for gas safety

checks arise, which are a legal obligation for a Landlord to carry out at least on an annual basis. A landlord has to show that they took all reasonable steps to comply with the law. HSE recommends the following best practice in these circumstances and strongly advises that a record be kept of all correspondence with the tenants:

Leave the tenant a notice stating that an attempt was made to complete the gas safety check and provide your contact details;

Write to the tenant explaining that a safety check is a legal requirement and that it is for the tenants own safety. Give the tenant the opportunity to arrange their own appointment;

HSE inspectors will look for at least three attempts to complete the gas safety check, including the above suggestions; however the approach will need to be appropriate to each circumstance. It would ultimately be for a court to decide if the action taken was reasonable depending upon the individual cir-

It is a good idea to include arrangements for access in the tenancy agreement.

Problems in the Snickets

The Proposed Order to Stop Up North Moor Lane

The Planning Inspector's report and decision on the proposed stopping up of North Moor Lane has been received and the Inspector has upheld the Secretary of State's decision that the order should be made.

Parish Council Projects

Councillors are always looking for projects to improve the village and the quality of life of those who live here – some small and some large. For the next financial year (2010-2011) Council intends to investigate the possibility of repairing the Memorial Garden gates and updating the Roll of Honour on the gates with the names of those who have fallen since WWII. Another suggestion for a project is to clean the War Memorial in St Mary's churchyard and repair the lettering. Whilst we need to look into how much these projects will cost we also need to obtain the permission of the organisations that own these items so it may well be a long process.

Community Facilities

The Council has been concerned at the lack of community facilities in the village for some time – the lack of a home for the Scouts & Guides; the burning down of the Pavilion at KGV and the sale of Hallgate School have highlighted this issue. We understand that the ERYC have agreed to undertake a survey of the community facilities within the village and we hope that this will go ahead in the near future. The Parish Council has written to the Chief Executive and the Leader of the ERYC to try and open negotiations into how the Civic Hall could be better used within the village.

Switch on Night 2009 November 23rd Don't Miss It:



The Cottingham Christmas Lights now in its 28th year will be switched on by three children from within the village. One will be a member of the Cottingham Brownies who are celebrating the 100th Annivesary of the Brownie movement. and two children who are relatives of the Cottingham Lights members. The big switch-on of the illuminations for the much-vaunted festive-season spectacular takes place on Monday, November 23rd, at 7pm.

The youngsters will be accompanied on the switch-on rostrum, opposite the Memorial Gardens in Hallgate, by BBC Radio Humberside presenter Steve Massam, who lives in Cottingham, and who will be Master of Ceremonies - a duty he has undertaken for many years.

After switch-on night, the lights will be in daily operation from midafternoon until early January, but they will be switched on all day on Saturdays and on Christmas Eve.

After year-long planning, installation got underway in October, with Hull-based lifting services firm, Peter Hird and Sons Ltd., of English Street, assisting with hoists.

Although the displays this year have not changed significantly since 12 months ago, there has been further massive investment in the lights, which have become a crowd-pulling Christmas highlight and placed Cottingham under a bright and colourful spotlight in the much wider East Riding area in the last 28 years.

A large percentage of the cash injection has been on refurbishment and "unseen" maintenance work including cabling and re-wiring, welding repairs carried out by Les Fisher free of charge. A total of £2,500 has been spent on new lamps and festoons. £3,000 has been spent on refurbishing the Father Christmas festoon above Crafty Creations and Curtain Creations. To meet increasingly stringent health and safety requirements, renewal of power supply cables and wiring which carries the festoons - the straps of lamps which criss-cross the streets - has also been a major and costly project. All scaffolding has been donated by Alan and Shirely Reid of B. A. Scaffolding.

The hi-tech, energy-saving lamps offer a five-colour sequence change and produce a flowing wave-like effect from the traffic-lights junction to George Street.

As well as adding to the spirit of Christmas and the New Year, it is hoped that, as in past years, the illuminations, which are concentrated

on the main village-centre shopping areas - and overlooked from the east by the floodlit towering St Mary's parish church - will again attract visitors and shoppers to Cottingham from throughout the Hull and the East Riding region and even further afield.

In addition to grants from the Cottingham Parish Council to each of the three sections - King Street and West End, as well as Hallgate - additional money has been raised from a series of regular annual activities. They include a golf tournament, bingo sessions, a Christmas raffle, as well as a stall, operated by the West End Section, on the village's Thursday Market.

There will be a new feature on the roofs of the Chinese and Indian take-away restaurants in Hallgate, but no one has been let in on the secret of what this will be.

Carols and other festive-season music, commencing at 6.30pm, will be provided by ex-members Cottingham Band on switch-on night when, in addition to a wide variety of side-shows and charity stalls throughout the village, there will be children's fairground rides in Hallgate and on the Market Green, where the trees will be festooned with festive-season lighting.

Street sellers have again been asked to apply for a "Cottingham Lights Official Hawker" badge, and officials have has appealed for the public to buy items only from the official hawkers displaying their official badge.

Also making a return this year will be the KCFM Radio's promotional vehicle - and stage - which took part in Cottingham Day 2009 celebrations.

Based outside the Duke of Cumberland Hotel on the Market Green, one of the station's presenters will compere the activities - including music and competitions for which there will be prizes - led by the promotion team, who will mingle with the crowds and also collect money to donate to the lights fund.

"We will interact with the people of Cottingham and our emphasis will be on enhancing what is always a brilliant event", said Sarah Harrison, Marketing and Events Manager for KCFM, which broadcasts to Hull and East Yorkshire.

Throughout the afternoon and evening, village-centre road closures and parking restrictions will be in operation. Parking will not be allowed on the Market Green after 3pm. Hallgate will be closed at 5.00 pm and other road closures, from 6pm until 9.30pm, or at the discretion of the police, will be: Hallgate (from Arlington Avenue to West Green); the George Street junction with Hallgate; King Street, from the junction with Finkle Street to Somerfield's car park, which will be open.

There will also be many Craft and other stalls in the Cottingham Civic Hall on the Market Green.

The Cottingham Neighbourhood Policing Team, said that, throughout the event, police officers and PCSOs, in high-visibility uniform, will patrol on foot to provide the public with reassurance and to prevent any public disorder or alcohol-related incidents. The principle intentions are to ensure the safety of persons attending the event and to control the traffic, minimising any inconvenience caused to the general public and other road users.

Officers will deal with any incident promptly and efficiently to minimise disruption to the event and reduce danger to the public, he stressed.





Christmas or Plum Puddings

hristmas or Plum Puddings have a firm tradition at Christmas in the UK, despite taking hours to cook and, ideally, having to be cooked at least a month before Christmas so the flavours mature. On Christmas Day, the pudding is resteamed for between 2 to 4 hours, depending on its size and is served hot for dessert.

Christmas Pudding and Plum Pudding History

Christmas Pudding or rather Plum Pudding dates back to the middle ages but but was originally a Christmas porridge called Frumenty which contained wheat or corn which was boiled in milk. Over the years other ingredients were added such as dried plums or prunes, eggs, and meat and it became known as Plum Pudding. Then during 11th Century, when spices including cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg were introduced to Europe from the Middle East, these were also added to the puddings, probably originally as a sign of wealth.

Although the recipe evolved further over hundreds of years, with ingredients being added and taken away, it was only established as an essential Christmas food in the 1800s when Queen Victoria's husband, Prince Albert's love of it made it fashionable throughout the country.

Christmas Pudding Traditions

There are many traditions associated with Christmas or Plum pudding, including:

It should be made with 13 ingredients to represent Jesus and His Disciples

Coins are added to the pudding mix and then very member of the family should take a turn to stir the pudding with a wooden spoon, making a wish as they stir then whoever gets a coin in their portion on Christmas Day will have their wish come true

A sprig of holly is often used to decorate the top of the pudding to represent the crown of thorns worn by Jesus on the cross

Traditional Christmas Pudding

Ingredients

175g/6oz Sultanas

175g/6oz Seedless Raisins

50g/2oz Ready to Eat Dried Prunes, chopped

50g/2oz Glacé Cherries, halved

75g/3oz Dried Figs, chopped

50g/2oz Candied Peel, chopped

90ml/3fl.oz. Brandy

1 Apple, grated

The grated zest and juice of 1 Orange

3 Eggs, lightly beaten

125g/5oz Shredded Suet

175g/6oz Soft Dark Brown Sugar

1 tbsp Black treacle

125g/5oz Fresh Breadcrumbs

125g/5oz Self Raising Flour

1/2 teasp Mixed spice

Instructions

- 1. Place the sultanas, raisins, prunes, cherries, figs and candied peel and in a large mixing bowl, mix well and leave to soak for 6-8 hours, turning once or twice. Don't be tempted to add any more brandy as the whole lot will be going into the pudding.
- 2. After the soaking period, add the remaining ingredients to the soaked fruit mixture and mix very well.
- 3. Well grease a 1.5L/21/2 pt heatproof pudding basin with butter, then turn the pudding mixture into the bowl.
- 4. Cover with a large piece of greaseproof paper and a double layer of foil, both with a centre pleat to allow for expansion and secure with string.
- 5. Place the pudding in a saucepan with sufficient boiling water to come just below the rim of the basin and steam for about 3? hours until firm to the touch, topping up the pan with extra boiling water as necessary.

Allow the pudding to cool a little before turning out.

Once cooked, they can be stored for 1-2 months in an airtight tin. When you're ready to serve the pudding simply re-steam for about 3 hours.

Mincemeat Makes 2.2kg/5lb

Ingredients:

1.3kg/3lb Dried Mixed Fruit

225g/8oz Cooking Apples, peeled , cored and grated

100g/4oz Blanched Álmonds, chopped

175g/6oz Shredded Beef Suet (or Vegetable)

450g/1lb Soft Dark Brown Sugar

1 teasp Grated Nutmeg

1 teasp Ground Cinnamon

The grated rind of 1 Orange

The grated rind of 1 Lemon

300ml/10fl.oz. Brandy or Sherry

Instructions

- 1. Place all the ingredients in a large mixing bowl and mix until thoroughly blended.
- 2. Cover and leave to stand for 2 days.
- 3. Stir well to re-mix, then transfer to jars and cover with a waxed disc and lid and allow at least 2 weeks before using.

Christmas Cake Recipe

This is a recipe for a traditional British Christmas Cake. If you want to ice it, be sure to make the cake at least 1 week before Christmas Day.

Makes 1 x 20cm / 8-inch cake

Ingredients:

100g/4oz Glace Cherries, quartered

250g/9oz Currants

250g/9oz Sultanas

100g/4oz Mixed Candied Peel, chopped

125g/5oz Plain Flour

225g/8oz Butter or Margarine

The finely grated rind of 1 Lemon

The finely grated rind of 1 Orange

225g/8oz Soft Brown Sugar

50g/2oz Ground Almonds

4 Eggs, beaten

100g/4oz Self Raising Flour

2 tbsp Lemon Juice

4 tbsp Brandy

To Decorate

450g/1lb Almond Paste

Icing Sugar

200g/7oz Apricot Jam

750g/11/2lb Royal Icing

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 170C, 325F, Gas Mark 3 and line a 20cm/8 inch deep cake tin.
- 2. Place all the fruit in a plastic bag and sprinkle in 4 table-spoons of the plain flour. Shake well to thoroughly coat the fruit. Set aside.
- 3. In a large mixing bowl, cream together the fat with the lemon and orange rinds and the sugar until light and fluffy.
- 4. Stir in the almonds and mix well.
- 5. Add the beaten eggs, a little at a time then fold in the remaining plain flour, self raising flour, fruit, lemon juice and brandy. Mix well.
- 6. Turn into the prepared cake tin and bake in the oven for 2 1/2
 3 hours. Check after 2 hours and cover with a double piece of greaseproof paper if necessary.
- 7. Remove from the oven and allow to cool in the tin before turning out.
 - This cake is traditionally covered with Almond Paste (marzipan).
- 8. Wait until the cake is completely cold then turn upside down, onto a plate. The bottom of the cake has now become the top. If necessary level what used to be the top so the cake will stand solidly.
- 9. Measure around the cake with a piece of string or tape measure.
- 10. Divide the almond paste into two and set one half aside.
- 11. Dredge a work surface very well with icing sugar. Divide the remaining half into two and roll each piece into an oblong as wide as the cake is deep and as long as half the circumference of the cake. It should be just OVER 7mm/1/4 inch in thickness.



- 12. Melt the apricot jam in a small saucepan and use to brush the sides of the cake. Make sure you reserve some for the top of the cake.
- 13. Press the two strips of almond paste to the sides of the cake, smoothing the joins with a round bladed knife. Make sure the top of the almond paste sides are level with the top of the cake. Transfer to a cake board and set aside.
- 14. Well dredge the work surface once again with icing sugar then roll our the remaining almond paste to a circle large enough to fit the top of the cake.
- 15. Brush the top of the cake with the remaining apricot jam then cover with the circle of almond paste, pressing down firmly and smoothing the join.

You should now wait at least 36 hours but preferably 5-7 days before icing the cake. Store in an airtight tin.

- 16. Spoon the Royal icing on the top of the cake then using a palette knife, smooth it over the top using a "to and fro" motion, until all the bubbles have broken.
- 17. Spread the icing down the sides of the cake, once again, smoothing with a palette knife.

Tip - getting a really smooth icing requires a little practice and patience, especially down the sides. Why not just "rough ice" the sides using a round bladed knife by simply patting the knife firmly onto the icing then pulling it back up thereby creating little peaks. Dampen the knife with water when necessary.



Dogs Put Footballers to Shame

t seems that the only news in the city over the last few weeks, has been that Hull City's saviour Jimmy Bullard has finally recovered from his knee injury, in time to save Hull City from the relegation trapdoor.

Mr. Bullard had ruptured his anterior cruciate ligament, but he is not alone as this is one of the most common injuries we see in dogs. The cruciate ligaments are inside the knee joint and keep the femur (thigh bone) and tibia (shin bone) stable. Unlike in people who usually have some kind of sporting injury to damage their cruciate, dogs have degenerate cruciate disease in which the ligament gradually wears out, although some dogs will damage their knees usually by getting their legs caught in rabbit holes when running at speed. Certain breed are pre-disposed to cruciate disease, these include Rottweilers, Labradors and other large breeds.

How will I know if my dog has damaged its cruciate ligament?

Your dog will become very lame on his hind leg, not willing to put weight on it at all and may even have a swollen stifle (knee joint). Your veterinary surgeon will do a thorough examination of the affected leg looking for joint swelling especially on the median

(inner) side, pain on flexion of the joint and what we call an anterior draw, when holding the thigh and shin bone movement and instability can be produced. We would also advise x rays to rule out other causes of stifle lameness.

What can be done for my dog?

Very much like athletes, surgery is the best way to help dogs with cruciate disease. For dogs smaller than 20kg we can use fishing line believe it or not to stabilise the stifle. The surgery involves opening into the stifle to remove the torn ligament and tidy up any tears to the cartilage in the knee joint, suturing the joint back together and then using the fishing line as an external ligament, which is outside the joint. Even in small dogs such as Westies there is still a lot of strength required from the nylon, up to 120lb pressure!

For larger dogs however no false ligament has the strength to stabilise the joint. We used to use a piece of the dogs own connective tissue as a ligament and in people I believe they even use the ligaments from dead people! Over the last few years a new technique has evolved known as a TIBIAL PLATEAU LEVELLING OSTEOTOMY (TPLO), which involves cutting a wedge of bone out of the shin bone (tibia) to alter the angle of the joint and restore stifle stability. In reality we are breaking the shin bone and using metal plates to repair the break. This is a very complicated procedure carried out usually at referral centres, but we are very proud of the fact that one of our veterinary surgeons at the Park Street Hospital, Mr David Robinson, is offering this surgery to clients with very good success rates. David has now done over thirty of these procedures saving our clients long journeys to referral centres.






Post operation x rays of a TPLO, showing the plated tibia after the wedge of bone has been removed, a 3 hour operation.

How will my dog be after cruciate surgery?

Dogs are much tougher than us humans, although sore for a few days after surgery they will with a week start to use their leg and recovery to full use takes three to four months, not nearly 10 months as in Jimmy Bullard's case. Dogs are usually on pain relief for a month or so but long term pain relief is not necessary. As cruciate disease is more of a degenerative than traumatic disease in dogs often when one cruciate snaps it is often followed a few months later by the ligament in the other leg. Most dogs return to full fitness after surgery, my own lurcher had her cruciate repair done at 8 weeks old and I certainly cannot catch her! As with any damaged joint arthritis may set in but this is usually many years down the line.

So when Jimmy Bullard finally plays again for Hull City, remember if he had been a dog, he would have been back on the pitch months earlier and could been operated on in Hull rather than America!

anxiety control and I have used some really successfully in the past. The great thing is that it is quick and easy and you do not get any lasting effects like drowsiness so you do not need to be accompanied. How cool is that?

Back On To The Drugs Then

I'm supposed to be talking about drugs this time. There was a time not too long ago when you could go to the dentist, get knocked out and have your teeth done. Sometimes this was done by a dentist on his own with nobody else with special training in anaesthesia or sedation. Those days are gone. General anaesthetics have now to be done in a hospital setting with emergency care available only a stone throw away. General anaesthesia has its place for advanced surgical work or with young children and is still available for that. It is also available for special medical cases e.g. being allergic to local anaesthetic. I don't think that general anaesthesia has a place in more routine dentistry and it certainly does not help anyone overcome their dental anxiety and give them tools to deal with emotions successfully themselves.

So What Else Is There Then?

Conscious sedation is the next step down if you like. This is when you are still awake but you can feel from a little less anxious all the way to feeling really out of it. With any of the techniques you really need to have a responsible person with you to make sure you are OK, a close friend or relative, and with some techniques you should not be at work or operate machinery afterwards. Already there is a draw back in that there is an increased hassle factor. It has to be planned, you have more people involved and you have more rearranging of your life. It will also cost more.

Another thing is that you can begin to rely in it fuelling your anxiety, especially if you have it for more 'routine' things. The advantage with some conscious sedation is the amnesic effect that it has, i.e. you can forget what went on. I think that this can be very useful for some advanced work. In children a very good technique is relative analgesia (laughing gas). This was really popular and common in many practices but as the regulations and requirement for more monitoring equipment increased it is not as popular today.

Pills And Other Stuff

Oral anti-anxiety tablets may be prescribed. Often you take one before bedtime the night before to help you sleep and then one or two the next day depending on when your appointment is. The beauty of this is obviously the convenience. The draw back is that it is difficult to predict the effectiveness. From one person to the next but a good night sleep and taking the edge off may be all that is needed to help you through. After this you may want to go solo next time without the medication. Last but not least there is I.V. sedation. This is the injection of a medicine into a vein to make you feel very relaxed.

The beauty of this is the amount of control of the effective dose and therefore how profound an effect the medication has i.e. it is much easier to control the amount of relaxation. It is quick acting and as mentioned earlier there is the amnesic effect. Again the draw backs are that it is not easily available there and then on demand and usually has to be planned for, the hassle factor and having to involve more people. As I mentioned earlier I think that this technique has its place for more advanced treatments.

So There You Have It

In the last three articles we have had a quick blast through several methods to overcome dental anxiety. In my experience over the last 17 years or so very few people that I have seen have needed to resort to drugs for their dentistry and I think that this is great. Communication is the key, this and understanding builds trust and a great working relationship.

I think I'll give the tree a miss this time and have a beer instead. Thanks for reading.



Map: EXPLORER 294 :: Start near the village pond. GR. 875592. Distance 6.5 Miles.


Talk by the village pond on the Thixendale road. Immediately before the Mill, turn left and follow a grassy track, cross over the Mill access road and continue along the grassy track. At the end of the field, pass through a metal kissing gate and descend down the dale on a clear diagonal track.

At the bottom of the dale bear right and pass through a metal kissing gate and then follow the dale up to the left. Climb moderately to reach a stile at the top of the dale head, cross this stile and then continue ahead in the same direction along a farm track. When the track swings left to the farm, continue ahead on the grassy track and cross a stile to emerge onto a metalled road. Cross the road and continue in the same direction along a farm track. Pass through a gate and continue along the track as it swings left to descend Thixen Dale.

On reaching the bottom of the dale, continue straight ahead follow-

ing the dale bottom to the left. On reaching the next gate, do not pass through but turn left to meet a stile, cross the stile and follow the dale bottom for about 200 metres then bear right to meet a plantation. Follow the path round the plantation keeping it on your right. Eventually cross a stile into Pluckham plantation and follow the path to reach the A166 road. On reaching the road, turn left and follow this to a cross roads and turn right (signed Huggate) and then after about 30 metres locate a path on the left and follow this keeping the hedge on the left.

On reaching the farm access road, turn left and follow the road into the farm, turn left and then right through the farm grounds and then follow a distinct track to eventually reach a stile. Cross this stile into Holme Dale and keep the hedge on the left. On reaching two magnificent Horse Chestnut trees, pass through a gate and then continue up the lane and back into Fridaythorpe.

In the Garden



Fruit and Vegetable garden

Plant any cane, bush and tree fruit ordered last month. Do not plant if the ground is frozen or waterlogged. If the planting site is not ready when plants arrive, then heel in the bare-root ones in a spare piece of ground, and leave containerised ones standing - but water them when needed.

Start winter pruning of established, open-grown, apple and pear trees (not cordons, espaliers, pyramids or fans).

Gooseberries, redcurrants and blackcurrants can be pruned from around now, but it might be better to wait until late winter/early spring, so that any winter damage can be removed at the same time. Grape vines can be pruned from now through the winter. Doing this early for those under glass will allow more light to reach other plants in the glasshouse or conservatory. Prunings can be used as hardwood cuttings.

Cut out the fruited canes of blackberries and hybrid berries, if not yet done.

Formative pruning of young, free standing, fruit trees and bushes (under three years old) can also be done from now. They should first be pruned to encourage branching and bushiness from the main stem. Subsequently, they should be encouraged to form an open centred 'goblet' shape of main branches, without any being misplaced or crossing.


Mulch fruit trees and bushes.

Lift and divide rhubarb plants to propagate them, or to rejuvenate old crowns.

Strawberry runners that have been potted up for forcing in February and March next year, should now be turned on their sides, or placed in a well-ventilated cold frame. Excess moisture or warmth could cause rots or precipitate premature growth.

Hardwood cuttings can be taken this month - this is a great way to propagate blackcurrants, redcurrants, white currants, gooseberries and grape vines - providing they are disease (especially virus) free.

Grape vines can also be propagated using eye cuttings. These are shorter than standard hardwood cuttings (having only one bud, or 'eye'), and are used commercially to produce a large number of plants. Only attempt these if you are confident, as

longer cuttings have more buds to rely on for rooting.

Clean and store bamboo canes in the shed (or other dry place) to ensure they're still in good condition for next year.

Vegetables

Harvest leeks. They can be heeled in horizontally into a shallow trench outside the back door, for easy access.

You may have other vegetables ready for harvest: Jerusalem artichokes, winter cabbage, spinach, Swiss chard, kohl rabi and radishes can all still be cropped.

Cauliflowers can be harvested, or left in situ with the leaves snapped and folded down over the curds to protect them.

Lift and store root crops such as carrots, beetroot, turnips and swedes.

Parsnips can be left in the ground until needed, or lifted and then buried in a shallow trench for easy access when needed. They taste better when frosted. Make sure to mark the trench.

If you have Brussels sprouts ready for harvesting, pick the largest sprouts from the bottom of the stalk first.

Stake any Brussels sprouts stalks that look leggy and vulnerable to wind rock.

Plant garlic cloves in modules inside a cold frame, or outdoors in mild areas in its final position (free-draining soils and low rainfall areas only).

Dig over, incorporating well-rotted organic matter if available and weed vacant areas of the vegetable plot. Once they are fully wetted by winter rain, cover them with thick black polythene or other opaque covering, and leave them until next season, when they will be easy to prepare for planting and sowing.

After digging, you may want to mulch.

Now is a good time to get ahead and prepare new asparagus beds for planting up in the spring. Plenty of organic matter and grit will help to improve drainage to the level required by asparagus. A raised bed could be a good investment on heavy clay soil, to make it more asparagus friendly.

Flower garden

Plant tulip bulbs this month. Some tulips persist year to year, some perform less well and are treated as bedding, and replaced

Lily bulbs can still be planted in pots this month (if available). They can either be brought inside next spring to 'force' them into an early display, or left outside to flower naturally in

Last chance to plant out winter bedding. You could try wallflowers, forget-me-nots, Bellis, Primula, Viola (winter pansies) and other spring bedding plants, planting them into well- prepared ground, or pots of suitable compost. Water them if no rain is forecast, using stored rain or recycled water wherever possi-

Now is a good time to plant new herbaceous perennials, as the soil is still warm, but moister than it was during the summer.

Penstemons are best left as-is (except for deadheading) until the spring, when they can be cut back further. In mild areas they can carry on flowering well into the late autumn and early winter. The old faded stems will help to protect the crowns from cold. Mulching over the crowns in colder areas will also help.

It is still a good time to lift and divide overgrown clumps of herbaceous perennials. This can improve shape, vigour and flowering, as well as increasing your stocks of favourite plants.

Lift and store dahlias, cannas and tuberous bedding begonias that have been hit by the first frosts. Only in mild areas can dahlias and cannas be left to overwinter in the ground, covering the crowns with a protective layer of straw or bracken, but they may come into flower very late the following year as a consequence of cold weather. Begonias should always be brought in, dried out, and stored in a similar way as for dahlias.





Recently I glimpsed the future, the digital future that is, and I only had to go as far as the KC Stadium. It was a first for this area, the first conference dedicated to the world of technology and how we interact with it; or put simply 'life in the digital space'. Entitled Hull Digital Live (www.hdlive09.co.uk) it was a coming together of all things digital – the Internet, communication, social networking, advertising & marketing, and how it affects all of us.

The keynote speech was from the BBC's own technology correspondent, Rory Cellan-Jones. Joining the Beeb back in the 1980's just as Richard Baker was reading his last news bulletin and hi-tech was a typewriter; he is a man who has indeed seen the rise of technology. His theme was Broadband; where the UK ranks in the world standings (about half way), right down to how our own local provider Karoo compares. 'Does anybody know where HU16 is?' he asked, as he pointed to a speed of 7Mbps on his big screen presentation. That was one of the best reported speeds in our local area as it turned out. But of course there are areas, particularly out towards the coast, where speeds drop considerably, or the service disappears completely; places now known as 'Notspots'. The UK average is apparently 3.8Mbps (depending whose figures you believe), though some areas enjoy breakneck speeds of up to 50Mbps thanks to hugely expensive fibre-optic cabling. The trick here is the much quoted and much-abused term 'up to'. Where you are determines what you get!

Looking even further afield, Rory C-J had just undertaken a tour of East Africa for a BBC programme looking at how those emerging nations are coping, and how they see Broadband as a priority, and are piping it in from a new cable running beneath the Indian Ocean from the Gulf. In some countries this is complimented by the 'one laptop per child' initiative that I have mentioned before in this column. See:

Such is the momentum behind the digital future that even these nations are racing to put in broadband over their more basic fundamental needs. Everyone is worried about being left behind in the relentless march into the future. Our own Government has published its own version, in the form of the Digital Britain Report. Many say this does not go far enough in its outlook, but it is pointing inevitably towards the Internet becoming a utility the same as water, gas and electricity.

Charles Arthur, Technology Editor of the Guardian, spoke of how journalism has changed over the years. News gathering now relies not on press releases, but by monitoring what is happening online. All human life is there; and I will explain a few terms now in common English usage. People are 'blogging' - writing up there thoughts online. 'Tweeting'- using the website called 'Twitter' which lets anyone post short messages saying what they are doing, or more importantly what they think, or what they have just heard/seen, and remember we are talking global here. Everything is instant. Journalists now gather all their info, write it up and post it to the online version of their own newspaper. So by the time the paper hits the streets next day, it is already old news. A thought struck me listening to this presentation that if we (the average person on the end of a computer), are all involved in putting our thoughts online and other people are reading/commenting and then posting their own version, then do we need journalists to package it up and sell it back to us to read?

The calibre of speakers you will have gathered by now was first class, and the techno-onslaught continued unabated (apart from the excellent refreshments). We were regaled with the science behind websites, and the psychology involved in online selling and some of the stunning new ways designed to entice us to buy, and of course make the process as simple as possible. The two memorable examples were a code on the corner of a magazine advert, that when a camera phone is pointed at it takes you straight to the website where that item is for sale. The other was a sheet with a code printed on it, which when held in front of a webcam projected a 3D image of a new TV onto the screen, so you could see for yourself how it would look in your own

And lastly a new term to me - 'augmented reality', and not a dubious substance in sight! Imagine standing outside somewhere, and you needed to know the way to the station. You simply point your iPhone (or similarly enabled camera phone) at the scenery in front of you, it takes a gps fix and then overlays the scene with directions of how to get there - fantastic!

But here's the thing. During the day we looked at the myriad ways there are of communicating without actually speaking to anyone. But in fact there were present around 200 people who took the time to get away from their computer, travel to the KC, from London, San Francisco, and Cottingham(!), and spend some quality time talking to each other face to face, discussing, and discovering new ideas. Congratulations to local organizer Jon Moss for a superb conference, and roll on next year's event.

Now some gritty matters from the computing frontline. Over 40 million internet users have been scammed in the last twelve months by instances of 'scareware' scams over the last year. It has been reported by a major security company that there are over 250 variants of the scam, thought to generate over £750,000 per annum for criminals according to data gathered between July 2008 and June 2009. The scam, which we have seen many instances of, takes the form of warning the user that their security is flawed or needs upgrading. They are then directed to a website where they are duped into paying around £40-£60 (normally quoted in US\$), basically for nothing. This fraudulent activity seems to be getting past all the major anti virus products (as it is not actually a virus), but does a very good job of masquerading as such, or even by using Microsoft colours and logos. Don't be tricked into this, if in doubt take



Never Too Late to Learn

he one thing that has, over the years, remained to impress me is the fact that no matter how old the horse, it never loses the ability to learn or re-learn (both good and bad). When you consider a thoroughbred in a racing career till the age of 11, as can often be the case.... they can be retrained to do another job in life. Amazingly, the longer the horse is in training the better.

The very fact that an individual horse can survive and flourish in the racing game for a long and consistent career, is a credible testament to its good temperament and trainable nature as an individual.

The "2nd hand" horse market is constantly flooded by very cheap, young thoroughbred horses. They are all racing failures and have been chucked onto the horse scrapheap for several reasons.

- They were simply too young mentally to cope with the stress and trauma of their training regime, leading to very real and dangerous behavioural issues.
- They were simply too immature physically to cope, leading to leg injuries at an incredibly young age.
- They were unfortunate enough to end up with one of the many awful or harsh trainers. Like the puppy breeding trade, there are too many unscrupulous and cruel so called trainers out there.
- Few and far between are the horses that simply don't have what it takes to run fast enough. They can be really genuine young horses, simply too slow.

The Racehorses that remain consistent and come out of training from 8 or 9 onwards are usually really calm and sweet individuals. Because they have stayed in so long then the chances are they have been both well trained and well cared for. These are the horses which are usually a delight to retrain into being general riding horses.

Their ability to learn a whole new way of going and a whole new lifestyle is profound. They appreciate time out in the paddocks and will make real bonds within their new herd, (sometimes too much so, which can lead to separation anxiety). But as a rule these older horses learn and learn well. They can very often end up competing in dressage, show jumping, showing or eventing.

If anyone out there is considering taking on an ex racehorse as their future pet then be well advised to learn about its history. It

should always hold a Weatherby's passport, not some basic identity. That way you can trace its history and career.

Dealers buy up these horses cheap, lose their identity papers and name, invent a past and sell to the unwary at a huge profit. These horses are usually untrained out of racing and will arrive with major issues......so be warned.

The photo below is one of older horses, Lord Tom who retrained into new a career.

Why, the older we get, do we humans lose the ability to learn new ideas or accept retraining? We tend to close-mindedness at times and can lose sight of new ways of both learning and training...

As a rule, the younger any human or animal is, then the greater is their ability to be taught in general. A race horse has been so totally institutionalised from such a young age, into a life style so intense in its way of being. It truly is a testament to the equine brain, that such enormous and profound changes can be made in a very short space in time, at such a late age as well.



Hallgate Schools - continued

December 1918 to 1st January 1919

chools resumed on Monday December the 30th 1918 then closed on Wednesday for New Year's Day 1919.

The attendance was fairly good despite the buildings being 'excessively cold' but there were the usual absences due to colds and sore throats etc. in all departments. Maud Ashton was granted an exemption certificate along with several other girls and a new subject was introduced in 'housewifery' alongside the established lessons in cookery and laundry for the girls. School continued to be cold and a shortage of fuel for the boilers resulted in the schools closing on Thursday 27th of February "for a long weekend" to conserve stocks of coal and coke - no doubt an agreeable surprise for the scholars!

Courses introduced to help with Influenza Outbreaks

A further new course of instructions was introduced in the girls' school - sick nursing, probably stimulated by the influenza outbreaks plus the seasonal illnesses; it was felt that this topic would both help the older girls to care for siblings at home and perhaps point the way to a career after leaving school.

An H.M.I., Mr Frith, paid a day's visit to the school on Tuesday 11th of March; he was evidently interested in singing as he "gave some very interesting suggestions on the teaching of singing, from 3 to 4pm to the head teachers of all three departments and to several assistant teachers in the girls' department."

Exams were held in March in both the girls' and boys' schools, Mr Moorby was away ill all February but returned in time for the quarterly exams and found a lot of colds among the boys and the staff resulting in poor attendance of all. Mr Moorby began to experience more frequent bouts of illness because he recorded in the log book that a Mr Blenkinsop from Norton school was to take charge when he "was not well enough to come".

Teachers received pay increase

In May 1919 a document was received from County Hall detailing increases in some teachers salaries - Mr Moorby's up £35 to £270 a year; Miss Youngson's up £45 to £175 and two other teachers were to receive £145 and £135 per year respectively. The same document directed that boys who attained the age and conditions for leaving school were to remain to the end of a term - not to leave on a birthday. Conversely, children could be admitted anytime and need not wait for the beginning of term, resulting in many children actually starting school on their birthday - horror of horrors! Further, "Section 8 (1) of the Education Act of 1918 is not yet in operation so that exemption under present Bye-Laws is in operation"; so the new school leaving age of 14 had not yet come into force - this applied to both girls' and boys' schools.

Cricket Match played on "Devon Street pitch"

An interesting item appeared in the boys' log book at the end of May - "On 30th May Sts. VI and VI had a cricket game on the Devon 'Street pitch."

Devon Street, off New Village Road, was not built up until the late 1920's and into the 30's - only the Edwardian houses on the right were there with a footpath to the bottom to meet the snicket, there were no houses on the left nor were there any on the right hand side of Cornwall Street, only the older ones on the left with a footpath down to the snicket; there were no houses on New Village front between these two streets - imagine a grass field there with a fence round it and a gate at the front. This field is where Richard Cox grazed his cows after milking at his dairy at 66 New Village Road, just passed the Classical Gas Showrooms. Mr Cox must have lent the boys the field or a part of it for their cricket games.

On the 5th June a lantern lecture was given to the boys and girls of Sts. IV and above in the boys' hall by an officer of the Canadian Emigration Board. There was quite an upsurge of interest in the prospects of emigration to the Dominions as they were then known, after the Great War and presumably this event was to give children a visual view of that country which was appealing for new settlers at the time, plus of course as a useful aid in geography.

On 25th of June a days holiday was given, "on account of the United Sunday Schools trip to Hornsea all on the same day thus avoiding trips on 4 or 5 different dates."

Classes and teachers in the boys' department in July 1919 were St. I, 41 boys Miss Lathem; St II, 41 Miss Webster; St III, 42 Miss Norton; St. IV, 37 Miss Steel; St. V 46, Mrs Wellstead; St. VI, 37 Miss Youngson; St VII and ex VII, 21 Mr Blenkinsop. Mr cook was demobilised in August "returning with his unit from Salonica" and resumed teaching at the school replacing Miss Norton who left to go elsewhere.

Many Changes of Staff

Three teachers appeared in quick succession in the girls' department - Miss Pomfrett who left to get married and was replaced by Miss Barnes from April to June when she too left and was replaced by Miss E.P. Wright. A lot of illness was reported among the staff, but the girls seemed to be enjoying a few healthy weeks for a change; 35 girls were transferred from the infants to the 'big school' in July and summer holidays were from 18th of July to 25th August 1919.

Mrs Tether did not return to school for several weeks due to illness and by mid September whooping cough, measles and diphtheria had made their usual appearances, especially among the younger girls. Two days holiday was given for Hull Fair and attendance was 'irregular' for the rest of the week as the Fair exercised it's usual pull over the children, many of whom thought nothing to walking there and back to save their precious coppers.


Mrs Tether went off ill again in November and did not return until June of the next year and a Mrs Peak was engaged as a supply teacher.

In September Mr Moorby complained in the log book that "Members attending a Dance Class will interfere with school property, defacing maps drawn on black boards etc."

Apples and pears were gathered from trees in the school gardens and heavy crops were reported; potatoes wee dug up and they also gave good results and the soil was then dug over for the winter. The headmaster had a further bout of illness in November but returned for the first anniversary of Armistice Day. This was a solemn occasion in both boys' and girls' department; at 10.58am all classes assembled in their respective halls and a two minute silence was observed, then a letter from the King to all schools was read out followed for the rest of the day by lessons on peace and war and the new League of Nations in all classes.

ver the last few years residents will have seen a group of fluorescent jacketed people, of all ages, cleaning up various parts of Cottingham on a Saturday morning. This band of volunteer litter pickers and graffiti removers are part of the Cottingham NATS team. NATS (Neighbour Action Teams) were the result of the "Building Communities Beating Crime" initiative. The East Riding of Yorkshire Council Safe Communities introduced 15 NATS teams which work in partnership with Humberside Police to identify concerns and agree local priorities.

The aim of the group is to work in partnership with Safe Communities to reduce crime, disorder and the misuse of drugs. Your local NATS team meets every two months and consist of representatives from local communities and includes local Police Officers, Police Community Support Officers, crime prevention panel, youth organisations, schools, drug treatment services, Fire and Rescue services, Neighbourhood Watch Groups, Safe Communities support officer, community and voluntary groups, local religious groups including "Cottingham Churches Together" and Parish and County Councillors, and anyone else who wants to join us.

Recent projects carried out by the Cottingham NATs include leafleting car owners to reduce vehicle crime, clearing graffiti and litter in the Cottingham area and very successful cycle coding days.

The NATS team work closely with the schools and recently the group are carryed out 'Theft of Cycle Awareness' days targeting adults and local school children with crime prevention advice and held another cycle coding. Professor David Bellamy, the TV presenter and environmentalist recently visited Croft Park Caravan Park at Little Weighton to offer eco-friendly advice to park owners Steve and Denise Yorke-Fairburn.

Local children from the Little Weighton Rowley C of E Primary School had a competition at their school, having to write an essay on why they would like to meet David Bellamy. Five winners were chosen and invited to be present when Professor Bellamy visited the Park. The children helped him to plant a cherry tree and were given lots of informtion regarding environmental subjects.

Professor Bellamy was very impressed with the work that has already been undertaken by Steve and Denise, such as recycling and composting measures, they leave hedgerows in their natural state to provide a habitat for birds, animals and plant life.

With David Bellamy's help they hope to offer customers green options with their holidays homes, such as urban drainage systems, solar heating and solar energy.

When Professor Bellamy began examining the conservation work being carried out by holiday parks almost ten years ago, he made some very exciting discoveries. For it wasn't just human guests which were enjoying the natural surroundings: birds, animals and plant life were also flourishing as a result of the good environmental practices being put to work.

Professor Bellamy's study prompted him to initiate an annual award scheme to highlight the many remarkable

This month our Mystery Diners visited The King William IV (King Billy) on Hallgate, Cottingham

rf you are looking for somewhere to eat in Cottingham which offers home-made cooking and portion sizes that even the biggest appetite would struggle with, then you need to visit the King William 1V Public House in Hallgate.

Now one of the most popular pubs in the village, landlady Maggie Clarke and her team have certainly turned the fortunes of this hostelry around over the last few years. It now boasts a comfortable lounge which doubles as the restaurant, a traditional bar, a back room Brewery Bar, which is available for hire and an outside seating area for when the English weather allows for outside drinking.

The pub offers a full range of beers, ciders, spirits along with a changing selection of guest ales and over a dozen wines, some available by the glass. A popular talking point about this pub is the food.

Having heard so much about it and never visited for more than a drink, my wife and I decided to give it a try. We visited one Friday for an early dinner, arriving at about 6pm. Food is served from 5.30pm to 7.45pm most evenings and when we arrived the place was packed with early evening diners and every table was in use. However this gave us time to get a drink and to look at the Menu and Specials board. The main menu offers a varied selection of sandwiches in both large and small portions, Hot Baguettes and Jacket potatoes with most of the prices under £4.

There is also a selection of Light Bites such as Soup and a roll (£1.95) and Garlic Bread (£1.95) as well as the King Billy Combo (£.4.50). The main meals read like fairly typical Pub Fare - Fish and Chips, (Available every day) Smoky Chicken, Scampi, Lasagna, Chilli, Gammon Steak - all at £5.95. There is also a range of Burgers, Steaks and a massive Mixed Grill if you are really hungry. On the Specials

Board on the night we visited was Home Made Steak Pie, Liver & Onions, Pasta Bake and a choice of desserts. Once you have made your choice and found a table you order your food at the bar, sit back and

From the Main Menu I chose Deep fried Fresh Fish & Chips and Mushy Peas and my wife had Home Made Steak Pie from the Specials Board. When we ordered, we were asked if we wanted small or large portions. We both picked the larger option!!!

As we waited for our food, only about 15 minutes, we watched a constant stream of plates coming out of the kitchen loaded with food and an equal number being returned empty. From where we were sitting it all looked very encouraging.

We had also ordered a bottle of Pinot Grigio wine to accompany our meal, which was one of nine different wines on the Wine Board at under a tenner. If I have any adverse comment to make it would be that the wine could do to be much colder.

When the food arrived, I have to say it was well worth the wait. The fish was huge and coated in a fantastic light homemade batter and cooked to perfection.

My wife's Home Made Steak Pie was enough for two, made with home-made pastry and filled with very tender pieces of beef. (All meat and Vegetables are bought locally)

The problem with such large portions is that it doesn't leave any room for a pudding, which looked really nice. The table next to ours had home-made Cheese Cake and Apple Pie with custard which were both huge and, according to the diners very tasty.

Our meal, with wine, cost a little over £21 which I feel is great value, especially when you look at the portion size. If you don't have a big appetite, then go for the smaller portion and maybe having a pudding as well.

As I say, if I am being 'picky' my only criticism was the the wine could be cooler, but maybe I should have asked for an ice bucket.

By the time we left at around 7pm the Lounge Bar was still busy with diners and I have a feeling it probably is most nights. We really enjoyed the food and all I can say is 'Maggie keep up the good work' This village needs a pub like this and if you have not tried the food, don't wait like we did, visit soon.

Put your best foot forward

our feet each have 26 bones. Your big toe has two bones and each of your other toes has three. These bones are called phalanges (fal-an-jeez) The middle part of your feet has 5 bones called metatarsals (met-a-tar-sals).

The two biggest bones in your feet are the strongest because they carry most of your weight. The heel bone (cal-ca-ne-ous) and the talus (that's the bone above your heel and below your shin bone) are two of the seven tarsal bones that spread out from your ankle to the middle of your foot.
